The court in giving its judgment, stated in substance, that the insured on freight, to entitle himself to recover on his policy, must show that he has done all in his power to earn it, and that it was lost without his fault, and in douding on his rights, the duty of the ship owner and of the facignter is to be taken into view. In case of a disaster, it is the duty of the ship owner to put his vessel into a condition to nacform the voyage, or if his cannot be done, to protien to perform the voyage, or if his cannot be done, to pro-cure another vessel if he can, to carry on the cargo. Here the vessel was capable of being repaired and refitted, and the dolay was not unreasonable. The ship therefore, could

the delay was not unreasonable. The ship therefore, could carn her freight, unless prevented by the condition of the cargo. The damage to the cargo, even if rendering it totally spoiled and of no value, does not deprive the ship owner of his right to earn the freight; the only circumstance in the condition of the cargo having such an effect, is its being uneass and dangerous to the ship and its crew. In this case it clearly appears, that this difficulty in the option could have been remedied, at a practical expense, and

without unreasonable delay.
It is insisted, however, that the expense of refitting the cargo for the voyage was chargeble on the freight, and af-forded a ground to abandon it, and that this was a sufficient

forded a ground to abandon it, and that this was a sufficient ground to give up the voyage.

The court did not recognize any such rule. If the disaster had happened, and the ship had goue into a port of distress, where the master had no funds, nor means of raising money, by a sale of part of the cargo, or otherwise, he otherwise, might be justified in permitting a sale of cargo damaged, if the expense of refitting it to a safe condition could not be met. But here the disaster was in a home post, the residence of the shippers, and they were bound to suffice cargo in a state fit for the voyage, unless they deem port, the residence of the shippers, and they were count to put the cargo in a state fit for the voyage, unless they deemed it more for their interest to self it there: in which case, they had a right to do so, but upon payment of the freight. The expense of refitting cargo, when damaged so as to be unsafe, does not belong to the ship owner. His obligation to them is 'danger of the seas excepted.' Where a dam age occurs to the cargo without his fault, by sea perils, the ship and cargo which thus meet a common misfortune, must each boar its own loss. The master must repair his ship if practicable; and get it ready within a reasonable time: the shipper, or the master, as agent in case of neces sity, must put it into order for shipping at the expense of cargo.
