Camp Sundeela, 24th October 1858.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report that on the 31st instant, I attacked the Fort of "Birwah," with the force mentioned in the margin, and took it by assault after eight hours' firing. Having reconnoitred the Fort the previous day, I selected the west front for my principal attack, where the outer defences appeared the weakest, and where I knew the Fort itself had but one line of works; a few hundred yards

from this side, there was also a village upon a mound, which was said by the natives and by Bahut Sing, a friendly Zemindar, to command the interior of the Fort, which they declared to be visible from it, (this however, I found was not the case). The village was entrenched and occupied by the enemy, and my first object therefore was to drive them from it having previously sent the Cavalry round to the north, on which side the jungle was very extensive, to prevent escape in that direction. I commenced by placing Captain Dowell's guns in a position to enfilade the entrenchments, and fire in rear of the villages. It was immediately abandoned; the Rifles pushed through with the Police Infantry on their left, and passing a top of large trees, came upon the edge of the dense thorny jungle, which nearly surrounds the Fort; the 88th in the meantime, threatening the south-west angle of the outer works, drove the enemy from a part of them, and their guns in these lines were withdrawn.

My chief difficulty now, was to ascertain the nature and exact position of the principal works, so completely was the Fort concealed by the jungle, which was almost impenetrable. Captain Pearson's guns were brought into action on the right of the village, upon that portion of the outer defences where the enemy was visible on this side; the mortars were placed close to the village, and in the tops of mangoe trees, whence a continued fire was kept up on the place, but, owing to the impossibility of seeing the object I fear their fire was somewhat ineffectual.

An 18-pounder and an 8-inch howitzer were brought down to the edge of the jungle, and opened at a distance of 100 yards upon the wall of the Fort, (a very small portion of one embrasure, whence a gun was occasionally fired, being visible through the jungle.) they very soon cleared away the intervening trees and exposed the S. W. Bastion, which I then determined to breach, knowing that it would give immediate access to the body of the place, the only other accessible sides having double lines of defence. The enemy still kept up a fire from a portion of the outer works, and I therefore directed a party of Rifles, under Lieute-

nant Percival, and Police Infantry under Captain Dawson, to move along the ditch on the west side, where it was inconsiderable, and mounting the breast-work to clear it of the enemy; this was easily effected and the enemy rapidly driven before them, escaping through paths in the jungle, and abandoning the outer works (which were completely turned by this movement) they retired to the inner Fort; the 88th passing to the right, entered the outer works by the main-gate on the east, and now communicated with us on the south side; we found the outer defences on the east and south of great strength, the ditch being newly cut about 20 feet deep and with nearly perpendicular sides. By this time the breach was rapidly improving, and I therefore made my dispositions for the assault of the body of the place.

The 88th were ordered to enter by the main-gate on the east; here I knew there was a double line of works, but I imagined that when the assault at the breach on the opposite side took place, these would be abandoned. Lieutenant Carnegie, Bengal Engineers, was to blow open the gates. Captain Dawson, with 200 Police Infantry, was to make his way round the north-west angle, through the jungle, to a gate on the north side, by which the enemy would endeavour to escape; this also was to be blown open, if necessary, and Serjeant Charlton, Royal Artillery, accompanied the party for this purpose.

The breach was to be stormed by a party of the Rifle Brigade, under Captain Alexander, and 100 Police Infantry, the remainder of each Regiment being held in reserve. Major Goodenough, Royal Artillery, acting as my Brigade Major, personally ascertained that it was possible to ascend the breach, with the assistance of ladders, which would also be required to get into the ditch, (this upon subsequent measurement was found to be nearly 40 feet wide, and 30 feet deep, having 3 or 4 feet of mud and water at the bottom.) The Police Infantry were to carry the ladders through the jungle and place them in the ditch while 100 of the Rifles kept down the enemy's fire from the loop-holes, &c.; the signal for the general attack, was to be the cheers of the storming party at the breach. The arrangements of each attacking party, were admirably made by their respective Commanding Officers, and the attacks were simultaneous; no loss was sustained in ascending the breach, although most difficult to get up. Ensign Richards, Rifle Brigade, was the first man at the top, closely followed by Major Goodenough, R. A., and Color Serjeant Maloney, of the Rifle Brigade; the enemy attempting to escape by the north gate were met by Captain Dawson and his Police Infantry, and driven back; at the same time the 88th, under Major Maynard, entered by the main gate on the east, in the most gallant style, the enemy receiving them with a round of grape as they advanced; the gate was blown to atoms by Lieutenant Carnegie, B. E., who I regret to say, was severely burnt in the attempt, owing to the fuze burning slowly and his advancing a second time to ascertain the cause. The second gate (as I expected) was entered without opposition. The place was now in our possession and with comparatively little loss; the enemy concealed themselves in the various buildings inside, and the principal number, with Gholab Sing, had retired to a house in the centre, from which a sharp fire was kept up from the loop-holes and windows. This fire, I am sorry to say, caused us many casualties. Captain Dawson, in a most gallant attempt to get inside, received a severe sabre cut on the right arm. It was now getting dusk, and feeling that my loss had already been very heavy, I determined to blow up what part of the house I could, and let the rest burn, for it was already on fire, as were most of the other buildings; Captain Dowell, Bengal Artillery, and Major Goodenough, R. A., (this Officer, although severely wounded in the right hand, continued to render me most valuable assistance) succeeded in blowing down one

side of the house, and exposed the court-yard, but the house was found to consist of a number of small rooms, and as considerable loss would probably have been incurred in forcing an entrance, I determined upon waiting for the fire to do its work, leaving strong parties to guard the doors, &c., by which the enemy could escape. From some prisoners taken, we learnt that Gholab Sing, and about 50 men had retired to this house upon the assault taking place; and their retreat being cut off by the north, many of these had been shot down, burnt or buried in the ruins by the explosion, but still a few remained who continued to fire upon any man exposing himself; the house was however well on fire, and I thought it impossible that any could escape. I left the 88th Regiment and the Police Infantry in the Fort, to hold the place and dispose of the rest of the enemy when daylight should appear, and returned to Camp with the remainder of the force and wounded. It was then passed midnight.

We learnt that on our approach in the morning, the Fort was occupied by 700 men, but that during the day the greater number of them had got away into the jungle, Gholab Sing's own men alone remaining; they offered a most determined resistance, and the strength of the place enabled them to inflict great loss; I am sorry to say that Gholab Sing himself and about 10 men who were shut up in the centre building, when I left after midnight, effected their escape during the night, by making a sudden rush to one of the bastions, and scrambling into the ditch, whence they new a path to the jungle; it is said Gholab Sing was wounded and eventually got off with only three followers.

I most sincerely deplore the heavy losses the force has sustained, but I imagine a Fort of such strength has seldom been taken in in so short a time; had the assault however been delayed the enemy would certainly have escaped, and although our loss immediately after the final assault was comparatively inconsiderable, the failure of daylight favored the enemy, and any attempt at forcing an entrance into the rooms after dark, would have doubtless still further increased our casualties. Eight guns were captured in the place and the loss of the enemy is estimated from 200 to 250. The Fort itself is now being destroyed under the superintendence of Lieutenant Tracy, Royal Artillery.

I beg to bring to the notice of the Commander-in-Chief, the names of the several Officers, whom I have to thank for their gallant and valuable assistance. Major Maynard, Commanding 88th Regiment, made all his arrangements in a most perfect manner, and greatly contributed to our success; this Officer speaks in the highest terms of Major Mauleverer, of the same Regiment, who distinguished himself by the cool and fearless manner in which he behaved. Major Oxenden, Commanding Rifle Brigade, deserves the greatest credit for the manner in which he handled his men and disposed them for the assault of the breach. Major Seymour, 2nd Dragoon Guards, Commanding the Cavalry, made excellent arrangements for preventing the escape of the enemy, and the denseness of the jungle and the failure of daylight, after which I withdrew them, alone prevented the Cavalry from taking a more active part in the operations. Major Pearson and Captain Dowell, Commanding the Field Batteries, afforded me every assistance, and the latter was most useful in blowing up the house in the interior which the Rebels occupied. Major Goodenough, Royal Artillery, proved himself in every way a most excellent Officer, and distinguished himself by his gallantry throughout the day, particularly at the assault of the breach. I regret to say he was wounded soon after this took place. Captain Campbell, Royal Artillery, acting as Deputy Assistant Quarter Master General, conspicuous for his energy, exerted himself to the utmost and rendered me every possible assistance. To Captain Boileau, Divisional

Commandant Oudh Police, I am very much indebted for the valuable assistance he afforded me on all occasions. Captain Dawson, Commanding Police Infantry, as usual displayed the greatest courage and discretion in the management of his men. I felt much the loss of his assistance when he received his wound, which I trust, however, will not eventually incapacitate him for duty, nor long deprive the country of his services. Captain Alexander, Rifle Brigade, Commanding the storming party, deserves the greatest credit, and Lieutenant Cragg and Ensign Richards, who accompanied him displayed the greatest courage; the latter, as I have stated, was the first at the top of the breach, but I regret to say, was shortly afterwards severely wounded. Lieutenant Carnegie, Bengal Engineers, a most gallant and intelligent Officer, whom I have already mentioned as having been severely burnt, rendered every possible assistance and displayed the greatest courage. Lieutenant Graham, Commanding the Oudh Police Cavalry, rendered valuable aid to that part of the force. Lieutenants Brown and Tracy, Royal Artillery, Commanding respectively the breaching batteries and mortars, the former of whom was slightly wounded, deserve the greatest praise for their conduct. The names of the following Officers in addition to those I have already spoken of, have been mentioned as particularly deserving praise: Lieutenants Waring, Burke and Moore, and Assistant Surgeon Knipe, 88th Regiment; and Major Seymour speaks in high terms of the assistance he received from Captains Stapylton and Carnegie, Squadron Leaders; and Lieutenant and Adjutant Calvert, 2nd Dragoon Guards; and particularly of Lieutenant Graham, Commanding Police Cavalry, Surgeon Cape, Oudh Police; Assistant Surgeon Rowbotham, 2nd Dragoon Guards; Assistant Surgeon Storey, Rifle Brigade; and Assistant Surgeon Bird, Bengal Artillery; deserve the greatest praise for their attention to the wounded during the nights.

The peculiar nature of the engagement afforded many opportunities for the display of individual courage, Serjeant Charlton, 6th Company 11th Battalion Royal Artillery, who accompanied Captain Dawson's party to the north gate, particularly distinguished himself by his coolness and courage, and he is most highly spoken of by that Officer. The names of the men mentioned in the margin, have been brought to my notice by their respective Commanding Officers as having particularly distinguished themselves, and many instances came under my own observation. I am sorry that several of these names should also appear among the wounded.

The conduct of the whole Force was admirable. I must not omit to state how much I am indebted to Mr. Kavanagh, Assistant Commissioner, for his assistance. Though last mentioned, his services are far from being the least important; his knowledge of the country, his energy and constant activity in procuring intelligence, render his services of the greatest value; his well known courage places him ever among the foremost in danger, and he rendered me the greatest aid throughout the engagement. I have derived the greatest benefit from Mr. Kavanagh's assistance, since assuming the Command here and it is at all times most freely given.

I have the honor, by direction of the Commander-in-Chief, to forward for the information of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General, a letter, in original, from Brigadier J. Chute, Commanding at Lucknow, dated 10th instant, with its enclosures, reporting the defeat of a large body of Insurgents near Sundeela, by the Troops under Command of Major Maynard, Her Majesty's 88th Regiment, and subsequently of Brigadier Barker, C. B.

2. The Commander-in-Chief desires to draw the attention of His Lordship to the ability and vigour which have characterized Brigadier Barker's attack and pursuit of the enemy, the results of which have been so signal; and Lord Clyde recommends that Officer and Major Maynard to special notice.

3. I am also to request, marked attention to the gallantry of Lieutenant Green of the Rifle Brigade, who has been dangerously wounded; and to the active part taken by Lieutenant Chamberlain, of the 5th Oudh Police, in this, as in other operation in which he has been engaged.

SIR,

ON the afternoon of the 4th instant, I received intelligence from the Chief Commissioner, that the Police Force at Sundeela, under Captain Dawson, was threatened to be invested by a large body of Rebels with a request that a small force might be sent with

3 guns to assist him.
Accordingly at 10 o'clock that night, a force under Major Maynard, 88th Regiment, as per margin, pro-

ceeded from Lucknow towards Sundeela.

The following morning a message was received by the Chief Commissioner, that Captain Dawson was in serious position, his force being completely invested, and the enemy's numbers said to be increased up to 12,000 men.

Fearing therefore, that the force sent on the previous night would be hardly sufficient, under these circumstances, for carrying out the operations they were intended to, I deemed it advisable to despatch a large additional force.

Brigadier Barker, C. B., having proffered his services, I gladly availed myself of them, and at 9 P. M., a column as per margin, marched for Sundeela, under his command.

I have the honor to enclose the following Despatches—

1st. From Major Maynard, Commanding the force sent on the 4th instant, which relieved Sundeela on the 6th instant, and caused the enemy to retire some distance, with a loss of one gun and 150 men killed.

2nd. From Brigadier Barker, C. B., who attacked the Rebels, strongly posted about 3 miles beyond Sundeela, on the 8th instant.

The force under this distinguished Officer completely dispersed the main body of the Rebels, taking 4 guns, and killing upwards of a thousand of the enemy.

The country round Sundeela is now reported to be completely clear of the Rebels, who have retired across the Goomtee.

I beg you will bring to the favorable notice of His Lordship the Commander-in-Chief the valuable services of Brigadier Barker, C. B., and Major Maynard, 88th Regiment, as also the Officers mentioned in their Despatches.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of Brigadier Chute, Commanding Troops at Lucknow, that according to instructions, I marched from Lucknow with the force as per margin, on the night of the 4th instant, and arrived at Mullacabad about 7 the following morning, where I was joined by 460 of the 2nd Oudh Police Cavalry, halted there till ½ past 3 o'clock P. M., when I again proceeded towards Ruheemabad, which place we reached about 7 P. M. and there halted for the night.

The following morning, the 6th instant, we marched for Sundeela, and as we approached the City about 6 A. M., discovered the enemy's Cavalry Picquets in our front. I threw forward my Cavalry in skirmishing order, supported by the Infantry and Guns in line, showing as strong and extensive a front as possible. In this order we advanced for some distance driving in the Picquets, and on nearer approaching the City, were assailed by a heavy fire from Infantry and Artillery, from the northern and western sides of the City, and the tops and gardens around, and our left flank threatened by the enemy's Cavalry; the latter were charged with success by the 5th, and part of the 2nd Oudh Police Cavalry, who succeeded in capturing one 3-pr. gun, and sabreing a considerable number, while I brought up my guns and mortars to

bear upon the gardens and enclosures occupied by the Infantry. Perceiving that the enemy's Cavalry was again menacing our left in considerable force, I removed my guns and directed my fire upon them, which I kept up for some time, and then a second time our Cavalry charged them, obliging them to retreat with loss.

After this the Cavalry of the enemy again reformed in our front in very extensive masses, and to all appearance as if they intended to hold their ground, when I ordered our guns and mortars to advance, supported on either flank by the Detachment of the 88th Regiment, in extended order; our fire proved most effectual (the Enfield Rifles doing considerable execution) and this time the enemy were driven back in complete disorder, our Cavalry in pursuit.

Their Infantry, which had hitherto been keeping a heavy fire upon us from the City and neighbouring enclosures, at the same time retreated rapidly in disorder, threatened by the 7th Police Infantry who followed them well up, our guns being brought to bear upon their left flank, the ground was such that Cavalry could not pursue.

Owing to the inability further to advance my guns on account of the obstacles presented, such as thick tops and bad ground, and the hard work the Europeans and Horses had undergone in the heat of the day, I did not consider it prudent further to follow up the pursuit.

We were engaged from 6 in the morning till 12 noon, previously having had a march of 8 miles.

The enemy's force from the best information may be computed at about 12,000 Cavalry and Infantry, the Cavalry preponderating; their loss may be put down at about 150 killed. I annex a list of Casualties.

The conduct of both Officers and Men is deserving of the greatest praise, and I beg to bring under the notice of the Brigadier, that of Captain Dowell, Commanding Detachment Bengal Artillery; Lieutenant Chamberlain, Divisional Commandant; Lieutenant Brown, Royal Artillery; Captain Hall, Commanding Detachment 88th Regiment.

Commanding at Lucknow.

Camp Sundeela, 9th October 1858.

SIR,

ON the day of my arrival at Sundeela, information was received that the main body of the Rebels, who had been recently investing this place, and had only been driven away the day before, by the advance of Major Maynard's party, was still within 4 miles at a place called "Jamo."

Accordingly at daybreak the following morning, I started with the force, as per margin, leaving a small force for the protection of the Town and Camp. I divided the Cavalry into two Columns, to act upon either flank, so as to cut off the enemy's retreat, when driven from their position. The left Column, under

Command of Major Seymour, 2nd Dragoon Guards, consisted of one Squadron 2nd Dragoon Guards, and 300 Police Cavalry; the right Column of the same strength was under the Command of Captain Stapylton, 2nd Dragoon Guards.

I advanced myself with the Infantry and Guns, against the enemy's position at "Jamo," having the Police Infantry under Captain Dawson on the right.

The enemy's position was admirably chosen, the village being situated on high ground completely commanding the whole plain over which we had to pass, and surrounded with "Dhauk" jungle and numerous jheels. Fire was opened upon us from 4 guns about the village, and from numerous jingalls and matchlocks in the jungle. Our guns were immediately brought into action, the Rifles being thrown out in skirmishing order to the right and the 88th to the left, leaving one Company in support of the guns. The 7th Police Infantry were for the time kept in reserve.

The Troops advanced steadily through the jungle, the right being well forward. The party of the Rifle Brigade under Lieutenant Green, gallantly rushed up the high position in front of the village, and captured a 6-pounder gun; at the same time Captain Dawson, with the 3rd and 6th Police Infantry, passed round the village and completely turned their left flanks by which they were thrown into disorder, and commenced a precipitate retreat. The Oudh Police here captured 3 guns, and killed a great number of the enemy, who were at first encountered in good formation.

At one time the Rebels made a show of turning our left flank, but the advance of the 88th prevented it, and they then dispersed through the jungle in full retreat.

The arrangements for cutting off the retiring enemy were completely successful; each Column of Cavalry came upon them in their retreat, and killed large numbers of them.

The total loss of the Rebels is estimated at upwards of 1,000 killed, but it was impossible to judge accurately, owing to the great extent and very difficult nature of the ground passed over during the pursuit. They have however received a lesson, which will keep the country clear for some time.

I much regret that our Casualties were necessarily somewhat heavy, though chiefly among the Native Troops, but it was impossible to avoid, the Troops being rather dispersed, owing to the extremely difficult nature of the country.

Among the wounded, (and I am sorry to say he is dangerously so) is Lieutenant Green, of the Rifle Brigade, who was attacked by a number of Sepoys, whilst leading his men through a thick piece of jungle; he received 9 severe sabre cuts, before his men could destroy the whole party, some 20 or 30. This Officer had behaved so gallantly all through the day, that I most deeply lament this misfortune.

It is my pleasing duty to record my thanks to Lieutenant Chamberlain, Commanding the Oudh Police. I am much indebted to him for his active assistance during the engagement, and I owe to him the suggestion of the plan of attack which was so successful.

To Captain Orr, Assistant Commissioner, I am much indebted for the very valuable and accurate information he obtained, as to the position and intention of the Rebels. To Major Maynard, Commanding 88th Regiment, Major Seymour and Captain Stapylton, 2nd Dragoon Guards, Commanding respectively the left and right Columns of Cavalry, and to Lieutenant Green, Commanding Detachment of Rifle Brigade, great praise is due. Major Seymour speaks highly of the conduct of Captain Carnegie, 2nd Dragoon Guards, the Squadron Leader; and of Lieutenant Graham, Commanding the Police Cavalry with the left Column, whose zeal and intelligence rendered him of the greatest assistance; and also of Lieutenant Hawkins serving under him.

Major Seymour also speaks most highly of Lieutenants Green and Ensign Richards, of the Rifle Brigade, who getting near the Cavalry in the pursuit most effectually cleared that part of the jungle for them: Major Seymour was with Lieutenant Green when he was wounded, and was himself struck by two sword cuts, but was fortunately not much injured.

Captain Stapylton speaks in praise of Lieutenants Calvert and Ormsby, 2nd Dragoon Guards, and most highly of the dashing conduct of Lieutenant Drummond, of the Police Cavalry, whose tact and discretion in the management of his men, enabled them to render valuable service. Captain Barrow also did good service with this Column. This Officer speaks highly of Serjeant Major Ward, and Trumpeter Smith, 2nd Dragoon Guards; the latter a mere boy engaged a Sepoy and had his Horse shot under him.

Of Captain Dawson, Commanding the Oudh Police Infantry, it is impossible to speak too highly; his dashing gallantry and the admirable tact which he at all times displays renders the Troops under his command most valuable assistance to an European Force.

Captain Dowell, Commanding the Artillery, performed good service with his guns at the commencement of the action, but from the nature of the ground

it was afterwards impossible to make use of the Artillery.

To Lieutenant Biddulph, Royal Artillery, my Brigade Major, I have to offer my best thanks; his energy and intelligence at all times renders him a most valuable assistant.

Lieutenant Lawford, Hodson's Horse, with a small detachment of his own Regiment and a few Police Cavalry, accompanied the centre Column, and did good service, cutting up some 150 of the enemy.

I would also mention Lieutenant Worsley, Commanding 7th Police Infantry; but the good services of Officers of the Oudh Police will be more prominently brought to the notice of Government by Lieutenant Chamberlain, through the Chief Commissioner.

Four Guns were captured, but one has not yet been brought in, having been abandoned for the moment during the pursuit, and has not yet been found.

I beg to enclose a list of Casualties and a return of captured Ordnance.

Several hackeries of ammunition were blown up, and much baggage taken. One elephant was also captured by the Oudh Police.

It is reported that two or three men of rank are amongst the killed, whom his ring has since been brought in. the Moulvie is said to be one.*

The force immediately opposed to us was about 5,000 men with 4 guns; but some distance in rear, there was a large body of about 2,000 men with 4 more guns. These however retired across the Goomtee at the very commencement, and were untouched.

The Assistant Commissioner reports the country perfectly clear up to the Goomtee, with the exception of 2 or 3 small Forts.

Extract Paras 2 and 3 of the Financial Resolution, No. 5681, dated the 28th September 1858.

Para 2. In respect to Casual Leave, His Honor in Council directs, after a careful consideration of the difficulties and inconvenience which an attempt to regulate such Leave by general Rules is apt to produce, that the Financial Resolution of 19th March 1858, which limits the grant of Casual Leave to fifteen days in every Calendar Year be cancelled; and that it be left to the Heads of Offices, subject to the orders of their own Government, to grant, at their discretion, Casual Leave of absence from Office in case of sickness, death of near relatives, &c., on condition that the Local Government shall see that the discretionary power to be placed in the Heads of Offices is not abused.

Para 3. Such casual absences from Office should not be reported to the Civil Auditor, but they should be systematically entered in a Book to be kept in each Office, and when an application for Privilege Leave may be received, the Leave should be granted or refused with some reference to the entries in the Book. Reports, however, should be made as at present to the Civil Auditor, in respect to the other descriptions of leave mentioned in the first part of this Resolution.

Legislative Council of India.

THE 20TH NOVEMBER 1858.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 13th November 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee who are to report thereon after the 24th of January next:—

A Bill to empower the Holders of Ghatwalee lands in the District of Beerbhoom to grant leases extending beyond the period of their own possession.

WHEREAS doubts have been entertained whether the Ghatwals of the District of Beerbhoom, who pay the revenue of their lands directly to Government under the provisions of Regulation XXIX. 1814 of the Bengal Code, have power to grant leases of those lands, or of any part thereof, for any term extending beyond the period of their own possession; and whereas, for the development of the mineral resources of the country in which the said Ghatwalee lands are situate, and for the improvement of the said lands, it is expedient that the power of granting leases for a long term of years, or in perpetuity, should be extended to the possessors of such lands; It is enacted as follows:—

I. All holders of Ghatwalee lands in the District of Beerbhoom under the provisions of the aforesaid Regulation, shall have the same power of granting leases for any period which they may deem most conducive to the improvement of their tenures, as is allowed by law to the proprietors of other lands. Provided that no lease of Ghatwalee lands for any period extending beyond the life-time of the Grantor of the lease shall be valid and binding on the successors of the Grantor, unless the same shall have been submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of the Division, such approval being certified by an endorsement on the lease under the signature of the Collector.

II. If any of the said Ghatwalee lands should be taken under the superintendence of the Court of Wards, or should otherwise become subject to the direct control of the Officers of Government, it shall be lawful for the manager or farmer under the sanction of the Court, or for the Collector with the sanction of the Commissioner, to grant any such lease as aforesaid; and every lease so granted shall be valid and binding on all future possessors of the said lands, anything in the existing law to the contrary notwithstanding.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 20th November 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee who are to report thereon after the 24th of February next:—

A Bill for the Registration of Literary, Scientific, and Charitable Societies.

WHEREAS it is expedient that provision should be made for improving the legal condition of Societies established for the promotion of Literature, Science, or the Fine Arts, or for the diffusion of useful knowledge, or for Charitable purposes; It is enacted as follows:—

I. Any seven or more persons associated for any Literary, Scientific, or Charitable purpose, or for any such purpose as is described in Section XX of this Act, may, by subscribing their names to a Memorandum of Association, and filing the same with the Registrar of Joint-Stock Companies under Act XIX of 1857, form themselves into a Society under this Act.

Memorandum of Association. II. The Memorandum of Association shall contain the following things, (that is to say,)

The name of the Society,
The objects of the Society,

The names, addresses, and occupations of the Governors, Council, Directors, Committee, or other governing body to whom, by the Rules of the Society, the management of its affairs is entrusted. A copy of the Rules and Regulations of the Society, certified to be a correct copy by not less than three of the Members of the governing body, shall be filed with the Memorandum of Association.

III. Upon such Memorandum and certified copy being filed, the Registrar shall certify under his hand that the Society is registered under this Act. There shall be paid to the Registrar for every such registration a fee of fifty Rupees, or such smaller fee as the Governor General of India in Council may from time to time direct; and all fees so paid shall be accounted for to Government.

IV. Once in every year, on or before the 14th day succeeding the day on which, according to the Rules of the Society, the Annual General Meeting of the Society is held, or if the Rules do not provide for an Annual General Meeting, in the month of January, a list shall be filed with the Registrar of Joint-Stock Companies, of the names, addresses, and occupations of the Governors, Council, Directors, Committee, or other governing body then entrusted with the management of the affairs of the Society.

V. The property, moveable and immovable, belonging to a Society registered under this Act, if not vested in trustees, shall be deemed to be vested for the time being in the governing body of such Society, and in all proceedings, Civil and Criminal, may be described as the property of the governing body of such Society by their proper title.

VI. Every Society registered under this Act may sue or be sued in the name of the President, Chairman, or principal Secretary, as shall be determined by the Rules and Regulations of the Society, and in default of such determination in the name of such person as shall be appointed by the governing body for the occasion; provided that it shall be competent for any person having a claim or demand against the Society, to sue the President or Chairman thereof, if, on application to the governing body, some other Officer or person be not nominated to be the defendant.

VII. No suit or proceeding in any Civil Court shall abate or discontinue by reason of the person, by or against whom such suit or proceedings shall have been brought or continued, dying or ceasing to fill the character in the name whereof he shall have sued or been sued, but the same suit or proceeding shall be continued in the name of or against the successor of such person.

VIII. If a judgment shall be recovered against the person or Officer named on behalf of the Society, such judgment shall not be put in force against the property, moveable or immovable, or against the body of such person or Officer, but against the property of the Society. The application for execution shall set forth the judgment, the fact of the party against whom it shall have been recovered having sued or having been sued, as the case may be, on behalf of the Society only, and shall require to have the judgment enforced against the property of the Society.

IX. Whenever by any Bye-law duly made in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Society, or, if the Rules do not provide for the making of Bye-laws, by any Bye-law made at a General Meeting of the Members of the Society convened for the purpose, (for the making of which the concurrent votes of three-fifths of the Members present at such Meeting shall be necessary), any pecuniary penalty is imposed for the breach of any Rule or Bye-law of the Society, such penalty, when accrued, may be recovered in any Court having jurisdiction where the defendant shall reside, or the Society shall be situate, as the governing body thereof shall deem expedient.

X. Any Member who may be in arrear of a subscription which, according to the Rules of the Society he is bound to pay, or who shall possess himself of or detain any property of the Society in a manner or for a time contrary to such Rules, or shall injure or destroy any property of the Society, may be sued for such arrear or for the damage accruing from such detention, injury, or destruction of property in the manner herein before provided. But if the defendant shall be successful in any suit or other proceeding brought against him at the instance of the Society, and shall be adjudged to recover his costs, he may elect to proceed to recover the same from the Officer in whose name the suit shall be brought, or from the Society, and in the latter case shall have process against the property of the said Society in the manner above described.

XI. Any Member of the Society who shall steal, purloin, or embezzle any money or other property, or wilfully and maliciously destroy or injure any property of such Society, or shall forge any deed, bond, security for money, receipt, or other instrument, whereby the funds of the Society may be exposed to loss, shall be subject to the same prosecution, and if convicted, shall be liable to be punished in like manner, as any person not a Member would be subject and liable to in respect of the like offence.

XII. Whenever it shall appear to the governing body of any Society registered under this Act, which has been established for any particular purpose or purposes, that it is advisable to alter, extend, or abridge such purpose or to amalgamate such Society either wholly or partially with any other Society, such governing body may submit the proposition to the Members of the Society in a written or printed report, and may convene a Special Meeting for the consideration thereof according to the Regulations

of the Society; but no such proposition shall be carried into effect unless such report shall have been delivered or sent by post to every Member of the Society ten days previous to the Special Meeting convened by the governing body for the consideration thereof, nor unless such proposition shall have been agreed to by the votes of three-fifths of the Members present at such Meeting, and confirmed by the votes of three-fifths of the Members present at a second Special Meeting convened by the governing body at an interval of one month after the former Meeting.

XIII. Any number not less than three-fifths of the Members of any Society may determine that it shall be dissolved, and thereupon it shall be dissolved forthwith, or at the time then agreed upon, and all necessary steps shall be taken for the disposal and settlement of the property of the Society, its claims, and liabilities, according to the Rules of the said Society applicable thereto, if any, and, if not, then as the governing body shall find expedient, provided that, in the event of any dispute arising among the said governing body or the Members of the Society, the adjustment of its affairs shall be referred to the principal Court of original Civil jurisdiction of the District in which the chief building of the Society is situate; and the Court shall make such order in the matter as it shall deem requisite. Provided that no Society shall be dissolved unless three-fifths of the Members shall have expressed a wish for such dissolution by their votes delivered in person, or by proxy, at a general Meeting convened for the purpose.

XIV. If upon the dissolution of any Society registered under this Act, there shall remain, after the satisfaction of all its debts and liabilities, any property whatsoever, the same shall not be paid to or distributed among the Members of the said Society or any of them, but shall be given to some other Society, to be determined by the Members at the time of the dissolution, or in default thereof, by such Court as aforesaid; provided however that this Clause shall not apply to any Society which shall have been founded or established by the contributions of shareholders in the nature of a Joint-Stock Company.

XV. For the purposes of this Act a Member of a Society shall be a person who, having been admitted therein according to the Rules and Regulations thereof, shall have paid a subscription, or shall have signed the roll or list of Members thereof; but in all proceedings under this Act no person shall be entitled to vote or be counted as a Member whose subscription at the time shall have been in arrear for a period exceeding three months.

XVI. The governing body of the Society shall be the Governors, Council, Directors, Committee, or other body to whom by the Rules and Regulations of the Society the management of its affairs is entrusted.

XVII. Any Company or Society established for a Literary, Scientific, or Charitable purpose and registered under Act XLIII of 1850, or any such Society established

and constituted previously to the passing of this Act but not registered under the said Act XLIII of 1850, may at any time hereafter be registered as a Society under this Act; subject to the proviso that no such Company or Society shall be registered under this Act unless an assent to its being so registered has been given by three-fifths of the Members present personally, or by proxy, at some General Meeting convened for that purpose by the governing body. In the case of a Company or Society registered under Act XLIII of 1850, the Directors shall be deemed to be such governing body. In the case of a Society not so registered, if no such body shall have been constituted on the establishment of the Society, it shall be competent for the Members thereof, upon due notice, to create for itself a governing body to act for the Society thenceforth.

XVIII. In order to any such Society as is mentioned in the last preceding Section obtaining registry under this Act, it shall be sufficient that the governing body file with the Registrar of Joint-Stock Companies, under Act XIX of 1857, a Memorandum showing the name of the Society, the objects of the Society, and the names, addresses, and occupations of the governing body, together with a copy of the Rules and Regulations of the Society certified as provided in Section II, and a copy of the report of the Proceedings of the General Meeting at which the registration was resolved on.

XIX. Any person may inspect all documents filed with the Registrar under this Act on payment of a fee of one Rupee for each inspection; and any person may require a copy or extract of any document or any part of any document, to be certified by the Registrar, on payment of two annas for every hundred words of such copy or extract; and such certified copy shall be *prima facie* evidence of the matters therein contained in all legal proceedings whatever.

XX. The following Societies may be registered under this Act: Charitable Societies, Societies established for the promotion of Science, Literature, or the Fine Arts, for instruction, the diffusion of useful knowledge, the foundation or maintenance of Libraries or Reading-rooms for general use among the Members or open to the Public, or Public Museums and Galleries of Paintings and other works of Art, Collections of Natural History, Mechanical and Philosophical Inventions, Instruments, or Designs.

THE 20TH NOVEMBER 1858.

The following Bill was read a first time on the 20th October 1858. The second reading has been postponed for four months, in order that the Bill may be published with a view to elicit the opinions

of the public generally upon the subject of Judicial Oaths and Affirmations :—

A Bill concerning Oaths and Affirmations.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the law relating to Oaths and Affirmations ; It is hereby enacted as follows :—

Acts repealed.

I. Acts V of 1840, and II of 1847, are hereby repealed.

II. In all cases in which at present any person is required to make oath or affirmation in any Court of Justice, or before any person empowered by law to administer oaths or affirmations, such person shall, from and after the passing of this Act, be sworn to speak the whole truth and nothing but the truth (or in the case of a juror, to give a true verdict according to the evidence) in the manner that may be considered most binding on the conscience of such person, by the Court or person before whom such person may be examined.

Person required to make oath in any Court &c., shall be sworn in manner most binding on his conscience.

III. Provided always that, if a person be of a rank which, according to the customs of the country, would render it improper to compel him or her to take an oath, or if any person have conscientious scruples against taking an oath, the Court or person empowered by law to administer oaths or affirmations, may dispense with such person being sworn, provided that such person shall make the following affirmation—

Affirmation in certain cases.

“ I solemnly affirm that what I shall state in the matter now under investigation shall be the whole truth and nothing but the truth.”

Or if the person be a juror—

“ I solemnly affirm that I will give a true verdict according to the evidence.”

IV. If any person, making such oath or affirmation as aforesaid, shall wilfully and falsely state for truth that which he knows or believes to be false, or which he does not know or believe to be true, such person shall be punishable in the manner provided by any law for the time being in force for the punishment of perjury and giving false evidence.

Punishment for false statement upon oath.

V. Any person causing or procuring another to commit the offence defined in the last preceding Section, shall be punishable in the manner provided by any law for the time being in force for the punishment of subornation of perjury, or causing or procuring false evidence.

Punishment for causing or procuring another to make false statement upon oath.

VI. Nothing in this Act shall be held to interfere with the provisions of Sections XV and XVI of Act II of 1855 (for the further improvement of the Law of Evidence), which enact that any person who, by reason of immature age, or want of religious belief, or by reason of defect of religious belief, ought not, in the opinion of the Court or person before whom his or her attendance is required, to be admitted to give evidence on oath or solemn affirmation, shall be admitted to give evidence on a simple affirmation that he or she will

speak the whole truth and nothing but the truth, and that the same provision shall apply to testimony given by affidavit or otherwise ; and the provisions of the said Sections shall have the same force and effect as if this Act had not been passed.

THE 27TH NOVEMBER 1858.

THE following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 27th November 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee who are to report thereon after the 1st of March next :—

A Bill for the establishment of Courts of Small Causes beyond the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter.

WHEREAS, with a view to the more easy recovery of small debts and demands, it is expedient to establish Courts of Small Causes beyond the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter at the several Presidencies of Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay ; It is enacted as follows :—

I. It shall be lawful for the Executive Government of any of the said Presidencies or of any place, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, to constitute Courts of Small Causes, with the required establishment of Officers, at any place within the limits of their respective Governments, for the trial of suits under this Act. Whenever any such Court may be so constituted, the Executive Government shall fix the territorial jurisdiction of such Court, and may, from time to time, alter the same as may appear proper.

Constitution of Small Cause Courts.

II. It shall also be lawful for any such Executive Government to invest any Court subordinate to a District Court, now existing or which may hereafter be established within the limits of their respective Governments, with Small Cause jurisdiction for the trial of suits made cognizable by Courts of Small Causes constituted under this Act.

III. The following are the suits which shall be cognizable by Courts of Small Causes constituted under this Act, namely, claims for money due, whether on bond or other contract, or for rent, or for personal property, or for the value of such property, or for damages, when the debt, damage, or demand does not exceed in amount or value the sum of five hundred Rupees. Provided that no action shall lie in any such Court on a balance of partnership account, unless the balance shall have been struck by the parties or their agents ; or for a share or part of a share under an intestacy, or for a legacy or part of a legacy under a will ; or for any claim relating to arrears or exactions of rent, or to alleged illegal distraints for rent, for which claim or for any part whereof a summary suit could have been brought

Proviso.

before an Officer of Government in the Revenue Department if commenced in due time ; or for the recovery of damages on account of alleged personal injuries, unless special damage of a pecuniary nature shall have resulted from such injury.

IV. Every Court constituted under this Act shall use a seal, bearing the following inscription in English and in the language of the Court—" Court of Small Causes of _____ ;" and every such Court shall be a Court of Record, and shall be subject to the general control and orders of the Judge of the District and of the Sudder Court.

V. The language to be used in the proceedings of the Courts constituted under this Act, shall be the same as that in use in the principal Court of Civil jurisdiction in the District in which such Courts are established.

VI. No person whatever shall, by reason of place of birth, or by reason of descent, be excepted from the jurisdiction of any Court of Small Causes constituted or invested with Small Cause jurisdiction under this Act ; and any such Court shall be competent to hear and determine all claims cognizable by such Court, when the cause of action shall have arisen, or the defendant at the time of the commencement of the suit shall reside as a fixed inhabitant, or personally work for gain, within the local limits of the jurisdiction of such Court.

VII. Whenever a Court of Small Causes is constituted under this Act, all suits cognizable under the provisions of this Act, which shall arise within the limits of the jurisdiction of such Court, shall be heard and determined in such Court, and shall not be cognizable, except in the way of appeal, in any other Court. In like manner whenever any Court is invested with Small Cause jurisdiction under this Act, all suits cognizable under the provisions of this Act, which may arise within the limits of the jurisdiction of such Court, shall be heard and determined in accordance with the provisions of this Act.

VIII. Nothing in this Act shall be held to take away the jurisdiction which a Magistrate, or a person exercising the powers of a Magistrate, or an Assistant or a Deputy Magistrate, can now exercise in regard to debts or other claims of a Civil nature ; or the jurisdiction which can be exercised by Village Moonsiffs or Village or District Punchayets under the provisions of the Madras Code, or by Punchayets

of Village Moonsiffs and Village or District Punchayets in Madras—

under Regulation VII. 1827 of the Bombay Code, or by Military Courts of Request, or by a single Officer duly authorized and appointed under the rules in force in the Presidencies of Fort St. George and Bombay respectively, for the trial of small suits in Military Bazars, in

Cantonments, and Stations occupied by the troops of those Presidencies, respectively, or by Punchayets in regard to suits against Military persons, according to the rules in force under the Presidency of Fort St. George.

IX. Courts of Small Causes constituted under this Act shall be held at such place or places within the local limits of their respective jurisdictions as shall be appointed by the local Government to which such Courts are subordinate.

X. Whenever any such Court is directed to be held at more places than one within the local limits of its jurisdiction, the Judge of such Court, subject to the control of the Judge of the District, shall appoint the time at which the Court shall hold its sittings in every such place. Due notice of the time so appointed shall be given by a proclamation to be fixed up in some conspicuous place in the Court-house or other building in which the sittings of the Court are to be held.

XI. The procedure to be observed in the trial of cases cognizable under this Act, shall be that prescribed in *(for simplifying the Procedure of the Courts of Civil Judicature not established by Royal Charter)*, and the provisions of that Act, unless otherwise herein provided, shall be applicable to cases tried under this Act.

XII. In suits tried under this Act, the decision of the Court shall be final, if the amount or value of the property in dispute shall not exceed the sum of fifty Rupees ; but if it exceed that sum, an appeal shall lie from the decision to the District Court, and the decision of the District Court upon the appeal, if any, shall be final.

XIII. If in the trial of any suit under this Act, whether originally or in appeal, any question of law or usage having the force of law or the construction of a document affecting the merits of the decision shall arise, on which the Court may entertain reasonable doubts, the Court may either of its own motion or on the application of any of the parties to the suit, draw up a statement of the case and submit it, with its own opinion, for the decision of the Sudder Court.

XIV. The Court may proceed in the case, notwithstanding a reference to the Sudder Court, and may pass a decree contingent upon the opinion of the Sudder Court on the point referred ; but no execution shall be issued in any case in which a reference may be made to the Sudder Court, until the receipt of the order of that Court.

XV. Cases referred for the opinion of the Sudder Court shall be dealt with by a full bench of that Court.

XVIII. The Sudder Court, when it has heard and considered the case, shall transmit a copy of its judgment, under the seal of the Court and the signature of the Register, to the Court by which the reference was made; and such Court shall, on the receipt thereof, proceed to dispose of the case conformably to the decision of the Sudder Court.

XIX. Each party shall bear his own costs, if any, consequent on the reference of a case for the opinion of the Sudder Court.

XX. In cases decided under this Act, in which no appeal is allowed, or if allowed, in which no appeal may have been preferred, it shall be competent to the Court which decided the case, to grant one new trial if applied for within the period of thirty days from the date of the decision, unless the party making the application can show just and reasonable cause for not having preferred the same within that period.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of Major General Sir J. H. Grant, K. C. B., Commanding Oudh Force, that I received intimation from Mr. Bradford, the Assistant Commissioner, on the 5th instant, of a body of the Madahewa Rebels having advanced and occupied Kintoor, distance 10 miles from this north-east, and Buddoo Serai, to the north-west, a mile and a half from there, pushing on their picquets about a mile and a half towards us. I sent out a Cavalry Patrol on the 5th instant, to reconnoitre the enemy's position, and finding that they were likely to remain there, I determined upon moving

2 o'clock A. M., for Kintoor, taking the European Infantry on elephants, and using bullocks to draw the Artillery, thereby easing the horses and enabling all to go fresh into action. I halted a short time before day-break, and about 6 o'clock the enemy's advanced picquet was distinctly visible, upon which I ordered the Cavalry to drive in the same, and ascertain the exact position of the main body of the Rebels, directing at the same time the guns of the European Artillery, under Lieutenant Swinton, and Kuppurthullah Contingent under Ensign Roddy, to be immediately horsed, and proceed to the front as quickly as possible, which was accomplished most satisfactorily, having 3 miles to gallop up to them. Ensign Roddy's guns were the first to open on the Rebel Cavalry, reported to be some of the late 3rd Light Cavalry of Meerut notoriety, under the Command of a Havildar Major of the same Corps, and who had drawn up his men in good order, sounding the different Cavalry calls, and apparently with the intention of charging, when Ensign Roddy sent grape into their ranks, the first discharge emptying six saddles, and causing the Commandant to retire himself, and a few more rounds threw them into confusion, and they retreated. The only gun that opened on us now received Ensign Roddy's attention; the first round shot knocking over three of the gun bullocks in one yoke, having passed through two, and lodged in the third, and the gun was shortly after captured by Ensign Roddy's guns, when he immediately pursued the retreating enemy for 5 miles, accompanied by the Cavalry, and as he drove the enemy from Kintoor towards Buddoo Serai, they were followed up by the Cavalry and intercepted by the European Artillery, placed on a commanding eminence, so as to cut off their retreat to the latter place, which was most effectually done. The chief work of the day devolved on the Kuppurthullah Contingent guns, under Ensign Roddy. Hodson's Horse, under Lieutenant Battye, of the 19th Native Infantry, doing duty with the Bengal Fusiliers, and the Kuppurthullah Cavalry, under Lieutenant Woodgate, 11th Native Infantry. These Officers, with their respective Troops, forming the pursuing force, with 100 men of the Oudh Military Police, whilst the European guns under Lieutenant Swinton occupied the left position towards Buddoo Serai, and held the enemy in check there.

2. The enemy were estimated at 3,000 Infantry and 200 or 300 Cavalry, and 4 guns, originally; but from getting intelligence the previous night of our intended attack, they removed some of their guns at once and

the only one which opened on us was captured, a copper 9-pounder of native manufacture. I was not aware of this gun being taken until the return of Ensign Roddy, when he reported the same, and concluding that we should follow in his rear and so take charge whilst he was in pursuit, did not send to inform me of it. I immediately started off with Lieutenant Chamier, Assistant Commissioner, Lieutenant Morland, my Orderly Officer, and 100 Sowars of the Oudh Police, under Lieutenant Sadlier, to obtain the gun, which we found had been removed by the enemy, and after following the track of the carriage for about 4 miles at a sharp gallop, we sighted the Cavalry retreating far in advance. We pursued as far as was judicious, and on our return found the gun and bullocks deserted near the spot where we first saw the enemy's Cavalry retreating. On my return after this, I placed the Troops in topos for the remainder of the day, no opportunity having offered of the Infantry being engaged, though I believe that the fact of seeing them in the distance on elephants, had a wonderful effect on the Rebels in causing them to retreat rapidly.

3. Every thing passed off most satisfactorily, and the severe chastisement the enemy have received will, I hope, prove beneficial, 450 having been killed, including some natives of rank, added to which we burnt their camp, captured an elephant, 10 camels and several bullocks, some with the Government brand, and destroyed their ammunition and new gun limbers, which were being made. Their dead were lying quite thick, 50 in one space, and 80 in another altogether. Mr. Bradford, the Assistant Commissioner, reports that from native information alone the affair was most complete; the Casualties on our side are very trifling, being 4 men wounded, 7 horses wounded and 1 killed.

4. My best thanks are due to Lieutenant Chamier Assistant Commissioner, Durriabad, and in Political charge Kuppurthullah Contingent, for his most valuable assistance on this as also previous occasions; to Lieutenant Sadlier, Commanding Detachment Oudh Military Police, who at my solicitation deferred his march from this for a day, and kindly placed his services and that of his Cavalry at my disposal, this augmentation to that branch in which we are deficient being most acceptable; and the meritorious conduct of Kote Duffadar Phoola Singh, of the Oudh Military Police Cavalry, having been brought to my notice by Lieutenant Sadlier, as being severely wounded when engaged with three of the enemy. I have much pleasure in recommending him to favorable consideration; also to Lieutenant Hamilton Maxwell, my Detachment Staff; as also Lieutenant Morland, my Orderly Officer, both of whom were most active and energetic in the performance of their respective duties; and to Lieutenant Swinton, Commanding the European Artillery; and Ensign Roddy, of the Kuppurthullah Contingent, for their excellent practice and great execution, as also to Lieutenant Woodgate, 11th Native Infantry, Commanding the Rajah's Cavalry, and Lieutenant Battye, 19th Native Infantry, Commanding Detachment Hodson's Horse, both of whom, aided by Unattached Ensign Nuthall, belonging to the Punjab Sappers, who volunteered to do duty with Hodson's Horse, as he was remaining at Durriabad for the day, and who, I am informed, killed three men himself; my thanks are equally due for their exertions in pursuit of the enemy.

5. His Highness the Rajah of Kuppurthullah and his brother accompanied the Column, and remained with the same during, and was highly gratified with the favorable result of the day's labors.

6. The Rebel leaders are reported to be four, viz. — Collector Darakhais, relative of Mummo Khar.

all of whom made an early retreat leaving their

Troops to follow. Several Sikhs are reported to have been fighting against us, and some of them were killed; one taken prisoner, states that the Rebels thought the Contingent would attack them alone, as at Kuthiya, without Europeans, in which case they purposed standing, but finding the Europeans make their appearance they determined upon not remaining to see them.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to transmit to you, for submission to the Right Hon'ble the Commander-in-Chief, the accompanying Report from Captain Howlett, 27th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, Commanding the out-post at Bansee, of two successful actions with the enemy, about 1,200 or 1,500 strong near Chittiah, about 6 miles from Bansee, on the 28th and 30th September with the Detachments under his command, of the 27th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, 2nd Sikh Military Police Battalion, a Troop 6th Madras Cavalry, and one of the Bansee Rajah's guns, on the first day; and on the second day with the reinforcement sent up from Bustee of 2 guns and 30 men *Pearl's* Naval Brigade, 70 men 13th Light Infantry, and half a Troop Bengal Yeomanry Cavalry. On the 28th the enemy suffered a loss of about 50 killed and wounded. On the 30th the enemy were driven from a very strong position, but few are reported to be killed in this attack, as immediately the guns opened they rapidly retired over a difficult and swampy country, pursued by our Troops for a considerable distance, and making for the westward towards Biskohur and the forest.

2. In the first action one of their leaders was killed, and another leader, a Subadar, had his horse shot under him, and in the retreat was murdered by the Rebels, accused of having got them into difficulty and trouble.

3. I am happy to say, our Casualty List is very light.

4. The good conduct, zeal, and cheerful alacrity of the Officers and Troops of all arms, in bad wet weather, and over a difficult country, is highly spoken of, and I beg to recommend them and Captain Howlett, Com-

manding the Detachment, to the most favorable notice of the Right Hon'ble the Commander-in-Chief.

TO THE BRIGADE MAJOR,

Bustee.

SIR,

I REPORTED on the evening of the 27th ultimo, my intention of bridging the Parassy Nuddec, in readiness for offensive movements against the Rebels, who, to the number of about 2,000, occupied an entrenched position in Chettiah, and the neighbouring villages, three *coos* north of Bansee.

2. Accordingly, early on the 28th, I took out coolies and materials, with an escort of 120 men of the 27th Madras Native Infantry, under Captain Kenney. On reaching the river's bank my advanced guard was met by a sharp file fire from the Rebel picquets, who were soon after supported by their main body. The swell of the ground, and much brushwood afforded them good cover, and the bend of the river upon our right flank exposed us to the fire of their left, where they brought their gun and zumbooruk to bear upon us: there was also some brushwood on our side of the river, under cover of which I extended my men and returned the fire, sending back on Bansee for a gun and more Troops, and constructing meanwhile a raft with which to force a passage. This was ready in about three hours, during which time a constant interchange of fire had been kept up. I then crossed over with all my force, seizing a village which covered the right flank of the Rebels. Here very heavy rain, which had been falling for a considerable time, and the lateness of the hour, induced me to halt, as I could not expect to accomplish more before dark. Next morning the European reinforcements Naval Brigade, 30 men with 2 from Bustee arrived, and 12-pounder Howitzers. I marched on Chettiah with the force detailed in the margin. I found the place evacuated and halted here, in consequence of violent and continued rain, and my information regarding the exact position of the Rebels being unsatisfactory.

3. Next morning again I marched westward, and soon after day light, came up with the enemy, who held a strong position, and seemed inclined to fight, for they had thrown out skirmishers to meet us, but their courage failed as we advanced, and a shell or two from the Naval guns decided them. They fled, and we pursued them for fully 4 miles, till they obtained the cover of the jungle; the difficult nature of the ground precluded the efficient use of Cavalry.

4. Our attack has had the effect of completely disheartening the Rebels, who are clearing quickly out of the District, making, as I believe, for Oude.

5. I have not been able to learn the exact loss of the Rebels. On the 20th their loss was certainly upwards of 50 killed and wounded, besides two of their Sirdars; they also burst their gun on that occasion, but on the 30th they got away with less damage.

6. I have the satisfaction, in concluding, of recommending to the Brigadier's notice the praiseworthy zeal and energy alike displayed by Officers and Men in these two affairs, especially in that of the Parrassy Nuddee, when the men showed great coolness and steadiness under fire. The names of Assistant Apothecary Sansman and a Naiquo, and Private of the 27th Madras Native Infantry, were particularly brought to my notice.

I think it due also to Lieutenant Pullan, Commanding Sikh Detachment, to mention that this Officer's local knowledge has enabled him to render me much assistance.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to forward herewith, for submission to His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief a report from Lieutenant-Colonel Dunsford, C. B., Commanding at Buxar, of an expedition despatched by him up the Kurrumnassa River, with the intention of surprising (if possible) Megha Rao, a Rebel Chief who has been for some time past plundering the Zemaniah portion of the District of Ghazee-pore.

2. This expedition,—though from the circumstances under which it was undertaken, and from defective information,—only partially successful,—reflects great credit on Major Carr, Madras Rifles, to whom the command was entrusted.

3. The punishment inflicted on the Rebels was severe, and will no doubt produce beneficial effect in the District.

4. I am unable to express my grief at the loss to the service of two such good and dashing Cavalry Officers, as Captain Nason, Military Train, and Captain Douglas, 4th Madras Light Cavalry. They were both brave to a fault, and both had greatly distinguished themselves. Both were shot through the body at the head of their respective Troops, almost at the same moment. Captain Nason deliberately charged a Sepoy, who stood to receive him with a loaded musket and bayonet; he was so close that his body was blackened by the powder.

Captain Douglas ran the man through and was almost immediately shot, but strange to say, he cut down two Sepoys after receiving his death-wound. I had counted on both these Officers, in my present operations for important commands, and their loss to me at this moment, is irreparable.

Although the great disproportion between the loss in Officers and Men, (of whom several are slightly wounded) may lead at first sight to the inference that the latter did not heartily support their Officers; this is, by no means the case. Major Carr speaks in the highest terms of the gallant bearing of the Soldiers, both of the Military Train and the 4th Madras Cavalry; and my personal observation of their conduct in all cases in the field, fully bears out and corroborates this opinion.

No return of the number of horses wounded has reached me; but this will be obtained and forwarded hereafter.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of Brigadier Douglas, C. B., that having learnt from my spies that Megha Rao, a resident of Gohumr, (who has lately assembled a number of men about him) was at the head of about four hundred

Sepoys, levying contributions in the Chowwa District I determined to take advantage of a great rise in the River Kurrumnassa, to try and effect his capture. For this purpose, I had previously sent up the gun-boat "Benares," under her energetic enterprising Commander Mr. Browne, who reported he could with

safety take up about two hundred men as far as Dehree. On the evening of the 6th instant, therefore, I detailed the party as per margin, sending the Infantry by Steamer and the Cavalry around *vid* Chowwa, with orders to meet the Infantry at a place to be appointed by Major Carr, of the Madras Rifles, whom I had named to command the expedition, and whose report I beg to

enclose. The lamented loss of the two gallant Cavalry Leaders, Captain Nason, Military Train, and Captain Douglas, 4th Madras Cavalry, has greatly dimmed this otherwise most successful expedition, in which all behaved so cheerfully and well. The loss to the enemy of so many Sepoys will no doubt be severely felt, but still greater will be the moral effect of a surprise upon a Rebel Chief, who has hitherto carried on his depredations unmolested. Megha Rao is said to have been of the party, but was probably one of the first to make his escape.

I had been given to understand that Keree, a village not marked in the Map, was only about 4 miles from Dehree, whereas Major Carr reported it to be much more, and that instead of being landed at Dehree the march was much lengthened by the Troops having been disembarked by mistake, at a short distance South of Soompa.

In conclusion, I would beg to report, that the Kurrumnassa has been cleared of all boats, and communication with the Ghazee pore side, I hope, effectually cut off.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to inform you, that agreeably to your instructions, I embarked with 100 men of Her Majesty's 84th Foot, under Captain Snow, 32 men of the Madras Rifles, under Captain Barclay, of the 68th Regiment Bengal Native Infantry, and 53 men of the 20th Punjab Infantry, under Lieutenant Jarrett, at 11 p. m. of the 6th instant, and proceeded as previously arranged up the Kurrumnassa River to Dehree, where I expected to meet a Troop of the Military Train under Captain Nason, and a Troop of the 4th Madras Light Cavalry, under Captain Douglas, who had command of the Cavalry portion of the expedition.

Through faulty information we landed some 3 miles short of Dehree, at 5 a. m. of the 7th instant, and it was consequently some time before I could arrange for the Cavalry to join me. On their doing so, I requested Captain Douglas to push on to the village of Keree, which, as the Head Quarters of Megha Rao Sing was the object of the expedition, with directions to surround the village, so as to prevent the escape of the Rebels whom I expected to find to the number of two and three hundred, with the usual complement of budmahes, until I came up with the Infantry por-

tion of the Force. Keree was reported to me only two koss from Dehree; it was fully nine miles.

Captain Douglas accordingly proceeded, but when he arrived about two miles from Keree; he encountered a body of the enemy of fully 300 Sepoys, who had either come out to meet the Force, or were proceeding on a plundering expedition. The Rebels took post on a low marshy ground, amongst standing corn, or rather advanced to meet the advance of the Cavalry who were three quarters of a mile in advance of the Infantry. The Cavalry charged and broke the Rebels, who, on retiring and fighting desperately, lost a number.

Mr. Garstin, the Magistrate, who accompanied the expedition, counted in one place 38 bodies all of Sepoys; in the standing corn where the first collision took place, a greater number are said to have been killed; five more were killed in the village of Keree; and I think I may say that sixty is below the number of those who were killed.

The enemy were completely broken, but our success was purchased dearly. In almost the first part of the conflict, the gallant Nason fell, shot dead; in a few seconds afterwards, the gallant Douglas received a mortal wound, from which he has since died. Both these invaluable Officers were shot in the same place; in the centre of the body.

The horses of the Cavalry being completely worn out, they halted; I came up with the Infantry, but the enemy had all disappeared.

I advanced on the village of Keree, with the whole Force, fully expecting that the village was occupied. I formed the Detachment in regular order, sending the Cavalry, divided into two equal portions, on the right and left of the village; the Infantry advanced on and into it; the village, which was a very long one was completely deserted; according to instruction it was set fire to, but with only partial success, as the houses were all tiled; however a good deal of it was destroyed.

I remained with the whole Force at Keree until 2 p. m.; the object of the expedition being then fully accomplished, I commenced my march back to the Steamer, which I reached at 8 p. m. The force of the sun was dreadful, and the brave Soldiers of Her Majesty's 84th Foot suffered very much; a number of them were struck down by the sun, but by God's blessing, on the untiring efforts of Assistant Surgeon Eteson, of the 20th Punjab Infantry, none died.

Instead of 4 miles to Keree, and 4 back as you were led to believe, we had to march upwards of 24 miles before we got back to the Steamer. The Infantry portion of the Force arrived back here at 3 a. m. to-day. The Cavalry, who from the time they started from Buzar, to the time of their return, a little more than twenty-four hours, had marched fully fifty miles, had fought an action in dreadfully swampy ground, got back here a short time before us.

I have the honor to bear my testimony to the good conduct and perseverance of all the Force, and the cheerful endurance of a very trying day's labour.

I would wish particularly to notice the exertions of Assistant Surgeon Eteson, who being the only Medical Officer with the Force, performed the duty of two Medical Officers, to the satisfaction of all.

Three men of the Military Train and one of the 4th Madras Light Cavalry, were slightly wounded; many horses were wounded more or less, and one belonging to the Military Train being unable to move, I ordered it to be shot.

Colonel Purnell, C. B., reports that on the 10th instant, he sent 100 Sowars under Lieutenant Mitford, of Hodson's Horse, to relieve a friendly Zemindar, (at Bibipore, 15 miles from Nawabgunge,) who was being besieged by Sepoys. On the approach of the party, the Sepoys took refuge in a house, and Lieutenant Mitford, forcing an entrance with 20 dismounted men, killed 11 and made prisoners of nine others, whom he brought back to Camp, together with the muskets and accoutrements of the whole party.

"My spies have been for miles round about and there is hardly a Rebel to be heard of, except at Birwah, where there are only a few men. The fort at Hutturah, a mile and a half from Birwah, has been evacuated by Zuluck Sing.

"Bahrut Sing (on our side, now at Etawah) wishes to occupy that Fort at once; and he also reports that all the Zemindars are willing to come in, if he, (Bahrut Sing) will order them to do so."

I HAVE the honor to transmit for submission to the Right Hon'ble the Commander-in-Chief, a report from Captain Garrard, 27th Regiment Madras Native Infantry, Commanding the outpost of Amorha, of an attack made on his post by the Rebel Force, about 1,200 strong, with 2 guns, from the westward, under Bane Singh, on the 1st October, when the enemy were completely defeated and pursued for a considerable distance, losing, as stated by late reports, about 150 killed and wounded.

2. The repulse and defeat of the enemy appear to have been very ably managed by Captain Garrard.

3. The *Pearl's* Naval Brigade men under Lieutenants Fawkes and Macquay are very favorably mentioned on the occasion. One of their guns in the pursuit was got up close to the Rebels, doing good execution. Captain Rowley, Commanding a Party of Her Majesty's 13th Light Infantry, and Lieutenant MacDonald, Commanding Troop 6th Madras Cavalry, are also very favorably mentioned; and I beg to recommend the Officers and Men of all Arms, for their zeal and gallantry, to the most favorable notice of the Right Hon'ble the Commander-in-Chief.

4. I beg to mention that Havildar Syed Modeen, Jemadar Emam Khan, Trumpeter Offerman, and Trooper Noor Khan, of the 6th Madras Cavalry, have been particularly brought to my notice, for their gallant forward conduct: the first named cutting down and killing three, the others, each two of the Rebels, and to solicit such notice of their zealous bearing, as the Right Hon'ble the Commander-in-Chief may deem them deserving of. I am happy to report that our casualty list is very light.

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of the Officer Commanding the Goruckpore Field Force, that the enemy from Lumpti, 1,200 strong, with two guns under Bane Singh attacked Amorha, yesterday, in front, a further body 600 strong with 2 guns from Jugdespore, threatening it on the right and rear. occupied posts in a semi-circle, at 600 yards out-side the entrenchment, the guns in the centre and Cavalry in rear of the left. The action commenced at 2½ P. M., and by 4½ the Rebels commenced retiring. Leaving the rest of my Force in position to meet the expected attack from Jugdespore, I pursued with the Seikhs, the Cavalry and one gun, with half the Naval Brigade, and 30 of Her Majesty's 13th Light Infantry in support. Heavy rain rendered the matchlocks of the Rebels useless, and overtaking them at three miles from this, we cut up a good many. Lieutenant MacDonell Commanding the Cavalry, reports highly of Havildar Syud Modeen, who cut down three and was most forward. Also of Jemadar Emam Khan, Trumpeter Offerman, and Trooper Noor Khan, each of whom killed two Rebels, and did their duty right well. The enemy are said to have lost 200, of whom 85 have been accounted for as killed, and 40 wounded; of the remainder nothing certain is known. I have to express my thanks to Captain Rowley, Her Majesty's 13th Light Infantry; Lieutenants Fawkes and Macquay of the Naval Brigade; and Lieutenant MacDonell of the Cavalry, as well as to the men under their Command, for their zeal and gallantry throughout the affair.

The Thannadar of Amorha has given me much satisfaction on account of the correct intelligence produced by him.

Para 2. In respect to Casual Leave, His Honor in Council directs, after a careful consideration of the difficulties and inconvenience which an attempt to regulate such Leave by general Rules is apt to produce, that the Financial Resolution of 19th March 1858, which limits the grant of Casual Leave to fifteen days in every Calendar Year be cancelled; and that it be left to the Heads of Offices, subject to the orders of their own Government, to grant, at their discretion, Casual Leave of absence from Office in case of sickness, death of near relatives, &c., on condition that the Local Government shall see that the discretionary power to be placed in the Heads of Offices is not abused.

Para 3. Such casual absences from Office should not be reported to the Civil Auditor, but they should be systematically entered in a Book to be kept in each Office, and when an application for Privilege Leave may be received, the Leave should be granted or refused with some reference to the entries in the Book. Reports, however, should be made as at present to the Civil Auditor, in respect to the other descriptions of leave mentioned in the first part of this Resolution.

Legislative Council of India.

THE 20TH NOVEMBER 1858.

THE following Bill was read a first time on the 6th November 1858. The second reading has been postponed for four months, in order that the Bill may be published with a view to elicit the opinions of the public generally upon the subject of Judicial Oaths and Affirmations:—

A Bill concerning Oaths and Affirmations.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the law relating to Oaths and Affirmations; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

Preamble.

I. Acts V of 1840, and II of 1847, are hereby repealed.

II. In all cases in which at present any person

Person required to make oath in any Court &c., shall be sworn in manner most binding on his conscience.

is required to make oath or affirmation in any Court of Justice, or before any person empowered by law to administer oaths or affirmations, such person shall, from and after the passing of this Act, be sworn to speak the whole truth and nothing but the truth (or in the case of a juror, to give a true verdict according to the evidence) in the manner that may be considered most binding on the conscience of such person, by the Court or person before whom such person may be examined.

III. Provided always that, if a person be of a rank which, according to the customs of the country, would render it improper to compel him or her to take an oath, or if any person have conscientious scruples against taking an oath, the Court or person empowered by law to administer oaths or affirmations, may dispense with such person being sworn, provided that such person shall make the following affirmation—

“I solemnly affirm that what I shall state in the matter now under investigation shall be the whole truth and nothing but the truth.”

Or if the person be a juror—

“I solemnly affirm that I will give a true verdict according to the evidence.”

IV. If any person, making such oath or affirmation as aforesaid, shall wilfully and falsely state for truth that which he knows or believes to be false, or which he does not know or believe to be true, such person shall be punishable in the manner provided by any law for the time being in force for the punishment of perjury and giving false evidence.

V. Any person causing or procuring another to commit the offence defined in the last preceding Section, shall be punishable in the manner provided by any law for the time being in force for the punishment of subornation of perjury, or causing or procuring false evidence.

VI. Nothing in this Act shall be held to interfere with the provisions of Sections XV and XVI of Act II of 1855 (for the further improvement of the Law of Evidence), which enact that any person who, by reason of immature age, or want of religious belief, or by reason of defect of religious belief, ought not, in the opinion of the Court or person before whom his or her attendance is required, to be admitted to give evidence on oath or solemn affirmation, shall be admitted to give evidence on a simple affirmation that he or she will speak the whole truth and nothing but the truth, and that the same provision shall apply to testimony given by affidavit or otherwise; and the provisions of the said Sections shall have the same force and effect as if this Act had not been passed.

THE 27TH NOVEMBER 1858.

THE following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 27th November 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee who are to report thereon after the 1st of March next:—

A Bill for the establishment of Courts of Small Causes beyond the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter.

WHEREAS, with a view to the more easy recovery of small debts and demands, it is expedient to establish Courts of Small Causes beyond the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter at the several Presidencies of Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay; It is enacted as follows:—

I. It shall be lawful for the Executive Government of any of the said Presidencies or of any place, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, to constitute Courts of Small Causes, with the required establishment of Officers, at any place within the limits of their respective Governments, for the trial of suits under this Act. Whenever any such Court may be so constituted, the Executive Government shall fix the territorial jurisdiction of such Court, and may, from time to time, alter the same as may appear proper.

II. It shall also be lawful for any such Executive Government to invest any Court subordinate to a District Court, now existing or which may hereafter be established within the limits of their respective Governments, with Small Cause jurisdiction for the trial of suits made cognizable by Courts of Small Causes constituted under this Act.

III. The following are the suits which shall be cognizable by Courts of Small Causes constituted under this Act, namely, claims for money due, whether on bond or other contract, or for rent, or for personal property, or for the value of such property, or for damages, when the debt, damage, or demand does not exceed in amount or value the sum of five hundred Rupees. Provided that no action shall lie in any such Court on a balance of partnership account, unless the balance shall have been struck by the parties or their agents; or for a share or part of a share under an intestacy, or for a legacy or part of a legacy under a will; or for any claim relating to arrears or exactions of rent, or to alleged illegal distrains for rent, for which claim or for any part whereof a summary suit could have been brought before an Officer of Government in the Revenue Department if commenced in due time; or for the recovery of damages on account of alleged personal injuries, unless special damage of a pecuniary nature shall have resulted from such injury.

IV. Every Court constituted under this Act shall use a seal, bearing the following inscription in English and in the language of the Court—“Court of Small Causes of _____” and every such Court shall be a Court of Record, and to be generally subject to the Zillah Judge and Sudder Court, and shall be subject to the general control and orders of the Judge of the District and of the Sudder Court.

V. The language to be used in the proceedings of the Courts constituted under this Act, shall be the same as that in use in the principal Court of Civil jurisdiction in the District in which such Courts are established.

VI. No person whatever shall, by reason of place of birth, or by reason of descent, be excepted from the jurisdiction of any Court of Small Causes constituted or invested with Small Cause jurisdiction under this Act; and any such Court shall be competent to hear and determine all claims cognizable by such Court, when the cause of action shall have arisen, or the defendant at the time of the commencement of the suit shall reside as a fixed inhabitant, or personally work for gain, within the local limits of the jurisdiction of such Court.

VII. Whenever a Court of Small Causes is constituted under this Act, all suits cognizable under the provisions of this Act, which shall arise within the limits of the jurisdiction of such Court, shall be heard and determined in such Court, and shall not be cognizable, except in the way of appeal, in any other Court. In like manner whenever any Court is invested with Small Cause jurisdiction under this Act, all suits cognizable under the provisions of this Act, which may arise within the limits of the jurisdiction of such Court, shall be heard and determined in accordance with the provisions of this Act.

VIII. Nothing in this Act shall be held to take away the jurisdiction which a Magistrate, or a person exercising the powers of a Magistrate, or an Assistant or a Deputy Magistrate, can now exercise in regard to debts or other claims of a Civil nature; or the jurisdiction which can be exercised by Village Moonsiffs or Village or District Panchayets under the provisions of the Madras Code, or by Panchayets under Regulation VII. 1827 of the Bombay Code, or by Military Courts of Request, or by a single Officer duly authorized and appointed under the rules in force in the Presidencies of Fort St. George and Bombay respectively, for the trial of small suits in Military Bazaars, in Cantonments, and Stations occupied by the troops of those Presidencies, respectively, or by Panchayets in regard to suits against Military persons, according to the rules in force under the Presidency of Fort St. George.

IX. Courts of Small Causes constituted under this Act shall be held at such place or places within the local limits of their respective jurisdictions as shall be appointed by the local Government to which such Courts are subordinate.

X. Whenever any such Court is directed to be held at more places than one within the local limits of its jurisdiction, the Judge of such Court, subject to the control of the Judge of the District, shall appoint the time at which the Court shall hold its sittings in every such place. Due notice of the time so appointed shall be given by a proclamation to be fixed up in some conspicuous place in the Court-house or other building in which the sittings of the Court are to be held.

XI. The procedure to be observed in the trial of cases cognizable under this Act, shall be that prescribed in *(for simplifying the Procedure of the Courts of Civil Judicature not established by Royal Charter)*, and the provisions of that Act, unless otherwise herein provided, shall be applicable to cases tried under this Act.

XII. In suits tried under this Act, the decision of the Court shall be final, if the amount or value of the property in dispute shall not exceed the sum of fifty Rupees; but if it exceed that sum, an appeal shall lie from the decision to the District Court, and the decision of the District Court upon the appeal, if any, shall be final.

XIII. If in the trial of any suit under this Act, whether originally or in appeal, any question of law or usage having the force of law or the construction of a document affecting the merits of the decision shall arise, on which the Court may entertain reasonable doubts, the Court may either of its own motion or on the application of any of the parties to the suit, draw up a statement of the case and submit it, with its own opinion, for the decision of the Sudder Court.

XIV. The Court may proceed in the case, notwithstanding a reference to the Sudder Court, and may pass a decree contingent upon the opinion of the Sudder Court on the point referred; but no execution shall be issued in any case in which a reference may be made to the Sudder Court, until the receipt of the order of that Court.

XV. Cases referred for the opinion of the Sudder Court shall be dealt with by a full bench of that Court.

XVI. The Sudder Court shall fix an early day for the hearing of the case, and shall notify the same by a proclamation to be fixed up in the Court-house of that Court.

XVII. The parties to the case may appear and be heard in the Sudder Court in person or by pleader.

XVIII. The Sudder Court, when it has heard and considered the case, shall transmit a copy of its judgment, under the seal of the Court and the signature of the Register, of the Court by which the reference was made; and such Court shall, on the receipt thereof, proceed to dispose of the case conformably to the decision of the Sudder Court.

XIX. Each party shall bear his own costs, if any, consequent on the reference of a case for the opinion of the Sudder Court.

XX. In cases decided under this Act, in which no appeal is allowed, or if allowed, in which no appeal may have been preferred, it shall be competent to the Court which decided the case, to grant one new trial if applied for within the period of thirty days from the date of the decision, unless the party making the application can show just and reasonable cause for not having preferred the same within that period.

Transmit copy of correspondence relative to an application from the Government of Bombay, soliciting a decision on two questions submitted by the Reverend G. N. Mitford, Assistant Chaplain, Bombay Establishment, viz. —

1st.—“What period of Service as distinguished from Residence, is requisite to entitle a Chaplain to the higher rate of Furlough Pay, viz., £101-12-3 laid down in 1844 by the Hon'ble Court, as well as for Pension.”
2nd.—“Is the period of seven years to be counted from the date of Arrival, or must the time taken under Medical Certificate be made up by actual Service.”

Para. 2. The term “Residence” in Section XXXI. of the Absentee Rules, and in paragraphs 2 and 3 of our Despatch in this Department dated 28th December 1855, No. 113, must be construed as “residence in actual Service,” con-

sequently a Chaplain will not be entitled to the higher rate of Furlough Allowance till he has completed seven years of actual Service, computed from the date of his arrival in India, nor will he be entitled to Pension on retirement until he has completed an actual Service, either of fifteen years if appointed before the 11th January 1854, or of seventeen years if appointed subsequently to that date. The time of absence passed on the ordinary Privilege Leave is, however, permitted to reckon as time spent on Service.

8. You were informed in paragraph 6 of our Despatch dated 15th September 1855, No. 78, that we did not require retrospective effect to be given to the new Rules, in respect of any leave which might have been taken by Chaplains in India previous to the date of their promulgation.

Notifications.—In the year 1855, a Public Officer serving under the Government of Bengal, with the cognizance of his immediate official superior, sold a house to a native gentleman living within his jurisdiction for 900 Rupees. There was not the remotest reason to suppose that the sale was in any respect otherwise than a fair transaction, but the matter having in due course been reported to the Honorable Court of Directors, the Court were pleased, in a Despatch dated the 4th March last, to desire that sales of this description between public Servants in India and Natives within their jurisdiction or beyond, should be strictly prohibited. The President in Council is assured that pecuniary transactions of an objectionable nature between public Servants and Natives of India seldom, if ever, now occur, and has the fullest reliance on the honor of the Queen's Servants in all Departments; but transactions of the nature alluded to, though in themselves entirely fair, and perfectly free on both sides from all unworthy motives, are liable to misconstruction, and when misconstrued are no less mischievous in their effect than corrupt dealings. In conformity, therefore, with the instructions of the Honorable Court, all such sales are prohibited. Should a Public Officer be doubtful whether a transaction to which he desires to become a party comes within this prohibition, he will consult his superior Officer and be guided by the instructions he may receive. A controlling Officer consulted on such an occasion will dispose of the case himself, or refer it for the orders of Government, as he may consider proper.

In respect to Casual Leave, His Honor in Council directs, after a careful consideration of the difficulties and inconvenience which an attempt to regulate such Leave by general Rules is apt to produce, that the Financial Resolution of 19th March 1858, which limits the grant of Casual Leave to fifteen days in every Calendar Year be cancelled; and that it be left to the Heads of Offices, subject to the orders of their own Government, to grant, at their discretion, Casual Leave of absence from Office in case of sickness, death of near relatives, &c., on condition that the Local Government shall see that the discretionary power to be placed in the Heads of Offices is not abused.

Para. 3. Such casual absences from Office should not be reported to the Civil Auditor, but they should be systematically entered in a Book to be kept in each Office, and when an application for Privilege Leave may be received, the Leave should be granted or refused with some reference to the entries in the Book. Legislative Council of India.

THE 20TH NOVEMBER 1858.

THE following Bill was read a first time on the 6th November 1858. The second reading has been postponed for four months, in order that the Bill may be published with a view to elicit the opinions of the public generally upon the subject of Judicial Oaths and Affirmations:—

A Bill concerning Oaths and Affirmations.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the law relating to Oaths and Affirmations; It is hereby enacted as follows:—

Acts repealed.

I. Acts V of 1840, and II of 1847, are hereby repealed.

II. In all cases in which at present any person is required to make oath or affirmation in any Court of Justice, or before any person empowered by law to administer oaths or affirmations, such person shall, from and after the passing of this Act, be sworn to speak the whole truth and nothing but the truth (or in the case of a juror, to give a true verdict according to the evidence) in the manner that may be considered most binding on the conscience of such person, by the Court or person before whom such person may be examined.

III. Provided always that, if a person be of a rank which, according to the customs of the country, would render it improper to compel him or her to take an oath, or if any person have conscientious scruples against taking an oath, the Court or person empowered by law to administer oaths or affirmations, may dispense with such person being sworn, provided that such person shall make the following affirmation—

“I solemnly affirm that what I shall state in the matter now under investigation shall be the whole truth and nothing but the truth.”

Or if the person be a juror—

“I solemnly affirm that I will give a true verdict according to the evidence.”

IV. If any person, making such oath or affirmation as aforesaid, shall wilfully and falsely state for truth that which he knows or believes to be false, or which he does not know or believe to be true, such person shall be punishable in the manner provided by any law for the time being in force for the punishment of perjury and giving false evidence.

V. Any person causing or procuring another to commit the offence defined in the last preceding Section, shall be punishable in the manner provided by any law for the time being in force for the punishment of subornation of perjury, or causing or procuring false evidence.

VI. Nothing in this Act shall be held to interfere with the provisions of Sections XV and XVI of Act II of 1855 (for the further improvement of the Law of Evidence), which enact that any person who, by reason of immature age, or want of religious belief, or by reason of defect of religious belief, ought not, in the opinion of the Court or person before whom his or her attendance is required, to be admitted to give evidence on oath or solemn affirmation, shall be admitted to give evidence on a simple affirmation that he or she will speak the whole truth and nothing but the truth, and that the same provision shall apply to testimony given by affidavit or otherwise; and the provisions of the said Sections shall have the same force and effect as if this Act had not been passed.

THE 27th NOVEMBER 1858.

THE following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 27th November 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee who are to report thereon after the 1st of March next:—

A Bill for the establishment of Courts of Small Causes beyond the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter.

WHEREAS, with a view to the more easy recovery of small debts and demands, it is expedient to establish Courts of Small Causes beyond the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Supreme Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter at the several Presidencies of Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay; It is enacted as follows:—

I. It shall be lawful for the Executive Government of any of the said Presidencies or of any place, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, to constitute Courts of Small Causes, with the required establishment of Officers, at any place within the limits of their respective Governments, for the trial of suits under this Act. Whenever any such Court may be so constituted, the Executive Government shall fix the territorial jurisdiction of such Court, and may, from time to time, alter the same as may appear proper.

II. It shall also be lawful for any such Executive Government to invest any Court subordinate to a District Court, now existing or which may hereafter be established within the limits of their respective Governments, with Small Cause jurisdiction for the trial of suits made cognizable by Courts of Small Causes constituted under this Act.

III. The following are the suits which shall be cognizable by Courts of Small Causes constituted under this Act, namely, claims for money due, whether on bond or other contract, or for rent, or for personal property, or for the value of such property, or for damages, when the debt, damage, or demand does not exceed in amount or value the sum of five hundred Rupees. Provided that no action shall lie in any such Court on a balance of partnership account, unless the balance shall have been struck by the parties or their agents; or for a share or part of a share under an intestacy, or for a legacy or part of a legacy under a will; or for any claim relating to arrears or exactions of rent, or to alleged illegal distrains for rent, for which claim or for any part whereof a summary suit could have been brought before an Officer of Government in the Revenue Department if commenced in due time; or for the recovery of damages on account of alleged personal injuries, unless special damage of a pecuniary nature shall have resulted from such injury.

IV. Every Court constituted under this Act shall use a seal, bearing the following inscription in English and in the language of the Court—“Court of Small Causes of _____;” and every such Court shall be a Court of Record, and shall be subject to the general control and orders of the Judge of the District and of the Sudder Court.

V. The language to be used in the proceedings of the Courts constituted under this Act, shall be the same as that in use in the principal Court of Civil jurisdiction in the District in which such Courts are established.

VI. No person whatever shall, by reason of place of birth, or by reason of descent, be excepted from the jurisdiction of any Court of Small Causes constituted or invested with Small Cause jurisdiction under this Act; and any such Court shall be competent to hear and determine all claims cognizable by such Court, when the cause of action shall have arisen, or the defendant at the time of the commencement of the suit shall reside as a fixed inhabitant, or personally work for gain, within the local limits of the jurisdiction of such Court.

VII. Whenever a Court of Small Causes is constituted under this Act, all suits cognizable under the provisions of this Act, which shall arise within the limits of the jurisdiction of such Court, shall be heard and determined in such Court, and shall not be cognizable, except in the way of appeal, in any other Court. In like manner whenever any Court is invested with Small Cause jurisdiction under this Act, all suits cognizable under the provisions of this Act, which may arise within the limits of the jurisdiction of such Court, shall be heard and determined in accordance with the provisions of this Act.

VIII. Nothing in this Act shall be held to take away the jurisdiction which a Magistrate, or a person exercising the powers of a Magistrate, or an Assistant or a Deputy Magistrate, can now exercise in regard to debts or other claims of a Civil nature; or the jurisdiction which can be exercised by Village Moonsiffs or Village or District Panchayets under the provisions of the Madras Code, or by Panchayets under Regulation VII. 1827 of the Bombay Code, or by Military Courts of Request, or by a single Officer duly authorized and appointed under the rules in force in the Presidencies of Fort St. George and Bombay respectively, for the trial of small suits in Military Bazaars, in Cantonments, and Stations occupied by the troops of those Presidencies, respectively, or by Panchayets in regard to suits against Military persons, according to the rules in force under the Presidency of Fort St. George.

IX. Courts of Small Causes constituted under this Act shall be held at such place or places within the local limits of their respective jurisdictions as shall be appointed by the local Government to which such Courts are subordinate.

X. Whenever any such Court is directed to be held at more places than one within the local limits of its jurisdiction, the Judge of such Court, subject to the control of the Judge of the District, shall appoint the time at which the Court shall hold its sittings in every such place. Due notice of the time so appointed shall be given by a proclamation to be fixed up in some conspicuous place in the Court-house or other building in which the sittings of the Court are to be held.

XI. The procedure to be observed in the trial of cases cognizable under this Act, shall be that prescribed in *Act (for simplifying the Procedure of the Courts of Civil Judicature not established by Royal Charter)*, and the provisions of that Act, unless otherwise herein provided, shall be applicable to cases tried under this Act.

XII. In suits tried under this Act, the decision of the Court shall be final, if the amount or value of the property in dispute shall not exceed the sum of fifty Rupees; but if it exceed that sum, an appeal shall lie from the decision to the District Court, and the decision of the District Court upon the appeal, if any, shall be final.

XIII. If in the trial of any suit under this Act, whether originally or in appeal, any question of law or usage having the force of law or the construction of a document affecting the merits of the decision shall arise, on which the Court may entertain reasonable doubts, the Court may either of its own motion or on the application of any of the parties to the suit, draw up a statement of the case and submit it, with its own opinion, for the decision of the Sudder Court.

XIV. The Court may proceed in the case, notwithstanding a reference to the Sudder Court, and may pass a decree contingent upon the opinion of the Sudder Court on the point referred; but no execution shall be issued in any case in which a reference may be made to the Sudder Court, until the receipt of the order of that Court.

XV. Cases referred for the opinion of the Sudder Court shall be dealt with by a full bench of that Court.

XVI. The Sudder Court shall fix an early day for the hearing of the case, and shall notify the same by a proclamation to be fixed up in the Court-house of that Court.

XVII. The parties to the case may appear and be heard in the Sudder Court in person or by pleader.

XVIII. The Sudder Court, when it has heard and considered the case, shall transmit a copy of its judgment, under the seal of the Court and the signature of the Register, of the Court by which the reference was made; and such Court shall, on the receipt thereof, proceed to dispose of the case conformably to the decision of the Sudder Court.

XIX. Each party shall bear his own costs, if any, consequent on the reference of a case for the opinion of the Sudder Court.

XX. In cases decided under this Act, in which no appeal is allowed, or if allowed, in which no appeal may have been preferred, it shall be competent to the Court which decided the case, to grant one new trial if applied for within the period of thirty days from the date of the decision, unless the party making the application can show just and reasonable cause for not having preferred the same within that period.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to forward for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, a report by Lieutenant Colonel Holmes, 12th Native Infantry, whom I sent on the 8th ultimo, from the further side of Tonk to pursue the Rebels.

2. I trust that the perseverance which Colonel Holmes displayed, and the patient endurance by the Troops, forced marches for 340 miles, partly during heat so intense that I lost 22 Europeans in three days, by sunstroke alone, when marching in the early morning, and partly during rains, said to be heavier than any which have been known in Rajpootana, will meet with the approval of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief.

3. I beg to bring to notice, that these men had already gone 135 miles with me, when we marched to save Jeypore, and that on rejoining after one day's halt, they accompanied me during the three forced marches, which enabled me on the fourth day (August 14th) to close with the Rebels on the Bunnass.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to report, for the information of the Major General Commanding Rajpootana Field Force, the operations of the Light

Field Detachment which he did me the honor to place under my Command, in Division Orders of the 8th ultimo. At 9 P. M. of the 8th ultimo the Column marched on Seelah, (distant about 18 miles) which I reached about 6 A. M. on the 9th. On the march, the sound of cannonading at Tonk was heard, and on arrival, reports were brought of the Rebel Force being in possession of the Town of Tonk.

Under instructions from Head Quarters, I moved on the morning of the 10th to the ford of the Bunnass River, at Kakray. Here I received information that the Rebels having knowledge of the approach of the British Force, abandoned Tonk and fled in the direction of Bunneetah, carrying off 4 guns and 4 tumbrils, besides spare ammunition belonging to the Nawab of Tonk.

On the 12th I marched to Ghans (distant 12 miles); reports of the Rebels' movements were conflicting. Some said they were at Bunneetah, others at Allyghur Rampoor, and others again, that their force, said to amount to 20,000 men, were divided between the two places above-named.

On the 13th I marched to Soontallah, where, hearing that the enemy were still on my left flank, I halted. In the evening I received intimation that the whole Rebel Force was at Koostulah and Mahdapore, trying to obtain possession of the latter place.

At midnight I continued my march for Koostulah, (distant about 18 miles); at a village about 4 miles from Koostulah, I heard that the Rebels were encamped at Koostulah. Giving time for the ammunition to close up, and directing the baggage to remain at the village (Poochalla), I moved forward with the hope of bringing the enemy to action.

On our Cavalry skirmishers approaching Koostulah, parties of Horse and Foot of the enemy were seen in flight through the ravines up to the hills. In that direction the Belooch Horse pursued, but were not successful in killing more than four men, one said to be a Jemadar of the Kotah Contingent, as also three men of that Corps. Several prisoners were made that day, but they were followers of the Rebels, and not worth detaining, and they were, after examination, dismissed.

A large body of the enemy it would appear had gone off to Ghodée and Pachowlass, the first thing in the morning or the night before; and as the Force under my Command had made a long march, our Baggage and Commissariat behind, and bodies of the enemy on the hills to the left of our route, and a column of them said to be on our left rear, I ordered a halt, sending the Belooch Horse to reconnoitre; they came upon one abandoned tumbril.

A large part of my baggage did not come up till late in the evening, and some not until the next morning, just as I was about to resume my march.

During the night, numerous camp fires could be seen along the ridge of the hills to our left front and left rear, and at 10 o'clock P. M., I received information from a Christian Officer (whose name I forget) Commanding the Nagur Battalion, in Mehdapore, that his Battalion had gone over to the enemy, and intended, in concert with the Rebels on the hills, to attack my Camp during the night; this obliged me to wait till daybreak, before I could attempt any further advance.

On the morning of the 14th, I marched to Pachowlass, starting at 7 o'clock, and was obliged to halt there, the Europeans being much exhausted with the heat.

The march to Koostulah forced many of the Rebels up the hills, and these I believe were never able to rejoin their main body.

Before me in flight remained the Rebel leaders, Tania Topce, Rao Sahib, the Nawab of Banda, Raheem Ali and others, two Regiments of Sepoys (Scindiah's), some hundreds of Bengal Mutineers, 5th and 7th Regiments of Irregular Cavalry, and some 3 or 4,000 other Horsemen, in all 10 or 12,000, men; no accounts that I could obtain made them less.

On the morning of the 15th ultimo I marched to Gooler, 6 miles, and in the evening to Angora, 6 more. The country becoming very difficult from jungle, ravines and nullahs, I was obliged to move during daylight.

On the 16th I halted in consequence of requiring supplies of flour for the Troops and extra carriage, and grain, and grass for the horses, all supplies on the line of march having been eaten up by the enemy.

On the 17th I moved to Pontara, 13 miles distant, through a strong Pass, and entered a valley formed by hills on our right, and the Mey River on our left; all this valley to Kutkur is full of ravines and jungle, and would be unsafe for Cavalry and Artillery to traverse without the protection of Infantry.

Information was brought that the enemy was halted on the Mey River in front of Kutkur, unable to pass the river.

At daylight on the 18th I moved on Kutkur (distant about 15 miles); on arrival, I heard that the Rebels had mostly passed the ford the day before, and the rear guard at daylight, but I am disposed to think that all had passed the day before. On this march one more tumbril was found abandoned, and was made over to the Tonk Horsemen accompanying me, and some gun ammunition was strewn along the road.

The ford of the river was deep and it took all that day, and a greater part of the night to pass the Troops and Baggage over.

On the 19th, hearing that the Rebels were entrenching at Matoonda, determined to make a stand, at 2½ P. M. I moved on Nowagaum (distant 6 miles); on arrival, being informed that they had moved to Boondee, I halted for the night and marched at early dawn to Boondee, on the 20th ultimo.

At Boondee on the 20th, I obtained information that the Rebels had marched the day before to Neem Keekera, and that they were moving through the Keena Pass, and intended marching upon Johaypore.

The road through the Keena Pass was described as difficult in the extreme, and supplies not procurable. I therefore decided on leaving the direct line of pursuit and by marching through the Boondee Pass to Johaypore; if I did not meet the enemy there to move on in pursuit, in the direction of Mundel Gurh, and intercept them between the River Bunnass and the hill country which they were traversing.

On the 21st I marched to Nowagaum and encamped on the banks of the Mey. This river, which on my arrival was ankle deep, rose most rapidly, and within an hour after was totally impassable, and it was not until the morning of the 25th, that I was enabled to cross the Column over to the village of Manglee.

On the morning of the 26th I commenced my march for Etonda. The advance guard of Cavalry and Detachment 72nd Highlanders crossed a nullah a short way in my front, and the Artillery was about to follow,

when the water rose so rapidly, that no further progress could be made, and it was with difficulty that I could recross that portion of the Force which had already passed over. After doing so, the river to my rear and the nullah to my front rose to so great a height, that I was obliged to halt till the 30th instant.

During the halt it was with the utmost difficulty that I could obtain supplies, and it was only by the construction of rafts, and by the employment of some men of the 12th Regiment Native Infantry, (expert swimmers) that I was enabled to procure supplies for the subsistence of the Troops, and Horses of the Artillery and Cavalry. During this protracted delay, I was receiving intelligence of the Rebels being at Keera, Jellodra, Maunpoora, Hora and Mundelgurh.

On the 31st at 10 A. M. the nullah becoming fordable, I crossed the Force over, encamped the Cavalry and Infantry just across the nullah.

On the 1st August at 3 P. M. I marched to Sarspoora, distant 4 miles, the road exceedingly deep in mud.

On the 2nd August at 2½ I marched to Tookra, distant 5 miles; the road most difficult for Artillery, and it was with the greatest exertions that the Troop Horse Artillery reached the encamping ground, between 7 and 8 o'clock, and part of the baggage, sick, carts, &c., did not arrive till the next morning.

On the 3rd August I was obliged to halt as the road ahead which I had directed to be examined, was pronounced impracticable.

On the 4th August, having discovered another route, I marched to Johaypore, where I received information of the Rebels being at Mundelgurh.

It was my intention to have resumed my march on the 5th, but I was prevented in consequence of the want of carriage with the Force, great numbers of camels having died on the march from Indagurh to Boondee, and during the eleven days' detention at Nowagaum and Manglee, as also on the march to Johaypore.

On the morning of the 6th I marched to Kujooru, where information was brought that the Rebels were crossing the Bunnass River at the Turbanee ford, and intended to march to Bheelwara.

On the morning of the 7th I marched to Kurhola. The Bunnass River was 4 or 5 miles in front, and said to be impracticable, excepting where the Rebels had crossed, and it was not till after many hours' search and till too late to make any further movement, that the Deputy Assistant Quarter Master General, Captain Heathcote, was able to discover one.

At 4 A. M. on the morning of the 8th, I moved on the ford, which was broad and upwards of three feet deep, and the passage of Troops and Baggage was not effected till nearly 5 o'clock.

About 2 o'clock P. M. I received intimation from the Assistant Quarter Master General, that the General's Camp was at Sanganeer, and that the Rebels were encamped at Bheelwara. I immediately made arrangements to march on Bheelwara as soon as the men had dined.

The Troops had fallen in for the march at 6½ P. M.; but not being furnished with proper guides, the march was not commenced till 9½ o'clock. The Troops marched all night, and between 2 and 3 o'clock P. M. on the 9th instant, reached Bheelwara, having marched about 35 miles, when I had the gratification of hearing of the successful action that had been fought, the evening before.

From the date of my leaving Head Quarters Camp, it had been my earnest endeavour to pursue as rapidly as possible, but the difficulties of the road were great and the heat of the weather in the first instance told upon the Europeans, and afterwards the heavy rains impeded the progress of the Artillery and baggage, and for eleven days the force was obliged to halt at the villages of Nowagaum and Manglee, in consequence of the flooded state of the Mey River, and a

swollen stream in front of Manglee; yet in spite of these difficulties, added to the loss of a large number of our baggage camels, the Troops had marched upwards of 240 miles from the date of leaving, till joining the Head Quarters Camp; and though I was unable to overtake the Rebels, yet they were so constantly kept on the move, that they were prevented from plundering many villages and towns, which, but for the fear of being overtaken, they would have done.

The conduct of the Troops was admirable; they met every difficulty and privation with the utmost cheerfulness; and from the Commanding Officers of the different Detachments of the Force, I have received the most cordial support.

A native gentleman, Moulvee Mahomed Moheedeem, Vakeel of Jeypore, who accompanied me through the pursuit, rendered me so much good service, (in procuring information, carriage, supplies, &c.) that I beg strongly to recommend him to the Major General's consideration.

In the year 1855, a Public Officer serving under the Government of Bengal, with the cognizance of his immediate official superior, sold a horse to a Native gentleman living within his jurisdiction for 900 Rupees. There was not the remotest reason to suppose that the sale was in any respect otherwise than a fair transaction, but the matter having in due course been reported to the Hon'ble Court

of Directors, the Court were pleased, in a Despatch dated the 4th March last, to desire that sales of this description between Public Servants in India and Natives within their jurisdiction or beyond, should be strictly prohibited. The President in Council is assured that pecuniary transactions of an objectionable nature between Public Servants and Natives of India seldom, if ever, now occur, and has the fullest reliance on the honor of the Queen's Servants in all Departments; but transactions of the nature alluded to, though in themselves entirely fair, and perfectly free on both sides from all unworthy motives, are liable to misconception, and when misconstrued are no less mischievous in their effect than corrupt dealings. In conformity, therefore, with the instructions of the Hon'ble Court, all such sales are prohibited. Should a Public Officer be doubtful whether a transaction to which he desires to become a party comes within this prohibition, he will consult his superior Officer and be guided by the instructions he may receive. A controlling Officer consulted on such an occasion will dispose of the case himself, or refer it for the orders of Government, as he may consider proper.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to inform you for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, that from a report I received during the night of the 8th, whilst at Bhaderpore, I had reason to believe, that the Rebels had reached late that night, a village two coss from Mungrowlee, en route from Chandairee. I consequently marched with Force as per margin, before daylight.

2. On reaching Mungrowlee, I was informed by scouts well in advance, that the enemy was seen advancing about 2 miles from Mungrowlee, their number about 5,000.

3. We found the advance of the enemy, about 1,000 strong, close to the village of Barulpore. A few rounds of shell drove this Force back on the main body, who were strongly posted at the elevated village of Shajehan Mhow. The whole country round the village was covered with

high scrubby jungle, in which Infantry could not see the enemy until quite close to them; our Force then advanced, each Regiment affording a quota of Skirmishers.

4. The guns were brought up, and the enemy deserting the village, endeavoured to outflank our left, and from 6 guns played upon our Troops advancing.

5. The jungle was so thick, that a column of the enemy, without being perceived, got entirely in the rear of our support; when luckily perceiving this, I ordered Sir W. Gordon, with a Troop of the 17th Lancers, to disperse them.

6. He charged them, dispersed them, and cut up between one and two hundred.

7. I solicit to bring this Officer's services prominently to the notice of His Excellency, and the Squadron under his command, who did their duty admirably,

8. The enemy stood fairly to their guns, one or two of which were taken by a rush of the 92nd and 71st combined.

9. The 19th Regiment Native Infantry, under their very able and zealous Commander, Captain Barrow, emulated the conduct of the British Troops.

10. At one period the enemy, in great numbers, were on all sides close to our front, flanks and rear, and yet so dense was the jungle, that their fire was utterly ineffective.

11. After their guns, 6 (six), were taken, they dispersed in every direction.

12. Unfortunately, all my Cavalry, except 85 of 17th Lancers, were detached to Brigadier Smith's Column, near Chandairee, or hardly a man would have escaped.

13. The heat of the day and the distance the men had already marched, together with the want of Cavalry, prevented pursuit beyond the village. I have since learnt, that about 2,500 of the fugitives crossed the Betwah that night, at a ford about 8 miles from Shajehan Mhow, near the road to Chandairee, the water up to their chins.

14. In my telegram of yesterday's date, the amount of killed was rated by me at about 150. I have since reason to think that I then much understated the number; perhaps double the number would be nearer the truth.

15. As at Rajgurh, so our loss has been trifling, although in this fight the enemy stood their ground for about an hour well, and the principal portion of the killed was in the middle of our Column to the rear.

16. My warmest thanks are due to Colonel Lockhart, Commanding the Brigade.

17. He records his approbation of the conduct of Colonel Hope, Commanding 71st Regiment; Captain Bethune, Commanding 92nd; Captain Barrow, Commanding 19th Regiment; 2nd Captain Lemarchand, Commanding the Bengal Artillery; and to Sir W. Gordon, Commanding the 17th Lancers; as also of that of his Brigade Major, Captain Parker, 71st Regiment; and of Ensign D. B. Hope Johnstone, who on this occasion, and at Rajgurh, acted as his A. D. C.

18. My Assistant Adjutant General, and Acting Quarter Master General, Captains Champion, of 24th Regiment Native Infantry, and St. John, of the 92nd

Regiment, together with my Aide de Camp, Major Elkington, H. Ms'. 6th Royal Regiment, did their duty, zealously and well.

19. Since I left the Bhopal Territory, Captain Gordon, Commanding 17th Regiment Native Infantry, has been attached to me as Political Agent, and I cannot too highly speak of his exertions, both as regards his Civil duties, and the assistance he gave me in the field.

by whom the peace and security of the country around were continually disturbed.

89, dated 27th August 1858, to announce the departure from Kirwee of the Troops under my Command, now noted in the margin, on an expedition into the Hills, south of Tirohan and Chitrakote, for the purpose of destroying the enemy who were in possession of the towns and villages of Dudree, Tekurree, Doondha, Entowa, Doondhela, Kurroreeah, Koreri and Dingrahut; numbering not less than 7,000 men, 500 of them being mutinous Bengal Sepoys and Sowars,

2. I reserve for a future despatch, on the termination of this duty, the details of my proceedings, merely observing that our march has been successful, and that the enemy evacuated every place I have named, in succession, as we approached; but on the evening of the 5th instant, when encamped about 6 miles from Entowa, and 15 or 16 from Kothee, I received intelligence that they had rallied to the extent of 4 or 5,000 men, and were determined to make a stand at, or near this place, moreover, that they had driven off, fired upon, and wounded one of a party sent by me to repair the difficult Pass of Punghatee, where they intended to dispute our further progress.

3. We were under arms at 4 A. M., on the 6th and reached the ghât about 7, when the enemy appeared in large numbers, many Bengal Sepoys and some Sowars being with them; they had taken the precaution to crown the heights commanding the Pass, and presented a somewhat formidable appearance to my gallant little band; however, I led the advanced guard, composed of a party of Her Majesty's 43rd Light Infantry, and of the 1st Regiment Native Infantry, Commanded by Ensign Young, of the former Regiment, in skirmishing order, to within 200 yards of the gorge, the main body being in reserve, a portion of them protecting the guns. I also sent a similar party to the advanced guard, under Captain Rishton, of the 1st Regiment Native Infantry, directly up the thickly wooded hill on our right, and running parallel to the Pass, our left being protected by a deep ravine, also covered with thick jungle, with instructions to crown the summit and sweep the brow of the hill right shoulders forward, so as to join the advanced guard in its ascent, a duty Captain Rishton well performed. Meanwhile, Captain Palmer, of the Royal Artillery, prepared his guns for action, the enemy during this time, keeping up a desultory but very harmless fire, which we did not return until all was ready, when I ordered the Pass to be forced. Captain Palmer's guns and mortars playing with admirable precision, over the heads of the advancing skirmishers. The sound of the guns, bursting of the shells, and the sight of the Europeans, seemed to terrify the enemy; for before we had proceeded 500 yards, he turned and fled in all directions into the dense and almost impervious jungle, leaving us in possession of a ghât which 500 brave men could easily defend against 10,000!

4. After a short halt at the top of the Pass, to bring up the guns, we again moved on, and in about an hour came in sight of another body of the enemy, apparently an outpost, 4 or 500 strong, who moved off on our approach, but as there was a small open space between them and the jungle, to which they rapidly retired, I had an opportunity to cut up several of them, by a dashing charge of the Seikh Horse, under Jemadar Nandan Sing, and Hydrabad Sowars, under Jemadar Novinya Inayut Oolla Begh, headed by Lieutenant and Adjutant Gompertz, of the 1st Regiment Native Infantry, and Lieutenant Wood, of the Engineers; by this time it was noon, I therefore halted to refresh the men, who were much exhausted by their morning's work, but in high spirits and ready to push on, which I determined to do, as I had reason to believe the main body were still in our front; we reached Kothee, at about 6 P. M., and found that the enemy had abandoned their position some hours previously, before we could have surmounted the Pass, and evidently in the utmost confusion, judging from the state of their encampment, Radho Govind's tent being amongst the spoils!

5. Hitherto my Intelligence Department, furnished by Mr. Mayne, the Magistrate of Banda, has been most efficient but now we are in a *terra incognita*; the villagers have all fled from dread of the Rebels and I am therefore somewhat at fault, the surrounding country being entirely unknown to any of my

Suides, nor do I yet know even the direction they have taken, but it is probable, either into the Rewah Country or towards Kalinger.

6. The Troops throughout this trying day, for they were fourteen hours under arms, exhibited all the best qualities of British Soldiers, and if gallant bearing and ardent pursuit could have secured the prize, they would assuredly have won it! I trust the Major General would approve their conduct, and submit it to the favourable consideration of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India, and of the Madras Army.

7. It is almost impossible to estimate the Casualties on the part of the enemy, in such an affair and in such thick jungle, as I have described, but from what I heard and saw, I do not think they could have exceeded 40 or 50; our own loss being blank!

SIR,

At 2 o'clock P. M., on the 1st November, I received an order from the Chief of the Staff, to advance from my position at Deerea, through Lallgunge to drive the enemy from Kurriya Bazar and the neighbouring posts.

2. I marched at 4 P. M. the same day, as there was a difficult ravine at Baboogunge, about 4 miles distant, that I was anxious to cross with the Siege Train, and heavy baggage during the night. I had previously prepared a passage across it. The Force bivouacked on both banks of the ravine. By daylight everything had crossed, and the Force moved on to Lallgunge.

3. I there received the information that Kurriya Bazar had been evacuated, the enemy having retired on Rampore Kussiah, and entrenched Camp on the River Sae, and that the Fort of Kythola, about 2 miles to the right of my line of march, was occupied by the enemy.

4. After two hours' halt to refresh the Troops, I advanced to Kaepore, a village situated at the junction of the roads leading to Rampore Kussiah, and Kythola and where the road is traversed by a large swamp, that extended laterally some miles across my front, there were but two passages across it, both being impassable for guns or baggage; by halting in this position I could attack Kythola, threaten Rampore Kussiah, and a passage across the swamp could be made during the night.

5. Upon summoning Kythola, it was found to be evacuated, the garrison having also retired upon Rampore Kussiah, abandoning the entrenchments and a few stand of arms.

6. Owing to the exertions of Lieutenant Scratchley, Commanding the Royal Engineers, with this Force assisted by the Delhi Pioneers, the cause-way was reported practicable the following morning at 8 A. M., the 3rd November.

7. At 8-30 A. M., the Force crossed and advanced upon Rampore Kussiah.

8. Upon approaching that place, the country became very close and intricate, being covered with large clumps of trees, low brushwood and standing Indian-corn, rendering it impossible to see more than a few yards, either to the front or flanks; great caution had therefore to be observed in the advance; the enemy however, did not make use of the advantages of ground thus offered to him.

9. The Force arrived in front of Rampore Kussiah about 10 A. M. Upon reconnoitring the place, I found it to consist of an elaborate system of entrenchments of great extent, constructed on both banks of the river Sae, with the old Fort as a citadel.

10. The works immediately in my front consisted of a line of six bastions, connected by curtains, constructed across a neck of land, formed by a deep bend of the river to the northward. The length of this work was about 700 yards in a direct line. This work was flanked on its right, and taken in reverse by the works opposite bank of the river.

11. The north and east sides, and the southwest angle of the works, were surrounded by a dense jungle of prickly thorn; on the south and north-west sides, the ground was comparatively clear but broken wooded and every available spot covered with Indian-corn rendering it impossible to see more than the crest of the parapet.

12. The works were surrounded by a ditch, that I had been informed, was 15 feet broad and 25 feet deep, which was subsequently found to be nearly correct. The ditch was covered in front by an abattis of prickly thorn.

13. The interior of all the works was a dense jungle, the only open spaces being the parapets and the terreplein, so that on making a lodgement, the assailants were exposed to the fire of the defenders, protected by this cover.

14. There were 17 guns and 5 mortars in the place (two of these were upwards of 8 inches in diameter.) The garrison consisted of between 4,000 and 5,000 men, about 2,000 being mutinous Sepoys, principally of the 17th, 28th, and 52nd Regiments, who could be plainly discerned on the parapets, dressed in red, and some in the same coloured linen uniform, with red turbans, as worn by the Punjaub Infantry. They were all armed with the musket and bayonet.

15. Having received information that the left, or last extremity of the advanced entrenchment, rested on the jungle, and that the work had not been continued down to the river; I determined to make the attack on that flank.

16. The Force under my Command was formed in position behind the village and Fort of Agaiya, about 1,500 yards from the place, concealed from the view of

the enemy by the village and the shape of the ground, which here rose to a gentle eminence, sloping down to the northwards, in the direction of the river Sae.

17. The heavy Battery, Royal Artillery, consisting of two 8-inch howitzers, and two 8-inch mortars, under the Command of Major LeMessurier, C. B., was formed on the crest of this eminence, protected on its left by the Fort of Agaiya, in which a Company of the 79th Highlanders was placed. A Company of the same Regiment under Captain Currie was directed to skirmish in the broken ground, in front of the Battery, as sharpshooters, to keep down the fire of the enemy from the entrenchments; this it did very effectually. The 4th Company Royal Engineers was also posted with the heavy Battery. On the right, I placed the Right Wing of the 9th Punjaub Infantry, under Captain Thelwall, H. M.'s 24th Regiment, who Commands that Corps, with instructions to force his way through the jungle, and endeavour to turn the left of the entrenchment.

18. The 1st Punjaub Cavalry, under Major Hughes was divided into two bodies, and one placed on each flank, to endeavour to discover any fords across the river, to prevent the passage of them by the enemy, and to complete the investment on this side.

19. The strength of my Force did not allow of any bodies of Troops, being detached across the river, to invest the northern front.

20. The remainder of the Force was held in reserve under Colonel Taylor, C. B., Commanding 79th Highlanders.

21. These dispositions had just been completed, when I received a quill despatch, by a spy, from Major General Sir J. Hope Grant, Commanding the Division, then encamped at Etayah, offering his co-operation the following morning, the 4th November at day-light. Anxious as I was for the assistance of the Major General, and conscious that with the Force under his Command, under his able direction, the result of the action must be more satisfactory than it would be without that co-operation, yet as my Force was then engaged with the enemy, and the Artillery already suffering from the fire of the place, I considered that I could not withdraw without dishonor to Her Majesty's arms. I therefore resolved to continue the attack. My intention was to carry the outworks, and there wait for the Major General's arrival, to attack the interior defences.

22. After the fire of the heavy Battery had continued for some time, I directed the skirmishers to advance nearer to the works. Captain Thelwall, with the Wing of the Regiment under his Command, forced his way through the jungle, strongly opposed by the enemy, to within 60 yards of the entrenchment, where he was met with discharges of grape; finding that his position was becoming untenable, and that he must either advance or retreat, he, with the prompt and daring resolution of a true Soldier, determined to storm the bastion, from which the guns were playing upon him. A passage was found across the ditch near its extremity; the men with great gallantry dashed across, and entering by an embrasure, effected a lodgment, they captured two guns, one of which was immediately turned by them upon the enemy, who, advancing with 1,500 men, endeavoured to retake the bastion. Captain Thelwall, though opposed to fearful odds, and exposed to a crushing fire, from the works on the north bank of the river, losing Men and Officers fast, still held his ground until the supports sent to his assistance came up. They consisted of two Companies 79th Highlanders, under Captain Miller, and four Companies of the first Belooch Battalion, under Lieutenant Colonel Farquhar, C. B. The Troops now assembled in the work, repulsed two attempts of the enemy to retake it. I would beg to draw the attention of the Major General to the

These Troops led by the Officers I have

operations were covered by an increased fire of Artillery and Skirmishers, along the front.

I much regret to say, that Lieutenant Colonel Farquhar had hardly entered the works, when he was struck by a ball in the left knee; he has since suffered amputation of the limb. I was thus deprived of the services of an old, gallant, and experienced Officer, at a most critical time.

The Command of the Troops in the works then devolved again upon Captain Thelwall, under whose leading the capture of the outer works was completed.

24. I cannot speak too highly of the conduct of this Officer, and of his Regiment. I am indebted to it for the success I have described, which ultimately led to the capture of the place. I trust the Major General will do me the favour of bringing Captain Thelwall's name to the most prominent notice of the Commander-in-Chief, together with the Officers and Soldiers he has named in his Report herewith enclosed.

25. Lieutenant Scratchley, Commanding Royal Engineers, volunteered to accompany the supports, for the purpose of rendering assistance, should it have been necessary to retrench themselves. I would also wish his name brought to the notice of the Commander-in-Chief.

26. The enemy having failed in his repeated efforts to retake the outworks, was observed about 2 o'clock to be retiring from the position on the north bank of the river.

27. I directed Major Hughes, with all the Cavalry that could be collected, to cross the ford on the right of the enemy's position and pursue. The nature of the ground, cut up with ravines, and covered with wood, precluded any Horse Artillery being sent, as guns used under such circumstances, would have been an encumbrance, instead of a help to him.

28. I then directed the Troops in the works to advance. Just as we were entering the principal work, or citadel, a large Mine was exploded, it is supposed by a Ghazee, burying in its debris the leading files of the Belooch Battalion; had the explosion occurred a few minutes later, my loss must have been most severe.

29. It was subsequently discovered that this Mine was the principal Powder Magazine of the place, said to have contained 8,000 lbs. of powder.

30. The enemy then evacuated the whole of the works, abandoning all his guns, together with large quantities of ammunition, stores and provisions.

31. Major Hughes pursued the enemy for 5 miles and pressed him hard, cutting up a great many men. The Regimental Color of the 52nd Regiment was captured by Lance Duffadar Wallee Mahomed Khan, who slew its bearer.

32. I much regret that the 1st Punjaub Cavalry, has been deprived of the services of Assistant Surgeon Clement Smith, who was severely wounded in the pursuit, heading a small party of Cavalry in the endeavour to reach his Regiment, to give assistance to the wounded.

33. The entrenchments and Fort of Rampore Kussiah are most extensive and complete. The Enceinte is 8 miles in circumference, enclosing an area of 190 acres, situated in almost unapproachable ground; on the west side, there are three lines of entrenchments, each covered by a ditch; most of the parapets of the whole work are 20 feet thick.

34. The place was found to contain a foundry for cannon and shells, with mould ready prepared for use, a quantity of gun metal, a laboratory for making fuzes, and a carriage manufactory fitted with English circular saws, and other tools; in fact, from the solidity and completeness of the place, it must have been a long time in preparation, and an arsenal for the Rebels and Mutineers. I trust its capture will inflict a heavy blow upon them.

35. Seventeen guns and five mortars, 22 pieces of Ordnance in all, were captured in the place.

36. From the nature of the ground, both inside and outside the works, which affords every facility for concealing both killed and wounded men, and the high crops outside, it is impossible to arrive at a correct estimate of the loss of the enemy. Many killed are constantly being found in the jungle, and other places, and many were seen to be carried off in all directions on ponies and the country bedsteads. I consider that the loss of the enemy was not less than 300 killed; the wounded cannot be computed.

37. My loss was severe; it amounts to two English Officers, severely wounded, four Native Officers, and 78 of all ranks; total 79 killed and wounded; but I trust, that considering the nature and extent of the works, and the importance of the capture, that it will be considered unavoidable.

38. I cannot close this Report without expressing the greatest admiration of the gallantry and good conduct of the Troops under my Command. I trust I may be permitted to mention how much I am indebted to the Officers Commanding Corps, and the Staff Officers of this Force, for the cordial support they have all times afforded me.

Colonel Taylor, C. B., Commanding 79th Highlanders; Lieutenant Colonel Farquhar, C. B., Commanding Belooch Battalion; Major Middleton, C. B., R. H. A., Senior Artillery Officer of this Force, are entitled to my warmest acknowledgments.

Major LeMessurier, C. B., who commanded the Heavy Battery, worked his guns with surprising rapidity and accuracy, under an annoying fire from the place. I am also indebted to him for the zeal and ability displayed in getting his guns across a most difficult country, without roads, during these operations.

Of Major Hughes and his excellent Regiment, I cannot speak too highly; its conduct under this Officer's good leading, has been admirable.

Captain Thelwall, Commanding 9th Punjaub Infantry, and Lieutenant Scratchley, Commanding Royal Engineers, I have already brought to the Major General's notice.

After the fall of Lieutenant Colonel Farquhar, the Command of the Belooch Battalion devolved upon Lieutenant Nicholetts, who is highly spoken of by Thelwall in his Report.

Captain Briggs, Officiating Assistant Commissary General, has been unremitting and unsuccessful in his exertions to supply this Force, under circumstances of great difficulty.

Mr. Power, Civil Service, and Captain Bunbury, Assistant Commissioner, attached to this Force, have been most active in procuring intelligence, and in affording every assistance to me. They both accompanied me throughout the action.

The Officers of my Staff, Lieutenant Acton, 53rd Regiment, Major of Brigade; Captain O'Brien, 20th Regiment, Deputy Assistant Quarter Master General, and Ensign Duff, 79th Highlanders, Orderly Officer, have displayed indefatigable zeal and ability in the discharge of their duties, on this and on every occasion.

I beg to enclose a State of this Force, on the morning of the 3rd November, together with a return of Casualties, a return of captured Ordnance, and a Sketch of Rampore Kussiah, with a report on the works, for the information of the Commander-in-Chief.

*Report upon the Fort and Entrenchments of
Kussiah Rampore, Oudh.*

The Fort and Entrenchments of Kussiah Rampore are situated on a bend or loop of the river Sae.

The Fort being at the top or north-west of this loop, surrounded by the southern entrenchments, which close the loop to the south, and by the northern entrenchments, which enclose it on all sides.

They occupy an extent of ground equal to 200 acres, and are 3½ miles in length.

The interior of these entrenchments is a dense, impenetrable bamboo and thorn jungle, through which a number of covered ways, similar to parallels, afford communication.

On the outside the jungle grows close up to the works, and in most places 5 or 600 yards or more to the front. Paths lead through it into the Fort, but they are of no use, except to the defenders.

Besides this, a very close and impenetrable abattis of cut thorn jungle, is to be found close upon the counterscarp of the ditch of the work, following it in all its sinuosities.

This ditch varies from 12 to 18 feet in depth, (in one or two places nearly 23 feet) and 8 to 20 feet in width, and surrounds the whole of the works, except in a few places where a formidable abattis supplies its place.

The profile of all the entrenchments is good; the command varying from 10 to 20 feet, the thickness of parapet from 10 to 18 feet, and well able to resist the heaviest Ordnance from the nature of the soil, which is principally clay.

In some parts the profile consists of two lines of parapet, separated from each other by a ditch; in others two ditches are to be found.

The interior Fort, or entrenchment, is of the nature generally found in this country, a rectangle with circular bastions at the angles, connected by straight curtains, which also have bastions.

This Fort has a very great command over the works surrounding it, and the country around.

It also affords a good defence against an attempt to take it from the south, especially across the ford.

The trace of the entrenchments is very irregular consisting of circular bastions, connected by irregular curtains, every bastion having four or more embrasures for guns.

In front of each bastion, a low line of parapet for musketry is to be found, and this generally flanks the entrances (mentioned before) into the Fort.

The trace on the whole is good. It has a few weak points on the river, where the entrenchments close upon it.

But these could be strengthened at the very last moment.

In fact, if a European Force had possession of such works, it could defy any attack, except that of a regular blockade to starvation.

The date of the construction of the different parts of the works, is of course difficult to ascertain. I should think that all the works, with the exception of the Fort and western Entrenchments, have been built since the first outbreak of the mutiny.

The ditch surrounding them, is however very old. It has been deepened in a great many places. The works have also been considerably strengthened and repaired since the rains; and in some parts there are signs showing that more works were contemplated.

Legislative Council of India.

THE 11TH DECEMBER 1858.

THE following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 4th December 1858, and was referred to a Select Committee who are to report thereon after the 15th of February next:—

A Bill to amend the Law for the trial of Officers of the Bengal Pilot Service for breach of duty.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend the law for the trial of persons employed in the Pilot Service of Government, at the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, when accused of breach of duty; It is enacted as follows:—

I. Act XXIV of 1845 (*for establishing a Court for the trial of Officers of the Pilot Service accused of breach of duty*) and Act I of 1851 (*for the appropriation of fines levied under Act XXIV of 1845*), are hereby repealed.

II. When any person employed in the Pilot Service of Government at the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, shall be accused of having committed any breach of duty while engaged in such Service, and it shall appear to the Superintendent of Marine, or to the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal, that such person ought to be brought to trial for such breach of duty, such person shall be brought to trial upon a charge or charges framed by the said Superintendent of Marine, or such other person as the said Lieutenant-Governor shall direct, before a Court constituted under the provisions of this Act.

III. The Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal shall appoint a fit person to be Judge of the said Court.

IV. When the Judge of the said Court shall be about to hold a trial under this Act, he shall summon, by writing under his hand, three persons, two of whom shall be Merchants of Calcutta and one a Master of a Merchant Ship lying in the Port of Calcutta, to sit as a Jury at the said trial. If any such person when duly summoned shall, without lawful cause, neglect or refuse to attend at the time appointed, or to remain in attendance until the trial shall be completed, it shall be lawful for the said Judge to impose upon any such person a fine not exceeding two hundred Rupees for every such default; and such fine, if not paid, shall be levied by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the defaulter under a warrant to be issued for that purpose by the Judge. Such warrant may be transmitted by the Judge to any Magistrate of Police for the town of Calcutta, and thereupon such Magistrate shall endorse the same and shall cause it to be executed in the same manner as if the warrant had been issued by such Magistrate.

Who shall be summoned to sit as a Jury. Penalty for persons so summoned not attending.

V. The Lieutenant-Governor shall appoint such person as he may think proper to conduct the proceedings before the Court as Prosecutor on the part of Government.

VI. The Judge of the said Court shall give sufficient notice to the Prosecutor, and to the party accused, of the time and place at which it is proposed to hold the trial.

VII. Before the commencement of any trial under this Act, the persons summoned and attending as Jurors shall be sworn by the Judge of the Court to give a true verdict according to the evidence.

Due notice of time and place of trial to be given to Prosecutor and the accused. Jurors to be sworn.

VIII. It shall be lawful for the Judge of the said Court, at the instance of the Prosecutor, or of the party accused, or of his own motion, by writing under his hand, to summon any person to attend as a witness at a time and place to be specified in the summons, for the purpose of being examined at any trial before the said Court; or if such person shall be about to depart from Calcutta, so as to be unable to attend at such trial without serious inconvenience, then to be examined before the Judge of the said Court before the day fixed for the trial; provided always that due notice of the time and place of such examination shall be given to the accused party; provided also that such witness may nevertheless be examined at the trial if he shall be able to attend thereat, in which case his previous examination may also be read at the trial.

If any person who shall have been duly summoned to attend as a witness shall, without sufficient excuse, neglect or refuse to attend, or attending shall refuse to give evidence or to answer any question which may be lawfully put to him, such person shall forfeit and pay such fine, not exceeding five hundred Rupees, as the Judge of the said Court shall order; and such fine, if not paid, shall be levied by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the person ordered to pay the same in the manner prescribed in Section IV of this Act.

X. The evidence of every witness examined before the said Court shall be given on oath, affirmation, or otherwise, according to the rules in that behalf for the examination of witnesses in Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature.

XI. Upon the completion of the trial the Jurors shall give their verdict upon the charge, or, if there be more than one, upon each separate charge. The verdict shall be according to the opinion of the majority of Jurors.

XII. If by such verdict the accused person is found guilty of the charge or of any one or more of the charges preferred against him, the Judge of the Court shall sentence him to be dismissed from the said Pilot Service, or shall award such other punishment, by loss of rank or pay, or by suspension from employment for a specified period, as to the Judge shall appear fit. The Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal, with the sanction of the Governor General in Council, may prepare a Schedule of offences and punishments (such punishments being of the same nature as those hereinbefore mentioned) for the guidance of the said Court; and if such Schedule be prepared and sanctioned, and the charge proved before the said Court is an offence specified in such Schedule, the Judge of the said Court shall award such punishment as is prescribed for such

offence in the said Schedule, and no other. If by such verdict as aforesaid the accused person is found not guilty of the charge or charges preferred against him, the Judge shall declare him acquitted of the same.

XIII. The Proceedings of the Court shall be sent by the Judge to the Superintendent of Marine for submission to the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal; and no sentence of punishment pronounced by the Judge of the said Court shall be final until it has been approved of by the said Lieutenant-Governor. The said Lieutenant-Governor may remit the whole or any part of such sentence, or may direct the substitution of any mitigated punishment, in lieu of the punishment awarded by the said Court, as he shall think fit.

XIV. If it shall appear to the Judge of the said Court that the verdict of the Jurors is manifestly contrary to the evidence, or that the trial is otherwise insufficient, the Judge, instead of passing sentence on the accused person, or declaring him acquitted, as the case may be, may certify the same to the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal. If the verdict of the Jurors be a verdict of acquittal, the said Lieutenant-Governor may either direct that no further proceedings shall be taken in the case, or may order a new trial before another Jury, as he shall think fit. If the verdict be a verdict of conviction, the said Lieutenant-Governor shall order a new trial before another Jury.

XV. It shall be lawful for the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal to make such rules as he shall think proper, not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, for conducting the proceedings and regulating the practice of the said Court.

XVI. Nothing contained in this Act shall be held to restrict the Marine Authorities or the Government from passing such orders as may be deemed proper upon any charge of breach of duty preferred against any person employed in the said Pilot Service, when it shall not be deemed necessary that such person should be brought to trial for such breach of duty under the provisions of this Act.

XVII. The provisions of this Act shall extend to all persons employed in the Pilot Service at the said Presidency and borne on the rolls of the Government establishment, whether such persons receive fixed salaries, or are remunerated by a portion of the Pilotage charged on the vessels piloted by them, or in any other manner.

Head Quarters, Camp near Doundeakera,
The 25th November 1858.

MY LORD,

I HAD the honor to announce to your Lordship in a Despatch dated the 23rd October 1858, addressed by the Chief of the Staff to the Secretary of Government in the Military Department, that I was about to take the field for the purpose of assuming the personal direction of Military affairs in the Byswarra Country.

2. Accordingly on the 2nd November, I rode to Pertabghur, where my Camp had preceded me.

3. Much care had been previously given to the exact calculation of time. The Column under Sir Hope Grant, which had recently been aiding the advance of Colonel Kelly from Azinghur; that under Brigadier Wetherall from Sorao; and that under Brigadier Pinckney at Pertabghur, having been alike combined in their movements for the reduction of the Country through which they passed, and to compel the submission of the Rajah Lall Madho of Amathee, if possible without loss of life.

4. During these movements, Sir Hope Grant had an affair with the enemy in the neighbourhood of the Goomtee, and took some guns, and Brigadier Wetherall stormed the Fort of Rampoor Kussea.

5. On my arrival at Pertabghur, these Officers had respectively reached the points indicated for a general operation against Amathee.

6. It was my earnest wish to carry into execution the instructions I had the honor to receive from your Lordship on the 1st November in completion of the Queen's Proclamation. I accordingly gave every chance to Lall Madho, who had peculiar claims on your Lordship's clemency, in consequence of the protection afforded by him to British fugitives at the time of the outbreak.

7. His allegiance was not willingly rendered, and I was obliged to close my forces round Amathee, before he would consent to come into my Camp. His Fort was then evacuated and his gun secured; the former has since been destroyed, his land and property having been assured to the Rajah.

8. From Amathee, I moved without delay to Shunkerpore, the Fort of Beni Madho, the most influential leader of the Byswarra, where I arrived on the 15th instant. He was summoned to lay down his arms with his followers, on which event taking place, life and liberty to go home were to be secured to the latter, and a careful consideration of his own claims to the former. But he was told in explicit terms that to treat with the Rebels in arms was absolutely forbidden by your Lordship, while in trusting to your Lordship's clemency, he had nothing to fear.

9. In order not to alarm him and so to cause a conflict between the picquets, and prevent the acceptance of the terms by the conduct of his followers, the three Brigades under Sir Hope Grant, Brigadier Pinckney, and Brigadier Wetherall were placed on the North, South and East of his Fort, but out of sight, although he was quite aware of their presence. Colonel Eveleigh, who had been advancing by my order from Poorwa to the West, was not quite in time to complete the investment, he having been delayed of the difficulty of the cross roads. During his advance he had taken the Fort of Simree and dispersed a body of Rebels.

10. The Rana Beni Madho taking advantage of my extreme forbearance, evacuated the Shunkerpore Fort, on the night of the 15th instant, and led his Troops, about 10,000 in number, to the Westward. Very early in the morning of the 16th, Sir Hope Grant was despatched to the Northward to Roy Bareilly, for the neighbourhood of which place, viz., Peroo, the Rana was supposed to be making. On the same morning, Brigadier Wetherall's Brigade, now transferred to Colonel Taylor, 79th Hussars, was ordered to move by forced marches to Fyzabad, to commence the Trans-Gogra movement. I remained for two days at Shunkerpore with Brigadier Pinckney's Brigade, now under orders of Colonel Jones, Carabineers, to enable the Civil Authorities to complete their arrangements when I moved towards Roy Bareilly.

11. On the 17th, while Brigadier Eveleigh was pursuing his advance according to his orders, he came across part of the Rana's force, numbering about 5,000 men, which he dispersed, taking 3 guns. At that time it was reported that Peroo, on the Sye, was still held, and Colonel Eveleigh was ordered to advance on

that place. Reports were most conflicting as to the direction taken by the Rana. Colonel Eveleigh was directed to send in his heavy guns and encumbrances to Roy Bareilly, and then to march toward Doundeakera with all despatch, to which we believed the Rana would now repair. He was desired to give no rest. I myself moved at the same time to Buchraon in one march, with the intention of intercepting the fugitives when struck by Colonel Eveleigh, what ever might be their direction. The followers of the Rana had again gathered round him at Doundeakera. I accordingly joined Brigadier Eveleigh at Nuggur on the 23rd instant, having marched 60 miles in three days, and have reason to congratulate myself on having done so, as the enemy had again mustered in considerable force at the strong position of Doundeakera, under the Rana in person. The position, consisting of enclosures of jungle flanked by the Fort of Doundeakera and the village of Buksur, is very strong.

12. I attacked him early in the morning of the 24th instant, (detail of Brigades as per margin,) with the two Brigades composed as per margin, completely broke and dispersed the Rebel Forces, inflicting a very heavy loss upon them and taking all the guns (7) in number, which still remained in possession of the enemy. The pursuit was pressed with great vigor till near midnight.

13. It was probable that the Rana Beni Madho left early in the action. He is a fugitive with a few followers, and it is supposed he has again turned Northwards. I am now waiting for some exact information, before taking further measures. Urgent instructions will be given to the various Officers Commanding Posts to act with the greatest promptitude towards preventing the Rebels from again gathering together.

14. I am happy to be able to inform your Lordship, that in consequence of these movements and the hopelessness of the rebel cause, which has now become apparent to all, the Talookdars and Zemindars of the Byswarra Country are everywhere giving in their submission.

15. The force that had left Shunkerpore under Sir Hope Grant did not stop at Roy Bareilly, but advanced according to instructions to Jugdespore and the Goomtee. Sir Hope Grant himself having been ordered to Fyzabad, to take charge of the operation proceeding from that quarter, put the Brigade that he had been with under Brigadier Horsford, who is now moving leisurely up the right bank of the Goomtee towards Lucknow, and is engaged in destroying Forts and reducing that part of the Country.

16. Thus I think. I may assure your Lordship, that the first half of the Oudh campaign has been brought to a conclusion in conformity with the plans I have had the honor to submit for your Lordship's consideration. Although extending over a length of more than two hundred miles, each movement and each apparently isolated attack, has been made to defend and to support what was going on to the right and left. The advance in line, stretching from the confines of Rohilcund to Allahabad and Azinghur, has compressed everything like rebellion in a large sense of the word beyond the Gogra, with the single exception of the Sectapore District, which is about being settled by the advance of Brigadier Barker.

He is already across the Goomtee. The late proceedings of that Officer and of Brigadier Troup (the latter having taken Mitowlee, and beaten the Rebels opposed to him in two or three actions) in the North-west, in giving execution to their several instructions toward the general plan of campaign, have been very satisfactory.

17. It is to be expected, when rebellion has been so long dominant in a very extensive Country, that Chiefs whose acts have placed them beyond the pale of mercy, and bodies of plunderers, will still continue to give trouble. I trust however, that the late operations will have so far carried out your Lordship's policy, as to reduce the remaining difficulty to a matter of Police, rather than of Military combination in that part of the Province which has now been subdued.

I am about to march to Lucknow. A movement on Byramghat and across the Gogra, in aid of that conducted by Sir Hope Grant from Fyzabad, will ensue very shortly.
