




POLE, or RUNNING BEANS

Culture.—Pole beans are even more sensitive to cold and wet, as well as to drought and hot winds, than the dwarf varieties, but are of superior quality and productiveness. After settled warm weather, set 4- to 8-foot poles in rows 4 feet apart and extending no the and south, the poles being 3 feet apart in the row. Let the poles slant slightly toward the north. Set in this way, the vines cling better and the pods are straighter and more easily seen. The poles should be set solidly so they will not lean in the way of cultivation. Around each hill plant five to eight Beans 2 inches deep. When well started, thin to four plants and see that they all climb around the pole in the same way, for they will

nt hve to eight Beans 2 inches deep. When well started, thin to four plants and see that they all climb around the pole in the same way, for they will not grow if tied up in the opposite direction. Another plan is to plant in rows thickly enough so that there will be one plant to 8 or 10 inches. Set posts five feet high firmly at each end of the rows and drive stakes made of 2 x 2 lumber at intervals of 16 feet along the rows. Stretch a wire, size number 10 or 12 between posts along each row, and fasten it to the tops of the stakes in the row with wire staples. Run a light wire or twine along the row about 6 inches from the ground and fasten to the posts and stakes with wire staples. Tie twine to the wire above and the wire or twine below, wherever there is a plant. The vines will run up these until they reach the top wire, when they will care for themselves. Another way is to omit the bottom wire and stick small stakes 2 to 6 inches in the soil and fasten to the top wire. One quart to 150 hills, 10 to 16 quarts to an acre.



CULTURE.—The best soil for Beets is one that is rather light and thoroughly enriched with manure. For an early supply sow in spring as soon as the ground becomes fit, in rows about I foot apart and 2 inches deep. For main crop sow the first week in May, and for winter use sow in June. These dates are for the latitude of Harrisburg. For the South, sow earlier; North, later. When the plants have three or four leaves, thin till they stand 5 or 6 inches apart. In October take Beets up and store in the cellar or in pits outside. One ounce will sow 50 feet of drill; five pounds to the acre in drills.



CULTURE.—Sow the seed (which is slow to germinate) in shallow boxes, or in a finely prepared seed-bed out-of-doors, in straight rows, so that the small plants may be kept free from weeds. See to it that the seed is not covered too deep, and that the bed is kept moist, almost wet, until the seeds germinate. When about 2 inches high, thin out and transplant so they stand 3 inches apart, and when the plants are 4 inches high, cut off the tops, which will cause them to grow stocky.

The crop is usually made to succeed some earlier one, but, in order to grow good Celery, the soil must be made as rich as possible, the essentials to success being very rich soil and plenty of water. If good plants are used, they may be set out as late as the middle of August, but the best results are usually obtained from setting about the middle of June or the first of July. The most desirable time, is that which will bring plants to maturity, during cool, moist weather. In setting, prepare broad, shallow trenches about 6 inches deep and 4 to 6 feet apart, in which the plants should be set 6 inches apart, cutting off the outer leaves and pressing the soil firmly about the roots. One ounce will sow nine square yards and produce 4,000 plants.



CULTURE.—In sections where the temperature never falls to 20 degrees below freezing point, seed may be sown in the open in October and transplanted to rows very early in spring; but in northern states we sow in hotbeds in February, or, still better, from September 10 to 20, and winter the plants over in a coldframe. Transplant March 15 to April 15, about 20 inches apart each way, in rows 2 feet wide; this earliest crop matures in June. For second-early crop, to mature in July and August, sow seeds of early kinds early in April and plant out in May. For a late crop, to mature from September to December, sow late varieties early in May and plant out

in July; the plants 2 and the rows 3 feet apart. Cabbages should be hoed every week, and the ground stirred as they advance in growth, drawing up a little earth each time until they begin to head, when they should be thoroughly cultivated and left to mature. Loosening the roots will sometimes retard the bursting of full-grown heads. Of late years many crops of early Cabbages have been destroyed by maggots at the roots. The best remedy seems to be to remove the earth from around the stem and apply kerosene emulsion. One ounce of seed will sow a bed of 40 feet and produce 2,000 plants.




Danish Ballhead being set out for seed




CUCUMBERS

CULTURE.—An ounce of seed will plant about 50 hills-one or 2 pounds to an acre. To grow early cucumbers, and avoid most of the striped bugs, plant the seeds about the first of May. Put them in turned-over sods or small pots which can be bedded in the soil in the frames, and use little bottom heat. Transplant to open ground in three or four weeks, without disturbing the plants, by cutting the sod or soil into chunks. The plants should be 3 or 4 feet apart each way. Try and transplant in the evening and water once and the plants will not droop. Four strong plants is enough for each hill. Pull off all cucumbers large enough to use. If they are left on and ripen, the vine will cease to bear. Use White Hellebore in water to destroy the bugs. The seeds can be planted in the hills in late May, and later.

CULTURE.—A crop of onions can be grown in any good soil, manuring for two years previously, if possible. With no crop is manure more essential, and it should be well rotted—to kill weed seeds for one reason. If rank fresh manure is used, it will result in many soft bulbs being produced; commercial fertilizer or a top dressing of wood ashes is also good. Clean up ground in time to complete the work before it freezes up, and spread the manure evenly, at the rate of 25 to 50 loads to the acre. This should be well mixed with the soil, and then the ground plowed a moderate depth.

Sowing the seed should be done as the ground can be got ready, and can be done best with a hand seed drill, carefully adjusted to sow the desired quantity of seed one-half inch deep. Thin seeding gives much larger onions than thick. Four or five pounds per acre is the usual quantity of seed needed to grow large onions. Just skim the ground as soon as they can be seen. Hoe again in a few days. At this weeding or the next, according to the size of plants, thin, leaving eight to twelve plants to the foot.

As soon as the tops die and fall the tops should be gathered into windrows. If the weather is fine they will need no attention while curing. Cut off the tops, when perfectly dry, about half an inch from the bulb.

If perfectly dry when gathered, and they are spread not to exceed two feet in depth, they can be kept in fine condition until

If perfectly dry when gathered, and they are spread not to exceed two feet in depth, they can be kept in fine condition until spring. Any arrangement will do that will keep them dry and at a uniform temperature of about 32 degrees F., care being taken not to disturb them. They should be thawed gradually. Repeated freezing and thawing will spoil them. An ounce of seed will sow a hundred feet of row; 5 pounds will sow an acre.









TABLE TURNIPS

Weisse Rübe Navone Rzoper Crukiew

In fall and winter, stock need Turnips and Rutabagas to keep them in good condition. We cannot too earnestly recommend farmers to increase their sowings largely. There are a great many varieties, but our list comprises the best for the garden or farm.

CULTURE.—Sow half an inch deep in rows about two feet apart or sow broadcast. Be sure to have the ground rich and freshly stirred. Be careful to weed and thin out, so the young plants will not be checked and injured. Any overcrowding will result in rough and poorly flavored roots. Get the spring and summer crops started very early. Hot weather causes them to become tough and bitter. In the middle and western states sow for fall and main crop from middle of July to last of August. Best results are obtained by drill culture. To preserve Turnips in good order for winter, store in a cool cellar and cover with sand or turf or put them in a pit where there will be no danger of water standing and cover with straw overlaid with earth sufficiently deep to keep out frost. One ounce for 100 feet of drill; 2 pounds to the acre.





MANURIAL CROPS

Modern agricultural practice proves that it is far more economical and desirable to grow the nitrogen fertilizer for soil than to attempt to produce this in the form of manure, especially on large farms or where much live stock is not kept. The farmer who is getting poor yields because of impoverished soil is doing a great injustice to himself. The chief thing it needs is organic matter, and if he cannot afford to give enough of this in the form of manure, he can afford to grow and turn down certain good cover crops for fertilizing.

Chief among them are the legumes and members of the pea and bean family, for the reason that the little nodules or lumps of their roots are composed to a great extent of free nitrogen of a kind that is most available for plant growth, and which, when bought commercially, will cost the farmer at least fifteen cents per pound. The clovers of various kinds, such as the Mammoth Clover, Red Clover, Alfalfa, Alsike and the sweet clovers are beneficial as soil renewers, and in addition to these there are other members of the great family of Leguminosæ which have their proper place and should not be ignored. Cow-Peas, Soy Beans, and in fact peas and beans of all kinds, Sand and Spring Vetch. Sainfoin, Kidney Vetch, Vellow Lupine and other Legumes have the power of catching nitrogen from the atmosphere and transforming it into available form for the plant growth.

Where soil is even too thin or poor in quality to grow Red Clover, Sand Vetch or Alsike can be started, and after growing these crops the Red Clover can then be grown with success. As an orchard cover crop nothing is better than Crimson Clover, which is becoming the most satisfactory cover crop for orchards in this country. The poor man who would enrich his soil should do so, not by expensive commercial fertilizers, but by growing Legumes and turning them down. If this is done, he can then add lime, phosphoric acid in the form of acid phosphate, and potash in the form of Kainit or wood-ashes, and will find the soil then to contain fairly well-balanced rations for plant-food, and be rich and productive in a few seasons.



Choice Lawn Grass Seed Mixtures

A Few Words Here.—The seedsman is always censured if weeds come up in the lawn. We invariably purchase the finest grasses we can obtain, either here or abroad. Weed seeds are carried by the thousands by birds and by the manure you put on the soil. Even if you plant nothing, weeds will come. We know of soil which was excavated at a depth of seventy feet and inside one month was covered with a magnificent growth of numerous weeds.

MAKING AND CARING FOR THE LAWN

Preparing and Manuring the Ground. In making a new lawn, all grading, tree planting and laying out of walks and drives should be done first. The ground should be thoroughly dug or plowed to a depth of 10 or 12 inches, after which some good fertilizer—pure ground bone is especially recommended—should be applied at the rate of 600 to 800 pounds per acre. The ground should be fine and perfectly smooth and even.

Sowing the Seed, Rolling and Weeding. The best time for sowing grass seeds is in Spring, from February to May, or if in Fall, from September to November, using on small plots at the rate of one quart of seed to each 15 square feet, and for

large lawns, golf links, tennis, cricket and croquet grounds, use at the rate of eighty pounds of seed per acre, and for putting greens, 100 pounds of seed per acre. After the seed has been sown broadcast the ground should be thoroughly rolled; or, on small places, beaten with the back of a spade to "firm" the surface and press the seed into the soil. Annual weeds, natural to the soil, will appear before the young grass becomes established; none of these should be allowed to ripen their seeds.

Renovating Old Lawns. This should be done either in the spring or early fall, by raking the soil where bare spots occur.

and sowing seed, taking care that it is not covered too deep, and also to roll or pat the surface smooth with a shovel.

Cutting, Feeding and Watering. When the grass has attained a height of 4 inches it should be mown, care being exercised not to cut it too close. Frequent rolling and mowing will make the turn close and compact, strengthen the grass and render the lawn smooth and attractive. Lawns require frequent feeding and watering to keep up their vigor. Top-dressing in Fall. A coating of wood ashes and ground bone in the late fall is very beneficial and gives the lawn a good start in the spring. It is also advisable to roll the lawn after the last cutting in the fall; it prevents much of the young

General Cultural Directions:—The well-known Annual Flowers, such as Sweet Alyssum, Calliopsis, Calendula, Marigold, Mignonette, Nasturtiums, etc., sow directly out-of-doors when danger from frost is past in the position where they are intended to flower. The ground should be dug and raked fine on the surface, sowing the seeds evenly and thinly either in lines or beds, covering not over four times their size, and firming the soil over them. For those which should be started indoors, such as Heliotrope, Celosia, Lobelia, Salvia, Vinca, Verbena, etc., the best plan is to sow in boxes, which should be filled to the depth of an inch with broken pots, coal ashes or any rough material that will furnish drainage. The upper inch should be nicely sifted soil, composed, if possible, of about one-third each sand, leaf-mold and light garden loam. Press firmly and evenly, and evenly, and evenly, and

and evenly, and water thoroughly the day before sowing. Sow the seeds thinly over the surface, covering about one-eighth of an inch and pressing thinly over the surface, covering about one-eighth of an inch and pressing firmly, cover with a pane of glass to prevent too rapid evaporation of the moisture, and keep in a temperature between 60 and 70 degrees. Water carefully as needed. The importance of this detail can only be learned by experience and observation. To omit a single watering, or a too frequent watering, usually leads to failure. When large enough to handle, transplant into prepared boxes, an inch apart each way, or put into small pots until time to plant out. At all times they should have an abundance of air; otherwise the young seedlings are liable to damp-off.


