### ASSESSMENT RETURNS

MAJORITY OF PAYMENTS HAVE BEEN MADE ON SYCAMORE CANYON IMPROVEMENT

Saturday was the last day set for paying assessments for the opening and widening of the Sycamore Canyon Road, i. e., it was the last day for payment without a penalty. During the thirty days to come payments will be received at the City Hall, but a 5 per cent penalty will be added. After that the property of any person in the assessment district who has failed to pay will be advertised for ten days and sold at tax sale. In spite of the fact that 1,500 pieces of property are involved in this improvement, which represents a sum amounting to about half as much as the city's annual tax levy, officials do not anticipate it will be necessary to sell any holdings, as there were no tax sales in connection with the Broadway improvement and the great majority have already paid.

Relative to the time required for this improvement to materialize, officials say it will be sixty days before the city can acquire title to the ground, six weeks more to establish the grade, and then about ten weeks to put through street proceedings to the point where the improvement can actually begin. With the best possible speed it will probably be some time in October before real construction work can start.

City and county engineers are co-operating in plans for a sand trap at the head of the street and pumping plant which the county is to furnish as part of its flood control work at a cost of \$10,000.

The committee working on the project to continue the Sycamore Canyon Road through the Tropic District to a junction with Brand Boulevard has been meeting with considerable success. Some of the largest property holders to be affected have signified their desire to have the thoroughfare put through and have signed a petition to that effect.

If that extension can be made it will open up to improvement a large amount of attractive property and increase values in the eastern portion of the city, restoring in a measure its lost prestige.

### FROM FAR OUTPOST

BROTHER OF MRS. L. T. ROWLEY, WOUNDED BY SHELL, WRITES FROM GERMANY

The following letter, written by the brother of Mrs. L. T. Rowley, of this city, who has been in the thick of the fighting since May and through the battles of Chateau Thierry, Soissons and the Argonne, will be of interest not only to civilians, but to the soldiers who have returned from the French front. The writer, Corporal Newcomb, is in Company C, 125th Infantry, A. P. O. 734, 32d Division.

Corporal Newcomb was born and raised in Downey and at the time the war broke out was an expert machinist in the sugar beet factory north of San Francisco. He was given deferred registration on account of being an expert machinist. He went to Camp Lewis in January and was there but two months when he was sent to France and put into a replacement unit. In that way he got into the 32d Division which was made up originally of Wisconsin and Michigan National Guards and which suffered heavily, losing before the war ended 14,400 men and officers.

"Horhausen, Germany, Feb. 3, 1919.

"Dear Sister:—

"The post card you sent reached me yesterday, also a letter from Robert. He said you had not heard from me for a long time but a letter must have gone astray, for I wrote as soon as able to after I left the hospital. Quite a few of us were kept in rest camps some time after we were out of the convalescent camp and I did not get to my outfit until January. I was wounded by a shell on the 12th of October. Three pieces entered my right thigh and one went through my right arm just above the elbow. My thigh never gave me any trouble but the doctor here says the piece that went through my arm struck a nerve center causing neuritis. I have no sense of touch in my hand, and my elbow and forearm give me trouble when they get cold, but the doctor ordered me to stay in and give my arm hot applications which I did and they are now feeling better. He says as soon as we get to the states I will be sent to a hospital and given electric treatment which will bring it back. It makes it pretty hard to control a pen, so please excuse this scribbling.

### COUNTRY DIVIDED ON LEAGUE OF NATIONS

LETTERS TO SENATORS FROM ALL PARTS OF THE COUNTRY SHOW WIDE DIVERGENCE OF OPINION

(Special Service to Glendale Evening News)

Washington, March 10.—Forty-seven hundred letters selected from the files of eighteen different Senators show that the writers in all parts of the country are divided on the League of Nations as follows:

Unqualifiedly for the league.....	1,628
For the league with qualifications.....	1,240
Expressing no opinion, but seeking information.....	264
Unqualifiedly against the league in its present form.....	1,508

In all of the letters a sentiment more or less firmly against war was expressed. More than half of the letters endorsing the league were from clergymen, lawyers, writers and other professional men. Most of the letters were from the Eastern or Southern States.

The bulk of the other three classes were from the Middle West or Pacific Coast. The writers unqualifiedly against the league in its present form in many instances bitterly attacked President Wilson.

Those favoring the league with qualifications chiefly raised the objection that the league ended the Monroe Doctrine and American sovereignty.

### FEAR THAT KAISER CANNOT BE EXTRADITED

ECONOMIC COMMISSION TO RESUME NEGOTIATIONS WITH GERMANY FOR PARTIAL LIFTING OF BLOCKADE

(Special Service to Glendale Evening News)

Paris, March 10.—The preliminary peace treaty probably will require Germany to turn over to an international tribunal the officers found guilty of war crimes.

The committee on responsibility for the war and punishment of those guilty is expected to report that the kaiser cannot be extradited and that it will be difficult to determine his personal responsibility for the war. The committee will suggest that Germany try to extradite him, but if no other alternative is found, it is understood an international indictment naming the kaiser as the world's greatest criminal will be published and that he will go down in history with that characterization resting upon him.

It is expected that the economic commission will begin negotiations with Germany once more within a very few days. Its terms, it is understood, will include partial removal of the blockade, so as to permit Germany to export coal and potash, and the establishment of neutral credits by Germany, which will allow Germany to use its gold reserve, if the country cannot raise sufficient money otherwise.

Washington, March 10.—The Supreme Court has confirmed the conviction of Eugene V. Debs, convicted of violating the espionage act. Debs has been sentenced to ten years in prison.

### GOVERNMENT CONTROL TO END

PRESIDENT VAIL OF BELL CO. SAYS TELEGRAPH AND TELEPHONE PROPERTIES WILL SOON BE RETURNED

New York, March 10.—The annual report of President Thomas N. Vail of the Bell telephone system today declared that the government's wire control is merely temporary and that the property of the telegraph and telephone companies will be returned to private ownership at the end of a limited period.

### GREATNESS OF CHINA

REV. MCCREA TELLS OF ITS WONDERFUL FUTURE AND FAITH IN AMERICA

At the First Baptist Church of Glendale, Sunday evening, Dr. P. L. Powell, pastor, after a brief reading and expounding of the First Psalm, invited Rev. T. F. McCrea, who is leaving this week for the Orient, to take the pulpit.

Dr. Powell pointed out the superficial character in the sight of God of many of the classifications of men which human society makes, but that there is one which is fundamental, the distinction between the righteous and the wicked. He pointed out that the declaration: "Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsels of the ungodly, nor standeth in the way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful epitomized in a negative manner the biography of the wicked man who began by listening to the counsels of the ungodly, and then, becoming bolder, associated himself publicly with sinners, and finally became a scorn of the good and true. "No man becomes wicked suddenly," he declared. "It is a long road he travels and it may take years to put him in the seat of the scornful."

He referred to the description of the righteous man given in the psalm "whose delight is in the law of the Lord and in His law he meditateth day and night." Said he: "It is not possible according to God's scheme to be turned into a righteous man in the twinkling of an eye. We become righteous by meditating upon the law of the Lord."

Mr. McCrea referred to the promise made by God to Abraham that "In thy seed shall all nations be blest," and to the prophecy of Isaiah that among those which shall come up for the blessing shall be "these from the (Continued on Page 4)

### MEMORIAL ENDORSED

SEC. F. K. LANE FAVORS COMMUNITY CENTER TO HONOR SOLDIERS AND SAILORS

Richardson D. White and other members of the park and civic center memorial for soldiers and sailors of Glendale are interested in the news that Monrovia also has the desire to make a memorial for the soldiers and sailors who went to war from that city, which will be of immediate and lasting use and benefit to them and to citizens at large. An attractive building, which will provide a place for community singing, drama, indoor athletics and other forms of wholesome recreation, is the plan of the "Gem City," and it has been endorsed by Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior, to whom the chairman of the committee wrote outlining the project. His reply is as follows:

"Hon. Walter F. Dunn, Mayor, Monrovia, Cal.:  
"Dear Sir: May I express to you, as the chief executive of your municipality, my hearty endorsement of the movement now spreading throughout the United States for the erection of community buildings as soldiers' and sailors' memorials. In expressing our gratitude for the patriotic service of the brave men, living and dead, who have helped to win the world for democracy and human liberty, it is most fitting that we erect in every community a living memorial rather than a mere shaft or monument. It has been suggested that these community houses be known as "Liberty Buildings" and that they be dedicated as neighborhood gathering places for civic service and fellowship for all the people.

"The war has shown, in the camps and camp cities, the great value of adequate facilities for fellowship and public recreation. Now that the men are returning home they should have the opportunity, through the coming years, to perpetuate the democracy of the camps and to share with their fellow townsmen, in a suitable building, facilities for discussion of local and national problems and for community singing, drama, indoor athletics and other forms of wholesome recreation. "There has been formed by persons interested in this movement a national committee on memorial buildings, with headquarters at 261 Broadway, New York. This committee is preparing to co-operate with local committees, by offering suggestions, if desired, as to facilities which might be included in these Liberty Buildings, and as to methods of financing and administration.

GUARD TO SPOIL GOOD KIDNAPING? NEVER!

(By United Press) BERLIN, Feb. 6. (By Mail).—It is not every day that you can have twenty men toting rifles and grenades as your personal bodyguard, and not have to pay anything for them.

Early one morning a representative of the "Kommandantur" arrived at the hotel with orders "to warn the English and American correspondents there that a plot had been discovered to kidnap them as a means of drawing Entente troops to Berlin."

The representative accepted a cup of "ersatz tea" and urged the acceptance of 20 good fighters, who would station themselves outside the door as a body guard. The offer was turned down.

"Well, then you'd better just go with them when they come to capture you," said the jovial uniformed representative of the commander, "Better not fight. Get the hotel to telephone us, and we'll come and rescue you. Let us do the fighting—it's better."

Bright prospects of a good story before night—but they never materialized. The kidnapers did not come.

TEACH USE OF LIMBS

(By United Press) LONDON, Feb. 20. (By Mail).—Schools to teach use of artificial arms and legs to thousands of mutilated war heroes are springing up all over England.

The pensions ministry pioneered in this work when it established a school at Charterhouse military hospital.

The government also is encouraging private experimentation to develop new types of arms of still greater usefulness.

"More types are being developed daily," says Sir Charles Henderdine, director of the artificial limb department of the pensions ministry. "Our biggest difficulty is persuading men to persevere in learning how to use artificial legs and arms. They are at first uncomfortable and cumbersome. This soon discourages the ordinary man, who begins to feel he had better get along without the appliance."

A month's training, however, usually convinces the experimenting soldier the appliance enables him to do many things he couldn't without it, Sir Charles says.

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# Christian Science Lecture by Mrs. Blanche K. Corby, C. S. B.

Mrs. Blanche K. Corby, C. S. B., of Los Angeles, Cal., a member of the Christian Science Board of Lectureship, delivered a lecture on Christian Science, Sunday evening, under the auspices of First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Glendale, in the church edifice, Maryland and California avenues.

The lecturer was introduced by Mr. Dale G. Vaughan, First Reader of the church, who said:

Christian Science makes its appeal to men and women in every walk of life, and it brings to them all the same peace, comfort and abiding trust in God's goodness and allness.

It heals them from sin, sickness, sorrow, poverty and fear.

It is little wonder that a religion which has such a beneficial effect upon the lives of its adherents, is attracting the attention of thinking people.

The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass., has established a Board of Lectureship, the purpose of which is to correct misapprehensions regarding Christian Science and to afford an opportunity to those who so desire, to learn something of its teachings.

It is my privilege to introduce a member of that Board, Mrs. Blanche K. Corby, C. S. B., of Los Angeles, California.

Mrs. Corby in her lecture said:

The message that Christian Science brings to the world today is one of good cheer; it is one of hope, comfort and salvation. To a world stricken with suffering, Christian Science offers deliverance from all the discords of life. Every one desires to live because life is natural and normal, and a knowledge of the best means whereby life may be conserved and made harmonious is indeed most worthy of our thought and consideration. Humanity generally has not looked to God for daily and hourly help in times of trouble. It has not believed that God is available under all conditions and circumstances; but there is no human condition so desperate, no disease so obstinate that man cannot be released through divine aid for God who is Love, is all powerful.

### GOD

Man's understanding of God reaches the pinnacle when he declares and knows that God is Love. This synonym for God is the highest concept of him, the tender, compassionate sense which was expressed by Christ Jesus in his work.

Because Christian Scientists no longer have a personalized, limited sense of God, but speak of him as Divine Principle, the objection is sometimes made that this term applied to deity seems abstract and cold, but as the true meaning of the word principle is basis or foundation which governs all that proceeds from it, we find that the term is a most appropriate one for God.

Every thinking person is cognizant of things that exist; because of his belief in the existence of things, he believes that there is a first cause or creator. Christian Science proclaims that God is the cause of all created things. It declares as Omnipotence and Omnipresence, the all-inclusive infinite One, or, as Mrs. Eddy so comprehensively states, "The Adorable One," including all life, law, power, intelligence, and action. This all-inclusive Omnipotence or the One Presence is best understood as Mind. The one omnipotent Mind or one conscious Being is expressed after its own kind, then all that expresses it must be mental because the activity of mind is thought. Everything is mental, whether upon a good or evil, a spiritual or material plane. All that we are conscious of today is the result of thought, that we exist as mortals is the result of thought that has gone before. All the history of the past and all present human activity are mental. Every human achievement, every discovery brought to light—is the result of somebody's thought. If it were possible for thought to cease on earth today, complete inaction, which is death, would result. All that engages man's attention, the daily routine, business, home and family, the great manufacturing activities, agricultural development, all the pursuits of life, would cease. Every complaint of the body is expressed through thought. If man could not think he could not be conscious of bodily pain and discomfort; it is only as all things are resolved into thought, into mental conditions, that the mystery of evil disappears. All wrong thought with its discordant results can be corrected by right thinking which can be continued only from the standpoint of changeless Truth, Divine Principle or spiritual unfoldment.

### SALVATION

Salvation is gained through right thinking. Many theories of salvation have been presented to the world, but only one has proved satisfactory and unfailing. Christ Jesus came as the way-shower declaring and demonstrating a full and complete salvation. Jesus did not teach that a man must die in order to be saved or to reach God; nowhere in the Scriptures is found any authority that he considered evil and death at all necessary or in accord with divine law; but he did say, "If a man keep my saying, he shall never see death."

When the beginner in Christian Science reads in the Scriptures that God pronounced his creation good; that he was satisfied with it; that he was entirely satisfied with man made in his own image and likeness; that this man was given dominion over all the earth; the question is sure to arise, what has taken place that man is not expressing his God-given dominion today? Christian Science reveals to this age the fact that nothing has happened to weaken or destroy man's God-given dominion. It is impossible that man, made in the image and likeness of God could fall into evil and sin, yet the belief that he did so fall has caused all of the sorrow and suffering on earth. The beginner further asks "If God is Infinite Good, where did evil come from, what is its cause

and origin?" When we learn to think in accord with Divine Mind, we find that evil in individual consciousness disappears and that, therefore, the only cause for evil or sin is a false belief, a wrong thought, and not a spiritual fact. In the degree that man ceases to think evil, evil and sin disappear; and proportionately as that disappearance takes place, goes all the mystery of evil, all its presence and power.

### HEALING

The first step toward freedom from evil is generally taken through the desire for physical healing. The healing method of Christian Science, the healing method used by Jesus, is unique, but there is no mystery, nothing supernatural about it. It is the simple teaching of Jesus, the spontaneous and natural result of better thinking. The physical healing in Christian Science is not for the purpose of making a man more comfortable in materiality, of enabling him to eat more food without discomfort, or to indulge more freely in appetites and passions, but the whole purpose of healing is to reveal the truth about life. It heals the sick to establish the fact of the reality of God or good, and it heals the sinner to prove the unreality of evil or evil. Christian Science does not teach that sickness and evil do not seem real to the human consciousness; but it teaches that the human consciousness is a false consciousness expressing itself according to its false beliefs in all the phenomena of evil and sickness, and that healing through a correction or overcoming is accomplished through the understanding of God and his Law.

Throughout human history man has defied himself, he has created God in the image and likeness of a mortal instead of finding that he himself is the image and likeness of God. Because God has been believed to be a mighty man manifesting jealousy, anger, revenge, visiting his wrath upon his people; the belief that might is right has grown to the utmost. As the result, human history is a record of the cruelty of the human will. Since the days of Pharaoh, prominent characters have wielded the iron rod of tyranny and despotism as exemplified by Xerxes when he commanded his soldiers to shout as they lashed the waves of the Hellespont, "Xerxes, thy master, bids thee be still," until today, we see the worst propensities of man incorporated into some forms of government as law. It is because of the deification of the mortal or material mind and its beliefs, that the statement is sometimes ignorantly made that the healing of Christian Science is wrought through suggestion, or the action of the human mind—one mind controlling another human mind. In order to correct this accusation made against Jesus' healing works, he said, "If I by Beelzebub cast out devils, by whom do your children cast them out?" (Matt. 12, 27) showing that evil cannot correct evil. The human mind, unilluminated, and uninstructed in spiritual law, cannot possibly understand spiritual healing, or the means by which it is accomplished; so it insists that it must be after its own method, the operation of the human will through hypnotism or what is popularly called modern psychology. Nothing could be farther from the truth.

The teacher of mathematics does not subject his pupil to a state of hypnosis in order to teach the science of numbers, but reveals to him the principle of mathematics, the truth about numbers. If each step in the solution of a problem were mentally imposed upon the more yielding thought of the child, he would not be trained to think for himself; on the contrary, he would be schooled in the habit of responding to suggestion from without. The pupil, to be alert and progressive, must be taught to think correctly, he must be free from the personal domination and control of the teacher. In like manner, the Christian Science practitioner knows that the human will must be divorced from every Christian Science treatment; indeed the human will could not give a Christian Science treatment. The practitioner's part in the healing work is to reveal to the patient the truth about being, and this truth about being, and the consciousness of the sufferer heals and saves. Evil, the fundamental quality of the human mind, believing as it does in both good and evil, cannot heal. It is wholly through the action and operation of spiritual law that the sick are healed. Christian Science treatment creates a desire to know and to do the will of God. It is regenerating in its influence. Mesmeric suggestion and hypnotism weaken the subject's ability to do what is right. His subjection to another mentality is in itself an evil. Healing is not accomplished through concentration or holding the thought for others, but through consecration of thought and purpose and love for God and man. The reading of the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," has cured thousands of sickness and sin; one hundred pages of the book contain testimonials of healing through the reading alone. No mesmeric suggestion was used by the book to accomplish such results, no human domination or control was exercised, but the revelation of truth contained in those pages opened the understanding, and healing followed as a natural consequence.

The objection is sometimes made that Christian Science practice does not take into account the symptoms of disease. It does, however, recognize the symptoms but only to analyze the mental cause which has produced the physical suffering. If the mental cause is found to be hatred, fear, resentment, grief, or anxiety, what prescription could be administered internally, or what application could be applied outwardly that could possibly correct such cause of disease? Because the popular forms of healing deal with the effect instead of the cause, there is a long list of what are called incurable diseases; incurable, only because some men have said that they cannot cure

them. Jesus never said that disease is incurable, but instead said to the woman who had been bowed together for many years, "Satan hath bound thee;" in other words, her belief in evil had caused her physical infirmity. The majority of cures wrought by Christian Science have been of diseases pronounced incurable, and the great ranks of Christian Scientists today are composed largely of those who have been compelled to turn to God for aid because some man has said he could not heal them. Happy day when one learns that man cannot heal, but that God can and does.

Centuries of time can never make a lie or false claim true, for it was false from the beginning; neither can centuries of misconception diminish the power of God, who is the same yesterday, today, and forever.

### MANKIND'S GREATEST ENEMY

Fear is the arch-enemy of humanity, and many are those who are living under its constant pressure and know not how to escape from its bondage. Throughout all time man has bowed down to fear as to a false god, and is confronted by its suggestions in all the activities of human existence. Fear attends his advent into the world, and throughout his life he is educated to be afraid; afraid of the food he eats, the air he breathes, and of the winds that blow; he is afraid of his brother man, afraid of his own body, and afraid of God. Little wonder that he is sick and in trouble. Christian Science reveals that God's universe including man was created without fear, therefore fear is without hope and without God, and anything without God has no real existence, God being the only Creator. Christian Science says to the sorrowing and fearful, you are suffering only from false beliefs, the result of ignorance and fear; ignorance of the changeless laws of God, Good, and fear of the ever-changing laws of man. To give an example of the instability of the laws of man, a former generation considered tomatos a deadly poison, while today they are recommended as a most wholesome food. The Christian Science practitioner knows that man needs to be freed from ignorance and fear, which he recognizes as the predisposing cause of disease. The sick are healed to establish the fact of the reality of good and the unreality of evil. The healing in Christian Science is not confined to physical healing alone, but may be applied throughout the whole range of human experience. It is indeed so intensely practical that it can be used in the routine of everyday life. Since God is the only Cause or Creator, all real law emanates from him, and there is no peace or safety in living in disobedience to his law. The engineer who spans the yawning chasm over which great trains are rushed in safety, owes his accomplishment to absolute obedience to the laws governing construction. These laws were in existence in prehistoric days, but man was limited because of his ignorance of them. Christian Science is the religion of opportunity. When it is understood that opportunity is a divine idea, therefore boundless and unlimited, and that it is always knocking at the door of consciousness, man will enjoy success instead of failure, and when he knows success from the standpoint of Principle, he will be able to understand the failures of the past and profit thereby.

One of the greatest torments that beset mankind is the fear of lack. The law of Infinite Mind includes no provision for poverty and lack. Christian Science teaches that the amplitude of God is the sufficient supply of man enabling him to be fed and clothed and is the true substance which is changeless and imperishable. Jesus, the man of God, knew no lack nor limitation. He turned water into wine when there seemed to be a lack at the marriage feast, he multiplied the loaves and the fishes when the multitudes believed there was no bread, he found gold in the fish's mouth when the disciples said there was no money for taxes. Throughout his whole career he constantly supplied the needs of humanity, proving that God is a God of abundance; and at the most crucial moment in his whole career, when forsaken of men, even by his own disciples, Jesus was forced to prove the abundance of life by overcoming death on the cross. When he declared, "Thy will be done," he overcame death, because in declaring the will of God he declared the law of life. In overcoming death, man's most feared enemy, he proved the continuity of consciousness,—the eternity of life.

### CHRIST JESUS

It is generally accepted by all Christians that Christianity relates essentially to the system taught and demonstrated by Christ Jesus and it is also believed that Jesus' plan of salvation reveals the true way; in the healing of disease, raising the dead, and in all the works of his ministry, he was bearing witness to the truth in accordance with the law of God. Christianity is not the creed of any sect; it is the demand of God to be Christlike and to prove faith by works. The Christians of the world believe in Jesus as a teacher and spiritual leader instead of a healer, but it was wholly by his works that he proved his divinity. True religion is not a theory, but a knowledge of the science of being, to be wrought out in life practice. The need of the world today for a religion which inspires its followers to emulate Christ Jesus in his teachings and practice is fully met by Christian Science. If Christians are to continue in the World as followers of Jesus, they must prove what they accept to be true by doing the works. Jesus proved what he knew by what he did. All that he said and did was from the basis of the demonstrated Christ, Truth, and the same Christ, Truth, is as available and demonstrable today as when Jesus lived upon earth. A law that can be annulled or set aside; that some supernatural event may be produced, was never a law but a belief; the law of infinite Mind

is eternal and unchanging and cannot possibly be violated or set aside that so-called miracles may be performed. Jesus did not violate but fulfilled all law, and individually he did all that he was to do and then said to his followers, "Be of good cheer, I have overcome the world (John 16, 33), the world of material sense and his was the example for all time.

### CHRIST

The Christ or Truth by which Jesus overcame the world, Paul said: "Was without father, without mother, without descent, having neither beginning of days nor end of life." (Hebrew 7, 3). Mrs. Eddy defines Christ as, "The divine manifestation of God, which comes to the flesh to destroy incarnate error." (Science and Health p. 583). All through human history great spiritual leaders have proclaimed the Christ. Abraham departed from the idol worship of his fathers, because he discerned something beyond the material sense of existence and proclaimed the one God as Spirit. Isaac, Jacob, and all the prophets who followed were able, through spiritual discernment, to look beyond the veil of matter, and to discern the Christ, Truth, or Saviour of the people, with signs following. After centuries of trial and great suffering, with here and there a glimpse of the Christ, Truth, which gave strength and courage to those who discerned, came John the Baptist declaring, "The Kingdom of Heaven is at hand;" and immediately following came the greatest prophet of all, the man, Christ Jesus, who gave so clear and practical a demonstration of the Christ, Truth, that it will forever remain a dispensation among men.

The healing of the early Christian church was a natural part of its religion and will always remain the natural part of Christianity. Again came the long night of materialism as the result of the waning faith of the early Christians in the power of God to save them from persecution. In their dire distress they yielded to the temptation to which we are all subjected under pressing circumstances, and made the mistake of looking away from the power that had always helped them to mere materialism; instead of turning to God, they turned to a human personality, and perhaps to one of the most subtle and deceitful personalities that history records. They looked to Constantine to befriend them and because of turning from Principle to person their power to heal was lost. Ritualism and ceremony usurped the proofs that Jesus required of his followers, and for centuries preaching and profession were considered the essentials of Christianity; then there appeared in fulfillment of prophecy a woman bringing a new light upon the Scriptures, a vision of the eternal Christ coming, as of old, because of the world's great need. Christian Scientists believe that the revelation of truth has appeared today in "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy. What will be the place in human history of this book that has again revealed God to man and that has given such liberation to humanity, such certainty of deliverance? Can its revelation be anything less than the revelation of the same healing Christ, Truth, of the ages? In asserting that Christian Science heals today as it did long ago we have only to offer the teaching of Jesus, the proofs of his ministry, and the fruits of our work. The practical operation of Christianity will always be the witness of Christ.

Christian Scientists do not claim that the full scope and measure of healing has been accomplished today; they are constantly striving for the mind of Christ; that they may do better work today than yesterday. Progress is the eternal unfoldment of Truth in individual consciousness, and the growth of a student of Christian Science is the proof of his faith.

### PRAYER

Prayer is supposed to have a place in the daily life of every consistent Christian, and is generally believed to be the means by which man communicates with God; Jesus attached so much importance to the right concept of prayer that he gave that greatest of all prayers, beginning, "Our Father, which art in Heaven." Nowhere did Jesus, teaching as he did that he was not God, instruct his followers to pray to him; neither did he instruct them to appeal to any other personality, but without intercession, to approach God with loving confidence. How many good Christians have absolute confidence that prayer is always answered? The crying need of the world is to know how to pray aright, to pray the righteous prayer which availeth much. Science and Health contains a chapter on prayer which is accepted by Christian Scientists and acknowledged by many other advanced thinkers to be the greatest treatise on prayer ever written. In this chapter Mrs. Eddy says, "desire is prayer," then she clearly sets forth what the right desire and purpose of prayer must be; her exposition is in exact accord with the teachings of Jesus. Christian Science teaches that by constantly thinking the truth, we fulfil Jesus' command to pray constantly. The truth, the spiritual fact about all things, exists, and the knowing of this is the constant or righteous prayer.

Mortal mind, the supposed opposite of God or Spirit, always presents an inverted sense of things; it believes only in itself and comprehends all things from its own standpoint and after its own likeness. If its claims and beliefs are the inversion of truth, then the very opposite of what material sense claims is true; to gain the experience of answered prayer we must hold thought to the spiritual reality of things. Jesus instructing his disciples in prayer said, "What things soever ye desire, when ye pray, believe that ye receive them, and ye shall have them." Much of the prayer of the world has been uttered for material things or for the fulfillment of human desires and it is never answered. Jesus denounced such prayer, but the moment we

know that God has given all good to man and that all good now and eternally is, that moment we begin to receive the benefits of prayer and experience its blessings. That moment may be the present moment—"Now is the day of salvation," cried Paul to a people who were looking to a future salvation, and Christian Science declares that today is the day of salvation to those who demonstrate the same Christ, Truth. Mankind has emerged but slowly out of paganism because it has not known how to pray intelligently. It has prayed to every kind of graven image, and to a humanized sense of Deity which, after all, is only its own graven image. Christian Science treatment is prayer, but it does not create nor change anything but false beliefs, neither does it operate because of any mental argument, but because it declares and demonstrates the spiritual facts of being; true prayer is deliverance from evil beliefs.

### THE BIBLE

Christian Scientists accept the teaching of the Bible from Genesis to Revelation and believe that the golden thread of truth running throughout unites all ages as the Christ is revealed. Science and Health has given an illumination to the Scriptures that enables the student to comprehend their spiritual import. If the Bible is God's word to his people, then it is for us today to know and to understand it. No longer do Christian Scientists read the Scriptures in a perfunctory manner, but it is their delight to read and study them daily. The last fifty years have witnessed an intensity and breadth of interest in Bible study unprecedented in the history of the Christian church; it is the testimony of no less an authority than the Rev. C. I. Scofield, D. D., editor of the Scofield Reference Bible.

The first tenet of The Christian Science Church reads, "We take the inspired word of the Bible as our sufficient guide to eternal life." Christian Science teaches unreservedly, as necessary for sound doctrine what are considered the essentials of religion; it teaches that there is one infinite, omnipresent God, the creator of all. It teaches the divine sonship in the ever-present Christ; the Holy Ghost, or Comforter, in the unfolding consciousness of fatherhood and sonship; the atonement or man's at-one-ment with God through Christ as demonstrated by Jesus when he proved that life is eternal; the baptism of Spirit, which cleanses from the impurities of the carnal or fleshly mind; and the resurrection through progress and growth in Truth into the complete satisfaction and perfection of God and his likeness.

The Bible as a book of human history would be of no more value today than any other ancient history were it not for that golden thread of Truth which has preserved it throughout all time and has made it sacred to all Christian people. The Christian warfare, the strife in individual consciousness, is ever the same in the overcoming of evil with Truth, therefore, the experiences of the people of God, of every prophet and apostle, depict the conflict between good and evil experienced by every mortal. Religious history presents different conditions of thought; the story of Job's life is illustrative of the life of every man born into the flesh. Mortal man, like Job, has looked in vain for a contented state of mind. Searching for satisfaction he has plunged into every pleasure only to find disappointment. Business and the accumulation of money have been the resort of many to gain content and peace of mind, but the goal has ever been a Will-o'-the-Wisp just ahead but never within grasp. Men have been prone to believe that there is no religious teaching that is satisfactory or dependable, and at last arrive at that place in their experience where they exclaim, "All is vanity and vexation of spirit" (Ecclesiastes 1-14). At this time they may be ready for Christian Science and when they understand it they can then declare, as did Job, "I know that my Redeemer liveth."

Mortal mind has within itself no saving grace. It suggests its own sense of happiness and pleasure; if man chooses to look to matter for satisfaction, he must accept all the suffering that accompanies this belief. Jesus' statement, "The flesh profiteth nothing," is identical with the statement of Science and Health in what is known as the Scientific Statement of Being that "All is Infinite Mind and its infinite manifestation." Christian Scientists have found that the teaching of their textbook does not vary one hairbreadth from the teaching of the Bible.

### THE DISCOVERER AND FOUNDER

Little more than fifty years ago there was just one Christian Scientist on earth, the Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, Mary Baker Eddy. She says, in "Retrospection and Introspection," that from her very childhood she was impelled by a hunger and thirst after divine things, a desire for something better than matter and apart from it. This spiritual desire made her always consecrated in thought and purpose to the endeavor to know and understand God.

Mrs. Eddy came of devotedly religious parents, and became a member of the Congregational Church when a very young girl, even though her confession of faith was not in accord with the strict and relentless theology of that day. She had discerned God as Love, and through this discernment lost her fear of the old Calvinistic decree of predestination. With maturing years came the conviction of the unreliable nature of all things material, and at last, she was left to die as the result of an injury supposed to be fatal. She then called for her Bible, and while reading of the cures wrought by Jesus realized that God was as able to heal then as in centuries past, and she immediately arose from her bed restored to health. Centuries of time had not annulled God's promises, and with her healing came the determination to know the science or truth of that which had wrought such a change in her life. She devoted years to the research; and at

last, in the divine and natural order of events, in 1875, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" was given to the world. This experience is most comprehensively set forth in her book, "Retrospection and Introspection," a short biographical account of her own life. She writes, "My immediate recovery from the effects of an injury caused by an accident, an injury that neither medicine nor surgery could reach, was the falling apple that led me to the discovery how to be well myself, and how to make others so. I then withdrew from society about three years,—to ponder my mission, to search the Scriptures, to find the Science of Mind that should take the things of God and show them to the creature, and reveal the great curative Principle,—Deity.

"The Bible was my textbook. It answered my questions as to how I was healed; but the Scriptures had to me a new meaning, a new tongue. Their spiritual signification appeared; and I apprehended for the first time, in their spiritual meaning, Jesus' teaching and demonstration, and the Principle and rule of spiritual Science and metaphysical healing,—in a word, Christian Science. "I named it Christian, because it is compassionate, helpful, and spiritual. God I called immortal Mind. That which sins, suffers, and dies, I named mortal mind. The physical senses, or sensuous nature, I called error and shadow. Soul I denominated substance, because Soul alone is truly substantial. God I characterized as individual entity, but His corporeality I denied. The real I claimed as eternal, and its antipodes, or the temporal, I described as unreal. Spirit I called the reality; and matter, the unreality."

Not one statement of Science and Health is presented as hypothesis or as theory of human opinion, but every statement issues from the standpoint of demonstration and proof. From Plato, the pagan philosopher, to the more advanced thought of Emerson is a far cry, but only here and there is there a glint of light. No human philosophy or theory has ever solved the problem of life demonstrably, as no human theory can solve the belief of evil and matter, from which belief issues all sin, disease, and death; only the teachings of Jesus, the master metaphysician, made clear today through Science and Health, are equal to so great a demand. Mrs. Eddy says of Jesus that he, "was the most scientific man that ever trod the globe. He plunged beneath the material surface of things and found the spiritual cause." Because Mrs. Eddy "plunged beneath the material surface," she has revealed to this age the same available Christ, Truth, which heals and saves. She proved a most consecrated follower of Christ Jesus and claimed nothing more for herself. Throughout all time, here and there, men and women of uplifted thought have been able to heal through faith, but they had no knowledge of divine law or of the process by which healing might be accomplished for all. Their experiences were fragmentary and not the result of a knowledge of Principle. It is no miracle to accomplish results when one is shown the way through a scientific rule and its application, but the great miracle was this, that in a world of abject materialism, a woman appeared, who, through steadfast faith in God and a desire to know his will in order to help mankind, was able to peer back through the centuries of error, ignorance, and darkness and perceive again the Christ idea. This was the miracle, and yet it was the inevitable action of Truth. In Science and Health, Mrs. Eddy has set forth a scientific system with definite rules for practice, which will enable any sincere seeker to prove the truth of her revelation. In the early years of her ministry, with sublime patience and courage, she waited, worked, and prayed, until she gained a handful of students to assist her in raising the standard of Christian Science on earth. Today Christian Science is known throughout the whole world; in many villages and remote places there is a Society of Church organization and most of the larger cities have many overflowing churches. Mrs. Eddy also established the Christian Science Journal and the Christian Science Sentinel, monthly and weekly publications invaluable to students of Christian Science. Later she founded the great international daily called "The Christian Science Monitor," a newspaper circulated and read throughout the world and generally acknowledged as entirely reliable in its statements. She also founded and directed many other activities in connection with the Church, which were designed to be, and always will be of great benefit to humanity. Is not this a great accomplishment for one lone woman?

Humanity has slowly outgrown its ancient beliefs and its many false gods, while history shows that woman has but slowly arisen from a state of captivity and bondage. It is this ancient belief that has been the basis of any opposition that has been to Mrs. Eddy's leadership. She has ever been the great friend of woman and through her teachings many of us have been given strength and courage to meet the problems of life successfully. She has revealed the way of deliverance for woman in the way of salvation for all mankind. Christian Science has made better men and women and it has elevated womanhood as it has purified manhood by giving a nobler citizenship to the world.

It would be strange indeed if Christian Scientists did not love and revere Mrs. Eddy for her unselfish devotion and for the blessings that they individually feel have been their portion as the result of her consecrated life work. She never encouraged the slightest personal adulation, but always turned her followers to the worship of God, away from personality to Principle. Humanity will some time realize that it can never repay its debt of gratitude to Mrs. Eddy, the Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science.

#### CHURCH

The Christian Science Church founded by Mrs. Eddy stands for pure democracy, the brotherhood of man, universal participation, growth, and culture, where each individual has his place in Divine Mind and cannot usurp the place of another. The true understanding of God reveals the true brotherhood of man. Knowledge of God is true education and only as the spiritual sense is gained through the study of the letter, can the truth be demonstrated; to have merely an intellectual sense of Christian Science without the spiritual perception of its teaching, is to lose its real import and be barren of fruits. "The letter and the spirit must both bear witness and then signs follow."

The world travelling in anguish and sorrow has great need of the Comforter to-day, but the great consoling problems can only be settled ultimately through the understanding of Principle. Millions of men have been taken from happy homes, from useful occupations, and from honorable citizenship to fight the battle of Principle against the lawless warfare of autocracy. In the new sector you were ready for business as instructed and always "on the job." Even under shell fire, for you were nearly all the time, you were calm and composed. With an unusual hard job at Fleville, you required no leave. I congratulate you for younger men generally required a rest.

You served the men in the trenches, the walking wounded, the passing soldier from the canteen; you carried the wounded, buried the dead, preached the gospel,—who can estimate the worth of your services? Let me say they were excellent and I congratulate you, and I appreciate your assistance and help as a co-worker in the division.

### DO YOUR BIT

At the Community Sing Thursday evening attention was called to the singing activities of the I. W. W., who have gotten out a book of propaganda songs which are sung at their gatherings. The government recognizes the fusing power of music in unifying sentiment and for that reason is doing everything possible to promote the community singing organizations which specialize on patriotic and familiar songs. Alexander Mitchell and Blake Franklin, officials of the Community Sing, feel that as a matter of good citizenship the organization should be sustained. The big audiences which assemble at the high school every Thursday are a proof that it would be hard to find a better way to bring people together and imbue them with the spirit of patriotism and hatred of I. W. W. and Bolsheviki propaganda. It can be made the instrument for much good, and those who recognize this fact and are ready to help in its maintenance should come forward with the dollars. Its founders do not want to pass the hat. They want it to be free to all comers, especially the poor who enjoy it though they are not able to give much to its support; but Glendale is a city of prosperous thousands who should come to the rescue of this organization and keep it going by a few subscriptions. Very little is needed, but that little will be gladly received by Messrs. Mitchell or Franklin.

### CLEVELAND AND WILSON

The bitter feeling between the President and Congress has probably not been paralleled since Cleveland's second term, but in the latter case the President's most bitter opponents were in his own party, while today Mr. Wilson has but a few Democrats opposing him. Cleveland's course in promptly sending Federal troops to Chicago during the great railway strike in 1894, when Governor Altgeld of Illinois refused to protect railway property or trains carrying U. S. mails from violence by strikers, caused the President to be assailed with the most-bitter invective by Altgeld and his supporters and also many Congressmen and Senators holding similar views. And in the succeeding two years, while the free silver fight grew in intensity, culminating in the nomination of William Jennings Bryan, Cleveland stood to his guns in defense of the gold standard with that sturdy directness of purpose and frankness of speech that characterized his every act. Time proved him absolutely right on these two measures, as also on many others, and today his name stands high on the roll of Presidents who suffered in defense of right and truth.

While President Wilson has never been so strongly opposed in any of his measures as was Cleveland, he has been assailed very bitterly the past few days, notably by Sherman of Illinois. Time may yet prove that Wilson was right in all his contentions, but we can afford to wait with patience for that verdict.

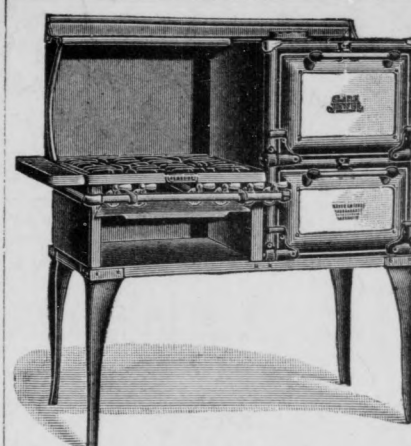
### "T'WAS A FAMOUS VICTORY"

One of the most startling political coups of the past half century was staged in Illinois about 1882. The Populist party was gaining considerable strength about that time and had elected three members of the Legislature. General John M. Palmer was the Democratic candidate for U. S. Senator, and General John A. Logan, the Republican. Singularly enough, these two men had been opponents years before during Sherman's Atlanta campaign in 1864. Right on the eve of battle Palmer refused to command his division, because he was ordered to report to Schofield, who was his junior in service by a few weeks, though of the same rank. Sherman promptly relieved him and the army thought he should have appointed Logan to succeed him, but Sherman instead appointed General O. O. Howard, a West Pointer. However, Logan, though loyal to his commander and rendering cheerful obedience to General Howard, was yet looked upon by many of the soldiers as their real leader, and it was this almost idolatrous love of his men that enabled him to save the army from disastrous defeat when McPherson's untimely death spread consternation among his followers, Logan leading them in a headlong charge against superior forces that turned the tide of battle.

In the contest for U. S. Senator 101 votes were necessary to a choice. The Republicans and Democrats had 99 each, so that the Populists with their three votes held the balance of power. If any two of them would vote with either of the old parties it would win. All held staunch, however, for a long time, and many hundreds of ballots were taken with the same result, only that the Populist members would vote for different men of their own political faith at times. Finally one of the Democratic members died. His district was overwhelmingly Democratic and it was not thought that the Republicans would even put up a candidate. Apparently this was the case, and the Democrats made no effort to get out the vote, thinking their candidate would get all that were cast, anyhow. But about the middle of the afternoon of election day, Republicans began swarming to the various polling places and writing in the name of their candidate, who was elected by a large majority. This caused wide comment all over the country, for it brought the Republicans within one vote of the coveted goal, as they had 100 votes to the Democrats' 98. Finally, to end the deadlock, Herman E. Taubeneck, Populist member from Clark County, cast his vote with the Republicans, and John A. Logan won. So high was Taubeneck's reputation for integrity that he was never seriously accused of selling out. He was of a Republican family and he was more in sympathy with that party than with the Democrats. He was elected to the Legislature one or two terms thereafter. The "101" had their pictures taken in a group and presented it to Congressman Logan.

### ANOTHER COXEY'S ARMY

"General" Jacob Coxey, who in 1894 led an army of unemployed to Washington from various parts of the country, demanding employment, is now proposing to devote his talent for organizing to a far different and most ignoble purpose. He proposes to head a "booze" army to march to Washington and voice a protest against national prohibition. If we mistake not, Coxey will meet with a far different reception this time. In 1894, though this "army" committed many depredations along the way, yet the people were in hearty sympathy with his object, that of obtaining employment for thousands of idle men. But his army of today, which he proposes to transport in automobiles instead of on foot, will face a different sentiment. Despite statements of booze advocates to the contrary, the great heart of the people cries out for surcease from the frightful inroads of the liquor traffic. It is a fact that when Illinois was still under the blight of liquor domination 85 per cent of her territory was free from saloons. The people of this country have spoken with a mighty voice the doom of the liquor evil, and they will not be denied.

land of Sinim." "The expression," he said, "is generally understood to refer to China. We missionaries are going out to fulfill the promise which God made to Abraham. We are going out to make ready the way of the Lord in heathen lands.

"I want to give you two thoughts about China. First, the greatness of China as a mission field; second, the greatness of America's opportunity in China.

"Try and think of a land as great in extent as our own land, stretching almost up to the frigid zone and down across line after line of latitude until it reaches the heat of the tropics; as far from east to west as across our own land, that possesses richly everything necessary for the physical well-being of man. Think of a land which has four times as many people as we have in this land, 400,000,000 people. In area it is equal to the entire continent of Europe including Russia and the land of Egypt and in population it is equal to the entire population of all of North America including Canada, the United States and Mexico, all of South America and the entire continent of Africa, the entire population of the German Empire and a good many millions left over for good measure. Think of it as one-fourth of the entire human race and then think of this race as one in blood, in language, in thought. India is a land of many peoples of many nationalities, languages, religions and customs. The same is true of Russia and it is true of this country. We are no longer Anglo-Saxon. We have millions of other races, but China is an unit, they think Chinese thoughts, they read the same literature, have the same customs, 400,000,000 who are strong and fearless, mentally and morally strong, a splendid people. China has developed the greatest non-Christian civilization this world has ever known.

"China counts her history in millenniums, Europe in centuries, we by decades. When Isaiah was writing, China was a land highly civilized. More than a hundred years ago, Napoleon said: 'Let the world beware when China awakens.' The soil of China supports all those people. She is rich in resources. America's national resources are rapidly passing away. The larger part of our coal, oil and iron resources have been used up, but in China those resources have not been touched. Her coal-area is equal to the entire area of all of the Atlantic states. One province alone is said to have coal enough to last the human race for two thousand years, and iron exists in quantities like this near the coal. The day will come when the Pacific coast will get all of her coal and iron from China and perhaps a great deal of her food-stuffs.

"No one can dream what the future of China will be industrially, politically, socially, this land which is awakening so rapidly to its possibilities. What is it going to be? If the Japanese should be able to lead China in the way they plan, untold calamity awaits the future, they say.

"America is face to face with an unparalleled opportunity to win China for Christ. China has realized for a long time the friendly attitude of America. Intensely national, with pride of ancestry, she is not ashamed to be Chinese but is proud of the fact. China civilized and educated Japan and Mongolia and other nations round about. She is known to them as 'the middle kingdom.' She long ago realized the futility of war to settle difficulties. In China 'reason' is the resort even in personal disputes where the public opinion of a group of people will decide the matter. But within one or two centuries have come western nations taking this piece of territory and that piece, oppressing China which is unable to meet force with force and which has felt great bitterness and hated foreigners; but China is beginning more and more to realize there is one nation that has always given China a square deal, one nation that has taken no territory and been guilty of no oppression, a nation which sent supplies to feed the starving, which gave back the Boxer indemnity, and which is sending missionaries. China looks to America for guidance and protection from enemies that, realizing the untold wealth under her soil and the immensity of trade to be developed, would exploit her. The Chinese mind has been closed by hatred, suspicion and fear all these years, but is open to America.

"All these need to know Jesus Christ, and when this knowledge is added to the forces already working in their lives, China will be a land that will do wonderful things for God.

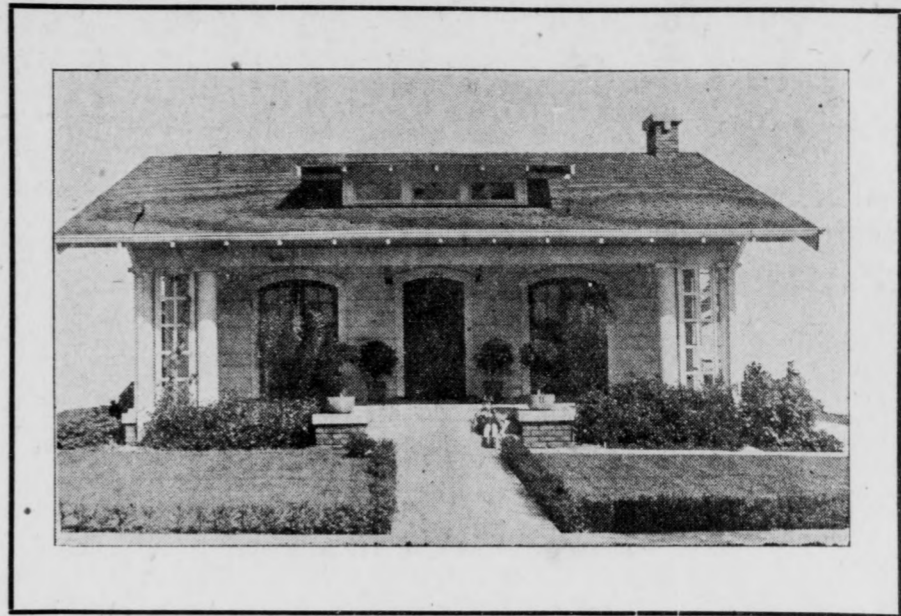
"Shall China follow the leadership of predatory nations that would teach her to use her great power for evil, or be led to the feet of Christ as Isaiah predicted? That is the vision we have before us as missionaries of the Church of Christ.

"China looks to America to lead her as a new republic into the great opportunities of the future that the Chinese believe lie before them in the years to come. Be thou faithful to the promise made to Abraham and to the vision of Isaiah."

will make of you a great and mighty people." But the people "went backward and not forward."

Because the Church has in a manner followed in the footsteps of the Israelites, it has not in the different centuries been able to measure up at all times and has spasmodically gone backwards and not forward; in spite of the fact that we were "well able to possess the land" and can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth us.

We think of the great inventors, men who in the past years have given all to discover "perpetual motion" and the sad chapter of those who have endeavored to find something that would do the work without outside intervention. God has chosen the weak things of the world to do the mighty things. His church is a divine institution and Jesus Christ loved the church and gave himself for it. Its history is something of perpetual motion. In the dark ages it was hard to tell at times whether it was going forward or backward, but it has always been light in spite of the darkness. God has in every century raised up men to champion His cause, like Jeremiah, and who felt the great truth of the words of Bonner when he said: "The thing that impels us as an outstanding truth is the fact that very soon every member of my congregation will be either in heaven or in hell." The

message blazed forth and there was a speeding up of the church of Jesus Christ. In the middle of the last century there were 1,000,000 souls added to the church under the preaching of Chas. E. Finney in the short time of two years. Then D. L. Moody came swinging into line as a great flame of righteousness, and so on down through the great revivals.

The message this morning is a strange one, yet you cannot get away from the fact that as individual members of the church you are saved to serve. Churches of all denominations are criticized because of the preponderance of women, but this is a day and age when the men are stepping forward. Send for the year book at Washington, D. C., and you will find that last year there were 19,000,000 women and 15,000,000 men in the churches. After the New Era Movement has carried out its program they will be 50-50.

The pastor then gave some astonishing statistics in a most interesting way concerning the Presbyterian Church of the U. S. A. during the past five years, taking in the Sunday School and other organizations. Then followed an outline of the special program to be carried out by this particular church during the next few weeks and the goal to be reached as a starter for the progress of the church, giving also the goals of the New Era Movement in general and the immense work to be accomplished by the Presbyterian Church of the U. S. A.

125th Inf., 32d Division. Our Division was kept very much on the go from May until they reached this port. We made a drive at Chateau Thierry after leaving Alsace, and from there went to Soissons and made a drive with the French. We saw much fighting on all of them, but the Argonne I believe was the worst. We had struck their strongest line when I was wounded, and as soon as they broke it was nothing much but follow them. It doesn't seem possible that a person could stand what we went through, but the majority did and came out O. K. Aside from my arm I am a great deal better physically than when I entered.

"We are the furthest outpost of the American Bridgehead. The country is very hilly, but these people don't mind hills when it comes to farming.

"There are more fruit trees here than we saw in France, and the people seem more thrifty, but they haven't had to contend with what the French have. At that you can notice they lack a great many things they would have in peace times.

"Everything is covered with snow and it is pretty cold. It is real pretty, but that is about all you can say for it. We are billeted around at the different homes and are quite comfortable. The old lady with whom four of us are billeted is the most envious person I ever saw. I don't think she sleeps any, for we hear her running around all hours of the night. The upper half of our door leading to the hall is glass and she takes a look in every time she passes. Suppose she thinks we will tear up the floor or something. The people, as a rule, seem to be rather friendly to us Americans, but they

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don't like the French.

"Robert must have been in some excitement according to his letter. He was to go on a ten-day furlough when he wrote. Would like to have a furlough myself, but think I can stand it till we start home. I don't see how we can make it back under three months. Would sure like to get back to a decent climate again. A girl in Oakland wrote and said there were lots of orchards in bloom in the Santa Clara Valley; that was in October. The report is out that several cities want this division to

parade when it gets back, but don't know what there is to it. We are all anxious to get home, but it takes time to move such a large body of men. Suppose we should be contented that we are not still on the front fighting, but a good soldier is not satisfied any place. Will close for this time, and hope this reaches you O. K. Love to all.

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
