Attorney-General Will Issue Fiat For Prosecutions

Hon. A. M. Manson Announces Police Commissioners Must Decide Character of Enforcement; Action Will Commence April 16.

The Lord's Day Act is to be enforced in Victoria.

Hon. A. M. Manson, Attorney-General, announced this afternoon that fiats for prosecution would be issued in accordance with the requests of the Board of Police Commissioners. Not Retroactive.

Mr. Manson, however, ordered that prosecutions for non-observance of Sunday laws should not start until next Sunday. Persons and firms whose names were taken last Sunday for keeping open shop and for the prosecution of which the Police Com missioners have made application, need fear no prosecution. "I have considered very thoroughly this matter of taking proceedings against certain individuals under the provisions of the Lord's Day Act, and I have had the benefit of the views of the Police Commission, the Ministerial Association, and the Retail Merchants' Association, Mr. Manson said to the Mayor.

"I have been advised, as you know, by yourself and your fellow commissioners that the enforcement of the Lord's Day Act in this city was not an issue at the time of your election as police commissioners. Commissioner North is not in accord with the majority of the Board in the matter.

BRITISH PREMIER ON DISARMAMENT BILL TO REDUCE

Correspondence With League of Nations Union Published

London. April 12.—Correspondence between the League of Nations Union and Mr. Lloyd George, British Premier, regarding a reduction of armament by European nations, was made public last night.

The executive committee of the Union represented to Mr. Lloyd George that at a recent conference in Birmingham the Union had decided to urge that any guarantee given France and Belgium should be a part of a general defensive alliance based on a reduction of armament.

Mr. Lloyd George replying, said it was proposed to discuss at Genoa merely that the states represented there should give a mutual undertaking to refrain from aggression. He said the guarantee to France rested upon special grounds, being one of the main conditions upon which France accepted certain important provisions of the Treaty of Versailles, including the formation of the League of Nations.

Replying to Mr. Lloyd George's letter. Lord Robert Cecil said the London, April 12—An endeayor to substitute an "aristocracy of brains for an aristocracy of birth," is embodied in a bill for the re-constitution of the House of Lords, which Colonel Claude Lowther to-day obtained permission of the House of Commons to present. He gave this description in making application for the privilege of presenting the measure which provides for a reduction in the number of members of the Upper House from 730 to 300, apart from princes of the blood. It also contains a provision for the creation of peers for life, with uninheritable titles and privileges.

Press)—With world shipbuilding rapidly reverting to the pre-war scale, Great Britain has resumed her great lead over the other countries of the world in the construction of ships of all classes. At the same time the United States, despite the great agifation for increased maritime power, has fallen behind.

This is disclosed by a statement issued here to-day by Lloyds. It shows that the shippyards of the United Kingdom have orders in hand totalling i over 500,000 gross tons more than before the war. The United States yards have orders in hand for only 136,000 gross tons, a decrease of about 10 per cent. from the figures for July, 1914. All other countries than the United States and Great Britain, with the exception of Germany, for which no authentic figures are available, now have under order more than double the pre-war construction aggregate for these nations. The figures showing the amount of shipbullding orders now in hand gave a clear indication of the lead held by Great Britain.

They are: United States, 136,266 tons: United Kingdom, 2,235,993 tons; all other countries, 1,307,353 tons.

The British dominions, according to Lloyds' figures, now have 63,650 tons under construction against 66,469 tons on January 1, 1922. Frenchwoman Pleads for Understanding of France

Mrs. Zimmern and Miss Christabel Pankhurst Make Forceful Addresses Before Women's Canadian Club

"If there is a country in Europe which has a right to ask for peace, that country is France. . . . Let us stop criticizing each other; let us understand each other and refrain from hasty judgments. Let us not patronize other countries. It is only with infinite patience that we shall rebuild a world which has been torn to its foundations. Let us remember that the unity of the war-

must become the unity of peace."

In an impassioned address before the Women's Canadian Club yesterday afternoon Madame Zimmern, wife of Professor Zimmern

and daughter of Pasteur Hirsch, of ford presided in the absence of the president, Mrs. Hyndman.

The lighter side of the entertainment was furnished by Mrs. R. G. Morrison, who sang a group of songs very charmingly. During the serving of tea in the ballroom, the Empress Hotel orchestra contributed selections Poissy, France, made a moving apa sympathetic understanding to France's efforts to rehabilitate her people after the tremendous upheaval of the war.

After expressing her gratitude as a Frenchwoman to Canada for its part in the war, she spoke feelingly of "the France which is the real France and not the France which is so sadly caricatured in the press." One of the great truths arising out of the war was the common bond of sacrifice between the women of France and the women of the British Empire—a bond impervious to the attacks of politicians. The war had proved that Frenchwomen were not the frivolous, immoral creatures of fiction. They were perhaps a little too intelligent; they could not help looking ahead, and their attitude in the matter of German reparations and the questions to be discussed at Genoa must be judged in the light of the harrowing experiences France had passed through in the two great invasions in her history, said the speaker.

Scondary Education.

Touching upon the French woman, whom Mrs. Zimmern described as "very complex," she reminded her audience that while her country-women had not shown the same eagerness to acquire the franchise as had the British women, the women of France had wielded a powerfal influence all through its history. She pointed with pride to the exemplary secondary education, system of France, which specialized in the education of women. "Under this system all sorts of windows are opened on the paths of knowledge, so that a woman can choose her own particular vocation and concentrate her studies to that end," explained the speaker.

It was not necessary to operate on a closed shop basis to pay the union scale, he pointed out.






