Obedience of a Roman Soldier.

I once made a visit to an old city which had been burried by an earthquake nearly two thousand years ago. It is called Pompeii, and is about fifteen miles from the city of Naples. During the earthquake which destroyed Pompeii, an immense quantity of ashes and burning cinders were thrown out from the crater of Mout Vesuvius, a volcano about two miles off. The wind blew these ashes and einders directly over the doomed city, burning and destroying all the roofs of the houses, and covering up the walls about forty f et deep, so that for more than fifteen hundred years nobody knew where the city had stood. This place was all covered over with trees and bushses; but it was accidentally discovered about one hundred years ago, and people have been busily at work since that time digging it out. There they find the streets, the pavements and brick walls of the stores and houses, besides an immense variety of curious things, such as statues, paintings, mirrors, spoons, knives, combs, etc. These curious things have been taken away and safely placed in the museum at Naples.

It is thought that when the ashes began to fall on the city the people fled from their homes, so that very few lives were lost.

When I visited or walked about its old streets, among other things I saw in the court yard of one of the excavated public buildings a dark colored place on the wall, about as high as my head. The guide, who went about to explain things, told me that this dark spot was caused by a human skeleton, which, in digging out this building, they found leaning against the wall at this place. It was the steleton of a soldier, for on his head was still found a brazen helmet, and at his feet the point of a spear, his sword and other pieces of his armor. It had fallen to this soldier's lot to stand on guard before that public building on the day of the great eruption which covered up the city.

As it was forbidden a Roman soldier, under pain of death, to desert his post without orders, this faithful sentinel, with his sword by his side and his spear at his shoulder, had paced up and down before that house all that terrible day He saw the terrified inhabitants hurrying away from their pleasant homes, but he alone stood, firm as a rock, with the falling ashes heaped around him, and the fiery cinders beating like hail on his helmet. He had received no orders to leave, and up and down he continued his firm and undaunted step. At last, overcome by the fiery tempest, he grasped firmly in his hand his faithful weapon, leaned himself against the wall and died like a brave man at his post. The next day I went into the Museum at Naples and saw the skull of the soldier still sticking in his brazen helinct, and on a shelf near by lay pieces of his bones and fragments of his broken armor.

What a beautiful exhibition of heroic obedience was the conduct of that Roman soldier. As I gazed on the spot where he died and listened to the simple story of his faithfulness, and especially as I afterwards took the sad relics of his fate in my hands in the Museum, I was more deeply impressed by these memorials of a true hero than by all the rest of the curious things which I saw in Pompeii.

Obedience in a soldier is a cardinal virtue. It is of all other qualities the first and most important. But it is a beatiful trait of character among other people besides soldiers, and especially in children. I have seen children openly disobey their parents. This is a sad sight; for if a child will not obey his eye. parents it is very likely that he will never learn to obey God. But let children be early taught promptly to obey their parents and they are in the path of learning to submit to the will of the great Parent above. The obedience which God requires is implicit; that is, his children are to obey him in all things, whether they can understand the reason for it or not. The Roman soldier dying at his post rather than disobey his orders, is a faithful illustration of that obedience which all God's creatures should render to Him .- Tales for Children.

Very often men are heard sneering at "little country papers," as being of no use or advantage to the localities in which they are published—as, in fact, of no more utility than the fifth wheel of a coach. The printing office and the village journal-little though it may be -are as indispensable adjuncts to the growth, prosperity and fame of a country town as almost any other branch of business that can be named. For an important district in these United States to be without its local newspaper, is to remain in obscurity and unknown to the world at large. Property owners and business men, in localities where newspapers are published, derive much benefit from the existence of a local press. It advertises the town, and makes known the inducements which it offers to the settler-proclaiming a'so the industrial resources of the neighborhood, thus inviting and caus ing an increase of population, and consequently augmenting property, wealth and prosperity. These are incontrovertable facts, observed in the history of all our growing towns. Yet men will talk about "little country papers" sneeringly, as if community derived no benefit from their existence. So, too, some men will argue that education is of no advantage to a man; and there are even those who poohpooh at the value of all our modern discoveries and improvements in science and art, and who stoutly maintain that the "good old times" of ignorance were the best-the golden age of the world. PRIMARY MEETINGS .- The Democratic Primary Meetings will take place to day at 2 o'clock, at the different precincts, to choose delegates to a County Convention to meet on the 2d August.

CAUGHT .- A Chinaman, who robbed Mr. Barnes of about \$400, was caught and committed to jail last Saturday to answer before the next Court of Sessions. All the money, except about two dollars, was found on his person He will represent this county in the next Pen-assembly at San Quentin.

COUNTY SEAT -Our special corres pondent at Woodland informs us, with sentimental brevi y, that "this Sylvan capital stands peacefully among the oak groves, and in the cool shades of widely branching trees, listens calmly to the rattling and whizzing of Headers and Threshing machines, intermingled with an occasional scream from the whistle of a Steam Threshing machine, that goes about doing good in this vicinity.

TAXES AHEAD .- By your defective Revenue Law the Clerk of the Board of Equalization is only authorized to give notice after the first Monday in August, that on the second Monday of that month the Board will meet to equalize taxes. This notice would be published in our issue of Saturday-only two days before the time at which this important matter is to be attended to. So we anticipate the legal notice, which will appear too late, and warn our tax payers that if they have any objections to make to their assessments, they can present them to the Board of Equalization, at Woodland, on Monday, August 11th, or on such following days as the Board may was to be ready in three years; \$500,000 adjourn to.

Something Wrong.

We understand D. W. Welty is now acting as Deputy District Attorney engaged in conducting suits against delinquent tax-payers. We also learn these suits are all brought at Washington, to accommodate the convenience of Mr. Welty, who is a Sacramento Lawyer. When the people of Yolo elected a District Attorney, it was not a part of the understanding that a citizen of Sacramento was to do the business, while the incumbent elected was teaching a country school; but such seems to be the case, and delinquents residing in the extreme ends of the county, have to make trips to Washington to defend their interest, and that, too, when the County Seat is both accessible and located in the center of the county. If a man is elected to an office, he is either unable or incompetent to discharge the duties of, he should have good sense enough to resign, if he does not, the Board of Supervisors should see to it, that the office is deciar ed vacant, and a suitable person-a citizen of the county-put in his stead. There are several attorneys in the county who are both capable and willing, to discharge all the duties of County Attorney, and they will bring these suits as near as reasonably can be required to the place where the property taxed is situated; at all events, they would not go to Washington, unless for the especial convenience of those delinquents who live in that vicinity. It is time this sub system was put an end to in the Attorney's office; at least let us have some man, selected by the county, who will not only attend to delinquent taxes-which, by the way, should have been done months ago-but also be in readiness to attend to all criminal cases, both in Justice's courts and elsewhere, when required.

This contract was entered into in October, 1860, and the road was to be paid in cash.

BY OVERLAND TELEGRAPH.

The following dispatches are from the Sacramento Union of July 23d:

CHICAGO, July 17 .- President Lincoln's visit to the army has stimulated the soldiers to new vigor.

WASHINGTON, July 17 .- The Peters. burg Va. Express gives an account of the planting of eight guns on the James river, and firing on the Federal transports, and says McClellan's position, in this way, may be rendered wholy untenable, as no river of the South offers more advantages for this mode of warfare than the James. The Express is gratified to perceive Confederate authorities are determined not to allow such advantages to go unimproved.

Мемрнія, July 16.—The Grenada Miss. Appeal has a New Orleans dispatch denying the truth of the reported recapture of Baton Rouge by Van Dorn. It says the canard was for financial purposes.

The same paper says the rebel army of Mississippi is rapidly swelling, and an important movement of some kind is beheved to be on foot.

Work upon the fortifications at this place is going on rapidly. The works are formidable, encircling the entire city. Gen. Villepigne, in command at Pano. la. Miss, has issued orders prohibiting the burning of any more bridges on the Mississippi & Tennessee Railroad. Printed circulars have also been issued prohibiting the burning of cotton south of a point thirty miles below this city. The Confederate pickets have been seen of late about six miles below the city.

WASHINGTON, July 17 .- The House adjourned sine die at two o'clock P. M. to-day. Nearly the entire Serate session to day was spent in executive session. The list of confirmations is very large.

channel of the river preventing successful maneuvering, they gradually returned to the mouth of the river, followed by the Arkansas. In passing over the bar at the mouth of the river, the Carondelet made a rush at the Arkansas, succeeding in grappling her. An attempt was made to board, but this was repelled by a stream of hot water from the latter. About the same time both vessels ran aground. The shock separated them, and the Arkansas she started down the river. The Tyler, seeing this passed her, keeping up a running fight with her greatly superior ad. versary. Our fleet before Vicksburg, with a number of transports, ammunition boats, rams and mortars, were lying scattered over a space of nearly two miles. None of the gunboats had steam up. The entire fleet was so scattered that but few could fire. The Arkonsas passed without danger, hitting some of our own boats as she approached. Such of them as could do so, opened fire, but her heavy plating resisted most of the shots. One eleven inch solid shot struck her larboard bow, passing through under the plating, ripping it up for a considerale distance. What further damage was done is not known. The Arkansas continued firing during the whole passage through the fleet. The Benton was struck once. The ram Lancaster also received a shot underneath her boilers. The Tyler, which engaged the Arkansas for nearly an hour and a half, was considerably damaged. The entire Federal loss, as far as known, is twelve killed and fifeen wounded, of whom five or six will probably die. The Arkansas now lies under the protection of the batteries of Vicksburg.

FT MONROE, July 19 .- Information from Suffolk says some excitement prevails there on account of rumors that the rebels are building bridges across the Blackwater river. It is believed to be their intention to make an attack soon.

NASHVILLE, July 21 -Ti ree bridges were burned to day within eight miles of this city, on the Chattanooga road. The enemy's force under Forest is only five miles from the city. Some of our pickets were captured on the Lebanon road, five miles out, this evening. Considerable excitement prevails.

ESCAPE FROM SAN QUENTIN .- The S. F. correspondent of the Bee says: About 2 o'clock on the morning of the 23rd, your reporter left for the State Prison on steamer Clinton, in company with a detachment of 40 mounted men of Capt. DeMerritt's Sacramento Cavalry, a detachment of police force under Chief Burke, armed and mounted, and about 50 citizens. They arrived at the prison at 5 o'clock, and found everything quiet, and Gov Chellis in his room asleep. We learned that at 1.45 noonday, about 20 of the prisoners, working outside in the brick-yard, made a brake from their guard, ran whooping around to the northern gate, and on their way entered Lieut. Governor Chellis' rooms and seized him-took him to the gate and demanded that he order it be opened. He ordered the guard, named Murphy, who was armed only with a club, to open it, which he refused to do, but was finally overpowered and badly beaten about the head. They then wrenched off the lock, and all who wished pessed out this gate, whooping and yelling. They went to the armory and possessed themselves of all the arms and ammunition, still keeping the Governor with them-then passed around towards the southern entrance, which was commanded by a cannon, under the charge of Capt. Watson, loaded with 180 Minnie balls and grape. The Governor ordered him not to fire upon them. The gun was fired in the oppasite direction, then spiked. They threw him and the cannon over a precipice of thirty feet. The Captain's arm was broken. About 300 were out at this time. Messengers were dispatched to San Rafael, and aroused all the country, who headed them off, and kept them on the peninsula. The party with the Governor ran with him four miles, and were pursued by five horsemen, who were constantly firing on them They made a desperate dash, released the Governor, and brought him in. Six are known to be dead We have the names of three-viz: Oliver Gray, the Chico robber; James Townsend and W. Harris. Thirty attempted to escape on the sloop Pike County, but a cannon was brought to bear on them and they surrendered.


