That index includes the espediente in this case as number five hundred and fifty, and it shows that the espediente was in the archives when that index was made; but it shows nothing more, and cannot in any sense be regarded as a Mexican record. Evidence to show that the grant was recorded is entirely wanting; and there is no pretence that the espediente was ever submitted to the Departmental Assembly for its approval. Absence of such approval, under the circumstances of this case, is entitled to very considerable weight. More than forty espedientes were presented to that assembly on the third and tenth days of June, 1846, and received its approval. Several of the grants were dated in April, 1846, and one was dated on the first day of May of that year, and the inference is a reasonable one, that if the espediente in this case had really been completed, and the grant actually issued, the former would have been included in the list. Taken together, these various considerations throw great distrust upon this document, and justify the conclusion that it is entitled to little or no weight. Rejecting the espediente as unsatisfactory and wholly insufficient, under the circumstances, nothing semains to support the claim in this case except the parol proof. Another witness, James M. Harbin, testifies, that he saw William Knight in Los Angeles about that time, and that he said he was there for the purpose of getting a grant for ten leagues of land on the Sacramento river; that Governor Pio Pico told him that he had issued the grant, and that he, the witness, saw papers in the possession of Knight when he started to return, but did not know what they were. Proof was also introduced by the claimant to show that the signatures to the marginal decree and the decree of concession were genuine; and he also introduced a affidavit of J. C. Davis, in which the affiant states that, on the 5th day of June, 1846, he heard Knight say, in the camp of Colonel Fremont, that he had just returned from the lower country, where he had procured his title papers; and the affiant also stated that he exhibited certain papers, calling them title papers, but the witness did not examine them, because he could not read the language. Other declarations of Knight were also introduced without objectionsuch as, that he, at one time, said he was going to Los Angeles, concerning the title to his land, and that, on his return, he said he had received it; and that, in March, 1847, he said he had lost his grant, and expressed his fears that he should lose his land in consequence of the loss of the grant. Suppose it were competent for the appellee to prove his claim without record evidence, still the burden is upon him to show that the grant was issued; and surely he must first show its existence and loss before he can be allowed to give secondary evidence of its contents. Applying that elementary rule to the facts of this case, and it is clear that the claimant has no standing in court. But a more decisive answer to the claim remains to be stated, and that is, that there is no record evidence that the grant was ever issued, and without such evidence the claim cannot be confirmed. That rule is founded upon the Mexican law, and has been so repeatedly announced by this court that it seems unnecessary to adduce any argument in its support. answer to the testimony of that witness claimant tending to prove that a book of records appertaining to land'titles in California, for the year 1846, was lost; but no attempt was made to show that the grant in question was ever recorded in that book. All we think it necessary to say upon that subject at the present time is, that proof of such a loss cannot avail a party in a case like the present, unless it also be shown, at least by circumstances which will justify the court in finding the fact. that the grant was duly and properly entered in the lost record. In view of the whole case, we are of opinion that the District Court erred in confirming the claim. The decree must accordingly be reversed, and the cause remand-

ed, with directions to dismiss the petition. Mr. Justice WAYNE. I content myself now with saving that I do not concur with the court in its conclusion in this case. I think it a severer exclusion of a right of property in land secured by treaty than has been hitherto adjuged by this court in any case from California.

GRAIN DEALERS .- The Commissioner of Revenue decides that a person who buys grain strictly on his own account, and sends it to another market, their to be sold on commission, is not thereby made subject to any license tax under the Excise law. If he buys grain solely for another person or firm, acting as their agent, he is still exempt from license. If he buys for more than one party, he comes 14, and require a license as a commercial broker.

This applies only to instances where grain is bought and sent to another market for sale. When the grain is sold by the purchaser he requires a dealer's license; but whether wholesale or retail must be left entirely to the judgment of the Assessor in each case.

Inasmuch as a licensed wholesale dealer is permitted to act as a commercial broker without an additional licente, as well as to sell at retail, parties engaged in the grain trade, as usually conducted, will probably find it to their advantage to obtain licenses as wholesale dealers .-Buffalo Com. Advertiser.

SWAMP LAND REPORT .- The Swamp Land Commissioners have prepared an elaborate report of their past transactions, which covers over five hundred pages of foolscap, to be presented to the Legislature at its approaching session. The Board have established 33 swamp land districts, which embodies 385,252 acres of land. It has caused to be segregated 1,018,142 acres of swamp land, of which amount 956,250 acres were claimed by the United States, but which are now secured to this State. Some \$78,890 have been expended, of which amount \$18,157 were paid to the City and County of Sacramento on account of the new levees built by the Levee Commissioners outside of the city .- Union.

> The facts are easily obtained to show that there has been woful mismanagement on the part of the military authorities sent to ameliarate the condition of that people. Hardly a week has passed during the last six month but one or more citizens have been brutally murdered, and their homes pillaged and destroyed; and this too, with a force of from three to seven hundred military within the county borders. For a time the military commander of the district even refused an escort for the mail between Hoopa Valley and Arcata, and it was only upon the threat that the route would be abandoned, that such protection was furnished. B:t Humboldt county is not alone in this extremity The people on the Trinity border, and in Klamath and Del Norte counties, are also in danger, and it is to be hoped that the entire Northern delegation will join in asking for relief for their constituents, and see that it is provided in some shape, no matter what, so long as we get it.

ARE LEGAL TENDER NOTES 'MONEY?' The San Francisco Herald has the fol-

lowing: Not long since the Supreme Court of this State decided that United States Treasury, or legal tender notes, were not rayable for local taxes, and now the question arises whether they are legally payable for anything. The important issue is before the Twelfth District Court, in the case of Jas. Lick vs. William Faulk ner and other. The defendants are tenants of plaintiff, and lately tendered him for the amount of the billin coin. H. H. Haight, who argued the case for the plaintiff, contended that legal tender paper was in effect worthless for payment of any debts whatever, as the Constitution gave no authority for the issuance of any but gold and silver coin. I. M. Hastings, who spoke for more than three hours for the defendants, expounded the Constitution, to show that the Government had express power to coin money, and that that 'money' might be of any material which might be deemed most fit, as the word 'money' dd not, of necessity, mean gold or silver or any other metal. "That if any person or persons shall exercise or carry on any business hereinafter mentioned, for the exercise or carrying on of which Knight's Landing. july1-tf trade or business a license is required by this Act, without taking out such license as in that behalf required, he, she, cr they shall, for every such offense respectively, forfeit a penalty equal to three times the sum of money or amount of duts imposed for such licenses.'
