Milledgeville, Oct. 18 .- A stalk of sugar cane, of the ribbon species, has been grown in the vicinity of Baltimore and exhibited at the office of the American Farmer. The stalk was not full grown, but sufficiently so to give accurance of the fact that this kind of cane could be successfully cultivated much farther North than has been generally est \$ 5000 improsed. A correspondent of the Charleston Courier asserts that experiments made by the writer during five vears, have proved the practicability of maintaining the reproduction of the Sugar Cane in South Carolina, through the severest cold of the climate, and of ripening six joints for sugar, four for syrup or treacle, and four for plants. 
