MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD:

SUBJECT: Cold Weather Clothing Teams

1. DA on 20 August, in rad WCL 39399 to CINCFE, stated that 3 Cold Weather Clothing Teams could be assigned to CINCFE. DA requested concurrence and advice as to air priority.
2. In C/N 1, 24 Aug 50, QM to G-4 thru G-1 and G-4, forwarded a proposed msg to DA accepting the offer of the 3 Cold Weather Clothing training teams. Air priority number was assigned for the movement of this unit from the Trans Sec, GHQ.
3. G-4 has indicated concurrence in the proposed msg. Winter weather conditions in Korea are extreme and it is felt that the teams offered by the DA can be used to the fullest for training personnel in Korea during the winter months. It is felt that G-4 interposes no objection.
4. Recommend G-4 indicate concurrence by initialing C/N 1.

WHY WE FIGHT - NO. 1

Let there be no mistake about the grave importance of the mission in which you are engaged. The life of your own country is the stake for which the enemy is gambling.

Today we are fighting an enemy who, with equal madness, proclaims----"today Korea! "Tomorrow, the WHOLE WORLD!"

Let us examine the course taken by the enemy in these past five years. The record is brief and brutal. In those five years, Communism not only has devoured the states on its immediate border, but also has reduced to slavery the once-independent states of Poland, Czecho-slovakia, Hungary, Bulgaria and Rumania. It is now consuming the independence of China and is reaching for all of South East Asia.

Communism's conquests--until today--have been made through guile, treachery and the spreading of internal cancer among the peoples it sought to enslave.

Today the pattern has changed. In the words of the President of the United States:

"The attack on Korea makes it plain beyond all doubt that Communism has passed beyond the use of subversion to conquer independent nations and will now use armed invasion and war."

In the tragic days following the savage and unprovoked onslaught upon the Republic of South Korea by a puppet army, acting under the orders of a puppet government and armed by its Communist masters, the civilized world, as represented by the United Nations, was shocked into a state of indignation and horror.

The expression of that indignation was unanimous---except for the Communists and their puppets. Fifty-three of the 59 members of the United Nations have joined in denouncing the



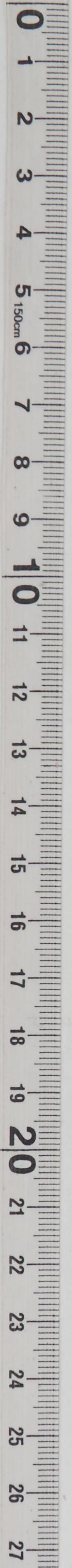
Communist plot. The Security Council, by overwhelming vote, has committed to the United Nations the task of ending this aggression. Forty-one nations have pledged themselves, each one to the best of its ability and capacity, to give material aid to the cause of World Freedom.

Let us never forget, however, that in this war we are fighting for ourselves, for the right to live our own lives in freedom, peace and security. The dagger that is pointed at us is Korean, but the hand that holds it is Communist.

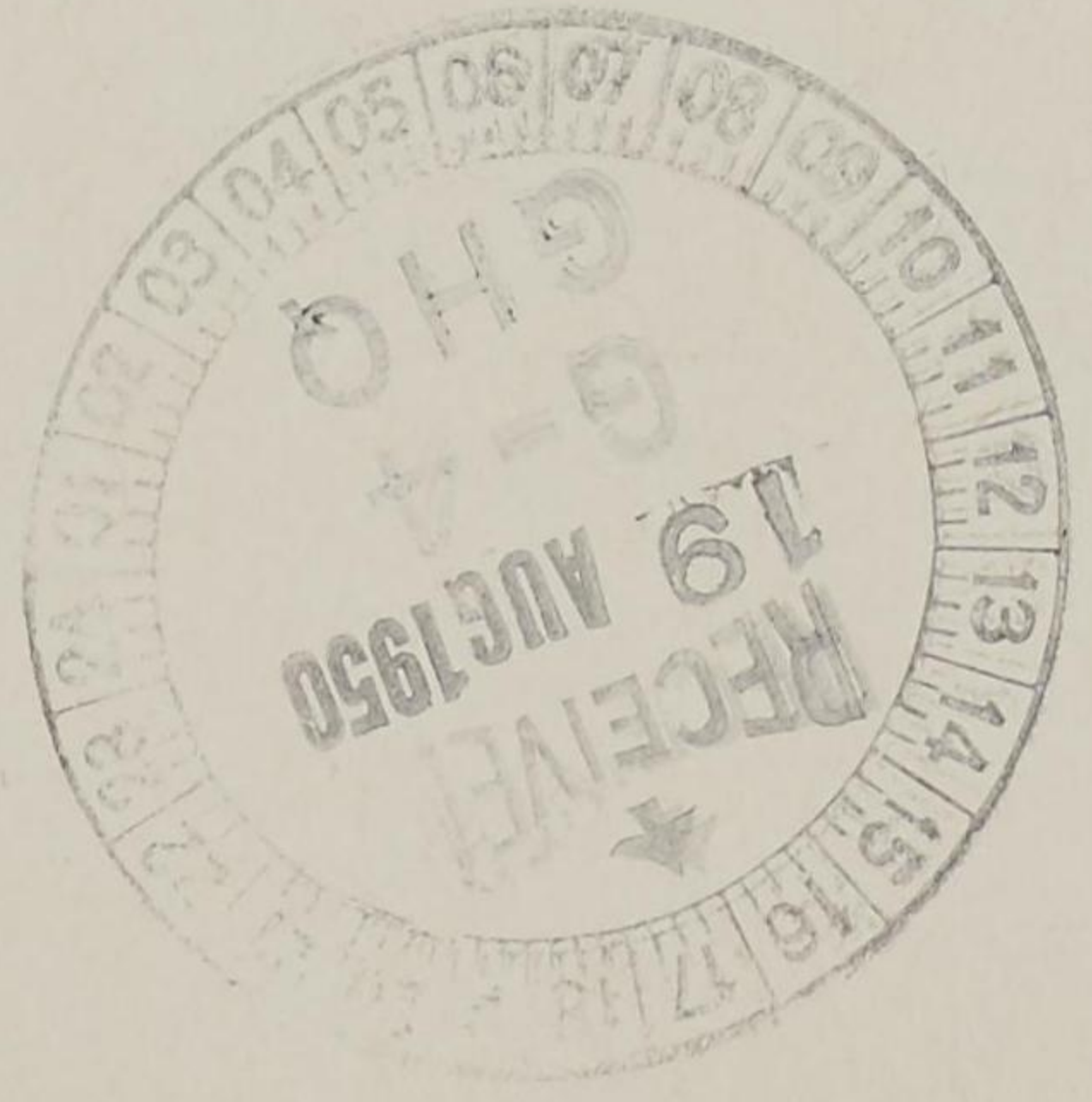
With all the might and power of a nation righteously aroused we shall oppose this evil force until its ultimate destruction.

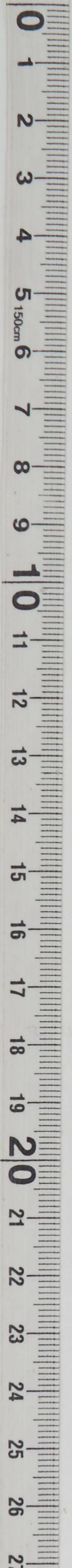

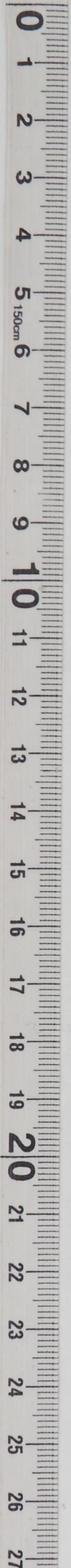

1. Ordn Officer in C/N 1 to G-3, thru G-4 on 14 Aug, forwarded the plan for the training, equipping and preparation of Ord units being held in GHQ Reserve. The plan as submitted by the Ord O closely parallels the outline for the supervision of training of units constituting GHQ Reserve, as issued by G-3 in G-3's C/N to all Technical Services on 12 Aug 50.

3. C/N 2 forwards the Ordn O plan for training to G-3 and informs G-3 that a separate request for the 69th Ammo Co is being initiated.

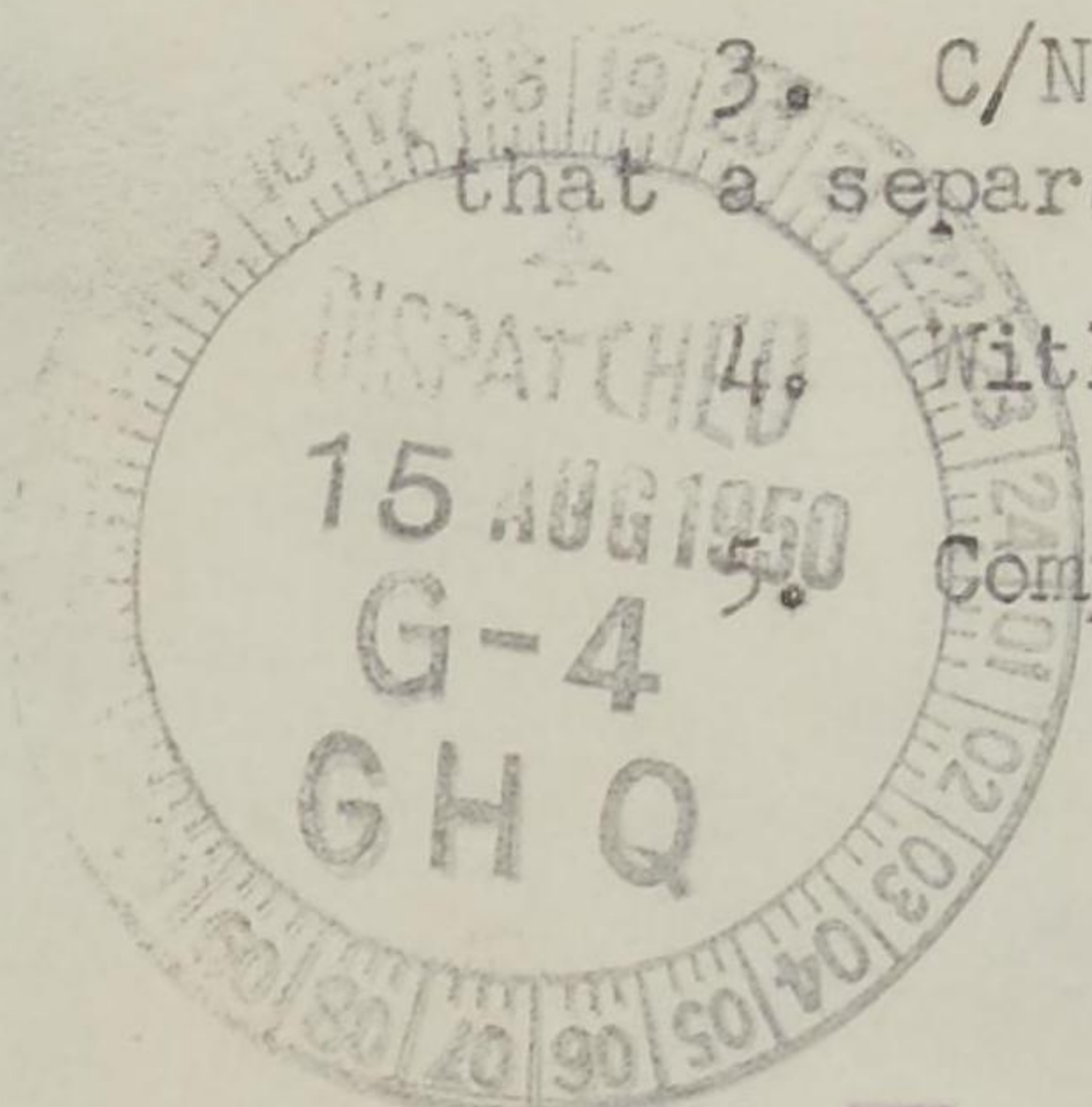

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SECTION I

General

1. Effective date:

This training memorandum is effective 1 September 1950.

2. Rescission:

*WIF*  
Training Memorandum No 1, 9 August 1949, OCAFF, as amended by letter, OCAFF, ATPMG 300.6/1(AFF Tng Memo)(8 Mar 50), 8 March 1950, subject: "Training of Military Police and Military Government Units, Regular Army," is rescinded.

3. References:

- a. Training Circular No 1, DA, 27 February 1950.
- b. SR 10-5-1, 11 April 1950.
- c. SR 10-500-1, 11 April 1950.
- d. SR 345-50-5, 20 December 1948.

4. Purpose:

This training memorandum enunciates the training policy of the Chief of Army Field Forces and furnishes guidance for the accelerated and intensified training of individuals and units utilized by the Army in the field. Additional training directives for Training Division, Guided Missile Units, WAC, and Civilian Components of the Army (not called into Federal Service) are issued separately.

5. Objectives:

The objectives to be attained in training are:

- a. To prepare each soldier psychologically by instilling in his heart the spirit of the offensive accompanied by the will to kill a ruthless and savage enemy who adheres to no established rules of land warfare and win over him on the battlefield despite any and all odds.
- b. To train every male soldier to take his place in combat operations and to fight as an Infantry soldier if the need arises.



c. To develop leadership and discipline as a prerequisite for all training.

d. To develop and maintain units capable of operating effectively in the field, either at their currently authorized or table of organization strengths.

e. To so conduct training as to facilitate rapid expansion to mobilization training.

f. To indoctrinate all individuals and units of the Army with the importance of effective cooperation with the Navy and the Air Force.

6. Standards of Training:

Battle experience has proved the soundness of our tactical doctrine and has emphasized the importance of maintaining the highest standards of leadership, discipline, physical fitness, training, and maintenance. These standards must be achieved and maintained in all training.

7. Training Principles:

The following well-established principles will be adhered to in the conduct of all training:

a. Training, as a function and responsibility of command, carries with it the necessity for close supervision and thorough inspection by all commanders.

b. Both leadership and unit teamwork are substantially fostered when the unit commander is held directly responsible for the conduct of the training of his unit.

c. The teamwork and morale of a unit are materially enhanced when its organizational integrity is maintained, whether undergoing training or performing administrative functions.

d. The basic skill of the individual and of small units is the foundation of the efficient performance of large units.

e. Maximum benefits accrue from training time when training schedules are carefully prepared and adhered to.

f. Maximum integration of training subjects by concurrent training gives each individual a better understanding of the practical application of his job and its relationship to the functions of his team and saves training time.

g. Combat exercises in the field enable units to test knowledge



and techniques learned in garrison training and to develop teamwork.

h. Teamwork between the arms and services is promoted when their units participate together in combat exercises in the field.

i. A sound critique of each combat training exercise enhances the training value of each such exercise.

8. Training Policy:

a. All commanders will take positive steps to instill and maintain high standards of military discipline.

b. Latent leadership potential will be fully exploited and developed.

c. All training will be directed toward the development of highly efficient and combat effective units.

d. Emphasis will be placed on teamwork within and between units.

e. Every opportunity will be taken to bring the arms and services together for training.

f. Training of technical and administrative service units will be designed to develop their ability to perform their missions and to maintain and defend themselves in the field.

g. Appropriate emphasis will be placed upon proficiency in basic military subjects during all phases of training.

h. Concurrent individual training will be conducted in all training phases.

i. In order to minimize the adverse effect on the progressive training of units resulting from the assignment of personnel to essential post administrative, maintenance, or fatigue duties for which they are not primarily intended, the following policies will govern:

(1) Whenever practicable, such functions will be performed by complete units or organic elements thereof (squads, platoons, etc) under their own leaders in order to salvage the maximum of leadership training from training time so lost.

(2) Units will be assigned such functions in accordance with definite schedules, and for sufficient periods of time in order to keep required changes in training schedules of units to a minimum.



- (3) During the specified period that a unit is assigned such functions, it will furnish all the required personnel for the performance thereof.
- (4) Units will be rotated so that complete units may carry on progressive training when they are not performing such functions.

9. Inspections:

The Commanding Generals of Continental Armies, Military District of Washington, and the Chiefs of Technical and Administrative Services will conduct such inspections of individuals and units assigned to their command as they deem necessary to determine the effectiveness and status of training and equipment within their commands. These inspections will be conducted and reports rendered in accordance with instructions to be issued by this Office. Existing instructions governing the inspections of the training divisions and the WAC Training Center continue in effect.

SECTION II

Conduct of Training

10. Training Doctrine:

a. In general, the principles and methods of instruction enunciated in FM 21-5 and TM 21-250 will be followed in all training.

b. Official publications and training aids of the Department of the Army as listed in the SR 310-20 series, SR 110-1-1, and FM 21-8 will be used as a basis in all instruction and training.

c. Joint doctrine and procedures will be in accordance with directives and instructions issued by the Department of Defense, the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and the Department of the Army.

11. Training Cycle and Training Phases:(See Annex 1)

a. In order to insure a balanced progression of training and the proportionate allotment of available time to essential phases of training, a five-phase cycle of 36 weeks of training is prescribed for all units recently activated or reorganized, and for those units currently operating on a training cycle in compliance with previous directives.

b. Those units which have had large turnovers of personnel and have received fillers in such numbers as to necessitate the re-training of the unit, need not repeat the entire training cycle but should conduct such training as will bring the unit up to a satisfactory state of combat readiness.



c. Post cycle training will be as subsequently prescribed by this Office.

12. Training Time:

All military personnel are subject to training and service at any time. However, subject to operational requirements, commanders will couple intensive use of training time with equitable granting of free time in accordance with the following guide:

a. All training prescribed herein will be conducted on a 44-hour per week basis.

b. The following activities will be conducted within the 44-hour week:

(1) Army General and Special Service Schools and Specialists Schools (substitution of a 48-hour week will be considered on an individual request basis).

(2) Troop tests and service tests conducted by AFF boards.

c. Additional time, or time within the 44-hour week may be used by commanders for appropriate activities such as special ceremonies, range firing, and field exercises.

d. (1) Sundays and National legal holidays will be observed. Instructions with reference to the Christmas and Thanksgiving holiday season will be issued later.

(2) Food service and other agencies which conduct training on holidays may be given compensatory time off, if practicable.

e. Nothing contained herein will restrict the number of hours necessary for required activities such as guard and other essential operating functions.

13. Training Programs: (See Annex II)

a. Training programs and schedules will be based upon currently available Department of the Army Training Programs (ATP's), Army Field Forces Training Programs (AFF TP's) or Department of the Army Mobilization Training Programs (MTP's), modified as hereinafter prescribed. World War II MTP's as modified by AFF TP 20-1 may be used as primary guides for preparing training programs and schedules for units not listed in Annex II and for those units for which no training program has been prescribed.

b. Two copies of training programs and other major training directives issued by the Commanding Generals of Continental Armies,



Military District of Washington and the Chiefs of Technical and Administrative Services will be forwarded to this Office.

14. Schools:

a. In order that units will be capable of performing current missions and of meeting requirements in the event of mobilization, it is necessary that adequately trained officers, noncommissioned officers, and enlisted specialists be provided for to the maximum degree possible. To this end, it is incumbent upon all commanders to constantly review the requirements of their units for such personnel and to make maximum use of all available Service Schools, the Leaders' Course and the Common Specialist Courses in Training Divisions, and to establish the necessary unit schools, for their training.

b. Class schedules for all Army General and Special Service Schools and Specialist Schools, except those listed in para 61a(18), SR 10-5-1, are published by this Office. Procedures for obtaining quotas are outlined in instructions issued by this Office and each Continental Army Commander.

c. Enlisted personnel occupying specialist positions who are not school trained should be afforded an opportunity to attend appropriate specialist schools at the earliest possible time.

d. References: Department of the Army Pamphlet 20-21, July 1949; SR 615-215-1, 9 March 1949.

15. Training Tests: (See Annex III)

a. Training tests are designed to determine the status of training of individuals and units, to insure uniformity of training, to determine adequacy of training, and to facilitate early adjustment to exacting standards. Currently available Army Field Forces Training Tests and training tests prescribed in Department of the Army Field Manuals and Technical Manuals should be used during and at the end of each training phase.

b. In cases where existing tests do not meet requirements of major commanders, it is a command prerogative to prescribe and conduct such additional tests as are deemed necessary. Copies of any such tests, in duplicate, will be furnished this Office for information.

c. Commanders are urged to submit to this Office any comments on the adequacy, scope, and effectiveness of AFF TT's.

d. This Office will be notified, at least one month prior to testing date, when training tests for units of battalion size or larger are scheduled. Notification will include the unit, place, time, and date.



16. Training Progress Charts:

It is desired that all T/O&E units maintain charts to indicate the progress of individuals and the unit for each phase of training.

17. Safety:

Realism in training must be achieved without sacrifice of essential safety factors. Common sense is a basic rule of safety in any training program. Most accidents resulting from the use of live ammunition, weapons, vehicles, and tools in training can be prevented by proper supervision and inspection. The firing of all types of ammunition and weapons will be governed by the provisions of SR 385-310-1, 4 March 1949, and appropriate field and technical manuals.

SECTION III

Special

18. Physical and Mental Conditioning:

Emphasis will be placed on discipline, mental conditioning and physical hardening to fit each individual to meet the rigorous demands made upon him in combat.

a. Individuals without combat experience must be trained mentally for the shock of battle. They must be subjected in training to every feasible sight, sound, and sensation of battle. They must be disciplined mentally to act calmly and with sound judgment regardless of noise, confusion, and surprise.

b. Physical hardening includes the ability to arrive fit for combat after trying marches and to perform combat duties for extended periods of time. Physical hardening will be continuous and progressive to prepare the individual to perform his battlefield functions. Training programs will include road and cross-country marching and practice on obstacle courses to assist in this hardening process.

19. Battle Indoctrination:

All male individuals of units utilized by the Army in the field will be given training in battle indoctrination courses indicated below to season and condition them mentally: to withstand the shock of battle; to inure them to the noise and fog of war as such; to develop skill in the use of weapons and confidence of the individuals in themselves and their team members under combat conditions. Appropriate notation will be made as a matter of record, as to courses completed and date thereof: in the case of officers, in item 42 of the "Officers, Warrant Officers and Flight Officers Qualification Record," WD AGO Form 66; in the case of enlisted men, on "Soldier's Qualification Card," WD AGO Form 20.



a. Infiltration Course:

All individuals of units utilized by the Army in the field will be given such training as to accustom them to the sound, sight and sensation of close overhead machine gun fire while advancing forward as part of a team.

b. Overhead Artillery Fire:

All individuals of units utilized by the Army in the field will be indoctrinated in the purpose, sound, and sensation of overhead artillery fire while moving thereunder.

c. Close Combat Course:

All individuals in combat arms units and individuals in the following combat support units will be given training: to teach members of small teams mutual combat support while fighting together against the enemy; to develop the ability of the team to advance against the enemy with initiative and speed, using its own weapons with skill and dexterity while negotiating difficult terrain; to develop confidence of the individuals in themselves, their weapons, and their teammates under combat conditions.

Combat Support Units:

- (1) Includes all service units organic to the three standard type divisions.
- (2) CHEMICAL:
  - 5-25 Chemical Mortar Battalion.
  - 3-266 Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, Chemical Smoke Generator Battalion.
  - 3-267 Chemical Smoke Generator Company.
- (3) ENGINEER:
  - 5-35 Engineer Combat Battalion, Army.
  - 5-137 Engineer Panel Bridge Company.
  - 5-138 Engineer Treadway Bridge Company.
  - 5-139 Engineer Ponton Bridge Company.
  - 5-192 Headquarters and Headquarters Company, Engineer Combat Group.



- 5-315 Engineer Construction Company.
- 5-324 Engineer Dump Truck Company.
- 5-367 Engineer Light Equipment Company.
- 5-398T Engineer Technical Intelligence Team (Combat).
- 5-511T Engineer Boat and Shore Regiment.

(4) MILITARY POLICE:

- 19-35 Military Police Battalion, Army.
- 19-37 Military Police Company, Corps and Army.
- 19-47 Military Police Escort Guard Company.
- 19-77 Military Police Platoon, Corps.

d. Combat-In-Cities Course:

All individuals in combat arms units and individuals in the combat support units listed in paragraph 19c, above, will be given training in: how to fight in cities and villages; how to fight in streets and alleys; how to clear streets and buildings, utilizing flame throwers, hand grenades, and/or firing quickly and accurately at suddenly appearing targets.

20. Combined Arms Training:

Every opportunity will be taken to develop Infantry-Artillery-Tank team proficiency in training. The members of each arm, particularly the leaders, must be familiar with the characteristics, capabilities, tactics and techniques of the other members of the team. Training should be conducted to develop the coordination and integration of effort necessary for effective team action.

21. Battalion Combat Team Training:

a. The development of the offensive capabilities of battalion combat teams is the primary training mission of the Army. To this end, Infantry battalions will be thoroughly trained in offensive operations and welded into effective battalion combat teams. Thorough indoctrination will be given to all concerned in the offensive use of the tank-infantry team adequately supported by mortar and artillery fires along with the support rendered by tactical air. Field exercises will be designed and conducted by commanders at all levels to facilitate the attainment of complete proficiency in offensive operations and to develop confidence in the battalion's offensive capabilities. Armor, Artillery



support, and Tactical Air support should be incorporated in battalion exercises and tests to the maximum practicable extent.

b. Within the Armored Division and the Armored Cavalry Regiment (L) these type battalions will be thoroughly trained as outlined above, with the Infantry, Artillery, and Tactical Air in the supporting roles. Emphasis will be placed on the exploitation phases of offensive operations.

22. Consolidation of the Objective:

a. Lessons learned in World War II indicate that many units suffered unnecessary losses of personnel, and lost objectives gained because unit commanders failed in properly consolidating seized objectives and in reorganizing units promptly. These unit commanders either did not have any plans for, or did not know how to consolidate properly an objective once gained.

b. In all training, and especially during field exercises and maneuvers, commanders will stress the proper method of consolidation of objectives and the expeditious reorganization of units following the seizure and consolidation of objectives. Too much emphasis can not be placed upon the necessity for thorough indoctrination of unit commanders at all levels in this important phase of combat. Advanced planning will be emphasized.

23. Night Operations:

a. In war, many of our operations will be conducted at night. To that end, commanders will stress training in night vision, night movements, night operations, and light discipline.

b. To be proficient in night operations, personnel must be taught proper night vision techniques. This proficiency can be attained by conducting routine training at night rather than limiting night operations to occasional special exercises. After basic training, part of the daily program in each training phase should be scheduled during the hours of darkness. Advantage will be taken of every opportunity to improve techniques used in night operations.

24. Defense Training:

Notwithstanding the proper emphasis placed on training in offensive operations, all units should receive sufficient training in the principles of defense to insure their capability of conducting defensive operations. Appropriate field exercises illustrating basic principles of defense should be conducted. The counter-attack delaying action and the utilization of the terrain to the maximum advantage should be emphasized. Defense training must include: erection of suitable wire entanglements adequately covered by protective fires; proper



use of antipersonnel and antitank mines; and handling and use of demolitions.

25. Antimechanized Defense:

Training in this subject will include attainment of individual proficiency in the ability to identify and to differentiate between our own and enemy tanks, and to be familiar with their limitations. Individuals will be so trained in the use of organic weapons as to instill confidence in the capabilities of these weapons against modern mechanized equipment. Special emphasis will be placed on the importance of, and need for, aggressive close-in action on the part of individuals to attain maximum effectiveness in the use of rocket launchers, recoilless rifles and grenades.

26. Anti-Infiltration Training:

Pending publication of appropriate field manual, training in this subject will be designed to counter enemy infiltration and guerrilla tactics. Small units will be so trained as to be capable of conducting independent actions against such enemy tactics in open country, woods, mountains, villages, river and shorelines. Training in this type warfare must place emphasis on training individuals in the proper use of cover, concealment and camouflage; movement under cover of darkness; scouting and patrolling; this latter to include tracking and quarrying of the enemy and destruction of his equipment and supplies. Training of commanders at all levels must stress:

a. The importance of adjacent units, especially immediate rear area units, being constantly linked together by normal communication means, liaison or otherwise, to provide warning and mutual support in effecting protection against attack and destruction in detail.

b. The methods and means of controlling the civil populace, especially within the actual zone of combat.

27. Air-Ground Training:

a. Effective tactical air support of ground forces can be achieved only when air and ground units train together and have a thorough knowledge of each others' capabilities and limitations. To this end, every opportunity should be taken to incorporate close air support in all training exercises.

b. It is desired that maximum use be made of all available aircraft, including organic Army aviation, for air-ground training purposes. Improvisation and training expedients should be used when aircraft are not available.



28. Training in Movement by Air:

a. Attention is invited to Department of the Army letter, AGAO-C 353 (20 Mar 50), 23 March 1950, subject: "Training in Movements by Air," and 1st Indorsement, OCAFF, thereto.

b. Training will be conducted in accordance with provisions of letter, OCAFF, ATING-25 353/169, 13 April 1950, subject: "Training in Movements by Air."

c. Field Forces units will conduct sufficient air movement training to insure their ability to move by air with air transportable organic equipment.

d. Prior to actual utilization of aircraft, and in the event aircraft is not available, extensive use will be made of mock-ups for training purposes.

29. Cadre Training:

a. Cadre training is an important part of preparedness for mobilization. Cadres as listed in T/O&E's constitute minimum requirements. Cadre understudies for all key positions must be trained concurrently, to enable units to provide cadres for units ranging in size from company level up to and including Army headquarters.

b. Individuals trained in their primary MOS should be given every opportunity for training in related or higher MCS's. It is the responsibility of unit commanders to insure that all suitable personnel be given the opportunity to learn the duties of the next higher grade by "on-the-job training" or by attendance at appropriate service schools.

30. Intelligence Training:

a. Intelligence training will be stressed in all phases of training; the play of Intelligence factors in CPX's, field exercises, and maneuvers will be continuous.

b. All military personnel will receive appropriate indoctrination training in Military Intelligence to include: production of military intelligence, how to report information of the enemy; handling of prisoners of war, disposition of captured enemy documents and materiel; security of military information, including signal communication security; counter-measures, and security against subversion, enemy psychological warfare, and action of partisan or para-military organizations. Security control measures will be incorporated in all problems and training exercises.

c. Members of Intelligence staff sections, Intelligence service detachments and reconnaissance units will be thoroughly trained



in the duties of their positions and given complete orientation on intelligence and counterintelligence by means of troop schools.

31. Supply Economy:

a. Commanders at all levels will, by constant and active supervision and training, insure that the most economical use is made of all materiel and supplies. It will be constantly impressed upon each individual that our national resources cannot simultaneously support a wasteful security force and our current living standard, and that the judicious use and conservation of materiel and supplies must become a habit with all personnel.

b. Training in supply economy will be conducted in all training phases. The initial instruction of recruits on this subject during basic military training is particularly important. It is also vital that all grades and ranks in all echelons of command appreciate and practice economy and enforce all measures toward its attainment. Preventive measures in maintenance will be stressed in all training to emphasize their important relationship to supply economy.

c. Periodic refresher instruction will be conducted by commanders of posts, camps, stations, and units.

d. Instruction in supply economy will be included in courses at all Army General and Special Service Schools and Specialist Schools, except those listed in para 61a(18), SR 10-5-1.

32. Training in Chemical, Biological and Radiological Defense:

a. The functions of the present Army organization described in FM 21-40 for defense against chemical attack will be expanded to include Biological Defense, and Radiological Defense. The outline plan for augmentation of the chemical defense organization, together with prescribed levels of training for individuals is prescribed in DA letter, AGAO-S 353 (9 Mar 50) CSGOT-M, 27 March 1950, subject: "Radiological Defense Organization and Training."

b. The purpose of chemical, biological, and radiological defense training is:

(1) Insure that the individual soldier has sufficient knowledge of the characteristics and potentialities of chemical, biological and radiological agents to dispel his fear of these weapons and instill confidence in his equipment, and his ability to protect himself under conditions where chemical, biological or radiological hazards are present.

(2) Provide trained staff personnel and unit chemical, biological and radiological defense personnel.



- (3) To insure the operating efficiency of the Army in the presence of these hazards.

33. Training in the Use of Army Aviation:

a. Appropriate commanders and staffs will be indoctrinated in the capabilities and limitations of Army aviation and will participate in flights for the purpose of training in troop control and observation methods.

b. Army aviation sections will be required to take an active part in the training programs of their parent units. Their training should insure their capability of operating and maintaining aircraft in the field with a minimum of supplies and equipment.

c. Field exercises and maneuvers should include the use of Army aviation.

34. Airborne Training:

a. Department of the Army policy for airborne training of personnel and units of the airborne division is as follows:

- (1) All personnel occupying positions requiring parachutist qualification in an airborne division will receive parachutist and air movement training.
- (2) All other personnel in an airborne division whose unit equipment is air transportable will receive air movement training.
- (3) Personnel in units of an airborne division, or elements thereof, whose unit equipment is not air transportable will not be required to receive special airborne training.
- (4) Any member of an airborne division who is not occupying a position requiring parachutist qualification, may volunteer for parachutist training.

b. All airborne units will become thoroughly proficient in the tactics of their basic arm.

35. Special Operations:

a. All units located at stations where realistic winter training can be conducted, will engage in at least one winter field exercise at their home station.

b. Amphibious, Mountain, Arctic, Jungle, and Desert training will be conducted in accordance with special instructions issued by this Office.



36. Joint Training Exercises and Maneuvers:

a. Joint training exercises and maneuvers will be prescribed annually by OCAFF after coordination with Department of the Army, and will be published in Department of the Army, letter, "Forecasts of Training Exercises." OCAFF will issue appropriate instructions and directives for the Army's participation in all joint exercises and maneuvers. In so far as practicable, each Army will be afforded opportunities to plan and supervise large scale maneuvers.

b. To assist in determining readiness of units in the General Reserve for participation in joint large scale maneuvers, reports as required by letter, OCAFF, ATING-22 354.2/49(14 Dec 48), 14 December 1948, subject: "Quarterly Report on Field Exercises and Maneuvers (Reports Control Symbol ATING-34)," should be submitted as prescribed therein.

37. Preparation of Unit Tactical Exercises:

Unit tactical exercises should be carefully prepared and supervised by commanders to insure correct illustration and application of tactical principles. The maximum amount of realism consistent with the provisions of prescribed safety regulations should be injected into all tactical exercises.

~~38.~~ Use of Aggressor, Maneuver Enemy:

Aggressor, the maneuver enemy, will be employed in all command post exercises, field exercises, map maneuvers, or other training in which it is appropriate to represent the enemy force as is designated in Field Manuals 30-101 to 30-104. Aggressor uniforms, equipment, charts, and advice on aggressor tactics and order of battle may be obtained in accordance with letter, OCAFF, ATFAC-Int 400/74(31 May 49), 31 May 1949, subject: "Aggressor Uniform, Simulation Equipment and Ammunition."

39. Training in Overseas Movement:

Training in preparation of individuals and units for overseas movement will be conducted in accordance with special instructions to be issued by this Office.

40. Mandatory Training:

Training as prescribed by Department of the Army in the subjects listed below will be conducted in accordance with the provisions of indicated Department of the Army references:


41. Strength and Training Status Reports:

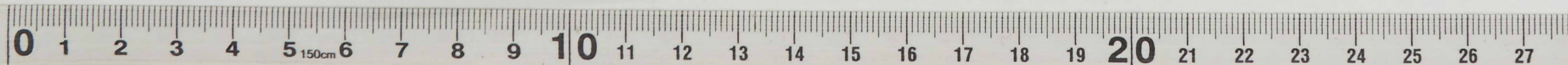

ANNEX I

36-WEEK TRAINING CYCLE AND TRAINING PHASES

TRAINING CYCLE

The training cycle is a five-phase training cycle covering 36 weeks prescribed to provide a balanced progression of training for those units recently activated or reorganized, those units operating on a training cycle in compliance with previous directives, and those units which have had large turnovers of personnel and have received fillers in such numbers as to necessitate the complete retraining of the unit.

TRAINING PHASES

a. Basic Military Training. - Basic military training indoctrinates an individual without prior military training with a common background of fundamental military knowledge. It conditions him mentally, physically and morally, while developing elementary applicatory skills designed to prepare him for advanced individual training.

b. Advanced Individual Training. - Advanced individual training prepares the basically trained soldier to function effectively as an individual or as a member of a squad, crew or detachment, and fosters development of leader and instructor potentialities. It also provides training in those specialties in which experience and basic occupational specialty training are prerequisites. Qualification in required military occupational specialty (MOS).

c. Unit Training.

- (1) Basic. - Basic unit training provides team training in which individuals are welded into effective squads, crews, platoons, companies, or comparable company level units.
- (2) Advanced. - Advanced unit training provides team training during which units of company or comparable level, of the same arm or service, are integrated into effective battalions, regiments, or groups.

d. Combined Arms Training. - Combined arms training provides for the training of a unit of an arm together with a unit or units of other arms and/or services. In this phase of training, units of the different arms or services are combined and developed into coordinated battlefield teams, and perfected in the tactics and techniques of the effective use of available manpower, weapons, and equipment.

e. Field Exercises and Maneuvers. - Field exercises and maneuvers provide regimental combat teams and larger units field training in tactical, logistical, intelligence, and administrative functions under simulated combat conditions.

1. Reference is made to a request (Incl #1) from the  
Commander-in-Chief, British Commonwealth Occupation Force, for  
a training supply of the 3.5 Inch Rocket Launcher and a quantity

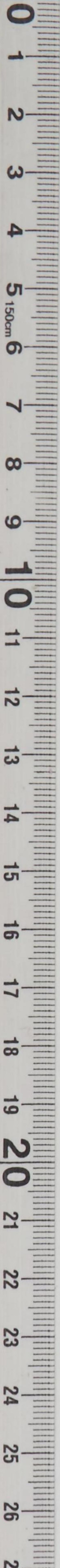

1. Reference: Letter, General Headquarters, Far East Command, AG 684 (15 July 49)GC-TNG, subject: Surface to Air Gunnery Ranges, 22 July 1949.

2. A report received from the Liaison Bureau, Foreign Ministry, through the Maritime Safety Board, Tokyo, states the following:

a. On 21 June 1950 at 1400, a Japanese ship, the Harunoboru Maru, was fired upon by a destroyer at a point two miles off Ryuhizaki, Aomori Prefecture, Honshu. The destroyer, cruising westward, fired three shots that fell 100 meters in rear of the Japanese ship. Five minutes later, another shot fell 600 meters to the right. Again, ten minutes later, one round fell 80 meters in front of the ship.

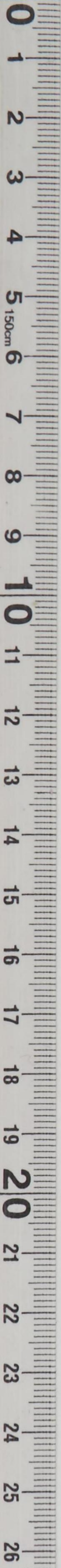
b. On the same date at 1600, naval firing was carried out by an Allied Power's ship off the coast of Yoshicka-mura, Hokkaido (Tsugara Channel).

3. Another report received from the Legal and Government Officer, Hokkaido Civil Affairs Region, stated that naval firing, approximately 13 rounds, was reported by CIC personnel and local police to have taken place south of Kushiro, Hokkaido on 19 Jun 1950.

4. There are no naval ranges approved in the area of the reported firing. Authority had been granted for units of the British Navy to conduct firing in the waters of the Northern Honshu Air-to-Air Gunnery Range during the period 19-23 June 1950 in conjunction with exercises held with

units of the Far East Air Forces. Although this range is located 100 miles southeast of the reported firing, it is considered possible that a ship of this British unit may have been responsible for the firing.

5. In view of the apprehension among certain elements of the Japanese caused by the present hostilities in Korea, it is essential that no unauthorized or unannounced naval firing take place in the waters surrounding Japan. It is desired that all elements under the operational control of the Commander, Naval Forces, Far East, be informed of the restrictions on firing contained in referenced letter. If additional training areas are required because of the increase of naval activity in the Far East Command, it is desired that the requests for such areas be submitted to General Headquarters, Far East Command, for approval.

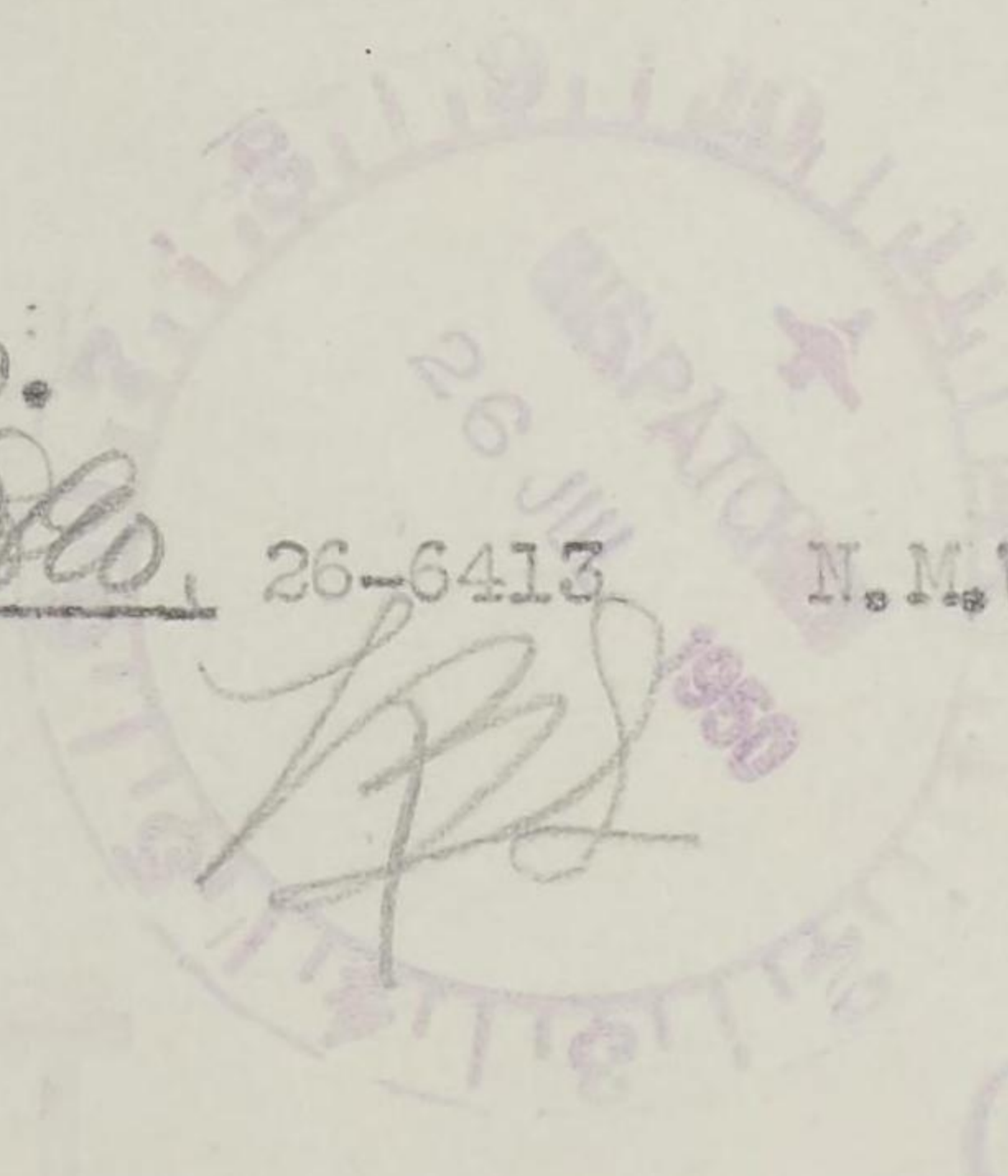
SUBJECT: Intensified Training of 7th Inf Div

1. On 25 July 1950 G-3 in compliance with a CofS directive drafted a message to CG 8th Army directing that the 7th Inf Div be concentrated, filled to strength and given intensified training. The message informs CG 8th Army:
  - a. This is an urgency overriding any occupation or personnel housing requirement.
  - b. 3 Infantry Bn cadres now enroute from ZI will be assigned to 7th Div.

  - f. That he is to submit progress reports including status of personnel, training and equipment, on a weekly basis, beginning Wednesday, 2 Aug 50.

3. G-3 action will provide a combat Infantry Division concentrated for employment.
4. Recommended G-4 action is to indicate concurrence by initials opposite G-4 on the draft message.

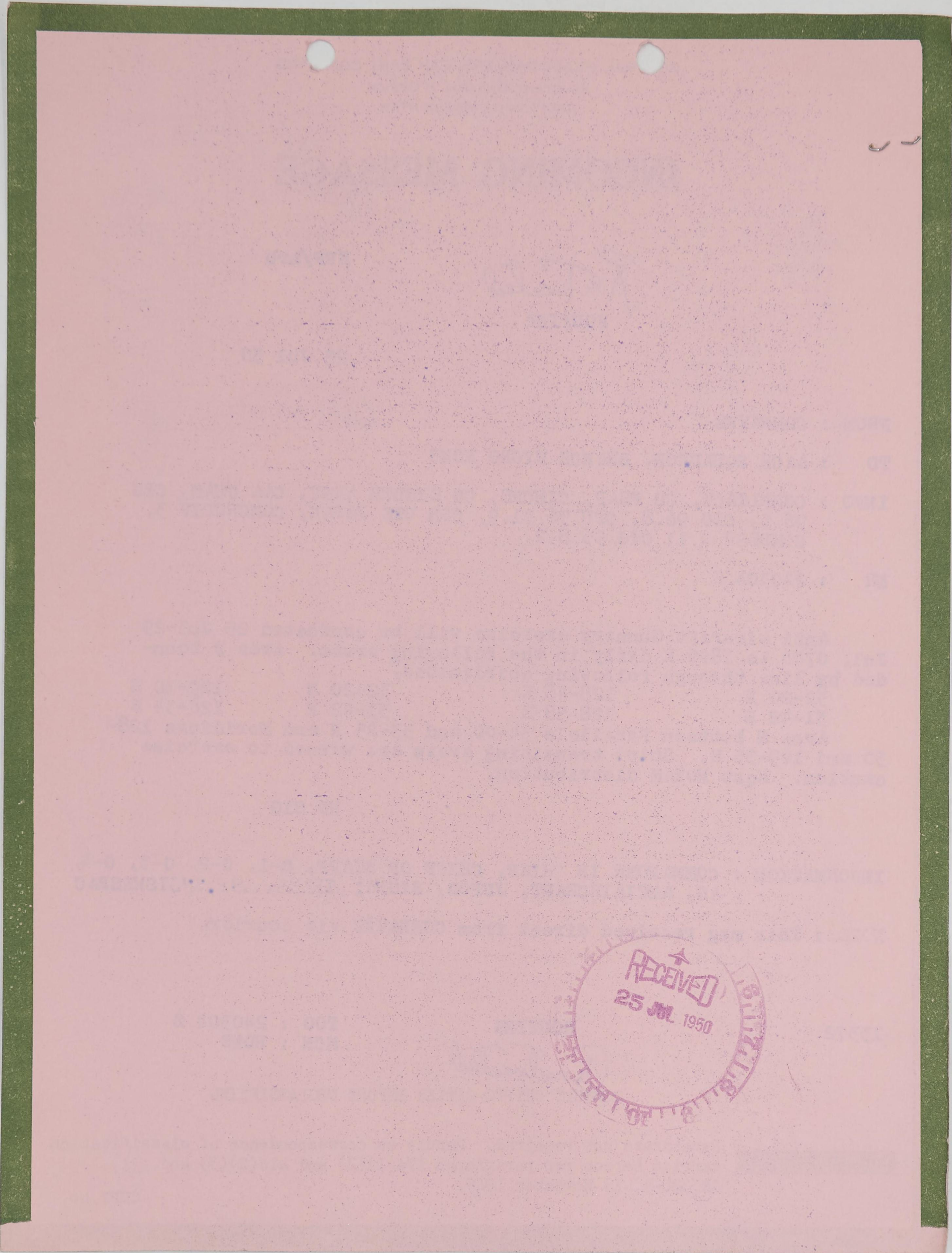
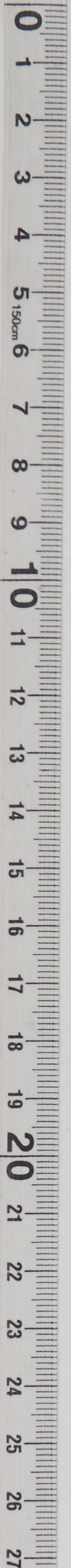
