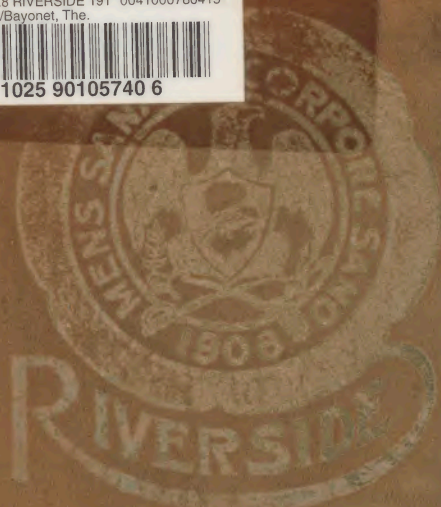

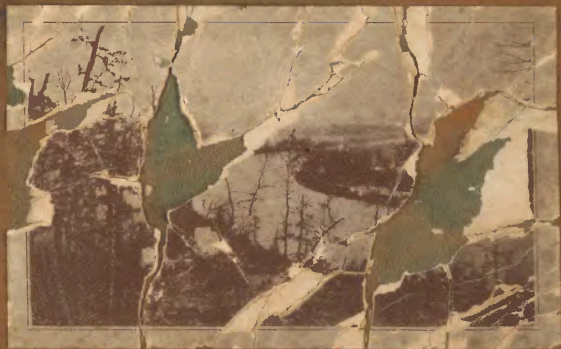

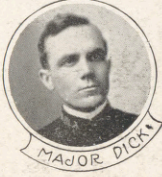
In succeeding years, the contents of the Annual may be much changed, but in this, its first appearance, certain departments, relevant only to an initial number have been admitted.

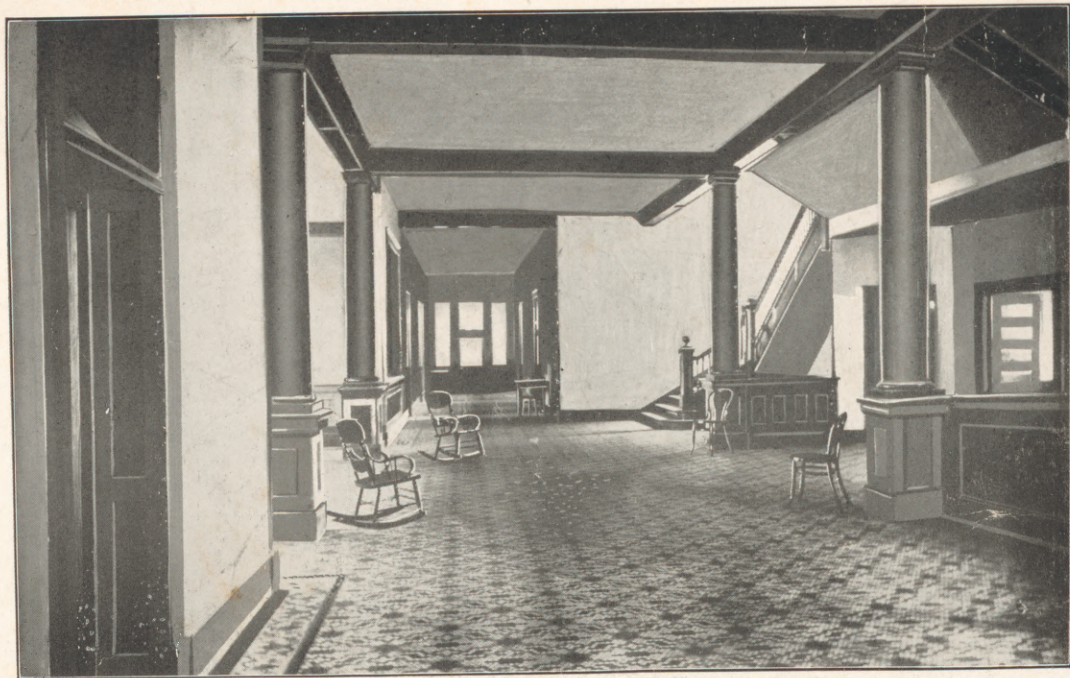
To all who have assisted us, either directly or indirectly, in the preparation of this work, the Staff wishes to express its hearty appreciation of their kindness.

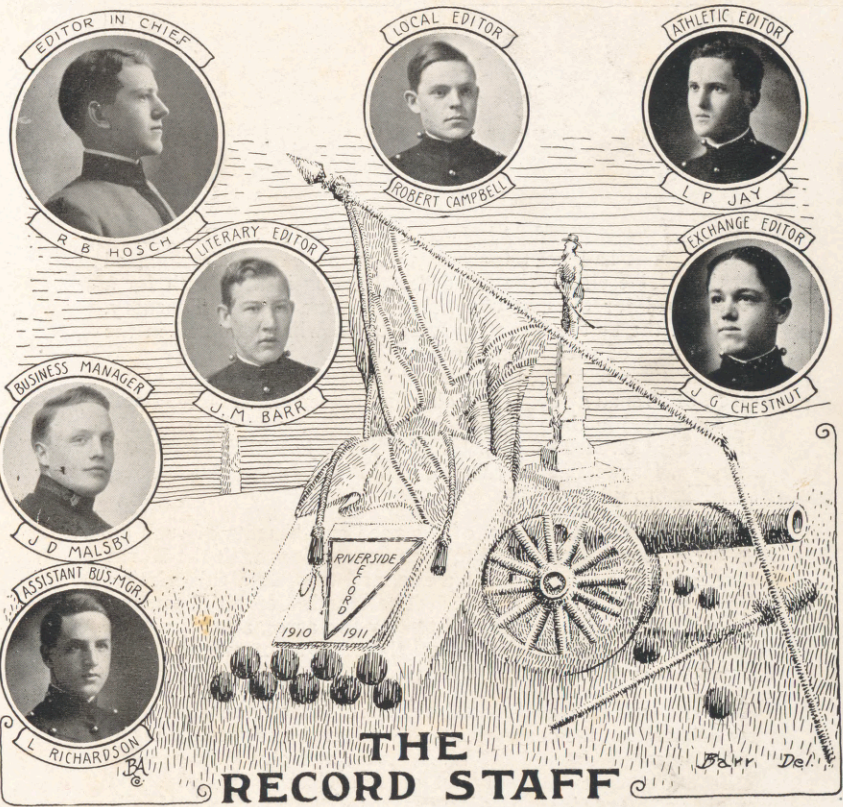
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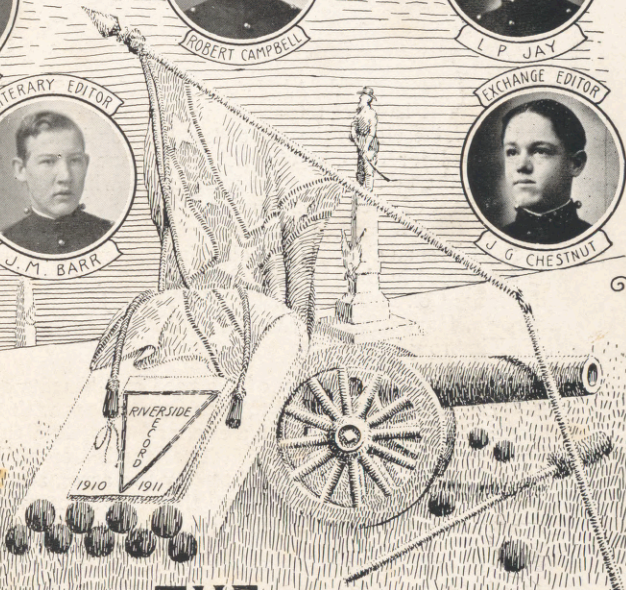

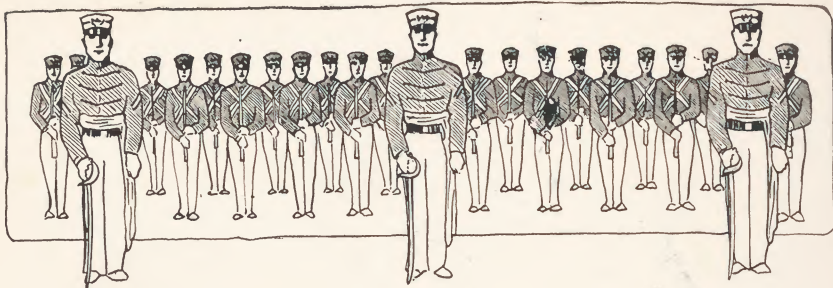

#### RIVERSIDE MILITARY ACADEMY—HISTORICAL.

Although it had been for many years a generally recognized fact that Gainesville is the most ideal location in the South for a great school for boys, it was not until some time in February, 1907, that the first active steps were taken which resulted in the establishment of such an institution.

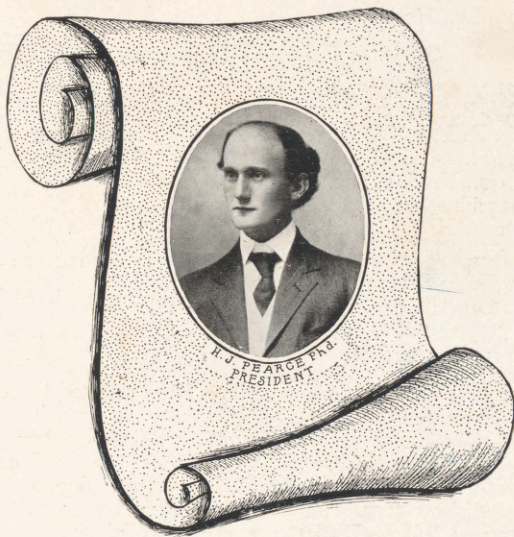
At the time named, upon the invitation of President H. J. Pearce, of Brenau College, the following named citizens of Gainesville assembled in the office of President Pearce to discuss ways and means: Col. H. H. Dean, J. E. Redwins, Jr.; J. H. Hosch, M. C. Brown, Hayne Palmer, Judge G. H. Prior, Judge J. C. Boone, E. E. Kimbrough.

After a general discussion of the need and benefits of such an institution, it was determined to open negotiations with the North Georgia Electric Company for a site, and to open a subscription list for stock at an early date. The North Georgia Company readily agreed to donate a site of twenty-five acres, allowing large liberty in selecting from the several thousand acres owned by the company, near the Chattahoochee river.

The site, which was first selected, fronted on the river, but after deliberation the committee finally adopted a suggestion made by the lamented General H. W. Warner, and chose the present site fronting eight hundred feet on the electric railway, and crowning a lofty ridge sloping gently to the river a half mile distant.

The subscription list for stock was headed by the late Dr. J. W. Bailey, who for many years was first in his support of every movement for the religious and educational uplift of the com-





munity. The other stockholders in the enterprise were as follows: H. H. Dean, H. J. Pearce, A. W. VanHoose, O. W. Warner, J. E. Redwine, Jr.; M. C. Brown, J. B. George, Palmour Hardware Co., Hosch Bros., Chas. M. Stieff, J. J. & J. E. Maddox, C. C. Saunders, W. H. Slack, W. A. Carlisle, G. F. Turner Co., W. J. & E. C. Palmour, Cinciolo Bros., J. H. Hunt, August Geiger, Piedmont Drug Co., M. M. Ham, E. P. Ham, G. P. Estes, W. I. Hobbs, W. B. Smith, G. J. Baldwin, J. H. Downey, W. E. Dozier, R. Smith, H. L. Rudolph, W. H. Evans, Pierce & Francisco, R. A. Mitchell, Stovall & Co., W. C. Ham, E. L. Douglass, Gainesville Lumber Co., N. C. White, J. T. Waters.

The stockholders selected the following "Board of Directors": H. H. Dean, H. J. Pearce, A. W. VanHoose, J. E. Redwins, Jr.; M. C. Brown, J. H. Hosch, Hayne Palmour.

Work was started upon the first building in the fall of 1907, and the building, now known as Lanier Hall, was completed in June, 1908.

Presidents Pearce and VanHoose, of Brenau College, being greatly interested in the development of the new institution, agreed to take charge of same under a lease granted by the board of directors.

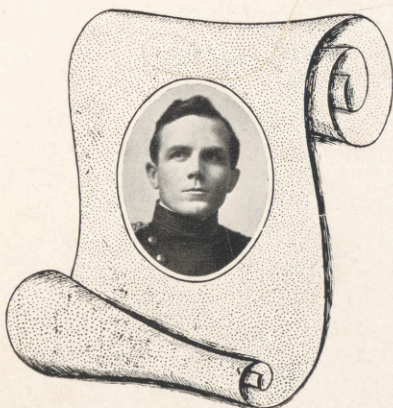
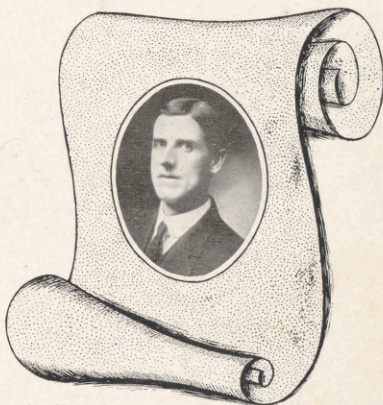
Accordingly, the school first opened its doors for students September 22, 1908, with President H. J. Pearce in active charge, and the faculty as follows: Guy A. Moore, principal and professor of English; Harry W. Stovall, commandant and professor of Mathematics; W. A. Dozier, professor of Science and Modern Languages; Robert S. Rosser, professor of Latin and Greek; R. H. Saddler, professor of History and football coach; Frank L. Anderson, professor of Mathematics and baseball coach; C. W. Stokely, Bookkeeping and Stenography.

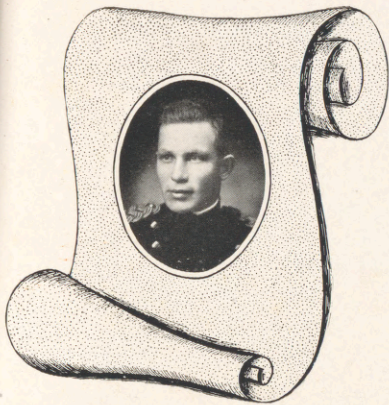

The enrollment during the first term numbered sixty-six, and the record in every department, particularly in athletics, was phenomenal. Incidentally, it may be remarked that three of the stars of the 1911 baseball team of the University of Georgia, said to be the champion team of the South, were also stars in both the football and baseball teams of Riverside during this first year—1908-1909.

During the second term, the spring of 1909, the affairs of the school were directed by Professor A. W. VanHoose, Dr. Pearce having resumed his duties at Brenau College. In April of that term, Professor VanHoose consummated a trade with Professor G. H. Gardner, then superintendent of the Donald Fraser Military Academy, of Decatur, Ga., whereby Professor Gardner acquired an interest in the management of the school, and became its active head during the year 1909-1910. In order to make this arrangement possible, and to secure the erection of a new building, the majority of the stockholders either donated or sold at a nominal price their stock to Messrs. VanHoose and Pearce, thereby virtually vesting the title to same in them.

During the next year a series of radical changes in management of the institution took place. Professor Van Hoose sold his interest to Professor Gardner, and later Dr. Pearce bought the entire interest of Professor Gardner, thereby again acquiring control of the entire property.

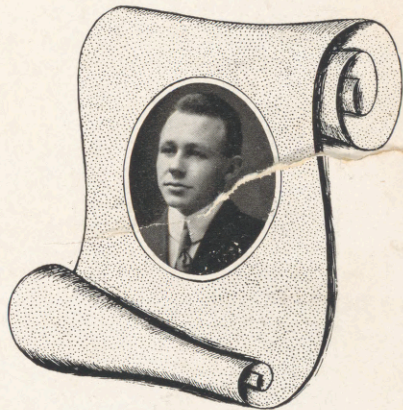
After acquiring ownership of the school Dr. Pearce decided to give it his personal direction, and this he has done during the year 1910-1911. He is now ably assisted by Professor F. L. McCoy, who purchased an interest and became identified with the school as principal in January, 1911.

    To thy Springtime, O my Life!

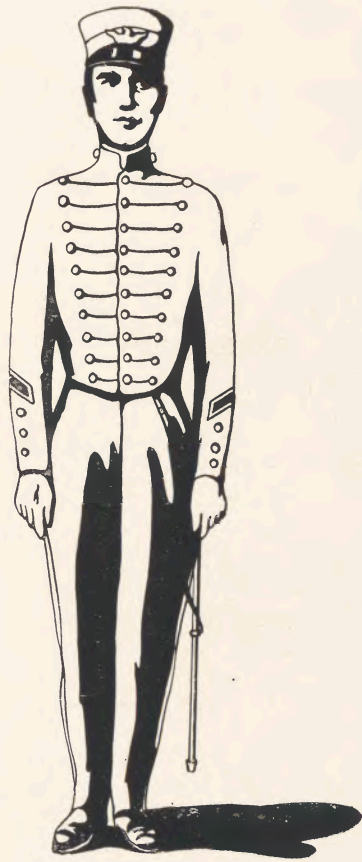
O bright was that vernal past,

After reading the letter, I sat down at my desk, turning my thoughts to my former schoolmates. Some had married, I knew; others, I suspected, had. Some had disappeared from my sight; others, I had not heard from for many years. I began recalling them one by one, when suddenly I was aroused from my reverie by the janitor informing me that some one wished to see me. Looking up, I saw before me a small man, with a grey mustache, faultlessly dressed. I did not recognize him but when he handed me his card and I read, "Marion Wingfield Smith.

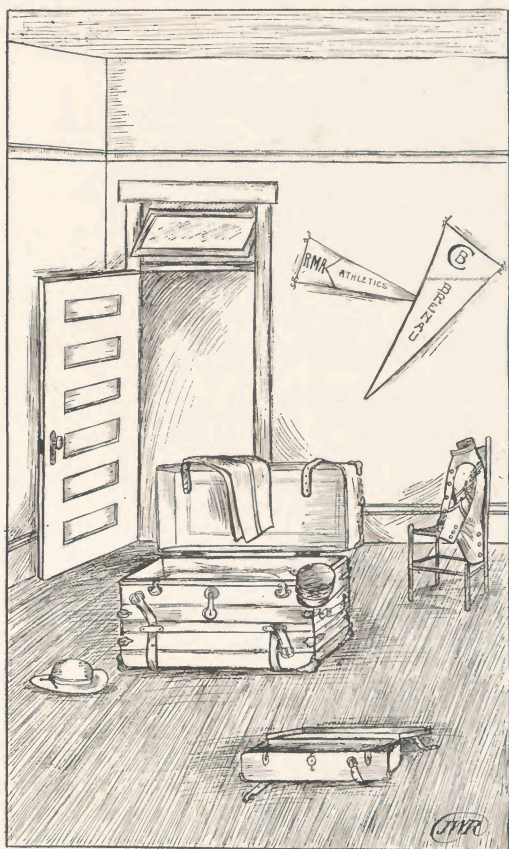
Richardson—A blank follows his name, nor do I wonder. I know where he is—janitor at the Arlington Hotel, Gainesville, Georgia.

## THE SOUTH IN AMERICAN LITERATURE.

... It is said that the very atmosphere of Greece was an inspiration to learning and so it with the South. The clear skies and balmy air seem to fill men with music, love and poetry. Those qualities when bodied forth in sympathetic expression results in a distinctive sectional literature. Our deficiency in literary advancement is accounted for by numerous obstacles. From the time of the first settlements until the Civil War, the South was a land of lords and slaves. The youth was free from care and naturally sought recreation in hunting and other manly sports rather than in literature. There

were no towns as in New England and practically all of the advancement was agricultural.

However, the South has produced in spite of these hindrances many geniuses and if the people of the South were as duly appreciative as those of the North, perhaps even our very obscure writers would be prominent.

The nation is indebted to the South through Thos. Jefferson for its Declaration of Independence, a semi-literary master-piece. He, like most Southern men, was attracted to the study of law, when the settlement of political questions was of paramount importance. Had he devoted his life to literature he would have undoubtedly become famous, and in proof of this it is enough to say that his genius was recognized by his fellow congressmen when to him was delegated the drafting of this famous document.

In a purely literary sense, the Charleston school of writers was perhaps the brightest of the age. The first of those was William Gilmore Simms. He was a novelist and wrote very much in the same style as did Cooper. Of him Professor Charles F. Richardson, the eminent critic, says, "He was poet, dramatist, Shakespeare an editor, essayist, aphoristic philosopher, historian, commemorative orator, legislator, proslavery apologist, journalist, magazinist, critic and, above all, a novelist."

Among other writers of this school were Hayne and Timrod. They were school-mates at Charleston and friends throughout life. Hayne was heir to a considerable fortune which he lost, however, during the Civil War. Timrod was never a man of means and for a while he actually faced starvation. He far surpassed his compeer and his style has been associated with that of the English poet, Seigh Hunt. Timrod dying at the age of thirty-eight left us only a thin volume of poetry the quality of which, in its free musical style characteristic of true Southern poetry endears him to us.

At about this time there were several periodicals started in Charleston. The Southern Review and The Southern Quarterly, which shows the fact that the South was awakening to the necessity of literature. When we think of the disadvantages in this direction alone under which the writers of the South labored and then compare with the favorable conditions which existed in the North and advantages in this direction alone under which the writers of the South labored East when Longfellow wrote we can but wonder what the South would have done under equally advantageous circumstances. Virginia produced and sustained the South's best periodical in the Southern Literary Messenger, of which Thos. N. Page, a recent Virginia writer says: "It had much to do with the substantiating of the unstable Poe, and developing nearly all of those writers of the South whose names have survived."

However, a little later besides the Charleston group there were the Virginia novelists, John E. Cook and Mary V. Terlume. Cook portrayed the stately and aristocratic life in old Virginia essaying to do for his native state that which Simms had done for South Carolina, Hawthorne for colonial New England, or Irving for Knickerbocker New York. The novels of Terlume who is better known under the pseudonym of Marian Harland are much smoother than those of Cook but she must be classed as a popular writer.

Next comes our group of dear old Georgia literatures. Among them we find Harris. He will always be dear to the children, hence, the people of our land, because he originated "Uncle Remus" and the "Darkey," a new figure in literature. The poets of Georgia are Sidney Lanier, and Dr. F. O. Ticknor, whose best poem, "Little Giffen" has been compared with Browning's shorter narrative poems.

Sidney Lanier was a man of indomitable will and courage. His strength did not lie in his body, which was indeed much weakened by disease, but in his brilliancy of mind and his generous musical soul. He was a graduate of Oglethorpe College and it is probable that he never received the proper training there for he says of himself that his life was a mere "drouth and famine." In this we do not agree with him. Although constantly engaged in a three-fold struggle for health, for bread, and for a literary career, he is acclaimed, "The True Poet of the South," the poet of a chivalrous reverence for women; the poet of all high emotions. He it was who sang,

"When life's all love, 'tis life;  
Aught else,  
'Tis naught."

He was naturally a musician and was connected with the Peabody Symphony Orchestra for several years, owing to which fact his poetry is more rhythmic and musical than that of any other American writer. He was perhaps the greatest lyric poet America has ever produced.

Poe contributed to the world's literature that which has never been successfully proto-typed. Every literary nation has attempted to reach the high standard set by Poe in the writing of detective stories but all have only copied and fallen short of it. He also contributed a style of poetry distinctively his own; a style which charms the reader as no other American verse has yet done and in which he puts into practice his theory that poetry should be written for the beauty of expression and not for the teaching of morals.

In so short an essay one cannot go into detail and sketch the minor writers, but:

"Poets of the South were they,  
The fairest realm on earth;  
They sang of arms and the man  
And the land that gave them birth;  
The bards of a lordly people,  
Forever enshrined in song—  
A literature immortal—  
They chant with heaven's throng."
