





TERMS OF SALE.

PHILADELPHIA, January 11, 1909.

All bills purchased after this date will be charged at the prices quoted herein,—unless special offers are made by letter or telegram and referred to in the order. Not less than ten pounds of one variety will be invoiced at the rates per hundred pounds.

Terms of Credit.—To regular customers and well-known houses of established credit, all bills bought from this catalog are due June 1st, without regard to date of purchase, excepting Beans, Corn and Peas on which terms are (except when included in a general order) sixty days net or subject to a dissount of one and a half per cent. for cash within ten days of invoice. All accounts are subject to sight draft on June 10th, if payment is not received previously by mail. Goods purchased after June 1st are payable on October 1st and subject to sight draft.

Bills purchased on special quotations, made by letter or telegram, are net sixty days from date of invoice, or subject to a discount of one and a half per cent. for each within

ten days of date of invoice

Grass and Clover Seeds, Onion Sets and Seed Potatoes in quantity, are invariably net cash.

Philadelphia or New York.

Cash Discount.—We allow a discount of Five Per Cent. on orders accompanied by a cash remittance, and also on all bills except where Beans, Corn and Peas only are ordered (at catalog prices) paid within ten days from date of invoice, or a discount of One Per Cent. a month on all bills (at catalog prices) if paid before June 1st.

The Prices Quoted are those ruling at this date. We expect to adhere to them through the spring, except where important changes compel us to advance or reduce our prices, when we shall be governed by the market. 10 lbs. and more will be supplied at the rates per 100 lbs.; ½ lb. and ½ bushel at pound and bushel rates; but smaller quantities will be charged at a higher rate.

NO CHARGE for Packing or Cartage.—Bags and boxes are charged at Cost. After delivering to forwarders in good order (as shown by Bill of Lading) our responsibility ceases.

Insurance will be effected only when so directed.

SEALED PACKAGES.—We make no charge for sealing **pounds**, **pecks**, or **bushels**, but at the low bulk prices quoted therein, we shall charge for putting up in smaller sealed packages, when so ordered, as follows:

In Ounces.—One cent per ounce, 50 cts. per 100 ounces.

In Quarter-Pounds, Pints, and Quarts.—Two cents for each package. In Two-Quarts and Four-Quarts.—A charge of three tents per package.

WE DO NOT COMMISSION SEEDS.—In response to hundreds of inquiries each year, we would state that we positively decline to send out any Seeds on Commission. Dealers handling seeds in packets will be supplied on liberal terms, and by ordering judiciously, those left over can be destroyed, and the business yet be more profitable and satisfactory than the handling of commission seeds.



Telegraphic Cipher (or Cable Code) FOR WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

The telegraphic cipher word for quantities must always precede the cipher words for seed, but if the same quantity of several varieties is ordered, the cipher word meaning that quantity need be placed only before the first. For example:

Arad Navy, Purity, Benares, Calliope, Chalice, Malmo Balcony, would mean, ship at once, cheapest route, ten pounds each Navy Blue and Sadie Burpee Sweet Peas (white-eeded), twenty-five pounds each Burpee's Allhead Early Cabbage and Oxheart Carrot, and ten bushels Burpee's Stringless Green-Pod Beans.

Our customers will find this a very inexpensive way of wiring their orders, but we must caution them that care be taken in writing out the messages, as we cannot hold ourselves responsible for errors arising from incomplete messages or incorrect translation.

IMPORTANT.—This telegraphic cipher must be used ONLY on orders by telegraph or cable, and never in written orders sent by mail.

These code-words can be used also if, when placing a telegraphic order, you wish to specify price quoted. For example:

Dare Calicut Chanter Dang, Mocha Bodkin Despoil, meaning: Ship at once by freight, as per special quotations, seventy pounds Chantenay Carrot at 35 cts. per pound, sixteen bushels Large White Pole Lima Beans at \$5.25 per bushel.

By exercising ordinary care in preparing the telegram you can save time and money by the use of our code system. When possible, telegraphic orders are filled and shipped the same day they are received.

Every package bears our full firm name, and is neatly printed in black ink, presenting a more attractive appearance than do the usual gaudy lithographed bags.

Every ounce-package is dated as above.

Packets, although not dated (because the electrotypes generally require the entire front of the bag), are all filled with the same choice quality of the Best Seeds that Grow for 1909.

W. ATLEE BURPEE & CO., Seed Growers.

Seeds of the best quality cost very much more to produce than do seeds of the ordinary commercial grade. And yet many merchants, having little or no knowledge of the value of High-class Seeds, purchase their supplies wherever they can be obtained the cheapest. It was brought to our notice that some merchants would buy a bill of seeds from us, obtain copies of our catalogs and show-cards, and then purchase a portion of their supplies from other seedsmen, who, growing "cheap seeds," could sell at much lower prices. In many cases planters who purchased from their local merchants, thinking that they were obtaining BURPEE'S SEEDS, got only a few of our seeds (perhaps in packets), and often the seeds bought by weight or measure were of inferior quality, falsely sold on our reputation, but for which we were not in any way responsible.

This deception was brought so prominently to our attention some years ago that we debated seriously whether we should not decline altogether to sell BURPEE'S SEEDS at wholesale. Further consideration, however, showed us that this would hardly be fair to the honorable merchants who had been handling our seeds exclusively for years. Therefore we announced that—

Hereafter we will sell Burpee's Seeds ONLY in sealed packages.

Packets and ounces, in Water-tight Manilla Bags, are sealed, and bear, plainly printed, either our Name or Registered Trade-mark Monogram, protected by United States Letters Patent. Quarter-pounds, pounds, pints, and quarts, in paper bags, have pasted across the top a green label, as below:



SEEDS IN BULK,—that is, Peas, Beans, etc., by the peck or bushel, and quantities of small seeds in bags, will have each sack sealed with our Trade Mark on a leaden seal.

This plan will be a protection to honest merchants from competition with other seeds falsely claimed to be BURPEE'S SEEDS, and at the same time will be a guarantee to the purchaser.









The only stiffly erect Bush form of the popular "Potato" Lima! Both pods and beans are twice the size of Kumerle or Dreer's Bush Lima.

Fordhook Bush Lima is altogether unique, and has created the greatest "sensaduction two years ago, nothing like it had ever been seen before! It was created by Nature as a single sport in a field of the Challenger Pole Lima in 1903. Previously the Kumerle (Thorburn or Dreer's Bush Lima) was the only dwarf form of the fat "Potato Lima." While this is largely planted, many gardeners have objected, however, to the prostrate growth of the plant, as the pods frequently become discolored from being beaten to the ground by the wind or rain.

Fordhook Bush Lima is of stiffly erect habit, branching freely but with all the branches held upright. This ideal bush growth is strikage like that of the large pole Limas. The leaves are large, smooth, and a dark rich green, identical with the leaves of Burpee's Bush Lima, as contrasted with the smaller pale green leaves of the Kumerle, Thorburn or Dreer's Bush.

Fordhook Bush Lima bears tremendous crops! The beans are ready for use as early as those of Burpee's Bush Lima, which furnishes fine Lima beans for the table three weeks earlier than they can be had from most pole varieties. The plump well-filled pods are twice as large as those of the Kumerle or Dreer's Bush, while the individual beans are also fully twice the size. The pods measure four to five inches in length, containing four to five large beans each.



Fordhook Bush Lima produces such large "Potato Limas" that visitors to our FORDHOOK and SUNNYBROOK FARMS have been astounded! The beans are very "fat" and lie so closely together in the pod that they are flattened on the ends. The pods are so fully packed that the beans are most easily shelled.

Fordhook Bush Lima has an additional merit over all other varieties of the "Potato Lima" type. The green beans, even when of full size, are tender, juicy and sweet in flavor when cooked, resembling the flavor of the finer varieties of large flat Lima,—as distinct from the rather dry and mealy character of all other varieties of the Potato, Challenger or Dreer's Lima type.
