## PINCHING MUM PLANTS

The first pinch should be made about 14 days after planting (see illustration). By pinching you make the plant branch, control height, and shape and produce more blooms.

The second pinch should be made 3 weeks after the first pinch. If you desire low bushy plants for the border a third pinch should be made during last week of July. For taller or cut flower purposes make only two pinches, but in no case should the last pinch be made in Northern states later than the last week of July.

This is most beautiful of pink lilies and is also the easiest to grow. It is seldom attacked by disease, and perfectly hardy, living for years in the coldest sections of the country when planted in a well drained place.
It grows slowly, with sturdy stems reaching a height of 4 feet, and blooms in late August and early September, producing branches of flowers many of which reach 6 inches in diameter. Usually 8 to 12 flowers per plant blooming over a 3 week period.
The frilly petals are white, but so flushed with deep pink that only the margins are clear white; and numerous dots of carmine decorate the petals. These are reflexed, or turned back, while long stamens and pistil project with decorative effect.

## HOW TO COOK WITH HERBS THE WAY THE EXPERTS DO:

1. Use herbs sparingly. It is better to use too little rather than too much. Never overpower the basic flavor of the food 2. When blending several herbs, always emphasize one flavor only and make the other flavors less pronounced.
2. Dried herbs are four times stronger than fresh. Use 1 tablespoon fresh when recipes call for 1 teaspoon dried.
3. Pressure cooking and aluminum foil baking holds herb flavors, but the delicate aroma and flavor may be lost by extended open cooking. In open cooking, add herbs during the last half hour.
4. Cut or chop the leaves of fresh herbs very fine with a sharp knife.

"Aster Yellows" is somewhat more difficult to control. Spraying with Malathion or D.D.T. to control leaf hoppers helps somewhat. Best preventative is to grow Asters inside a screen or cloth house such as is used for Dahlias. Plants in the open garden are subject to constant attack, so persistent, regular spraying is needed to kill the leaf hoppers that carry the disease.

## Watering

Moisture plays an important part in the success or failure of your gardening efforts. The simple suggestions we make will, if carefully followed, insure maximum success and minimum disappointment.
INDOORS: When sowing seed indoors to be later set into the open garden, use a standard florists' pot or pan (shallow pan) or a "flat," which is a shallow box. Be sure there are holes bored in the bottom for drainage. Cover the drainage holes with broken pottery or coarse gravel and then fill with potting soil. This is a mixture of half sand and half black loam. Firm soil and sow seeds in rows, marking each row to identity sowing. Water by setting box or pot in water so that it soaks up from below, or use a fine spray which does not wash the soil. At no time should soil be allowed to dry, neither should it become water-logged.
OUTDOORS: It is harder to control moisture when making direct ground sowings. Once seed has been sown and the soil firmed well over it, care must be taken that at no time does it become hard and dry. Excessive watering will cause seed to rot, the soil to sour and "damping-off" will result. Once plants have become established, water by soaking ground around the plant rather than sprinkling from the top.

Perennial seed, for the most part, germinates slowly and should be sown in drills 2 inches apart; planted hinly and covered to a depth of not more than lour times the diameter of the seed. A good method is to press the end of a ruler into the soil and make your press sowing in this indentation. Press firmly into soil and water. At no time should seed bed be permitted to dry out.

TRANSPLANTING: When seedlings have produced one pair of true, leaves, plant into an area where the soil has been enriched by the application of onefourth organic fertilizer, setting the small plants 4 to 6 inches apart. Protect by lath sash during the hot dry months of late Summer and you should have plants large enough to transfer to the permanent location in September. Atter transplanting be sure from the hot midday sun.

## Pelletized Seed Petunias F-1

To make easier the handling of certain fine seeds, we have had them pelletized. This is a process whereby the tiny seed is given a protective coating into which has been incorporated a nutrient that assists in germination. A practice long in use by large vegetable growers with whom it has proven a big success.
Size permits individual handling of each seed. You can tell at a glance whether there are sufficient for your individual need. No guessing when you use "pelletized" seed. Start indoors for best results.
SOW SEED: Start seed indoors in February or March Use clay pots or milk cartons that have been cut engthwise and filled to within $1 / 2$ inch of the top with vermiculite, soil or peat moss. Water until moist and then place seeds about 2 inches apart, pressing down gently flush with the surface. Pellets should be just visible.
A pane of glass or cover over the seeds, slightly raised at one end, will hasten sprouting. When sprouts ap pear remove cover and water as needed. If vermiculite or moss is used, add a soluble fertilizer such as Ra-Pid Grow. Thin seedlings when 2 inches tall to allow room for proper development. Transplant to permanen place in the garden when weather has warmed and danger from frost is past. This is usually after the middle of May. Space plants 12 to 14 inches apart.
