West Virginia Miners Hold Key to Situation—Militia of That State in Readiness.

Cleveland, O., July 12.—Local operators took a more hopeful view of the strike this morping. Dan Hanna, manager of M. A. Hanna & Co., said as long is West Virginia coal was mined there could be no particular stringency. Not a pound of coal entered the city yesterday. A prominent coal operator said this morning that unless miners are representeds at the meeting of the board of arbitration at Pittsburg to-morrow the whole thing will be a farce.

Tittsburg, July 12.—A strong effort will be made this week to settle the miners' strike by arbitration. A suggestion for a joint conference board of arbitration of Ohio labor commissioners of Indiana and Illinois and the statistical breezer of Pennsylvania, to be held in Pittsburg, to see if miners, and operators could not be induced to submit their differences to arbitration, met with a prompt response from members of the four committees and a conference will be held here to-morrow morning. Reports are aiready here from Ohio, Indiana and Pennsylvania.

Chiengo, July 12.—Colonel W. P. Rend, the millionaire Chiengo operator, has returned from Pittsburg, where during the past week he has been in conference with the officials of mihers' organizations relative to a settlement of the strike. Mr. Rend discussed the strike situation at length and continuing said:

"The strike has grown in size from day to day until now it has assumed vast proportions. I expect that within the next ten days it will have reached the full maturity and its greatest strength. Unless speedily settled, it threatens to be one of the most formidable conflicts between capital and labor in the entire industrial history of the country.

"The success or failure of the strike depends very largely upon the success

"The success or failure of the strike depends very largely upon the success during the coming week of the plans of the miners' officials. They will strain every effort to close down the mines of the New York & Cleveland Gas company, in the Pittsburg region, and at the same time organize and bring out the coal diggers in West Virginia.

"Besides the authracite coal mines in West Virginia, there are also large amounts of bituminous coal being produced in Pennsylvania outside of Pittsburg. While coal will be scarce in very many places, there will be no general famine, at least not for a while longer.

"It seems to me the best way of all is to have a conference of all the representatives of both the operators and miners at Pittsburg and then, by joint concessions on both sides, agree upon terms of peace."

New York, July 12.—The Journal and Advertiser says:

Rossland, July 12.—Collector Johnson, of the port of Nelson, has completed his report for the fiscal year ending June 30. It shows that the exports of ore from West Kootenny, including ore shipped via Revelstoke, which is credited to New Westminster, amounted to \$4,541,-450. By quarters, the exports were as follows: \$730,535; \$885,800; \$1,916,040, and \$1,300,154. More than half of this product was from the mines of Rossland, the balance being made up of the production of Nelson, Ainsworth and Slocan mines. For the quarter ending June 30, 1896, the ore export amounted to only \$467,667, the increase this year being over 200 per cent. The exports for the month of June were \$480,180.
