I. ADMINISTRATION

1. Approval of Minutes of March Meeting

The minutes of the March meeting were approved as written.

2. Date of Next Meeting

The regularly scheduled dates for the next meeting were 17 and 18 May. However, it was suggested by the Chairman that the dates be changed to 16 and 17 May, in order that he might give a dinner for members and former members of the Commission of Fine Arts, to celebrate the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Commission, which fell on the 17th of May. Mr. Perry said he could not be here; and Mr. Walker, architect member of the Commission, was not sure that he would be able to attend on the 16th and 17th. Final Action on the dates for the next meeting was deferred until 20 April.

3. Bureau of the Budget: Request for FY 1961 Budget Estimates and Status of Bills Lifting the Limit of Authorization of the Commission of Fine Arts

The Chairman informed the members that the House of Representatives had passed the House bill (H.R. 7923) which would set no limit on appropriations for the Commission of Fine Arts. The Senate had also passed a bill (S. 2778) setting a limit of authorization of \$100,000. In the final debate on H.R. 7923, the number of the bill was changed to S. 2778, and it was returned to the Senate for concurrence. The Senate had not yet accepted the House action, but in any event, it appeared certain the limit of authorization would permit a larger

budget estimate. It was accordingly agreed that a budget request of \$69,000 would be submitted for the next fiscal year, this being the same amount as was requested for the current fiscal year, and reduced to \$42,300 by the Congress for exceeding the present \$35,000 limit of authorization.

At this time it was also decided that it would not be desirable to request a supplemental appropriation of \$26,700 from the Congress for Fiscal Year 1961, so as not to delay for another year employment of assistants needed in administration of the Commission's work.

4. District of Columbia Government
Invitation to Ground Breaking Ceremonies for Theodore Roosevelt
Bridge

It was noted that the Chairman and members of the Commission of Fine Arts had received invitations to attend the ground-breaking ceremonies for the new Theodore Roosevelt Bridge at 3:30 pm on 19 April. Since this event was scheduled to coincide with the date and time of the Commission's meeting it was impossible for any of the members to attend.

II SUBMISSIONS

1. National Society of Interior Designers
White House - Refurnishing of Diplomatic Reception Room
The Chairman welcomed Mr. Michael Greer, President of the National Society of Interior Designers and Mr. Benjamin West, Chief Usher of the White House to confer with the members on plans to refurnish and redecorate the Diplomatic Reception Room in the White House.

Mr. Greer had brought with him a color sketch of the proposed rug design, samples of fabrics to be used for upholstery, and photographs of the furniture that was proposed for the room. He reported that there was much enthusiasm for the plans of the Society of Interior Designers, not only among the members themselves, but from others who wished to donate either furniture or money, providing that such donations were tax deductible. The most expensive gift thus far received, was a \$10,000 chandelier. Mr. Greer further stated that it had been decided to use only 18th Century American pieces and no reproductions, with the exception of a pair of Duncan Phyfe benches made approximately 1810.

The border of the rug was in three parts. The outside part had 50 stars and the inside border carried the motifs from the seals of the 50 States. The colors were predominantly yellows and greens, chosen to give it the appearance of an antique Aubusson rug. The

texture was very closely woven; a cross between needlepoint and an Aubusson rug. The members considered the design to be a handsome one and approved it for design and color.

In the absence of a general plan it was difficult to judge the pieces of furniture which seemed individually handsome in the photographs shown by Mr. Greer. There was, however, some doubt raised as to the size and scale of the chandelier, as well as the necessity for it in a room with such a low ceiling.

Mr. Greer was requested to have sketch plans and elevations prepared for presentation to the Commission at their next meeting in May. It was also suggested that, at the May meeting, a visit be made to the White House by the members of the Commission, in order to view the design and the Diplomatic Reception room at first hand.

The Secretary was directed to prepare a letter for the Chairman's signature, to Mr. Greer, confirming the Commission's views on this matter, this letter being made a part of the permanent record of the proceedings.

2. District of Columbia Government
Department of Sanitary Engineering
Sewage Pumping Station, East End of Theodore Roosevelt Bridge

The members considered revised drawings for the visible parts of the Sewage Pumping Station which the District of Columbia Department of Sanitary Engineering proposed to locate adjacent to the east end of the Theodore Roosevelt Bridge between the east bound and west bound approach roads. Technical reasons required moving the structure fifty feet further eastward than had previously been shown, and apparently that much closer to the Inner Loop.

The members felt that it was impossible to give final approval to this project until the District of Columbia government submitted the final layout for the approach roads to the Theodore Roosevelt Bridge. Accordingly, no further action was taken.

The Secretary was directed to prepare a letter for the signature of the Chairman, to the Engineer Commissioner for the District of Columbia, advising him of the views of the Commission, this letter being made a part of the permanent record of the proceedings.

3. National Cultural Center Board of Trustees
Design of Seal

The Secretary showed the sketch that had been submitted for an official seal for the use of the National Cultural Center Board

of Trustees. After studying the sketch, the members of the Commission considered that it was inadequate, and recommended that the Board of Trustees enlist the services of the Heraldic Branch of the Quartermaster Corps, U.S. Army.

The Secretary was directed to prepare a letter for the signature of the Chairman, to Mr. L. Corrin Strong, Executive Vice Chairman of the National Cultural Center, informing him of the views of the Commission.

4. General Services Administration
Public Buildings Service

a. Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, Proposed Building at 17th Street Between New York Avenue and F Street

The members viewed a quarter-scale model showing the development of a design for a headquarters for the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation at 17th Street between New York Avenue and F Street. They agreed that it did not appear that the advice given by the Commission at the March meeting regarding the placement of the building or the treatment of the design facing 17th Street, N.W. had been taken. A meeting was scheduled for the following day with representatives of General Services Administration, Public Buildings Service, and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and further discussion was withheld until that time.

b. Smithsonian Institution
Museum of History and Technology
Sculptors for Exterior Work and Painters for Interior Work

The Secretary brought to the attention of the members, lists of artists for a program of sculpture and painting that had been submitted by General Services Administration and the Smithsonian Institution. Approval by the Commission of Fine Arts of the artists and the placement of sculpture in five locations on the exterior of the building was requested. A plan was submitted showing these locations. Mr. Paul Manship, former sculptor member of the Commission of Fine Arts was supervising the entire project. The members considered that the material was not adequate and further action was withheld until the meeting on the following day when representatives of General Services Administration, Public Building Services and the Smithsonian Institution were scheduled to present the proposal.

c. Armory Group
Georgetown Post Office (Customs House) - Changes to Terrace
Mr. Macomber, representing the Board of Architectural

Consultants for Georgetown met with the members to discuss the plans, previously reviewed by the Georgetown Board, for alterations to the entrance to the Custom House under the terrace of the Georgetown Post Office. Under the auspices of the Armory Group, plans had been prepared showing how more headroom could be provided for the entrances into the building, by breaking into the terrace, and removing an existing stairway. The members of the Commission agreed with the Georgetown Panel that this action seemed unnecessarily drastic. They preferred maximum extension of the existing ramp, to a line of the sidewalk, which would provide adequate headroom and not change the terrace. Mr. Macomber stated that he would advise the Armory Group of the Commission's suggestions at the next meeting of the Board of Consultants.

Department of the Interior

5. National Park Service
National Capital Parks

a. Netherlands Carillon, Night Lighting

The Secretary reported that work on the Bell Tower and Carillon, gifts from the people of the Netherlands to the people of the United States had been completed; and that it was to be dedicated on May 5. The National Park Service had presented for the Commission's approval, a scheme for lighting the tower proposed by the Phillips Company of Holland. The members felt that there was no objection to the proposed lighting but deferred approval until the meeting on the following day, when they were scheduled to discuss the matter with Mr. Haussmann of the National Park Service, National Capital Parks.

b. George Washington Memorial Parkway System, Bridges at Glen Echo, Carderock, Little Falls and Cabin John Gardens

The Secretary reported that these four bridges, two of which were identical in design, were to be part of the George Washington Parkway System on the Maryland side of the Potomac River above the District Line. The design for Little Falls, which was a single span, was approved. The members thought the three other designs should be restudied to make them single span bridges also. Further discussion was deferred because Mr. Haussmann, architect with National Capital Parks, was scheduled to discuss the projects with the Commission on the following day and the members reserved their suggestions until that time.

6. American Battle Monuments Commission
Okinawa Memorial - Proposed Design

The members looked at designs by Alfred Poor for the proposed memorial on Okinawa. The memorial consisted of two wing-like, reinforced

concrete pylons rising from a square bastion with flattened sides, faced in natural travertine. The members expressed general approval of the design, although there was some question as to whether the monument could withstand the frequent typhoons that occur on Okinawa. They also felt that the ramp between the wings was unnecessary. Further discussion was scheduled for the meeting on the following day when Mr. Poor, the architect, and Colonel Walker of the American Battle Monuments Commission, were to be present.

III DISCUSSIONS

1. National Capital Planning Commission

Mr. Harland Bartholomew, Chairman of the National Capital Planning Commission came to the meeting at the invitation of the Chairman to discuss the problems of current interest with the members of the Commission of Fine Arts, such as the penetration of parkland by highways, and the current practice of placing buildings without consulting the National Capital Planning Commission or Commission of Fine Arts, as exemplified in the placement of buildings for the Court of Claims, the National Grange, and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

a. Approach Roads to the Theodore Roosevelt Bridge

For Mr. Bartholomew's information, Mr. Rapuano related details of his meetings with representatives of the District of Columbia Department of Highways and Traffic regarding the west leg of the Inner Loop and the approach roads to the Theodore Roosevelt Bridge. As a result, a method was found to simplify and reduce the height of the interchanges between K Street and the Inner Loop. However, the only agreement he could reach for the Inner Loop south of this point was in regard to the deletion of one lane from a three-deck interchange at E Street, near the proposed Cultural Center. No conclusion could be reached on the idea of eliminating the interchanges and carrying Constitution Avenue directly into the Theodore Roosevelt Bridge, without separating the Highways.

Mr. Bartholomew agreed that study of this idea might prove helpful. He stated that the National Capital Planning Commission had always been greatly concerned about the large proportion of traffic which would be thrown into E Street with the completion of the bridge. Mr. Bartholomew reminded the members that the National Capital Planning Commission had recommended originally that the crossing of the river above Memorial Bridge be within the vicinity of the Three Sisters Islands rather than

at its present location near the Theodore Roosevelt Island. Now the District of Columbia Government was planning a bridge at the Three Sisters in addition to the Theodore Roosevelt Bridge. To go into these matters further, Mr. Bartholomew suggested a meeting on the following morning between Mr. Rapuano of the Commission of Fine Arts, Mr. Barnett of the Bureau of Public Roads, Department of Commerce and himself, to discuss the problem of the roadways in the vicinity of the bridge. (Note: The meeting was not held because Mr. Barnett was unable to attend.

b. Placement of Building Without the Knowledge of the Commission of Fine Arts and the National Capital Planning Commission

The members of the Commission of Fine Arts again expressed their regret that the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation had been assisted by the General Services Administration in locating its headquarters building at New York Avenue and 17th Street, without consulting the National Capital Planning Commission and the Commission of Fine Arts. In doing so, a site which seemed a natural one for the expansion of the Executive Offices of the President, became unavailable. Mr. Bartholomew stated that the National Capital Planning Commission had recently approved the location of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation without knowing, at the time, what the detailed plan for the building was to be. It was recalled that similar actions occurred in the placement of the National Grange Building and more recently the Court of Claims on the East side of Lafayette Square. The members agreed that some way should be devised to keep all interested agencies aware of such plans before designs were completed, and that further attention should be given to coordinating this problem. In this connection, note was taken of the placement of the stadium at the end of East Capital Street, and the conflicting plans for the redevelopment of the East Mall.

Before leaving, Mr. Bartholomew stated his opinion that the National Capital Planning Commission and the Commission of Fine Arts should know more about what the other is doing and suggested that a member of the Commission of Fine Arts attend the meetings of the National Capital Planning Commission. The members thought such attendance would not be possible, but agreed that more conferences like the one just concluded would be very helpful.

3. District of Columbia Armory Board
Status of Project and Letter to District of Columbia Armory Board Regarding the Proposed District of Columbia Stadium

The members reviewed the status of the proposed District of Columbia Stadium which was to be built without their approval, on the east end of the Mall, near the Anacostia River. It was noted that bids were to be asked at once for this work.

3. Department of State

a. Furnishings for State Department Dining Room

The Chairman reported that Mr. Estes, Assistant Secretary of State for Administration was encountering difficulty in acquiring suitable furnishings for the Department of State Dining Room. He particularly requested assistance in locating some 18th Century draperies and bookcases. The members of the Commission were in sympathy with the problem, and said they would keep the problem in mind.

b. Sculpture in South Court and at South Entrance

The members reviewed the status of plans for the proposed sculptural groups, at the south entrance and in the south court of the new State Department Building, for which Congress had recently refused to appropriate funds. The design of the proposed sculptural groups at the entrance by Albert Stewart, consisted of large eagles with wings outspread protectively over seven smaller human figures. After looking at the sketches, the members agreed that the sculpture showed little promise for the prominent position it is to occupy and they felt this design should be discarded for use here. They were unanimous, however, in the hope that acceptable sculpture could be placed in this location at a future date.

Funds were also denied for the heroic figure by Marshall Fredericks which was to be located in a fountain in the south court of the State Department Building. Mr. de Weldon, the sculptor member of the Commission, had viewed the figure in the sculptor's studio after the March meeting of the Commission. He assured the members that the figure was well executed and would be handsome in this setting. The members of The Commission felt that efforts should be continued to carry out this project.

c. Ceremonial Route for Reception of Distinguished Foreign Visitors

The Chairman informed the members that he had been called by the Office of Protocol regarding decorations for the new route into the city, for the reception of distinguished foreign visitors on their way from the airport to the White House. Instead of crossing Memorial Bridge and moving up Constitution Avenue, the new route crossed the Rochambeau Bridge, and followed 14th Street and New York Avenue to Pennsylvania Avenue. The change in route had been made in the hope of attracting more spectators for the processions. The members did not take issue with the change of route, but it was noted that the new route passed the Great Plaza where it's use as a large parking lot has made it one of the most unsightly features of the city. This seemed to the members to provide added impetus to their efforts to restore the Great Plaza to its rightful role as a part, and it was

agreed to try to enlist the aid of the Office of Protocol. The Secretary said he would inspect the decorations for possible suggestions for the Commission to make.

4. General Services Administration

Letter from Administrator, General Services Administration,
Regarding the Program for the Removal of Temporary Buildings

The Chairman reviewed a letter he had written to the Administrator, General Services Administration, Mr. Franklin Floete, inquiring about the status of the Removal Program and urging removal of all remaining temporary office buildings in the city of Washington. He also read Mr. Floete's reply, which stated that the program for removal of temporary buildings was still in effect and that the buildings would be removed as soon as construction of other buildings had been authorized and funded. The ultimate date for the realization had, however, been changed from 1962 to 1966. The members of the Commission agreed that they would continue to urge the removal of temporary buildings at every opportunity.

5. Redevelopment Land Agency

Status of Development of the Southwest Mall

The Secretary reported as a matter of information, that the Redevelopment Land Agency was at a point of adopting plans for the Southwest Mall, which had been in preparation for over a year, by Mr. Willo von Moltke, an architectural consultant from Philadelphia. The Secretary had a set of the drawings, but the Commission had not been requested to give advice by the Redevelopment Land Agency.

6. Franklin D. Roosevelt Memorial Commission

There was some discussion of the eligibility of the members of the Commission of Fine Arts to enter the competition for the design of a memorial to Franklin D. Roosevelt. Some of the architect members thought the Commission should be allowed to enter such an important competition if they so desired. The Chairman stated that he would write a letter to the Chairman of the Commission, Mr. Francis Biddle, informing him that some of the members, or their office staffs, might wish to enter the competition, and requesting his views. The draft of such a letter will be considered at the May meeting, inasmuch as the members have seen the preliminary program there may be some conflict of interest involved.

7. Department of the Interior, National Park Service
National Capital Parks

The Chairman showed the members a recent newspaper clipping, which stated that the General Services Administration had employed an

architect to design a headquarters building for National Capital Parks, on the site of the temporary work shops immediately south of Independence Avenue and west of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing. The members were disturbed, because it had been understood that this land would be left open to become part of the setting of the Washington Monument, when these temporary buildings were removed. It was agreed that the Chairman would write a letter to Honorable Conrad Wirth, Director, National Park Service, inquiring whether consideration had been given to other sites, in order that this important park land might remain open.



I was in a room where some work was done in 1902, when the General Building Administration, had a contract for professional services was then made to prepare plans and specifications for the reconstruction of the main floor of Wing A of the Executive Building in Washington, D.C. The contract stated that the estimated cost of this reconstruction will be \$244,000.

The members of the Committee of Five also, at their recent meeting on March 16th, called on to inquire whether there has been any change in the Administration's policy to demolish, as rapidly as possible, the temporary buildings erected during World Wars I and II. It was last program has not changed or altered, owing to acceleration of the first these program, the Committee strongly urges that a new schedule be made for this highly important work.

The Committee of Five also has advised the removal of temporary war time buildings. In a meeting of the Committee on March 15, 1934, the following resolution was adopted:

recommended that the temporary war buildings (including dormitories) be removed from park areas in the District of Columbia, in accordance with the agreement with the Secretary of the Interior that they be removed one year after peace is declared also that the temporary Navy and Munitions Buildings of World War I be removed, as desired by President Roosevelt.

The program, as adopted in 1956 by the General Services Administration, was in line with the Commission's position as regards the removal of temporary buildings from the Mall and park lands of the District of Columbia. The Commission hopes that there has been no change in attitude on the part of the General Services Administration or the Bureau of the Budget, as regards these plans, whose realization the Commission considers of the greatest importance for the city of Washington. The Commission feels all the more strongly about this matter, because in other world capitals, such as Paris and London, steps have been taken to remove temporary buildings and restore the pre-war appearance of these cities. At this time, so long after the end of the two World Wars, the prolongation of the life of any temporary building on the Mall would seem to be a matter of concern not only of the Federal Government but of the people of this Country.

We have read with interest the views expressed in your letter of March 17 concerning the proposed renovation of the first floor in the fourth wing of the Munitions Building on Constitution Avenue and the relationship of the project to GSA plans for the construction of Federal Buildings in the Washington metropolitan area.

The principal objective of the construction program announced in 1956, as revised in August 1959 (see enclosed brochure), is to provide replacement facilities for the housing of approximately 63,000 of the approximately 180,000 employees in the area now located in temporary or obsolete buildings. Temporary buildings comprising in the aggregate approximately 750,000 sq. ft. of space have been demolished since the close of World War II. New buildings are being constructed on some of the sites involved. When the construction of other buildings which have been planned has been authorized and funded, additional temporary buildings will be replaced. However, until this occurs, we must continue to maintain buildings required for occupancy by Federal agencies in condition suitable for this purpose.

Based on current and foreseeable progress toward our objective, it is highly improbable that the Munitions Building can be removed for at least five years. The alteration project to which you refer is necessary to provide for the relocation of Federal activities now carried on in temporary buildings located on the site to be utilized for the construction of the recently authorized Stadium and adjoining parking facilities. The proposed expenditures will be limited to those considered essential to accomplish this purpose.
