Mother: Varvara NAVROTS'KYY nee unknown, born 1892, last known to be in UkSSR; teacher.

Sister: Maria NAVROTS'KYY, born 1923, at Kosyna, last known to be in UkSSR.

Religion: Greek-Catholic
Languages: Ukrainian, Polish, Russian, German and some English

Hobbies: Photography and sports.

Education: 1930-36, grade school equivalent, in Ternopil. Later attended the Ukrainian gymnasium which completed in 1943.

Military History: September 1943, entered the 1st Ukrainian Division (German) from which was discharged in 1945 (was a sergeant in a tank unit; later became a 2nd Lt.)

After Germany's capitulation in 1945, he found himself in Austria; during 1948-51, he lived and worked in Mittenwald. (An attachment to his biographical form reads that he moved to Munich in 1950 and became employed with the IRO administration in Funk Kaserne.)

Comments on Capabilities: Young but reasonably mature. Excellent type of leadership in operations or tactics.

## MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

SUBJECT: 201's Opened on the Basis of Untranslated Document, MGSA-2941, 2 January 1951

- 1. This 201 was opened on the basis of information collected through IVAN MOROZ — , Soviet Repatriation Committee agent in the Schweinfurt area of West Germany. His operations were carried out in several displaced persons camps through 1946 and 1947.
- 2. Contacts and agents of Moroz were listed with available D. P. camp records collected (apparently) by 66th CIC detachment. 201 files were opened in December 1953 by SR/3 (W3), presently SB/X/EU.
- 3. Data on these contacts is in the form of handwritten notes and camp records. They are in the German, Russian, and Polish languages. Because the material has changed hands several times, transliteration of names is very poor. The 201 Index records generally reflect no biographic data other than name and 201 number.
