1. On 3 June 1969 (fallowing arrangements made in Havana, Cuba bus weeks earlier by the wadersigned), Miss June Coli arrived in New York City for a series of neetings and possible recruitment as a contact of the all Division.

- 2. Originally esheduled to arrive Pricay evening 3 hay, Miss with arrived early friday morning, having left Havana the previous might, travelling by way of Missi. This emplicated matters seas-hat since Miss CUES was not fully informed of the true reason for our asking her to come to liew York. As a recoll, she made consect with a few peo, le wind we would have rather not have had her see prior to sur contact with hor. Hause of all persons contacted in Rew Tork are contained in a separate memoraname based on a debricfing carried out in descinates on 6 June 1960. One also editor of Contacted in Hew York, and attempted to find out about me from him. He had been briefed by me warlier in the week, bovever, and merely referred to no se a "friend" with neary contacts in newspaper field and in government circles. Miss Cubb and-s as as "heary Rubhers and as far as I knew, she has no knowledge of my real name.
- 3. My first contact with Miss Cubs was made in havens, Cubs on 28 Karch 1960. We met in the coffee shop of the navana hilton hotel where I was introduced to her by _____ of ____ My cover at the time was that my visit to Havena was being sponsored by "German and french news-.aper interests, leaving searchat vague my specific uponsors. Miss will did not invulve about me amy further at that time and was helpful in getting appointments for me and Mr. Claus Jacobia a logitimate German correspondent of "Der Spiegel", with certain Cuben officials. we met again several times during my stay in havana and found her a woman with many contacts among leaders of the aevolutionary movement. Before leaving Cuba I set her for dinner in an attempt to evaluate her possible usefulness to us but as de no further effort toward a recruitment.
- 4. After returning to Hoodquarters and discussing her strategic position within the hierarby of the nevolutionaries, Chief an and Chief *H/4 orined that a recruitment attempt should be made in view of the increasing interest in the activities of the Cuben government.
- 5. On 20 May 1960 on amether trip to Havena, Miss was was again cortacted and after two meetings was asked to come to new York. At no time in my discussions with her was CIA named or inforred. In havens I talked

to her about her "future" and said that I had been comentat impressed by her fluency in "panish and shility to "get around". I saked her if she had an interest in coming to her Terk and discussing an employment possibility which sould make use of her talents. In anser to her inquiries as to what she would have to do, I vaguely referred to reporting and writing and possibly some public relations activity. She agreed to come and I advanced her \$180.00 to purchase her plane tickets.

- 6. The question of "leave" to come to how fork was brought up for I told her that I didn't want her to get into difficulties with her office. She said that she was pretty much her own boss and would find an ale untercourse. Later we decided that I would send her a telegram in the name of her father from New York telling her that father would be in her fork for a few days and would like to see her. The bellowed that this would be a good excuse because all her close high level friends including her boss will know that the is very attached to her father and use that he smaller money from time to time. I also saked whether her go ag to be fork some create any suspicious on the part of the rolice or country possile. The was sure it wouldn't because of the rather high rate of reaffic by leban officials to and from new York, the thought bland books of the father high rate of reaffic by leban the honestly falt that her York would be the most logical place for her to go.

Miss colds, an American citizen employed by the cuban herolutionary Covernment, is a difficult type of person to characterize, attending from the borth American midwest, she left home in her early twenties and has never restless and more or less "homeless" ever since, the is "bohemian" as a type, and her life with Latin Americans of all makes of life noncomed her considerably and has removed much of the momenthness and a math from test. Due to many factors in her past she has become evertly hard and cold and confused. She doesn't quite feat at home anywhere my more and table me as several occasions that she has never been fully accepted by the better class latins, or latin Americans from the same work of life the custos from the believes this is one reason why she "fits" in with the "nevoluti naries" for they too are not fully accepted by havana cubans and more or less stick to themselves. As no longer many that the Borelettonory movement the was so idealistically notivated for a few months ago is the right thing, and wail her contact with up, had made up her mind to leave thin in the near fature. Her association with fidal Contro and execurage has been mother shattered "dress", one of a whole series in her life. As a result, I do not feel she is as "ideal" agost but in view of the lack of contacts in the avvolutionary movement and the fact that she is a number of the efficial group, I feel she can be of use and can be made to pass information and material to us.

9. One of the most difficult problems with hiss CDBB will be control. She has shown good conspiratorial sense which at first surprised me comenhat, but after learning more of her back, ound and post activities (long illicit leve affair and engaged in dope traffic) it is probably by now second mature to her. She will also need considerable steering toward interdiffence targets. Although she sits in the midst of memorous activities of intelligence interest, her own personal interests until now have been along vestly different lines and much of her post activity with the movolutionary government has been guided by emotion and idealism. She is embusiastic and is liable to take her first intelligence assignments with some differentials, not purposefully but as a result of her "collaborating" with a United States service of some stature against a force she once firstly believed in but lately has been turning against buch as of failure to materialise along the idealistic lines she originally anticipated.

10. Miss C.Bb also has very few materialistic also or desires. Money means almost nothing to her as is indicated in the report on her destricting. Of the each advanced her for a round trip ticket to new York the jurchased a one way ticket and used the other to pay off detts. This thought nothing whotsoever of this and apparently obtains and spends money without a true realization of its value. The lives over her income of approximately loupesos (equivalent to dollars) a month, making up the difference by handouts from friends or, if she is really caught short, by having her father send her money.

Il. While in New York, several meetings were need with her and she was gradually indoctrinated to the fact that my interests in her were of an intelligence nature. Cla was never mentioned in our if cursions yet at one joint she said she suspected I must be from the because no other government agency operates outside of the United States and her past experience with the FBI was of a nature to indicate that they always ask her to visit them at their offices. (She was questioned once on a trip to hew York in connection with the Harita LORFHZ case.)

12. while in New York discussing her potential with her, it was obvious that her complex background, present activities, vest circle of friends and her unstable character would call for a more thorough debriefing. She agreed to come to mashington with me to "see and talk to a frient for a technical evaluation of her ability to act securely" and on 6 June 1960 she arrived at the hotel Blackstone in "ashington registering as annevel wilson. Arrangements were made with Al/A/Cl to have her polygraphed to which she agreed. That evening she was taken to the Botel haleigh where an extensive debriefing and evaluation of her was made. The results of this debriefing including a chronology of her activities and past history are contained in a separate expension.

13. Fellowing the polygraph, Mice CCEB planted to return to New York and Havens but due to the length of time that the emmination required, she stayed in machington wall the norming of 7 duly. She departed for New York at 8:00 A.H. and left that evening for Havens, Caba. She obtained information of a CI nature before her departure. This information consormed activities of a Caban agent in Mices.

Id. Hiss COSB was teld prier to her departure that if she was sincere in wanting to aid and assist we in obtaining factual information about current activities in Caba, she would have to be completely honest and subject herself to some control. The was given a few targets to concentrate on until our beat meeting as an attempt to evaluate her ability along there lines. The was asked to obtain names and contacts of Joviet and satellite citizens dealing with the Revolutionary government. The was asked to see the Chief of grands lating when she knows well and monitor his activities, the was taked to find a rune to see Kung rai, head of the tree China hows Agency (Communist) and monitor his activities also. Also, she was told to try to untermine what hunes Jimines accomplished on his visit to the Loviet Union. The was told that all matters partaining to Cuban relations with the Led Chinase and the poviets are of interest as well as any indications of local communist party activities with the Covernment.

15. At first I was planning to go to haven to establish a local contact, however, just before her departure Miss and suggested that she make another trip to how York around I duly and to allocate the matter of a local contact, if advisable, at that time. I believe that the havens station should determine if they want to have local access to Miss Code and her activities. If Miss Code can be controlled and accepts stating, it would perhaps be desirable to mould her into a long range asset by having her become very copy with the Commandst leaders and become, overtay, even more "radiu" about the revolutionary movement. Later she could perhaps be used electrice in Letin America, probably among the rabid left wing youth groups that are becoming increasingly anti-American and more powerful in various areas.

16. We would appreciate any comments the havens itation may have concerning where and how to establish contact with her locally. In feel that her usefulness has current need and she may be able to handle many on the spot assignments for the local station. The does need direction and that too could best be handled locally. Her next visit to hew York has already been laid on by her physician friend who will rejuest her to visit the city for "treatment" before the doctor departs for agrope on an extended trip. Wiss COBS was informed that if her services are considered useful, we will pay her a sum of 200 Cuban pesos a month. One agreed but sho was told that any unreliability or indication of dishonesty on her part would oreak the relationship. The sum of 200 peops was suggested after discussing the matter of compensation with a senior member of the lawans station.
