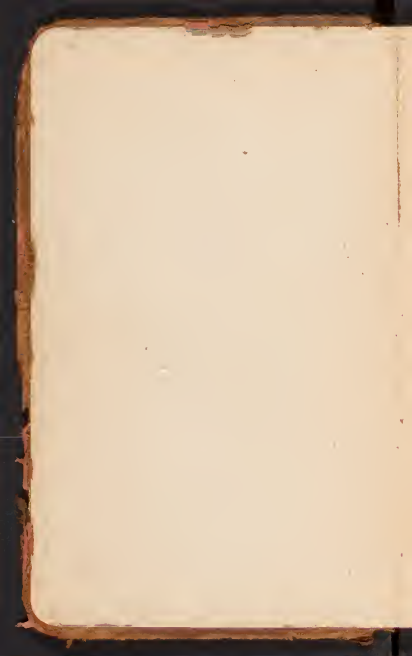

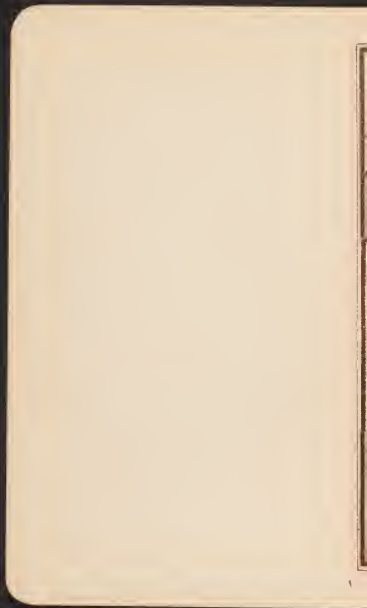

Clear 16° at 7.45 A.M. - 12° at 11 P.M. Cold!

To-day the herbarium has been entirely cleaned and is now in good shape. I helped a good deal. I recorded a number of things. Saw Gilbert photo materials for developing, etc. Wrote out my Shakespeare Ann. Report. To Harv. by this A.M. to try on frock coat & suit & overcoat at Coöps.

Erith Congdon & Mollie Wyman lunched here. Messrs. Cushman & Knowlton came this evening. The cards can't be found & we are going ahead without them. Laid out a plan of work. Broke up about 10.15. Called for Mr. & Frank Smith's at 9.30.

Clear & partly cloudy, cold.

They are very wonderful. Afterwards George & I went through the Washington & Subway and lunched at Dreyfus' - First-rate lunch.

Worked on Potamogeton most of the day - M. & I called on Prof. & Mrs. Marks this P.M. and saw the baby. She is a beautiful child.

This evening we called on Mr. & Mrs. Belden & the Blackwells. The Beldens only in Long letter from Lucy & May (Medeira).

Rainy & foggy to-day. Sun shown this evening though little fell.

At home all day. Finished revision of Potamogeton & making cards for our Local Flora. Worked on several other genera. Forgot my appointment at dentist at 1.30!! First time.

Shakespeare Club this evening. Delightful paper by Prof. Wm. A. Neilson on Milton - Puritan or Poet? The rowe both went in carriage from Newbury -

Clear, cold, partly cloudy -  
 At home most of today working

 us - he had a very pleasant evening  
 Pease & I looked over Syrinchium  
 We hear that A. Lawrence Lowell

Snowing off & on. Disagreeable.

This morning I walked to the Coop and  
 tried on my suit & overcoat. They came this P.M.

 with my Sagittaria. Dr. Robinson spent nearly 2 hrs.  
 with me over my 105 sheets. Fernald says my  
Willyby Eleschem pygmaea is E. intermedia.  
 L.H. Bailey & G.G. Kennedy both pronounced it pygmaea.  
 Home to lunch. Spent the P.M. on my Sagittaria

Clear - cold.

At home this A.M. working on

about 5 when I went to Mary's  
and staid till nearly 6.

Wea.

Blustery, sun & hail -

Dr. Coolidge is very sick with pneumonia. A consultation was held this morning between Dr. Deiman & Dr. Clepp of Boston. He does not suffer, but he has wandered a good deal today. We have written near relatives & friends of the family about him. He was 91 last Nov. 1.

I have been at home all day, except for a walk to S.D. speaks this evening. I have read, written letters, worked in plants, & at night with the Dr. & with Mrs. C. etc. I have also taken tea with Mrs. Coolidge.

MONDAY 18

Wea.

Clear, cold - ground white. The doctor has been his own, but he wanted most of the time with short intervals. A 2<sup>nd</sup> nurse has come and she will occupy an spare room. To Harv. by the A.M. & to Dr. Deiman for his things. Am reading 'Egypt & its Monuments'. To the Hunt Club this evening. Currier's Will Brewster showed a Nova Scotia specimen of *Megascotis skua* - It was up all last night

Read this evening 'Lion King'

Ther. TUES. JAN. 19, 1909 Wea.

Cloudy with little sun - Flakes in the air -  $0^{\circ}$  at 8 A.M. rises to about  $27^{\circ}$  -

At home to-day mostly reading Egypt, reviewing some of Breasted's & read 'Egypt and its Monuments'.

Worked on 'Xyris' - Called on Dr. Robinson at 5:45 for an hour. Dr. Coolidge is more comfortable to-day we hope - many callers came here to inquire - M. in bed to-day with cold.

Ther. WEDNESDAY 20 Wea.

Clear and cloudy - much warmer. Melting.

To Dr. Briggs at 11 A.M. at home rest of day - many called to inquire for Dr. Coolidge. The main trouble now is the hallucinations. He wanders from one subject to another constantly. He has had a solid  $\frac{1}{2}$  his sleep since Friday. He drops off for a few minutes at a time. Mrs. C. keeps up. Mary Rogers has been here for the past 4 days. comes daily. Dr. Robinson called this evening.



Ther. THURS. JAN. 21, 1909 Wea.

Cloudy, chilly -

Dr. Coolidge very ill early this A.M. Mrs. & I were called up at 4.20. Elroy & Viola came up early. I had a consultation and a bandage placed from the <sup>KIDNEYS</sup> ~~hands~~. He rolled and has been reasonably comfortable without pain. Wandering a good deal. I took a short walk this A.M. Miss Bishop showed me a fine flowering Sacromatium. This P.M. a bad case of grippe came on suddenly with me, with shivering and fever & soreness - I was bundled up in bed.

Ther. FRIDAY 22 Wea.

I have been in bed all day, very lame, sore and hot. Doctor D. visited me twice. Miss Bowers, the night nurse, gave me alcohol baths.

Dr. C. about the same today, but always weaker. His cold began on the 13<sup>th</sup> Jan. and he took to his bed on the 15<sup>th</sup> at 5 P.M. Miss Bowers came on the 18<sup>th</sup>.

People are very kind, inquiring incessantly how is land for me to add to the care when he needs all her strength.

SAT. JAN. 23, 1909

Wea.

Raining very much.

I have been in bed as yesterday.  
 Another alcohol rule by Miss Bowers.  
 Dr. C. has been just about the  
 same. Mind clear part of the time  
 He told everybody good bye with touching  
 words to each. He said he paid me a beautiful  
 tribute. How I regret lying in bed sick!  
 Bishop <sup>Laurence</sup> ~~Proctor~~ came out and administered  
 the Holy Communion to Dr. C. & family.

Vida spent the night in our spare room.  
 Thus ~~interesting~~ in it with Miss Bowers.  
 Ther. SUNDAY 24 Wea.

Raining & disagreeable. Snow fast going  
 In bed all day, but better, talking more than milk  
 for the first time. Have read the papers and written  
 some postal cards. "The Republic" story is wonderful.  
 Several peals of thunder by 4.22 & 4.25 P.M.  
 Dr. C. about the same, but more faint. He worries  
 more over his affairs. Mr. holds out nobly,  
 Vida sleeps here in our spare room at night.  
 Everybody very kind. Emily & Jenny take  
 turns during the day here some stairs, some  
 callers, writing notes etc.

MON. JAN, 25, 1909

Wea.

Cloudy, chilly -

I am still better & was up this  
P.M. for a half hour in my study.  
Was glad enough to get back to bed.

Dr. C. keeps on just the same.  
It is astonishing. One blessing is  
that he does not suffer any. We  
shall simply wait and watch.

TUESDAY 26

Wea.

Clear & cloudy, cooler all day -

I have been up twice <sup>ton</sup> day and had my  
dinner and supper in the study. I  
am still better, having read quite a  
little. First slave since the 20<sup>th</sup>.

The good Doctor keeps along quietly.  
He lies in bed and I imagine even  
in his weakness, thinks a good deal -  
Physically he is almost better, but very  
feeble - I mean the various troubles, in  
limbs etc. are less.

Cloudy -

I am steadily improving and have been up considerably to-day, and soon stairs to dinner and supper. Have read the magazines, etc.

Dr. Coolidge is actually better bodily. Though very weak, and we must simply wait. I long to get in to see them there in the other house -

THURSDAY 28

Wea.

Clear, cold, sun!

Have been in my study to-day, but feel very weak. Went soon to dinner & supper. Elery and Rand called this AM. Elery will try to run for Assessor. Rand saw the Doctor in business. H. C. Mearns / Hark '96, called this PM. to get some facts on the Dr.'s life for the Transcript.

Wrote some verses this evening for some cards for Bitchelover's 'We Dine' tomorrow night.

 this afternoon and he seemed to enjoy
