MEMORANDUM FOR: Chief of Staff

SUBJECT: Policies and Principles Governing the Conduct and Operations of Commercial Entrants into Japan

1. G-1 position with respect to the memorandum proposed by ESS is predicated on two basic principles.

a. Facilities requisitioned from the Japanese Government for the use of Occupation Forces and various missions may not properly be made available for the use of commercial entrants.

b. Special privileges should not be extended government-to-government traders which would in effect place a premium on Communism.

2. With reference to Paragraph III b of the proposed memorandum which deal with service representatives, no reason is seen for allowing them to receive logistic support from the Occupation Forces or their local missions. These individuals will be entering Japan with a view to making a profit and may not be construed as directly assisting the prosecution of the Occupation. They should have the ability to lease housing or import to Japan their logistic requirements. If not able to do this such individuals would appear to lack the requisite financial standing to justify their entrance as service representatives. The time has come to examine requisitioned facilities with a view to reducing them instead of increasing such requirements. The original decision of the Chief of Staff that domiciliary arrangements of service representatives be the same as private traders is believed to be sound and need not be reconsidered.

3. With respect to Paragraphs II c and III c of the proposed memorandum and the proposed change to the 14 May Memorandum to Heads of Foreign Missions, it is believed that two salient objections exist.

a. To permit missions to bring in government traders within the limits of mission facilities would only serve to invite other missions who lack facilities to demand an increase in the requisitioned facilities presently assigned to them. This is not theoretical inasmuch as the Belgian and the Netherlands Missions have already asked for an additional 41 spaces based on a trade combination fromed between their governments. It has been suggested that it will be impossible to inform missions which have a large number of unoccupied spaces, e.g. USSR, that they cannot put government traders in these spaces. That suggestion is believed to be unsound inasmuch as the original allocation of spaces was for a mission

SUBJECT: Policies and Principles Governing the Conduct and Operations
of Commercial Entrants to JapanI. PERSONNEL

Commercial entrants to Japan shall be placed in one of the four following categories:

a. Private Traders - Those engaged in buying and selling operations on behalf of private firms.

b. Services Representatives - Those engaged in businesses which provide the services necessary and attendant to trade, viz., shipping, insurance, banking, legal, supply, etc.

c. Government Traders - Those members of government trade missions or groups who conduct trade with the Japanese Government on an approved government-to-government basis. There are two classes of this category of personnel, (1) members of "permanent" trade sections of an allied mission in Japan, and (2) members of "temporary" trade groups of an allied government who will come to Japan for specific trade negotiations.

d. Investment Representatives - Those engaged in approved development of or investment in Japanese interests on a commercial basis, and/or those engaged in inspection of substantial investment interests.

II. CRITERIA FOR SELECTION

Criteria for selection for entrance into Japan of commercial entrants will be as follows:

a. Private Traders

(1) Those from outside Japan will be selected by countries concerned within quotas established by the IATB, and cleared by SCAP approval.

(2) Those already resident in Japan will be permitted to remain and participate in private trade on same basis as those entering from without Japan. These individuals will not be charged against national quotas.

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b. Services Representatives - Approved in accordance with essentiality of service provided, availability of facilities necessary for operations and logistic support, and limitations set by the IATB. When allocations have been made by IATB, countries concerned will apply directly to SCAP.

c. Government Traders -- Approved in accordance with provisions of SCAP Memorandum, AGO91.31, dated 14 May 1947, Subject: Trade Representatives in Japan. (G-1 and G-4 Position)

Government Representatives - Approved in accordance with availability of local facilities within quota limitations set by the IATB. Applications submitted by countries concerned to SCAP for approval and clearance.

III. LOGISTIC SUPPORT

Logistic support for commercial traders will be as follows:

a. Private Traders

(1) Those from outside Japan will be accommodated by the Japanese Government which will provide accommodations and facilities as allowed by SCAP at per diem rates authorized by SCAP.

(2) Those resident in Japan will be responsible for their own logistic support.

b. Services Representatives -- Prior to 15 August 1947 in Occupation Force, or Mission facilities. After 15 August 1947 logistic support will be provided as indicated above for private traders, until such time as additional facilities can be provided by the Japanese Government which will permit of individual logistic support. (G-1 and G-4 Position)

c. Government Traders - Provided in accordance with provisions of SCAP Memorandum, AGO91.31, dated 14 May 1947, Subject: Trade Representatives in Japan. Government Traders admitted in excess of the 14 May memorandum will be housed as are Private Traders. (G-1 and G-4 Position)

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b. Services Representatives - Approved in accordance with essentiality of service provided, availability of facilities necessary for operations and logistic support, and limitations set by the IATB. When allocations have been made by IATB, countries concerned will apply directly to SCAP for approval.

c. Government Traders - Approved in accordance with provisions of SCAP Memorandum dated _____, subject: Trade Representatives in Japan.

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a. Private Traders

(1) Those from outside Japan will be accommodated by the Japanese Government which will provide accommodations and facilities as allowed by SCAP at per diem rates authorized by SCAP.

(2) Those resident in Japan will be responsible for their own logistic support.

b. Services Representatives - For initial period by either (1) local mission concerned, or if no local mission is established, by (2) arrangement with SCAP. Length of initial period will be determined by SCAP at the end of which entrants will be required to provide their own logistic support.

c. Government Traders - Provided in accordance with provisions of SCAP Memorandum dated _____, subject: Trade Representatives in Japan.

d. Investment Entrants - Provided by the Japanese Government on same basis as private traders, or arranged for an independent basis same as that for services entrants. Availability of housing or accommodation will be a major consideration in the logistic support for this category.

IV. PERSONAL ARRANGEMENTSa. Clearances

Clearances for all commercial entrants will be in accordance with provisions of SCAP Staff Memorandum No. 36.

b. Overseas Travel

(1) Travel arrangements will be the responsibility of individuals or groups involved.

(2) In emergency, U. S. Army will provide army transport from Japan on "space available" basis, at established rates.

(3) Baggage will be limited to a maximum of 125 pounds personal plus 50 pounds for commercial samples.

c. Entry

(1) Control points maintained by GHQ (ESS) at Tokyo and Kyoto to direct flow of personnel from ports of entry to billet areas.

(2) Ports of entry will be Kobe, Yokohama, _____, _____, _____, _____, and such other ports, including airports as may be designated by SCAP. Eighth Army will maintain processing centers at all ports of entry.

(3) Processing accomplished by Eighth Army and to include (a) registration, (b) customs and quarantine inspection, (c) movement to control points and (d) emergency attention. (To include movement to processing centers of individuals entering at ports other than Kobe and Yokohama.)

d. Housing

As indicated under Part III, Logistic Support, above.

e. Hotel Accommodations

(1) Operated and maintained by Boeki-Cho (Japanese Board of Trade) under SCAP supervision.

(2) Charge made at flat rate of \$10 a day to include meals and lodging only.

(3) No choice of accommodations assured.

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f. Outside Accommodations

- (1) If arranged by Boeki-Cho, provided at rate of \$10 per diem.
- (2) If arranged by individual, paid for as per agreement made.

g. Personal Services

- (1) Sales facilities, bar, barber, laundry provided by Boeki-Cho at hotels at announced rates on pay-as-you-go basis.
- (2) Personal services arranged by individual paid for as per agreement made.

h. Finance

- (1) Authorized currency for use in Japan will be U.S. MPC's. (Yen may be acquired for personal use.)
- (2) Dollars or dollar instruments should be brought to Japan in quantities sufficient to cover personal expenses.
- (3) MPC's may be purchased from SCAP at finance exchanges in official billets for dollars or dollar instruments. (Currencies (a) of countries which have specific agreements with SCAP regarding convertibility thereof into U. S. dollars, or (b) which are freely convertible, may be used to purchase MPC's at such time as they are approved for such use by SCAP.)
- (4) Yen may be purchased from SCAP at finance exchanges in official billets for foreign currency using the military exchange rate between the yen and U. S. dollars as the basis for conversion (evaluation of foreign currency with respect to U. S. dollars will be based upon par value of those currencies registered with the International Monetary Fund).
- (5) Proceeds from all MPC or yen sales will be deposited in the SCAP Trust Fund Account.
- (6) All foreign currencies, including U. S. dollars, not immediately converted will be deposited for safeguarding within 48 hours after arrival.
- (7) Reconversion of MPC's upon departure will be permitted in cash amounts not to exceed 150 U. S. dollars, or the equivalent thereof in foreign currencies. Amounts in excess of this sum will be reconverted into instruments not negotiable in Japan.

(8) Yen reconversions will not be permitted.

i. Transportation

(1) Rail -- Rail travel in military trains to be paid for with MPC's and travel orders to be issued by SCAP. Rail travel can be arranged through Boeki-Cho.

(2) Taxis -- Provided by Boeki-Cho at dollar rates on pay-as-you-go basis.

(3) All forms of transportation other than as provided for in sub-paragraphs (1) and (2) above to be arranged on a personal basis to be paid for in yen.

(4) Scheduled occupation buses may be used on a space-available basis.

(5) Occupation pool transportation will not be available.

(6) No automobiles will be allowed to be shipped to Japan for use of private traders.

j. Medical Services

(1) Medical services in accordance with existing regulations will be provided either by:

(a) U. S. Army medical facilities to the extent of availability.

(b) International Catholic Hospitals in Japan located at Tokyo, Yokohama, Kobe and Osaka.

(2) Medical services provided by U. S. Army medical facilities will be on a reimbursement basis at the rates prescribed in current publications.

(3) Payment for medical services received from U. S. Army medical facilities will be made in MPC's. Payments for services received from the International Catholic Hospitals will be made in yen.

(4) Medical services provided by U. S. Army medical facilities will be limited to that required to prevent undue suffering or to save life or limb. Elective medical and dental care will not be provided by the U. S. Army.

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k. Standards of conduct

(1) Same legal status as nationals of their own country not connected with the occupation.

(2) Subject to Japanese criminal law as administered under occupation procedures.

(3) Carrying of deadly weapons is prohibited.

(4) Occupation of more than one residence is prohibited.

(5) Must comply with regulations concerning monetary and black market transactions and traffic.

(6) Occupational "off limits" restrictions will not apply except to temporary inclosures and stockades, dump areas containing confiscated war materials, and areas within Occupation Forces buildings.

l. Amusements

(1) Free admission as spectators at concerts, sport events, and similar entertainment for Occupation Forces will be available.

(2) Entertainment where fees are charged to Occupation Forces will be available according to contract agreements of the entertainment concerned.

(3) Private club privileges will be extended according to the regulations of the club concerned.

m. Religious services

All religious services available to the Occupation Forces will be available to trade personnel.

n. Administration and departure

- (1) Records of arrival and departure maintained by Eighth Army.
- (2) Registration records maintained by Eighth Army.
- (3) Movements regulated and records thereof maintained by ESS.
- (4) Requests for extensions by individuals submitted to SCAP at official billeting agencies. Extensions processed by ESS through control centers and approved by G-1 with concurrence of country concerned.
- (5) Departure control by Eighth Army upon notification by ESS.
- (6) Personnel reports for Washington prepared by ESS.
- (7) Emergency controls and movements responsibility of Eighth Army.

V. BUSINESS ARRANGEMENTSa. Government Basis

Conducted between authorized government missions (permanent or temporary) and the Japanese Government under SCAP supervision and regulation.

b. Private basis

Between individual buyer or seller through negotiations with Japanese suppliers or buyers and Boeki-Cho in consultation with and subject to approval of SCAP.

c. Commodities available

(1) Lists will be published by SCAP in accordance with the following categories:

(a) Products or commodities showing stock on hand and scheduled monthly production for export.

(b) Products under very limited production to be sold mainly on government-to-government basis.

(c) Commodities required in Japan and for which sellers should be invited to Japan.

(2) Samples will be displayed in show rooms at Kyoto and Tokyo. Trade directories and other informational literature will be available at hotels.

d. Pricing

(1) Arranged through negotiation by private traders with Japanese sellers and Boeki-Cho in consultation with and subject to approval by SCAP.

(2) Prices will be the best obtainable. Criteria applicable to pricing will be:

(a) Current world market prices.

(b) Prices established in principal international markets.

(c) Prewar prices in principal foreign currencies, not including yen, adjusted to altered production costs and other influences.

(d) Comparisons with prototype merchandise or substitute items.

(3) Where no background price exists pricing will be set in accordance with accepted trade practices.

(4) All prices will be quoted in U. S. dollars.

e. Bids

(1) Informal -- Submitted by buyer on standard form for purpose of displaying buyer interest, determining availability, and indicating offered price by buyer.

(2) Sealed bids -- To be used for items in short supply. Upset price may be set.

f. Contracts

Contracts will be in the form provided by Boeki-Cho and subject to approval by SCAP. Parties to the contract will be the buyer and Boeki-Cho.

g. Licenses

Licenses for export will be issued by Boeki-Cho and validated by SCAP.

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h. Financing

- defined as
- (1) Payment may be made in an acceptable foreign currency
 - (a) Currencies of countries with which SCAP has convertibility agreements.
 - (b) Freely convertible currency as announced by U. S. Treasury.
 - (c) U. S. dollars.
 - (2) Payment may be made by usual forms of commercial letters of credit with proceeds to be credited to Trust Fund accounts as designated by SCAP.

i. Shipping

- (1) Initially U. S. Maritime Commission will perform port agent functions pending establishment of private shipping agencies.
- (2) The Maritime Commission will quote rates, offer shipping and assist in related technical matters until private shipping agencies are established.
- (3) Establishment of private shipping agencies will be subject to SCAP approval. (At present Allied shipping lines are represented on the Maritime Commission.)

j. Insurance

- (1) Limited facilities will be available in Japan pending establishment of private insurance agencies under SCAP approval.
- (2) Full service to be established as required and as approved by SCAP.
- (3) Pending availability of full services in Japan, recommend buyers obtain blanket insurance policies from home countries.

k. Claims.

- (1) SCAP will not undertake any warranty or guarantee of merchandise.
- (2) Claims for adjustment will be submitted to Boeki-Cho within 30 days after arrival of goods to port of destination.
- (3) Disputes on claims will be submitted to SCAP whose final determination shall be binding.

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1. Communications

(1) Indigenous communication services, including domestic mail, domestic telegraph, local telephone, and domestic long distance will be available at yen rates.

(2) Allied military APO's and FPO's will not be available. However, International Mail Service will be available at yen rates. In this connection

(a) Transactional mail is being arranged.

(b) Mailing of samples will be permitted with opening of transactional mail.

(c) International Air Mail expected to be available soon.

(3) Overseas commercial radio will be available with payment therefor to be made in military payment certificates, British Armed Forces Special Vouchers, or Japanese yen according to destination of such communications.

m. Miscellaneous

(1) No member of the Occupation Forces may engage in any form of commercial transactions.

(2) No member of a firm or business accredited to the Occupation Forces may engage in any form of commercial transactions other than those authorized under the terms of the approved SCAP license issued for that firm or business.

(3) No commercial entrant may engage in any commercial transactions other than those authorized under the terms of reference for the category under which he was cleared.

(4) Arrangements by foreign concerns to designate Japanese or Japanese firms or foreign nationals as permanent agents will be subject to SCAP approval and authorization in each instance.

(5) Automobiles may be brought to Japan by services entrants but no petroleum products or vehicle maintenance will be provided from U.S. Army sources.

1. Australia has requested entry of Mr. E. J. F. Wood, an official of the Australian Government, to purchase oyster spat for experimental purposes (Tab: Aust Rqst).

2. a. This concerns the category of commercial missions which do business on a government to government basis.

b. ESS/FT (Mr Pickelle) states entry is desirable.

c. G-2 CIS (Lt Miwa) states no derogatory information is on file.

d. DS (Capt Presby) states that by telecon 27 August, the Australian Mission gave assurance of logistic support.

3. An Australian Wool Committee of three members is at present in Japan. ESS (Dr Kenney) states this committee expects to be here for two more weeks. Mr Wood expects to enter in mid-September. It may be assumed, therefore, that his entry will not be a further exception to the limitation of two members imposed by para 7 of Memo 14 May.

4. Recommend DS reply to Australian Mission in substance as follows:

"Clearance is granted for entry of Mr. Wood in the capacity of a commercial mission for a period of four to eight weeks under the provisions of paragraph 7, Memorandum for Chiefs of Allied Missions, dated 14 May 47, subject: 'Trade Representatives in Japan'. 1. Request has been received from Canadian Liaison Mission to clear Miss Alice Marion Cox to enter Japan as a missionary.

2. a. The request states that Miss Cox is to commence missionary work not under the direction of a Missionary Society. Her return has been approved by Bishop Mann, who is one of the two bishops of the Anglican Church who visited Japan last year to survey conditions here with reference to the missionary effort.

b. Assurances are given by the Canadian Mission that funds and food have been arranged for Miss Cox's use in Japan, however, the assurance of housing for her is dependent upon Bishop Yashiro of Kobe.

3. a. Numerous similar requests have been received in the past from missionaries, both American and British. They have uniformly stated that assurance of housing was available from Japanese sources. None of these requests have received favorable consideration since it is not believed that assurances from Japanese nationals may be accepted safely.

b. Further, it has not been the policy to allow independent missionaries to enter Japan since they have no missionary organization which is responsible for them and have no representatives in Japan who may exercise surveillance over their activities and be responsible for their care in the event of an emergency.

c. Despite the fact that numerous arrangements have been made for Miss Cox which may be considered to be valid, it is believed that approval for her entry would be considered a precedent which might be seized upon by other independent missionaries to demand clearance. The value to the

MEMORANDUM FOR: The Head of the Canadian Liaison Mission in Japan

SUBJECT: Clearance for Entry into Japan

1. Reference is made to your letter dated 26 August 1947, concerning entry into Japan as a missionary of Miss Alice Marion Cox.
2. The missionary policy of this Headquarters provides that missionaries may enter Japan only if they are members of an organized mission board or organization which has carried on missionary activities in Japan prior to the war. Such organizations, if they have no representative missionary in Japan, may send such a representative who is held responsible to give the assurances required by the missionary policy for the return of other missionaries to Japan. Owing to disrupted economic conditions in Japan, assurances of Japanese nationals for housing or logistic support have not been considered acceptable.
3. Although it is appreciated that considerable arrangements have been made to maintain Miss Cox as a missionary in Japan, her clearance is not within policy and therefore cannot be considered.

This was replied to by ourad C 69684, 23 January, which concurred in principle except that it was deemed undesirable to allow individuals to enter Japan for cultural purposes. Radio War 81132, 29 June 1947, further discussed this general subject proposing substantially the same terms as contained in W 89294. Detailed comparison of these three radios is attached as Tab: Comparison.

2. Substantially the same information contained in War 81132 was transmitted to this headquarters as SWNCC 348 which is attached with brief as tab: SWNCC 348.

3. In the interim period, while these communications were transmitted, several individual cases were discussed with War Department, one of which resulted in the dispatch to this headquarters of radio W 99868 which stated that no interchange of persons would be allowed pending decision on the U. S. proposals on the subject to the Far Eastern Commission. This radio was considered to close, for an indefinite period, the travel of Japanese abroad. Upon receipt of this radio plans were in process for travel of 17 Japanese abroad.

4. On 19 August, radio War Service 8112, which relayed State Serial 327 to POLAD, was received. This radio was considered to be purely a State Department interdepartmental instrument. It stated that pending FEC decision the Amconsul, Yokohama was authorized to grant transit certificates for Japanese traveling abroad under the terms of SWNCC 348. Initial action taken on this radio was by Amconsul, Yokohama on 21 August, which stated that in view of the termination of such travel as stated in War radio W 99868 Amconsul considered it desirable that SCAP receive interim directive regarding the matter. Supplementary action taken on War Service 8112 (State Serial 327) was ourad C 55106, 27 August 1947, which stated that State Serial 327 considered interdepartmental State Department instructions and that it in no way altered our instructions as received in W 99868 and requested clarification.

5. Current War Department radio W 85173, 27 August 1947, is in effect the interim directive, issuance of which was advised by Amconsul, Yokohama in his radio 139. Comparison of the date time groups of ourad C 55106 (270313) and W 85173 (272327) shows that these radios crossed in transit. It is considered, however, that radio W 85173 may be considered as a reply to our radio C 55106.

6. The only new element entering the picture as a result of W 85173 is the use of the term "exceptional cases" in describing the categories of Japanese who are authorized by it to travel abroad. Amconsul, Yokohama advises that they have received many requests for Japanese to travel abroad. Of the requests received less than 10 have been considered to possess sufficient merit to warrant retention in files. However, on none of these cases has an advisory opinion been requested from Washington. Such advisory opinion would require approximately 3 months. All other proposed Japanese travel abroad such as the ecclesiastical group bound for conferences in Europe are considered to be terminated since the conferences for which they were destined have ended. It is the opinion of Amconsul, Yokohama (Mr. Overton) that no case in his files can be considered as exceptional. It is the opinion of G-1 that although travel of Japanese nationals abroad is considered highly desirable, no case exists at present which could be considered as exceptional.

7. It is considered that two courses of action are open as follows:

a. Reply to War acknowledging receipt of W 85173, stating that it is considered as reply to C 55106 and stating that there are currently no exceptional cases pending in this matter.

b. No action be taken to reply to W 85173 and status of Japanese travel abroad be considered under its terms and any exceptional cases which arise be acted upon.

1. Request has been received from United Kingdom Liaison Mission for the exit from Japan of Mrs. Hoshimi (nee de Souza, British national by birth) and her five children for the purpose of repatriation to Singapore.

2. a. It is stated in the British request that four of the children were born in Singapore and one in Japan.

b. The Government of Singapore has approved their repatriation.

c. The only Japanese national, by birth, concerned is the youngest child who was born in Yokohama in 1946.

3. a. The Japanese nationality of Mrs. Hoshimi is by civil law only. Therefore, it is not believed that her travel can be considered to fall within the category of Japanese travelling abroad which is currently under consideration by the Far Eastern Commission.

4. It is concluded that there is no objection to the repatriation of Mrs. Hoshimi and her five children to Singapore. G-2, CIS (Mr. Wheeler) has no objection.

a. To para 1b of C/N - "Where traffic warrants, the Japanese Government Railways will open separate Allied windows. Where competent RTO facilities are available, tickets will be sold at these windows."

b. To Section III of Memo for Record - para 7. "Special Car. Any rail car other than coaches and sleepers normally used in regular service."

c. To Section V of Memo for Record - para 19. "Qualifications. Nothing in this study is intended to preclude group travel in other than special cars when suitable equipment is available. Rates for group travel will be based upon a charge of 1¢ per passenger per mile except that a minimum of 20 fares must be purchased."

3. Reference para 4, Section III of Memo for Record, it is suggested that Occupation Force personnel be defined in accordance with para 2b, SCAP Circular 3, 10 January 47, as follows:

"All persons in Japan on official business who are on duty with, attached to, or associated with governments, or agencies thereof, (other than the Japanese government) which are accredited to or affiliated with the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, excluding the dependents of such persons."

1. 1. Requests for extensions of stay in Japan have been received from 34 private trade representatives of the United States.
2. a. Paragraph I(4) of Memorandum of Understanding Between SCAP and U. S. Trade Mission states that extension of privileges to private trade representatives may be granted with the concurrence of SCAP and the initiating country.
- b. A request from the War Department for the extension of the period of validity of clearance for 15 of the first increment of U. S. private trade representatives to 10 September is being processed as a parallel action, recommending the extension.
3. a. With all requests for clearance processed and granted for the initial quota of 400, the quota is but slightly more than half filled. In view of this it may reasonably be expected that ample hotel accommodations will be available to cover all individuals from whom requests for extension have been received and for those for whom the extension of entrance to 10 September is recommended.
- b. The original reason for the stipulation in the Memorandum of Understanding that the initiating country would be consulted on extensions was to prevent a situation whereby a private trade representative in Japan would be granted an extension which would prevent the entry of one at home who had not yet had an opportunity to come to Japan. This situation will not exist because the determining factor is the availability of hotel space.
- c. It is believed that the present requests for extension may be granted with the authority of CINCPAC, and that it should be proposed to the War Department that parallel action be taken in the case of all future requests for extension. The same policy should be applied to private trade representatives of all countries where it is impracticable to quickly contact the official representative of the country concerned, such as an Allied Mission in Japan. In the case of the latter, requests for extension should be checked with the Mission prior to granting the clearance.

1. WAR Radio 85096, 28 August, states that the Commerce Department desires consideration be given to extending entrance period of the first group of private traders to 10 September, inasmuch as some were unable to arrive during the period of 15 - 29 August for which clearance was originally granted.

2. The cable also notes that the Far East Commission may reduce U. S. quota because all of the first increment were unable to arrive between 15 - 29 August.

3. a. As of 29 August, 74 private trade representatives have physically arrived in Japan of the first increment of 102. The War Department cable indicates that 15 of the first increment require extensions of clearance. That would indicate that 13 of the first increment are unaccounted for, as to entry, between the records of the War Department and records of GHQ. It may be assumed that these individuals are preparing to leave or are presently en route and would also require an extension of period of validity of clearance.

b. No objection is foreseen to extension of the period of validity of clearance to 10 September on all remaining 28 in the first increment of 102. The reason for the establishment of a 15 day period of validity of clearance was to prevent countries exceeding their quota by delaying entry of these individuals. General knowledge of clearance procedures to date would not indicate that any deliberate attempt is being made by private traders from U. S. to delay their entry beyond the original period of validity of 15 - 29 August.

c. The quota of 400 for the initial period has been only half filled with all requests granted. In view of this, ample hotel accommodations may reasonably be expected to be available to cover the extension of time in which the traders, to whom extensions would be granted, would be in Japan.

4. No reason can be seen for any thought that may have been given by the Far East Commission to reduction of U. S. quota because some private trade representatives approved for the first period were unable to enter during the period 15 - 29 August. It is considered that by reason of the much more active interest in Japanese trade displayed by the U. S. than that of any other

Reur War 85096, records here indicate only 74 private traders have arrived in U. S. quota as of 29 August, In view of this, concur in extension of period of validity of entry on remainder first quota to 10 September. Considered this extension need not affect period of validity of 16 - 30 September on second increment inasmuch as substantial number here of first increment have indicated desire to leave latter part of August or first part of September.

Subject of reduction U. S. quota by reason inability of all U. S. traders to arrive in 15 day period is of primary interest here. Strongly recommend no such reduction be made because U. S. had evidenced most active interest in coming Japan of any nation. At present 400 quota only half filled for first period, with all requests for clearance acted upon. Only Canada and Australia as well as U. S. filled initial increment. Canada and United Kingdom have requested and been granted extension of validity of clearance on several of first increment due to inability of traders to arrive in allotted 15 day period.

MEMORANDUM FOR: General Beiderlinden**SUBJECT: Russian Citizens, Menko and Kiipus**

1. DS (Mr Sebald) has received a memorandum from Soviet Member, Allied Council for Japan, asking information as to the legal basis for the proposed deportation of two Russian citizens, Menko and Kiipus, from Japan. Instant paper is the proposed reply from DS.

2. Background of this case is as follows:

a. Menko and Kiipus are Russian citizens, previously employed by the Army Transport Service. Upon termination of their contract they refused to return to the U. S., as required by their contract, because they had married in Japan.

b. DS, by letter of 15 July (approved by C/S) informed the Soviet authorities that SCAP would permit Menko and Kiipus to remain in Japan for 60 days, in order to allow arrangements to be made for their entry into Soviet Russia.

3. As pointed out by DS in C/N of 22 August, herewith, the proposed reply makes it mandatory that SCAP carry out the deportation as ordered, if the two Soviet citizens have not departed by 13 September.

4. If proposed reply is approved by C/S, necessary action will be taken to have the PM apprehend subject Soviets on 15 September and deport them to the U.S.

5. Recommend initial concurrence on C/N of DS to C/S, and return to Plans & Policies for necessary action.

1. At 1000, 26 August 47, Mr. James P. C. Liu, IPS, GHQ, SCAP made a verbal request of G-1 for clearance for the following Chinese nationals to disembark from the USAT General Gordon on 27 August for the purpose of visiting in Tokyo on 27 August:

Professor Lin-chun Chen
Professor Liu-shen Tsai
Professor Rudolf Lowenthal
Miss Yi-shen Sha

It was understood from Mr. Liu that in the event any of the Chinese nationalists for unforeseen circumstances failed to reboard the transport prior to sailing time, the Chinese Mission would assume responsibility for their logistical support until such time as they departed from Japan. Mr. Fu Yun-ying (English secretary, Chinese Mission) confirmed Mr. Liu's statement in a telephone conversation with Major Edrington, G-1 Section, on 26 August.

2. 8th Army (Capt Ferris - Customs, Immigration and Quarantine) was notified by telephone of the clearance and was told that no letter would be dispatched to 8th Army confirming the verbal clearance.

3. G-2 (CIS - Lt Miwa) advised no derogatory information is on file.

4. Mr. Liu was verbally informed of the clearance at 1620, 26 August.

Upon further questioning, he indicated that he did not know upon whose orders, or if he did know he was not at liberty to tell me. I pointed out to Crocker that I had neither the time nor the inclination to stand in line to be checked by MPs. Crocker was courteous, but it was clear that he had no authority in the matter.

Finding it useless to argue any further in the PX, I stood in line from 1355 until 1425, a half hour period. I noticed that civilians were not waiting in line, and upon asking I was told that dependents did not have to wait in line. I watched closely and observed that female civilians were permitted to leave the PX upon their statement that they were dependents, without showing any form of identification.

The PX was hot, humid and uncomfortable. There was no reason posted within sight as to why this check was being made. The attitude of the several hundred milling and sweating people was just a bit short of belligerent. I can see no useful purpose in inconveniencing personnel in such a manner. It obviously was not a complete check, since female civilians were permitted to depart upon their word that they were dependents.

This report is submitted for your information and such action deemed necessary. I would be glad to pursue this subject in any way deemed best.

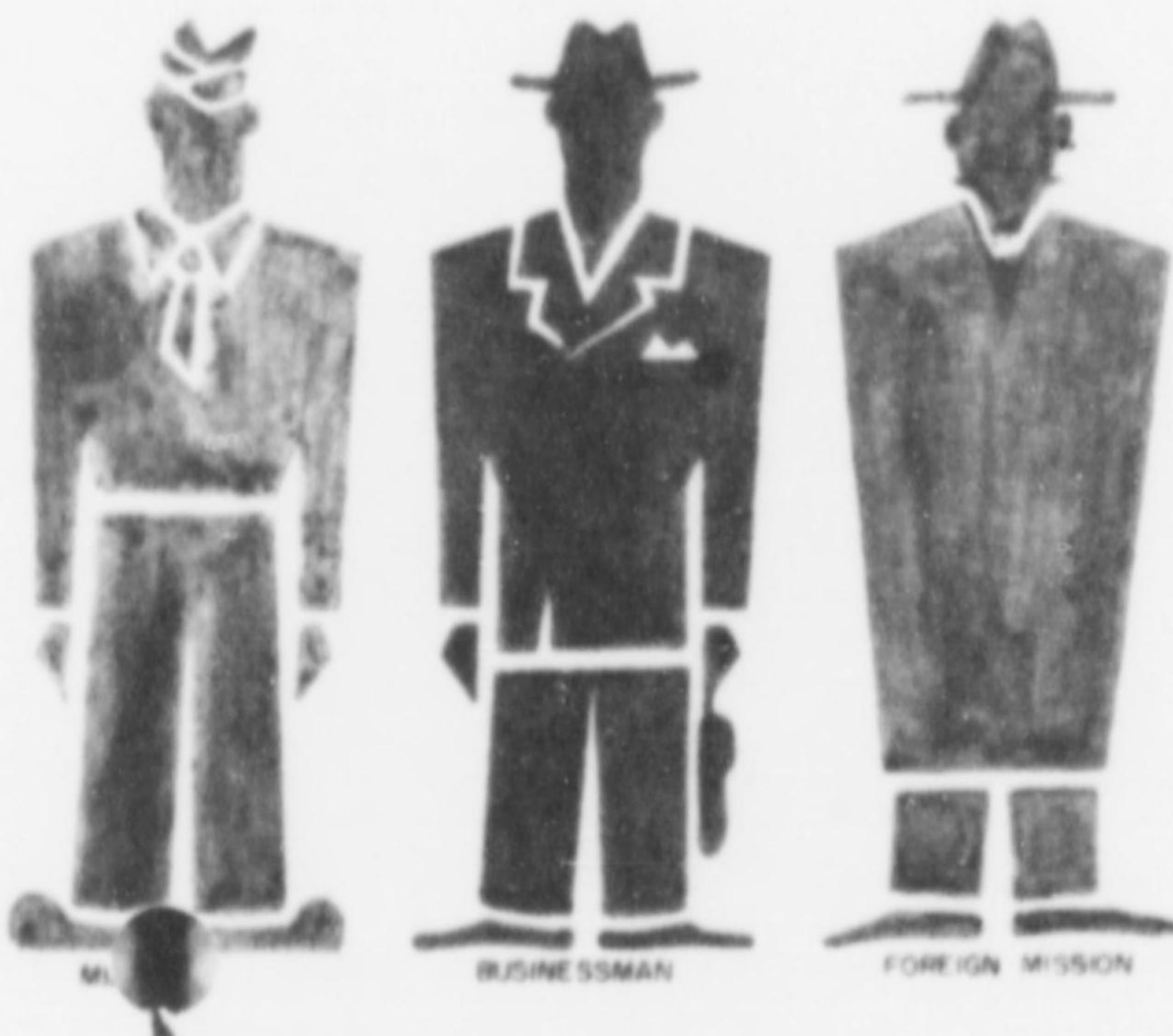

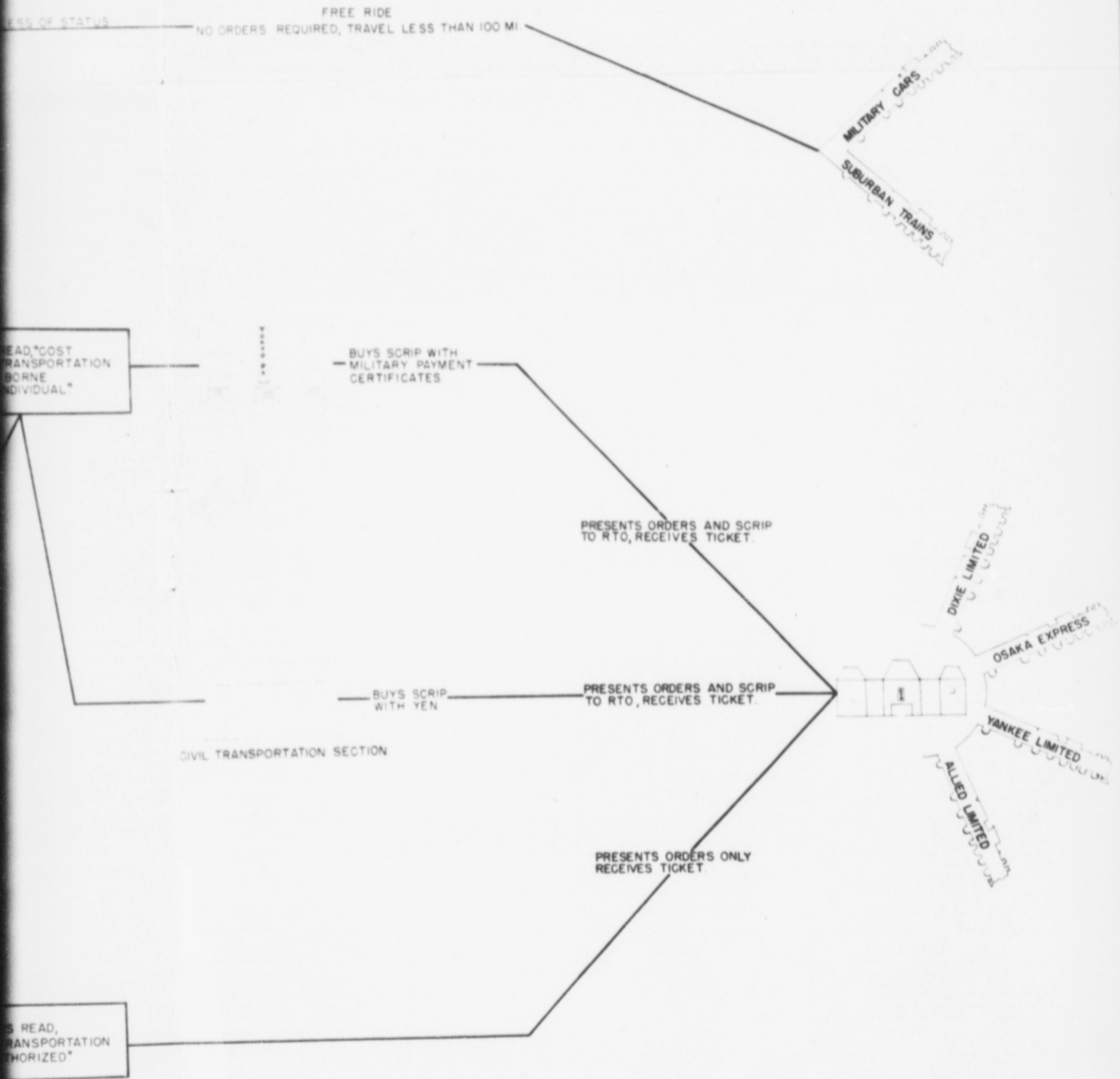

1. An application for authority to receive Mrs. Thomas C. (Grace) Galloway as a house guest has been submitted by Mr. Frayne Baker, PIO, SCAP & PEC (Tab: Rqst). Mrs. Galloway, currently in Evanston, Illinois, is the mother of Lt. Col. Mera Galloway, WAC, CI&E Section, GEQ, SCAP.

2. In paragraph 4a of a C/N dated 18 June 1947 to the Chief of Staff (Tab: C/N 18 Jun 47) G-1 recommended that "house guests not be admitted to Japan at this time". The Deputy Chief of Staff changed the recommendation to read that "house guests not be admitted from without the theater to Japan at this time". As amended by the Deputy Chief of Staff the Chief of Staff approved only paragraph 4a of subject C/N on 20 June 1947.

- 3. It was informally learned from Col. Galloway that:
 - a. Mrs. Galloway intends to remain in Japan for approximately 7 days if authorized to enter as Mr. Baker's house guest.

1. Clearance is granted Mrs. Galloway to visit Japan for a seven day period commencing on or about 1 October 1947.
2. Mrs. Galloway should be instructed to apply immediately to the Passport Division, State Department for a passport and for a War Department Military Permit. This application should include the following:

- a. Statement that she understands and accepts conditions under which the invitation of her host was approved and that commercial transportation will be used in traveling to and from Japan and no attempt will be made to secure passage on an Army transport.

- b. Certificate of health from a civilian physician, worded substantially as follows: "I certify that I have, on (date), examined Mrs. Thomas C. Galloway and have found no physical defects which might reasonably be expected to require hospitalization during the next 12 months, nor evidence of communicable disease. I have administered immunizations as follows (describe). In my opinion, Mrs. Galloway is physically fit to travel to and visit in Japan. (Signature of physician)."
