Sect. 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Re-resentatives of the State of Louisiania, in General Assent-ly convened, That from and after the passage of this act Sect. 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiania, in General Assembly convened. That from and after the passage of this act all the free white male inhabitants, above twenty-one years of age, within the incorporated limits of the town of Opelousas, who have resided therein six months previous to any election, who are citizens of the United States, and shall have paid, or be liable to pay a corporation tax, shall have the right of electing six members of the Board of Police of said town, and a President; the voters shall designate on their takets the person to be President of the Board.

That no person shall be elected as President or member of the aforesaid Board of Police, who is not, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States, a resident in the town of Opelousas, at least twelve months preceding the election, be at least twenty

Sec. 3. Be it further enacted, &c. That the President and members of the aforesaid Board of Police, before proceeding to the discharge of their duties, shall take an oath, before some judge or justice of the peace, to support the Constitution and laws of the United States, and of this State, and to furthfully perform their duties inspatially and to the best of their abilities.
