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
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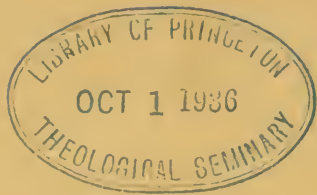

# A TREATISE MADE by Athanasius the great, concer- ning the vse and vertue of the Psalmes.



The holy Scriptures is certaynely the teacher of all vertue and of the true faith: but the booke of the Psalmes doth expresse after a certaine maner the very state and condition of the soule. For as he which entendeth to present himselfe to a King, first will cōpound with himselfe to set in good order both his gesture and speech, leaſt els he might be reputed rude and ignorant: Euen so doth this godly booke enforce all such as be desirous to leade their lyfe in vertue, and to know the lyfe of our Sauour, which he lead in his conuersation, putting them in minde in the reading thereof, of all their affections, and passions, whereto their soule is inclined.

Moreouer the Psalmes enforce & teach euery man with diuers instructions, wheremy he may not onely espy the affections and state of his soule, and to win a good paterne and discipline, how he may please God, but also with what forme of wordes he may amend himselfe, and how to geue God due thanks, leaſt if he should speake otherwise then were conuenient, he should fall into impiety by his irreuerent estimation of God, for we must all make account to the iudge, as well of our euill deedes, as our ill wordes.

If therefore thou wouldest at any tyme describe a blessed man, who he is, and what thing maketh him to be so: thou hast the 132. 41. 112. 128. Psalmes.

2 If thou wouldest rebuke the Jewes for their spite they haue to Christ thou hast the 2. Psalm.

3 If thine owne familiars pursue thee: and if many rise agaynst thee, say the 3. 143. Psalmes.

4 If thus in trouble thou hast called on God, and hast tarped vpon his helpe, and wouldest geue him thanks for that he hath heard thee with his helpe, sing the 4. 116. 40. Psalmes.

5 If that thou feelest that euill men lay snares for thee, and therefore desirest Gods eares to heare thy prayer, sing the 5. Psalm.

6 If thou feelest Gods dreadfull threates, and feelest thy selfe afrayd of them: thou mayst say the 6. 38. 88. Psalmes.

7 If any take counsaile agaynst thee, as Achitophel did agaynst Dauid, if tho u be admonished thereof, sing the 7. Psalm.

8 If thou, in beholding the grace of our Sauour to spread on euery side specially for the restozing of mankind to saluation, wouldest speake thereof in meditation to God, sing the 8. Psalm.

9 If so agayne thou wilt sing in geuing thankes to God for the prosperous gathering of thy fruites, vse the 8. Psalm.

10 If thou wouldest haue thine aduersary kept backe, and thy soule sa-  
ued,

- ued, trust not in thy selfe but in the sonne of God singing the 9. Psalmie.
- 11 If thou perceiuest God to be wroth with his people, as though he regarded them nothing, thou hast to pacifye him to complayne thereof, the 10. 60. 74. Psalmes.
- 12 If any man would put thee in feare, haue thou thy hope in God, and sing the 11. psalmie.
- 13 If thou beholdest the pride of many men, and seest malice to abound, so that there is no godlynes among men, repayre then to God and sing the 12 psalmie.
- 14 If thine aduersarye lye long in wayte agaynst thee, despayre not as though God had forgotten thee, but call vpon the Lord, and sing the 13. 61. 22. psalmes.
- 15 If thou hearest any to blaspheme God in his prouidence, be not partaker with them in wickednes, but make haste to God and say the 14. 53. psalmes.
- 16 If thou desirest to know who is a Citize of heaue: sing the 15. psalmie.
- 17 If thou hast neede of prayer for such as be agaynst thee, and haue closed thy soule on euery side, sing the 16. 17. 86. 141. psalmes.
- 18 If thou hast escaped from thine enemies, and art deliuered from them who pursued thee, sing thou the 18. 89. psalmes.
- 19 If thou doest wonder at the order of thinges created by God, considering the grace of the deuine prouidence sing the 19. 24. psalmes.
- 20 If thou seest any man in aduersitye, comfort him and pray for him with the 20. psalmie.
- 21 If thou perceiuest thy selfe to be defended and fed by God, and to lye prosperously, reioyce therein, and sing the 23. psalmie.
- 22 If thine enemies conspire agaynst thee, lift vp thy soule to God & say the 23. psalmie and thou shalt espy the to labour but in vayne agaynst thee.
- 23 If thine enemies cluster agaynst thee. and goe about with their bloudy handes to destroy thee, goe not thou about by mans helpe to reuenge it, for all mens iudgements are not trusty but require God to be iudge, for he alone is iudge, and say the 26. 35. 43. psalmes.
- 24 If they presse more fiercely on thee, though they be in numbers lyke an armed hoast, feare them not, which thus reiect thee, as though thou were not annoynted and elect by God but, sing the 27. psalmie.
- 25 If they be yet so impudent that lay wayte agaynst thee, so that it is not lawfull for thee to haue any vocation by them, regard them not, but sing to God the 28. psalmie.
- 26 If thou wilt exhort and prouoke kinges and princes, to submit their powers to God, and to regard his honor, sing the 29. 82. Psalmes.
- 27 If thou renue and buid thine house, both of thy soule whereto thou receuedst God to host, and of thy tempozall habitation, sing the 30. 48. 127 psalmes.
- 28 If thou seest thy selfe had in hate for the truetnes sake of the frendes and unsefolke, leaue not of thy purpose, nor feare them which be agaynst thee, but thinke on them which follow, and sing the 31 psalmie.
- 29 If thou beholdest such as be baptised, and so deliuered from the corruption of their byrth, prayse thou the bountifull grace of God, and sing the 32. psalmie.
- 30 If thou delightest to sing among many, call together righteous men

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of Godly lpe, and sing the 33. psalme.

31 If by chaunce thou fallst among thine enemies, and yet hast fortunately escaped them, if therefore thou wilt geue thankes, call together meeke men, and sing the 34. psalme.

32 If thou seest wicked men contend among themselves to doe mischief, thinke not that their nature doth unpell them by necessitie to worke sin agaynst their will, as certaine heretiques suppose, but consider the 36. psalme, and thou shalt perceiue that they be to themselves their owne occasion of sinning.

33 If thou seest how wicked men doe much wickednes and that yet simple folke praise such, when thou wilt admonish any man not to follow them, to be lyke vnto them, because they shall be shortly rooted out and destroyed: speake to thy selfe, and to other the 37. psalm.

34 If thou hast decreed to take heede of thy selfe, and seest thine enemies to approach nye thee, as to such the aduersarye is more prouoked to come with assault, and therefore wilt prepare thy selfe, sing the 39 psalme.

35 If thou seest many poore men to begge, and wilt shew pity to them, thou mayst both thy selfe receiue them to mercye, and also exhort other to doe the same, saying the 41 psalme.

36 If thou hast a desier to Godwarde, and hearest thine enemies to bybrayd thee, be not troubled, but consider what fruite of immortallitie riseth to thee for this desier: comfort thy soule with hope to God, and so therein relieuing and allwaging the heauines of thy lpe, say the 42. psalme.

37 If thou wilt remember of Gods benefites which he did to their fathers, both in their outgoing from Egypt, as in the desert, and how good God was to them, but they butthankfull to him, thou hast the 44. 78. 89. 102. 106. 107. 114. psalmes.

38 If thou hast made thy refuge to God, and hast escaped such trouble as was prepared agaynst thee, if thou wilt geue thakes and shew out his kindenes to thee, sing the 46. psalme.

39 If thou wilt know how to geue thankes to God when thou doest resort to him with sound vnderstanding, sing the 47 48 psalmes.

40 If thou wilt exhort men to put their trust in the liuing God who ministrerh all thinges abundantly to good mens bfe: and blameth the madnesse of the worlde: which serueth their God Hammo so inordinately, sing the 49. psalme.

41 If thou wouldst call vpon the blind world for their wrong confidence of their brute sacrifices, and shew them what sacrifice God most hath required of them, sing the 50 psalme.

42 If thou hast sinned and art conuerted and moued to doe penance, desirous to haue mercy, thou hast wordes of confession in the 51. psalme.

43 If thou hast suffered false accusatio before the king, and seest the deuil to triumph thereof, goe aside and say the 52. psalme.

44. If they which persecute thee with accusations would betray thee, as the pharishes did Iesus, and as the Aliens did Dauid, discomfourt not thy selfe therewith, but sing in good hope to god p 54 69. 57 psalmes.

45 If thine aduersaries which trouble thee doe bybrayd thee, and that they which seeme to be thy frendes, speake most agaynst thee: whereupō

- It in thy inceditation thou art somewhat grieued thereat, thou mayest call on god, saying the 55. psalme.
- 46 If persecution come sierce on thee, and bnbetwaeres chaunce to enter into the caue where thou hidest thy selfe, feare not, for in this strait thou shalt haue expedient wordes both to comfort thee and put thee in oide remembraunce with the 57. 142. psalmes.
- 47 If thou wilt confound hypocrites which make glorious shew outwardly, speake their conuersion, with the 58 psalme.
- 48 If thy pursuers commaund thy house to be watched, when thou art escaped, geue thanks to god, and graue it in the Tables of thy hart for perpetuall remembraunce, and say the 59 psalme.
- 49 If thine enemies cruelly assault thee, and would catche thy life, offer the subiection to god agaynst them, and be of good comfort: for the more they rage, the more shall god subdue them and say the 62 psalme.
- 50 If thou speest persecution, and gettest thee into wildernes, feare thou not, as though thou were there alone, but hauing god nye vnto thee, rise to him early in the morning, singing the 63. psalme.
51. If thine enemies would put thee in feare, and neuer cease to lay traynes for thee, and peck all maner quarrels agaynst thee, though they be very many, geue no place to them, for the darteres of babes shall be their destruction, if thou sayest the 61. 68 70. 71 psalmes
- 52 If thou wilt laud god with a psal. or hymne, sing the 65. 66. psalmes
- 53 If thou askest mercy of god sing the 67. psalme.
- 54 If thou wouldest sing to the Lord thou hast what to say, in the 96 98 psalmes.
- 55 If thou hast neede to confesse god with thanks, sing the 71. 75. 92. 95. 108 136 108. 111. 138. psalmes.
- 56 If thou seest wicked men prosper in peace, be not offended thereat, but say the 73. psalme.
- 57 If thine enemies haue beset thy wayes whether thou fleest, and art thereby in great anguise, yet in this trouble dispayre not but pray, and if thy prayer be heard, geue god thanks and say the 77. psalme.
- 58 If they perseuer still, and defile the house of god, kill þe elect, and cast their bodies to the foules of the ayre, feare not their cruelty, but shewe pitye to them which be in such agony, and say the 79 psalme.
- 59 If thou wilt enforme any man with the mystery of the resurrection, sing the 81 psalme.
- 60 If thou wilt sing to the Lord call together gods seruauntes on the feastfull day, and sing the 81 95. 134. psalmes.
- 61 If the aduersaries flocke together on euery side, and thyeete to destroy the house of god, and make their conspiracies agaynst the Religion, let not their number and powre trouble thee, for thou hast an anker of the wordes of the 83 psalme.
- 62 If thou callest an eye to gods house and to his eternall Tabernacles, and hast a desier thereto as the Apostle had: say thou also the 84 psalme.
- 63 If gods wrath be ceased, and the captiuitie ended, thou hast cause how to geue thanks to god with Dauid, recounting his goodnes to thee and others with the 85 116. and 76. psalmes.
- 64 If thou wilt rebuke Daynuns and hereticks, for that they haue not the knowledg of god in them, thou mayest haue an vnderstandig to

ing to god the 86.115. psalmes.

65 If thou wilt see and know the dissent that the Cathollicke Church hath from Ithisme: and wouldest conuert them, or to discern the church concerning the outward appearaunce, & soymes thereof: thou mayst say the 87. psalme.

66 If thou wouldest knowe how Moyses prayed god, and in his meditation, recounting the brittle state of mans lyfe, that hee might followe wisdom, reade the 90. psalme.

67 If thou wouldest comfort thy selfe and others in the true Religion, and teach them, that hope in god, wil neuer suffer a soule to be confounded, but make it bolde and without feare for gods protection, sing the 91. psalme.

68 If thou wilt sing on the Sabbaoth day, thou hast the 92. psalme.

69 If thou wilt sing on the Sondag in the meditation of gods word, desiring to be instructed therein, wherby thou mayest rest in gods holy will, and cease from all the workes and doctrines of vaine men, reuolue that notable psalme. 119.

70 If þ wilt sing on the second day of the Sabbooth, thou hast þ 95. psal.

71 If þ wouldest sing to þ Lord, þ hast what to say, in the 96.28. psalmes.

72 If thou wilt sing the 4. day of the Sabbaoth, sing the psalme 94 for then when the Lord was betrayed, he began to take vengeance on death, and to triumph of it: therefore when thou reade the Gospell, wherein thou hearest the Iemes to take counsell agaynst the Lord, and þ he standeth boldly agaynst the Deuill, then sing the foresayd psalme.

73 If thou wilt sing on good Friday, thou hast a commendation of the 93. psalme. for then was the house of gods Church builded, and grounded by founded though the enemies went about to hinder it: for which cause sing to God the longes of triumphant victory, with the sayd psalme, and with the 129. and 28. psalmes.

74 If there be any in captiuitie wherein thy house is layd waste and yet builded agayne, sing the 96. psalme.

75 If the land be vext with enemies, and after come to any rest by the power of God, if thou wilt sing therefore, sing the 97. psalme.

76 If thou considerest the prouidence of God in his gouernance so over all, and wilt instruct any with true fayth and obedience, when thou hast first perswaded them to confesse themselues sing the 100. 147. psalmes.

77 If thou doest acknowledge in god his iudiciall power and that in iudgement he mixeth mercy, if thou wilt draw nye vnto him, thou hast the wordes of the psalme. 101. to this end.

78 If for the imbecility of thy nature thou art wery with the cōtinuall miseries and griefes of this lyfe, and wouldest comfort thy selfe, sing the 102. psalme.

79 If thou wilt geue thanks to God as it is most conuenient and due for all his giftes, when thou wilt so doe: thou hast how to reioyce the soule thereunto, with the 103 and 104. psalmes.

80 If thou wilt prayse god, and also know, how and for what cause, and with what wordes thou mayst best doe it, consider the 113. 117. 146. 133. 147. 148. 149. 150. psalmes.

81 If thou hast fayth to such thinges as god speaketh, and beleuest that which in prayer thou vtterest: say the 116. psalme in the end.

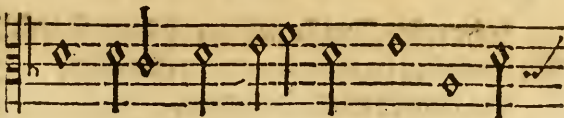

- 82 If thou feelest thy selfe to rise vppward in degrees of well workinge as though thou saydest with S<sup>t</sup> Paule, I forget those thinges which be behinde me, and set mine eyes on thinges which be before me, thou hast the 120. psalme.
- 83 If thou beest holden in thraldome vnder straying and wandring thoughtes, and feelest thy selfe drawen by them, whereof thou art loy, then lay the selfe from thenceforth, and tary where thou hast found the selfe in fault, set thee downe and mourne thou also as the Hebrue people did, and say with them, the 137. psalme.
- 84 If thou perceivest that temptations be sent to proue thee, thou oughtst after such temptations to geue God the thankes and say the 139. psalme.
- 85 If yet thou be in bondage by thine enemies and wouldest fayne be deliuered, say the 140. psalme.
- 86 If thou wouldest pray and make supplication, say the 141. 142. 143. psalmes.
- 87 If any tyranous enemy rise vp agaynst the people, feare thou not, no more then Dauid did Golyah, but beleue lyke Dauid, and sing the 144. psalme.
- 88 If thou art elect out of low degree, specially before other to some vocation to serue thy brethren, aduancce not thy selfe to hye agaynst them in thine owne power, but geue God his glory who did choole thee, and sing thou the 143. psalme.
- 89 If thou wilt sing of obedience prayling God with Alleluya, thou hast the 105. 106. 107. 111. 112. 113. 114. 117. 118. 119. 126. 146. 147. 148. 149. 150. psalmes.
90. If thou wilt sing specially of our Saviour Christ, thou hast of him in euery psalme, but most chiefly in the 25. 45. 110. psalmes
- 91 Such psalmes as shew his lawfull generation of his father, and his corporall presence be the 11. 69. psalmes.
- 92 Such as doe prophesy before of his most holy crosse and passion, telling how many decentfull assaultes he sustayned for vs, and how much he suffered, be the 2. 119. psalmes.
- 93 Such as expresse the malicious enities of the Jewes, and the betraying of Judas, are the 55. 109. 21. 50. 72. 69. psalmes.
- 94 Such as describe his glory in his passion, death, and sepulture, be the 22. 88. psalmes.
- 95 For his dominion and presence in the fleshe, reade the 116. psalme.
- 96 Such as shew his glorious resurrectiō of body, be the 24. 47. psalmes
- 97 Such as set out his Ascension into heauen, are the 93. 96. 98. 99. psalmes.
- 98 And that he sitteth at the right hand of his father, the 120. psalme maketh manifest.
- 99 Such as shew that he hath authoritie of his father to iudge, expresse his iudiciall power, both in condemning the deuill, and all wicked nations, are the 72. 50. 82. psalmes.

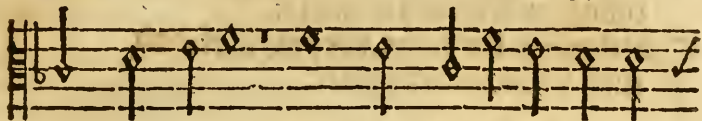

4 The pangues of death did compasse me,  
and bound me euery where:

The flowing waues of wickednesse,  
did put me in great feare.

5 The slye and subtle snares of hell,  
were round about me set:

And for my death there was prepar'd,  
a deadly trappynge net.

6 I thus beset with payne and grief,

did pray to God for grace:  
 And he forthwith did heare my playnt,  
 out of his holy place.

7 Such is his power that in his wrath,  
 he made the earth to quake:  
 Hea the foundation of the mount,  
 of Basan for to shake.

8 And from his nostrels came a smoke,

David prophecteth his destruction, and encourageth the faythfull to put their confidence in God, whose iudgements are most sharpe agaynst his aduersaries. And finally he rendereth thakes to God for his deliuerance. In this psalme is lively set forth the kingdom of Antichrist.



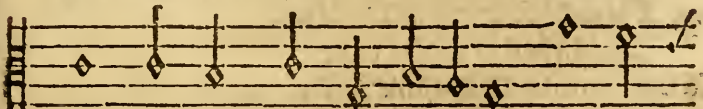

 which did them sore annoy:  
 And fild their countreys full of frogs,  
 which should their land destroy.

46 Noꝝ how he did commit their fruites,  
 vnto the Caterpillar:

And all the labour of their handes,  
 he gaue to the Grasshopper.

47 With haylestones he destroyd their vines,  
 so that they were all lost:

And not so much as wild figge trees,

48 And yet with haylestones once agayne,  
 the Lord their cattell smot:

And all their flockes and heardes likewise,  
 with thunderboltes full hoat.

49 He cast vpon them in his ire,  
 and in his fury strong:

50 Then to his wꝛath he made a way,

But gaue vnto the pestilence,

52 But as foꝝ all his owne deare folke,

And caried them through wildernesse,

we doe not present our selues here be-  
fore thy maiestie, trustyng in our owne  
merites or worthynesse, but in thy ma-  
nifold mercies, which hast promised to  
heare our prayers, & graunt our requestes, which we  
shall make to thee in the name of thy beloued sonne  
Jesus Christ our Lord: who hath also commaunded  
vs to assemble our selues together in his name with  
full assurance that he will not onely be amongst  
vs, but also be our mediatour & aduocate to wardes  
thy maiestie, that we may obtaine all things which  
shall seeme expedient to thy blessed will for our ne-  
cessities: therefore we beseeche thee most mercifull  
father, to turne thy louing countenaunce to wardes  
vs, & impute not vnto vs our manifold sinnes & of-  
fences, whereby we iustly deserue thy wrath and  
sharpe punishment, but rather receaue vs to thy  
mercy for Jesus Christes sake, acceptyng his death  
& passion, as a iust recompence for all our offences, in  
whom onely thou art pleased and thorough whom  
thou canst not be offended with vs. And seyng of thy  
great mercies we haue quietly passed this night,  
(graunt O heauenly father) that we may bestow  
this day wholly in thy seruice, so that all our thoughtes,  
wordes, and deedes, may redound to the glory  
of thy name, and good ensample to all men, who se-  
ing our good workes, may glorifie thee our heauen-  
ly father. And for as much as of thy meere fauour

and loue, thou hast not onely created vs to thine owne similitude and likenesse, but also hast chosen vs to be heyres with thy deare soune Iesus Christ of that immortall kingdome which thou preparedst for vs before the beginning of the world, we beseech thee to encrease our fayth and knowledge, and to lighten our hartes with thy holy spirite, that we may in the meane tyme lue in all godly conuersation and integritie of life, knowing that Idolaters, adulterers, couetous men, contentious persons, Drunckardes, gluttons, and such like, shall not inherite the kingdome of God.

And because thou hast commaunded vs to pray one for an other, we doe not onely make request (O Lord) for our selues, and them that thou hast already called to the true vnderstandyng of thy heauenly will: but for all people and nations of the world, who as they knowe by thy wonderfull woorkes, that thou art God ouer all: so they may be instructed by thy holy spirite, to beleeue in thee their onely Saviour and redemer. But for as much as they can not beleeue except they heare, nor cannot heare, but by preachyng, and none can preach except they be sent: therfore (O Lord) raise vp faythfull distributors of thy mysteries who setting a part all worldly respectes, may both in their life and doctrine, onely seeke thy glory. Contrarily confounde Satan, Antichrist, with all hirelynges, whom thou hast already cast of into a reprobate sence, that they may not by sectes, schismes, heresies and errours, disquiet thy little flocke. And because (O Lorde) we be fallen into the latter dayes and dangerous tymes, wherein ignoraunce hath gotten the vpper hand

hand, and Sathan by his ministers seeke by all meanes to quench the light of thy Gospell, we beseech thee to maintayne thy cause agaynst those rauening wolues, and strengthen all thy seruauntes, whome they keepe in prison and bondage. Let not thy long suffering be an occasion, eyther to encrease their tyranny, or to discourage thy children, neyther yet let our sinnes and wickednes be a hinderaunce to thy mercyes, but with speede (O Lord) consider these great miseries. For thy people Israell many times by their sinnes prouoked thine anger, and thou punishedst them by thy iust iudgement, yet though their sinnes were neuer so greuous, if they once returned from their iniquitye, thou receauedst them to mercy. We therfore most wretched sinners bewaile our manifold sinnes, and earnestly repent vs for our former wickednes, and vngodly behauiour towardes thee: and whereas wee cannot of our selues purchase thy pardon, yet we humbly beseech thee for Iesus Christes sake, to shew thy mercyes vpon vs, and receaue vs agayne to thy fauour. Graunt vs deare father, these our requestes and all other things necessary for vs & thy whole Church, according to thy promise in Iesus Christ our Lord. In whose name we beseech thee as he hath taught vs saying: *Our father which art in heauen. &c.*

**A**Ll thynges depend vpon thy prouidence (O Lord) to receaue at thy handes due sustenance in time conuenient, thou geuest to them and they gather it, thou openest thy hand, and they are satisfied with all good thinges. O heauenly father,

Which art the fountaine and full treasure of all goodnes, we beseech thee to shew thy mercyes vpon vs thy children, and sanctifie these giftes which we receiue of thy mercifull liberalitie: graunt vs grace to vse them soberly and purely according to thy blessed will, so that hereby we may acknowledge thee to be the author and geuer of all good things, and aboute all, that we may remember continually to seeke the spirituall foode of thy word, wherewith our soules may be nourished euerlastingly, through our Saviour Christ: who is the true bread of lyfe, which came down from heauen, of whome whosoever eateth shall liue for ever, and raigne with him in glory world without end. So be it.

**L**et all nations magnifie the Lord, let all people reioyce in praising and extolling his great mercyes. For his fatherly kindenes is plentifully shewed forth vpon vs, and the trueth of his promise endureth for ever.

the end, and in the end. So be it.

**O** Eternal God and most mercifull Father,  
we confesse and acknowledge here before  
thy diuine maiesty, that we are miserable  
sinners, conceiued and borne in sinne and iniquity,  
so that in vs there is no goodnes. For the flesh euer-

more rebelleth agaynst the spirite , whereby we cōtinually transgresse thy holy preceptes and commaundementes, & so purchase to our selues through thy iust iudgement, death and damnation . Notwithstanding ( O heauenly ffather ) for asmuch as we are displeas'd with our selues for the sinnes that we haue committed agaynst thee, and do vnfaignedly repent vs of the same : we most humbly beseech thee, for Iesus Christes sake, to shew thy mercy on vs, to forgeue vs all our sinnes and to increase thy holy spirite in vs, that we acknowledging from the bottome of our hartes, our owne vnrightheousnes; may from henceforth not onely mortifie our sinfull lusts and affections, but also bring forth such fruits, as may be agreable to thy most blessed will, not for the worthynes thereof but for the merites of thy dearely beloued sonne Iesus Christ our onely sauour, whom thou hast already geuen an oblation and offering for our sinnes, and for whose sake, we are certainly perswaded, that thou wilt denye vs nothing that we shall aske in his name, according to thy will. **A** Almighty God and most mercyfull father, we humbly submit our selues, and fall downe before thy maiestie, beseechyng thee from the bottome of our harts, that this seede of thy word now sower amongst vs, may take such deepe roote, that neither the burnyng heate of persecutiō cause it to wither, neither the thorny cares of this lyfe choke it, but that as seed sowne in good ground, it may bring forth thirty, sixty, and an hundred fold, as thy heauenly wisdome hath appoynted: and because we haue neede, continually to craue many thynges at thy handes, we humbly beseeche thee (O heauenly Father) to graunt vs thy holy spirite to direct our petitions, that they may proceede from such a feruent mynde, as may be agreeable to thy most blessed will. in these most perilous times: let thy fatherly prouidence defend vs agaynst the violence of our enemies which doe seeke by all meanes to oppresse thy truth. Let thy fatherly fauor so preserue them, and thy holy spirite so gouerne their hartes, that they may in such sort execute their office, that thy religion may be purely mayntayned, manners reformed, and sinne punished, according to the pre-  
cise

case rule of thy holy worde. And for that we be all members of the mysticall body of Iesus Christ, we make our requestes vnto thee (O heauenly Father) for all such as are afflicted with any kynde of crosse or tribulation, as warre, plague, famine, sicknesse, pouertie, imprisonment, persecution, banishment, or any other kynde of thy rods, whether it be calamitie of body, or vexation of mynde: that it would please thee, to geue them patience and constancie, till thou send them full deliuerance of all their troubles. Roote out from hence (O Lord) all rauenyng wolues, whiche to fill their bellies seeke to destroy thy flocke. And shew thy great mercies vpon those our brethren in other countreys, which are persecuted, cast into prison, and dayly condemned to death for the testimonie of thy truth. And though they be vtterly destitute of all mans ayde, yet let thy sweet comfort neuer departe from them: but so inflame their hartes with thy holy spirite, that they may boldly and chearefully abide such triall, as thy godly wisdom shall appoynt. So that at length as well by their death as by their lyfe the kyngdome of thy deare sonne Iesus Christ, may increase and shine through all the world. In whose name we make our humble petitions vnto thee as he hath taught vs. Our Father which art in heauen hallowed. &c.
