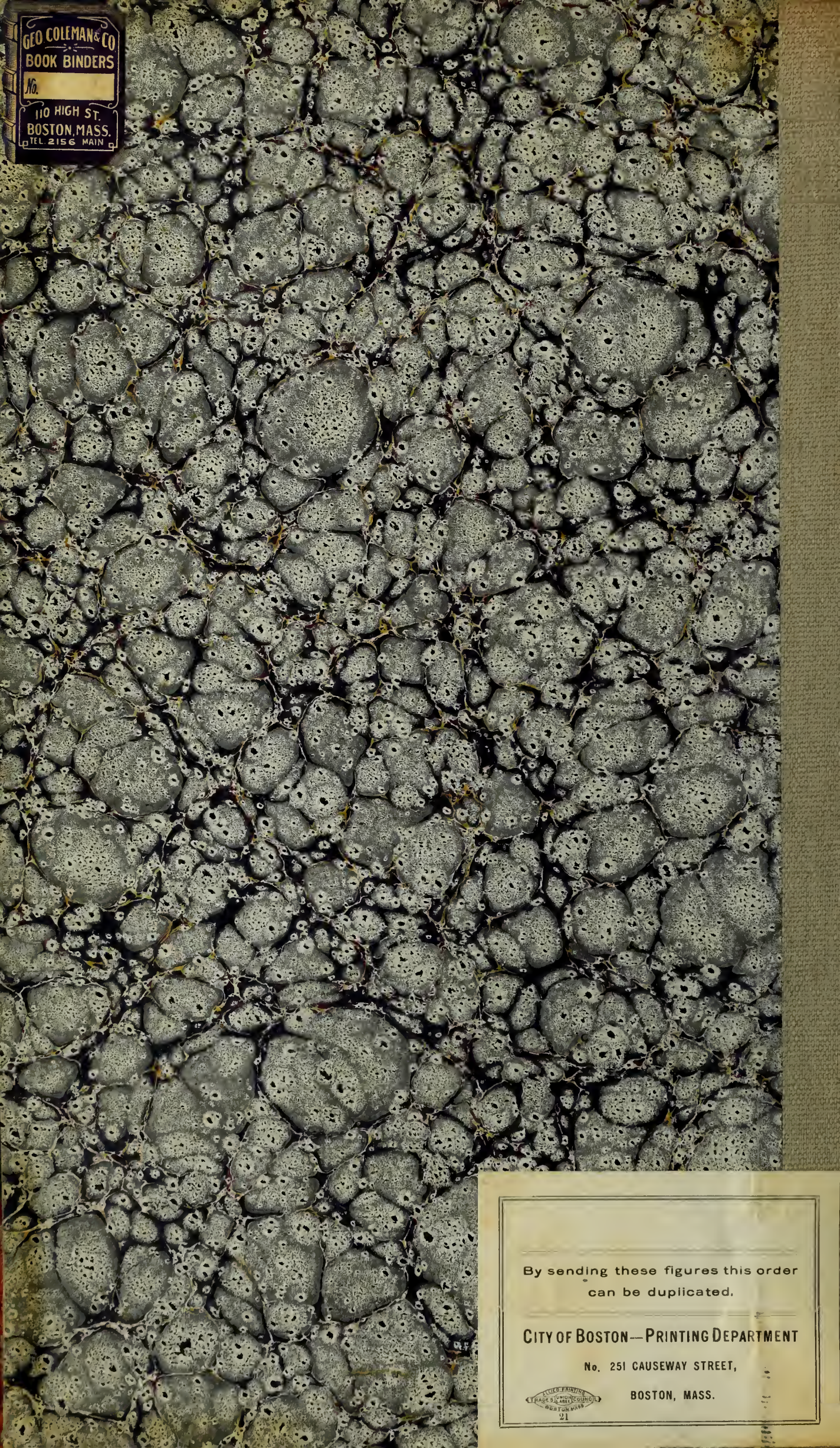




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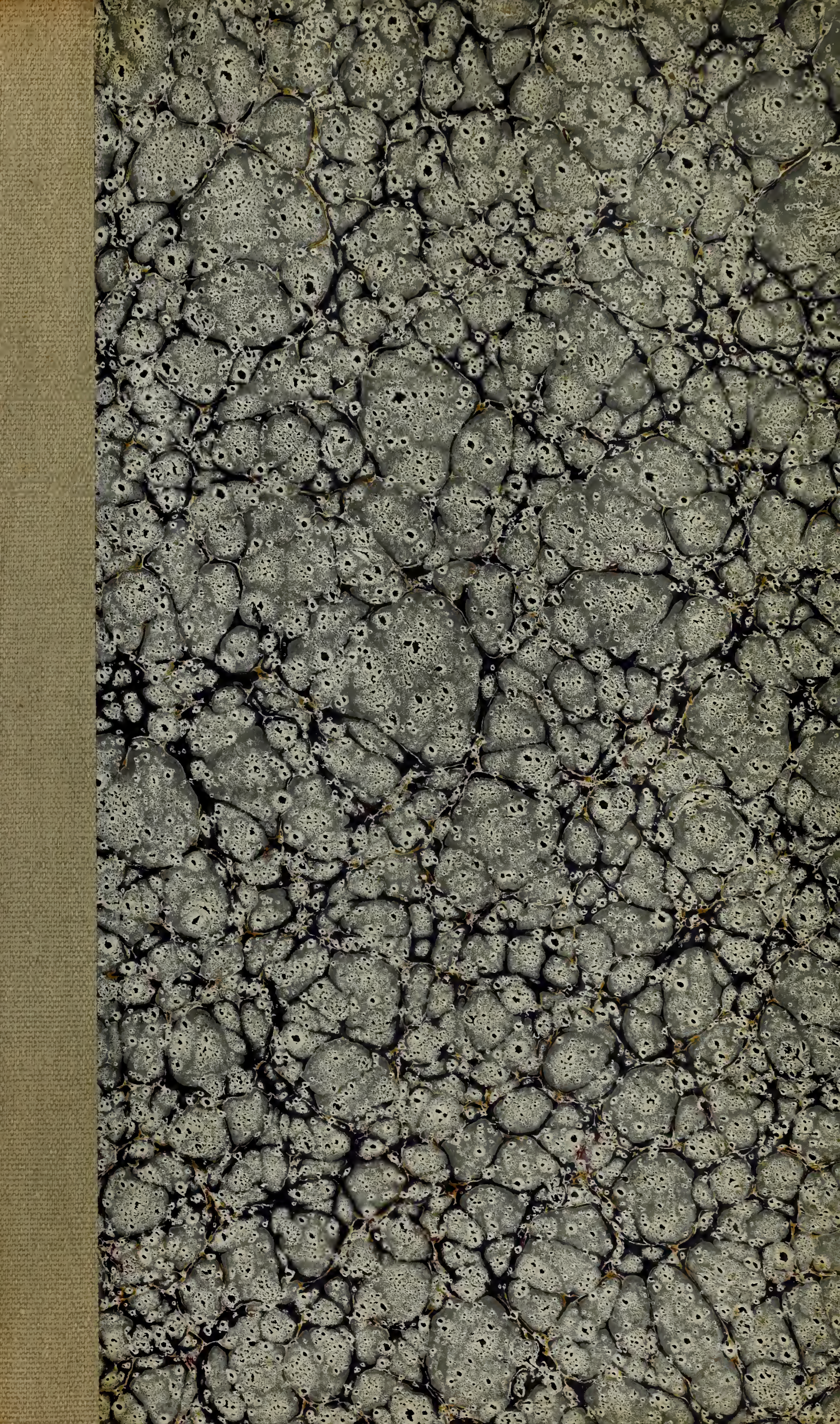
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BOSTON, JANUARY 12, 1904.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3 P. M. Present Messrs Stratton and Pratt, also Superintendent Pettigrew and Engineer Putnam. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

A conference was held with City Solicitor Babson and S. R. Knights, in regard to the value of the Randolph street property taken for the Ward 9 playground. Subsequently an offer of \$8,000 was made to the Boston Industrial Home in full for damages for the taking of its stable on Randolph street.

A communication from J. L. Nason and Company, requesting the Board to consider the value of the Albany street land and buildings owned by James N. Thompson, Trustee, and report to them, was received and laid over.

A report of the Committee of the Massachusetts Emergency and Hygiene Association, in charge of the Women's and Children's Division at Charlesbank, of the work of the past year, was received for publication in the annual report of the Board.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the Order of the Common Council requesting the Board to report to the Council the cost of establishing and equipping a playground in the Jamaica Plain district of Ward 23; and the matter was referred to the Chairman for reply.

A request from H. F. Gregg, that the Board approve the entrance of Gregg street into the Arborway, at its junction with Pond street, in accordance with a plan dated January 11, 1904, was received and laid over.

A communication from Guy Lowell in regard to the plans for the Charles River Embankment, in the rear of Beacon street, was received and placed on file.

An offer of \$51,750 was made through J. L. Nason and Company to James N. Thompson, for damages on account of land taken from him for the Ward 9 Playground.

VOTED, that the plan of a proposed street on land of H. F. Gregg, to connect with the Arborway and Pond street, drawn by W. C. Bates, Surveyor, and dated January 11. 1904, be approved, and that the Chairman endorse said approval on said plan.

BOSTON, FEBRUARY 2, 1904.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton and Pratt, also Superintendent Pettigrew and Engineer Putnam. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the disposition of the material proposed to be excavated from the Fens' basin, which was placed on file.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the order of the City Council in regard to lighting Wood Island Park for skaters; and the matter was referred to the Chairman to reply to the Mayor.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the application of the Boston Elevated Railway Company for approval of plan to locate the curve in the street railway tracks at Anawan avenue and Beach street across the lands taken for the West Roxbury Parkway; and it was

VOTED, to authorize the Boston Elevated Railway Company to construct the curve in its tracks at the corner of Anawan avenue and Beach street across lands of the West Roxbury Parkway, as shown by the lines in green on the plan of A. L. Plimpton, Civil Engineer, dated January 6, 1904, on condition that said tracks be removed when Belgrade avenue is extended across the Parkway, or whenever the Company is notified by this Board so to do.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the request of George W. Fowle for the conveyance to him of a right of way across the lands taken for the West Roxbury Parkway, for entrance to his lot until the parkway is completed; and the matter was referred to the Secretary to notify his counsel, Mr. Dakin, that the Board cannot grant Mr. Fowle's request.

A communication from T. M. Clark relative to convenient access to his house for supply wagons, also communication from the Police Board and report from the Superintendent regarding the same matter were received and placed on file.

A communication was received from J. L. Nason representing his desire for

a settlement of the land damage case of James M. Thompson, Trustee, and suggesting that the Board take into account the damage to his wharf property by the taking of the Ward 9 Playground, was received; and the Secretary was directed to confer with Mr. Nason in regard to the matter.

A petition from Messrs Carret, Chase and Hay for the payment to John L. White of the amount due him on account of a mortgage on a part of the Chestnut Hill estate taken by the City from Frederick J. White, the City to take an assignment of said mortgage, was received; and the Secretary was directed to confer with the Law Department in regard to the proposed assignment.

A communication from the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company relative to defects in the underground service at the Nursery, Franklin Park, was received; and the matter was referred to the Chairman for reply.

A petition from Charles L. Miller and many others, expressing appreciation of the management of the toboggan chutes at Franklin Park, was received and placed on file.

An application from Michael Green for a carriage stand on Commonwealth avenue, opposite Charlesgate East, was received and referred to the Superintendent for report.

An application from S. I. Hudgens for a renewal of his burro privilege at Franklin and Marine Parks, was received; and it was

VOTED, that S. I. Hudgens be permitted to keep a burro and pony stand at Franklin and Marine parks, for this season, provided that he gives a ride of 350 feet for five cents, and that the burros and pony and their equipment are satisfactory to the Superintendent of Parks.

VOTED, to authorize the Boston Elevated Railway Company to dump snow, during the present season, at such places on the Strandway near Newman street as the Superintendent may direct.

A report from the Superintendent, and correspondence with the Company in regard to the matter were placed on file.

VOTED, that the salary of Arthur E. Ogden, clerk, be increased from twelve dollars to fifteen dollars per week, from February 1, 1904.

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BOSTON, FEBRUARY 24, 1904.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton and Pratt, also Superintendent Pettigrew and Engineer Putnam. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the communication from W.D. Loring, Clerk of the Harvard Improvement Association, regarding the projected improvements at Franklin Field; and the Secretary was directed to reply to Mr. Loring in accordance therewith.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the communication from W.H.H. Emmons, Chairman Board of Police, regarding complaints that horses are frightened while crossing the bridge over the tracks at Charlesgate West.

The Superintendent submitted a report on a communication to him from Ellery H. Clark, Chairman Committee on High Schools of the School Committee, regarding the making of special arrangements in playgrounds for high school pupils; and the matter was referred to the Superintendent to write to Mr. Clark or confer with him.

The Superintendent submitted a report on work in connection with the construction of Columbia Road to be done by the Street Department, also some correspondence between Miss Perry, Librarian at the Franklin Park library, and the Master of the Gibson School, with regard to a more extended use of the library by the pupils of the school.

Executive Circular, No. 23, requesting a list of employees and salaries paid, was received and referred to the Secretary to supply the Mayor with a list.

An order of the City Council relative to the use of private pleasure beats on Jamaica Pond was received and referred to the Superintendent for report.

A communication from the Mayor accompanying a letter from the Metropolitan Park Commission, in regard to the extension of Everett street, was received and placed on file.

A communication from the Metropolitan Park Commission accompanying taking No. 443, of land on Western avenue, Brighton, for an addition to the speedway section of the Charles River Reservation, was received; and it was

VOTED, to concur in said taking. Subsequently the members of the Board signed the written instrument concurring therein.

A communication from Victor J. Loring relative to the continuance of the complaint filed in the district court by the Wellesley Park Commissioners, under the billboard act, was received and placed on file.

Mr. Francis J. McLaughlin came before the Board in the matter of the valuation of the Randolph street property. He submitted estimates which he had

drawn up for the Law Department, and gave his reasons in detail for the values he had placed on the several properties taken. The estimates were placed on file.

VCTED, to advertise the following notice to owners of teams:

Applications for furnishing teams for work in the Park Department, for the coming season, will be received only until 12 M. of Saturday, March 12, 1904, at the office of the Board, Pine Bank, Jamaica Plain. Applications must be on blank forms furnished by the Department, and in accordance with the printed notice now being issued from said office.

A committee of the South Boston Citizen's Association, consisting of William J. Feeley, M. J. Mahoney, S. W. Johnson, and E. P. Barry, accompanied by Alderman Slattery, came before the Board in regard to the dredging of the flats between Old Harbor Point and I street, and the construction of a boat landing at Burnham's wharf. Mr. Feeley said that the purpose the Citizen's Association have in view is to dredge the flats in order not only to beautify the basin, but to add to its sanitary value and incidentally add a considerable area of filled land to the playground. They also desired a public landing at Burnham's wharf so that steamboats could land at this point and take passengers to Castle Island. Mr. Feeley said that if it was not feasible to do the dredging all at once it might be done by installments.

Mr. Barry stated that, while he did not approve of the Strandway and believed that it would eventually be used for commercial purposes, and that South Boston was not so well off to-day as before the work was undertaken, yet, undoubtedly, the improvements suggested by Mr. Feeley would make a great improvement in the neighborhood, and would please the public. He said the dredging of the flats would add to the attractiveness of the Strandway and do away with the unpleasant odor from the flats, which the people living in the neighborhood now suffer. It would also add to the yacht anchorage, and, with a landing at Burnham's wharf, would accommodate a large number of yacht owners and business men.

Mr. Johnson said that he did not agree with Mr. Barry as to the future of that section of South Boston lying south of Broadway and east of Dorchester street, which is wholly residential in character, and, in his opinion, is more beautified by the park than it would be by wharves. He said the flats were always unbearable in summer and would be a great detriment to the pleasure drive.

Mr. Mahoney stated that abreast of the brewery is the worst place, and the dredging of the flats near this shore was of the most importance.

Alderman Slattery corroborated what had been said by the previous speakers, and said that, while it may not be possible to get a large appropriation

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for the work, a beginning might be made if the Commissioners would say what would be a reasonable sum to work with. The Chairman said the Board would look into the matter and communicate further with the Committee.

BOSTON, MARCH 7, 1904.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton, Pratt and Prendergast, also the Superintendent and the Engineer of the Board. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Superintendent submitted a report on a partial improvement of the flats at the Strandway, as suggested by the Committee of the Citizen's Association of South Boston; and the matter was referred to the Chairman to communicate the substance of the report to the Committee.

A communication from the Metropolitan Park Commission, accompanying a copy of Taking 446, of land in Brighton from Henry B. Goodenough, for extension of Everett street, was received; and it was

VOTED, to concur in said taking, the members of the Board signing the written instrument concurring therein.

A communication from Messrs Merriam, Hooper, and Hilton, in behalf of Mrs. Margaret P. Russell, Executrix of the will of Ellen C. Johnson, stating that the balance of the fund devised by her for the purpose of constructing a public fountain had been paid to the City for the maintenance and repair of the fountain, and requesting the Board to make provision for man as well as for beast in accordance with the donor's intention, was received and placed on file.

A communication from the agent of the White Star Line, agreeing to be responsible for the cost of repairs to the fender guard and railing of the pier at North End Beach, was received; and the Superintendent was authorized to proceed with the work.

An order of the Common Council requesting the Board to transfer to the Bath Department the buildings and all other properties at the North End Beach, was received and placed on file.

An application from Antonio Gregori for a renewal of the refreshment privilege at Castle Island was received, and referred to the Superintendent for report.

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A request of the Massachusetts Board of Managers for the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, relative to a municipal exhibit, was received and referred to the Superintendent for report.

Mr. Hosea Hyde, Special Agent Department of Right of Way, American Telephone and Telegraph Company, came before the Board with reference to the long-distance wires which cross Columbia Road at Mt. Vernon street. Mr. Hyde stated that the Company has a great deal of trouble with the cable carrying the telephone wires under the bridge at this point, due to boys damaging the cable, which allows water to get in and thereby interrupts the service. Mr. Hyde said that these interruptions were a tremendous detriment to the business of the country, and that very many and serious complaints of the service are made, and that it costs considerable to repair the damages and renew carbons burnt out in electric storms, and that the resistance caused by the cable is equal to twenty-eight miles of open wire, which is an objectionable feature in long-distance telephone service. Mr. Hyde said further that the cable boxes and platforms were unsightly, and that the Company would put up straight, well-painted poles, and allow the New England Telephone & Telegraph Company to place their wires on the poles, thereby doing away with the poles and wires on Buttonwood street. Mr. Hyde said that the wires were small, and that putting them overhead would improve the appearance of the parkway rather than disfigure it. The Board took the matter under advisement.

Patrick H. Cronan, Cornelius Buckley and Martin Murray, a committee of laborers in the Park Department, came before the Board and asked that the men be put on full time. Mr. Cronan said that it was hard for the men and their families to be kept on half-time so long, and that many of the men had obtained no outside work. The Chairman stated in reply that the men would be put back to work as soon as the state of the ground would permit.

VOTED, that the City Treasurer be requested to pay Bridget A. Black the amount due her late husband, John Black, on the pay-rolls of this Department.

VOTED, that the Chairman be authorized to make a request on the City Auditor for a special draft in favor of John L. White for the sum of \$16,655.83. being the amount due him on account of a mortgage on a part of the Chestnut Hill estate taken by the City from Frederick J. White, upon the said John L. White's giving an assignment of said mortgage and the note and debt secured thereby satisfactory to the Law Department, said amount to be charged to the appropriation for Chestnut Hill Park.

The Superintendent submitted the bids for an iron fence at Charlestown Playground received December 28, 1903, also modified proposals submitted in

answer to the Engineer's request of January 5, 1904, and recommended that the original bid of the Rogers Iron Company, which was the lowest bidder, be accepted, provided they will make the rails 2" x 11/16" x 5/16" and deduct \$130 on account of deficiencies in the First Street Playground fence. It was, thereupon,

VOTED, to accept the bid of the Rogers Iron Company, subject to the conditions proposed by the Superintendent.

BOSTON, MARCH 21, 1904.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton, Pratt, and Prendergast, also the Superintendent and the Engineer of the Board. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the communication from John H. Colby with reference to the City's rights of way in Foster street slip, North End Beach. Messrs Colby, Rudnick, and Nichols also came before the Board. Mr. Colby stated that his clients contended that they owned the fee in Foster street slip, and that they had asked the Court of Land Registration to confirm their title, and that the examiner for the Court concurred in this view of it, but that the City put in evidence to show that the Park Commissioners had taken the fee in the westerly half of the passageway, and also claimed rights of way in the easterly half. The Court found according to the City's contention, but no plan has been filed, and the petitioners have taken an appeal to the Superior Court. Mr. Colby said that the finding of the Court leaves about seven feet of Foster street slip in which the City and Fiske's wharf have rights of way, but that his clients have arrived at an agreement by which the latter may build over the passageway, provided they widen it to 20 feet, and give Fiske's wharf the right to use it. This proposition they also make to the City, which gives up nothing but the right to use a passageway varying from three to seven feet in width against one of twenty feet in width. This, they claim, would better the condition of the City, aside from the fact that the City had taken rights in the westerly half of the passageway, for which the estate now represented by his clients had received no pay. Mr. Nichols said that he concurred in what Mr. Colby

had said, and that he thought the proposition was a good one for the City. The Chairman said that the Board would look at the premises before deciding the matter.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the cost of the proposed park at Craigie bridge, to be constructed by the Charles River Basin Commission.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the petition of Frank Feather for a refreshment stand in the Overlook, Franklin Park, and the matter was referred to the Superintendent to interview Mr. Feather as to what he desires to do.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the order of the Common Council requesting this Board to report to them the advisability of securing the land bounded by M and N and East Eighth and East Ninth streets for park or playground purposes; and the matter was referred to the Chairman to reply to the Mayor.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the petition of the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company to locate poles on Bellevue street, West Roxbury; and the Secretary was directed to notify the Company to confer with the Engineer in regard thereto.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the applications for positions of matron in the Golf House and the Arboretum sanitary building; and the Superintendent was authorized to appoint Mrs. Maria Baker and Mrs. Winifred Redding to said positions.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the petition of Antonio Gregori for a renewal of the Castle Island concession; and it was

VOTED, that the exclusive right of selling refreshments at Castle Island, heretofore granted to Antonio Gregori, be extended for three years, on the same terms as before.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the communication of George E. Gay, Director of the Educational Department, Board of Managers for Massachusetts of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition, in regard to making a park exhibit at the Exposition; and the matter was referred to the Superintendent for further consideration.

VOTED, that, whereas, by an act of this Board, passed August 7, 1903, a parcel of land supposed to belong to the Boston Industrial Home, situate on Randolph street in said Boston, and containing 3225 square feet, was taken for a playground, there be awarded and paid to the said Boston Industrial Home the sum of eight thousand dollars upon its proving title thereto, and giving a deed or release of the same, including an acquittance and discharge of all damages, costs and expenses arising or in any way growing out of said taking, satisfactory to the Law Department, and that the Chairman sign a request on the City Auditor for a special draft in favor of said payment, said amount to be charged to the appropriation for Wards 7 and 9 Playground.

The Superintendent submitted a report recommending the appropriation of \$200 for a merry-go-round for Mystic playground, to be constructed by the Department; and it was

VOTED, to authorize the Superintendent to construct the same.

The Superintendent submitted reports on the orders of the Common Council referring to settees on Bromley Park, the placing of park employees on full time, and the plowing and rolling of the Marcella Street Playground; and the several matters were referred to the Chairman for reply.

The Secretary was directed to notify Michael Green that the Board cannot grant his request for a cabstand at Charlesgate East and Commonwealth avenue.

The Superintendent submitted a report from the Engineer in regard to the petition of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company to the Board of Aldermen, for the location of telephone poles on the westerly side of Old Colony avenue and Columbia Road, which was placed on file.

Applications to the Board of Police for the appointment of Jeremiah J. Downey, James F. Hurley, and Patrick P. McNamara, as special police officers at Christopher Gibson Playground, Neponset Playground, and Franklin Field, respectively, and on abutting and boundary streets within 500 feet therefrom, were approved by the Board.

A communication from D. L. Prendergast, in the interest of T. J. Leary's application for a position at Christopher Gibson Playground, was received and referred to the Chairman.

A request of the East Boston Cricket Club for permission to play schedule games at Wood Island Park, during the coming season, was received; and it was

VOTED, that the East Boston Cricket Club be permitted, under the direction of the Superintendent of Parks, to use a portion of the playground at Wood Island Park, for the purpose of playing cricket, during the season of 1904.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3 P. M. Present Messrs Stratton, Pratt, and Prendergast, also the Superintendent and the Engineer of the Board. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Superintendent submitted a report from Miss Ferry on the nature library scheme, which was placed on file.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the communication from J.W.M. Vine, Secretary Roxbury Cricket Club, regarding the use of grounds at Franklin Field for cricket, during the season of 1904; and the communication was referred to the Superintendent to arrange the matter of games with the clubs using the grounds.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the request of F. E. Bridgman, Manager of the Boylston Church Base Ball Club, that the Club be permitted to use the playground at Franklin Park for practice and match games, during the season of 1904; and the matter was referred to the Chairman for reply.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the communication from G. F. Abbott, requesting that a bicycle path be constructed along the path from Blue Hill avenue to the drive in Franklin Park, and the Secretary was directed to reply thereto in accordance with the Superintendent's report.

VOTED, to authorize the Superintendent to remove the flagstaff from near the Farragut statue to another location.

The Secretary was directed to notify the South Boston Yacht Club that the Board expects the Club to improve its grounds, as required by the lease.

An order of the City Council requesting the use of the road around Wood Island Park by people in pleasure vehicles, in addition to its present use by foot passengers only, was received and referred to the Chairman for reply.

A communication from the Board of Police, calling attention to the lack of notices regarding exclusion of automobiles from the park roads, was received and referred to the Chairman for reply.

A communication from the New England Telephone & Telegraph Company, acknowledging receipt of the communication of the Board in relation to trees on the public ways adjacent to parks and parkways, was received and placed on file.

A communication from the Edison Electric Illuminating Company making apologies for the cutting off of the limbs of a tree at Christopher Gibson Playground, and requesting that their overhead wires may remain until they can arrange for their removal, was received; and the Secretary was directed to ask what is the shortest time in which they can arrange for the removal of the wires.

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A petition of Daniel V. McIsaac and others for a location on the Strandway, for the Washington Village Yacht Club, was received and placed on file, the matter having already been attended to.

BOSTON, APRIL 26, 1904.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3.30 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton, Pratt, and Prendergast, also Superintendent Pettigrew. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Superintendent submitted a report calling attention to the condition of the maintenance appropriation and the need of retrenchment; and it was

VOTED, to authorize the Superintendent to discharge about sixty men.

The following City Council orders were received:

"In Board of Aldermen, April 4, 1904

"ORDERED: That the Board of Park Commissioners, with the approval of the Mayor, be and they are hereby authorized, in the name and behalf of the City, to enter into an agreement satisfactory to the Law Department relating to the boundary line between North End Playground and land adjoining on the southeast formerly belonging to Charles A. McDonough, Trustee.

Passed. Sent down for concurrence. April 7 came up concurred.

Approved by the Mayor April 13, 1904."

"In Common Council, April 14, 1904

"ORDERED: That the Park Commissioners, through His Honor the Mayor, be requested to pay the same amount to the teams working in the Park Department as the teams in the various other departments of the City received.

Passed. Sent up for concurrence. In Board of Aldermen, April 18, concurred."

"In Board of Aldermen, April 11, 1904

"ORDERED: That the Board of Park Commissioners be requested to proceed at once with the laying out and construction of the Speedway at Franklin Field; the expense incurred to be charged to the appropriation already made for the same purpose.

Passed. Sent down for concurrence. April 14 came up concurred."

The Superintendent submitted a report on the communication from the Water Commissioner submitting plans of proposed relocation of water pipes in Commonwealth avenue, made necessary by the construction of the new Stony Brook conduit, and proposed method of crossing the bridge over the waterway; and it was

VOTED, to approve the plans.

The Superintendent submitted a report stating that the position of instructor at Wood Island Park is now vacant, and suggesting that the position be offered to John D. O'Reilly, and that the terms of service of athletic instructors in the department be for six months only. It was, thereupon,

VOTED, to authorize the Superintendent to appoint John D. O'Reilly instructor at Wood Island Park gymnasium, at the rate of \$30.00 per month; and to make the terms of all athletic instructors for a period of six months, during the summer season.

The Superintendent reported that he had arranged with Mrs. Wells, of the Committee of the Massachusetts Emergency & Hygiene Association, for conducting the work at Charlesbank whereby the Committee will dispense with the services of one assistant during the summer, thereby decreasing the expenses twelve dollars per week; and it was

VOTED, to approve the arrangement.

A communication from the Parade Committee of the National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, requesting the use of Commonwealth avenue, between Arlington street and Massachusetts avenue, for the formation of the parade August 16 next, was received; and it was

VOTED, that the Parade Committee of the National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic be permitted to use Commonwealth avenue for the formation of the parade August 16 next, provided they obtain from the Board of Police the detail of a sufficient number of police to protect the trees and other property of this department from injury, and otherwise make arrangements satisfactory to the Superintendent of Parks.

The Superintendent stated that the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company desired permission to erect a temporary pole and overhead wire service to the Sewer Division's headquarters in the Fens; and it was

VOTED, that the Secretary issue a permit for said purpose, the location of the temporary pole to be approved by the Superintendent.

A communication from Katherine Dexter, stating the need of a path across the green of Commonwealth avenue, between Massachusetts avenue and Charlesgate East, was received; and it was

VOTED, to authorize the superintendent to construct a footpath at the point referred to by Miss Dexter.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton and Pratt, also the Superintendent and the Engineer of the Board. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The superintendent submitted a report on the matter of placing a drinking

fountain in Rogers Park, as requested in an order of the Common Council of May 5; and the superintendent was authorized to place an ordinary faucet within the grounds on the Lake-street side.

The superintendent submitted a report in regard to the finish of the wall of the new building to be erected adjoining North End Beach, to make it useful for hand-ball. Subsequently the Board approved and signed the agreement prepared by the Law Department relating to the boundary line.

The superintendent submitted a report on the request of the South Boston Citizen's Association for the erection of three shelters at Marine Park; and the matter was referred to the chairman for reply.

The superintendent submitted a report on the petition of the Boston Work Horse Parade Association to use a part of Commonwealth avenue, on the occasion of their annual parade; and it was

VOTED, that the Boston Work Horse Parade be permitted to pass through Commonwealth avenue, from the junction of Beacon street and Brockline avenue to Massachusetts avenue, on May 30.

The superintendent submitted a report on the communication from Hon. Fred S. Gore relative to settees in Dorchester Park; and the secretary was directed to reply.

The superintendent submitted a report on the request of the Young Men's Christian Associations of Massachusetts and Rhode Island, for the use of Wood Island Park, June 18 or 25, for an out-door athletic meet similar to that held last year; and it was

VOTED, to grant the request under the direction of the superintendent.

The superintendent submitted a report on the cost of a bath locker building at Savin Hill Beach; and the superintendent was authorized to invite proposals for its erection.

A communication from the Trustees of the Chestnut Hill Land Trust offering to sell the city a parcel of land adjoining Chestnut Hill Park, for 12 cents per foot, was received; and the secretary was directed to reply that the Board has no funds at their disposal which can be devoted to this purpose.

A communication from the Boston Elevated Railway Company requesting the removal of three trees necessitated by the construction of a third track or siding on Blue Hill avenue, opposite Elmo street, was received; and it was

VOTED, to authorize the company to remove the trees.

A communication from the Superintendent of Streets, with a report from the Deputy Superintendent of the Paving Division, relative to the condition of South street between the Arboretum gates, was received and placed on file.

A communication from J. L. Nason relative to a settlement for the land and buildings taken from James W. Thompson, Trustee, on Albany street, was received and laid over.

A request of D. W. Waldron to hold a series of picnics in Franklin Park was received, and referred to the superintendent for report.

Communications from the Massachusetts Automobile Club acknowledging the letter of the Board of May 10, also from the Board of Police acknowledging the receipt of amendment of park rules, were received and placed on file.

A request was made to the Board of Police for the appointment of Thomas Carroll as a special police officer at Marcella Street Playground and vicinity.

A communication from the Treasurer of Harvard College stating that the College Corporation is ready to carry out the plan for an exchange of land to straighten the boundary between The Soldier's Field and North Brighton Playground, on the terms originally proposed, was received; and the matter was referred to the Law Department to prepare the necessary papers.

VOTED, that the age limit on the Franklin Park playground be raised from seventeen to nineteen years; also that notices pertaining to the use of the playground, similar to those at Fellows Street Playground, be posted at Prince Street Playground.

Mr. Charles E. Park submitted plans for a building which he is about to erect at the corner of Charlesgate West and Newbury street, to be known as the Newbury Street Apartments, and asked that the Board approve the roof, cornice, and other fixtures which are above the seventy-foot limit. It was thereupon.

VOTED, that the elevations shown on the plans for the Newbury Street Apartments above seventy feet in height be approved, and that the Chairman endorse said approval upon the plans.

Alderman Bromberg, Alderman Kneeland, Representative Leonard, F. W. Whitely, Secretary Roslindale Citizen's Association, and Messrs George J. Wilkinson, Henry A. Fisher, H. A. Gilman, and Paul Jepson, members of a committee of the Roslindale Baseball and Athletic Association, came before the Board. Both Alderman Bromberg and Alderman Kneeland addressed the Board, calling attention to the great need of improvements in the Roslindale and the Forest Hills playgrounds, and stating that the Committee on Appropriations of the City Council had added \$12,500 to the appropriation for the Park Department for the purpose of putting these grounds in order and increasing the bathhouse accommodations at Savin Hill Beach. Mr. Kneeland said that they found they could not order the Board to do these things, but could get the money and request the Board to carry them out. The approximate

cost of putting the Forest Hills Playground in good condition was \$10,000, but they would be satisfied if \$4000 was spent there and \$500 for Roslindale Playground.

Representative Leonard stated that the main thing to provide for at Roslindale Playground is the base-ball game. Bleachers are needed and should be made a permanent thing.

Mr. Wilkinson said that his Association had spent \$1200 for base-ball last year, and it would probably spend \$2000 this year. This is raised by membership fees, the sale of score cards, and from what subscriptions they can get outside of the grounds. He said that Mr. Jepson took charge of the Fourth of July entertainment last year, when two ball games were given. There is no lawn, nor are there proper facilities for women and children who come to see these games. The Association would be glad to dispense with the grading if bleachers are erected. Mr. Wilkinson said further that the Roslindale Citizen's Association is in favor of the seats being furnished.

The Chairman stated that the Board would take the matter under consideration.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at Pine Bank office at 3.30 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton and Pratt, also the Superintendent and the Engineer of the Board. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Superintendent submitted reports on ferry service to Castle Island and on Mr. Hudson's request for approval of his application for a seven-day victualler's license at the public landing; and it was

VOTED, to approve of Mr. Hudson's application for a seven-day victualler's license.

The Superintendent submitted a report on Bacon and Tarbell's application for a renewal of their carriage concession at Franklin Park; and it was VOTED, that the carriage privilege heretofore granted to Bacon and Tarbell, in Franklin Park, be extended for one year on the same conditions as before.

VOTED, that the regulations for the Franklin Park carriage service be amended so as to read as follows:

Park carriages will stand at Blue Hill avenue entrance after eleven o'clock A. M., weather being good, and will go over the route with four or

more passengers, but no more passengers are to be taken than the seating capacity will permit.

The fare over the route or any part of the route is not to exceed twenty-five cents; except that the fare from Scarboro' pond, or for any less distance, to the park entrance shall not exceed ten cents.

The route is from Blue Hill avenue entrance by way of the Circuit Drive to the Valley Gate; thence making the circuit of the Playstead, stopping at the Overlook; thence by the Circuit Drive to Schoolmaster Hill and the east entrance of the Loop Roads; thence by the easterly Loop Road through the Wilderness, by way of Hagborne Hill, to the Circuit Drive; thence by the Circuit Drive, by way of Scarboro' Pond, to the place of starting. A passenger desiring to be put down at the Overlook, Schoolmaster Hill, the Wilderness, Hagborne Hill, Ellicottdale, or Scarboro' Pond, may afterwards enter any carriage having a vacant seat without the payment of additional fare.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the request of D. W. Waldron for a series of picnics in Franklin Park; and it was

VOTED, that the Managers of the Fresh Air Fund be authorized to hold a series of picnics, for five days beginning July 23, in Long Crouch Woods, Franklin Park, under the usual conditions and with the same privileges that have been accorded them in past years.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the application of Mr. Beckley for permission to use an automobile in Franklin Park and the Arboretum, for the purpose of securing views for publication in Country Life in America; and the matter was laid over.

1. The said baths and piers, beach and grounds, shall be open to this Board at all times, and the right is reserved to maintain a boat landing at the end of the westerly pier of the North End Beach, including the privilege of furnishing light refreshments at said landing.

Bennett for large bunches of bitter-sweet, for the decoration of a hall, in aid of the Boston Teacher's Mutual Benefit Association. The Secretary was directed to reply to the latter, that the Board finds it necessary to refuse requests for material of this kind for decorative purposes.

VOTED, that the concession heretofore granted to Charles Fottler, for sharpening skates and selling skates and skate straps, at Franklin Field, including the sale of refreshments, be continued for this season, upon the same terms and conditions as before.

Executive Circular, Number 32, requesting heads of departments to allow all men in the employ of the City half-holidays, on the days of the State and City elections, without loss of pay, as part compensation for their services, was received; and it was

VOTED, to grant the men in the Park Department half-holidays, in accordance with the said request.

Orders of the City Council making appropriations for deficits in the appropriations for Chestnut Hill Park and Strandway, also authorizing the expense of building a retaining wall and fence on the northwesterly boundary line of Columbus Avenue Playground, to be charged to the appropriation for Columbus Avenue Playground sanitary building, were received and placed on file.

A request of the Boston Elevated Railway Company for the privilege of dumping snow and ice on Charlestown Playground, during the coming winter, was received and referred to the Superintendent for report.

Communications from the Municipal League of Harrisburgh, to the Superintendent, acknowledging the courtesy of this Department during the recent visit of the City Councils of Harrisburgh, to view the Boston parks; and

from G. A. Parker, Vice President American Civic Association, to the Mayor, requesting names and addresses of park officials, were received and placed on file, the Superintendent having already furnished the list requested.

A request from Lieutenant Ralph Earle, for permission for the football team of the U. S. S. Missouri to practice on Charlestown Playground, was received and the Secretary was instructed to reply.

An application was received from John J. Hourihan, for pony privileges at Franklin and Marine parks, and was referred to the Superintendent for report.

A communication was received from George E. Gay, Director Massachusetts Educational Exhibit at St. Louis, stating that a gold medal had been awarded to the Massachusetts' collective exhibit, to which this Department was a contributor.

VOTED, to approve the plan for converting the brick building at Randolph Street Playground into a shelter and sanitary building, and to authorize the Superintendent to do the work.

VOTED, that, whereas, by an act of this Board, passed January 27, 1903, a parcel of land containing 522 square feet, supposed to belong to Ellen McMahon, situate in that part of Boston which was formerly Dorchester, and adjoining Dorchester Park, was taken for park purposes, there be awarded and paid to the said Ellen McMahon the sum of two hundred and ten dollars, upon her proving title thereto and giving a deed or release for the same, including an acquittance and discharge of all damages, costs, and expenses, arising or in any way growing out of said taking, satisfactory to the Law Department; and that the Chairman sign a request on the City Auditor for a special draft in favor of said payment, said amount to be charged to the appropriation for public parks.

A communication was received from J. T. Coolidge, Jr., stating that the Art Commission had accepted an iron lantern presented to the City by Bunkio Matsuki, and recommended that it be placed somewhere in the Back Bay Fens, also suggesting a location on the river bank opposite Simmons College. The Board took the matter under advisement, and subsequently decided not to accept the lantern for the location suggested.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton, Pratt, and Frendergast, also present the Superintendent and the Engineer of the Board. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the petition of Ralph G. Stowell for a renewal of his boating concession; and it was

VOTED, that, with the approval of the Mayor, the rights and privileges heretofore granted to Ralph G. Stowell, of maintaining and operating for hire a public boat service in the waters of Jamaica Pond, be extended for the season of 1905, together with the right to sell light refreshments, including confectionery and fruit, except bananas, watermelons, and unshelled peanuts, at the boat landing at Jamaica Pond; on condition that he furnishes an equipment of boats and landing facilities equal to those furnished heretofore: all of said service to be under the supervision of the Superintendent of Parks, and to be carried on to the satisfaction of the Board, the right to sell refreshments to be subject to revocation on evidence of any untidiness about the premises.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the complaint of John H. Sullivan, that teams having higher numbers are employed in preference to his; and the Secretary was instructed to reply.

The Board voted to provisionally approve the plans for the new Stony Brook gatehouse, submitted by the Street Department, and instructed the Secretary to reply to the communication from the Chief Engineer of the Sewer Division, regarding the substitution of green slate for shingles on the roofs of the gatehouses in the Fens.

A communication from the Charles River Basin Commission, requesting approval of plan for the location of the section of the marginal conduit which is to be constructed in the upper end of Charlesbank, was received and referred to the Superintendent for report.

Bids for repairing the roof of the building on Randolph Street Playground were received, and it was

VOTED, to accept the proposal of Thomas J. Hind for repairing the roof of the building at Randolph Street Playground, including new galvanized iron cap, cornice, and conductors, new zinc flashing, and cleaning out and repairing present gutter, for the sum of \$100.

The Secretary was instructed to notify Mr. George G. Crocker that the Board regrets that it cannot accept his offer to devote the lot on Third and Athens streets, near the railroad cut, to playground purposes, for the term of three or five years, provided the City will abate the taxes during that term.

A communication from the Superintendent of Streets in regard to the disposal of material now being dredged from the Fens, was received and referred to the Superintendent for report.

A communication from the Dorchester Gentlemen's Driving Club, expressing the appreciation and thanks of the Club for the work done by the Board at Franklin Field in behalf of the horsemen, was received and placed on file.

VOTED, to allow the Boston Elevated Railway Company to dump snow and ice into tidewater, from Charlestown Playground, and on that part of the Strandway in the vicinity of Newman street, during the coming winter, on the same conditions as before, and the further condition that the Company protects the gateway on Alford street, by erecting temporary wooden posts, and repair any damage to the iron fence caused by their teams.

VOTED, that, whereas, by an act of this Board passed August 7, 1903, a parcel of land supposed to belong to Joseph O. Hobbs and others, situate on Albany street in Boston, and containing 30,675 square feet, was taken for a playground, there be awarded and paid to Mary Ann Prescott, Annie L. Prescott, and said Joseph O. Hobbs the sum of thirty-five thousand dollars, upon their proving title thereto and giving a deed or release for the same including an acquittance and discharge of all damages, costs, and expenses arising or in any way growing out of said taking satisfactory to the Law Department; and that the Chairman sign a request on the City Auditor for a special draft in favor of said payment, said amount to be charged to the appropriation for Playground Wards 7 and 9.

The Superintendent was authorized to put the men on half-time, as the condition of the appropriation for maintenance and the state of the work may require.

BOSTON, DECEMBER 8, 1904.

A special meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 4 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton and Pratt.

A hearing was given on the complaint of Colin W. Cameron of the Carpenters' District Council, and others, that Mr. A. A. Hersey was not complying with the terms of his contract for pile driving at Columbus Avenue Playground. Messrs Cameron, Huddell, and Coffin representing the labor unions interested,

and Mr. Hersey, the contractor, were present.

Arthur M. Huddell, representing the Hoisting and Portable Engineers, stated that the Mayor had assured them that the conditions of the contracts must be lived up to. He said that Mr. Hersey works nine hours and employs men who are not citizens, that he works his engineer nine hours and pays him less wages than the rules of his organization specified, namely, \$4.00 for eight hours' work.

Mr. Hersey stated, in answer to what Mr. Huddell said, that the Union tried to get the piledriver concerns to adopt an eight-hour day, but failed to do so. He said he was paying men on the rolls \$2.25 per day, which is the rate ordinarily paid by piledrivers, and more than some of them pay. He paid his engineer \$2.50 per day.

Seymour Coffin, of the Piledriver and Bridge Builders' Union, said that they were not trying to force Mr. Hersey to employ Union men, but want the conditions of the contract lived up to. He said that Mr. Hersey, instead of employing a regular engineer, has his foreman run the engine, and employs men who are not citizens.

Mr. Hersey said in regard to his foreman that the man has qualified as an engineer, and that he has continuous employment at \$17.00 per week. In regard to the employment of citizens, he did not discriminate against them, and did not think he was called upon to hunt them up for employment.

Mr. Cameron, in conclusion, called attention to his letter of December 3, which he said does not mention Union employment. He offered to bring City Engineer Jackson to show that Union time and wages prevailed last July when 170 men were working eight hours, and sixty odd, nine hours, also that two City contracts were changed from nine hours to eight hours and a maximum wage of \$2.25 per day was enforced by the City. He offered a list of nine firms in Mr. Hersey's line of business who were working eight hours a day.

Mr. Hersey was asked by the Chairman if he would submit a list of firms working nine hours, by two o'clock Friday. Mr. Hersey said he doubted whether that would be possible, but would do so sometime during the day. The Chairman said that the Board would give Mr. Hersey all day Friday, but asked that the list be sent to him as soon as ready.

The Commissioners declined to suspend work under the contract pending the submission of evidence by Mr. Hersey, although requested by the delegation from the Labor Unions to do so.

A special meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 11 A.M. Present Messrs Stratton, Pratt, and Prendergast; also present the Superintendent and the Engineer of the Board.

The estimates of the amount necessary to meet the ordinary current expenditures of the Department for the coming financial year were considered and adopted.

The Superintendent submitted a plan of a proposed playground in the Fens, to be constructed opposite the Art Museum site and Simmons College, by filling in two of the bays in the Fens' pond and raising the adjoining meadows to grade 10, which was approved; and the Superintendent was authorized to open a dump for the delivery of such material as he may deem suitable for said purpose.

The Superintendent submitted a report from Engineer Putnam in regard to the disposal of the material now being pumped from the Fens' pond, recommending that the present method of disposal be continued, which was placed on file.

The Superintendent recommended a slight change in the line of the marginal conduit as proposed to be built in the upper end of Charlesbank; and it was

VOTED, to provisionally approve the plan for locating the Boston marginal conduit in the upper end of Charlesbank, submitted by the Charles River Basin Commission, with a modification in the line of the conduit as shown on said plan.

VOTED, that the playgrounds in Wards 2 and 9 be named respectively Cottage Street Playground and Randolph Street Playground.

BOSTON, JANUARY 10, 1905.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton, Pratt, and Prendergast, also present the Superintendent and the Engineer of the Board. The records of the last meeting, also of special meetings of December 2 and 16, were read and approved.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the petition of Robert Treat Paine, Jr., and others, for a uniform name for the parkway on the westerly side of the Fens, from Commonwealth avenue to Brookline avenue, and suggesting for it the name Somerset Road, which was placed on file.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the request of the Common Council that electric lights be provided at First Street Playground, for the skating season; and the matter was referred to the Chairman for reply.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the condition of the maintenance account, and the need of additional horses and sprinkling wagons; and it was

VOTED, to authorize the Superintendent to purchase such additional horses and sprinkling wagons as the balance of the appropriation will warrant.

The Superintendent submitted a plan for a sanitary building for Marcella Street Playground, and the Superintendent was authorized to obtain proposals for constructing the same out of the materials obtained from the removal of the Asylum buildings; also to obtain proposals for removing the Stony Brook bridge in the Fens.

The Superintendent submitted Mr. Putnam's report on the request of the Quincy Quarries Company for payment of the unsettled account of the Quincy Granite Quarries Company; and the Superintendent was instructed to refer the matter to Mr. Guy Lowell.

A communication from the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company, acknowledging receipt of the Chairman's letter relative to putting their wires underground at Forest Hills street, was received and placed on file.

A communication from Mayor Collins, authorizing the sale of that part of the Marcella Street Home building which is situated on land in charge of the Street Department, was received and placed on file.

A City Council order authorizing the construction of the Marcella Street Playground from the appropriation for Playground Ward 22, was received and placed on file.

A communication was received from the Edison Electric Illuminating Company declining to put their wires underground at Pond street, as requested to do by the Board; and the matter was referred to the Chairman to confer with the Law Department as to what action the Board should take to enforce its demands.

A communication was received from James P. McSorley, in regard to his depositing material on the site of the proposed embankment at West Boston Bridge, under an arrangement with the City Engineer for constructing the approach to said bridge; and the Secretary was instructed to reply.

A hearing was given to M. J. Kenney from the District Council of the Knights of Labor, and Timothy Sullivan from the Park Department Assembly, on the question of allowing pay for Christmas Day to all the men in the employ of the Department. Mr. Kenney said, the fact of the men's being on half-time resulted in some of the men's receiving pay for the holiday which others did not. He had been requested to put the matter before the Board to see if pay for the holiday could not be given to all alike. The poorest paid men suffer most, as the better paid men are not laid off. The men hoped that the suspension of about forty men last spring would result in permanent work for the remainder, but it has not been realized, and the men besides lose their pay for the holiday.

Mr. Sullivan said that the men had never been docked for Christmas before, that all the men worked on some day of the week before Christmas, and that they all ought to be treated alike.

The Board took the matter under advisement, and, subsequently, authorized the Superintendent to give a holiday, without loss of pay, to all the men who did not receive pay for Christmas Day.

A hearing was given on the petition of R. T. Paine, Jr., and others, that the parkway bordering the westerly side of the Fens may have one name from Commonwealth avenue to Brookline avenue. There were present at the hearing, Robert Treat Paine Jr., Moses Williams, Trustee of the Boston Water Power Company, George N. Dana, Trustee of the Dana lands, Joseph Balch, Theodore M. Clark, Henry Lefavour, President of Simmons College, Robert Treat Paine, and others.

Mr. Robert Treat Paine Jr. said, in opening, that the petitioners desired one name given to the parkway on the west side of the Fens, instead of the three names it now bears; namely, - Charlesgate West, Boylston Road, and Audubon Road. He then gave way to Moses Williams, who said, the situation at present causes great confusion, similar to that in the case of two streets of the same name, one in Brookline and one in Boston. It is inconvenient to those who live there, besides being a detriment to the land, because persons cannot find where they want to go. They get a dislike for the neighborhood, which tends to give it a bad name and retards its development. The assessed value of the property is only one-third what it ought to be. The petitioners want a name given to the road on the west side of the Fens which shall indicate the character of the land and its position. The name suggested by the petitioners would indicate the Somerset as the point of departure of this road as it branches out from Commonwealth avenue. It should have one name from Commonwealth avenue to Brookline avenue. He said that carrying the name Audubon Road down to Beacon street would not do, as two

Audubon Roads coming out at Beacon street is not desirable. There is also objection to the present condition at Brookline avenue where the Ipswich street cars cross Audubon Road, as one alighting there is not able to determine which way to go as he would be if there were two names instead of one.

Mr. Balch said he represented large interests which want a locus established for the road. He favored Somerset, as most persons know where the Somerset is, and it would indicate the location of the road.

Mr. T. M. Clark said that when the present names were established the only entrances to the Fens were from Boylston street, Huntington avenue, and Tremont Entrance. The principal entrance is now from Commonwealth avenue, and he had counted from four to five thousand persons in an afternoon, in pleasant weather, pass his house. The annoyances he, at first, had suffered when he moved into his house were overcome by not giving his address as Audubon Road, but as the corner of Back Bay Park and Jersey street. He gave instances to show that friends have had great difficulty in locating his house.

President Lefavour of Simmons College said that, although not an abutter, he had a great interest in the matter. He called attention to the new street that is contemplated from the Fenway to the Harvard Medical School, and said, it is obvious that, in general, the road or way leading to so important a point should have one name. He suggested that the name Audubon Road might be retained from the bridge to Brookline avenue, in case the boulevard to the Medical School is brought out at the bridge.

Mr. Robert Treat Paine Jr. said that the Fenway branches from the westerly way at the bridge, and that name should be carried to that point. It is subordinated now by the crossing of Boylston Road, which interferes with the simplicity and harmony of the system. The name Somerset Road meets the general favor, as being attached to the location. Charlesgate Road was considered but is not favored. It would be in the interest of simplicity and convenience to carry the name to Beacon street, if the people there wish to have it done. He had met no objection in securing the petitions, they having been signed by every one interested.

Mr. Dana said he agreed with the advisability of one name instead of three names.

Mr. R. T. Paine said he owns a lot of land of Boylston Road, between the bridge and Boylston street. He has had difficulty in describing where his son lives, and said this is the time to deal with the problem, and give one continuous name to the whole thing, stopping at Brookline avenue.

Mr. Bova came before the Board with reference to the Head House, his lease of which expired December 31. He said he did not wish to renew the lease but

would take the house on a percentage basis, the same as in his first lease. He said that the annual receipts have diminished from about \$12,000 in the early years to about \$7000 in the last three years, and that the business would not warrant the large rental imposed by the last lease.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the bids received for summer uniforms; and it was

VOTED, to accept the bid of the H. C. Locke Company for shirts, coats, and overalls, and the bid of H. B. Spitz for hats.

A communication from the Mayor authorizing the board to appear before committees of the Legislature in relation to matters affecting the park system, was received and placed on file.

A communication from the Engineer of the Charles River Basin Commission, with accompanying plan showing change of location of the marginal conduit at the lower end of Charlesbank, was submitted by the Superintendent, and it was

VOTED, to approve the plan for the location of the marginal conduit in the lower end of Charlesbank, with the proposed change of line shown in red on said plan.

A communication was received from the New York, New Haven, and Hartford Railroad Company, relative to the notice from this Board to remove the buildings erected for the Metropolitan Coal Company, on land adjoining the Arborway at Forest Hills, contrary to the restrictions thereon; and the Secretary was instructed to reply.

Councilman O'Connor came before the Board and asked that one or more lights be provided for the Strandway Playground. The matter was referred to the Superintendent with full power.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the bids received for boiler for heating the new storehouse and repair shops at Franklin Park; and it was VOTED, to accept the lowest bid, and to adopt the Superintendent's recommendation to charge the expense to Randolph Street Playground, and to transfer the present boiler at Franklin Park to Randolph Street Playground.

The Superintendent submitted a report on using the balance of the general appropriation for the purchase of playgrounds for completing Columbus Avenue Playground; and the matter was referred to the Chairman.

The Superintendents submitted a report on the arrangements for the summer session at the Women's Division at Charlesbank; and it was

VOTED, to approve the arrangement submitted by the Superintendent, including the appointment of Miss Mary Jewett Price as assistant superintendent during the summer vacation.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the petition of W. S. Mitchell for permission to use a portion of West Roxbury Parkway for market-gardening

purposes; and the Secretary was instructed to reply.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the cost of completing the building at Marcella Street Playground, which was placed on file.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the bids received for furnishing three sets of harness; and it was

VOTED, to accept the bid of H. C. Steehr and Company.

The Superintendent submitted the Engineer's report on the cost of an additional height of fence for Randolph Street Playground, adjoining Reed's Block, as requested by Randall G. Morris; and the Secretary was instructed to reply to Mr. Morris.

A communication from the Board of Health accompanying permit for the dumping of rubbish and ashes in the Fens, was received and placed on file.

Orders of the Common Council, requesting that the Strandway Playground base-ball ground be resurfaced, also that a hand-ball court be provided at said Playground, were received and referred to the Chairman for reply.

A communication from Mrs. Everett Holbrook, complaining of the condition of the sidewalk on Commonwealth avenue, near Massachusetts avenue, was received and the Secretary was instructed to reply.

Mr. Lewis S. Dabney came before the Board in regard to the construction of the proposed embankment on Charles river. Mr. Dabney referred to what the residents on the northerly side of Beacon street had done in the way of submitting plans to the Board, drawn by A. W. Longfellow and Little, Brown and Moore, and stated that their desire as represented in said plans, was that the least width of embankment compatible with the object in view should be adopted. He said he favored the Little, Brown, and Moore plan, which he would submit again to the Board.

VOTED, to lease the Head House to L. E. Bova for three years, at the rate of \$1000 per annum and on the same conditions as the former lease, subject to the approval of the Mayor.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton and Pratt, also present the Superintendent and the Engineer of the Board. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Superintendent submitted a statement showing the amount available for labor for the remainder of the fiscal year, and recommended that no reduction in the force be made until the planting season is over.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the bids received for grass seed, with recommendation; and it was

VOTED, to authorize the Superintendent to accept the bids recommended by him.

The Superintendent submitted a report on Mr. Grandin's request regarding the substitution of granolithic for the grass plot at the corner of Commonwealth avenue and Charlesgate West; and it was

VOTED, to approve the change, and to authorize the Secretary to issue a permit therefor.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the request of Mr. Horace G. Allen for a fence between his house and Chestnut Hill Park, and the matter was referred to the Superintendent to confer with Mr. Allen.

The Superintendent submitted a report on bids for various supplies, recommending that awards be made as indicated on the accompanying specifications; and it was

VOTED, to authorize the Superintendent to purchase supplies in accordance with his recommendation.

The Superintendent submitted an estimate of the cost of the proposed changes in the Fenway and Huntington Entrance, made necessary by the proposed exchange of land between the City and the Museum of Fine Arts, which was placed on file.

The Superintendent submitted a request of the East Boston Cricket Club for permission to play cricket at Wood Island Park, during the season of 1905, recommending that the request be granted; and the matter was laid over.

A request of the Tenean Veteran Fireman's Association for permission to hold a "play-out" at Neponset Playground, April 19th, between the hours of ten and twelve A. M., was received and it was

VOTED, that the Tenean Veteran Fireman's Association be permitted to hold a "play-out" at Neponset Playground, April 19th, between the hours of ten and twelve A. M., under the direction of the Superintendent of Parks.

A communication from John Cronin relative to tennis courts at Marine Park was received and placed on file.

The application of Frederick T. Fuller, to the Board of Police, for appointment as a special police officer at Columbus Avenue Playground, was received and signed by the Chairman.

A delegation from the East Boston Citizens' Trade Association, consisting of the President, James E. Maguire, and Messrs Joseph H. Barnes, F. H. Caruthers, and Vincenzo Bonzagni, came before the Board to urge improvements at Wood Island Park. Mr. Maguire stated that East Boston people, including ex-Governor Bates, felt that there should be a roadway around the park. The original plan called for such a roadway, and in the opinion of citizens it should be constructed. They felt that, considering the fact that this park is the only one accessible to the people of East Boston, more money should be spent there. At the Field House, the showers which had been temporarily fixed up should be put in good condition. Mr. Maguire said that the best part of the playground is taken up by cricket, which is played only on Saturday afternoons, and not always then; that more tennis courts are needed, and urged that the cricket ground be given over to tennis, providing for cricket elsewhere. He said that they desired another bathing beach established, allowing the bathhouses for men and women to be separated more than they now are.

Judge Barnes, the next speaker, said that the roadway was wanted most, that the Board cannot perhaps build the roadway on the old plan, but it can be carried as far as the bathhouses. He asked whether the Commissioners would be in favor of building the road if the money was provided by the City Council, and said that additional police protection is needed, and the road if lighted would make for protection. The Board could aid in obtaining the cooperation of the Police Board. He was informed that barges may be run to the park this summer and hoped that they would be under the control of the Board. Work on the grade crossings, which are now being abolished, has obstructed Prescott street. A temporary foot-bridge might be built there by the Railroad Company, and if the Board finds this to be the case, he suggested that the Board request the Railroad Company to construct it.

Mr. Caruthers said there were only four tennis courts, and that it was most difficult to get a court at certain times. He said he agreed with the President that the cricket ground should be moved elsewhere and the ground now occupied used for tennis. He also said something should be done to the shower-baths in the Field House.

Mr. Bonzagni said that it would help the matter of keeping the park respectable if a road were built around by the shore, as this would bring people there in carriages and on bicycles, and thus help to police the park.

The Chairman stated that the building of the road as originally planned was a very costly matter and could not be entertained at the present time,

but that the Board would have the Superintendent look into the matter of lights and police, the shower-baths, and the use of the cricket ground for tennis.

Messrs Burr and D'Arcy, of the Dorchester Gentlemen's Driving Club, came before the Board and asked that a fence be erected along the Speedway and a return drive twenty or twenty-five feet wide be provided on Franklin Field. Mr. Burr stated that they desired to open the season April 19, and that they would have a member of the Club confer with the Board in regard to formulating rules to govern the speedway.

VOTED, that the Street Department be authorized to construct a drain in Riverway from the premises of the House of the Good Shepherd to Muddy River, according to the plan submitted by the Sewer Division, on the condition set forth in the usual form of permit to be issued therefor, and in addition that the drain be used only for surface water from said premises, be kept in good repair, including the removal of any deposits in Muddy River arising therefrom, and be removed by said Department when notified by the officer or board having for the time being the control of said Riverway.

A request of the Young Men's Christian Associations of Massachusetts and Rhode Island for the use of Wood Island Park for an out-door athletic meet, June 10, was received and referred to the Superintendent.

Orders of the Common Council were received containing requests for modern benches or settees on Commonwealth avenue, for settees around Franklin Field and along the Strandway from the Boston Yacht Club house to K street, for an ice-water drinking fountain at Cottage Street Playground,

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that ladders or other life-saving apparatus be placed along the sea wall at Marine Park, that the baseball grounds at Wood Island Park be sodded, that Franklin Park, on the easterly side of Walnut avenue between Columbus avenue and School street, be put in condition for public travel, also requests for information in regard to the completion and opening of the gymnasium at First Street Playground, and the amount remaining unexpended of the appropriation for the construction of a speedway at Franklin Field; and the orders were severally referred to the Superintendent for report.

A communication from John T. Hourihan requesting that the pony livery concession at Marine Park be transferred, for the present, to Thomas F. Griffin, was received and referred to the Superintendent.

A request of Andrew J. Griffin for a change in the location of his carriage stand at Boylston Entrance was received and referred to the Superintendent for report.

VOTED, that Mr. Prendergast be authorized to approve drafts and bills in the absence of the chairman and the chairman pro tem.

VOTED, that the chairman be authorized to sign contracts on behalf of the Board.

The Superintendent submitted a report on Andrew J. Griffin's request for a change in the location of his carriage stand at Boylston Entrance, and the matter was laid over.

The Superintendent submitted reports on the orders of the Common Council requesting the Board to place life-saving ladders on the sea wall at the Strandway, that the gymnasium building at Charlesbank be put in a sanitary condition, and that the Board furnish an estimate of the cost of placing Billings Field in condition for baseball and other sports; and the matters were severally referred to the Chairman for reply.

A report from the Superintendent on his interview with Superintendent Donovan regarding unfinished work in the Fens, and a communication from the Superintendent of Streets stating his intention to place green slate roofs on the gatehouses, were received and placed on file.

The Superintendent submitted reports on the boat service at Marine Park, and the need of an instructor at Randolph Street Playground; and the Superintendent was instructed to appoint Miss Daley, formerly at Christopher Gibson Playground, to said position.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the request of Councilman J.J. McCarthy for ground at Charlesbank for school gardens for the Hebrew Industrial School; and the Secretary was instructed to reply.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the communication from G. W. Lee, of the Field and Forest Club of Dorchester, regarding an educational garden in Franklin Park and the use of the Refectory Building for the regular meetings of the Club; and the Secretary was instructed to reply.

The Superintendent was instructed to lay out additional tennis courts at Wood Island Park.

VOTED, that the East Boston Cricket Club be permitted, under the direction of the Superintendent of Parks, to use a portion of the playground at Wood Island Park, for the purpose of playing cricket, during the season of 1905.

An order of the City Council authorizing the Board to lease vacant land between Massachusetts avenue and Norfolk avenue, Ward 17, for playground

purposes, was received and referred to the Superintendent for report.

A communication from Miss Frances Zirngiebel relative to a children's museum in the Refectory Building, Franklin Park, was received and referred to the Superintendent

A communication from Dr. James J. Minot relative to a day sanitarium in Franklin Park was received, and the Chairman was instructed to reply.

Communications from the Board of Police relative to the Chairman's request that police officers be detailed at Cottage Street Playground during ball games, also regarding fires in the parks, were received and placed on file.

Executive Circular, Number 37, directing heads of departments to grant leave of absence to all employees, members of the Grand Army of the Republic, who wish to attend the National Encampment, was received and placed on file.

VOTED, that the Grand Commandery of Knights Templars be permitted to use Commonwealth avenue, for the formation of its parade, May 24, on condition that a sufficient number of police be provided by said Commandery to protect the trees and other property of this Department from injury. and that the arrangements otherwise be made satisfactory to the Superintendent of Parks.

VOTED, that the following regulations be adopted:

REGULATIONS FOR SPEEDING WITHIN OR UPON THE ROADWAY IN FRANKLIN FIELD

1. The Superintendent of Parks or person in charge shall have full control of the course and the conduct of the exercises, and no person is to enter or remain when forbidden by him.

2. The course shall be open for speeding at such hours during week days as the Park Commissioners shall from time to time determine.

3. No person on foot or horseback, or on a cycle or motor vehicle, shall enter or remain on the course when it is in use for speeding. Signs placed at each end of the course will indicate when it is so being used.

4. Only buggies, runabouts, surries, and other light vehicles adapted to the speeding of light harness horses, drawn by not more than two horses and capable of seating not more than two persons, shall be allowed on the course when it is in use for speeding.

5. No person shall drive on the course except in a southwesterly direction, nor make loud outcries for the purpose of urging his horse or horses, nor abuse or overdrive any horse.

6. No person shall drive a horse that is not well broken and under proper control, nor stand a horse or drive slowly in such manner as to ob-

struct the course, nor continue to drive on the course after having been directed by the Superintendent or person in charge to leave the same.

Orders of the Com on Council requesting the Board to place the gymnasium building at Charlesbank in a sanitary condition, to place settees on the Strandway between K and Newman streets, and to allow double time to all laborers who are required to work on Sundays, were received and referred to the Chairman for reply.

A communication from Corporation Counsel Babson in regard to Mr. C. B. Perkins' contention of rights of way in the park land on Perkins street was received and placed on file.

A petition from George W. Adams and others, protesting against the granting of privileges on Franklin Field which will compete with the business of concerns located in the vicinity, was received and referred to the Superintendent for report.

Communications from James E. Maguire, President Citizens' Trade Association of East Boston, requesting again the rearrangement of the playground at Wood Island Park and the getting of some kind of a safe way over the railroad tracks at Prescott street, also from E. Van Etten, Vice President New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, in regard to access to Wood Island Park during grade-crossing work at that point, were received and placed on file.

Correspondence between the Chairman of the Board and the Charles River Basin Commission, in regard to depositing material along the line of the proposed Charles River Embankment during the progress of the work on the Charles River dam, also sundry communications from the Board of Police in regard to police protection in the Arnold Arboretum, were received and placed on file.

A request of the Dahlgren Corps 20 to use the water front on the Strandway adjoining the South Boston Yacht Club house, for memorial services, May

30, was received and it was

VOTED, to permit the Dahlgren Corps 20 to use the water front on the Strandway adjoining the South Boston Yacht Club house, during the hours from ten until twelve, on May 30, for Decoration Day services.

VOTED, to permit the Boston Work Horse Parade to pass through Commonwealth avenue from the junction of Beacon street and Brookline avenue to Massachusetts avenue, on May 30.

Communications from the Bath Trustees requesting the transfer of Charlestown and North End beaches to them for the season of 1905-6, were received; and it was

VOTED, that the care and control of the beach at Charlestown Heights be transferred to the Bath Trustees, at their request, from June 15, 1905 to June 15, 1906, reserving the right to this Board to revoke the authority hereby given at any time in its discretion, and with the approval of the Mayor.

VOTED, that the care and control of the bathhouses and piers at North End Beach, including the beach and grounds northerly of Commercial street, be transferred to the Bath Trustees, at their request, from June 15, 1905 to June 15, 1906, upon the following terms; namely,-

1. The said baths and piers, beach and grounds, shall be open to this Board at all times, and the right is reserved to maintain a boat landing at the end of the westerly pier of the North End Beach, including the privilege of furnishing light refreshments at said landing.

2. The Bath Department shall keep said premises clean and well lighted heated, watched, and guarded during said term, and shall employ such attendants as may be necessary for the purpose.

3. This Board reserves the right to revoke the authority hereby given at any time in its discretion, and with the approval of the Mayor.

VOTED, to allow the park laborers whose services can be dispensed with, a holiday for a picnic, on such day as they may select, without loss of pay, in part compensation for their services.

VOTED, that the Superintendent be authorized to appoint Alice Timmins matron at Savin Hill Beach.

Adams and others against refreshment privileges being granted on Franklin Field, also a report on the communication from John Cronin regarding tennis courts at Marine Park; and the Secretary was instructed to reply to the latter communication.

Communications from the Board of Police, in reply to letters from the Chairman, in relation to preventing the sale of tonics and other drinks on Franklin Field, and depredations by visitors to Wood Island Park, also a communication from the Charles River Basin Commission in relation to the dumping of material in the rear of Brimmer and Charles streets, were received and placed on file.

An order of the City Council was received authorizing the Board to expend, for the construction of playgrounds, the balance of the loan for playgrounds, amounting to \$2,494.80, issued under authority of chapter 412 of the acts of 1898, as amended by chapter 279 of the acts of 1899.

VOTED, that this Board, under article 4 of the lease of the boat service at Marine Park to Robert B. Hudson, hereby consents to the transfer from said Hudson to George C. Fitzpatrick of the right under said lease to furnish steam boats, and convey passengers by water to and from the several public landings in said Park, to keep launches for hire, and keep and use said landings for said purposes, with all the rights and privileges and subject to all the obligations, conditions, and specifications in said lease applicable thereto, provided, however, that the sureties on the bond annexed to said lease consent in writing to said transfer.

VOTED, that the City Treasurer be requested to pay to Christine Schlotterer, widow of Bernard Schlotterer, the amount due him on the pay-rolls of this Department.

VOTED, that the carriage privilege heretofore granted to Bacon and Tarbell, in Franklin Park, be extended for one year on the same conditions as before.

BOSTON, JUNE 19, 1905.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3 P.M. Present Messrs Pratt and Prendergast, Mr. Stratton being out of the City. Also present the Superintendent, and the Engineer of the Board, and Mr. Guy Lowell. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the expenditures for labor on maintenance account, and it was

VOTED, to authorize the Superintendent to suspend about thirty men.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the boat service at Marine Park stating that Mr. Hudson's bondsmen would not assent to the proposed transfer of the ferry service to Mr. Fitzpatrick.

The Superintendent submitted a report recommending the abolishment of the shrubbery border adjoining Charles street, and the reconstruction of the sidewalk on the street line in connection with the work of the Charles River Basin Commission on the marginal conduit.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the complaint of Edward E. Smith regarding the division fence at Christopher Gibson Playground, stating that he would have the fence repaired.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the request of a South Boston Society that refuse dumped on the Strandway be covered with gravel and a dike erected to prevent the floating away of loose material, which was referred to the Chairman for reply.

The Superintendent submitted a report on winter arrangements at the Women's Division at Charlesbank, recommending that the building be kept open during afternoons and early evenings, omitting the evening classes; and it was

VOTED, to authorize the employment of Miss Phelps for this purpose, at a salary of \$8.00 per week, from October 15.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the condition of the iron columns under the pier at Marine Park; and it was

VOTED, to authorize the Superintendent to make temporary repairs at an estimated cost of \$800.

A request of the Boston Traveller that the Outing Department of that paper be allowed to erect a permanent tent in Long Crouch Woods or Dorchester Park for a series of picnics, was received and referred to the Chairman for reply.

A communication from the Edison Electric Illuminating Company, relative to the condition of the electric light poles at Castle Island, was received

and referred to the Superintendent for report.

A communication was sent to the City Auditor requesting him to charge the expenditures for completing the wall at Columbus Avenue Playground to the balance of the loan for playgrounds, under the order of the City Council authorizing this balance to be used for construction.

Messrs Henry Parkman, James J. Storrow, George B. Morison, H. F. Adams, Dr. Hugh Cabot, Dr. George B. McGrath, Edmund D. Codman, Dr. J. Payson Clark, Benjamin P. Ellis, and Henry C. Vaughan, a representation from the Union Boat Club and Boston Athletic Association, came before the Board. Mr. Parkman opened the hearing by stating that, although the plans are not prepared, it is proposed to make an embankment back of Brimmer and Beacon streets, which will cut off the Union Boat Club from the water. This would be a serious loss to the boating interests of Boston, unless some provision should be made on the new water front for the accommodation of the Club. The Club asks that the Board grant a location on the embankment under some sort of tenure, as has been done in Philadelphia and on the parkway at South Boston. He said that, at the suggestion of the Chairman, he had conferred with the Board's Architect, Mr. Guy Lowell, who told him that it was proposed to establish a location for boat clubs down near the West Boston bridge. This location, Mr. Parkman said, is too far away from the present one, and if insisted upon it would tend to break up their Club, which is the oldest rowing organization in the United States, and has at present some two hundred active members. As reasons why the Club should be continued in its present location Mr. Parkman cited the following: Six to eight large races are rowed there on an average every year, attracting a great many visitors, some fifty or sixty thousand persons viewing the Harvard-Cornell race the other day. All these races terminate in the corner near the Union Boat Club. The clubhouse is the centre of the boating interests, it accommodates visitors on these occasions, and, generally, assists in making these races successful. Mr. Parkman said further that the Club is ready to make the boathouse ornamental and have the plans approved by the Architect. The Club would spend anywhere from ten to thirty thousand dollars for a clubhouse which would cover an area of about four thousand square feet. The boathouse need not be higher than two stories.

In answer to a question from Mr. Storer, Mr. Lowell said that from the artistic point of view it had been thought necessary to group the buildings near the end rather than provide for them in the centre of the embankment. It always was supposed to be intended to give facilities for boating, but in work of this kind much depends on the shore. The curve of the shore here

makes it undesirable to have a building at this place. The building might be set back and an interior basin constructed having an outlet to the river. In this basin accommodations for the public might be provided at the same time. The boathouses on the Schuylkill are screened by trees.

Mr. Storrow said that the plans of the Charles River Basin Commission will make conditions for boating on the river very much better than at present. When the dam is built, the flats covered, and the current done away with, a large use of the basin will be made for pleasure purposes. It would be extremely unfortunate if anything is thrown in the way of boating on the river. It is a pleasure to see pleasure boats on the basin. If the boating interests are not properly provided for now and the plans do not comprehend proper facilities for boats, the Board will see its work marred, sooner or later. The public will demand access to the water from this corner, because it is only a few steps from the Public Garden. The issue is going to be entirely different from what it is to-day, as hundreds and thousands will be seen coming down to this corner. It will be necessary to have the front used at short intervals of distance. The use of the river will be checked unless boating may be made convenient. It is an unattractive walk from the Public Garden to the Cambridge Bridge site, particularly in summer. Mr. Storrow further said that boats in a race or in practice can keep under the protection of the wall, which they could not do if a diagonal course were taken in order to reach a location near the West Boston bridge. The interests of the public require the greatest use of the water possible.

Mr. Parkman resuming said that at one time there was a statute on the books allowing the corner to be filled in, at which time there were plans drawn carrying the basin up to the boathouse. He suggested that the conduit which the Basin Commission is authorized to build might interfere with a secondary basin in the corner. Mr. Lowell asserted, in reply, that it would probably be desirable to carry a roadway along this part of the basin between the present boathouse and the water.

Mr. H. F. Adams, President of the Union Boat Club, said he had always expected the Club to be provided for, as it has been a factor in Boston life for so many years. The purpose of the park is first beauty, then practicality. What is a boat race but a gathering of the City's people? The desire of the people is that the thoroughfare be so made that people will come for miles to see a boat race. It is in the geographical centre, and within easy reach of all parts of the Metropolitan district. The Board should give serious consideration to the matter before driving us away from the location we have occupied for so long.

Mr. George B. Morison, President of the Boston Athletic Club, said that since 1889 the Athletic Club have had a boating department, with boathouses located near the Union Boat Club, and it would be for the interests of his Association to continue in their present location.

Dr. Hugh Cabot, Captain of the Boat Club, said the course is on that side of the river, owing to the prevailing direction of the wind. A diagonal course would be prohibitive in the spring, when you must take advantage of the wall and wind. A southerly and southeasterly wind give a good course. A diagonal course is objectionable because oblique to the wind. A little observation will show the necessity of having the boat clubhouse just at the end of the course, as oarsmen often need immediate attention at the finish of the race. The National Regatta will not go to a city where boathouses are not conveniently located.

Dr. McGrath, President of the New England Association of Rowing Clubs, which have races on July 4th and Labor Day, said the course is one of the finest in the country. All these New England clubs would show equal interest in the matter if they were given the opportunity.

VOTED, that the Superintendent be authorized to grant permits for the sale of refreshments at Wood Island Park on July 4th.

VOTED, that the Board approves generally of the model of a memorial for the late Francis Parkman, which was placed on the grounds at Jamaica Plain and exhibited on June 10th.

VOTED, that the Managers of the Fresh Air Fund be authorized to hold a series of picnics, for five days beginning July 25, in Long Crouch Woods, Franklin Park, under the same conditions as heretofore.

A communication from Edward F. McSweeney of the Boston Traveller, in acknowledgment of the Chairman's letter declining their request for a permanent location at Franklin Park for children's outings, and an application from Margaret Clancey for position of matron in the Park Department, were received and placed on file.

On the application of the New England Motor Company, for permission to run a sight-seeing motor car on the Strandway, it was

VOTED, that the New England Tally-Ho Company be permitted, until further notice, to run one of its sight-seeing motor cars from a stand located at, or at some place conveniently near, the Head House at Marine Park, over and along the Columbia Road as far as Dorchester avenue and return, for such fares and subject to such regulations as the Superintendent of Parks shall approve.

VOTED, that the sum of five hundred dollars be allowed and paid to Superintendent Pettigrew towards the expenses incident to a trip to visit various European parks and gardens, and that he be allowed two months' absence for said purpose.

A hearing was given to George C. Fitzpatrick on his application to run gasoline launches between Castle Island, Governor's Island and Wood Island Park. Mr. Fitzpatrick said that he already had a landing at Governor's Island to which he had run a boat from Wood Island Park. He had also placed a float and gangway at Castle Island, and desired to run boats from there to Governor's Island on Sundays and holidays, also hourly and half-hourly

trips in the harbor on week days.

He said that he had been to considerable expense in securing the boats, and would be willing to have them inspected by the United States authorities if that can be done, otherwise by the Engineer of the Board. He said the boats would be safe to cross the channel if manned by competent men in the positions of pilot and engineer. Mr. Fitzpatrick's statements were supported by Captain J. W. Scott and Engineer John Griffin.

The matter of allowing Mr. Fitzpatrick's boats to run was then left with the Chairman.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the communication from the Schoolhouse Commission in regard to the surface water drainage from the group of buildings to be erected for the Normal and Girls' Latin schools, and it was

VOTED, that the Schoolhouse Commission be given permission to take the surface drainage from the Normal and Girls' Latin schools into the Fens, under the supervision of the Superintendent of Parks, and in such manner as he may direct, said permission to be revokable at any time by this Board or by the officer or board having for the time being the control of said Fens.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the request of Fire Commissioner Wells for permission to locate a post fire alarm box on the corner of Newbury street and Charlesgate West, in the position shown on the plan submitted by

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the Fire Department, dated October 20, 1905; and it was

VOTED, to grant said permission on the conditions specified in the permit to be issued therefor, and in addition that the Fire Department shall keep the said box and post in good order, and shall remove the same when notified by this Board or by the officer or board having for the time being the control of said Charlesgate West.

Alderman Curley came before the Board and stated that the older boys and young men in the vicinity of Fellows Street Playground would like the privilege of using the playground in the evening when it is not in use by the children. They would also like to have the entrance from Fellows street restored, and a hand-ball court erected which they can use after 6 P.M., to be constructed of wood without a concrete base. The Chairman said that the Board would look into it and see what can be done for the older boys, including the hand-ball court.

VOTED, that John Glennon's pay be fixed at \$2.25 per day.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton and Prendergast, Mr. Pratt being absent from the City; also present the Superintendent and the Engineer of the Board. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

Mr. John Travers, with his counsel, Joseph J. Gallagher, came before the Board in the matter of the notice handed to Mr. Travers on November 14, notifying him of the intention of the Board to reduce his compensation from \$3.00 per day to \$2.25 per day, for lack of employment as foreman of gardening gang. Mr. Gallagher stated that his client admitted receiving legal notice of the intention of the Board to reduce his pay, and of the hearing tendered to him, and that he appeared under protest believing that the hearing is improperly held. He preferred to follow the language of the statute and ask for a hearing, rather than to accept one in which the initiative was taken by the Board because he might waive some rights that he otherwise might have under the statute. The Chairman stated, that, in view of Mr. Gallagher's statement, the Board would declare the hearing closed, and suggested that Mr. Gallagher

confer with the Law Department, under whose directions the proceedings were held; subsequently it was

VOTED, that the compensation of John Travers, employed in this Department as gardener, be reduced from \$3.00 per day to \$2.25 per day, for the reason stated in the notice given to him November 14, 1906, under chapter 314 of the acts of 1904.

The Secretary was directed to notify Mr. S. W. Johnson that the four houses erected by him on Columbia Road, as shown on the plan submitted by him, are at a less distance than five feet from the side line of the lots upon which the same are placed, and are therefore a breach of the restrictions upon the land, and that, while the Board does not intend to take present action in regard to this matter, future events may require the Board to take some action to enforce this restriction.

A communication from the Corporation Counsel, advising the Board in regard to the above matter, was received and placed on file.

VOTED, that the Superintendent arrange with the Street Department to fill in with City ashes the large pond and adjoining pool at Marine Park.

VOTED, that the Secretary issue a permit to the Boston Consolidated Gas Company to make slight changes in the position of its poles in that part of Commonwealth avenue from Brighton avenue to Chestnut Hill avenue, as shown on the plans submitted by said Company, but said permission shall not be construed as giving said Company any permanent location for its poles in said avenue, or to permit the placing of any more wires thereon, the fixed policy of the Board being that all wires in the park system shall be underground.

VOTED, that notice be given to R. B. Hudson, to terminate in six months the agreement or lease between him and the City of Boston concerning the keeping and care of boats at Marine Park; and a communication to that effect, signed by the Chairman, was approved, and the Secretary was instructed to forward the same to Mr. Hudson.

VOTED, to give the Superintendent full charge of the office building and all officers and employees of the Department at Pine Bank.

VOTED, that the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company of Massachusetts be permitted to erect and maintain three poles with the wires thereon in West Roxbury Parkway at Anawan avenue, as shown on the plan, dated November 4, 1905, and filed with its petition for this permit, subject to the provisions and regulations governing the erection, maintenance and removal of poles and wires by said Company under the votes of this Board of September 5, 1893, November 13, 1893, May 21, 1894 and December 1, 1902.

A communication from the Boston Elevated Railway Company asking permission to dump snow in emergencies, such as heavy storms, during the coming winter, on unfinished portions of the Strandway Playground, was received and it was

VOTED, to grant the request, the locations of the dumps and the method of dumping being made satisfactory to the Superintendent of Parks.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton, Pratt, and Prendergast, also present the Superintendent and the Engineer of the Board. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the condition of James C. Steimbrey, with request for instructions; and the Secretary was instructed to see the Corporation Counsel in regard to the case.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the order of the Common Council relative to providing proper lighting facilities at Columbus Avenue Playground, and the matter was referred to the Chairman for reply.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the petition of members of the Boston Hockey Association for two lighted hockey rinks at Franklin Field, and the matter was referred to the Superintendent for reply.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the request of Miss Sawtelle, Principal of the Hancock School, that a portion of Prince Street Playground be turned over to the School Garden Committee; and the matter was placed on file.

A communication from the Secretary of the Art Commission relative to the lettering on the William Lloyd Garrison statue, was received and the Secretary was instructed to reply.

A communication from R. C. Sturgis, Chairman Schoolhouse Department, stating that the Street Department intended to provide surface drainage for the group of school buildings at Tremont Entrance; from the American Telephone and Telegraph Company and New England Telephone and Telegraph Company, relative to removal of wires at Forest Hills; and from the Board of Health regarding permit to fill ponds at Marine Park were received and placed on file.

Mr. John F. Cronin, Chairman Democratic Ward Committee of Ward 23, came before the Board with reference to the Travers case and also the Keyes-street sewer. Regarding the latter he said that the Deputy Superintendent of the Sewer Division stated that the Street Department would maintain the sewer, but that it would be unfair to ask the abutters to pay a proportion of the cost of the sewer, as they will be charged for the cost of the new sewer when it is extended from Forest Hills to Green street, which would be equivalent to paying twice for the privilege of sewerage. He said there were not many houses on Keyes street and probably only one house will enter the sewer. The Board took the matter under advisement, and subsequently,

VOTED, to allow the abutters on Keyes street to enter the Keyes-street sewer under the conditions named in the Chairman's letter of November 27 to

E. S. Dorr, Chief Engineer of the Street Department, Sewer Division, except the payment of any part of the cost of the sewer.

Mr. Cronin stated, regarding the Travers' case, that Mr. Travers' pay had been reduced, and when he protested he was given a hearing, at which time formal action was taken to reduce his pay. Mr. Travers claimed that he had been deprived unlawfully of his rights, that he can take his case to court and will do so unless the Board will rectify the matter. Mr. Cronin said that he did not desire to criticise the Department or take any political action, but that those back of Mr. Travers think that his pay should be restored to what it was before the reduction and arrears of pay be given him from the time it was reduced, and that, if the Board does not take favorable action in the matter, they will bring it to the attention of the Acting Mayor.

The Chairman stated in reply that the Board having voted to reduce Mr. Travers' pay after a hearing cannot take up the matter again. As to the future the Board has to try and apply its funds to the best advantage. If they have work for Travers to do they should keep him. Not having work for him as a freeman they give him a chance to work in a subordinate position. Not having the work, or the money to pay him, they have to act accordingly. The Chairman said that the Board would further consider the matter, and, subsequently, notified Mr. Cronin that the Board cannot reconsider its action in reducing Mr. Travers' pay.

The Superintendent was instructed to arrange with the Street Department to fill in the low ground at Billings Field with City ashes, during the winter.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton, Pratt, and Prendergast, also present the Superintendent and the Engineer of the Board. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

Executive Circular, Number 43, calling for annual estimates, was received, and the Superintendent submitted an itemized statement of expenditures on maintenance account for the present financial year, together with a report on maintenance of the parks for the next financial year. Estimates were, therefore, prepared for transmission to the Acting Mayor.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the appropriation for maintenance, showing the need of curtailing expenditures, and it was

VOTED, to suspend December 18 the men who were reinstated November 8, 1905, and to place on half-time such other men as the Superintendent shall select, also to reduce the pay of such men receiving more than \$2.00 per day as the Superintendent may find work for as laborers at \$2.00 per day; and that the Secretary send to each man a notice of the proposed action, stating as the reason for such action, lack of funds in the appropriation.

The Superintendent submitted a report recommending that the dwelling house on Marcella Street Playground be repaired at an expense of about \$300, and rented to the caretaker at \$10.00 per month, and that the brick stable be advertised and sold at public auction. It was, thereupon,

VOTED, to authorize the Superintendent to repair and rent the dwelling house, and to employ S. R. Knights to sell the stable.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the plan of C. Howard Walker of proposed change in pedestal of the Lief Ericson monument, suggesting the removal of the basin; and the Secretary was instructed to reply to Mr. Walker, stating that the Board would be pleased to have the opinion of Miss Whitney and the Art Commission on this suggestion.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the petition of Ralph G. Stowell for an extension of the boating and refreshment privilege at Jamaica Pond, recommending its continuance for one year; and it was

VOTED, that, with the approval of the Mayor, the rights and privileges heretofore granted to Ralph G. Stowell, of maintaining and operating for hire a public boat service at Jamaica Pond, together with the right to sell light refreshments, including confectionery and fruit (except bananas, watermelons, and unshelled peanuts), be extended for the season of 1906; on condition that he furnishes an equipment of boats and landing facilities equal to those furnished heretofore and keeps his premises for the sale of refreshments clean and tidy; all of said service to be under the supervision of the Superintendent of Parks, and to be subject to revocation if the business is not carried on to the satisfaction of the Board.

A communication from the Division Superintendent New England Telephone and Telegraph Company, transmitting agreement executed by that Company in accordance with the vote of the Board granting said Company a temporary location for three poles in the parkway at Anawan avenue, was received and placed on file.

VOTED, that the Board will accept an agreement containing restrictions to be imposed upon land of Louisa B. Dutton and others, adjoining Riverway, providing for a reserved space as shown on the plan thereof, dated December 1,

1905, including an agreement that any betterments assessed upon estates belonging to them on account of the laying out and construction of said park shall be assumed by the City of Boston.

The Board approved the plan of water-pipe connection in Mystic Playground between the shaft of the water-pipe tunnel under Mystic river and Chelsea street.

The Superintendent submitted a report on public carriage stands on Commonwealth avenue; and it was

VOTED, to grant the locations of public hackney carriages in Commonwealth avenue, named in the list submitted by the Board of Police with its letter of December 8, except that allotted to Daniel Sullivan, said location being now occupied by John J. Toomey.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the Christmas holiday with reference to the men not working Christmas week; and it was

VOTED, to give these men a holiday without loss of pay during the following week, in lieu of Christmas Day.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the orders of the Common Council requesting the Board to provide electric lights at Franklin Field and Strandway Playground for skating; and the orders were referred to the Chairman for reply.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the request of A. H. Kirkland for a brief report on the condition of the City in regard to the gypsy and brown-tail moths; and the Superintendent was instructed to reply.

The Superintendent submitted a report in reference to the expense attending the meeting of the Executive Committee of the American Association of Park Superintendents at Boston, amounting to \$17.00; and it was

VOTED, to authorize the Chairman to approve the bill for said amount, to be charged to the appropriation for Park Department.

An order of the Common Council requesting the Board to flood Rogers Park and vacant land between North Beacon street and the Boston and Albany Railroad for skating, was received and referred to the Chairman for reply. The Superintendent was authorized to construct a dam for the purpose of flooding Rogers Park Playground, at an expense of about \$150.

City Council orders requesting the Board to place the employees of the Park Department on a permanent basis, also to have the parks and playgrounds flooded for skating purposes, were received and placed on file.

A communication from Wilson H. Fairbank, Executive Commissioner, Board of Managers for Massachusetts of the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition, Portland, Oregon, stating that a gold medal was awarded the Park exhibit, and presenting the Department with a silk banner as a souvenir, with the compliments of the Board of Managers, was received and placed on file.

A communication from George P. Beckford, on behalf of the West Roxbury Citizen's Association, asking that the filling of the low land at Billings Field be suspended in order that skating may be afforded there, was received, and the Superintendent was instructed to flood the playground as usual.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton and Pratt, also present Superintendent Pettigrew and Engineer Putnam. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Superintendent submitted a report in regard to James C. Steinebrey, and the Secretary was instructed to write Mr. Steinebrey that, unless he is able to return to work by February 1, the end of the financial year, his name will be dropped from the pay-roll.

Executive Circulars 1 to 3, directing heads of departments to place the salaries or wages of employees at the same amounts as they were September 13, 1905, and to furnish a list of all persons who have entered the service since that date, were received and placed on file.

VOTED, that rule 4 of the general rules adopted by this Board August 31, 1903 as amended May 9, 1904, be further amended so that the second, third, and fourth clauses thereof shall read as follows:--any vehicle in a funeral

procession, or any hearse, except on the road from Forest Hills street to the entrance of Forest Hills Cemetery, or -- any motor vehicle in Arnold Arboretum or in Franklin Park, except on said road or Glen Lane, or in any park, parkway or reservation unless conforming in all respects to the laws relating to the registering of automobiles and motor cycles and for licensing operators thereof, or -- any led horse, or any vehicle for merchandise except on said road, Glen Lane, or the road across the Riverway in extension of Bellevue street, or in going by the shortest route to the nearest public way to take from such reservation, or to leave therein, a person or merchandise; by inserting after the words "Commonwealth avenue" in rule 5, the words,-- between Arlington and Beacon streets; and by inserting after the words "eight miles an hour" in said rule 5, the words,--or in any other part of said avenue.

A hearing was given to Hugo P. Strekfus on his request to be heard relative to his suspension. Mr. Strekfus stated his belief that he had been suspended for other reasons than that given in the notice sent to him. He said it was because he had objected to being put to work scraping gutters as not being gardener's work, and asked Mr. Duncan to allow him to do pruning work. Mr. Duncan, he said, told him that he was not competent to prune, which Mr. Strekfus denied as he had been pruning and doing other gardening work since last March. Mr. Duncan, he said sent him to Mr. Pettigrew who told him he would have to suspend him. Mr. Strekfus further said that he was the only skilled man suspended, that he was not suspended when the rest were for lack of funds, and ought not to be suspended now for that reason. Subsequently, it was

VOTED, that Hugo P. Strekfus employed in this Department as gardener be suspended from and after December 29, 1905, for the reason of lack of funds in the appropriation.

A hearing was given to Messrs. Joseph Engel and C. S. B. Cowling on the petition of Mr. Cowling and others protesting against the granting of permits to do business on Franklin Field. Mr. Engel, as the landlord of two of the signers of the petition, stated that while he considered the sharpening of skates a public convenience, to which he did not object, the sale of refreshments which is carried on in connection with it hurts the business of his tenants. Mr. Engel said that he thought the Board ought not to permit anything to be done on the public grounds which would compete with the business of those established near them. Mr. Cowling stated his objection to the sale of refreshments on the Field, which, he said, injured his business. The Board took the subject under consideration, together with a report on the matter submitted by the Superintendent.

A hearing was given to Samuel W. Johnson on his request that the Board pass a vote declaring the houses built by him on Columbia Road to be substantially in accordance with the restrictions on the land. Mr. Johnson stated that he procured a permit from the Building Department to build four houses on this land, each house to be three feet from a line drawn midway between them, and that he had placed the houses six and one-half feet apart, believing that he had more than fulfilled the requirements of the law. He did not know, he said, that the restrictions required the houses to be further apart than this, but he recognizes that ignorance on his part was no excuse. He said that he thought he was justified in asking the Board to relieve him from a situation which interfered with the sale of the houses. The Chairman stated that the Board sympathized with him and would do anything that the Law Department said it could do under the circumstances.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 3 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton, Pratt, and Prendergast, also present the Superintendent and the Engineer of the Board. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Superintendent submitted a report in regard to the suspended men and the giving of a holiday to the men who did not work on Christmas week.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the request of the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company for permission to make connection between the underground cable and three poles on Commonwealth avenue, between Beacon street and Brighton avenue, and it was

VOTED, to authorize the Secretary to issue a permit to the Company to do the work in accordance with the Superintendent's recommendation; and to write to the General Manager that the Board does not wish the granting of the permit to be construed as allowing the maintenance of overhead wires in this avenue, the fixed policy of the Board being that all wires in the Park system shall be underground.

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A communication was received from Corporation Counsel, Thomas M. Babson, relative to an agreement to settle the suit of Sarah A. Leatherbee and others for the taking of land on Albany and Randolph street for a playground, and it was

VOTED, to approve the settlement by the Law Department of the suit of Sarah A. Leatherbee and others for land taken August 7, 1903, for Randolph Street Playground, for the sum of forty thousand dollars, without interest.

Mr. Nosea Hyde of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company came before the Board in relation to the removal of two of their poles from the Parkway at Forest Hills. Mr. Hyde said the Elevated Railway Company have their span wires on these poles, and if the poles were removed others would have to be erected to support the trolley wires. The situation at the present time is such that it is difficult to know what to do. When the elevated railroad comes some other arrangement might have to be made. The Chairman stated that the Board would take into consideration Mr. Hyde's representations.

A communication from Miss Anne Whitney, relative to the time of beginning work on the Lief Ericson statue, was received and placed on file.

A communication from the Board of Police, in answer to the Chairman's letter regarding injury to benches and other City property at North Brighton Playground, was received and placed on file.

A request of John J. Scannell for additional coupe' at the southwest corner of Commonwealth avenue and Massachusetts avenue was received and referred to the Superintendent for report.

Communications were received from the Secretary of Local Union 242, International Brotherhood of Stationary Firemen, acknowledging the action of the Board in increasing the pay of John Glenmon; from A. W. Stedman, in answer to the Chairman's letter regarding addition to his automobile house in West Roxbury Parkway; and from Faneuil Improvement Association of Brighton, acknowledging the action of the Board in causing Rogers Park to be flooded for skating, which were read and placed on file.

VOTED, to amend the regulations for fences, signs, trees, etc., by adding at the end of section 3 the words, -or erect any structure or make any excavation in such road or way.

VOTED, that the title of the regulations for fences, signs, trees, etc. be changed to read as follows: Regulations for streets and boundary roads in charge of the Park Commissioners and lands abutting on the same.

A communication was received from William D. Solier in regard to uniform automobile signs and referred to the Superintendent for report. A hearing was given to Francis Hurtubis, Jr., and Frederic Tudor on the same subject.

Mr. Hurtubis said that he represented as counsel the Automobile Owner's Association and the Massachusetts State Automobile Association, both of which desire that the park signs referring to automobiles should conform with those adopted by the State Highway Commission and which are being adopted all over the State, also that the small signs at the Park entrances should be made more conspicuous, and the "danger" signs, indicating sharp curves or dangerous crossings, should be made more definite, and should be one hundred and fifty feet from a corner or crossing. These signs with "speed" and "exclusion" signs should be uniform with those used elsewhere in the State. Mr. Hurtubis also asked that the speed limit on Commonwealth avenue be made ten miles an hour. Mr. Frederic Tudor, President of the Automobile Owners' Association, said he concurred in all that Mr. Hurtubis had said.

The Secretary was instructed to advertise for team work the same as last year.

VOTED, that rule 3 of the general rules adopted by the Board August 31, 1903, and amended May 9, 1904, and January 8, 1906, be further amended by inserting before the word "parkway" the word, -boundary, and by striking out the word "aforesaid".

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 66 Devonshire street, at 3 P.M. Present Messrs Stratton, Pratt, and Prendergast, also present the Superintendent and the Engineer of the Board. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Superintendent submitted a report in regard to filling the Fens' Playground, and it was

VOTED, to authorize the Superintendent to make the best arrangement he can with the Fuller Construction Company for excavated material to be delivered at the Fens' Playground, but not to exceed ten cents per load.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the application of the Boston Elevated Railway Company for permission to run a feed wire in Arborway, between South and Washington streets; and it was

VOTED, that the Boston Elevated Railway Company be permitted to temporarily erect, maintain and use one 500,000 c. m. feed wire on the Arborway between South street and Washington street, at Forest Hills, as shown on a plan thereof filed in the office of this Board, said wire to be removed as soon as the elevated structure has been extended to Forest Hills square and necessary feed wires installed thereon.

A hearing was given to Michael J. Murphy on the notice of his suspension for insubordination. Mr. Murphy was present with his counsel, Mr. Cronin. Mr. Cronin said that the difficulty which caused Murphy's suspension arose while he was working for Foreman McNulty. Murphy, he said, claimed that McNulty had a grudge against him and would not give him a fair show. Mr. Murphy stated in his own behalf that he was handling ladders under McNulty, when he started to pick up the moth nests as it was getting late and he knew the ground had to be cleaned up by night. He was taking off the nests when McNulty told him to bring the limbs up to the street, which he finally did although he had the last limb in his hand when McNulty told him to bring the limb and not to take the nest off. McNulty told him to report to Mr. Duncan, which he did on the following day. Mr. Duncan told him to go back. McNulty wouldn't put him to work, and the next morning Mr. Duncan told him he had no work for him and would lay the case before the Superintendent.

Mr. Murphy further said that he was only called to work recently, he hadn't worked before since December. He had no trouble with any other foreman except Bean. He couldn't work for McNulty, who, he said, was down on him and had told him that he would have him looking for another job. Had been sent to Mr. Duncan several times before and been sent back. The last time Mr. Duncan said to him, "Murphy, you are all the time making trouble", and wouldn't put him to work. He said a foreman on the gypsy moth work, named Cooper, remarked on two occasions to Murphy that McNulty didn't like him.

Murphy said he was a married man with eight children and first worked for the department in 1880 or 1881, and went back about eight years ago. He was suspended last summer and again in December. The trouble with Bean, he said, was when hoeing between the bridges near the Administration building. Mr. Shea put him to work - was asked to go across to finish a walk - couldn't understand him at first - when he did, he said, "Well, of course, I will go over"- he lost two days and was told that Mr. Shea had stopped him for talking.

Mr. Cronin said that it was hard to answer charges without knowing what they consisted of. Men working for the City get to looking at things in another way than when working for private parties. They get to thinking

they can afford to be independent. A foreman may have personal feeling against a man and can make it hard for him. Murphy, he said, was fifty odd years of age, and a Civil Service employee of the City of Boston. If, as a result of these charges, he is discharged it will be impossible for him to get his name again on the Civil Service lists: he will lose his Civil Service rating. He has suffered already, virtually paying a fine of two dollars a day since he was suspended. He said it would be going too far to discharge Murphy permanently. Subsequently, it was

VOTED, to suspend Michael J. Murphy in accordance with the notice previously sent to him and for the reason stated therein.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the order of the City Council requesting the Board to allow Rugby to be played in the field near Hath street and South Huntington avenue, Olmsted Park; and the matter was referred to the Chairman for reply.

The Superintendent submitted a report on curb lines at the intersection of Jersey street and Audubon Road; and it was

VOTED, to amend the vote of this Board of May 28, 1906 in relation to the connection of Jersey and Queensberry streets with Audubon Road, so that the curbs of Jersey street may connect with the curbs of Audubon Road with a radius of thirty-two feet instead of fifteen feet.

A hearing was given to Patrick H. Costello in regard to restrictions on the lot of land on Arborway corner of South street. Mr. Costello said that he appeared again to ask for the modification of the restrictions on his land so that he could make his investment pay. It was impossible to sell the lot with the present restrictions upon it. He wanted the restrictions so modified that he could put stores on the South-street front of the lot, as it is more of a business or commercial centre than a residential section, and he wanted the cost of apartment houses reduced. He said that the restrictions for single wooden houses on some parts of the Arborway are \$4000 instead of \$5000, and for a single brick house \$7000. He contended that it costs only

one-fifth more to build a brick house than it does to build a wooden house, or \$6000 instead of \$7000, and that this reduction if applied to apartment houses on the basis of a \$4000 wooden house would make the cost of a brick apartment house \$2700 for each flat.

Frank A. Graham, of H. W. Savage's office, said he had tried to sell Mr. Costello's land but could not on account of the restrictions. He had sold a six-apartment house on Hampstead Road, just above Mr. Costello's land, which rented for twenty-six to twenty-eight dollars per month. This house detracts from the other houses in the neighborhood. No one will buy the corner lot for a residence, could not sell it with the privilege of a store on South street. Steam-heated flats, he said, would rent for only thirty or thirty-five dollars per month, couldn't rent a building costing \$4000 per suite to pay anything on the investment.

Samuel Braidstreet, owner of the land adjoining the Arborway across South street, said that his land is assessed for sixty cents per foot, but that he couldn't get an offer of more than thirty cents on account of the restrictions - land sells in the neighborhood for commercial purposes at \$1.25 to \$3.00 per foot. He said he wanted the same relief that Mr. Costello asks for.

R. S. Barrows said that Mr. Costello's request for a reduction from \$4000 to \$3000 per flat is a proper one. He couldn't afford to build a four-thousand-dollar flat - \$12,000 for a three-flat house being prohibitory.

William B. Blakenore said that the longest front of Mr. Costello's land is on South street, on which the street cars run. He cannot use the park frontage to advantage, as it is twelve or fifteen feet higher than the South-street side. The adjoining land on South street is occupied by three apartment houses of cheap construction. Mr. Costello's land is peculiar in itself and is adapted to an apartment house rather than a single house. The land is more adapted for business than for dwelling-house purposes.

A. C. Chisholm said that right around the corner from Mr. Costello's land is the cheapest kind of an apartment house. \$3000 per flat is as much as anybody will stand, and, with regard to stores on South street, he instanced the apartment house on Commonwealth avenue having stores facing on Massachusetts avenue as similarly situated.

Mr. Fitzsimmons, Supervisor of Plans in the Building Department, corroborated Mr. Costello's evidence as to relative cost of brick and wooden houses.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 68 Devonshire street, at 4.15 P.M. Present Messrs. Stratton, Prendergast and Coakley, also present the Superintendent and the Engineer of the Board. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Superintendent submitted a report on maintenance estimates and additional items for construction. The estimates were approved and referred to the Chairman to transmit the same to the Mayor.

The Superintendent submitted reports on bills for gypsy moth suppression work on the estates of William S. Stevens and Louise M. Hollings, which were referred to the Chairman.

Mr. Leahy said that Mr. Rodd proposes to erect a three-family house 27 X 55 feet, on the lot of 3697 square feet, shown on the plan of William J. C. Semple, Surveyor, dated September 14, 1906, the house to be 4 1/2 feet from the side lines of the lot and 15 feet from the front line. He also submitted a formal request in writing, asking the Board to consent to the use of the lot as intended by Mr. Rodd, and also allow access to and from his building.

Mr. Teeling stated that there are two militia companies in Charlestown and that the State would build the armory, which the City has agreed to accept. Several sites have been looked at, and the one which commends itself to the militia companies most is on the playground at Sullivan Square. They came before the Board to ask whether the Board would consider a proposition to have a portion of the playground used for that purpose if compensation is allowed by the State and the money turned over to the City for development of the playground.

Mr. Teeling said they represented not only the militia companies but the people of Charlestown, who would be benefitted more by the improvement of a part of the ground so it could be used for a playground, rather than to keep the whole unimproved. The Armory benefits chiefly the military men, and the only reason for relinquishing part of the land would be the development of the rest, although the playground would afford room for military manoeuvres, which would be of interest to the people. He said that the main difficulty in getting a location elsewhere was the cost of the 35000 feet of land needed for the armory. Improved land costs so much as to leave too little money for the building. A site on Alford street next to the gymnasium would be best and cause the least injury to the playground.

Lieut. Cody said that the playground is almost too large for the needs of Charlestown and he did not think it would ever be used to the full extent expected. Since the establishment of this playground Mystic Playground has been acquired, which meets the demands of the Ward 3 section of Charlestown.

Captain Smith stated, that, if a site for the armory is given there would then be room for at least four baseball grounds besides the gymnasium

and children's playground. He said that Charlestown is not going to develop much, having reached its limit, and that the playground is handier to Somerville and Everett than to Charlestown. They favored the purchase of a site from the park and the use of the money to go ahead with the improvement of the ground. They ask for an early decision as the armory commission meets to consider the matter on the 20th.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the use of Randolph-street Playground by factory girls at noon-time, under the direction of the ladies of the South-End Mission; and the Superintendent was instructed to allow them to try the plan.

The Superintendent submitted a report on Father Walsh's request for a location for a floating bathhouse at Charlesbank, which was laid over.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the communication from P. J. McCarthy, Secretary of the D. A. Knights of Labor, requesting that three suspended men be reinstated, which was placed on file.

The Superintendent submitted a communication from L. H. Lane regarding police protection on Columbia Road, and the renewing of the grass space; and the matter was referred to the Chairman for reply.

In place of taking 35 feet more of the field he said he would move the fence nearer the speedway, using the ground now lying between the fence and the speedway, with about 15 or 20 feet more to be taken from the field to make the return drive and extend the speedway about 208 feet westerly from the east corner of Lyons street. This would enable them to start from that end. They also wanted some improvements in the way of seats and stands, in order to make it a model little plant. There were twenty-eight days of amateur racing last year, which furnished more sport than any of the other sports that attract the public. More people would go to see the racing if some bleachers were provided there. A starter's stand, a judges' stand, and a couple of fences were all that would be necessary in addition to a little grading.

Mr. Burr stated that the plan was nothing more than what was contemplated when the \$25000 for a speedway was appropriated. It was only necessary to even or level the return drive, no more than a little filling and grading being needed. There is now no place for teams to stand, and if the hollow near the sheep-fold, which is ground of no use to anybody now, could be filled up, it would allow the race to start from that end. He did not regard this plan as foreign to the use of the field; it was the selvage edge of the field, of no use to anybody.

Mr. Linnehan said that the plan takes nothing from the playground now, as it is land back of the backstops, and does not touch the playground. They would like to see the money used this summer, so as to get the benefit of it this season.

The Chairman stated that the Board would like to have them state their case in writing, and submit a plan showing how much more land than is now in use would be required.

VOTED, to permit the St. Joseph's Athletic Association to moor its float and landing opposite its boathouse at Charlesbank.

Mr. Judkins stated that he had made an agreement with Dr. Field to clear the property numbered 861, 863 and 865 Fifth street and 98 Q street. He received a letter from Dr. Field stating what he would do the work for, and accepted it, but would not pay it unless somebody in authority assured him that the work had been properly done. This assurance he got from the State Superintendent's office in the form of a letter from Mr. Rogers, stating that Inspector Sylva had looked over the work and reported it as properly done. Mr. Judkins stated further, that, after receiving notice from the Park Department of their intention to clean the premises, he wrote a letter to the Commissioners stating that the work had been done there and that if the premises had been cleaned no work should be done and no charge made. He said that he did everything as agent of the estate that could be done, and feels that the bills rendered by the City are unjust, especially as the charge is more than the amount paid Dr. Field for doing the work.

Dr. Field said that he objected to having the City step in and make the owners of the property pay twice, instead of allowing him to make the work good if it was not properly done. He said that the City ought not to go upon

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property and charge for the work there when the work has already been well done and reported well done by the inspectors of the State Superintendent's office.

The matter was referred to the Superintendent to hear the evidence the petitioners have to offer and report to the Board.

A hearing was given to John C. McDonough in regard to his request for a hearing on the notice of suspension that had been sent to him. Mr. McDonough, who was present, was represented by his counsel, Mr. Logan, and also by Patrick H. O'Connor. Mr. Logan, after referring to Mr. McDonough's suspension and the reason for it, lack of work, as given in the notice, called upon him to state his case.

Mr. McDonough said that he had been employed about three years, that he went to work as a paver, and after about ten months at that work he was cut down to laborer's pay, although Mr. Duncan had previously told him that he was doing satisfactory work. He said that paving work was done by others not engaged as pavers, while he did not get the work he supposed he was engaged to do. Mr. McCarthy had been doing paving work, also some work had been done by others in South Boston and on Columbia Road. He further said he had accepted the job for less than regular paver's pay, that he had had an opportunity to go to work at the Navy Yard, which chance he lost by staying with the City, and that it cost him \$25.00 to join the paving union.

Mr. O'Connor stated that Mr. McDonough's suspension was due to petty spite, because he would not wear the uniform, rather than to lack of work, and charged the assistant superintendent with being actuated by revengeful motives and using abusive language.

The hearing was closed.

Mr. Gethro was more interested in putting on steam boats and a fishing boat, and as he was getting the big end of the whole privilege he ought to be willing to allow Stephens to run the small boats or buy the property at a fair price.

In answer to a suggestion from the Board that Mr. Stevens' conduct of

the boat service was not satisfactory, Mr. Logan said, that, if the Board will bring out the facts as to his unfitness, it would suffice. The feeling against the Board is such that the Board ought to state the facts as to the unfitness of Stevens.

Mr. Norris said that he did not know Stevens. That his attention was called to the matter by two delegations who represented that the people were angry, very angry, because the privilege had been taken from a South Boston man, which they thought an injustice. Mr. Norris said that he suggested to them that Mr. Stevens' service was not satisfactory and that Mr. Driscoll had said that it was not so. Mr. Hackett continuing said, we were sent to East Boston, whether or not under proper authority he did not know, and told to report to Mr. Bean, who was at work pulling up a bridge. Talked with Mr. Walsh, who said we would get the Park Department into trouble by working. We were not looking for trouble, and told Mr. Bean that we would like to speak to Mr. Duncan on the telephone. Couldn't get him and went back to the yard where we were put to work on the roller. If Mr. Bean has told the story that we refused to work, it is not so as we did not refuse to work, but wished to lay the matter before Mr. Duncan.

In answer to Mr. Coakley, Mr. Hackett said that both are willing to work; that last winter, although not machinists, they were at work at all kinds of work in the shop. Asked if some of the rollers had not been laid off, Mr. Hackett said he did not know but thought they were laid off for a few days. He had told Mr. Duncan that his roller was not fit to go out. Mr. Duncan, however, told him to go down and do the best he could; the roller broke down on the way back to the yard. Asked by Mr. Coakley how many were working that morning and how many since, Mr. Hackett said he did not know, but his roller has been out ever since under Mr. Taylor, no one being left in the shop.

Mr. Hackett further said they did not have their wages reduced in the winter, that they got \$3.00 a day, and worked under cover on account of the labor unions. If we had worked outside for Mr. Bean, he said, there would have been trouble, as when we went over there, where eight or nine men were working, we called Mr. Bean to one side, and, while talking with him, one of them called us two strikers and repeated it two or three times, and others did the same. Mr. Hackett said he asked Mr. Bean for the name of one of the men, and that Mr. Bean would bear him out in that statement.

The hearing was closed and the Board took the matter under consideration. Subsequently, it was

VOTED, that the Superintendent be instructed to offer Richard Walsh and Lawrence J. Hackett such other work in the department as he may have at current wages for such work.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the sub-lotting by Mr. Bova of the stand at Marine Park; and a hearing was given to Mr. Bova on the matter.

Mr. Bova stated that a party came to him and wanted a concession to sell cornucopia ice-cream. In case of the relinquishment to the Park Department by the School Committee of any or all of the playgrounds, the playground and its equipment shall be restored by the School Committee to the Park Department in the same condition as when received by the Committee or as authorized by the Board of Commissioners of the Park Department.

3. No new construction nor alteration in the grounds, buildings or other equipment of the playgrounds taken shall be made without the written approval of the Board of Commissioners of the Park Department.

4. The Board of Commissioners of the Park Department will hold the balances of the maintenance appropriations available for said playgrounds subject to the requisition of the School Committee, all work to be done by the employees of the Park Department.

5. The School Committee shall retain all instructors and other employees of the Park Department now employed at said playgrounds so long as they give efficient service.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the plans for three buildings to be erected at 60, 64 and 68 Seaver street; and it was

VOTED, that the Secretary issue a permit to A. Varnerin to erect the buildings in accordance with the plans submitted.

A hearing was given in the matter, at which Dr. Minot, Miss Isabel F. Hyams, Mr. Horatio A. Lamb, Mr. George S. Mumford, Dr. Arthur K. Stone and Walter E. Kruesi appeared.

Dr. Minot stated that they represented a committee of the Tuberculosis Association, which is maintaining an out-door school for tuberculous children in a shed on the site of the Robert Brigham Hospital on Parker Hill. He said, we opened the camp July 16. The children and the parents want us to stay there; but, as the work on the hospital is about to begin, we are obliged to give up the school, unless we can secure another location. We would like to use a part of the Refectory Building in Franklin Park, somewhat similarly to the Emergency Association's care of Charlesbank. The School Committee would like to see the thing tried, and express their willingness to co-operate and to supply a teacher. It would be a great advantage to put affected children now in school in a special school if we can find a place where it can be done. It is proposed to take the most needy cases selected by the Consumptive's Hospital Department for day treatment in the open air. It has been tried in Providence and also in Berlin. In Berlin all the children affected are sent to the forest school, except in stormy weather, when they are under shelter. If the consent of the Board is given we propose to make use of the room adjoining the staircase, the kitchen below and the room

above opening onto the roof, which also can be used for an out-door playground. We propose to give the children three meals a day, as we want to be sure they get a sufficiency of the right kind of food. The thirty-three children we had this summer gained in weight and improved in vitality. They are positive but not contagious cases, children who are behind hand in their studies, and have had conditions to content with in their homes. The vitiated air of the schools is not conducive to study.

Mr. Lamb, the auditor of the Association, stated that they received aid from everywhere, subscriptions came from all classes of society, and that all societies would be glad to have this one aided.

Mr. Kruesi, the secretary of the Association, also spoke on some phases of the work, mainly corroborative of what Dr. Minot had stated, and the hearing was then closed.

Mr. John H. Colby came before the Board in reference to George H. Denny's proposition to establish a moving-picture show in the building belonging to the Haynes estate on Sixth street near Marine Park. Mr. Colby stated that it was not to be vaudeville and no Sunday entertainment was contemplated. He had applied to the Mayor, and wished to know whether objection would be made to it by the Park Commissioners. It would be a harmless show with no objectionable features. Quite a large number of people favor it, one clergyman favored it and one objected. Subsequently the Board referred the matter to the Superintendent for report.

The Superintendent submitted a further report from Engineer Putnam on the height of tower necessary for the elevators on the Avenue Trust Hotel; and it was

VOTED, to approve the elevations above seventy feet in height, shown on the plans of the hotel to be erected on Commonwealth avenue by the Avenue Trust, and that the Chairman endorse said approval on the plans.

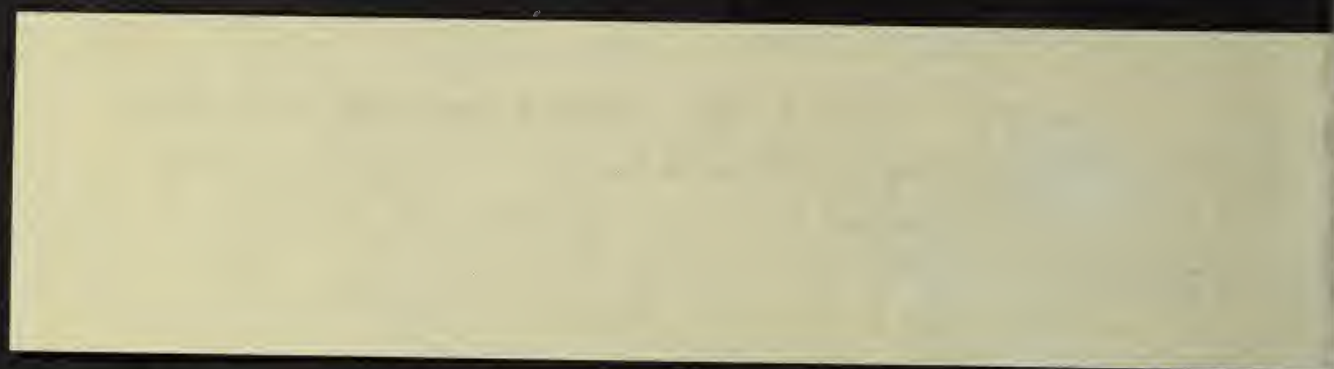

2. All children's corners so taken and all additional corners established under this agreement shall be equipped and maintained by the School Committee, said maintenance work to be done by the Park Department's employees, under the direction of the School Committee, and the cost charged to the School Committee. Such maintenance shall be of such a character as to keep in good condition the grounds and property of the Park Department turned over for the use of the School Committee.

3. A representative of each department shall be appointed to make an in-

ventory and valuation of the property of the Park Department in said parts of the playgrounds. In case of the relinquishment to the Park Department by the School Committee of any or all of the playgrounds, each playground and its equipment shall be restored by the School Committee to the Park Department in the same condition as when received by the Committee or as authorized by the Board of Commissioners of the Park Department.

4. The School Committee shall also have the use of the Park Department playgrounds and out-door gymnasiums as provided for in the said act, as may be mutually agreed upon between the Board of Commissioners of the Park Department and the School Committee, between the close of school sessions and 5.30 P.M. daily (Sundays and Saturdays excepted); on Saturday forenoon from April 1 to July 1 and from September 1 to Thanksgiving Day; and at such other periods as may be mutually agreed upon between the Board of Commissioners of the Park Department and the School Committee.

5. No new construction nor alteration in the grounds, buildings or other equipment of the playgrounds taken shall be made without the written approval of the Board of Commissioners of the Park Department.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the request of Thomas J. Murphy, gardener, for full time and additional pay; and the matter of allowing full time was referred to the Superintendent with full power.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the application of Jane Lynch for the position of matron at the Cottage-street Playground; and the matter of appointment was referred to the Superintendent with instructions.

Storror, Chairman of the School Committee, relative to the use of the Refectory Building, Franklin Park for tuberculous children, also a communication from Dr. Minot relative to the same, were received, and a hearing was given to Mr. Storror, Dr. Scannell and Mr. Ellis of the school board. There were also present Dr. Harrington, Director of School Hygiene, Dr. J. J. Minot and others.

Mr. Storror said that in asking for the use of the Refectory Building for the tuberculous children, he did so in pursuance of a vote of the School Committee, who had taken action after appointing a committee to assist them technically in arriving at a conclusion. The purpose in view was to find accommodation for the Parker Hill Class of some twenty children, for whom the School Committee, on September 22, appointed a teacher. Advised by their experts they find that it is improper to continue the class in the present location after the holidays, and, unless they can obtain suitable accommodations, the class will have to be abandoned. This would leave nothing for those children to face but to return to the ordinary schools, and it would mean death for at least a majority of them: there is no alternative so bad as that one. Such spots and buildings as the School Committee have on their hands are not conveniently situated or suitable for the purpose. The Franklin Park building is by far the best place available, and, perhaps, this is putting it mildly.

He further said that he would be very glad if the Board would ask the special committee appointed by the School Committee, who have advised the School Committee that there is no other suitable place, why the building should not be used. It is now used for a purpose not contemplated at the time the land was taken or the appropriation for the building was granted. This departure already taken makes it easier to determine whether it is better to save the lives of these children or to use the building as at present for a library. He also said that they would like to put the children in the building the day after New Year's day and keep them there until the end of the school year, and that, if anything would be gained by taking the children away, they would do so if a site can be found for a tent in the spring.

Dr. Minot stated that since his committee were here before they had found no place available that the Association could pay for. Vacant houses or vacant halls having water and sewerage were too expensive, as the Association cannot pay very much rent. The School Committee did not offer any fund for this purpose. The children cannot stay where they are, the tent alone is too cold and they need a building where they can dry their clothes in sudden storms, and where hot drinks (hot chocolate etc.) can be prepared. As to the condition of the children none are seriously ill, and all are trained not to cough and not to spit. They would require only the kitchen and two serving rooms in the refectory, the pergola and perhaps the roof. There is a separate door to these rooms and the library need not be disturbed. This thing has been done in foreign parks, and many affected people now go to the parks. Numbers go to the day camp at Mattapan in the street cars, sometimes as many as eighty per cent. of the passengers may be these people. The children are insipient cases and there is practically no risk.

Dr. Scannell of the School Committee said that the problem of what to do with these children was not theirs. It was brought to the attention of the School Committee when they were asked to supply a teacher. There is no school building available or proper to carry on experimental work on these lines at a minimum cost. If the Board grants this request it will do much to help the School Board to solve the problem as to what to do in these cases.

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners was held at the Chairman's office, 53 State street, at 4.15 P.M. Present Messrs. Peabody, Prendergast and Coakley, also present Superintendent Pettigrew. The records of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Board reorganized by electing a chairman and a secretary for the ensuing year. The question on the election of a chairman being put by the Secretary, Mr. Prendergast voted for Mr. Peabody, Mr. Coakley voted for Mr. Peabody: Mr. Peabody did not vote.

The question on the election of a secretary being put, Messrs. Peabody, Prendergast and Coakley, severally, voted for George F. Clarke.

VOTED, that the Chairman be authorized to approve drafts and bills, and to sign contracts on behalf of the board.

VOTED, that Mr. Prendergast be chairman pro tem., and be authorized to approve drafts and bills in the absence of the Chairman.

VOTED, that in the absence of the chairman and the chairman pro tem, Mr. Coakley act as chairman pro tem., and be authorized ^{to} approve drafts and bills.

VOTED, to permit the Boston Work-Horse Parade Association to use Commonwealth avenue, from the junction of Beacon street to a point half a mile west of Cottage Farm Bridge, for the formation of its parade, and the south side of the avenue to Massachusetts avenue for its procession, on Memorial

Day, May 31; also to construct a grandstand on Commonwealth avenue west of Brookline avenue, in the same position as formerly, said stand to be removed as soon as may be after the parade and the ground left in a condition satisfactory to the Superintendent of Parks: the arrangements for the parade to be carried out under the direction of the police.

VOTED, to reject the proposals for arsenate of lead received April 30.

The Superintendent submitted a report on a communication from Amy G. Grant, requesting that the committee in charge of the open-air class be permitted to set up a gas stove in the Overlook Building, Franklin Park, for cooking purposes, which was referred to the Superintendent for reply.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the request of James P. Magenis, that St. Leo's Roman Catholic Parish of Dorchester be permitted to entertain, at a basket picnic in Franklin Park, on Monday, July 26, the Roman Catholic Sunday School children of Boston, to erect tents and other conveniences therefor, and have entertainments similar to those allowed at the Old Home Week picnics; and it was

VOTED, to permit St. Leo's Roman Catholic Parish of Dorchester to hold a basket picnic for the Roman Catholic Sunday School children of Boston, on July 26, in Franklin Park; all the arrangements therefor to be under the direction of the Superintendent of Parks.

The Superintendent submitted a report on bids received for trap rock and crushed stone, and the matter was referred to the Superintendent to report further to the Chairman.

The Superintendent submitted a report on sites for a playground in Ward 17, which was referred to the Secretary to ascertain at what price land from estate of Henry W. Hubbard and Joseph L. Bergman can be secured.

The Superintendent submitted a report on sites for a playground in Ward

19; and the Secretary was instructed to ask the Corporation Counsel to define the limits within which the Board can use the appropriation.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the regulation of traffic on Commonwealth avenue extension; and it was

VOTED, that the general rules adopted by the Board August 31, 1903, as previously amended, be further amended by striking out in rule 4 after the words "Glen Lane" the word "and", and by inserting after the words "Bellevue street" the words, -and the north drive of Commonwealth avenue between Beacon street and Warren street, and between Wallingford Road and the Newton line; also by striking out in rule 5 after the words "Massachusetts avenue" the word "unless" and inserting in place thereof the words, - and between Beacon street and Brighton avenue, except; also by adding at the end of rule 5 the words, -and between Brighton avenue and Warren street, except upon the middle drive going east or the south drive going west.

The Superintendent submitted a report on the communication from Mitchell Freiman, Superintendent West End House, in regard to the management of the Charlesbank Gymnasium; and the Secretary was instructed to reply.

The Superintendent submitted a report from Mr. Putnam on the request of the Sewer Division for permission to construct the Vila-street district surface drain in the Fenway; and the matter was referred to the Superintendent to issue a permit for the construction of the drain in accordance with the Engineer's report.

A communication from J. M. Manning, relative to the construction of a two-family house for Patrick T. and Mary E. Reardon, on the Arborway near Jamaica street, was received and referred to the Chairman with full power.

VOTED, that public interest demands that a view of the ocean and access to the beach should be maintained opposite K and M streets, as has always been intended.

A request was received from the Lincoln House Association to hold track and field sports at Wood Island Park on the morning of May 31; and it was

VOTED, to grant the Lincoln House Association permission to hold track and field sports at Wood Island Park on the morning of May 31, including the right to use the dressing-rooms and shower baths, under the direction of the Superintendent of Parks.

Mr. Coakley submitted a request from Alderman Giblin, that a constituent of his be given a permit to sell light refreshments at Wood Island Park; and the Secretary was instructed to reply, that the Board has decided not to grant any privileges of this kind at Wood Island Park, except temporarily on July 4th.

VOTED, that the Superintendent have the life-preservers in the parks inspected and tested once a month, by some competent person, and a report made in writing.

A petition was received from Rev. J. V. Tracy and others, protesting against a grocer's license for the sale of intoxicating liquor being granted at 366 Washington street, Brighton, on account of its proximity to Rogers Park, and requesting the Board to take such action as the Board may deem the circumstances require. The matter was referred to the Chairman to write to the License Board objecting to the granting of the proposed license.

VOTED, that the salary of Arthur E. Ogden, clerk, be fixed at \$1200 per annum, to take effect when approved by the Mayor.

A hearing was given to Charles G. Corliss on the notice of suspension. Mr. George Libby, counsel for Mr. Corliss, stated that Mr. Corliss for a number of years has been employed as blacksmith at the shops in Franklin Park, and that no fault was found with his work up to the time that Allen came there. Mr. Corliss says that Mr. Allen refused to speak to him or have any dealings with him. This continued up to the time Mr. Allen told Mr. Corliss to go home, that he had been drinking or was drunk. Mr. Corliss says that a young man that came to look at the pigeons brought two pints of whiskey a week previous to the time that Mr. Allen told Corliss to go home. Mr. Corliss says that he had trouble with quincy or sore throat, that he had not been drinking that day and was able to work. Mr. Libby said that it would be a serious detriment to Mr. Corliss to be discharged, as it would go in the record against his employment in the Civil Service, that Mr. Corliss would not want the name of being discharged, and requested that he be reinstated.

Mr. Corliss stated that he was discharged on February 19, had not been drinking that day, had what the doctor called quincy sore throat, had been afflicted since the Monday previous, that Mr. Allen asked him if he was not pretty nearly all in. Mr. Corliss asked that the Board give him another trial. Said he was in condition to go back to work, but did not desire to go back again with the idea of working under Mr. Allen. He said he was a drinking man but did not drink to excess, and was not in the habit of drinking while on the work. He said he had liquor there brought in by other men but he never brought it there himself. He admitted that he had had liquor at the other shop but never at this one. Mr. Corliss offered to resign if the Board could not give him work somewhere else than under Mr. Allen. The Board, thereupon, accepted his resignation.

Special Regulations Concerning the Exclusion and Use of
Motor Vehicles in the Boston Parks and Parkways.

Voted, That the following special regulations concerning the exclusion and use of motor vehicles in the Boston parks and parkways be and the same are hereby adopted under the provisions of Section 17, Chapter 534 of the Acts of the year 1909:

1. Motor vehicles are hereby excluded from Franklin Park and the Arnold Arboretum, except on Glen Road and the road from Forest Hills Street to the entrance to Forest Hills cemetery in said Franklin Park.

2. On Commonwealth Avenue, between Arlington Street and the Ericson statue, motor vehicles travelling in either direction shall use the driveway on the left of the parkway only.

3. On Commonwealth Avenue, between Beacon Street and Brighton Avenue, motor vehicles travelling in either direction shall use the driveway on the right of the parkway only.

4. On Commonwealth Avenue, between Brighton Avenue and Warren Street, motor vehicles shall use the middle driveway only, except for the purpose of going in the nearest way to some building between said Brighton Avenue and said Warren Street.

5. Every motor vehicle when stopped upon any road or driveway shall be at the side of the road and as near as possible to the curb or gutter, and with its machinery at rest, and no motor vehicle shall be left standing for more than 20 minutes.
