













PREFACE.

THREE articles, in relation to the Schuremans of New Jersey, were prepared by the present writer, in the year 1879, at the request of the editor of the New Brunswick Times, and they appeared in that journal. They were subsequently printed, in pamphlet form, in California. Thus the subject was revived, and, at the expense of Mr. Melanchthon Freeman Schureman, of Metuchen, New Jersey, a larger pamphlet was published. Much of the information it contained was at second hand, and an examination of some original records revealed serious errors. Recourse was then had to all original records that were accessible, and an extensive correspondence was had with members of the family, and this book is the outcome of such research and correspondence.

Four portraits are given in this work. That of James Schureman naturally appears, for he was the most conspicuous of the family in public life, and one of his wife is given in connection with his. None is extant of Jacobus, the founder of the family, nor of his sons, John and Ferdinand. Melanchthon Freeman Schureman's is given, as that of a representative man, and because his interest and liberality made the publication of the first edition possible. The Compiler gives his own, from the consideration that persons who care for the book would like to see the face of one whose interest in the subject, and whose patient enterprise, have resulted in the gathering of the material, and framing it into this genealogy.

INTRODUCTION.

THIS book relates to Jacobus Schuurman, of the neighborhood of New Brunswick, New Jersey, 1720, and his descendants. The pronunciation of the name has been, always, Skureman: the spelling, in the older Dutch, was u e r, which was changed to u u r; and the name appears in Utrecht, Netherlands, with that spelling, at the present time. The name of Jacobus appears with the duplicate u; and his son John was persistent in that spelling, to the time of his death, 1795; but James, son of John, gave up the struggle, and allowed his name to be Anglicized, by the use of u r e. A letter is in existence, from James Schureman to John Schuurman, in which the former uses the English spelling, but conforms to the Dutch, in writing his father's name.

In Germany, about the year 1300, appears Hermann Scureman, who held in fee a hide of land at Scheuren, near Dortmund, Arnsberg, Westphalia. Later on, Johann Schuremann held the same, and other possessions. In 1371, at Arnsberg, Johann Schuyrmann was enfeoffed of various lands, among them the "Manse at Holland," for himself, as well as for his brothers, Everhard and Hinrich. From this line was descended the famous Anna Maria Schuerman, distinguished as a linguist, scholar, theologian, and accomplished woman.* The shield of this family was of Norman shape, argent, party per pale, with a label in chief, a fillet with four pendant points: i. e., it was a white, oval shield, with two horns and a peak at the top, and divided by a perpendicular line. The fillet and pendants indicate that it was the shield of the eldest son—not of the head of the family. Descent from this line is not claimed, for it has not been traced.

The name in this line is found also at Antwerp, Cologne, and Utrecht. On the night of the 4th of October, 1564, Friderich von

Schurman, with his wife, who was of the family of the Barons of Lumey, Counts of la Marck, left Antwerp for Cologne, abandoning position and property, rather than give up his evangelical faith. On that day, the Duchess of Parma, Regent of the Netherlands, had caused to be stabbed and burnt, Christopher Smith, known as the Monk Fabricius, from the monastery at Bruges. Frederich, their son, in 1602, married Eva von Harf, of a noble family of Cologne. They had four children, the youngest of whom, Wilhelm, died in his sixth year. The eldest was Heinrich Frederich, born 1603, died 1632. The second, Johann Gottschalk, was born in 1605, and died in 1664. He was an evangelical minister, and was carried by his zeal into Germany, and in 1661-62 to Basle, Switzerland, but returned to Utrecht. Anna Maria was born the 5th of November, 1607, and died single, in 1678, at Wieuward, in Friesland, as a member of the Labadist community. Her father had died in 1623, and the mother removed the family to Utrecht, probably, because of the Thirty Years' War, which was devastating Germany. Anna had, at Utrecht, an elegant cabinet-edel pand-which was the resort of the learned and titled persons of Europe. The affianced Queen of Poland, Louise Marie Gonzaga, with an escort, called informally upon her; and, in conversation, she responded in Italian to the Bishop of Orange; in French to the Queen's secretary; in Greek to M. Corrade, the Queen's physician; and she carried on a discussion on some point in theology, in the Latin tongue. It has not been ascertained whether either of her brothers was married.*

In the United States of America, there is a line of Schuremans, earlier than the one which is the subject of this work. They are assumed to be descendants of Harmen Schuerman; of whom the record following is found:—"1649, June 3. Release of Harman Scheurman of all claim against Cornelis Maerson, deceased, on account of the purchase of a tract of land on Manhattan Island." † The correct spelling of this grantor's name would have been Harmen Schuerman. His children seem to have been known, at first, as Harmenzen; and

one of them is assumed to have been "Frederick Harmenzen, van Bremen," who was a church member at New Amsterdam, in a list which began with 1649; and the wife of such Frederick was Christina Jans, who was received to church membership the 30th of August, 1674. They had children baptized, 1659-74. The name appears, later, at New Rochelle; from which place members of the family migrated to St. John, New Brunswick, in 1783, and thence spread into Prince Edward Island in 1784, in the person of William, who had married Jane Bonnet, in 1768, and from them is descended Dr. Jacob Gould Schurman, President of Cornell University. The British Provincials, of the new residence of the Schuermans, were ignorant of the Dutch language: and the e was dropped from the name, and the pronunciation was softened into Shureman.*

FAMILY I.

I. Jacobus Schuurman: married Antje Terheun. He settled at Three Mile Run, near New Brunswick, New Jersey; and, no doubt, he and his wife were members of the Dutch Church at Three Mile Run, and the record of baptism of their children was there probably, and the burying-place of that church is supposed to have received their bodies. The wife Antje was daughter of Albert Terheun, of Flatbush, L. I.; and the marriage was in 1720, or early in 1721.

He was a schoolmaster, and voorleser, or prelector, and came, as such, in the company of Rev. Theodorus Jacobus Frielinghuysen, on the ship King George, Capt. Goelet. The latter preached in New York, 17th January, 1720; the arrival was, therefore, in that year, or late in the year previous. He entered at once on the duties of his pastorate over the churches on the Raritan, to which he had been appointed while he was in Holland, and settled down at Three Mile Run, and married Eve Terheun, sister to the wife of Schuurman. The Church at Raritan was organized in 1696; the one at Three Mile Run about the year 1703; and the one at New Brunswick, known as the "Church of Laurenz Brook by the River," in the year 1717. The organization at Three Mile Run was abandoned about the year 1753.* No records of this church are in existence, except possibly incorporated with those of New Brunswick. early records of the Six Mile Run church perished in the fire which consumed the house of David Nevius, (18).

Frielinghuysen and Schuurman lived with Hendrick Reinersz. They settled near the small church building, then standing at Three

Mile Run. The graveyard, still in good condition, is near by. "Jacobus Schuürman" was received to church membership, on confession, the 15th of April 1720. He had some facility in writing Dutch verse, which he used in the defense of his pastor, from worldly attacks. He was chorister, and taught a school in the Dutch language.* Schuurman's first child, Ann, was born 10, Oct., 1721, if the statement of her age, and the date of her death, upon her tombstone, are correct. He had a child baptized 4, Apl., 1735, after which his name is not found; unless he was the "Jacob Schuurman," who had a daughter, Maria, baptized 13th Jan., 1755. The mother's name was Maria. She was, probably, a Van Voorhees. But this Jacob may have been son of Jacobus: the record of births and baptisms of the children of the latter is incomplete; probably some of the baptisms were recorded at Three Mile Run, or Six Mile Run, now called Franklin Park.

Children, (all born at Three Mile Run, probably):

2. Anne², b. 10, October, 1721, for the inscription upon her tombstone, in the yard of the First Dutch Church at New Brunswick, N. J., reads: "In memory of Ann Schureman who departed this life, May 25, 1800, aged 78 yrs, 7 mos, 15 days." This stone stands beside that of the widow of her brother Ferdinand. She was often a baptismal witness. (This inscription was copied, and was given to the Compiler, by Mrs. Sluyter, as if it were that of her grandmother, Ann, wife of John Schuurman. Hence the error in the first edition of this genealogy.)

3. Jacoba, baptized 2, February, 1724: ‡ died before 1760: she was

first wife of Archibald Thomson. FAMILY 2.

FAMILY 2.

Jacoba Schuurman [3], (Jacobus¹), baptized 2, February, 1724: died before 1760. She was admitted to church membership, the 9, November, 1750, as the wife of Archibald Thomson, who had been admitted, on confession, 10, August, 1741. He was of Scotch blood, and was, probably, of the Perth Amboy line. Perhaps he was son of John, a schoolmaster and resident of New Brunswick, who was named in the will of his father, John, dated 24, June, 1732, the executors of which qualified 4, October, 1733. The will directed the burial of his body in the church grounds at Piscataway. It mentioned also the testator's wife, Mary, and his son, Benjamin, then in Dublin, Ireland.* Persistent efforts have been made, without success, to determine the ancestry of this Archibald.†

Frederick's second wife, Emma Cecilia Combe, left a daughter Emma, afterwards widow of Rev. Louis Germond, pastor of the Reformed Church of Latry, Vaud, Switzerland. FAMILY 3.

Margaret Schuurman [4], (Jacobus'), born 27, September, 1726, bap. 9, October, recorded Margareitha Schuerman: died 4, August, 1745: married, 13, October, 1743, Petrus Vredenburgh, Sen., born 30, July, 1721, died 26, July, 1810, son of William and Catharine [Schott] Vredenburgh, and g. g. s. of Willem Van Vredenburch, an immigrant in May, 1658, in the Gilded Beaver.*

Child, (born at New Brunswick):

13. Petrus Vredenburgh: born 14, July, 1745: died 24, August, 1823: m. 17, December, 1772, Margaret Schuurman (14). Fam-ILY 8.

FAMILY 4.

John Schuurman [5], (Jacobus¹), born 27, February, 1729: died 6, July, 1795: married February, 1751, Antje De Riemer. His tombstone, at the rear of the First Dutch Church, New Brunswick, reads: Died July 6, 1795, aged 66 years, 4 months, and 9 days: his birth, therefore, must have been as here given. He maintained the spelling with a duplicate u and an r, and a letter is in existence, dated 1st December 1790, addressed to him as "John Schuurman Esq"," by his son James, who signed himself "Js Schureman," with the Anglicized spelling.

Antje De Riemer was daughter of Isaac and Antje (Woertman) De Riemer, and was baptized at New York City, 4, October, 1721, and she died in the year 1800. She was received to church membership at New Brunswick, on confession, 9, October, 1750, as the widow (wedeuwe) of Peter Stryker. The marriage bond, at Trenton, for her second marriage, reads 22 February, 1750, according to the legal calendar—meaning, in popular usage, 1751. Her Will, as widow of John Schureman, of New Brunswick, was dated 16, October, 1795, and proved 23, July, 1800, and is of record at Trenton. She directed the division of her estate between her daughters, Ann Van "Duersen," wife of William; Jane Thomson, wife of John; Elizabeth Nevius, wife of David; her son, James Schure-

man; and her grandsons, John and Peter Vredenburgh, children of her daughter Margaret, deceased. On the 2nd of May, 1803, William Van Deursen and James Schureman, of the City of New Brunswick, and John Thomson, of the State of New York, as executors, conveyed to Johanna Dumont, a house and lot on the southerly side of New Street.*

John Schuurman settled in New Brunswick, where he had a store-house on the Raritan River, at the foot of Dutch, now Schureman Street. It does not appear when he left Three Mile Run. A map, made in 1766, has John Schureman's name on the north side of the road, half-way between Middlebush and Millstone: but he may

have owned without occupying that land.

He was admitted to church membership at New Brunswick, 2, November, 1752, and was chosen Deacon, along with Archibald Thomson, 25, October, 1754. Their successors were chosen, 13, April, 1757. The churches of the Raritan group had been incorporated, 7, June, 1753. The church building, which was then standing, at the corner of Burnett and Dutch Streets, had been erected about 1714: and, in 1717, it was determined that it should be "known as belonging to the people of Laurenz Brook by the River": and that the people of Six Mile Run and Ten Mile Run, who were but one congregation, should be at liberty to erect a church building at either place, and to have their own consistory: but they were to remain one spiritual body with the one of Laurenz Brook: and the two consistories were to meet as one, on matters of importance. John Schuurman was an Elder of the church in 1765, and was appointed chairman of the building committee in September of that year. The new building was erected in a new location, and was occupied in the autumn of 1767. The old lot was sold to John Schuurman. He was Elder again in 1793, and on the 24th of August, he signed the call for Rev. Dr. Ira Condict, and he headed the subscription list. His successor in the eldership, Peter Vredenburgh, Sen., was chosen 5, April, 1795. "In the church he was conspicuous for an unaffected piety, fervent zeal, and fruitful benevolence." † He was a subscriber, 6, March, 1777, to the fund to meet the last payment on the parsonage at Millstone, and his subscription was

£2.5.0.* He was added to the Faculty of Queens College, in 1782.† He was Trustee of the College, 1782–95, and its Treasurer 1780–90, 1791–95. In the minutes, his name, as well as that of his son James, appears with the duplicated u and the r, without an e. And in the minutes of the Consistory his name is spelled the same way, 12,

March, 1794, 5, April, 1795, and 2, May, 1795.

John Schuurman was active and influential in the Revolutionary struggle. A few of the freeholders of Middlesex County met, at the Court-House, New Brunswick, 3, January, 1775, in pursuance of a notice of the 20 of December. They agreed that cities, towns, and districts should each choose a Committee of Observation and Inspection, who should meet at New Brunswick, 16, January, and choose a Committee of Correspondence, for a limited period. John and Ferdinand Schureman, from New Brunswick, David Williamson from South Brunswick, and Jonathan Combs from Windsor, were of the Committee of Observation: and Jonathan Combs and David Williamson were of the Committee of Correspondence. A Provincial Congress assembled at Trenton, 23, May, 1775. Among the deputies were Col. John Schureman and Col. David Williamson, who were members also of the Provincial House of Assembly. A Provincial Convention had met at New Brunswick 21-23, July, 1774, and had appointed a general Committee of Correspondence for the whole Province, with authority to call a Provincial Congress, whenever they should think it necessary. News of the Battle of Lexington had been received, 24, April, and on 2, May, the Committee had met at New Brunswick, and called the Congress. On the 3. June, the Congress adjourned to the 5, August, after having appointed a Committee of Correspondence, with authority to reconvene the Congress: John Schureman was of this committee. The Congress reassembled on 5, August, and Lucas Schenck appeared in place of David Williamson. They provided for the election of deputies, on 21, September, to a Provincial Congress to be held at Trenton, on the 3, October. On the 17, August, the Congress adjourned to the 20, September, after having appointed a Committee of Safety, to exercise their powers during the recess: John Schureman was of this Committee of Safety. The Congress met, pursuant to adjournment, 20, September. new Congress met 3-25, October. It was the policy of the times to change the deputies frequently; partly to extend the responsibility,

and partly to prevent engrossment of power by a few persons. Schuurman's storehouses were burned by the British, a negro and horses stolen, and his merchandise carried off, in 1776-77, to the value of \pounds 378. 0. 5. He joined in making an appraisement of blankets, which was laid before the Provincial Congress, by John Dennis, as follows:

New Brunswick, Feb., 6, 1776.

In pursuance to an order of the provincial congress, directed to us the subscribers for appraising all the blankets at New Brunswick, we find as follows:

"He was a very estimable member of society. Such was the respect entertained for the endowments of his head, and the excellent qualities of his heart, that he was frequently elected a member of the legislature, and was appointed one of the judges of the county. The charge of the education of his grandson and namesake, devolved chiefly on this pious and venerable grandfather, whose instructions and prayers, no doubt, contributed to improve the good dispositions which grace had implanted in his heart. At this period, the respected father was called much from home, in the public service of his country." †

Ferdinand Schuurman [6], (Jacobus1), born about 1731, it is supposed: died before June, 1782. Perhaps his death and burial were at some other place, while the British were in occupation of New Brunswick. His wife was Eleanor Voorhees. described as of Griggstown, Somerset County, cordwainer, in a deed dated 22, April, 1760, whereby he conveyed to Barnardus Gerritsen land at Middlebush, bounded on two sides by other land of Ferdinand.* He had five children, whose baptisms were recorded at Six Mile Run, 1754-63, and three at New Brunswick, 1766-72. an Elder of the Dutch Church at New Brunswick, 12, September, 1765, when Philip French conveyed the land for a new church. was probably a member of the Six Mile Run Church until about 1764. He took a determined part in the Revolutionary struggle, as well as his brother John. The freeholders of Middlesex County, who met at New Brunswick, 3. January, 1775, chose him as one of the Committee of Observation and Inspection for New Brunswick, who should meet with the others at New Brunswick, 16, January, to choose a Committee of Correspondence for a limited time.†

His widow, "Neeltje Schuurman, widow of Ferdinant Schuurman," was received to church membership, on confession, 28, June, 1782. Her tombstone, in the yard of the First Dutch Church, New Brunswick, reads, "Eleanor, wid. of Ferdinand Schuurman, dep. this life July, 29, 1809, in her 89th year." Beside this tomb is that of her sister-in-law, Miss Ann Schuurman. Persistent efforts have been made, without success, to ascertain the date and place of death of this Ferdinand.

Captain John Thomson [9], (Jacoba 3 Schuurman, Jacobus1), married 30, June, 1766, Jane, daughter of Pieter and Antje (De Riemer) Strycker. (Antje's second husband was John Schuurman [5].) Johannes Thomson and Jannetje Stryker, his wife, were received, on confession, to church membership 2, October, 1772.*

Jane Stryker's ancestry seems to have been as follows, Jan Strycker, b. 1615, died before 1697, came from Ruinen, Drenthe, Netherlands, in 1652, and was probably in New Amsterdam until 1654, and then settled at Flatbush, Long Island. who was the mother of all his children.

His seventh child, Pieter Janse, b. 1, Nov., 1653, d. 11, June, 1741, m. 29, May, 1681, Annetje Barends or Joosten. He was on the assessment roll of Flatbush, 1683: on the patent 1685: took the oath as native in 1687: was on the census in 1698: Capt. of Militia, 1689, as per p. 190, Calendar of English MSS.: on 1, June, 1710 purchased four thousand acres of land in Somerset County, N. J., and his sons Jacob and Barend, and the four sons—Pieter, Johannes, Abraham, and Jacobus—of his son Jan, settled on that land. Will dated 13, April, 1729, proved 27, May, 1742, recorded Surrogate's office, N. Y., Lib. 14 p. 251.

Jan (Pieterse), third child—the first two died in infancy—of Pieter Janse, b. 6, August, 1684, d. 17, August, 1770, lived at Flatbush: m. (1) in 1704 Margarita Schenck, who died in August, 1721: m. (2) 11, February, 1722, Sarah Bergen, bp. 2, June, 1678, d. 15

July, 1760.

Pieter (Janse) oldest child of Jan, b. 14, September, 1705, m. Antje de Riemer, bap. 4, Oct., 1721, Dutch Church New York

He was, in 1767, the only navigator between Amboy and New York; and, in 1775, he commanded a packet plying between those places. The British carried off his sloop of thirty tons. He was First Lieutenant of Capt. John Lyle's (Lyell) Company, of the Third Regiment of Militia of Middlesex County.* It is said that he was made a prisoner, at the capture of Fort Washington, 16, November, 1776. If so, he must have been exchanged very soon, for in the same year, or early in the one following, he was captured, along with his cousin, James Schureman [16], at Laurenz Brook, and was confined in the Sugar-House prison, New York, where he received kindnesses from the Royalist, Philip Kisuyck, whose wife was a Jannetje

City. She was received to church membership, as his wedeuwe, 9, November, 1750, and she m. (2), in February, 1751, John Schuurman. Pieter removed to Somerset County, New Jersey, in 1730. His children were: Jane, the date of birth or baptism not discovered—married Capt. John Thomson: Antje, baptized 2, June, 1745, New Brunswick, married William Van Deursen: and Lydia, baptized 3, July, 1747, Raritan, and not traced further. She is not mentioned in the Will of her mother, dated 1795. William and Antje (Stryker) Van Deursen had a son Staats (Stawts or Stahts), baptized 13, June, 1773, New Brunswick; graduated at Queens College, 1791; married Joanna Schuyler, (see note to Family 9,) daughter of Abraham and Alida (Voorhees) Schuyler, and had a son William, the well-known physician, of New Brunswick, who married Eleanor Hendrickson. Jacobus Stryker, b. 24, Aug., 1688, third son—the second died in infancy—of Pieter Janse and Annetje Barends, is supposed to have married Annetje Vanderbeek 17, December, 1710. He removed from Flatbush, to Somerset County, N. J., and settled on land on Millstone River, purchased by his father. He is supposed to be the Jacob whose children were baptized at New Brunswick, with the mother's name Jannetje, namely: Jan., 12, June, 1720; Jacobus, 23, May, 1725; and Lisabeth, 16, July, 1727. (This Elizabeth may have been the second wife of Archibald Thomson.) This Jacobus, baptized in 1725, is supposed to have been the one who married Sarah Messelaer, and to have had children baptized at New Brunswick, namely: Jannetje, 14, September, 1755, m. 12, Oct., 1772, N. Y., Francis Cowenhoven; Johannes, bap. N. Y. 15, November, 1758, m. in N. Y.; and Peter (Rev.), b. 23, Dec., 1763, bap.

25, Dec., N. Y. m. 11, June, 1787, Sarah Barkeeloo.

Stryker, which kindness he recognized in the naming of his youngest son. These prisoners escaped, soon after, and joined the American Army at Morris Plains.*

The Captain's daughter, Jane, had married Conrad Ten Eyck, somewhere between 1790 and 1796, and they were living at Schenectady, where Ten Eyck was tutor in the High School. The Captain bought land at Aalplaats (Eel place), four miles from Schenectady; but did not remove to it at once, because he had not yet disposed of his land in New Jersey. This land, in New York, was occupied, in the summer of 1798, by John Thomson and wife, and Eliza Thomson, children of the Captain. The Captain, and the remainder of his family, took possession in the autumn. This land must then have been included in Albany County, for the Captain is described, in a deed in 1801, as of Albany County. In February, 1802, he removed to land that he had purchased at Fonda's Bosch (woods), now Broadalbin (Breadalbane), Fulton County, some twenty miles from Schenectady, where he probably died. This land was on the east side of Fonda's Brook, about two miles from the Bosch. A stream of water ran through the land, on which he erected a sawmill, lime-kiln, and grist-mill: the last became a paper-mill, and was consumed by fire. The Captain became financially embarrassed, and his health was poor, and his son-in-law, Rev. Dr. Perrine, bought the land, but allowed the Captain to occupy it, and his son, Isaac S., afterwards. The latter long afterwards bought the land, and, after him, it was occupied by his son, Samuel B. Thomson.

The Captain's widow was living at Auburn, in February, 1827, with her daughter, Mrs. Perrine, and there Mrs. Catharine (Schureman) Wynkoop [51] called upon her, and wrote of her as "Aunt Jane," that is, half-sister of her father. She died at Broadalbin, where she had been living with her son Isaac.

The Captain and his wife, in 1801, made two deeds of land in New Brunswick.†

George Thomson [10], (Jacoba 'Schuurman, Jacobus'), baptized 21, July, 1751, New Brunswick, and recorded "Joris Thomson": married, with a license, dated 11, December, 1778, Trenton, Maria Williamson, daughter of David and Eleanor (Schuyler) Williamson. They lived at Rhode Hall, near Cranberry, New Jersey. George Thompson was a private, from Middlesex County, in the Revolutionary Army.† His widow married Col. Thomas McDowell.

James Schureman [16], (John⁵, Jacobus ¹), born 12, February, 1756, baptized New Brunswick, 15, February, and recorded "Jacobus Schuurman": died 22, January, 1824, at New Brunswick: married 28, January, 1778, Eleanor Williamson, born 16, January, 1761, died 15, July, 1823, daughter of David and Eleanor (Schuyler) Williamson.*

Eleanor's sister, Maria, married George Thomson [10]: Jane Maria married John Voorhees:

He was graduated at Queens College, now Rutgers, and his name appears in the Catalogue in the lustrum 1771-75. Dr. Steele says that his graduation was about 1773, and that he was an accurate scholar.* The Committee of Safety of New Jersey, on the 10, January, 1776, appointed him Second Lieutenant, in Captain John Taylor's Company, in Col. John Neilson's battalion of minutemen.

The Provincial Congress of New Jersey, adopted an ordinance, on the 29th February, 1776, directing the incorporation of the minutemen into the militia companies of the districts in which they resided, respectively. This was because of the depletion of the ranks of the minutemen, by enlistments into the Continental service.† The records of the Adjutant-General's Office, Trenton, show that Schureman was a Second Lieutenant in the 2d Regiment of militia, Middlesex County, but do not give the date of appointment. John Neilson was colonel of this regiment.

On the 14th June, 1776, Schureman was appointed Lieutenant in Col. David Forman's Battalion, of Gen. Nathaniel Heard's Brigade of Jerseymen, known as "new levies," or "five-months-men." It seems that there were ensigns but no second-lieutenants in this organization. As Schureman is called "captain," by Dr. Steele, and by the Cyclopædia of American Biography, it is probable that he was at some time in command of the company, and so obtained the title, by courtesy. Dr. Steele says further that it was chiefly owing to his example, and his pleadings at public meetings, that the company, to which he belonged, was formed at New Brunswick, and that they served with great credit in the Battle of Long Island. An effort was made, by the compiler of this genealogy, to trace the services of this company, battalion, and brigade, and the result will be given here.

Catharine married John Perrine: and Lydia married Stephen Johnes. Her aunts married as follows: Mary, Matthew La Rue; and Catharine, John Voorhees: and her uncle, Abraham Schuyler, Judge, married Alechi (or Alida) Voorhees, and had children, as follows: Alida, married to Andrew Ten Eyck; Ellen, married to John Clarke; Christina, married to Peter Thomson [27]; Joanna, married to Staats Van Deursen; Abraham, who died unmarried; and Catharine, married to — Lyell.

The Continental Congress, on the 3rd of June, 1776, called for thirteen thousand eight hundred men, of which the contingent from New Jersey would be thirty-three hundred men, to re-enforce the army in New York, and to serve until the first day of December. The Provincial Congress of New Jersey, on the 14th of June, determined that its quota should be raised by voluntary enlistment, in one brigade of five battalions, to consist of forty companies of seventy-eight men each. Forman's Battalion had Thomas Henderson for lieutenant-colonel, and Samuel F. Parker for major, and consisted of four companies from Middlesex County, and four from Monmouth. The arrival of the forces of General Sir William Howe, off Sandy Hook, caused the marching of this brigade, in an incomplete state, on the 25th of June. On the 8th of July, Gen. Nathanial Greene ordered Colonel Forman's "Regiment," which he called "Jersey new levies," to occupy Fort Box and the Oblong Redoubt: it seems that only a portion were so used. The former fort took its name from Brigade Major Daniel Box, of Nixon's Brigade: it was on Gowanus Cove, at the right of the defenses of Brooklyn. Next to it was Fort Greene: then the Oblong Redoubt: then Fort Putnam, on the Waalbogt. On the 4th of August, a detail was ordered from Col. Forman's "Regiment," to work, on the day following, on Fort Sterling, which was on Columbia Heights, south of the Brooklyn Ferry. On the 9th of August, Brigadier-General Greene became Major-General, and his old Brigade fell to Colonel John Nixon, promoted. On the same day, the remaining battalions of Heard's Brigade were ordered to Long Island, to re-enforce General Greene. On the 16th of August, Generals Nixon and Heard, of Greene's Division, were ordered to furnish a "fatigue party from their brigades, and to form the necessary lines from Fort Box to Fort Putnam." Early in August, Forman's Battalion had been rated at three hundred and seventy-two men; but other men may have joined before the battle.

The defenses on Long Island had been planned by General Charles Lee, and General Greene had continued the work upon them, and had made himself familiar with the topography. At the time of the fighting, he was sick and absent, and the command of his division, consisting of the brigades of Nixon and Heard, appears to have devolved upon General Nixon, either by seniority or by direct assignment. On the night of the 23rd of August, the battalions of Forman and Johnson were sent to the coast road. Forman's Battalion, on the morning of the 27th of August, was at Fort Box. This fort seems

to have been of diamond shape, and on or near the line of Pacific Street, Brooklyn, a short distance southeasterly from Bond Street. After the battle of the 27th of August, and by the 2nd of September. the army was recast into three grand divisions, or corps, under Generals Israel Putnam, Joseph Spencer, and William Heath. Greene's brigades, on account of his continued sickness, were assigned temporarily to Spencer, and they were on the line from Hoorn's Hoek to Harlem. About the 5th of October Greene was placed in command in New Jersey, near the Hudson River. On the 15th of November he ordered Heard's Brigade to advance rapidly to the relief of Fort Washington: perhaps they were involved in the catastrophe. In November, Heard's Brigade was with Washington, at Newark beyond the Passaic. Colonel Forman was detached to repress a threatened insurrection in Monmouth County.*

Early in the year 1777, Schureman, with his cousin John Thomson [9] (previously a sea captain), was captured by the British cavalry, on Laurenz Brook, at what was afterwards Bergen Mill, three miles south of New Brunswick. They were confined, for a short time, in the guard-house, at New Brunswick, and then were transferred to the "Sugar House Prison," in New York City, on the southerly side of Liberty Street, east of, and near to Nassau Street. Philip Kisuyck, a Royalist, and a connection by marriage, -his wife was a Stryker,-furnished them with money, in order that they might They bribed the guard to give them the privilege of the yard; and one night, having bestowed upon the guard liquor containing laudanum, they dug their way through the wall, and escaped to what was then the upper part of the city, and in a small boat, with one oar, they paddled over to Pouel's Hoek, whence they went to the Patriot army, at Morristown.

On the 26th of October, 1779, Lieut.-Col. John Graves Simcoe, of the Queen's Rangers, made a foray from Amboy, and burned stores at Bound Brook, whale-boats and the church at Raritan, and the court-house at Hillsborough, now Millstone. Word was sent to New Brunswick, and Col. John Neilson advanced with the 2nd Regiment of Middlesex militia to Raritan Landing, and detached

Captain Moses Guest, with thirty-five men, to harass the foe on the march. Guest set an ambush, and Simcoe's horse was shot and fell. and Simcoe was stunned. A bayonet thrust would have finished him, but Schureman turned aside the weapon, and took Simcoe prisoner.*

He was a representative in the General Assembly of New Jersey, in 1783, 1784, 1785, 1788, and a member of the Senate and Council, in 1808, 1810, and 1812. In the year last named he was Vice-President of the Council, which office corresponded with the presidency of the Senate.I

In September, 1786, he was one of the three delegates from New Tersey, to the Convention of delegates from six States, which met at Annapolis. This convention was proposed by Virginia, to formulate better trade relations. It recommended a new call, with a view to representation of the States which had failed to send delegates : and then adjourned. The constitutional convention followed.§

On the 7th of November, 1786, he was elected to the Congress the Confederation, from New Jersey. He served as such for two years, 1786-88. He was a Representative in the first Congress of the United States, March 4, 1789-March 3, 1791; and in the fifth Congress, May 15, 1797-March 3, 1799. He succeeded John Rutherford in the Senate of the United States, December 3, 1799, and served until 26th of February, 1801, when he resigned, because of the impending installation of Jefferson, as President. He reappeared as a Representative, and served in the Thirteenth Congress, May 24, 1813-March 15, 1815.

Schureman was a merchant at New Brunswick, and his house and store were on Burnet Street, at the foot of Schureman Street, which was re-named from him. He was Mayor of the city, 1801-13, and 1821-24. While he held the office, he deemed it necessary to tear down a building, to stay a conflagration, and he shouted through a

trumpet,—"Down with that building!" There was hesitation; but some one said, "That's Schureman's voice," and the building was torn down forthwith.

His name appears as Elder of the Dutch Church, 15, September, 1817, and 18, April, 1819, to fill vacancies. He was trustee of Queens College, 1782-1824; Secretary of the Board, 1784-93; and Treasurer, 1795-1813; and his name appears in the minutes with the duplicate u and an r. But he signed his name with the letters u r e.

Rev. Dr. Isaac Ferris, who, in his student days, was an inmate of Schureman's house, said of him: "Mr. James Schureman was a noble specimen of a man, highly intelligent and judicious, and possessed of general influence, and of large and liberal views. He had seen much of public life, in honorable positions, and was qualified for the leading place which others assigned him." *

He purchased, in 1783, a place at One Mile Run, which remained in the family more than one hundred years, and was occupied, in succession, by his sons James and William, and by James, son of William.

Mr. Schureman was a man of native dignity, of some reserve, and of prompt and determined energy. A biographical sketch of him is given in Appleton's Cyclopædia of American Biography.

A portrait of him, with the date "1806" on the back, is in the possession of the Compiler; also a companion portrait of his wife. They are supposed to have been painted by Bass Otis, or Washington Allston. His lacks the right eye, which he had lost with smallpox. A connected copy of the two portraits is given on the page opposite. Children, (all except John, born at New Brunswick):

In the year 1819, in the course of a revival, he preached a free and unlimited atonement, and caused a stir in his church: the consistory, to bring the matter to a head, and quiet it, laid the subject before classis, which declined to discipline him, holding that there was room, within the church, for a difference of opinion on the subject, and their action was sustained by the Particular Synod.*

"They were among the most self-denying, earnest, and efficient missionaries of their day."

John Schureman, Rev. Dr. [43], (James, 16 John, 5 Jacobus 1), born 19, October, 1778, at a place near New Brunswick, N. J., to which his parents had retired, when the British occupied New Brunswick; baptism recorded at New Brunswick, 15, November, 1778, "Schuurman": died 18 May, 1818, at New Brunswick, of typhoid fever; married 11, May, 1802, Julia Anne Conover, born 11 July 1781, died 24, May, 1834, daughter of Col. Elias Conover, of Monmouth, N. J., and of Anne Fish, of Long Island. The name Conover was, originally, Koenhoven.

The Doctor's "father was called much from home in the public service of his country, and the charge of the son's education devolved chiefly on his pious and venerable grandfather." He was graduated from Queens College, 3, September, 1795, and studied theology with Rev. Dr. John H. Livingston, at New York, and was licensed in 1801: he was pastor at Bedminster, N. J., 1801-07; of the Hillsborough Church, at Millstone, 1807-09: the Collegiate Church, N. Y., 1809-11: and the New Brunswick Church 1813-15. He had never been in robust health, and the pastoral charge at New York was too much for his physical strength; so he accepted the Vice-Presidency of Queens College in 1811, and retained it until his death. He was professor of Moral Philosophy and Belles-Lettres, 1813-18, and also of Ecclesiastical History, and Pastoral Theology, in the Seminary, from 1815 to 1818. He was one of the trustees of the College from 1800 until 1818. The College of New Jersey, as well as Queens, made him A.M., in 1801, and Columbia College in 1816 conferred on him the degree of S. T. D. While he was pastor of the church at New Brunswick, he was instrumental in healing discords, which had existed for some time: but feeble health compelled him to give up that pastorate. His characteristics were, amiability, solidity, and Christian discretion; and he was greatly beloved and trusted. He was simple, clear, direct, and logical, and he sustained himself among some of the most popular ministers of New York City. He was rising in usefulness, influence, and reputation, at the time of his death.*

subsequently, went with General Lovell to California. His portrait, in his uniform, life size, is in the possession of his sister. "He possessed talents of an uncommon order, and served with great ability in the campaign against Mexico, and received promotion for his gallant services in that country. While attached to the military post at Los Angeles, Cal., he won all hearts by his amiability, his kind and gentle nature, and his upright bearing as a man. In all the relations of life, he was frank, manly, and just. His latter end was calm and peaceful as his nature."

Catharine [51], (James, 16 John, 5 Jacobus 1), born 10, February, 1795, baptized 29, March, New Brunswick: died 18, May, 1847, of consumption, at One Mile Run, New Brunswick: married 10, August 1825, at Claverack, N. Y., Rev. Richard Wynkoop, born 16, December, 1798, at New York, died 5, April, 1842, at Hagerstown, Md., of congestion of the bowels, son of Peter and Margaret (Quackenbos) Wynkoop, and grandson of Judge Dirck and Tjaatje (Wynkoop) Wynkoop. The Judge was an active and trusted Revolutionary patriot, in Ulster County, N. Y. His wife's name would be Anglicized as Charity; but it appears only in its Dutch form, and the provincials pronounced it Chawchee. Catharine, in 1843, returned to New Brunswick. She was a woman of great calmness, good intelligence, and excellent memory, assisting her husband with chapter and verse of Scripture passages. A good miniature likeness of her is in the possession of her son, painted by an amateur, who did not have equal success with her husband's.

Wynkoop was graduated at Columbia College, in 1819: was at the New Brunswick Seminary, 1819–22: finished his theological studies with Rev. Dr. Robert Mac Cartee, N. Y.: was licensed 5, April, 1826, by the Second Presbytery of New York (Associate Reformed): was Synodical missionary of the Dutch Church, at Cato, Cayuga county, N. Y., 29 October, 1826–31, January, 1827, and 1–25 April 1827, when he furnished a substitute, who was accepted: pastor of the General Assembly Pres. church at Yorktown, formerly Krompond hamlet, Westchester county, N. Y., 14, June, 1827–16, April, 1834: pastor of a church of the same denomination at Hagerstown, Md.,

25, June 1834, until his death. Under his lead, the church returned to the Associate Reformed connection, 6, March, 1838. He possessed great mental power; was keen in analysis, convincing in argument, and effective in ridicule, and was ready and playful in conversation. His discourses were never written out. He was six feet in height, broad in the shoulders, quick in his movements, with supple and enduring muscles. His face was full, and his eyes were bright, and of very dark hue.*

her husband, she made her home with her children. She was an intelligent woman, and an interesting correspondent. To her interest and industry we are indebted for much material used in this compilation.

Sluyter was graduated at New Brunswick Seminary in 1815: pastor at Claverack and Hillsdale, 1816-25, as associate to Rev. John G. Gebhard, who died in 1826: Claverack, 1825-42: Claverack 1st and 2nd, in 1842: Claverack 1st, 1843. Having some of his Sabbaths free, he preached at Ghent also, for seven years. He was zealous in the organization of new churches, and is credited with the forming of the one at Hudson. His ministry was abundantly blessed with the increase of the church, and he labored energetically, in preaching, visiting, and conversing. He was distinguished as a revivalist, and took part in six extensive revivals. He had a fine presence, and a military bearing, and he was a good singer. He was Chaplain of the old 47th Regiment, with rank from 31, August, 1831, under commission, dated 5, August, 1831, signed by Enos T. Throop, Governor, and John A. Dix, Adjutant-General.

Sluyter was at Williams College, 1838–40: school teacher at Rhinebeck, 1840: entered the law office of David Dudley Field, New York, in November, 1841: signed the roll, as attorney at law, 16, May, 1845, and as solicitor, 26, May, 1846, and was subsequently, counsellor at law: member of the firm of Field and Sluyter, 1847–62; at first, it seems, Stephen J. Field was a member of this firm, afterwards, Dudley Field, son of David Dudley: he was afterwards in partnership with George W. Stevens. He was a member of Assembly, New York, in 1856, and again in 1857, and a member of the Union Club 7, July, 1858—, 7, August, 1861. His residence was in New York until in his latter years, when it was in Jersey City. He

was an amiable, liberal, sprightly, and entertaining companion, and he had many friends.



OF THE GENEALOGY.

THE perpetuation of the Schureman name, in this line, rested in six young men at the time of the publication of this genealogy, namely: 922, Irving T., 923, Paul, 924, Frank, 935, Theodore W., 937, Melanchthon Eugene, and 975, James P. Of these, 922 and 937 died in the year 1904, unmarried.

I. Jacobus Schüurman. He was born after 1693; for his companion, friend, and brother-in-law, Rev. Jacobus Frelinghuysen (1693–1748), describes himself, April 14, 1740, as aged 47;* and he, Schuurman, received, from the enemies of Frelinghuysen, the stigmatism of the "boy Schuurman." † It has not been discovered when he died, but it could not have been earlier than 1754, if it

was his child who was baptized at New Brunswick, N. J., January 13, 1755—Maria, parents Jacob Schuurman and Maria [Van Voorhees]. However, this may have been his grandchild.

He came to America, in the ship King George, Jacob Goelet master, in company with Rev. Theodorus Jacobus Frelinghuysen, who was or became his friend. The latter preached in New York City, January 17, 1720,* and immediately after settled at Three Mile Run, N. J., which took its name from its distance from a landing on the Raritan River, which is now known as New Brunswick, named after the royal family of Great Britain, and he entered upon the ministry to the five churches on the Raritan. Schuurman settled in the same place, and they took as wives daughters of Albert Terhune. It was charged that he was inducted into church membership, and made schoolmaster, in ways which deserved criti-Frelinghuysen was an evangelical Christian, and insisted upon definite faith, and practice in conformity with it. In this he was seconded by Schuurman, who was even more rigid than his pastor. There was deep affection between them, and this was made a subject of reproach. They labored and suffered together, and some account should be given here of Frelinghuysen. Whatever faults there may have been in his methods or his manners, it is now generally agreed that he, Frelinghuysen, wrought an excellent work for the promotion of practical piety. He was born at Wolfenbuettel, East Friesland, Hanover, and was licensed at Embden, in 1717. to preach. The Reverend Vincentius Antonides and Bernardus Freeman, under date of February 11, 1715, wrote to the Classis of Amsterdam that "The Dutch congregations very plainly are increasing every day. On the Raritan they are busy also in calling a minister." On June 5, 1718, "Rev. Matthias Winterwyck, minister at Alphen, together with the Messrs. Banker and van der Meulen, appeared before the classis [of Amsterdam], and exhibited an instrument from the congregation at Raritan, in the Province of New Jersey, by which they were authorized to call a minister for those churches. They declared that they had chosen for this purpose the Rev. Theodorus Jacobus Frielinghuysen, formerly minister at Lochimer Voorwerk, in East Friesland, now co-rector at Enckhuyzen; with the request that the classis would please to approve this call, and ordain him to the sacred ministry. Whereupon the Rev. Frielinghuysen, having come within, declared that he accepted

said call in the fear of the Lord. He handed in at the same time an excellent testimonial from the Cœtus of Embden. The Classis, having taken all things into consideration, approved the call, and ordained him to the sacred ministry." The Synod of North Holland, under date of 1719, July-Aug., made this note: "Sent to Raritan in the Province of New Jersey: Rev. Jacobus Theodorus van Frylinghuysen." [The family name appears as above.] linghuysen, at the Raritan, was accused of teaching false doctrine. He, to show what his teachings were, published three sermons, with a preface dated New York, June 25, 1721. These sermons were indorsed by Guiliam Bartholf and Bernardus Freeman. Henricus Boel, under date of July 21, 1721, made a statement in writing that Capt. Jacob Goelet had related to him and his brother, that Rev. Frilinghuysen, and Schuurman also, while on the voyage, said that most of the preachers in Holland were unregenerate men; and that Schuurman held forth to that effect to Boel and to Boel's brother [who was a lawyer]. The enemies of Frelinghuysen, in 1725, complained that he upheld Schuurman, who was teaching that the unregenerate should not use the Lord's prayer. Rev. Bernardus Freeman was reported to have said uncomplimentary things of Schuurman: ex. gr., that if Frelinghuysen had not brought that "ezel" [meaning an animal with pendulous ears and potential voice] with him, matters would never have come to this, neither would there have been any trouble nor quarrelling. Peace articles were agreed upon, November 18, 1733, and were read from the Raritan pulpits in January, 1734. The pastor and elders reported, July 8, 1735, to the Classis of Amsterdam. In the minutes of the Classis of Amsterdam is a note of the Acts of the Cœtus, New York, Apl. 26, 1748. Elder Hendrik Fisher, of New Brunswick, present. He read a letter from the Consistory at New Brunswick, urging the examination of Leydt, in order that their congregation, which was vacant, might employ him as a candidate.*

22, 1824; married Eleanor Williamson. He allowed his name to be Anglicized in its spelling, but retained the Dutch pronunciation,

which would be nearly expressed by Sskureman.

His son John [43] was much depressed, and distrustful of himself, and to reassure him, he wrote to him from the "City of Washington, Feb'y 4th, 1801," as follows: "Dear Son. The depression of mind which you have depicted in yours of the 25th ult. gives me real concern. . . . 'The call should be rational, clear, and come from a source of authority.' It need not be miraculous. ternal evidence rests on feeling, not reason. Enthusiasm says it exists, I will not contradict it, faith in its existence may support the weak. That a man is called to a particular office by the Director of the universe is to be rationally inferred when he has from childhood by instinctive impulse devoted himself to the acquirement, or under the direction of his parents has obtained the knowledge of those principles of a profession without which it would be impossible to exercise it with advantage. As to yourself-You have been resigned up by your parents to Him that gave you, from your infancy, to be devoted to His service. You have been instructed by their direction in those branches of literature which might qualify you for the work. You have been enabled by His grace to pursue these studies with diligence, and may I not say with pleasure, and to keep your mind free from the gross pollutions of the world. You have commenced in the profession with respect. You are looked up to with expectation by all your friends and acquaintance for progressing with credit to yourself and advantage to others. You have been blessed with talents which place you above contempt and which diffidence itself will learn to confide in. Are not all these circumstances combining together grounds for the rational conclusion that you have a Providential call? Would it not be presumptious to reject it. What then does this 'darkness, this absence of evidence, which gives you painful apprehension,' consist in? Is it the want of a miraculous internal conviction, which is not deduced from external circumstances? Is not that conviction which arises from rational conclusions, drawn from considerations such as I have mentioned, and more could be added, as persuasive, as forcible, and as obligatory as any you can expect to arrive at? Is it not such a conviction as God in His providence usually bestows, and on which he intends His creatures should act? But reverse the argument. If after these resignations and cares on the part of your parents, after this painful diligence on your part, after these expectations from the pious people of God, with such gifts as nature has bestowed, and industry has acquired, you should doubt, where is the evidence on which you can retract? Have you a call to return to the business of the world? Surely your Master bids you say, No. A tear of compassion flows down my cheek, and makes the paper too wet to write on. God give you that assurance which reason is too weak to point at. Consult your friends, open your heart to Mr. Condict [Rev. Ira]. In the communion of friends there will be consolation, if there is no complete relief."

An other letter—one on the subject of politics—is in the possession of the compiler, through the kindness of Miss Harriet Josephine Schureman [530], which shows his distrust of Thomas Jefferson, and of the "Republicans" of that period. It was written to his son David, February 16, 1801, and reads as follows: "I have just now handed in my resignation and shall leave the Senate chamber in half an hour. I have taken a seat in to-morrow's morning stage.

The votes for President are the same as heretofore." [The meaning was that the formal announcement of votes corresponded with the figures reported at the close of the Presidential election.]

He thought that the War of 1812 was an unnecessary one. This is shown by a letter to his wife, which is as follows:

" Nº. 36.

WASHINGTON, Sunday, 19th Feby 1815

"My DEAR ELEANOR

"I count every day with great solicitude that separates me from my beloved. It will add to the pleasure of our meeting, if God permits it, that we shall meet with His blessing of peace on our country. I yesterday sent a paper to David containing the treaty. It is of God's mercy that our enemies, after a contest unprofitable to both sides, and the wanton, unnecessary effusion of human blood, have consented to end the quarrel, and leave us as we were when we began. Our Democrats in their public speeches call it a glorious war and an honorable peace. They make a great noise now that they have got out of the woods, but it is plainly perceivable that they feel pangs of conscience for the evils they have entailed on their country, without acquiring for it one solitary good. An overruling Providence may bring good out of evil, but experience, that one side may declare war, but that the consent of two parties can only make peace, will in future correct the angry passions of party men and make them cautious of again getting into such a scrape.

18. Elizabeth Schuerman: born August 2, 1761; died September 15, 1831; married, November 4, 1781, David Nevius. The fire that consumed his house, and destroyed church records, occurred February 17, 1799.

Nevius was descended from Rev. Johannes Neef, or Neeffius, or Nevius, of Amsterdam, born about 1594, who became pastor, June 13, 1619, at Zoelen, South Guelderland, and, while such pastor, married, July 25, 1625, Maria Becx, maiden, of Cologne.

Their first child was Johannes, baptized March 14, 1627; died about May, 1672; married, November 18, 1653, Adriaentje Bleijck, from Batavia, E. I., daughter of — Bleijck and Swartje Jans, the latter having become the wife of Cornelius de Potter. Potter removed to New Netherlands about 1650-51; and he was a baptismal witness, March 3, 1652, at Manhattoes, which became New Amsterdam in 1653. In 1670 he was ferrymaster, and lived on the Brooklyn side of the ferry.

Petrus, 6th child of Johannes and Adriaentje, was baptized February 4, 1663, New Amsterdam; died April 29, 1740; married, June 22, 1684, Janetje Roelofse Schenck, daughter of Roelof Martinse and Neeltje Gerritse (Van Couwenhoven) Schenck. He lived at

Flatlands, L. I.

Pieter, 6th child of Petrus and Janetje, was born July 28, 1695; died September 16, 1768; married, March 26 or 30, 1717, Brooklyn, N. Y., Altje Ten Eyck, daughter of Tobias and Elizabeth (Hegeman) Ten Eyck. He lived at Marlborough, N. J.; afterwards at Blawenburgh.

Petrus, 1st child of Pieter and Altje, was born July 31, 1718; died December 2, 1793; married, before May 24, 1744, Johanna Stoothoff, daughter of Petrus. He was of Middlebush, N. J.

David, 4th and youngest child of Petrus and Johanna Stoothoff, was born June 2, 1758; died March 12, 1825; married Elizabeth Schuerman, as above.*

43. John Schureman, Rev. Dr., 1778–1818. He pursued theological studies, 1795–1799, at Schenectady, under Rev. Dr. Dirck Romeyn, and was an inmate of his house. Perhaps there was a

break in his studies, because of his delicate health. He was licensed by the Classis of Albany, September 4, 1799.

It has been assumed usually that Dr. Schureman's theological studies were prosecuted in New York, under the Rev. Dr. John Livingston; but this is negatived by two letters, which are in the possession of the compiler. The first is to him from his father, dated "Brunswick, Nov' 2, 1795," and addressed to him "at Dr. Romaine's, Schenectada," in which it is said: "On my return from Albany I found my friends and your friends well, and particularly solicitous about you and how you were disposed of. Relying on your discretion your mother submits to a temporary separation with resignation tho not without a sigh. . . . Devote yourself to your studies. If your situation in the Doctor's family is not easy use a becoming freedom to declare it and avail yourself of our contract to exchange your board—yet not on light grounds. . . . If your companion [Conrad Ten Eyck?] is unreasonably overbearing, let not meekness degenerate into dependance."

The second letter is from John to his mother, and is dated "Schenectady, April 7, 1799." In this letter he wrote as follows: "... It is now more than four weeks since I left you... The progress that is made in my studies is not equal to what I could desire. My dear mamma, I sometimes groan under heavy discouragements. Under an impression of the solemnity and importance of that office to which I aspire, and a sense of my weakness and unworthiness, my spirits fail, and my judgment reproves me."

This distrust of himself continued, and in answer to a letter in the same vein his father wrote to him in February, 1801, in expostulation and encouragement. The letter will be found under James [16].

The likeness of him here given is from a portrait that hangs in Kirkpatrick Chapel, Rutgers College. A portrait taken at an earlier age hangs in the parlor of the Collegiate Dutch Church, New York, corner of 5th Avenue and 49th Street.









A Scureman shield was in existence as long ago as the year 1300 A.D. It was of Norman shape, argent, parti per pale: i. e., it was of silver, or white, of oval shape, and divided by a vertical line through the middle.

This description is evolved from the description, actually found, of the shield of Hermann Scuremann, which had a device of a cadency, descent, or difference, called a label, consisting of a horizontal fillet *in chief*, with pendant points; that is, it had a bar with pendants, in the upper part of the shield. This device shows that Hermann was the eldest son. Upon the death of his father, he would drop the label and his own eldest son would assume it.

This shield was of Scheuren, near Dortmund, Arnsberg, Westphalia, Germany, and Hermann's liege was the Count of Arnsberg.*



Here you see my countenance, depicted in a portrait; If art refuses symmetry, your favor will supply it.
