Manager's Introductory Word.

Madison, Wis., Jan. 1, 1918.

Dear Friends and Customers:

The writer has now been engaged in the seed business for thirty years, beginning in 1888 with a small four-page catalog devoted exclusively to Seed Potatoes. In 1903 the business was incorporated with a capital stock of \$50,000. In 1908 we burned out at Clinton and moved to Madison. In 1913 we built the large steel and concrete seed house that we now occupy here in Madison. The capital stock was increased to \$100,000.

Our Business has Grown Wonderfully. Instead of one 200-acre farm, which supplied enough Seed Potatoes when the business first started, it now requires several hundred such farms and a good many thousand acres to furnish the seeds we sell. We now have customers in every state of the Union. I want to thank all our good customers for their patronage, especially the past season, which is our banner year thus far. "Good Seeds Make Good Customers. Boy! Have Made our Success."

Our catalog is designed to appeal to users of seeds who appreciate having things represented in a plain, straightforward way. The slogan "Olds' Catalog tells the truth," is not a mere boast. The one great aim in preparing the catalog each year is to make sure that all the descriptions, statements and illustrations are true to fact. I would rather lose orders than exaggerate or misrepresent and I feel that the fact that we have been constantly adding to the list of customers who have confidence in us and our seeds is good evidence that this is the right policy.

The year 1918 will be a hard one for seedsmen. Seed crops the past season were short and some items were entire failures. Seeds that have always been grown in Europe cannot now be secured from there. Transportation service is bad. We are short of help as a number of our best men have been called to the war. However, we shall do our very best to help our customers who are doing their part in winning the war by growing bigger crops of grain and vegetables. We have worked hard to secure the best seeds possible and now intend to work harder than ever to live up to our ideals of service, promptness, just dealing and careful attention to details.

What Makes a Good Seed House? My opinion is that Quality should be given first consideration. What do you think about it? Pure seeds, Vital Seeds, Trueness to Name and Type. Are not these the things that are of the most importance? Next I would name Service. This includes such things as promptness, attention to details. Honesty and Truthfulness are of about as much importance as Service. Perhaps more.

Price is the last thing that should be considered. It has its bearing of course and everything is high enough this year, that is sure. But I appeal to you do not let price be the only consideration or the principal one. If you plant poor seeds you are lost. Everything nearly depends on the seed. Make sure that you get the best to be secured, the kind we offer, regardless of price.

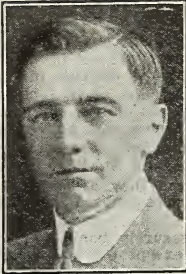

Our Staff of Seed Growing Experts

"Do you grow your own seeds," is a question we are often asked. We answer, yes, indirectly. They could not all grow at one place as no one locality is suited for producing all the different seeds required. Our Seed Corn, Grain and Potatoes, however, of which we make a specialty, are mostly grown right here in Wisconsin and there is no better state in the Union for these things. We place contracts with men who are specialists and have had experience with particular crops. We furnish the stock seed or satisfy ourselves that the seed used is what we want.

We present on this page the faces of a few of these expert men.

Henry Schroeder. King of the Red River Valley Potato Growers. Mr. Schroeder is a stockholder in our company and has grown Red River early potatoes for us for 22 years. He grows as high as 550 acres of potatoes a year, shipping to all sections. He is also President of two banks.

J. R. Anderson. Another large grower of Red River Valley potatoes. Mr. Anderson grows Early Six Weeks potatoes.

F. S. Campbell, Wisconsin's most famous grower of certified seed potatoes. Mr. Campbell's specialty is Rural New Yorker, but he grows also Green Mountain and Irish Cobbler. He has taken many prizes.

Oluf Cook. One of the enterprising pioneer potato farmers of Northern Wisconsin. Mr. Cook's farm is in Sawyer County. He grows Olds' White Mammoth certified stock and has had them for 10 or 12 years.

Karl T. Hazleberg. Grower of certified Green Mountain potatoes, Barron County, Wisconsin. Barron County took second place at the last Wisconsin Potato Growers' meeting.

Allen Fahland. An enthusiastic young potato specialist, of Polk County, Wisconsin. Mr. Fahland has been working on Carman No. 3 for nine years and has greatly improved this variety. Has grown 400 bushels per acre.

Arthur Oschner. Corn specialist and member of the Wisconsin Experiment Association. Mr. Oschner grows Golden Glow and has a fine strain.

H. C. Brueckner. Our most famous corn expert and grower of the finest seed corn produced in Wisconsin. Mr. Brueckner grows nothing but Murdock Yellow Dent and for the last 8 years we have handled all he could raise. Mr. Brueckner has taken a great many premiums. He is a member of the Wisconsin Experiment Association and lives in Jefferson County.

R. H. Lang. A young scientific farmer, also of Jefferson County and also a member of the Experiment Association. Mr. Lang grows Golden Glow.

John Wagner. One of the big farmers of Dane County. In fact he owns several farms and is chairman of supervisors in his town. Mr. Wagner's specialty is Pedigree Barley but he also grows Seed Oats. He is one of our stockholders and has been growing for us for 9 years.

A. V. Bronner. Another prominent grain farmer, neighbor of Mr. Wagner's. Mr. Bronner also is a stockholder with us and has grown thousands of bushels for us of different varieties of oats, wheat and barley.

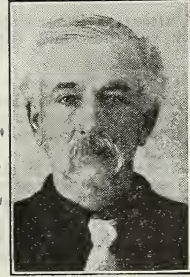

INSTRUCTIONS FOR ORDERING.

PLEASE USE ORDER SHEET found in catalog in making out your order if convenient and retain a copy. If you have occasion later on to write us about the order give post-office address from which it was mailed. Orders are filed alphabetically by post offices, so if you give a different post-office address it is difficult for us to find the order.

WE ACKNOWLEDGE ORDERS when received unless the order, or some part of it, is to be sent at once or within a day or so. If any part is mailed right out that answers as an acknowledgment or if goods can be sent at once by freight or express we send acknowledgment and notice of shipment at the same time enclosing Bill of Lading.

WE SEND LARGE SHIPMENTS BY FREIGHT unless otherwise instructed. See table of freight rates below. We have three railroads here at Madison, Chicago and Northwestern, Milwaukee and St. Paul and Illinois Central.

CUSTOMERS PAY TRANSPORTATION CHARGES on all goods unless they are offered postpaid. We have both the American and Wells Fargo Express Companies. There are special express rates everywhere on seeds. In the main the rate is 25 per cent less than the merchandise rate.

NO CHARGE FOR PACKING OR PACKAGES. Everything will be securely packed and labeled and delivered free at the Freight, Express or Post Office, without extra charge for packages except for a few items like clover seed, where bags are extra as noted in the catalog. All express rates have been reduced since the Parcel Post law went into effect.

PREPAID STATIONS. If there is no agent at your railroad station the freight has to be prepaid, and in such case we must request you to send money with your order to cover the amount.

ORDER EARLY. Do this for two reasons. We can give your order more careful and prompt attention if received before we get into the rush, and then we will not have to write for permission to substitute for varieties sold out.

OUR THREEFOLD GUARANTEE.

1. QUALITY. We guarantee the quality of the seeds, plants, bulbs and potatoes we send out to the extent that should they not prove as represented we will refill the order or return the money; but we give no further warranty, express or implied, as to description, purity, quality, productiveness or any other matter of any seeds, potatoes, bulbs or plants we send out and will not be responsible for the crop.

2. SAFE ARRIVAL. We guarantee everything we send out to arrive in good order. If potatoes freeze on the road we will refill the order if the time of shipping is left to our discretion. If any goods arrive in bad order, however, bags torn or anything else wrong, have this noted on the freight expense bill which must be sent us so that we can make proper claim. The bill of lading must be returned also.

3. RECEIPT OF MONEY. We will be responsible for all money sent us through the mails, if remittance is made by P. O. or Express Order, Draft or Registered Letter. We will also accept personal checks at face value. Small amounts, less than \$1.00, may usually be sent safely in postage stamps or coin.

OUR PURPOSE.

To have the best of everything; to send out a neat, attractive catalog with truthful illustrations and descriptions; to be prompt; to be courteous; to be satisfied with small profits; to be honorable in our dealings, and to treat every customer so that he will want to order again. PARCEL POST RATES.

Parcel Post Rates apply to seeds, potatoes, bulbs, plants and merchandise of all kinds except poisons, which cannot be sent by mail. If ordered at freight or express prices add at the following rates if to go by mail:

1st and 2nd Zones (up to 150 miles from Madison) 5c for the first pound, 1c for each additional pound.

3rd Zone (151 to 300 miles from Madison) 6c for the first pound, 2c for each additional pound.

4th Zone (301 to 600 miles from Madison) 7c for the first pound, 4c for each additional pound.

5th Zone (601 to 1,000 miles from Madison) 8c for the first pound, 6c for each additional pound.

6th Zone (1,001 to 1,400 miles from Madison) 9c for the first pound, 8c for each additional pound.

7th Zone (1,401 to 1,800 miles from Madison) 11c for the first pound, 10c for each additional pound.

8th Zone (over 1,800 miles from Madison) 12c for each pound.

Packages must not exceed 50 pounds in weight for the first two zones, and 20 pounds for all other zones.

SEED POTATO DEPARTMENT



There is money in potatoes if you plant the right kind of seed. Use seed that was grown for seed. Our seed potatoes are grown on contract specially for seed and from select stock.

Olds' Seed Potatoes have had a national reputation for years, but really the stock that we have to offer this year is better than usual. Most of our Wisconsin grown potatoes are "Certified Stock." That means that they have been inspected both when growing and after being dug, by the Wisconsin Potato Growers' Association, an organization under the supervision of the Wisconsin College of Agriculture with headquarters here at Madison. An official red label tag will be used with every order filled from this certified stock reading as follows:

"This Seed is Certified as Regards:

1. Freedom from varietal mixtures and reasonable conformity to the correct vine and tuber characteristics of the variety.
2. Freedom from black wart and powdery scab, or from serious infection with any other disease."

Our Seed Potatoes are Government Graded. We have decided to adopt the rules for grading established this last fall by the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture and the U. S. Food Administration. All the potatoes we offer unless otherwise stated conform to the rules of **U. S. Grade No. 1.** These are described as follows:

"This grade shall consist of sound potatoes of similar varietal characteristics, which are practically free from dirt or other foreign matter, frost injury, sunburn, second growth, cuts, scab, blight, dry rot, and damage caused by disease, insects, or mechanical means. The minimum diameter of potatoes shall be one and seven-eighths (1 7/8) inches."

Our Second Size Potatoes are just like the first size in every particular except as to size and conform to the specifications for **U. S. Grade No. 2,** as follows:

"This grade shall consist of potatoes of similar varietal characteristics, which are practically free from frost injury and decay, and which are free from serious damage caused by dirt or other foreign matter, sunburn, second growth, cuts, scab, blight, dry rot, or other disease, insects, or mechanical means. The minimum diameter shall be one and one-half (1 1/2) inches."

PACKING AND SHIPPING. We are in the best possible position to make prompt shipments, as we have our own sidetracks and load potatoes direct from our warehouses into cars alongside, shipping everything in refrigerator cars early in the season. If late in ordering, name second choice, as our rule is not to substitute without permission. All early shipments are packed in lined barrels. Later in the season, we sometimes ship in sacks, especially nearby orders, when we are satisfied that they will go just as well that way.

Our barrels hold exactly 172 pounds each net weight, the Wisconsin barrel. We understand a federal law recently passed makes a barrel of produce somewhat different. **Our barrel however is just 172 pounds** as stated.

WOODBURY WHITE ROSE.



A splendid new early potato, which we offer this year for the first time. It is just what is wanted by market gardeners who are looking for an attractive early that yields and is of fine quality.

Woodbury White Rose is a seedling of Early Rose but is superior to that old standard variety. It is a little earlier and yields better, as well as holding its type better. The single tuber we show in the picture is a typical specimen. The shape is oblong, just like the shape of the Early Rose in its best days; skin and flesh both pure white; skin slightly netted, eyes shallow, so that there is little waste in paring; of splendid quality and of beautiful appearance.

Our stock of Woodbury White Rose is from the Northern Peninsula of Michigan. Mr. Olds personally inspected the field of this variety while growing in August last. He found there a beautiful sight. The field at that time was in full bloom. It looked like a field of cotton. The stand was practically perfect, the growth large and strong and very even. He found that Mr. Geo. Nicholson, an old experienced potato grower, who grew our stock for us, had been working with this variety several years, and had been breeding it up and improving it. Mr. Nicholson himself had just carefully rogued his field and staked the mixtures. He found just 5 purple blossoms in a field of 5 acres.

Mr. Nicholson and his neighbor, Mr. Miller, who was also growing White Rose, both declared this the best early variety they had ever tried. They said it always outyielded Early Ohio and other earlies and was fine in appearance.

We are glad indeed to be able to offer this fine new white skinned early potato to our customers, something different in type from the other earlies we have. Our stock as grown by Mr. Nicholson is smooth pure stock, free from disease, and coming from the extreme north will be vigorous and healthy in its growth. We know the stock will please and we want all our potato customers to try it.

The well-known dependable all-around early variety.



Early Ohio is without doubt the most popular early potato in the country. We have more calls for it always than for any other early. Every one knows what it is, and knows that it can be relied on for an early market variety in almost every locality. A large percentage of the so-called Ohios throughout the country, however, are badly mixed. It is even very common to find Ohios all mixed up with Early Rose or some other variety with smooth skin and pointed ends. A typical Early Ohio should have blunt rounded ends, with the cluster of eyes at the seed end right out flush with the surface.

Our illustration shows just how Olds' Famous Improved Red River Grown Early Ohios look, as it is an actual photograph of a barrel put up from our bins showing the potatoes just exactly as they are. Note the well-rounded symmetrical shape and uniform size. No run-out stock about them. We have sold thousands and thousands of bushels of this high grade vigorous stock, shipping them to customers all over the United States.

Part of the Red River Ohios we offer were grown by Mr. Henry Schroeder personally, the "Potato King" of the Red River Valley. Mr. Schroeder's stock is really "Pedigree Stock," bred up and selected during a long term of years. It is not only pure and free from disease but will produce as it has the breeding in it. We charge more for it because it is worth more and because it costs us more.

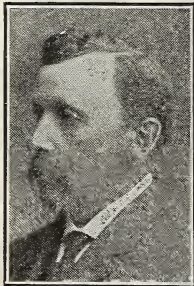

We have always gotten best results from hill selected seed, taking only those hills that have six or more 3 to 10 ounce potatoes, true to type and not more than one or two small ones."

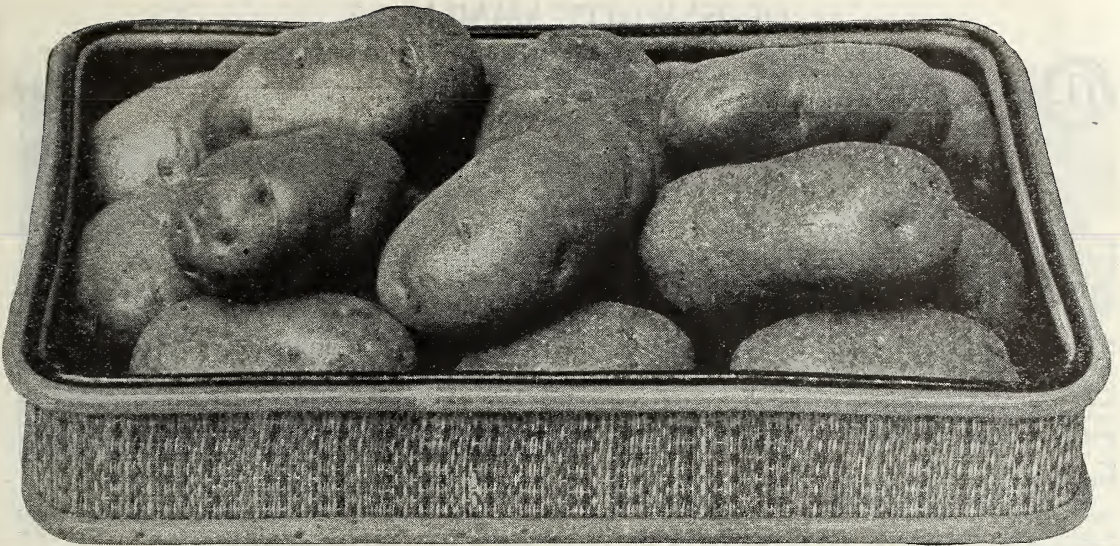

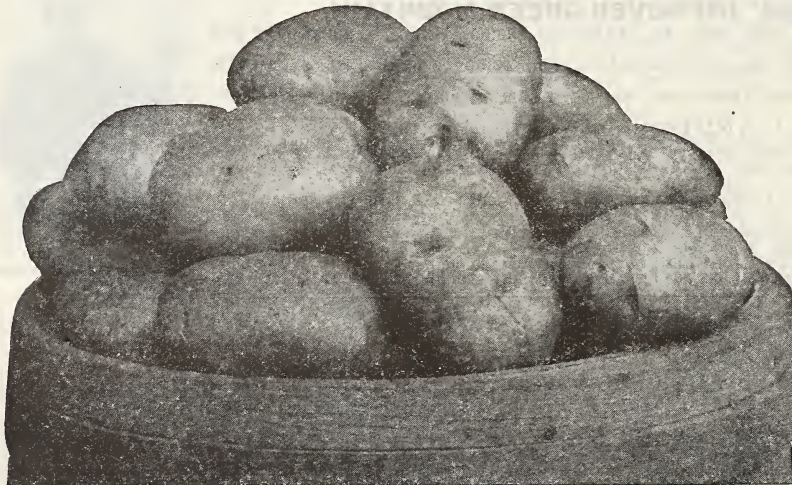

OLDS' SEED CORN

THE SEED CORN SITUATION

The Seed Corn Situation at the date of this writing, the last week in December, is the worst we have ever known in our experience in the seed business. It looks like pretty nearly a Seed Corn Famine. No 1917 crop corn grown in the North shows a decent germination test unless it was picked and hung up very early in the season and not much corn in the North this year was fit to save for seed at all.

Old Corn is Best. Our advice to our customers this year is to plant 1916 corn if you can get it, preferably of course northern grown and the varieties that are known to be adapted to your latitude. We have some Dakota grown corn, 1916 crop, that shows a high test and this will be good for planting in the North. Will also have a number of small lots of old corn grown in Wisconsin that we will offer through our Weekly Price List as soon as the corn is tested and ready. These lots will be given the names of the men who grew them, with the definite locality where grown.

New Corn of Early Varieties from the Corn Belt is Next Best to Old Corn. There will not be anywhere near enough old corn all told to supply the needs. 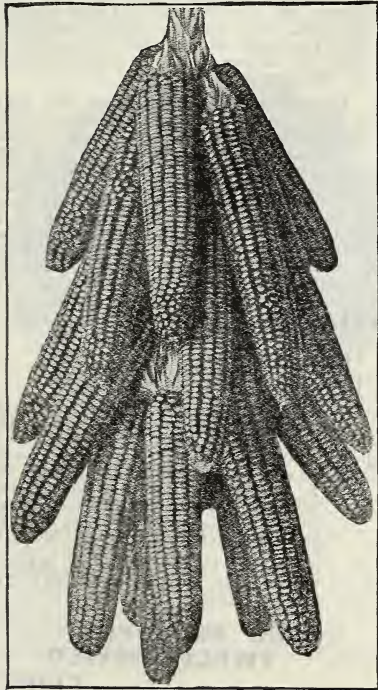

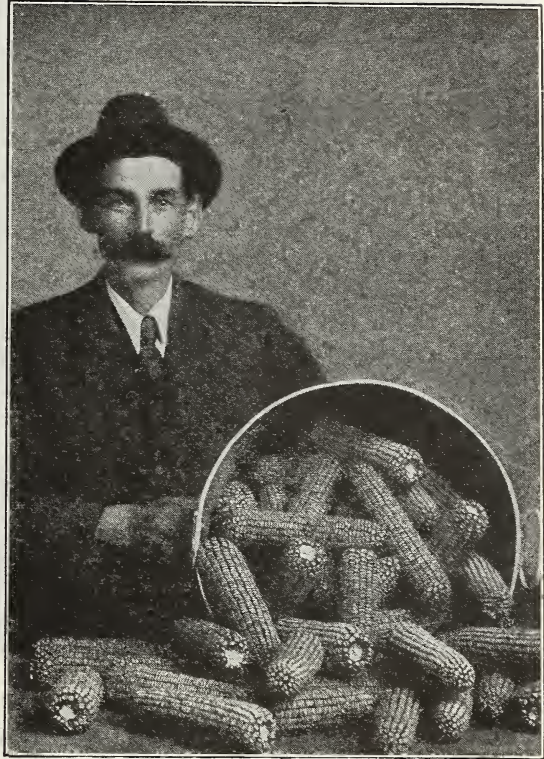

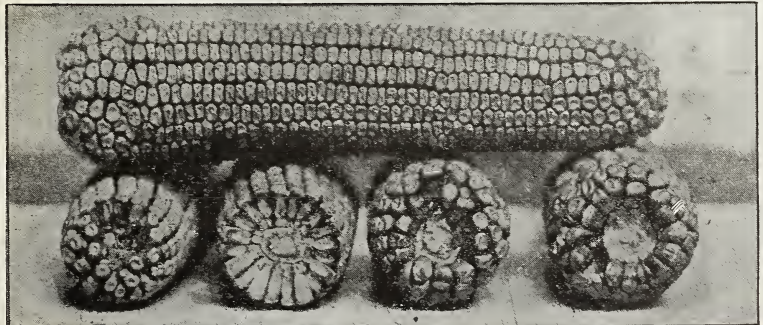

Silver King is the best known of all-around good varieties of corn adapted to latitude of Southern Wisconsin. It has become immensely popular and has really revolutionized corn growing in Wisconsin putting us as a state ahead of Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska, Kansas and all other states in the Union in yield per acre. This is a great triumph for Silver King.

History:—This corn originated in northern Iowa. 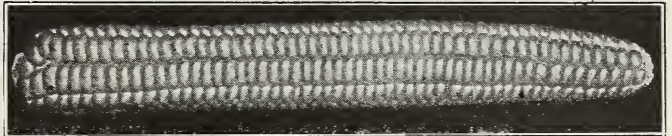

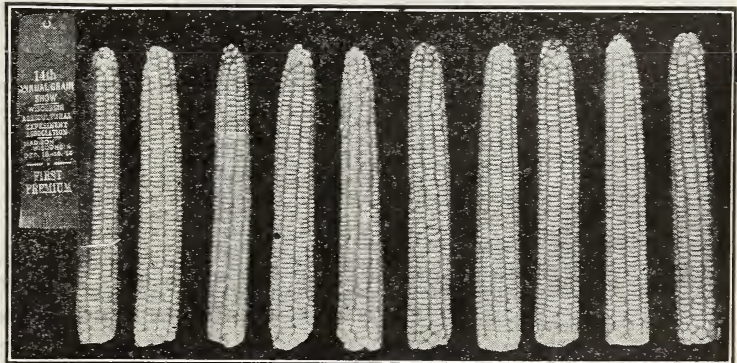

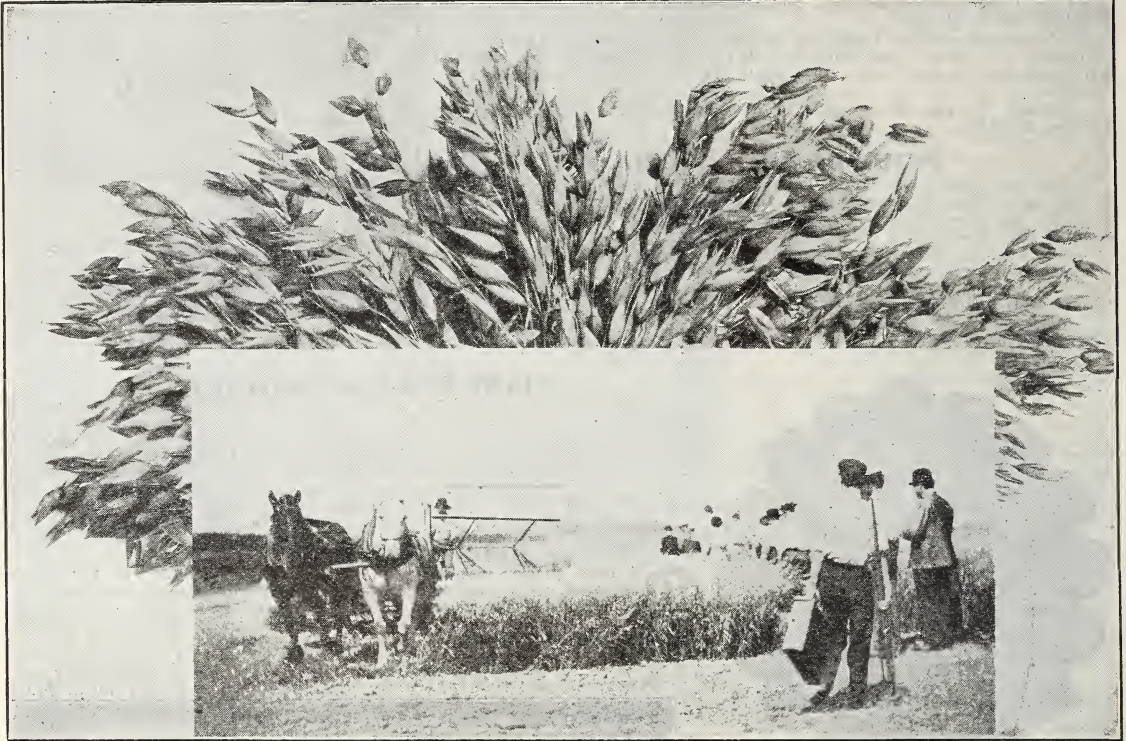

OLDS' WHITE KHERSON. (Iowa No. 103).

Olds' White Kherson is a distinct new variety which originated at the Iowa Experiment Station. It was first sent out for trial five years ago to a select list of a few prominent farmers including Hon. H. E. Krueger, Wisconsin's famous grain expert. Mr. Krueger named these oats "White Kherson" because they possessed so many of the characteristics of the Kherson, being just as early but white instead of yellow. He says of them "They beat the Swedish Select 12 bushels per acre in 1913 and 28 bushels in 1914. They grow a short stiff straw so that every bundle is a mass of oats and we do not have to handle a lot of worthless straw." Mr. Krueger says they yielded 20 bushels more per acre than Wisconsin Pedigree No. 1, were 2 weeks earlier and were heavier, running 3 bushels per bag. This was in 1914. In 1915, they yielded 108 bushels per acre on Mr. Krueger's farm and this was the average for 30 acres and in 1916 Mr. Krueger wrote: "Our yield on one of our fields was 118½ bushels per acre by actual weight and measured land. I find White Kherson fine to get a catch of clover or alfalfa with; just as good as barley in that respect; and their earliness gets them ahead of hot weather."

Mr. Krueger showed these oats at the Dry Farming Congress Exhibition at Wichita, Kansas in 1914 and in 1915 and secured both years "First on White Oats, Open to the World" and then "Sweepstakes" On All Oats.

WISCONSIN PEDIGREE NO. 7.

A new pedigreed variety of oats originated at the Wisconsin Experiment Station. It will be sent out in small quantities this season, 1918, by the station for trial among the members of the Ex. Ass'n.

History. Pedigree No. 7 is of Kherson origin. It came originally from the Kherson district of Russia to the Nebraska Experiment Station. In 1911, seven years ago, breeding work was begun on it at the Wisconsin Station. It has been grown in the test plots at that Station as a pedigreed variety for 5 years, and during that time has shown some remarkable yields, several times over 100 bushels per acre and one year as high as 111 bushels per acre.

Description. Wisconsin Pedigree No. 7 is a yellow oat, bright and shiny, with a very thin hull. In fact it is about all meat, very heavy and a great oat for feeding. It is very early. Indeed the earliest of all varieties, some 25 or 30, grown at the Wisconsin Station. This is of great importance as it escapes the rust so apt to hit oats just before harvest.

It has the stiffest straw and has stood up the best of all oats at the Wisconsin Station Farm. This means a great deal. Last season when heavy storms lodged other oats so that they could not all be secured by the binder Wisconsin No. 7 stood up perfectly and there was no loss in cutting. They yielded a third more per acre than Pedigree No. 1 just because of this one thing.

Another thing about this new oat is its hardiness. Prof. Leith says it is the hardiest of anything, resists heat and withstands unfavorable conditions. He recommends it for sandy land especially.

To sum up, Wisconsin Pedigree No. 7 will prove valuable because of its hardiness, extreme earliness, resistance to heat and rust, stiffness of straw, adaptability to hard conditions and heavy yielding qualities.

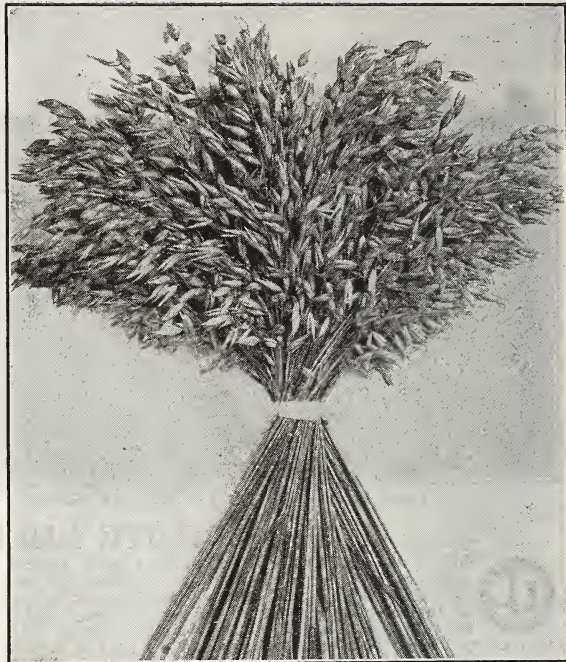

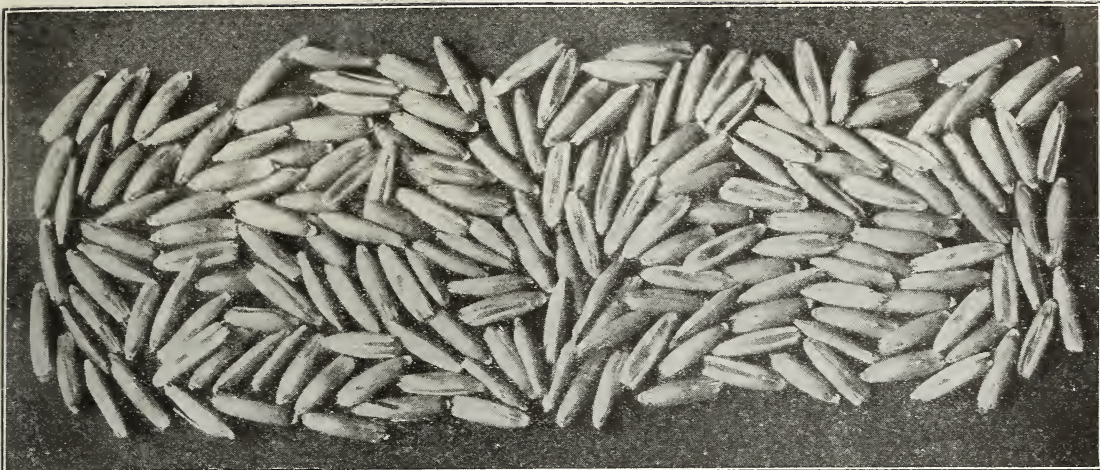

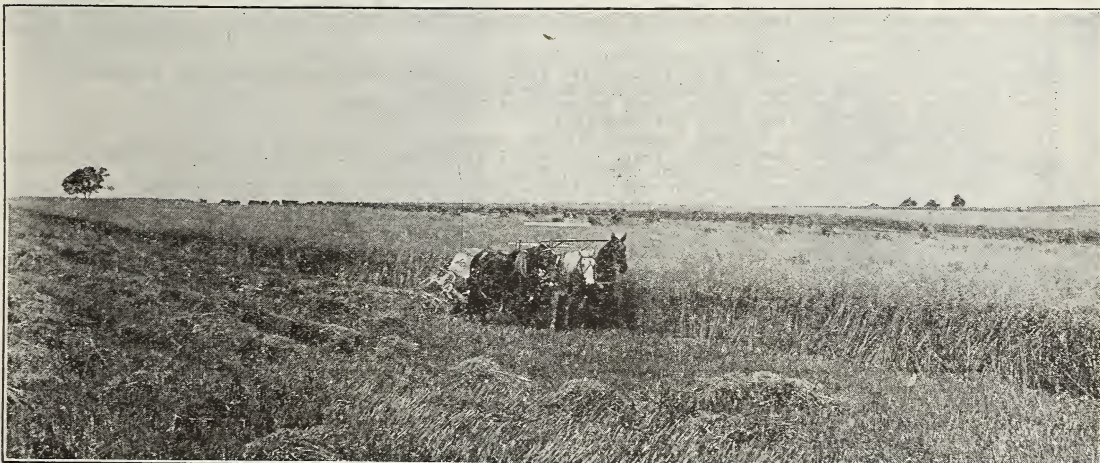

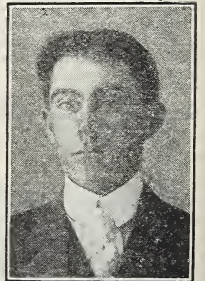

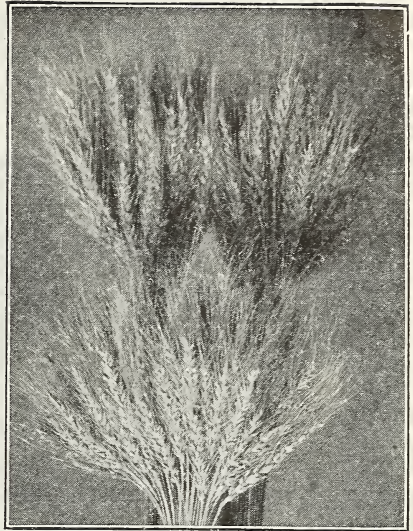

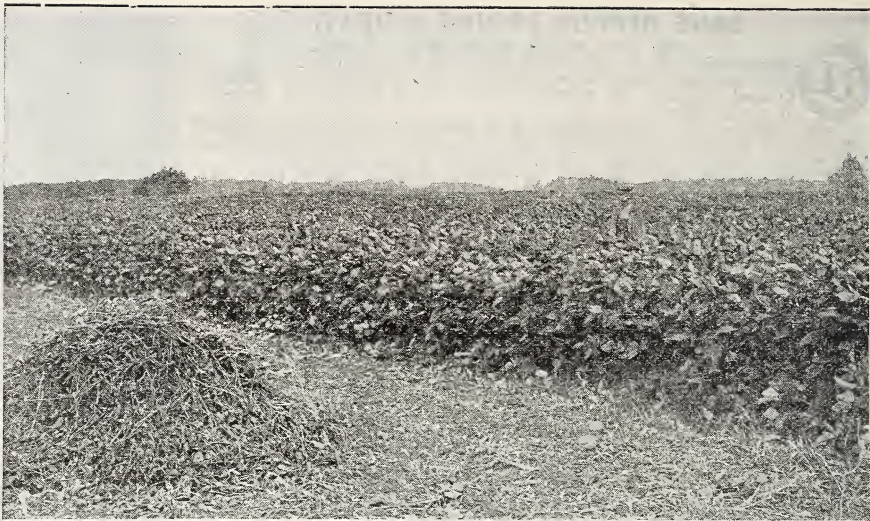

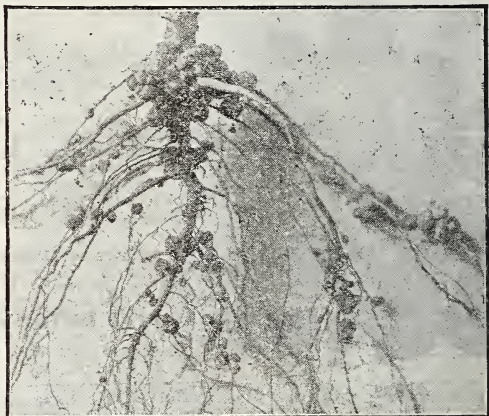

GRIMM ALFALFA. (The Alfalfa for Northern Latitudes.)

The Variety of Alfalfa known as Grimm is the hardiest of all varieties and best adapted to the Northwest.

History. The seed of this variety was brought to Minnesota from Germany in 1857, by a German farmer named Grimm. Prof. W. M. Hays, while at the Minnesota Experiment Station about 1890 found Mr. Grimm growing this alfalfa and at once began calling attention to its hardness and adaptability to Minnesota conditions. At one time Prof. Hays had advised farmers that it was not worth while to attempt growing alfalfa in the Northwest. Mr. Grimm had never heard of this advice and in his 25 years' experience with alfalfa had not discovered that it was not adapted to Minnesota conditions.

Characteristics. Grimm Alfalfa may be distinguished from common alfalfa:

First, By the fact that the blossoms are variegated in color, yellow, green, blue, brown, etc., instead of all purple.

Second, By its branching root system instead of the long straight tap root of the common alfalfa. This enables it to withstand the hard winters, the tap root of the common alfalfa often being broken by heavy freezing.

Third, By its stronger growth and larger top and more spreading top. The picture shows this.

Superiority of Grimm Alfalfa. We have mentioned hardness. In 1914 at the Wis. Ex. Station 16 plots were seeded to alfalfa with various strains of seed coming from Kansas, Nebraska, Montana and the Dakotas, including four plots sown with variegated seed, two Grimm and two Baltic. All the 16 plots made fine stands the first season and in 1915 all gave excellent yields. But the winter of 1916, which was a severe one, took its toll. The four plots sown with the variegated varieties were the only ones that came through in good shape. The winterkilling on those was very slight, an average of 27 per cent, and as the remaining plants started early in the spring and spread out rapidly the injury was not noticeable. These four plots yielded an average of 6045 pounds of cured hay that year whereas the other 12 plots all winter killed badly, and yielded only 4470 pounds of hay per plot.

Prof. Graeber, Alfalfa expert at the Wisconsin Station, is very enthusiastic over Grimm seed and seems to think that within a few years farmers of Wisconsin and other northern states will sow nothing else. He does not advise sowing the much advertised Cossack alfalfa, another variegated variety, as he says the Grimm has thus far proven to be just as good and the seed is much cheaper. Nor does he find the Baltic any better than the Grimm and the seed of that is also scarce.

One of our growers, Mr. F. C. Kemper, writes as follows:

"I have been growing alfalfa seed in South Dakota 10 years. I secured my original stock of Grimm seed through the S. D. Agricultural College. The seed of Grimm alfalfa is not distinguishable from the seed of common but a field in bloom is easily distinguished by an expert grower. Grimm makes a much more rapid growth after cutting than common. As to hardness it has proven its superiority over all common as far north as the Arctic circle. I consider true Grimm far superior to either Cossack or Baltic. Cossack does not recover as quickly as Grimm after cutting and it is more woody. The Baltic lacks vigor of growth. Have had the Cossack in my trial grounds for 3 years and make observations on the Baltic in fields of two of my friends.

"The Grimm requires less seed per acre than common alfalfa; three to eight pounds is what I use. There are no noxious seeds in my seed that I know of. It is free from dodder. There seems to be considerable seed sold as Grimm which is not true Grimm. We look after our fields for adulterations as carefully as any breeder of blooded live stock looks after his herd and our seed is guaranteed to be **absolutely free from any other alfalfa.**"

Mr. J. C. Parkin, writes:

"Of all crops with which I have had experience, alfalfa, at least the Grimm variety, to which my experience has been confined, is in a class by itself as a crop capable of making a luxuriant growth during long periods of drought on moisture stored in the soil. In the year of 1917 with less than an inch of rainfall after the fifteenth of May I grew six-five acres of alfalfa that produced one ton of hay per acre the first crop and three bushels of seed the second crop. In the eight years that I have been growing it none has winterkilled."

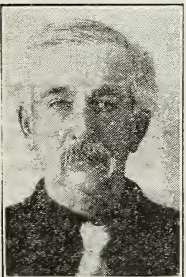

Hulled seed is preferable to unhulled as it germinates more readily. Scarifying the seed also makes it germinate better. 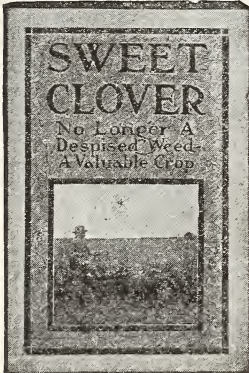

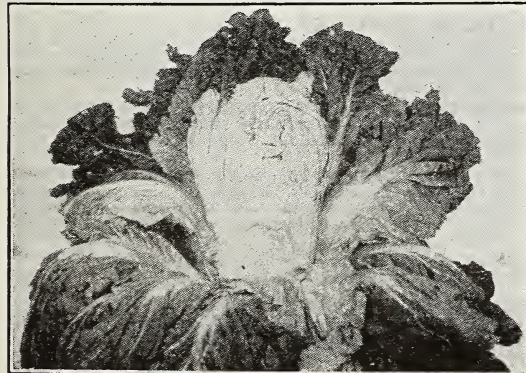
Commercial Cabbages in Center; Balance of field Wisconsin Hollander.



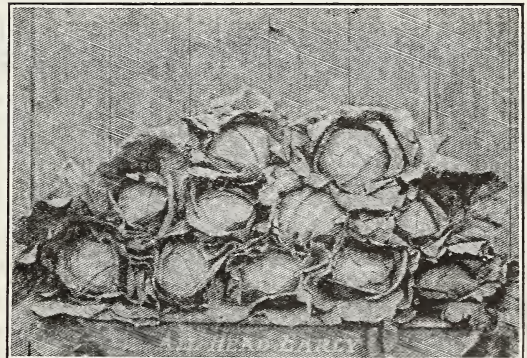
