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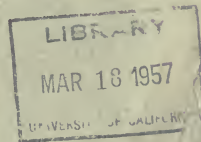

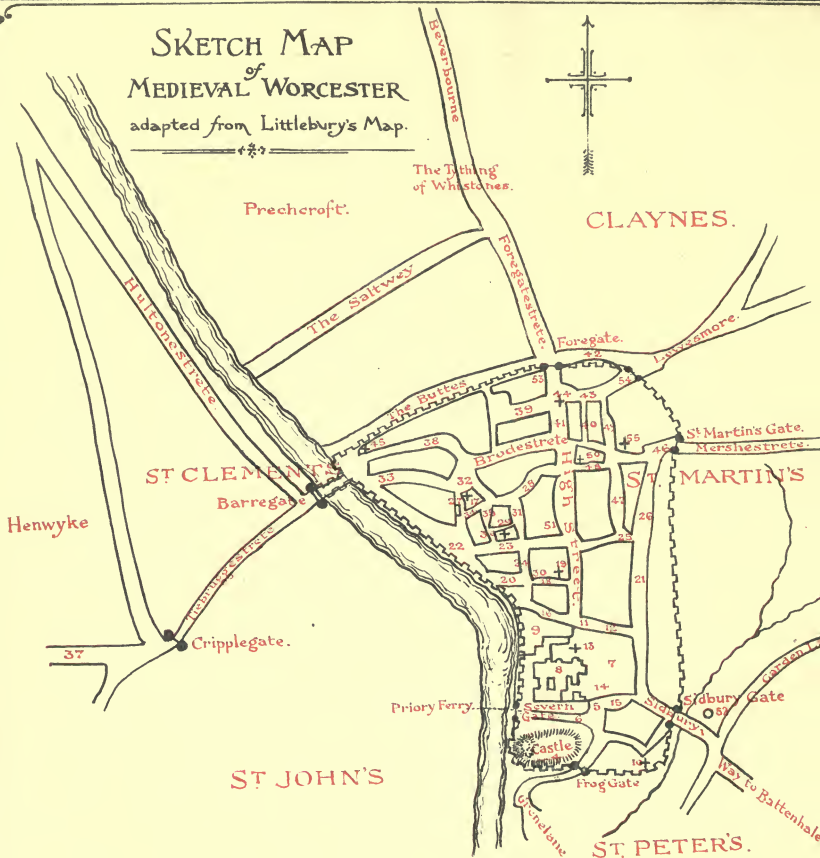

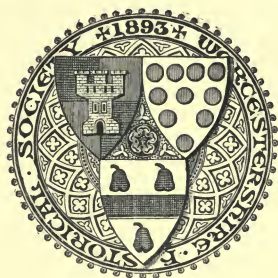

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INTRODUCTION.

ORIGINAL documents must inevitably be of higher interest than a copy, even if that copy chance to be contemporary; yet considerable attention has been paid to monastic cartularies, and comparatively little to the original deeds from which they were compiled. The present volume deals with part of the collection of such deeds now in the possession of the Dean and Chapter of Worcester, and forms the most important part of Class B, section 2, of their archives, the section including charters, leases and other parchment documents relating to Worcester and its suburbs. These have been in part utilized by various writers in the past, and some few have been printed *in extenso*, but the greater number have not previously been calendared or in any manner systematically dealt with: Dr. Peter Prattinot constructed a very brief list in 1824, dealing with 240 documents, but this had become entirely disarranged and useless when Bishop Edmund Hobhouse examined the series in 1881; in 1908 an entire rearrangement was carried out, at the request of the Dean and Chapter, by the editor of the present volume, covering the whole of the archives then remaining. This was done in too short a space of time to admit of any carefully planned arrangement, but the documents were sorted into five classes, and numbered and arranged in charter-boxes in chronological and topographical order. In consequence of this haste some documents were misplaced, and a few others put together in an ambiguous section under the general title Worcester. A careful study deed by deed has led to the identification under streets, &c., of many of these latter, and they will be found in their proper places in the following pages, although their numeration has not been altered.

Very many of these deeds are torn and fragmentary, and nearly all much discoloured by years of neglect, so that restoratives have been necessary in many cases.

- F. Deeds not originally part of the series. Most of these wherever possible have been handed back to their proper owners, viz., the Bishop of Worcester, the Bishop of Ely, and the Chapters of Norwich and Winchester.

The most interesting deeds are undoubtedly those relating to the jurisdiction or rather administration of the Diocese *sede vacante*, dating back as they do to the time of the original agreement made between Archbishop Boniface and the Prior and Convent in 1268, but this apparently was only a settlement between the three parties interested of an ancient and customary right which had not hitherto been adequately defined, but it is thirty years earlier than the commencement of the great Register book, which Mr. Willis Bund has already edited for the Society. The series includes the confirmation of the agreement by the Prior and Convent of Christ Church, Canterbury, and gives the full text of the original document which was supposed to be lost; it does not, however, add any further particulars to those already known. The declaration made by the Proctors of the Prior, in the Consistory Court held by Cardinal Ottobon in Wincombe Church, on the Feast of St. Peter-in-Cathedra, 1265, is of interest not only in showing how the decree was promulgated, viz., to representatives of the divers Rural Deaneries of Gloucestershire, but for the curious fact that only one of the three proctors commissioned to appear cared to act: no explanation is however given, but the plural form in which the original was cast led to the correction of the Document to the singular.

The formal acknowledgment of the Prior's rights is also found in an inspeximus of a letter from Bishop Nicholas, under the hand of Ralph de St. Denis, Notary of the Holy Roman See, the said letter bearing date Epiphany, 1266. There are also entries on a roll of the dispute with the Abbey of St. Peter, Gloucester, disputing on the one hand the Prior's right to visit, and on the other the steps he took to enforce it, giving the arguments of both Prior and Abbot, and their several answers.

The more important of these documents have been printed in full in the Appendix, and throw an important additional light upon the *sede vacante* Register; one cannot quite see why they were not entered therein, but that volume does not appear to be retrospective.

Another interesting deed is that in which William, Archdeacon of Arréou, acting as Administrator of the See of Canterbury, orders the Prior of Worcester to act, *sede vacante*, on death of Bishop William de Geynesburh; this is dated at London the 7th Ides of October, 1307.

Very curious is a short letter written in French by the Prior to one Richard de Wyke, styling himself Chaplain of our Lord the King, politely refusing his request to give lodgement to *un Polain*; at first sight it seems a very serious document for so small a request, and the Prior speaks seriously of his inability to oblige, and points out that the Bishop has already complained of the excess of sojourners, and he proceeds to add that were he to grant the Chaplain's request some mischief-maker would certainly acquaint the Bishop, and he himself would be severely blamed. It at least shows the esteem in which a horse was then held, and the care over the smallest details of Monastic economy, if there is not a more subtle meaning in the expression.

A second document in French, given in the Appendix, is the text of a letter from Edward the Third directed to the Abbot of Evesham, the Prior of Worcester, and a Knight of the Shire, Sir John atte Wood, urging the speedy collection of a loan of 600 marks, and calling on them to appoint a committee of 12 persons, composed of Regular and Secular clergy and laymen, to collect 50 marks each. This is dated 17th June, 1370. It is interesting to note from the Cellarer's rolls that the sum was repaid, not indeed by the King, but by his executors after his death.

Another deed gives the close of a dispute between the Religious and the secular clergy of the city, anent the ringing of the bells for prime and curfew; the monks maintaining that the bells of the town churches disturbed their devotions, and infringed their ancient privileges. The matter was carried to Rome, and the Pope appointed as his commissioner the Abbot of Pershore, who found that the Cathedral authorities had justly complained. He accordingly summoned the clergy of the town with their Holy Water bearers, part of whose duties it may have been to ring the bells, and declared that they were not to sound the prime and curfew until the Cathedral bell had given the signal. It may be noted that some of the clergy could not be found, an absence that was possibly not entirely accidental.

The bulk of the documents consist of grants of lands and rents to the Priory, prior to the statute of mortmain, and leases by the monks and their successors of the same lands. In this connection it will be remembered that every acre and half acre in the common fields; and every burgage, tenement, toft, and croft in a town, was held of some lord, either directly of the King, or far more frequently of another subject; and it sometimes happened that a series of lords had interest in the property, each owing some service to the lord above him, and receiving some service from the tenant below him. Such a tenant in fee held rights in which he had a life interest, and which were heritable. Of species of tenure there

were several, but that which concerned the Priory most was tenure in frankalmoin, that is *in libera elemosina*, or free alms.

Such grants were made in return for an indefinite spiritual service, such as the prayers in general of the Religious; the word *elemosina* expressing the motive of the gift rather than the description of tenure. Grants of this description could be withdrawn at the grantor's wish, and hence to render possession constant the term perpetual was prefixed, and property thus acquired was free from secular jurisdiction. To secure freedom from secular service the word pure was added, so that a grant in free pure and perpetual alms brought an ownership as full as could be desired. These grants were moreover taken out of the realm of human justice by their very terms, since primarily they were definite grants to God, the fact that they were also given to the Religious being secondary.

Such an alienation of land seems at first sight absolute, but it was not safe until a confirmation had been obtained from every person who held any right in it. The immediate overlord sometimes joined with the grantor in his concession, but usually a fresh deed was the rule, and although at first no money passed for such a confirmation, in a few years it became usual.

The final confirmation rested with the King, nor was it considered sufficient to trust to what had been done in the past, but rather to obtain a fresh confirmation from each monarch in succession. In practice the Religious usually waited until they had many small rents to be confirmed to them. There are several such deeds in the present series.

Tenure in frankalmoin was but one of the tenures by which a monastery held its possessions; more important still was that of Knight's service, whereby the property of the house became a Barony, and had to render military service in consequence. Tenure by divine service occurs also; in such a case the grantor extracted from the grantee some definite return for his benefactions. An early and interesting example occurs in the Covenant made by Prior Senatus, c. 1196, for a mass for the soul of his predecessor, Prior Ralph de Bedford.

Besides the Grant by charter we meet with many Quitclaims, that is the record of a surrender of rights by means of a sealed deed, the pioneer of the somewhat similar release. There are many specimens in the series. Leases whether for lives—in which case the tenant became a freeholder—or for a term of years, are common, and the rent payable either in money or in kind helps to the understanding of land values. Two deeds require special notice: the first is a solemn bond by a certain Christian Wynemer, binding herself under severe penalties to carry out the provisions of her gift to Christian Westesik, the said penalties being a payment of 10 marks to the

grantee, of 40 shillings to the fabric of the Cathedral church, and to have her goods distrained and herself excommunicated. This is a good specimen of an early bond, and contains all the usual provisions (Maitl. and Poll., ii. 225). The other is a grant of chattels to Alice, widow of Walter de Leye, a master mason, and incidently gives a list of shop fittings. The chamber or camera itself, woollen cloth, linen, chests, dishes, brass vessels, coffers, and small appliances, but the vendor specifies for the return of the great brewing-vat at her death. The date of this deed is 1342.

The various properties dealt with in the documents came for the greater part, sooner or later, into the possession of the priory officials. The earlier in pure and perpetual alms, the later with qualifications, such as a proviso for masses for the soul or some description of service. In the later deeds the gift is usually specifically assigned to one of the Priory Obedientiaries, or to some definite purpose, so that most of the officials were recipients of beneficial grants to support the work of their several offices, and the income is duly noted in their half-yearly accounts. Grants to the light of St. Wulstan would in natural course be audited in the rolls of the Tumbarius, those to the light of the Blessed Mary in those of the Magister Capellae, and so forth. There are a number of donations in support of the Gardinarius, but no rolls of such an official remain, but one would suppose him to be an Obedientary also. In the earlier days leases were not issued by officials without a note of the Prior's assent, but this was not later on the rule, indeed one document is attested by the Sacrist's seal, and not the Common Seal of the Priory. The purchase of seals by one or another of the Obedientiaries appears upon their Computus rolls, but impressions are rare. At Worcester more than elsewhere the seals have suffered, which partly perhaps accounts for this rarity.

It is said that Edward the Confessor granted to Worcester some form of self-government in 1042. It is certain that he granted St. Wulstan and his monks sake¹ and soken², team and toll, and as the Bishop was at that time Abbot, in a certain sense the town, which was a Bishop's town in 1086, may be said to have received a charter from him. But the fact that it was a Bishop's town might mean little more in practice than that the Bishop had tenants with property about his Cathedral. Henry I. is further said to have given the City civic liberty under a constable, perhaps when he visited the city in 1128; and from other sources we learn that there had already been friction between Urso D'Abitot and the monks, of which more presently. All this is somewhat vague, but the present series of deeds show that at least as early as Henry II. the citizens had courts of their own, presided over by provosts, chosen presumably by the King.

It is unfortunate that these early documents bear no date, since the many names of the then provosts, and those of the early bailiffs, cannot now be arranged in order—indeed the reigns in which they flourished can but be hinted at; until the middle of the reign of the 1st Edward we are hardly ever upon sure ground.

Nevertheless there is no reason to doubt that both Richard I. and John augmented the liberties of the city. The charter of the first named speaks of burgesses, and grants to them the fee of the city at a fee farm rent. It does not however hint at the constitution, which in some form or other must even then have become customary; but it was probably, as the deeds indicate, a town moot under provosts and senior burgesses. A town moot of this kind included all the adult citizens of the city, and they had the right to be present at, and vote in, the "moot," but in practice the attendance would become more and more confined to that of the leading citizens, who would be largely guided by the Officers of the Constable, those of the Bishop, and very possibly of the Prior—until in fact a necessity arose for a limitation of interference, and a more definite constitution, such as appears in the charter of Henry III. The charter granted by the last named King allowed a municipal government under two Bailiffs, freely elected by the burgesses, equal in their authority, and undistinguished by the adjectives High and Low¹ as in other towns; with these the King's officers, the Sheriff, and Constable, were not to intermeddle, since the Bailiffs, unlike the earlier Provosts, were not in the same way under their control. Henry's charter was confirmed by him on the 23rd of February, 1256.

The franchise granted to the burgesses was actually of small value. *Sake and Soen* was a kind of jurisdiction that every lord enjoyed, even when it was not stated in so many terms in his charter. It was no great gift, no special privilege, but simply that manorial jurisdiction which every person had who possessed tenants enough to form a court. Such a court was held under the earlier Provosts. It was merely the old customary Town Moot or gathering of the freemen. The only real addition is the right to hang thieves taken within the Manor (see Maitl. and Poll., i. 579). Of far more practical importance is the grant of freedom from toll, passage, pontage, stallage, licence, dangegeld, and gaywite throughout the realm, London alone excepted.

The citizens were to have a Gild-merchant, no trader having the power to carry on his trade within the walls unless he became a member of the fraternity; while membership for a year excused him from obedience to any former lord. He became free, a matter of no slight moment in a feudal regime.

To the Gild-merchant gradually became assigned much that would appear to have been more properly carried out by the direct supervision of the City Bailiffs and their Aldermen. Such assignation of responsibility perhaps arose from the fact that the more prominent men of the borough were permanent in the management of both, and that the gilds rendered easier and more economical the constitution of the city, and greatly aided the development of its trade. In the case of Worcester the gild became so important, that the defence and repair of its walls and gates, protection from fire, the policing of the city, and the sanitation of its streets and river, were overlooked by it, and the very city bailiffs were responsible to the gild's officials. In spite of this it is scarcely referred to in any of the documents, none of its masters or proctors appear as witnesses, nor are the Acts of its Mornspeeches mentioned.

The court at which the deeds were for the more part executed was the Town Moot. The names of the Provosts and afterwards the Bailiffs are conspicuous, and their fellow-witnesses may well have been Aldermen, Chamberlains, and Assessors. These date back many years prior to the year of Henry's Charter, and indeed in the earliest the later *Ballivi* are invariably styled *Prepositi*, so that the city was at first under provosts, until bailiffs took their place; this may have been in the reign of John. Whatever the constitution of the city, these deeds show that trade flourished in a very marked degree.

The ancient street names of the city of Worcester present a problem at once fascinating and full of pitfalls for the unwary. At first sight it seems an easy matter to fix the older appellations to their modern usurpers, and easy it would be if bounds were always given in a way to answer our queries; but it is rarely so. Thus in considering the maze of streets a start must be made at some well ascertained point, about which there can be no possibility of error. None seems more suitable than the ancient main entrance to the Cathedral, known as the Cemetery Stairs. These occupied the southern end of the High Street, from what is now Mr. Haughton's shop to the corner of Lich Street. From these stairs the forum of ancient Worcester, its High Place or High Street, ran northward, then as now the seat of the principal trade of the city and of its chief inhabitants. On the eastern side, a narrow lane, the Lich Lane or Lich Street, led to the Lichgate of the great cemetery about the Cathedral Church, important remains of which still exist with exceedingly massive oaken uprights. This Cemetery served as the burial-place of the burgesses and their families for many centuries. Lich Street led on to the suburb known as Southbury, but now corrupted into Sidbury, and thence by the South gate to the uplands of Battenhale. Before the South gate was reached a turn led to the main entrance of the Priory to the

Great or St. Mary's gate. This turn was called La Knole or Studemery's Knoll, and lastly High Timber Street, which name was current within living memory until superseded by the meaningless Edgar Street based wholly upon a misnomer. The *insula* thus formed by Lich Street, Edgar Street and the line following the bailey of the castle, closed by the river wall of the monastery, constituted the Sanctuary, of which the Cathedral was the just and natural centre. St. Mary's Gate has been confused for a very long period with the gate of the Castle, which King John is credited with having constructed, but there is more than one reason why this particular gate could not have been that of the Castle. The main entrance at Worcester to the Norman monastery would appear to be that which still gives access to the Cloister. In most Benedictine houses this entrance was adjacent to the West front of the Priory Church, but in the case of Worcester, the position of the Bishop's Palace and the Severn led to the monastery being constructed upon a comparatively small piece of ground, so that the usual arrangements could not be carried out. There must have been an approach to this entrance along the outer ramparts of Urso D'Abitot's entrenchments, and possibly not very much else. The gateway as now standing is obviously of two or perhaps three dates, the material used in the lower and earlier portion being different from that of the later, but in neither is there any evidence that it was intended for military use: in fact it is defenceless. There is no portcullis¹, no *Meurtrières*, no loopholes for cross bowmen, and at the most it could only have stayed a short-lived attack from citizen rioters. The later part was obviously built after the destruction of Urso's outer enceinte, when the monks obtained their own again; the old portions appear to be earlier.

At the North-east corner of the Cathedral stood the Church of St. Michael in Bedwardine, and a way lay to it called St. Mary's Stairs. Such small churches are often found in the immediate proximity of the Cathedral or Monastic Church of a city, and the reason is set out in the case of the Church of St. Nicholas at Rochester. A deed there shows that in 1327 the monks agreed to build an oratory in a corner of the nave of their church next the north door, with doors and windows to the Oratory to keep the reserved sacrament for the sick during the night hours, and that when it is built all access to the Cathedral Church is to cease except on the night of our Lord's Nativity and the Feasts of All Saints and St. Nicholas. (Roch. D. & C. Archives, No. 604.) This Oratory expanded into a church. If this little church was built at Rochester to save the monks from disturbance in the night, it is quite possible St. Michael's took its origin for similar causes.

On the south of the Edgar Tower the way forked ; a narrow lane ran along the Priory boundary wall, of which Castle Place is now the remains. This was formerly called Castle Lane, and gave access to the earthen ramparts of the late Saxon camp. It is just possible that this may afterwards have been known as Sheriff's Lane, but at present there is no proof that it was so. Once this lane opened into Frog Lane, but was closed at the request of the gaoler, who found it difficult to prevent his prisoners from escaping by it. The removal of the motte or burh of this earth-fort revealed the fact that the site had been occupied by a late Keltic people who used socketted celts with wings, and that they were succeeded by an Iron Age people whose *fibule* and other ornaments had in a like manner been preserved. The site was probably fortified with the dual purpose of guarding the ford and protecting the water-way, and this burh and its fosse was the origin of the future City of Worcester. It must not be thought that the population about the ford needed defence, but rather that the river-way afforded exceptional facility for the invasion of the Midlands, and the burh of Worcester was thrown up for the same reason as that of Welcombe by Stratford-upon-Avon. There is historical evidence that the great burh-maker, Ælfæda, Lady of the Mercians, with her husband Æthelred, reconstructed the earth-fort about the year 918, at the special request of the Bishop.

It was this burh, with its oval earthworks and motte, just within the enceinte, that was again reconstructed by Urso D'Abitot, who, not content with the old bailey, threw up between that and the monastery an extension, seizing sanctuary land for his purpose. It would suffice doubtless if he left sufficient room for a roadway to the Norman door already mentioned. The gateway of the earthworks would seem to have been reconstructed by King John, when both timber and stone were used, the latter probably for foundation only. There is no evidence that the fort was ever more than a series of palisaded mounds of the ordinary type, and the gate-house would suffice if it corresponded with the rest of the structure.

The larger fork lying a little south of the smaller is now called Severn Street, but the older inhabitants use the old title of Frog Lane ; this led to the river through a postern called the Frog Gate, outside which a green way led southwards to Diglis meadows. A "Grene Strete" is named in the charity deeds of St. Swithin's, but it is not likely to be this little way. The exact position of the Church of St. Peter-the-Less is somewhat doubtful. It is almost certain it was within the enceinte of the Castle earthworks, and may have been the original Castle Chapel, which would be a necessity. Such a Chapel was usually close to the Motte, as at Castle Rising in Norfolk and elsewhere ; but wherever it was a lane ran

from it to the Church of St. Peter-the-Great, and King Street is probably a portion of it.

Hitherto the streets present no very great difficulty, but the network between the High Street on the east and the Quay on the west is far more complex. The Bishop's palace, now the Deanery, had its main entrance in Palace Yard, then called Bishop Street, and an approach to St. Alban's Church was gained by way of Palace Row, meeting a turn from the High Street, which commenced at the corner by St. Helen's Church, and was called St. Alban's Lane, in modern parlance, Fish Street, which was continued to the river side by what is now Warmistrey Slip, so named from the mansion of the Warmistrey family, but which usurped the ancient name of St. Mary's Street. Whether this name points to an otherwise unknown chapel of the Blessed Mary or not can perhaps hardly be answered, but in 1196 or thereabouts an Adam of St. Mary's occurs among other incumbents of Worcester parishes as a witness to the endowment of a Mass for the soul of Prior Ralph de Bedeford, who died in that year. The continuation of Bishop's Street appears on the modern map as Little Fish Street; but was in earlier days called Huckster Street, though from one deed it would appear that Huckster Street communicated with the Fore-gate Street. The Gyld Hall, or at any rate a gild hall, was in this street. It terminates at the point Copenhagen Street crosses it. This street, the Cokestrete of early Worcester, leads from the High Street past St. Andrew's Church to the river, and still retains one of the very best specimens of a gabled house in Worcester, the barge-board being worthy of careful study, possessing as it does figure subjects and heraldic decorations. It has been assumed that the street was at one time named Cucking Street, on the assumption that through it the cucking-stool was led to the river, but the evidence of the N.E.D. is entirely against such a derivation. Huckster Street is continued under the name of Brid or Bird port, a street that bends slightly towards the south-west, and which at about half its length is again crossed by a street on the right, which is now a cul-de-sac, but which may perhaps have led out into the High Street and borne a name that so far only occurs in deeds at St. Swithin's, viz., Bocherestrete¹, but this is mere guess-work. Its left branch is known as Hare Lane, a name not as yet met with in the early deeds. There was, however, a public-house at the corner called the Hare and Hounds, which may account for it. In that case the older name may be Shipmonneslane, which was somewhere in this neighbourhood. Hare Lane leads to a lane, Hounds Lane, which crosses it at right angles, and possibly at one time passed on the west of

St. Andrew's Church, where there is still a right of way. Yet another lane, Group, or more correctly Grope, Lane, leads from the Bridport past Hounds Lane into Keyen Street. This lane had, at one time, flights of steps and can hardly be other than the Wodestathstrete of the deeds. It is continued as Powick Lane and Bank Street into the High Street. This Powick Lane certainly took its name from the family named Powyke who had property here temp. Edward III.

From the northern end of High Street The Cross, the greatest and widest of the ancient streets, Broad Street¹, led towards the Severn. All Saints' Church was then obscured from view by a row of houses now demolished, and was approached by a flight of stairs which must be the Hollhollenstare of the deeds. From the Broad Street a diagonal street, the Newport, led to the ancient bridge. This street is called Eport in the deeds, because it led to the eye or ait in the Severn, which was utilized by the builders of the bridge. This bridge led to the suburbs across the river, and was defended at its western extremity by the Barr gate, after which the line of way ran by Tibrugge street to the Cripplegate, while on the right Hilton Street led then as now towards Henwick. Somewhere here was another street mentioned in St. Swithin's deeds called Wullengale or Wynhale Street, but its exact position does not appear². These were within the parish of St. Clement's, the greater portion of which lay on the right bank of the Severn, although the church itself was on the left at the end of the lane called Dolday.

The High Street terminated in the Northgate, Forestgate, or Foregate, while beyond it stretched the tithing of Whistones in the parish of Claines and the Hamlet of Barbone, the brook of the beavers, while between the street and the river stretched the Bishop's meadow, the Prichcroft.

It is necessary to retrace our steps to the Cemetery Stairs before we can deal with the similar network of streets upon the east of the High Street, and which filled up the space between that street and the walls. The Lich Lane leads to Sidbury on the south, but to Friars Street on the north, a name derived from the Franciscan monastery, part of whose buildings still rear their massy gables to the street. This is met by a turn from the High now called Pump Street, but more anciently Neldare Strete, the home of the needle-makers, with exception of the corner opposite St. Helen's Church, where the shoemakers found a home, though they appear to have migrated across the High Street into St. Alban's Lane, which was re-christened Corviser Street. Near St. Swithin's Church a short street called St. Swithin's Street was anciently known as Goose Street,

Goose Throttler Street and little Mealchepping. From it a cross street, The Shambles, formerly the abode of the baking fraternity under the name of Backster Street, leads into Pump Street. The Corn Market was held in the open space about the Church of St. Martin, and was connected with Friar Street by what is now New Street, a name which has supplanted that of Glover's Street, and with Church Street by Melechepping Street, which is happily unaltered. St. Martin's gate was on its eastern side, and led, so we gather from St. Swithin's deeds, to Merche or Marsh Street. At the south-western angle of the space, Queen Street appears, having taken the place of the early Corncheapingstrete. The junction of the High Street and St. Nicholas Street was once the site of the Garden market, but its eastern extension was called Gaol Lane, which led into Lowesmore, a name that remains unchanged.

This brief summary of the ancient streets and lanes of the city will help the reader the better to comprehend the several names under which the deeds are grouped, although there is much to be done in clearing up the topography of old-world Worcester. A mine of information awaits us in the large series of ancient deeds in St. Swithin's parish chest. It is to be hoped ere long these will be made available to antiquaries.

In these streets and lanes the Provosts, Bailiffs and burgesses of the city carried on their several occupations in the picturesque gabled houses of the period, of which not a few happily remain.

Their goods, disposed at first in cellars partly below the level of the street and approached by stairs from it, were later shown on the ground-floor, so arranged that the solar or dwelling-room of the family was built above it, and in time bedrooms and lofts were raised yet higher, the whole falling into a general type, exposing in the larger edifices, such as the hostelries, two gables to the street, and a roof line at right angles to them, while behind was the little toft and croft that made up the usual burgage tenement. No doubt then, as now, there were local rivalries and perhaps jealousies, and then, as now, certain men of mark held a predominant position in civic affairs, and held in all probability equal influence both in the gild and town moot; but Worcester would seem to have been a fairly prosperous city, where skilled artisans were able to live and rear their families in such prosperity and peace as the times afforded, and at a date earlier than any of our documents the churches and chapels of the city were built and endowed, and the Priory and its Monks set an example which rarely lapsed as a living power for good in the busy commercial world about it. Indeed the names of some streets, such as Coke Street, Baxster Street, Corviser Street, Needler Street, etc., and Huckster Street, were so named from the trades that occupied them, but

the deeds speak of many other persons whose trade was from its nature confined in range, and these are to us the more interesting.

A single Medicus (Chirurgion), Gervase the Medicus, was living probably in Sidbury, in the year 1297.

In the year 1302, one Richard Bagley, described as an Apothecarius, with his wife Edith, gave a house in Broad Street to Agnes, daughter of Simon de la Beuwe, butcher.

Thomas Organista, who is a witness in three deeds of Bedwardine, in the reign of Henry III., was a professional musician, an organist in fact, one *qui organa pulsat*. He can hardly have performed elsewhere than in the Cathedral, and at least it is pleasing to think he did so, though his execution would not be so pleasant to modern ears.

Between the trades and the above "Professions," stand out very prominently the men to whom we owe the beautiful fabric of the Cathedral, the great choir of which was built during the 13th century. Are we wrong in ascribing this work to Master Alexander, the mason? That he was a man eminent among his peers is evident; since he takes first place among the witnesses, as in a grant by William de St. John, a cellarer of Worcester, and brother of "the linen weaver," to the Priory of lands in Bedwardine, and is expressly described as *Magistro Alexandro cementario Ecclesie Beate Marie de Wigorn*. He again appears as witness (in the second place) in a charter of the date of King John. Later on in the century another mason, John de Strensham, was living in a tenement in Sidbury; he seems to have left the city in 1321, as in that year he sold all his goods and chattels to the widow of a brother mason, viz. to Alice, relict of Walter de Leye, who also lived in Sidbury, in a house next that of the Hospital of St. Wulstan, 1323. It can hardly be doubted that these Master Masons were responsible for such parts of the Cathedral and Priory as chanced to be built during their term of office.

Of importance are the Worcester Goldsmiths, the men who wrought the immense amount of gold and silver plate which enriched the several churches of the diocese; much of this must have been made at Worcester. They were the legitimate successors of the older Moneyers, the last of whom was living temp. Henry II., and it is noticeable that his name, Oslac, is that of one of the earliest Provosts. Oslac is not a common name, and the two men may well be identical.

In the early years of Henry III., Ingram the Goldsmith was working here, and has as his contemporary, or nearly so, a certain Hugh, who had a workshop next to the plot of land of Richard the Sacrist; the mention of Bishop Cantilupe limits the date of this document to the years 1236-66. Hugh is also a witness in another deed, and is named as holding a tenement

in Needler Street, and contemporary with him Master Bartholomew the Goldsmith, who is named in a deed which is a quitclaim by Bartholomew to John de Estleye of a tenement in the Cemetery bounded by a stair next to the house of Alexander and the Court of the Bishop. Hugh was succeeded in business by his son William, who gave to the Priory certain lands in Worcester to augment the Sacrist's income. He was probably the same person as William le Goldsmith, who had a messuage and one shop in le Bridport, in which he was living with Ysabel his wife in 1310, and of which he was formally enfeoffed in the bailliff's court five years later. His business must have flourished, since he took another tenement next his own in 1338, when he had as his immediate neighbour Walter the Chirurgeon. In 1316 he and his wife were enfeoffed of a house in the High Street; there was moreover some connection with Lyche Street, since he is a witness to a lease of a house there in 1333, to John le Goldbeter and Agnes his wife.

There were other goldsmiths in Worcester in the 13th century, viz., one Robert, who occurs as witness in the year 1302, and in the same year is called Robert, son of Robert the Goldsmith; he had a tenement in Neldare Street. In 1320 Geoffrey also appears, and is described as son and heir of Ralph the Goldsmith. He is named as granting a rent of 3s. 6d. out of a house in the Bridport to one Robert Bonner; Pain (Paganus) is yet another, and is one of the witnesses to a grant of a shop in the High Street to a goldsmith named Jordan de Revereshull. This is in 1310. Of a later date John le Goldsmyth occurs in 1376; but later than this there is no mention of the trade.

Next to the Goldsmiths mention may be made of the Bellfounders, who were working at Worcester all through the Middle Ages, and are frequently noticed in these deeds. There was once a bellfounder's yard in Silver Street, but hardly of so early a date. The earliest of the trade appearing in the deeds is one Simon, who flourished in the middle of the 13th century, and was living in Sidbury till 1294. He is named under the style of Simon Campanarius, or Simon le Belyeter, between the years 1226-66. In point of date he is succeeded by a man who was particularly conspicuous in the government of the town under the title of Richard le Belyeter, and on four occasions occupied the Bailiff's office, viz., in 1301, and in 1310-12, and yet again in 1314; as may well be imagined, he occurs as a witness many times, at dates varying from 1300 to 1322, but in only one document as a principal; in this he leases lands in Timberdine to Richard le Mercer, A.D. 1306. The document has affixed to it a fine specimen of his seal, a wide-mouthed bell, with the legend "*Sigillum Ricardi le Belyeter.*" This Richard may well have been son of Simon, and may have been the father of John le Belyeter, who succeeds him and appears as a witness in 1347 and in 1351.

Of yet later date, but perhaps of the same family, is Richard le Belyeter, who occurs in 1464.

Of the other metal workers there is less to say, but there was a boltsmith in 1347 (if the name actually represents a trade, of which there is some doubt). Coppersmiths are twice named, viz., Nicholas le Coppersmith, 1333, and again in 1348. Smiths generally are frequently mentioned and need not detain us, but Stephen le Locksmith is an exception, since he was bailiff in 1301-2, and had a shop in front of the Gyld Hall in the High Street.

Corvisers or Shoemakers gave their name to a street in Worcester at an early date, and the trade is more than once mentioned. Thus Nichol the Corviser is named early in the reign of Henry III. ; William de Inteberg, who married Joan de Cotherigge, held two houses in le Bridport in 1304 ; Thomas de Dene occurs in 1326 ; there was also Martyn le Corvysor in 1320—1346, and Richard le Parchemen, who granted his rights in a tenement to Richard le Mercer in 1329, but none of them seem to have lived in the street which bore their name.

If we turn to the manufacturers of articles of wearing apparel the list contains many modern-looking names, such as Drapers, Dyers, Glovers, Hosiers, Mercers, Tailors, and Webbers or Weavers, most of whom were represented in every town of this date, and therefore demand no special treatment. But an exception should be made in the gloving trade, since from an early date it has been an important one in the city. The earliest of the craft named is Walter the Glovemaker, mentioned in a deed of the middle of the 13th century. Richard Hole worked here in 1405, and John Canyng owned a share of a tenement in Eport in 1499.

The trades dealing with provisions were bakers, in sufficient numbers to have a street of their own, in which their ovens were situated, and requiring special construction, it would seem possible that they did not move to other parts of the town. If bakers were many, and influential, the same cannot be said for the butchers, who are only named occasionally. They naturally required pasturage within easy reach of the town ; one of them, Walter Derlung, had a messuage in Henwick in 1331, another, John de Brotton, leased a tenement in the High Street in 1338, and Henry Cheylemarch and Edith his wife carried on business next the Church of St. Martin in 1329.

The Cooks had a street to themselves, viz. Cokestrete, but are only twice mentioned in these deeds, viz. William the Cook, temp. Henry III., and Walter as early as King John.

Every little manor had its miller, and Worcester was no exception. The Worcester millers carried on their labours in "The mill-next

Worcester," which was a windmill at Batenhale¹, all through our period, and were often of considerable importance. Grocers or Spicers were of necessity wanted but they were not numerous. Cellarers or Vintners provided the needful wine; the earliest mentioned, as early as the 12th century, is one Gunbert Vinetarius.

The Chandlers had a street to themselves as had the Needlers, but the latter are not mentioned at all, and the former but rarely. Carpenters are plentiful but never seem to have herded together; one bowyer is named Roger le Bowyer in 1333. In the Middle Ages the barber held an exceptional position, one of considerable responsibility, inasmuch as he was usually half surgeon also. Only three are referred to in the deeds, Geoffrey Barbour in 1347, John le Barbour in 1330, and William Gornay in 1455.

The preservation of the deeds of a religious house was in the first instance due to the land hunger of the spoliators, since every particle of land the house possessed was most assiduously tracked down by the grantee of the Crown. Greed fraught with endless food to the modern student! In the case of Worcester the ancient regime passed almost imperceptibly into the new and the documents never changed hands. The neglect of generations of officials is alone responsible for the terrible gaps in the series, but it is a matter of thankfulness and wonder that any have escaped. But what antiquary can fail to regret the loss of the splendid series of Saxon deeds Dugdale catalogued? and the more recent labours of Prattinton and Hobhouse show that the losses even in the last century have been severe.

It is not too much to say that their present condition is almost entirely due to the energy and zeal of Canon Wilson, who personally cleaned and examined by far the greater number, and caused the Dean and Chapter to order their removal to their present resting-place.

The work of editing these charters could not have been undertaken but for the kind permission of the Dean and Chapter, and the help and advice of the General Editor, of Canon Wilson, of Professor Skeat, to all of whom the editor's thanks are due; and also to Mr. Shuttleworth, Master of the Choir School, who has spared neither time nor trouble in clearing up the topographical difficulties presented by the documents.

The thanks of the Society are also due to the Dean and Chapter for courteously permitting the Catalogue to be printed.

All that the copyist has done is to alter the A.-S. letters to Anglo-French ones, and to make one or two pardonable mistakes.

Thus, he writes *f* and *s* instead of *ƿ*, according to position. Also *ƿ* and *z* (after an *o*) for *ƿ* (*ʀ*). He makes *ƿ* (*w*) and *þ* (*th*) precisely alike, which is usual at his date. Also *f* for *ƿ*; *t* or *τ* for *ƿ*; and the French *g* instead of A.-S. *g*. He dots the *ý*, which is right.

I believe he is wrong as to the following:—

. ƿ . error for . þ̅ . the usual short form of *biscop* (bishop).

He has misread *geunnen*, and turned it into *geunien*; one downstroke too few.

The A.-S. *munece* he has altered to *munete*.

There is little else to be said. þ̅ is for *þæt* = 'that.'

geunnen = granted.

For *munete*, read *munece*, dative.

Sace and *socne* mean "of *sacu* and *soen* (or *soken*).” The usual forms *sac* and *sok*e are incorrect. There never was a *sac* or *sak*. *Sace* is the gen. of *sacu* (mod. E. *sake*) used in the technical sense of 'privilege to hear legal disputes.' And *socne* is the gen. of *socn* (mod. *soken*, as in *Port-soken*), which Kemble took to mean the same as *sacu* (which is absurd); but in Toller's A.-S. Dict. it is better explained by 'the right to inflict a fine.' i.e. he had the right to hear a cause and to assign the penalty. There has been much incorrect use of *sak* and *sok*e in later documents, and a good deal of mistaken opinion.
