- The notability standard is less stringent.
  - <u>WP:BASIC</u> states: People are presumed **notable** if they have received significant coverage in **multiple published** <u>secondary sources</u> that are <u>reliable</u>, <u>intellectually independent</u> of each other, and <u>independent of the subject</u>.
  - <u>Wikidata:Notability</u> states: An item is acceptable if and only if it fulfills at least one of these two goals; that is, **if it meets at least one of the three criteria below**:
    - 1. It contains at least one valid <u>sitelink</u> to a page on Wikipedia, Wikivoyage, Wikisource, Wikiquote, Wikinews, Wikibooks, Wikidata, Wikispecies, Wikiversity, or Wikimedia Commons.
    - 2. It refers to an instance of a clearly identifiable conceptual or material entity that can be described using serious and publicly available references.

    - 3. It fulfills a **structural need**, for example: it is needed to make statements made in other items more useful.

- 1. The notability standard is less stringent.
- 2. It can, and should, be a collection point for collecting citations.
  - URLs and DOIs can be entered as references just by themselves, although adding a retrieval date and perhaps the language can be helpful.
  - Book and journal citations also can be used as references, but more fields are advisable.
  - Citations are required for most item property/values to display in the {{Infobox person/Wikidata}} template.

- 4. You may decide that the subject is not notable enough for a Wikipedia article or that you do not want to create it for now.
