- A University-wide Silver Award (first in Scotland)
- A Gold Award for School of Chemistry
- Silver Awards for the School of Biomedical Sciences, the School of Biological Sciences, the School of Informatics, School of Physics and Astronomy, and Roslin Institute, and the Royal (Dick) School of Veterinary Studies. The Schools of Molecular, Genetic and Public Health Sciences and Clinical Sciences jointly submitted and were successfully awarded Silver.
- Bronze Awards for: the Schools of GeoSciences, Engineering, Mathematics, Health, Psychology, Architecture, Divinity, and the Institute for Sport, Physical Education & Health Sciences, History, Classics & Archaeology, and the School of Economics.

Edinburgh won its first University Athena Swan Institutional Bronze Award in 2006 and successfully renewed in 2009 and again in 2012, and successfully achieved Silver in 2015.

The School of Chemistry successfully attained Silver in 2006 and subsequently successfully renewed in 2009, following which they achieved Gold in April 2012. (first Gold in Scotland and second in UK)

These awards recognise achievements in having action plans in place which demonstrate progress made on gender equality, and include actions on how they intend to continue to progress.

 <p>CHECK THE AUTHOR Do a quick search on the author. Are they credible? Are they real?</p>	 <p>SUPPORTING SOURCES? Click on those links. Determine if the info given actually supports the story.</p>
 <p>CHECK THE DATE Reposting old news stories doesn't mean they're relevant to current events.</p>	 <p>IS IT A JOKE? If it is too outlandish, it might be satire. Research the site and author to be sure.</p>

Robert Louis Balfour Stevenson (13 November 1850 – 3 December 1894) was a Scottish novelist, poet, essayist, and [travel writer](#). His most famous works are *Treasure Island*, *Kidnapped*, *Strange Case of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde* and *A Child's Garden of Verses*.




A literary celebrity during his lifetime, Stevenson now ranks among the 26 most translated authors in the world.^[1] His works have been admired by many other writers, including Jorge Luis Borges, Bertolt Brecht, Marcel Proust, Arthur Conan Doyle, Henry James, Cesare Pavese, Ernest Hemingway, Rudyard Kipling, Jack London, Vladimir Nabokov,^[2] J. M. Barrie,^[3] and G. K. Chesterton, who said of him that he "seemed to pick the right word up on the point of his pen, like a man playing spillikins."^[4]

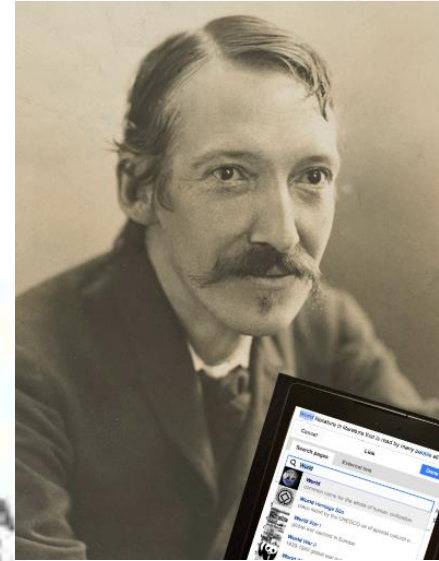
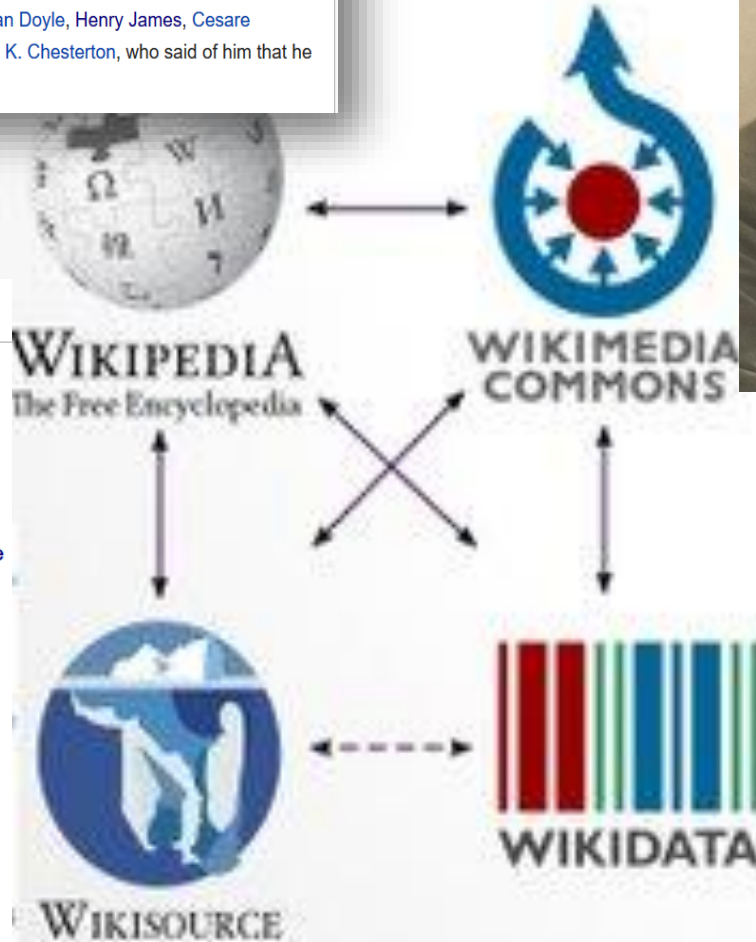

Thomas James Jehu

Dr **Thomas James Jehu** FRSE FGS (1871-18 July 1943) was a British physician and geologist. The **Jehu-Campbell Fossil Collection** within **Edinburgh University** was donated by Jehu in combination with **Robert Campbell** and is now the main component of their "Highland Border Series" of fossils. A large number of the fossils come from the **Aberfoyle** area.^[1]

Life [edit]

He was born in **Llanfair Caereinion** in **Wales** in 1871, the son of John Jehu. He was educated at **Oswestry High School**. He then studied Medicine at **Edinburgh University** graduating MB ChB in 1893.

He did a further year of Science gaining a further degree (BSc) then went to **Cambridge University**, where he gained a further MA in Science. Despite gaining his doctorate as a physician (MD) he then went to **Andrews University** then moving to **Edinburgh University** in 1914.

In 1904 he unsuccessfully tried for the chair in Geology at **Glasgow University**, but lost to **John Water Gregory**. In 1906 he was elected a Fellow of the **Royal Society of Edinburgh**. His proposers were **James Geikie**, **Ben Peach**, **John Horne**, and **Ramsay Heatley Traquair**. He won the Society's Keith Prize for the period 1925-27 and served as their Vice President 1929-32.^[3]

In 1914 he succeeded Prof **James Geikie** as professor of Geology at **Edinburgh University**.^[4] In 1932 he oversaw the transfer of his department from **Old College** to **King's Buildings** where it was thereafter housed in the Grant Institute due to its endowment by Sir Alexander Grant.^[5]

He remained a professor until death in Edinburgh, on 18 July 1943, when he was succeeded by **Arthur Holmes**.

Reproductive Biology Honours students

A cohort of 38 fourth year Honours students on the Reproductive Biology course worked in groups to research and write 8 new articles on terms related to reproductive health.

The sessions were split into 2 x 3 hr sessions.

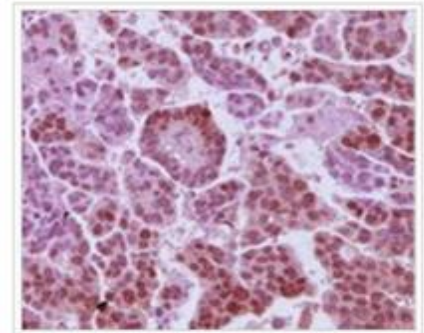
High-grade serous carcinoma (HGSC) is a type of tumour that arises from the **serous** epithelial layer in the **abdominopelvic cavity** and is mainly found in the **ovary**. HGSCs make up the majority of **ovarian cancer** cases^[1] and have the lowest survival rates.^[2]

HGSC is distinct from low-grade serous carcinoma (LGSC) which arises from ovarian tissue, is less aggressive and is present in stage I ovarian cancer where tumours are localised to the ovary.

Although originally thought to arise from the **squamous** epithelial cell layer covering the ovary, HGSC is now though to originate in the Fallopian tube epithelium. HGSC is much more invasive than LGSC with a higher fatality rate - although it is more sensitive to **platinum-based chemotherapy**,^{[3][4]} possibly due to its rapid growth rate. In rare cases, HGSCs can develop from LGSCs,^{[5][6]} but generally the two types arise independently of each other.



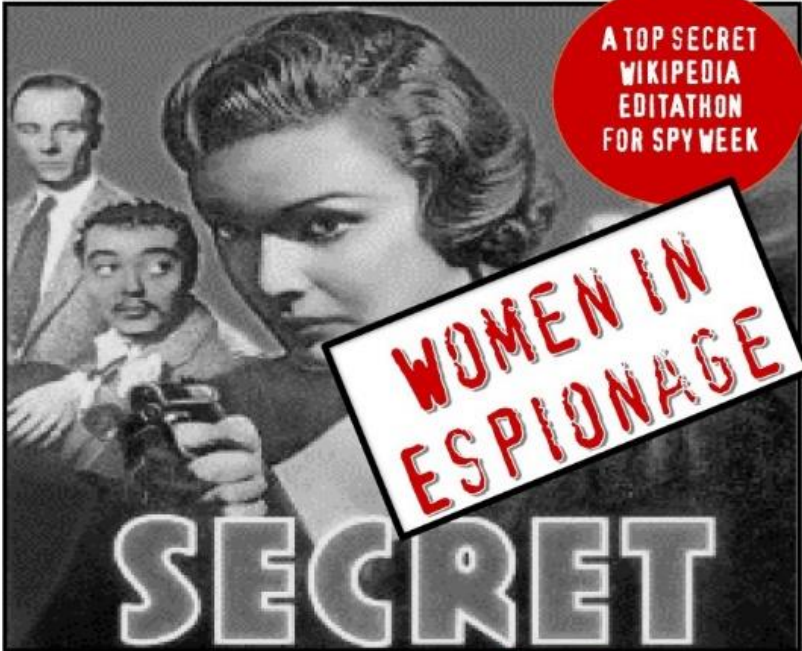

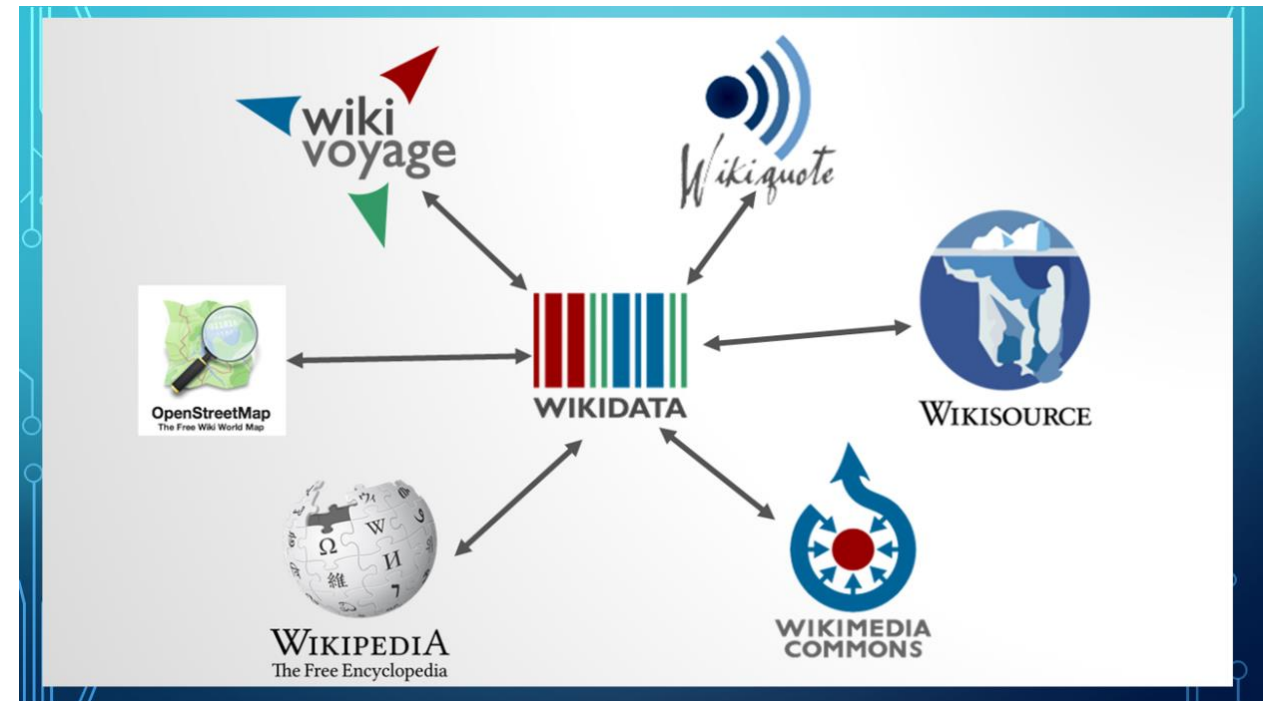
