WHHEREAS, His Majesty's Government consider it desirable that a uniform system should be established in disposing of the Crown Lands in his Majesty's North American Provinces; And Whereas, the Earl Bathurst, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, has transmitted to his Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor a Copy of the following Regulations that have been prepared on this subject, with orders that, immediately after the receipt thereof, the same be strictly adhered to in his Excellency's Government:

REGULATIONS

For granting Lands in the British North American Provinces.

For the information of Persons desirous of obtaining Land in his Majesty's Provinces in North America, the following summary of the Rules which have been established for the future regulation of Grants of Land, has been prepared by direction of the Earl Bathurst, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonial Department.

The Commissioner of Crown Lands will, from time to time, and at least, once in every Year, submit to the Governor, a Report of the total quantity of each district of Crown Property, so far as he may then have ascertained the same, together with his opinion of each description of Property which it may be expedient to offer for Sale within the then ensuing Year, and the upset price per Acre at which he would recommend the several descriptions of Property to be offered, provided the Land proposed to be offered for Sale does not contain any considerable quantity of Timber fit for His Majesty's Navy, or for any other purposes, it being the intention that no Grant of the Land upon which such Timber may be growing should be made until the Timber is cleared.

If the Governor should be pleased to sanction the Sale of the whole or any part of the Land recommended to be Sold at the upset price proposed, or at any other price which he may name, the Commissioner of Crown Lands will proceed to the Sale in the following manner:

He will give public Notice in the Gazette, and in such other Newspaper as may be circulating in the Province, as well as in any other manner that circumstances will admit, of the time and place appointed for the Sale of the Lands in each District, and of the upset price at which the Lots are proposed to be offered, that the Lots will be sold to the highest Bidder, and if no offer should be made at the upset price, that the Lands will be reserved for future Sale in a similar manner by Auction.

That no Lot should contain more than 1200 estimated Acres.

The purchase money will be required to be paid by four instalments,

without interest ; the first instalment at the time of the Sale ; and the second, third, and fourth instalments at intervals of a year.

If the instalments are not regularly paid, the Deposit Money will be forfeited, and the Land again referred to Sale.

Purchasers of Land at any Sale not exceeding two hundred Acres, being unable to advance the Purchase Money by instalments, as proposed, the Commissioner may permit the purchaser to occupy the same upon a Quit Rent, equal to Five per cent. upon the amount of the Purchase Money, one Year's Quit Rent to be paid at the time of Sale, and to be paid annually in advance afterwards ; upon the failure of the regular payment, the Lands to be again referred to Auction and Sold.

The Quit Rent upon Lands so purchased in this manner, to be subject to Redemption upon payment of Twenty Years' Purchase, and Parties to be permitted to redeem the same by any number of instalments not exceeding four, upon the payment of not less, at any one time, than five Years amount of Quit Rent, the same proportion of Quit Rent to cease.

In case, however, the parties should fail regularly to pay the remainder of the Quit Rent, the same to be deducted from the instalment paid, and the Lands to be re-sold by Auction, whenever the instalment may be absorbed by the accruing payment of the remainder of the Quit Rents.

Public Notice will be given in each District in every year, stating the names of the persons in each District who may be in Arrears, either for the instalments of their Purchases or for Quit Rents, and that if the Arrears are not paid up before the commencement of the Sales in that District for the following Years, the Lands, in respect of which the instalments or Quit Rents may be due, will be the First Lot to be exposed to Auction, at the ensuing Sales ; and if any surplus of the produce of the Sale of each Lot should remain, after satisfying the Crown for the sum due, the same will be paid to the original Purchasers of the Land who made default in payment.

No Land will be granted at any other time than at the current Sales in each District, except upon application from Poor Settlers, who may not have been in the Colony more than Six Months preceding the last Annual Sale ; Settlers so circumstanced, may be permitted to purchase Land, not exceeding two hundred Acres each, at the price at which it may have been offered at the last Annual Sale, and not purchased, and may pay for the same, or by Quit Rent computed at five per cent. on the Sale price, and thenceforth these Persons shall be considered as entitled to all the privileges, and be subject to the same obligations, as they would have been subject to if they had purchased the Land at the last Sale.

In cases of Settlers who shall be desirous of obtaining Grants of Land, in distinct Districts not surveyed, or in Districts in which no unredeemable Grant shall have been made, the Commissioner of Crown Lands will, under the authority of the Governor, at any time within a period of Seven Years from the date hereof, grant permission of occupancy to any such Settlers, for Lots of Land not exceeding two hundred Acres, upon consideration that they shall pay a Quit Rent for the same, equal to five per cent. upon the estimated

value of the Land at the time such occupancy shall be granted, and the persons to whom claims of occupation shall be made, shall have liberty to redeem such Quit Rents at any time before the expiration of the Seven Years, upon the payment of Twenty Years' purchase of the amount; and at any time after the termination of the Seven Years upon the payment of any Arrear of Quit Rent which may be then due, and Twenty Years' purchase of the annual amount of the Rent.

No Patent will be granted until the whole of the purchase money shall have been paid, nor any transfer of property made, except in case of Death, until the whole of the Arrears of the Instalments or Quit Rent shall have been paid.

The purchase money for all Lands, as well as the Quit Rents, shall be paid to the Commissioner of Crown Lands, or to such person as he may appoint, at the time and places to be named in the condition of the Sale.

The usual fees payable on Grants of Land, are to be paid by the purchaser, and the Lieutenant Governor will determine whether the whole or what proportion of them are to be paid, on the party receiving a licence to occupy the Land.

In order that the above Regulations may be carried into immediate effect, His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has been pleased to confer the office of Commissioner of Crown Lands upon John Spry Morris, Esq.—and as an entire change will thus be made in the system of disposing of Crown Lands in this Province, His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has commanded that public Notice be given :

1st. That His Excellency, having no longer any authority to grant Lands upon the usual terms, applications to His Excellency for Land are unnecessary, and will not be received, either at this Office, or by the Boards of Land Commissioners in the several Counties and Districts of the Province, or the Surveyor General at Sydney, in the Island of Cape-Breton.

2d. That, for the future, unappropriated Lands will only be disposed of in the mode prescribed in the above Regulations.

3d. That all persons holding Lands under Warrants of Survey, Tickets of Location, Crown Leases, or other authority from Government, will be allowed to obtain Grants in the accustomed manner, provided the fees for the same be lodged at the proper Offices in Halifax, or with Henry W. Crawley, Esq. of Sydney, previously to the 1st of January next, after which time they will not be permitted

to complete their Titles to their Lots, except by purchase, in conformity with the new Regulations.

And Whereas His Majesty's Government have further directed that the Quit Rents due to His Majesty, upon grants of Land, be collected from the 1st January last, the Net produce of which will be applied to such local charges or improvements as may receive His Majesty's approbation.

Notice is therefore also given, that the said Quit Rents will be collected accordingly.

With reference to the collection of Quit Rents, his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has directed the following extract to be published, of the instructions transmitted for the guidance of the Commissioner of Crown Lands :—

" You will give Public Notice, that you have received instructions to apply to all persons holding Lands from the Crown, in perpetuity, upon the payment of Quit Rents; as well as to all persons holding Lands upon lease for term of years ; for the payment of the rents which may be due from them respectively ; to commence from the first of January, 1827 ; and you will, at any time within seven years from the date hereof, sell to the Proprietor of any Lands held in free and common socage (but to no other person whatever) at twenty years' purchase, any Quit Rents which may be payable by them respectively, provided that all arrears, up to the end of the year preceding the time of purchase, be previously paid.

" If these Quit Rents are not purchased by the Proprietor within seven years from the date hereof, further Instructions will be given in regard to the sale by Auction, or otherwise, as may then be deemed expedient."

*Directions for coming up Halifax Harbour, taken from
the printed Directions at the Custom House, Halifax.*

SAMBRO Island and Light House is in latitude 44 deg. 30 min. N. and longitude 63 deg. 32 min. W.

From the westward, bring the Light to bear N. E.; if it bears more easterly, stretch to the southward till it bears N.E. and as much northerly as you please, there being no shoal or ledge to the southward; then keep it open on your larboard bow; give it more than a mile and a half birth, as much more as you please.

NOTE.—The western ledges lie from the Light S.W. distant two miles, the other W S W about one league; the eastern ledges lie in a range nearly, some above water, the outermost one mile and a half from the Light, bearing from it E. N. E.

When the Light bears north distant about 2 miles, run N E. 4 miles, then north will carry you to Chedabucto Head at a proper distance, clear of all danger.

When abreast of Chedabucto Head, run N. half W. for the south point of George's Island.

When within half a mile of George's Island, you may enter the harbour west of it in 11 fathoms, or east of it in 15.

In passing between Sandwich point and Mauger's beach, run nearest the point to shun a shoal which runs off S. W. from the beach.

There is also a shoal lying one mile south of Sandwich point.

Coming from the eastward, run for the Light and you cannot fail seeing Chedabucto Head as you open Halifax Harbour; the Light being 4 miles distant from the Head to the S. W.

[The above are hoisted at the east or west yard arm, according to the quarter the vessel first appears in, with the addition of a ball at the centre of the yard, until the vessel can be seen, when one or more of the following descriptive colours will be hoisted at the mast head.]

- Do. with a red pendant over it, for a two decker.
- Do. with a blue pendant over it, for a frigate.
- Do. with a white pendant over it, for a small armed vessel.
- A red flag pierced white, for a packet.

The following table constructed by the celebrated Doctor Herschel, upon a philosophical consideration of the attraction of the sun and moon, in their several positions as to the earth, and confirmed by the experience of many years actual observation, may, without doubt, suggest to the observer, what kind of weather will probably follow the moon's entrance into any one of her quarters, and that so near the truth, that it will be very seldom found to fail.

From the above table it will be seen that the nearer to midnight either the moon's periodical changes (i. e. within two hours either before or after it), the more fair the weather is in summer; while the nearer to noon that the changes take place, the reverse may be expected. Fair weather may also follow when either of the periodical changes occur during the afternoon six hours, viz. from four to ten, but this is mostly dependant on the wind.—The moon's entrance during all the hours after midnight except the two first, is unfavourable to fair weather. The like may nearly be observed in winter. Every farmer ought to preserve a copy of this table, and carefully to regulate his pursuits by its indications. Such a line of conduct might materially promote his comforts and his interest, while in no case would it disturb his prospects, or destroy his hopes.







- Soap suds is among the best
of all possible antidotes for in-
sects, besides being a valua-
ble manure. If you will
sprinkle your fruit trees in
the spring, by the help of a
garden engine or other means
with soap suds, twice a week
for two or three weeks, you
will soon find that caterpillars
and canker worms are as
scarce on your premises as
mosquitoes in December.—
Soap suds is also excellent for
watering cucumber vines, mel-
on vines, cabbage plants, &c.
If water from washing
cannot handily be had, you
will find it worth while to sub-
stitute a weak solution of pot
ash. Cleanse your cellars, as
well as the rest of your pre-
mises from all offensive and
putrescent substances. At-
tend to potatoes, peas, beans,
cucumbers, corn, oats and bar-
ley. Set early cabbages, and
don't forget turnips. Planting
time is here, and corn will
go nicely with good hoeing.


