MEXICAN INSURGENTS LOSE 400 KILLED AND WOUNDED 9 AMERICANS WOUNDED BY STRAY BULLETS

(Special Service to Glendale Evening News) DOUGLAS, Ariz., Nov. 2.—Gen. Villa's army was defeated at Agua Prieta this morning. The army is now retreating eastward.

Four hundred dead and wounded were left on the field. Several miles east of Agua Prieta the army halted, while 500 head of cattle were slaughtered. Nine Americans were wounded during the fighting by stray bullets. Four of them were American soldiers.
