2. Mrs. Kawachi-Behrend, by letter dated 14 June, requested that she be repatriated to Germany on the next repatriation vessel, in order to join her family. She is a Caucasian, former German citizen, who married a Japanese national in Germany and was repatriated to Japan with her husband in 1946. Since that time her husband has died, and Mrs. Kawachi-Behrend has been living on relief.

3. SCAP radio CX 52691, 15 May 47, to OMGUS presented the case of Mrs. Kawachi-Behrend (and three other families in same category) to U. S. authorities in Berlin for consideration.

4. OMGUS radio CRX 1776, 20 May 47, did not concur in re-repatriation of subject personnel at expense of Military Government but offered to give instructions for the return of subject personnel at their own expense.

5. Mrs. Kawachi-Behrend has been interviewed several times by a representative of G-1, and the above information given her. However, inasmuch as she is without funds, and knows no one who will guarantee payment of her passage, there would appear to be no means to repatriate her. The other families in the same category, as shown in ourad CX 52691, are also without funds.

6. It is to be noted that at present there are approximately 440 non-objectionable Germans in Japan who desire repatriation but are prevented from departing on the next repatriation vessel by the refusal of the French, Russian and United Kingdom authorities to accept them. Most of these families are on relief and have husbands and relatives in Germany, with no prospect of repatriation for at least one more year.

7. It is recommended that Mrs. Kawachi-Behrend be notified by a representative of G-1 that her request cannot be granted at this time.

Entry of Private Businessmen into Japan.

1. Reference is made to attached staff study, proposed radio, and Routing Slip from the Office of the Chief of Staff requesting comment in connection with policy for entry of businessmen.

2. Attached radio proposes that present members of PAG be permitted to divorce themselves from SCAP and to hold Powers of Attorney for purposes of property inspection and restitution, and, upon completion of restitution and rehabilitation of oil company property, to enter into commercial operations in Japan. Staff study and radio point out that if this privilege is granted oil company representatives other important industries will request similar privileges.

3. Attached G/N, C/S to G-1, subject, "Policy on Service Personnel for Commercial Representatives," dated 13 July, states that, for the present time, entrants will not be permitted "for the purpose of inspection and pursuit of substantial investment interests." It is believed that PAG and similar personnel who enter in connection with restitution and rehabilitation of property are included in the above terminology, but that entry should be permitted in those cases, such as PAG, involving the interests of the Occupation.

4. It is the opinion of G-1 that until such time as entrants are permitted for the purpose of inspection and pursuit of investment interests PAG and similar personnel who are engaged in restitution of property should be chargeable to the quota of 20 technical aides per country authorized to enter Japan in connection with reparations and restitution activities. It is also believed that when this personnel has completed restitution and rehabilitation of property and is prepared to enter into commercial operations they should be charged to the quota of the country of origin for entry of private businessmen into Japan. If such personnel are not chargeable to a quota there will be little control exercised over the number in Japan. Lack of suitable accommodations dictates establishment and maintenance of firm controls.

5. Information received from Mr. Burr Smith, Chairman, U. S. Reparations and Restitution Delegation, indicates that there are at least 45 American industries (and an unknown number of foreign industries) that desire to send into Japan representatives for restitution and rehabilitation of property and to reestablish commercial operations at the earliest practicable date. Mr. Smith advised that ten of the authorized total of twenty persons who act as technical aides to the U.S. Reparations and Restitution Delegation are authorized entry into Japan in connection with restitution of private business

Mr. Smith further advised that it would be impracticable to charge to the twenty man technical aides quota PAG and other personnel who enter Japan in connection with restitution of property.

6. Recommend dispatch of proposed check sheet to CPC requiring investigation of feasibility of charging PAG and similar personnel to the technical aides quota during the period of restitution and rehabilitation of property and to the businessmen quota when they are prepared to enter into commercial operations.

7. G-4 (Col Patton), ESS (Lt Col Ryder) and CPC (Mr. Brenn) concur in this action. Reparations Section (Mr. Meiklejohn) advised that concurrence could not be given to charging personnel to technical aides quota pending further study.

1. Returned herewith are staff study and proposed radio, above subject.
2. In view of the scope of the problem involved in restitution and re-habilitation of property in Japan and the probable requests for entry in this connection from other industries when it becomes known that oil companies have been granted this privilege, firm controls are necessary to govern entry of this type personnel.
3. It is desired that CPC investigate the feasibility of charging to the Reparations and Restitution technical aides quota former PAC and similar personnel divorced from SCAP or cleared for entry during the period of restitution and rehabilitation of property, and to the businessmen quota when they are prepared to enter into commercial operations.
4. Coordination should be effected with G-1, G-4, ESS and Reparations Section and recommendations submitted at the earliest practicable date.

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of 20 June 1947 in which you request issuance of special passes for three months for two members of the Tokyo BureauNewsweek.

In this connection, Paragraph 6 Staff Memorandum No. 12 of 10 January 1947, General Headquarters, indicates installations in Japan which are off limits to Allied personnel. It is suggested you refer to this Staff Memorandum to determine specific places for which special passes would be required.

2. This radio does not affect our action, inasmuch as our radio dispatched yesterday stated that we had no objection if War Department approved. Inasmuch as 8th Army is furnishing the administrative personnel, and Nanking has been so informed, no further action is deemed necessary.

2. The SS General Black arrived at Yokohama on 9 July to embark objectionable, diplomatic and certain non-objectionable German and Austrian repatriates. Approved property regulations were received on 17 July in JCS Radio WARX 82061.

a. JCS Radio W 88416, 27 December 46, contains approval of property and financial regulations proposed by CINCFE for German and Austrian repatriates from Japan (except former diplomats). This radio and WAR Radio W 81923, 13 July 47, form the basis for preparation of Property Regulations and Procedures to be applicable to repatriates.

b. War Radio 99179, 31 May 47, ordered that the USAT General Black be used for the repatriation of objectionable Germans and former German diplomats and consular officials. It also placed such restrictions on repatriation of non-objectionable Germans that no non-objectionables would be eligible for repatriation from Japan.

c. War Radio WAR 99322, 4 June 47, gave a draft directive of the proposed property regulations for former German diplomats, and requested CINCFE comments.

d. Ourad CX 53302, 12 June 47, gave CINCFE views on the property regulations for former diplomats and reaffirmed the necessity for 40-days notice prior to repatriation.

e. War Radio WX 80179, 15 June 47, requests CINCFE to furnish guards and administrative personnel for the SS General Black, and requests that CINCFE route the vessel to Bremerhaven via Shanghai and the Suez Canal.

f. War Radio 80502, 21 June 47, states that early decision is expected concerning property and financial regulations for former German diplomats in Japan, and that while it is realized it may be necessary to hold the General Black in port while preparing the repatriates for outloading, it is hoped that the full 40-day interval will be unnecessary. This radio also confirms the fact that the rate of exchange for repatriates to Germany is 3 1/3 marks per dollar.

g. War Radio WX 81004, 28 June 47, recommends that non-objectionable Austrians (total of 9 persons) be repatriated aboard the General Black.

h. War Radio W 81923, 13 July 47, gave the final property regulations (as approved by SWNCC, though not released by JCS) applicable to former German diplomatic and consular personnel.

1. It is to be noted from this radio, which incorporates the changes
cont'd. requested by CINCPAC in ourad CX 53302, 12 June 47, that:

(1) By para 4B(I) no yen is approved for export. On the initial repatriation in February repatriates were permitted to carry out yen to the equivalent of \$50; however, in view of this radio, it is considered that the intent is to prohibit all repatriates from carrying out yen, and the directives have been drawn up to this effect.

(2) While paragraph 4D states that all property left in Japan by former diplomats is subject to the German vesting decree (thus will be taken in charge by CPC), paragraph 4E(II) states "View here that storage in U. S. military warehouses might in time create undue responsibilities which may well be avoided by permitting storage at owner's risk". In view of these two conflicting views, it is the desire of CPC to plan to store the property in military warehouses, inasmuch as this will preclude the necessity of locating this property and taking it into custody later.

(3) Paragraph 4A sets no arbitrary limit as to the amount of baggage for former diplomats unless necessitated by restricted shipping space. This directive to the Japanese Government sets a limit of 8000 pounds per individual due to restricted shipping space.

i. OMGUS Radio CC 9878, 15 July 47, agreed to accept all non-objectionable Germans previously resident in U. S. zone Germany. This group totals 135. Instructions for their repatriation are included herewith.

j. JCS Radio WARX 82061, 16 July 47, contains final approved property regulations applicable to former German diplomats and consular officials.

4. Reference subparagraph 1a above is proposed memorandum for the Japanese Government to effect this repatriation. This memorandum is to have three inclosures as follows:

a. Nominal rolls of repatriates (In preparation. No changes are made in these rolls without approval of the C/S).

5. Medical and Sanitary Regulations are identical with those used in initial German repatriation in February 1947. These regulations are concurred in by PH&W (Port Quarantine Branch - Capt Merkle).

6. Property Regulations and Procedures have been prepared using above quoted radios as basis. This inclosure consists of three parts, to provide for different sets of regulations for objectionables, non-objectionables and former diplomats.

7. Reference subparagraph 1d above (letter of surveillance instructions) is for the guidance of Eighth Army in supervising this repatriation.

8. Recommend approval of proposed actions contained in subparagraphs 1a to d, inclusive, and return to G-1 for necessary action.

subject: Repatriation of German and Austrian Nationals.

MEDICAL AND SANITARY PROCEDURES

1. The Welfare Ministry will carry out the following
medical and sanitary procedures as minimum requirements
incidental to subject repatriations:

a. Physical inspections for detection of louse infes-
tation, and of cases and suspects of quarantinable diseases
(cholera, plague, smallpox, louse-borne typhus, yellow fever)
or of communicable diseases which might prejudice the health of
subsequent contacts will be made at each repatriate's home
before repatriation commences. If it is determined that a
repatriate should not depart due to disease or infirmity, this
fact will be reported to the Eighth United States Army inspection
team immediately, and the repatriate will be given a physical
inspection by an Allied medical officer. Names of those
exempted from repatriation will be reported immediately to
General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

b. Hospitalization or other effective segregation of
persons known or suspected to be infected with quarantinable or
significant communicable diseases, until communicability has

passed. These persons will not be moved to the reception center until communicability has passed.

c. Appropriate measures for continued observation of persons known to have had contact with a quarantinable disease of a type liable to convey infection. Observation will continue during the incubation period of the disease concerned, calculated from the day of last contact. The following incubation periods will be observed: Smallpox - 14 days, louse-borne typhus - 12 days, plague - 6 days, cholera - 6 days, and yellow fever - 6 days.

d. Immunizations to be given at reception center.

(1) All repatriates will be vaccinated against smallpox.

(2) Typhus vaccine will be administered to all repatriates not vaccinated within the previous four months.

(3) Only the initial dose of a multi-dose vaccine need be administered at the reception center if the flow of repatriates would otherwise be impeded.

(4) Vaccine necessary for medical processing will be furnished by the Eighth United States Army.

e. Physical inspection during daylight hours, except in exceptional circumstances in which the flow of repatriates would otherwise be impeded.

f. Attachment to the passenger manifest of a blanket certificate to the effect that all required procedures have been

accomplished.

g. Maintenance of records required to comply with international quarantine procedures.

PROPERTY REGULATIONS AND PROCEDURES

I. General.

1. The term "property" shall include all movable and immovable property and all rights and interests in or claims to such property whether matured or not, including all property, rights, or trustees and all property, rights, interest or claims transferred by way of gifts or otherwise, or for consideration, express or implied, but not including the rights or interests of third parties to a bona fide sale for full consideration, and shall include but shall not be limited to buildings and lands, goods, wares and merchandise, chattels, coin, bullion, currency, deposits, accounts, or debts, shares, claims, bills of lading, warehouse receipts, all kinds of financial instruments whether expressed in Reich Marks or in any foreign currency, evidences of ownership of property, contracts, judgments, rights in or with respect to patents, copyrights, trademarks, etc., and in general property of any nature whatsoever.

2. Attention is invited to the Memorandum from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, AG 130 (22 Sep 45)ESS, (SCAPIN 45) dated 22 September 1945, and Appendix A thereto.

In addition, all sales, gifts or transfers of any kind of movable or immovable property by foreign nationals to be repatriated in accordance with these instructions is prohibited, except as specifically exempted for former German diplomatic personnel and for non-objectionable personnel, as provided in Paragraphs III and IV of these regulations.

II. Objectionable German Nationals (Part ^I~~II~~, Inclosure No.1).

1. General. When the Eighth United States Army inspection team representative directs, the Japanese custodian will take over all property, both movable and immovable, in excess of that to accompany the repatriate to the port as indicated in paragraphs 2, 3 and 4 below, and the custodian will guard and conserve this property and process it in accordance with instructions herewith. Prior to the departure of the repatriates, the custodian will be on duty at the premises during daylight hours. The custodian will not live in the house of the repatriate during the period prior to departure of the repatriates, except when specifically directed to do so by the officer in charge of the Eighth United States Army inspection team. However, he will be available during daylight hours to inventory all property and to prevent removal of property from the premises. When directed by the Eighth United States Army inspection team, after departure of the repatriates, the custodian will move in and live on the premises at all times as long as any property, movable or immovable, remains in his custody.

2. Property Which May be Taken. Those nationals being repatriated who are classified as "objectionable" (Part I, Inclosure No. 1) will be allowed to take with them only \$50 (United States currency) or its equivalent in any other monies except yen. Each repatriate will be informed that the current conversion rate is three and one-third (3 1/3) marks for one (1) dollar; other foreign currency at official rate. Yen is not approved for export. Each repatriate will be allowed to take with him 350 pounds (159 kg) of personal effects per person, not to exceed 1,500 pounds (682 kg) per family. The following financial instruments are exempted from seizure: personal bank books, personal insurance policies, non-negotiable savings certificates, or any other non-negotiable documents.

3. Seizure of Personal Effects. Personal effects will not be seized for custody except those in excess of maximum baggage limits and limits as set forth in paragraph 4 below.

4. Prohibited Items. "Objectionable" nationals will be prohibited from taking with them the following articles:

- a. Watches in excess of two watches per adult, or four watches per family, regardless of value.
- b. Cameras in excess of one camera, including moving picture types, per adult, or three cameras per family.
- c. Necklaces and bracelets in excess of two necklaces and two bracelets per adult regardless of the value.

- d. Rings, precious stones, bullion and all other jewelry except that which has sacred or marital significance. One child's ring of nominal value may be allowed each child.
- e. All table silverware and flat silverware in excess of complete service for 6 persons in case of a single individual or a family of 6 persons or less; in case of families composed of more than 6 persons, the flat silverware service allowable will be increased correspondingly to the increase in the number in the family.

Examples as follows:

- (1) Single person - complete flat silverware service for 6 persons.
- (2) Family of 6 persons or less - complete flat silverware service for 6 persons.
- (3) Family of 7 persons - complete flat silverware service for 7 persons.

f. Firearms, ammunition or weapons of any sort.

5. Property Inventory. Inventory of property of "objectionable" nationals will be processed in the following manner:

- a. The owner and custodian will together inventory all property which is to be stored. Prior to the inventory, property will be divided into three categories as follows:

- d. Rings, precious stones, bullion and all other jewelry except that which has sacred or marital significance. One child's ring of nominal value may be allowed each child.
- e. All table silverware and flat silverware in excess of complete service for 6 persons in case of a single individual or a family of 6 persons or less; in case of families composed of more than 6 persons, the flat silverware service allowable will be increased correspondingly to the increase in the number in the family.

Examples as follows:

- (1) Single person - complete flat silverware service for 6 persons.
- (2) Family of 6 persons or less - complete flat silverware service for 6 persons.
- (3) Family of 7 persons - complete flat silverware service for 7 persons.

f. Firearms, ammunition or weapons of any sort.

5. Property Inventory. Inventory of property of "objectionable" nationals will be processed in the following manner:

- a. The owner and custodian will together inventory all property which is to be stored. Prior to the inventory, property will be divided into three categories as follows:

- (1) Small items of high intrinsic value such as cash in excess of limits as set forth in paragraph 2 above, bullion, bills of lading, warehouse receipts, financial instruments, evidences of property ownership, contracts, judgments, rights in or with respect to patents, copyrights, trademarks, jewels and jewelry in excess of that which may be taken, and similar items, the safekeeping of which require bank vault storage. No items of jewelry or small items of intrinsic value will be included which have a value of less than \$50 (U.S.) per item or set. Each copy of inventory will show in the upper left-hand corner thereof the repatriate's number as listed on the nominal roll of repatriates.
- (2) All other movable property, except that which accompanies the repatriate. Any item of movable property inventoried by the repatriate and the Japanese custodian which is deemed by the Eighth United States Army inspection team to be of insufficient value to warehouse will be lined out, initialed and added to the end of the immovable property inventory.

(3) All immovable property, i.e. lands and buildings, to include all such property owned within the prefecture of the repatriate's residence, other prefectures of Japan, or abroad, plus movable property left on the premises as stated in (2) above.

b. Each category of property will be inventoried separately.

c. Seven copies in English will be made of each inventory of high intrinsic value (5a(1) above) and movable property (5a(2) above), typed or in ink, and each copy will be signed by the owner and by the custodian. Disposition of these copies will be as follows:

- (1) One copy retained by the owner as his record and receipt.
- (2) One copy dispatched immediately by the Eighth Army officer in charge of repatriation operations in each area, to General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, Attn: Civil Property Custodian.
- (3) One copy, receipted by the Eighth United States Army custodian to whom the property is turned over, will be retained by the Japanese custodian.

(4) The remaining four copies will be used for future property transfer.

d. Only four copies of immovable property will be made and disposition will be as follows:

(1) One copy retained by the owner as his record and receipt.

(2) One copy dispatched immediately by the Eighth Army officer in charge of repatriation operations in each area, to General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, Attn: Civil Property Custodian.

(3) One copy, receipted by the Eighth United States Army custodian to whom the property is turned over, will be retained by the Japanese custodian.

(4) One copy to be retained by Eighth United States Army representative for record purposes.

- e. Care will be exercised in filling out the forms completely and uniformly. The custodian will supervise and protect all property left when the repatriate departs.
- f. The inspecting team, before departure of the repatriates, will physically check all inventory records upon completion, verify their accuracy and proper signature thereon by both parties.

6. Inventory Lists of Movable and Immovable Property.

The inventory lists of movable property in excess of baggage allowance, and immovable property will contain the following information:

- a. Name of Owner.
- b. In the upper left-hand corner of each copy of each inventory will be shown the repatriate's number as indicated on the nominal roll of repatriates.
- c. Address of Owner. (Address in Japan)
(Address in home country, if known)
- d. In the case of movable property each box, trunk and crate and all unpacked articles will be

tagged and numbered consecutively, each separate container will be marked plainly and indelibly with the repatriate's number as indicated on the nominal roll of repatriates and the inventory will contain a list of all items by number and description. Boxes and trunks will contain one package inventory inside the container and one package inventory permanently attached to the outside thereof. One key for each of any locked containers will be placed in a sealed envelope and wired to the container. All copies of the inventory of each container will be signed by the repatriate and the custodian.

e. Address at which property is located.

f. Name and address of custodian.

7. Livestock of all types will be taken into custody, concentrated in one location, and a Japanese custodian placed in charge thereof. The Japanese Government is charged with the maintenance of such animals.

8. Foodstuffs of non-perishable nature left by repatriates will be collected and placed under custody of Eighth United States Army. Such items will be stored in the collecting point warehouse but will not appear on any inventory sheets. After the completion of inventorying, a consolidated list of such non-perishable food stuffs will be dispatched immediately by

repatriation officers in charge in each respective area to
General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers,
Attn: Civil Property Custodian.

9. Packing and Crating of Property. The Japanese Government will be required to furnish packing boxes, crating materials, other necessary materials, and personnel to prepare furniture, household property and other items left behind for storage upon departure of repatriates, and for crating of such personal property within the prescribed allowances to accompany the repatriate. In addition, arrangements will be made by the Japanese Government to weigh all baggage accompanying repatriates, before departure from their homes, to insure that prescribed allowances are not exceeded.

10. Disposition of Property Taken into Custody.

- a. Small items of high intrinsic value. Immediately upon inventory and proper packing, small items of high intrinsic value, noted in paragraph 5a(1) above, will be delivered to the inspection team representative of the Eighth United States Army who will receipt for and be responsible for delivery to the vaults, Bank of Japan, Tokyo or Osaka Mint, Osaka. The inventory, packing and delivery of high intrinsic items will be given priority over all other tasks.
- b. The Japanese Government will arrange for working teams to crate, pack and deliver to the nearest

collecting point, noted in paragraph 12 below, all movable property to be warehoused as shown on the inventories. Crating and packing will begin immediately after inspection of property by the Eighth United States Army inspecting team, who will be informed when the crating and packing has been completed and the property is ready for shipment to a collecting point.

- c. The Japanese Government will guard all immovable property and all items stored therein pending further orders from the Commanding General, Eighth United States Army.

11. Collecting Points. Collecting points at which property will be turned in will be established by the Eighth United States Army at Nagahama, Kagohara and in the Kobe-Osaka area, in addition to warehouses in Tokyo.

12. Property of Japanese Wives. The processing of property of Japanese wives who elect to remain in Japan instead of accompanying their husbands, will be as follows:

- a. Japanese wife remaining in Japan whose husband is classified as "objectionable" may retain:
 - (1) Personal or real property which she can prove was acquired prior to marriage.
 - (2) Family movable property in the weight specified for repatriates to take with them.

b. Japanese wife remaining in Japan whose husband is classified as "objectionable" will not be allowed to retain:

- (1) Watches in excess of two.
- (2) Necklaces and bracelets in excess of two.
- (3) Rings, precious stones, bullion or other jewelry except that which has a sacred or marital significance.
- (4) Firearms, ammunition or weapons of any sort.

c. All movable or immovable property in which there is a German interest will be taken into custody.

III. German Nationals Formerly Having Diplomatic Status.

(Part ~~XI~~^{II}, Inclosure No. 1)

1. Each repatriate formerly having diplomatic status will be permitted to take from Japan 8000 pounds (3636 kg) of personal effects and household goods, provided that the size does not exceed 200 cubic feet per repatriate. However, all those repatriates having former diplomatic status will be clearly warned that existence of facilities at port of debarkation for handling more than 500 pounds per person is highly dubious.

2. German nationals formerly having diplomatic status may take with them United States dollars, German marks, or any other currency except yen, in an amount not to exceed the equivalent of \$250 (U.S.) at the rate of three and one-third

(3 1/3) marks for one (1) dollar. No yen will be taken by such repatriates. The following additional financial instruments are exempted from seizure: personal bank books, personal insurance policies, non-negotiable savings certificates, or any other non-negotiable documents.

3. German nationals formerly having diplomatic status are prohibited from taking with them any firearms, ammunition, or weapons of any sort.

4. Owners of real and/or personal property may sell such property prior to repatriation and use the proceeds therefrom for any legal transactions within Japan prior to repatriation. Any proceeds remaining in possession of such former owners, in Japanese yen, will be seized by repatriation officials and listed on the high intrinsic items inventory as outlined in paragraph 7c below. Proceeds remaining in possession of such former owners, in U. S. dollars, German marks, or any other foreign currency, in excess of limits set forth in paragraph 2 above, will also be seized and listed on the high intrinsic items inventory as outlined in paragraph 7c below.

5. Seizure of Personal Effects. Personal effects will not be retained for custody by repatriation officials except that property which the repatriates specifically designate be left. Repatriation officials will make certain that no oriental art objects and oriental jewelry are looted property. In case any looted property is discovered, the same will be seized and noted

on the inventory of property left for United States Army custody as "looted".

6. Agents to be Appointed by Repatriates. In all cases in which a repatriate leaves real and/or personal property the repatriate will designate in writing in quadruplicate an agent in Japan to deal with Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers if and when the property is released. The original will be given to the designated agent, one copy will accompany the inventory copy forwarded to General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, Attn: Civil Property Custodian, one copy retained by repatriate, and one copy by United States Eighth Army.

7. Property Inventory. Inventory of property of German nationals formerly having diplomatic status will be processed in the following manner:

a. The owner, the Japanese custodian and a representative of the United States Eighth Army will together inventory all property which the repatriate chooses to leave. Prior to the inventory property will be divided into three categories as follows:

(1) Small items of high intrinsic value such as cash in excess of limits as set forth in paragraph 2 above, or other high intrinsic items voluntarily left by repatriates.

No items, except cash, which have value of less than \$50 will be included.

- (2) All other movable property except that which accompanies the repatriate.
- (3) All immovable property, i.e. lands and buildings, to include all such property owned within the prefecture of the repatriate's residence, other prefectures of Japan, or abroad.

b. Each Category of Property will be Inventoried Separately.

c. Seven copies in English will be made of each inventory of high intrinsic value (7a(1) above) and movable property (7a(2) above), typed or in ink, and each copy will be signed by the owner, the Japanese custodian and the United States Eighth Army representative. Disposition of these copies will be as follows:

- (1) One copy retained by the owner as his record and receipt.
- (2) One copy dispatched immediately by the United States Eighth Army officer in charge of repatriation operations in each area, to General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, Attn: Civil Property Custodian.

- (3) One copy, receipted by the United States Eighth Army custodian to whom the property is turned over, will be retained by the Japanese custodian.
 - (4) The remaining four (4) copies will be used for future property transfers.
- d. Only four (4) copies of inventory of immovable property will be made and disposition will be as follows:
- (1) One copy retained by the owner as his record and receipt.
 - (2) One copy dispatched immediately by the United States Eighth Army officer in charge of repatriation operations in each area, to General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, Attn: Civil Property Custodian.
 - (3) One copy, receipted by the United States Eighth Army custodian to whom the property is turned over, will be retained by the Japanese custodian.
 - (4) One copy to be retained by the United States Eighth Army representative for record purposes.
8. Inventory Lists of Movable and Immovable Property.

- a. The inventory lists of movable property voluntarily left by repatriates, or left involuntarily at port of embarkation due to shipping space restrictions, and immovable property will contain the following information:
- (1) Name of owner.
 - (2) In the upper left-hand corner of each copy of each inventory will be shown the repatriate's number as indicated on the nominal roll of repatriates.
 - (3) Address of owner. (Address in Japan)
(Address in home country, if known)
 - (4) In the case of movable property each box, trunk, and crate and all unpacked articles will be tagged and numbered consecutively, each separate container will be marked plainly and indelibly with the repatriate's number as indicated on the nominal roll of repatriates, and each inventory will contain a list of all items by number and description. Boxes and trunks will contain one package inventory inside the container and one package inventory permanently attached to the outside thereof. One key for each of any locked containers will be placed in

a sealed envelope and wired to the container. All copies of the inventory of each container will be signed by the repatriate and the custodian.

(5) Address at which property is located.

9. Packing and Crating of Property. The Japanese Government will be required to furnish packing boxes, crating materials, other necessary materials, and personnel to prepare furniture, household property and other items left behind for storage upon departure of repatriates, and for crating of such personal property within the prescribed allowances to accompany the repatriate.

10. Disposition of Property Taken into Custody.

- a. The Japanese Government will arrange for working teams, to crate, pack and deliver to the nearest collecting point, noted in paragraph 11 below, all movable property to be warehoused as shown on the inventories. Crating and packing will begin immediately after inspection of property by the United States Eighth Army inspecting team, who will be informed when the crating and packing has been completed and the property is ready for shipment to a collecting point.
- b. The Japanese Government will guard all immovable property and all items stored therein pending further orders from the Commanding General,

United States Eighth Army.

11. Collecting Points. Collecting points at which property will be turned in will be established by the United States Eighth Army at Nagahama, Kagohara and in the Kobe-Osaka area, in addition to warehouses in Tokyo.

IV. Non-Objectionable German Nationals (Part III, Inclosure No. 1)

1. Those nationals being repatriated who are classified as "non-objectionable" (Part III, Inclosure No. 1) will be allowed to take with them \$250 (U. S. currency) or its equivalent in any other monies, except yen, and not to exceed 500 pounds (227 kg) of personal effects per person. Repatriates will be informed that current conversion rate is three and one-third (3 1/3) marks to one (1) U. S. dollar.

2. Non-objectionable nationals are prohibited from taking with them any firearms, ammunition, or weapons of any sort.

3. No property restrictions or prohibitions other than those noted in paragraphs 1 and 2 above will apply to "non-objectionable" nationals. In case any "non-objectionable" repatriate has movable property in excess of the 500 pounds limitation per person, such repatriate will be advised that the responsibility for its disposition, custody or safekeeping in Japan rests with the repatriate and that the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, or any other official agency of the Allied Powers, will not assume, in trust or otherwise, the custody or safekeeping thereof. It is, therefore, anticipated that

no inventories of property of "non-objectionable" nationals will be necessary.

4. The Japanese Government will be required to furnish packing boxes, crating materials, other necessary materials, and personnel to crate, box and prepare for shipment all personal property within the prescribed weight allowances which is to accompany the repatriates. In addition, arrangements will be made by the Japanese Government to weigh all baggage accompanying repatriates before departure from their homes to insure that prescribed allowances are not exceeded.

5. A Japanese wife remaining in Japan, whose husband is classified as "non-objectionable" and being repatriated, may be allowed to retain, in addition to all property owned by her, whether title was acquired prior to marriage or not, all personal and real property of her German husband over and above his baggage limitations.

6. No Japanese custodian will be appointed in the case of any "non-objectionable" repatriate.

SUBJECT: Repatriation of German and Austrian Nationals

TO: Commanding General, Eighth Army, APO 343

1. References.

a. Memorandum from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, file AG 370.05 ()GA (SCAPIN) dated , subject: "Repatriation of German and Austrian Nationals", with three inclosures (Inclosure No. 1).

b. Informational Data Form (Inclosure No. 2).

2. The SS General Black now at Yokohama has been designated to embark German nationals listed in Inclosure No. 1 to reference paragraph 1 above. Authority has been granted to retain the SS General Black at Yokohama for the time necessary to outload repatriates. Upon completion of outloading in Japan the SS General Black will outload repatriates at Shanghai, China en route to Bremerhaven, Germany.

3. It is desired that the Commanding General, Eighth Army:

a. Arrange for administrative personnel, including guards and medical attendants, and supplies, including food and medical, for voyage from Yokohama to Bremerhaven for repatriates named in reference paragraph 1 above, and for approximately 1,000 repatriates from China. Prior to departure of the vessel, instructions will be issued relative to accounting for supplies,

and disposition of personnel upon completion of duties.

b. Establish customs service at Nagahama Reception Center to process baggage of repatriates in accordance with regulations outlined in reference paragraph 1 above.

c. Issue necessary orders to embark personnel to be repatriated, using this directive as authority.

d. Issue necessary orders to route the SS General Black to Bremerhaven, Germany via Shanghai, China and the Suez Canal.

4. Nominal rolls of repatriates have been prepared to include entire families, i.e. where one parent has been classified as objectionable and subject to repatriation, the entire family has been included. The protest of any member of a family against being subject to repatriation because of his parents will be reported immediately to General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

5. Cases may be found in which nationals included on the nominal rolls have married nationals not subject to repatriation, and such cases have not been reported in time for both names to be included on the rolls. In these cases the national not subject to repatriation will be included on the nominal rolls if he or she so desires. However, such marriages will not serve to exempt objectionable nationals from repatriation. Similarly, children not on the nominal rolls will be included.

6. The Commanding General, Eighth Army, is hereby delegated authority to exempt from repatriation:

a. Japanese wives and children who elect to remain in Japan.

b. Those nationals who, upon examination by United States Army medical authorities, are considered physically unfit to travel. In the event that any member of a family is exempted due to physical or mental infirmities, all members of that immediate family, including mother, father, dependent children and other dependents will be exempted also.

Names of repatriates exempted under the provisions of this paragraph will be reported to General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers as soon as practicable.

7. Attention is invited to the fact that there are three types of repatriates, as indicated in Inclosure 1 to reference paragraph 1 above. It is desired that personnel listed in Part 2, Inclosure 1, reference paragraph 1 above (German nationals formerly having diplomatic status) be notified immediately upon receipt of this memorandum (prior to issuance of written instructions by Headquarters, Eighth Army) that they are to be repatriated in the near future and be informed of the property regulations applicable to them. It is desired that this notification be made with a minimum of delay so as to enable full opportunity for disposal of property referred to in applicable property regulations.

8. Inventory of property to be left behind by former German diplomats will be made by a representative of United States Eighth Army, together with the owner and the Japanese

custodian. If this property has not been transferred to a warehouse when the repatriate leaves, the Japanese custodian will be ordered by the Japanese Government to guard the property, both movable and immovable, until ultimate disposition is determined.

9. Informational Data Forms (Inclosure No. 2) will be completed in eight (8) copies for each family and for each repatriate not a member of a family. It is desired that these forms be forwarded to General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers prior to sailing of the repatriation vessel.

10. Special surveillance is requested to insure compliance of the Japanese Government with provisions of reference paragraph 1 above, and in rendering the report on completion of repatriation. (See paragraph 5, reference paragraph 1 above)

Part I. Reurad WCL 34358, 17 July 47, concerning the entry of displaced persons into this theater, the following comments are made:

a. Due not only to the different nationalities involved, but also to the differences between oriental and occidental customs, food and ideologies, it is believed that it would be difficult to indoctrinate such individuals to serve/in ^{the U.S.} this theater.

b. The standards of professional development and conduct of such a group are not considered to be equivalent to the carefully selected U.S. citizens who are presently engaged in various positions mentioned urad. However, since the U.S. Army would be responsible for bringing these displaced persons into this theater, their conduct and results of their work would inevitably be attached directly to the Army.

c. Such individuals would have little moral obligation to the U.S. Government or to the ideals of the Occupation, and as such would probably show no hesitancy in engaging in black market or other unauthorized activities.

d. The potential positions described are lucrative

for the type of person desiring them and it is believed that the U.S. Government would be censured if displaced persons were given these positions instead of previously established U.S. citizens.

e. Further, it is believed that the difficulties inherent in accomplishing thorough security check on such individuals would preclude their entry into Japan.

Part II. It is therefore considered neither feasible nor desirable to permit entry of displaced persons in this theater.

1. 1. WAR radio W 81923, 13 July 47, passes to CINCPAC the financial and property regulations applicable to former German diplomatic personnel, as approved by SWNCC, though not released officially by JCS.
 2. This radio differs from the proposed regulations (received in WAR radio WARX 99179, 31 May) as follows:
 - a. Former diplomats may appoint an agent for personal as well as real property. This was a change suggested by CINCPAC.
 - b. While paragraph 4D states that all property left in Japan by former diplomats is subject to the German Vesting Decree (thus will be taken under control by CPC), paragraph 4E(II) states "View here that storage in U. S. military warehouses might in time create undue responsibilities which might well be avoided by permitting storage at owner's risk". Inasmuch as this does not forbid the storage of property in military warehouses, CPC still desires to store the property under U. S. control. This will preclude the necessity of locating the property and taking it into custody later.
 - c. By paragraph 4B(I) no yen is approved for export. On the initial repatriation in February, repatriates were permitted to carry out yen, within the limits laid down as to the amount of currency allowed. In view of this radio, it is considered that the intent is to prohibit any repatriate from carrying out yen, and our directive to the Japanese Government will be drawn up to this effect.
 3. Provisions of W 81923 were confirmed by JCS Radio WARX 82061, 16 July.
 4. Necessary papers are being prepared for submission to the Chief of Staff.

Repatriation of Margaret Reitzig

1. Reference is made to attached Amembassy, Nanking radio 111204 Z, dated 12 July and to routing slip from DC/S, FEC to G-1.

2. Background of this case is as follows:

a. Subject was deemed to be objectionable and subject to forcible repatriation on grounds of membership in Nazi Party and having been an employee of the German Embassy.

b. Upon receipt of her request for reconsideration of her case re-investigation was made and recommendation submitted to the C/S that she remain objectionable and be repatriated on the second repatriation vessel.

c. Upon Miss Reitzig's personal representation that she had applied for a visa to enter China, decision was made that if she received permission to enter China prior to departure date of repatriation vessel she would be allowed to depart Japan for China.

d. Attached radio was sent in reply to CINCFFE's request that the Amembassy, Nanking determine what action would be taken by the Chinese Government on Miss Reitzig's request. It was pointed out in CINCFFE's radio that CINCFFE had no interest in this matter other than to receive an answer.

e. Diplomatic Section has requested the Chinese Mission in Tokyo to expedite a reply to Miss Reitzig. The Chinese Mission replied that Miss Reitzig's application had been sent to China with the recommendation that it not be favorably considered and that it was doubtful if any reply would be received in the near future.

f. If Miss Reitzig receives permission to enter China prior to departure of the General Black and if she can secure passage to China, she will be allowed to depart Japan for China. However, if Miss Reitzig has not received her visa prior to departure date of the General Black she will be included in the list of objectionable German nationals and will be repatriated.

3. No further action appears necessary pending receipt of further information from Miss Reitzig.

 1. In accordance with instructions contained in routing slip, 13 July 47, from the Chief of Staff, following information is furnished concerning attached newspaper clipping.
 2. No request has been received from Rev. J. Frank Norris for entry Japan of any missionary. Lt. W. R. Lindsey mentioned in the clipping as an Army Chaplain is not stationed in this theater. Rev. Loys Vess is unknown to G-1 or to Religions Division of CI&E as a missionary or missionary applicant.
 3. Information received from Religions Division of CI&E indicates that the "Fundamental Baptists" are an offshoot of the Southern Baptists. The Southern Baptists currently have several missionaries present in Japan under the auspices of Foreign Missions Conference of North America. The Fundamental Baptists were not represented in Japan prior to the war and have had no missionary experience in Japan.
 4. The attached quotation from an article in the Religions Section of Time Magazine, 19 May 47 issue, is presented as further background information on the activities of Rev. J. Frank Norris. It is believed evident from the tenor of the attached article that it is questionable if a missionary effort sponsored by Rev. Norris would be of value in furthering the Christian effort in Japan.
 5. In the event a request is received by the CinC personally for entry of a missionary sponsored by Rev. Norris' group, grounds exist for denying entrance on the basis that his board or church has had no prior missionary effort in Japan.

2. 1. In accordance with instructions from SGS in C/N No. 1 above, following brief of SWNCC 348 as amended by 348/2 and 348/3 is submitted.

2. The main body of SWNCC 348 consists of the staff study leading to the conclusion that an interchange of persons should be allowed between Japan and other countries. This conclusion has been presented to the Far East Commission by the United States member. The conclusions were embodied in a radio to this Headquarters, WAR 81132. This radio states that during the occupation, interchange of persons between Japan and other countries will be allowed for general cultural purposes providing that War, State, SCAP and respective foreign governments approve and such interchange is sponsored (to include finances) by agencies or individuals acceptable to the approving authorities. Such interchange will be for non-military, non-commercial, non-political purposes which will contribute to the democratization of Japan. Entrance of missionaries is subject to provisions of our missionary policy. Communications regarding such interchange will follow established military and governmental channels. A general program for such interchange is responsibility of SCAP with coordination with War and State.

3. JCS recommended amendment in 348/2 to preclude travel to Japan due to current economic conditions. In 348/3 State refuted the general premise of this amendment but compromised to extent of stating that such restriction was only temporary. The United States member of Far East Commission was instructed to so inform Far East Commission. SCAP was informed of this amendment by radio WAR 81255.

4. All communications received by this Headquarters on this subject have been answered. Recommend no further action.

1. 1. Radio has been received from the War Department which clarifies the status and composition of Cooperatives for American Relief in Europe (CARE). This message sent as a result of opinion in War Department that a misunderstanding existed at this Headquarters concerning CARE and its desired operations in Japan.
2. a. Ourad ZX 41565 approved initiation of operations by CARE in this theater and granted clearance for 2 representatives to travel to Japan for the purpose of setting up such operations.
- b. One representative of CARE (Mr Gable) arrived in Japan and on 23 June all interested staff sections attended a conference at which time Mr Gable gave a complete description of the CARE organization and its desired operations in this theater.
- c. As a result of this conference a draft agreement between CARE and SCAP was written by PH&W and circulated to interested staff sections for concurrence. It was the opinion of G-1 that prior to final concurrence being secured from interested staff sections, the agreement should be submitted to JAGD to be screened for legality and correct legal phraseology.
- d. JAGD expressed the opinion that since delivery of a CARE package to a selected individual in Japan would be predicated upon the payment to CARE of the cost of this package by an individual or organization elsewhere, that such operations could be classed as commercial operations.
- e. Upon ascertaining this viewpoint, Mr Gable of CARE mentioned it in a telephone conversation which he had with one of the executives of the CARE organization back in the U.S. The War Department radio cited above is evidently a result of this telephone conversation.
3. a. A clear understanding exists among all interested staff sections as to the exact nature of CARE composition and activity. It is clearly recognized that CARE is a non-profit organization.
- b. It is believed, however, that if CARE were allowed to operate in Japan under the terms of a general agreement rather than

Every effort is being made to expedite issuance of such license.

Reurad WCL 32739, 11 July 47, status and methods of operation of CARE clearly understood here and every effort being made facilitate earliest initiation of CARE program this theater. Term "commercial" applied to CARE only in purely technical and legal sense by JAGD here when draft agreement between SCAP and CARE was reviewed for legality. Since CARE contemplates leasing warehousing facilities and hiring labor from Japanese sources, and engaging in financial transactions with Japanese postal authorities, CARE operations could technically be construed by potential self-seeking interests as constituting commercial activities in Japan.
