ART AND CRAFTS
AT EXHIBITION

FINE PAINTINGS AND
HANDICRAFTS SHOWN

Gratifying Collections in the Wo-
man's Building Are Being
Greatly Admired

What will be to many: one of the
most attractive features of the fair is
the splendid inaugural exhibition of
The Island Arts Club, which occupies
the upper floor of the woman's build-
ing.

The exhibition is made up of original
work only, but oils, water-colors,
pastels and black and white studies
are shown in bewildering variety.

Mrs. Bampfylde Daniel is showing a
number of magnificent canvasses. No.
34 is a characteristic scene of a log-
jam at Glacier, a truthfully colored
and faithful representation of British
Columbia scenery.

Miss T. Wyde also has some very
fine landscapes, although her forte is
portraiture. No. 85, a very striking
full length portrait in oils of Lieuten-
ant-Governor Paterson, wearing his
official uniform, occupies a conspicuous
place.

Mr. Palmer, a large contributor to the
crafts department, shows some very
handsome work in etched brass, sten-
delling and glazed pottery.

Thomas Bamford, an artist the merit
of whose work is well known to Vic-
torians, is showing an interesting col-
lection of local sketches in oils and

water-colors. This artist excels in
coloring and his work needs only to be
seen to be appreciated. "A Breaking
Wave" is a charming bit of local coast
scenery, and the vivid tints of the
water are truthfully portrayed.

Miss Mills has devoted her attention
chiefly to the crafts exhibit, but her
clever study of a monk, No. 68, and
another of a Ghisy girl, No. 30, make
one sorry not to see more of her work
in the arts department.

Mrs. Denis R. Harris has a group of
vivid sunrise effects, Nos. 30, 45 and 100,
and in her portraits, Nos. 26, 27 and 95,
one readily recognizes well known local
citizens, "My Pet Roses," No. 54, is a
dainty bit of work.

John Middleton, an English new-
comer to the city, who was for many
years artist master in his native town
and surrounding districts, has set in
several very fine water color sketches
of Cornish coast scenery, which any
one familiar with the locality will at
once recognize.

Miss Chambers, another new-comer
to the city, has some beautiful work,
and her exhibit is one of the largest.
No. 22, "Little Fan Pipes to His Flock,"
is an exquisite study in twilight effects.

Mr. N. Shaw, Miss Cocker, Miss Lil-
lian Clarke, and Miss Kittie, Miss Mc-
Mickling, and a number of others have
all contributed largely to make the in-
augural exhibit of the Island Arts Club
a success, and the public will be glad
to see more of their work in the fu-
ture.

SLIPS THROUGH TYPHOON'S TAIL

SADO MARU SWEEP BY SEAS OFF ALEUTIANS

Japanese Liner Has Cargo Valued at \$2,000,000, Including Silk and Tea

When off the Aleutian islands on the 21st inst., the N. Y. K. liner Sado Maru, Capt. Horiuchi, was caught in the tail-end of a typhoon sweeping from the South Pacific, and for twenty-four hours the steamship plunged and rolled in a heavy sea. Capt. Horiuchi had ordered extra fastenings on everything movable and no damage was done, although at times the huge seas which struck the steamship broadside of the Sado Maru were so high that the water threatened to sweep her decks clean.

The Sado Maru arrived at the outer wharf shortly after 1 o'clock this afternoon, having been in port for the last night. She brought a cargo valued at approximately \$2,000,000, including 2,500 bales of silk and silk goods worth \$1,500,000, which will be sent to New York on a special train from Seattle. In addition the cargo, which totalled about 5,000 tons, included 12,000 cases of Formosa and Japan tea, 1,000 tons of porcelain for United States points, 2,000 packages of lily bulbs, and 400 tons of camphor. At this port 300 tons, measurement, of local and Vancouver freight was put ashore, including 1,500 sacks of sugar for Vancouver, 2,500 cases of pineapples, rugs, porcelain and curios.

The passengers included Chancellor H. Yonoki and Professors G. Okakura and T. Tomoda. Altogether the Sado Maru brought over 100 passengers. The following "second-class" passengers landed here: Rev. W. Fukuda, Mrs. M. Okabe, T. Asai, K. Okabe, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Manley, Mrs. M. Matsui, besides eighteen Japanese third-class.

QUEEN TAKES LARGE CARGO FOR 'FRISCO

Carries 1,780 Tons of Freight and Many Passengers—Topeka Due Friday

Carrying 123 passengers and 1,780 tons of freight, one of the largest cargoes taken south by any of the company's vessels for some months past, the Pacific Coast S. S. Co.'s liner Queen sailed this morning for San Francisco. Twenty-one passengers booked from Victoria for the Bay City, among them being the Misses M. Waring, A. J. Rankin and A. E. Read, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Matheson, Mr. and Mrs. A. Kynaster, Miss M. Downey, Mr. and Mrs. James Ross, Mrs. M. Bray, J. Hastee, E. Mercier, Mrs. J. D. Casey and R. D. Perry.

The steamer City of Topeka, which is taking the place of the City of Puebla on the run, while the damaged steamer is in drydock at Seattle, left San Francisco at 2 p.m. on Tuesday with 120 tons of cargo, including 100 tons of flour, to be landed here. She is expected in on Friday morning.

NEW WEIR LINER COMING

According to information received yesterday by the officials of the Water-horse line at Vancouver, the new steamer Lucerie, 16,000 tons, recently completed at Glasgow, will commence leading in a few days, and will come direct to this port. The vessel will take on cargo in Glasgow and Liverpool, and will sail for this coast via Suez. The Lucerie will be of the same size as the Orteric, the other new vessel consigned for Pacific service. Both steamers are levitians in size, and will compare favorably with any steamers now in service on the coast. The Orteric will probably commence unloading some time in December.

THE TIME USED IN PACIFIC STANDARD

The time used in Pacific Standard for the 120th Meridian west, it is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight. The figures for height serve to distinguish high water from low water. The height is in feet on a draught of a foot, above the average level of the lowest low water in each month of the year. This level is half a foot lower than the datum to which the soundings on the Admiralty chart of Victoria harbor are reduced.

MUST CALL AT NEW ZEALAND

WILL BE CONDITION OF MAIL SUBSIDY

Sir Wilfrid Notifies Premier Ward That He Desires Canadian-New Zealand Service

A dispatch to the Times from Wellington, New Zealand, states that Premier Ward has been officially notified by Sir Wilfrid Laurier that the Canadian government will make it compulsory for the Canadian-Australian line to call at a New Zealand port after August next on the Sydney and B. C. service. The mail subsidy expires on August next unless an extension is allowed, and it is understood from the above dispatch that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Premier Ward are both working for direct connection between this port and New Zealand, which was dropped with the withdrawal of the Pondo and Buentaur, formerly operating on a schedule under subsidy.

MARINE NOTES

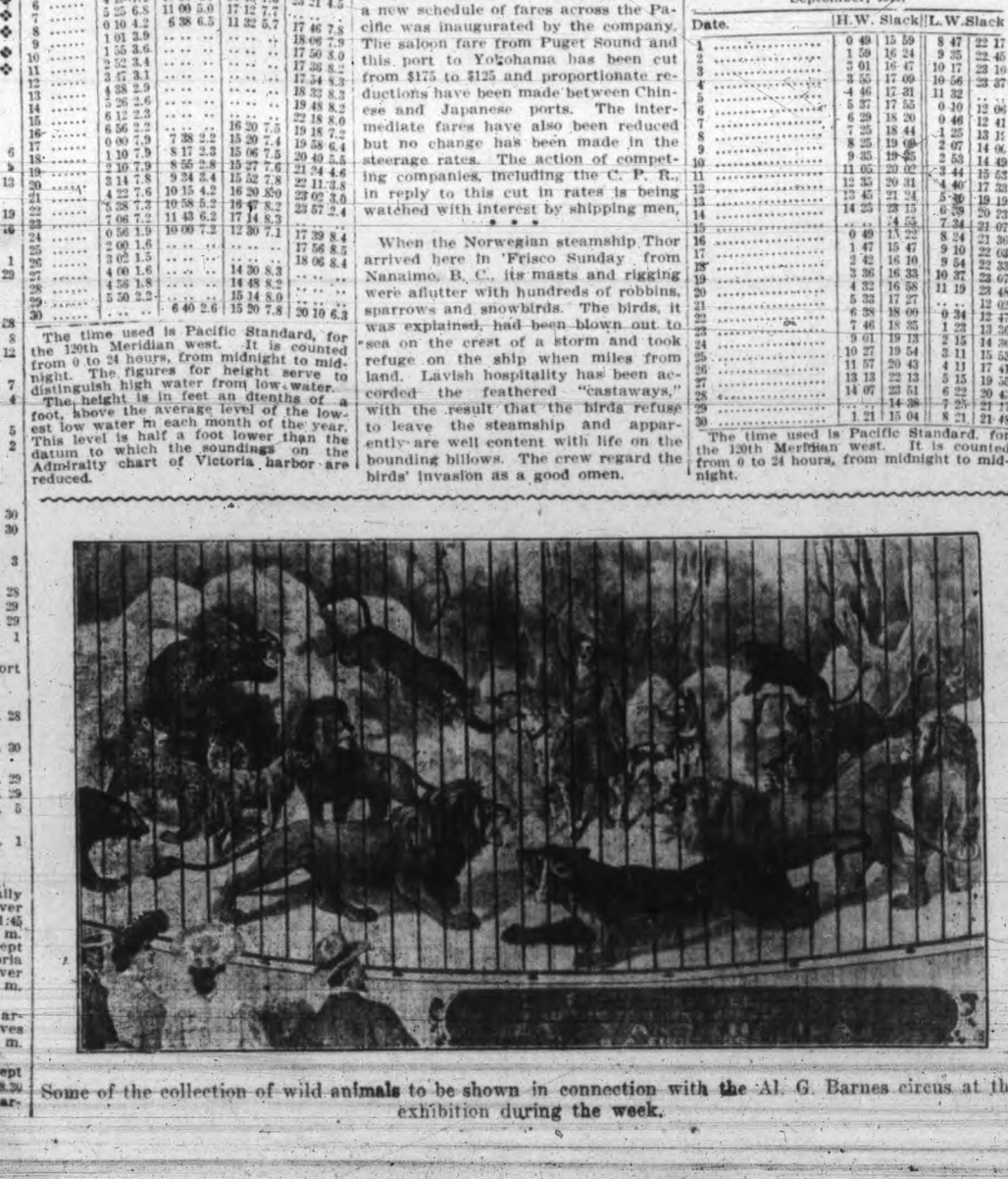

## WOMEN'S WORK AT THE FAIR

SPLENDID EXHIBIT IN THEIR BUILDING

Approach Has Been Greatly Improved by Laying Out Grounds

The most flattering comments regarding the improved appearance of the grounds immediately surrounding the Women's Building are heard from all visitors, and the great credit is due Mrs. Richards, the indefatigable president of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Agricultural Society, for the taste and skill she has displayed in the arrangement of the plants and shrubs at her disposal, especially in consideration of the fact that she has only had two short months in which to do it.

Close to the entrance gates is a large bed of ornamental evergreen shrubbery, a permanent gift to the city from the celebrated Laritz nursery. On either side of the main entrance is Mrs. Henry Richards' famous collection of magnificent palms and ferns. On the left, intermingled with the greenery, are massed red geraniums and on the right vivid pink blossoms form a brilliant contrast to the foliage.  
 A gorgeous bed of asters, the gift of E. A. Wallace of Flewin's gardens, is much admired, and a showy exhibit from Montan's nurseries, which will be renewed from season to season, is a gift to the city which may well be appreciated. The rear of the building is banked with ferns, and on either side of the broad gravelled drives are large beds of ornamental shrubs and herbaceous plants which will be a thing of beauty throughout the varying seasons. A number of seats loaned by the park committee are on the grounds and will be much appreciated.

The interior of the building is, if possible, more attractive than the exterior, and the first impression the visitor receives is of daintiness and cleanliness. In fact, one man was heard to remark that he felt as if he ought to take off his shoes before going in. The prevailing colors are white and yellow, and the effect needs only to be seen to be appreciated. The lattice work in white is especially dainty and pretty. Facing the entrance is the large tiered booth devoted to the well represented domestic science department. Here the most edible dainties find an artistic setting. The colors used are green and pink, with white draping, and the effect is exceedingly pretty. Quantities of pink sweet peas are massed amongst the exhibits, and at either end are pink and green screens having at their bases large jars of bullrushes.

The fine collection of old English lace shown by Mrs. A. E. Diepecker, occupies a conspicuous place, and a table of hand-painted china by amateurs is a very creditable feature.  
 The "ladies' fancy work" department is exceedingly well represented and fills a very large space. The articles submitted vary from patchwork quilts to the most elaborate sofa cushions. The work is all of a high order and there is not one tawdry article in the entire collection. The eyelid and silk embroidery are especially good, and exceeding neatness characterizes everything. Of interest to many is a patchwork quilt in rose leaf design on a white ground, which is 110 years old. The multitude of stitches all so carefully and uniformly taken are an object lesson to the women of the present day.


The fancy work exhibit by girls under fifteen is worthy of special mention. Good taste in coloring and clever workmanship are characteristic of it throughout.

Three large booths are taken up by the large and varied display of the Women's Institutes of Metchosin and Colwood, Lake Hill and Gordon Head. The latter has used the institute colors, red and white, with good effect, for decorative purposes. Lake Hill has chosen yellow and carried out its color scheme with prettily arranged grains and yellow flowers. Metchosin and Colwood have a most effective display of pink and green, carried out with hunting and brass jardinières filled with pink cactus dahlias. All three exhibits show beyond question what a splendid work the institutes so recently organized throughout the country districts are accomplishing. Fancy work in all its branches fills a large space, but the jars of jellies, jams, canned fruits and pickles, to say nothing of culinary productions, all temptingly displayed, show that the more practical side is far from being overlooked.

The Women's Exchange is a feature to be reckoned with, and will well repay a visit. It is to the right of the Women's Building on entering, and in it are to be found at reasonable prices articles which every housewife wishes to possess. Many of the articles have already been sold, and the venture bids fair to become all that its organizers, Mrs. Richards, hoped for, and a permanent institution in Victoria.  
 Other attractions are a fine exhibit of candy by the Vancouver Candy Factory; a hand-vacuum cleaning demonstration; cooking by electricity by the Hinton Co.; a case of Kauri gum, a principal product of New Zealand, and said to be a very valuable collection, kindly loaned by Dr. Frank Quick, Royal Oak.

A checking room is to be found to the immediate left of the entrance, which will be a great convenience to visitors.

**Competitive Art Exhibit.**  
 In a bright, cheery room, opening off the main floor, is the competitive art exhibit. While the display here is not very large it is of a high grade, and embraces almost all varieties of art work, paintings, cleverly applied designs, some very fine samples of wood-carving, and other lines. A still-life study of daffodils is very pretty, and the lights and shadows are cleverly handled. Another still-life study of a kitten is also very good. Mr. Strappini has contributed a number of grouse and pheasant pictures which are marvels of careful work. A weird canvas depicts a Madir chief at the age of 104, and there are several good landscapes

and marine studies. The applied designs for stencilling on wallpapers, by some of Miss Mills' pupils, are exceptionally good. There are also some fine samples of hand-painted china, and a full length fender stool of carved wood is a very fine piece of work.

## THE ADVANCE MAN

"The Witching Hour."  
 Augustus Thomas' great play, "The Witching Hour," which has been such a furore for the past two years, will be at the Victoria theatre to-morrow evening. John Mason will play the star role, Jack Brookfield, supported by the original Hackett Theatre Company. The scenic equipment will be new and very elaborate.

Most of the comedy in "The Witching Hour" falls to Lew Ellinger, an inveterate gambler, who, after borrowing \$15,000 from Jack Brookfield, the Louisville gambler, offers to play him for the cheque on the spot.

One of the funniest series of lines in the play is spoken by Ellinger after Brookfield has disclosed to him his power of thought control and second-sight—the first of which enables him to force the decision of a hostile jury and the second to read the cards which Lew Ellinger deals himself from a straight-deck.

Ellinger, being convinced of Brookfield's power, says: "Can you do that every time?" Brookfield replies: "I don't know, I never tried." Ellinger says: "Well if you can do that every time I know a game in Cincinnati."  
 By this time the audience is "on," and when Brookfield refuses to make use of his power in crooked games, Ellinger brings the house down with a roar by his closing line, which is full of disgust: "You've got a mind like that and you won't go with me to Cincinnati."

"The White Sister," which comes to the Victoria theatre on Saturday for one night, is not primarily a play of a religious nature, for the element of religion is but a subsidiary to the story. Miss Allen's new drama might well be called "a play of love and duty." The peculiarly enticing fascination of a romantic love story is undoubtedly the keynote of "The White Sister's" remarkable success. The religion of the play is but the religion of an Italian woman who turns to her church for comfort after she has been robbed of the man to whom she is betrothed. The keenest interest of the play is centred in the love of the nun and the soldier, whose ways have led them far apart, both in actual distance and in beliefs.

No actress is better fitted, perhaps, to play delicate love scenes than Viola Allen, and "The White Sister" affords ample opportunity for her to exploit her talents in an emotional direction. Miss Allen is an ideal "Julie" in so to speak, a woman whose every motion, even in the middle of a highly exciting scene, is exactly right and perfect without that fault of making the action seem stilted, the unpardonable offence of the mediocre player. Love is the motive of the story and it is the motive, as well of the sub-plot, with which the complications are brought into "The White Sister." Only secondary to the love of the nun and the soldier is the same soldier and the Countess Chiaramonte.  
 James O'Neill, of "Monte Cristo" fame, is featured with Miss Allen in the play.

**LAUNCH WRECKED.**  
 Stewart, Sept. 23.—Frank D. Rice's survey party of seven narrowly escaped death at Georgia river on the canal when their launch caught fire from an explosion of gas, probably caused by a leaky engine. Five of the men were in bed at the time and escaped in their underclothing. The men with considerable difficulty cut away the small boats, but not before the craft was a mass of flames. Survey instruments, a camera, clothing and considerable money were lost.

### ATE LEATHER IN FROZEN NORTH

### EXPLORING SCIENTIST'S TRYING EXPERIENCES

### V. Stefansson, Known Here in Connection With Mikkelsen Expedition, Tells of Adventures

That even shoestrings look good to men hungry in the far north, with their food caches raided and ruined by bears and wolverines, is shown in letters written to Hermon C. Bumpus, director of the New York Museum of Natural History, by Dr. Rudolph Anderson and Vilhjalm Stefansson, who left New York for the Arctic zone in May, 1908. The scientists, who are making extended ethnological and zoological collections on the shores of Arctic America for the museum, have travelled four hundred miles east of the mouth of the Mackenzie river.

The last news from Mr. Stefansson was dated March 25, 1910. In his letter the explorer tells of a trying journey up the Horton river, which started on November 25, 1909. Six persons were in the party and they carried two days' provisions. During the one trip, which took fifteen days, hunting was bad. Each bank of the river was hunted, but not a single animal was found.

The party ate whale tongue, which, owing to its fibrous nature and to the presence of sea salt, was very sickening. When the tongue was gone the men ate sealskins, deerskins—which they used for sole leather—and the tough skin laces used for their snowshoes. There was sufficient seal oil with the expedition. The oil, about a teaspoonful a day, was consumed to keep away the ravages of hunger. It was taken with deerskin or feathers, as few of the men could take it "straight."

Dr. Anderson wrote from Fort MacPherson on July 15. He tells of the hardships encountered by the party and of finding a partly eaten carcass of a caribou, which supplied enough meat for three or four meals. When it was gone the men lived on "Whitefish" blubber taken "straight" and a spoonful of portions of the animal's stomach, taken with oil at each meal. The stomach contained a peck of well masticated moss and grass. It was found of little nutritive value, but did wonders in helping the members of the expedition to eat the oil.

The travellers made camp one day at a time when the spirits of every one were low. Dr. Anderson asked "Jimmy," one of the Eskimau boys, what was the name of the district. The boy knew of no name, but he suggested that it be called Kakwalak, the "place of no food."

The two scientists have made interesting observations on the native fauna and geography of the regions through which they are travelling. They joined forces on November 20, 1909. In September Mr. Stefansson, with two Eskimaus, landed at Cape Parry, Arctic America, from the whaling vessel, Rosie H. He spent the winter in the vicinity of Franklin Bay. Dr. Anderson pushed forward by sledge from Toker Point, along the coast to Franklin Bay, where he joined his colleague, about fifteen miles northwest of Horton river. On March 14 Dr. Anderson left Cape Parry and went by sledge to Fort MacPherson for supplies and mail. He reached the post on June 28. In the meantime Mr. Stefansson set out to visit the natives of the Copper Mine river region, two or three hundred miles east of Cape Parry.

N. Stefansson was one of the leading members of the expedition which sailed from Victoria a few years ago in the schooner Bedford. They passed through Behring straits safely, but the vessel was lost in Arctic ice-pack. Captain Mikkelsen was in command.
