Sir

There is here a general apprehension that the weights, either formerly used by the Banks, or lately imported from Boston, are deficient in weight; and I recollect your having once informed me that the troy pound weight, which I possessed in London, was several grains heavier than that formerly used at our Mint. I will therefore thank you for answers to the following queries.

1. What is, as compared with the troy pound weight now used at the mint, the weight of your former standard weight, and that of the several weights in common use amongst Banks, either here, at Boston, or at Philadelphia, which you have had an opportunity to examine?
2. Where are the most correct made, by whom, and at what price (exclusive of taxes) say for weighing altogether ~ 5000, & 3000 penny weight, respectively?
3. Having in this bank a scale and set of weights made at Boston (called Deacons), is it necessary to send them to Philadelphia in order that the difference may be examined and how & by whom is that done?

As we are daily exposed to losses in taking correct foreign gold by weight, I would be much obliged to you for an immediate answer to the first of the preceding queries.

I am also apprehensive of some loss on foreign gold

the Mint, with respect to the standard, which  
it seems to me, is proposed by the late law to be lower than  
(according to the laws of the foreign countries) it ought to be  
than it will prove to be. I would wish to know what  
has hitherto been the result with you, not on  
the particular object required by law, but on the  
large sums deposited for coinage at the Mint  
since the last law. This may govern as to buying  
such foreign coin that is deposited with us or  
sending it to the Mint.

Sir

Permit me to submit for consideration some  
further remarks in addition to those addressed to the Department  
on the 9th of July, in regard to the change in the devices and inscrip-  
tion on our gold coins issued under the late Act of Congress. The  
criticisms to which the omission of the motto "E Pluribus Unum" and  
the removal of the cap from the head of the figure of Liberty have been  
subjected ~~universally agreed to be correct and reasonable,~~  
~~universally agreed to be correct and reasonable,~~ have not so  
far as my observation extends been favorably ~~received~~ and their  
effect, very limited at any moment, appears already, to have ceased  
and the topic to be nearly abandoned. I ~~now~~ however with some  
concern, indications of an impression entertained in other quarters,  
that the changes referred to, being designed only for the purpose of  
distinguishing the new coinage from former issues of the ~~present~~ year  
are to be replaced by the former devices and inscriptions when this  
special necessity shall have ceased. Certainly they have been  
highly useful for the purpose of distinction alone, but my aim  
and hope looks beyond this, to the ultimate confirmation of these  
modifications of our coinage, as proper in themselves, and whilst  
before the year shall expire, will I am persuaded have entirely  
approved themselves to the discernment and right feeling  
of the public. Allow me in support of these views to touch  
briefly to the original provisions of the law touching the points

in question, and to the elevations subsequently made from the simplicity of those provisions and the early coinage founded thereon.

The Bill for establishing the Mint originated in the Senate. When sent to the House it contained a provision that the coins should exhibit on the face thereof, the head of the President for the time being, with the numerical order of the Presidency. The House made no alteration in the Senate's Bill except by substituting for that clause the following "an eagle with an inscription of the word Liberty and the year of its issue. In the reverse of each of the gold and silver coins the Act prescribes that there shall be "the figure or representation of an Eagle with the inscription United States of America". On the reverse of the copper coins it is directed that there shall be one inscription which shall express the denomination of the piece namely cent or half cent." These are the only devices and inscriptions prescribed in the Act. The law passed April 2nd. 1792 and ~~the above~~ provisions remain unaltered to the present day.

What was intended in the law by an ~~introduction~~ emblem of Liberty, associated with an inscription of the word Liberty, ~~and~~ <sup>generally</sup> ~~and~~ ~~and~~ ~~and~~ ~~and~~, may be inferred from the manner in which this provision was executed under the immediate eye of the authority from which the Act emanated. To illustrate the <sup>origin of the fashion</sup> ~~of the~~ <sup>in</sup> towards a variety of specimens of our coins issued at an early period.

The first of the specimens to which I would call attention is No. 1, a cent of 1798 the date of the first issues. The emblem is a female head uncovered the hair flowing unrestrained, and the inscription Liberty above

the head. We find her no cap. Nos. 2 and 3 are cents of 1794 and 1795. On each of these is a cap of clapper form. Very properly however it is not placed on the head of the figure, but appears borne on a mane projecting backward as if resting on the shoulder. Nos. 4 & 5 are two specimens of the issues of 1796, one having the cap borne as before, the other ~~is~~ without it, showing that the cap was discarded within that year, and the simplicity of the original emblem returned viz. a female head uncovered with an inscription of the word Liberty. From that period no cap has appeared on the copper coins, the only exception ever is that the ~~law~~ was even introduced, whatever reason had dictated the temporary adoption of that specific emblem, had it seems been reconsidered and abandoned. Nos. 6 & 7 are specimens of the subsequent copper coinages of these No. 7 a specimen of the date of 1814. It will be perceived has a head of Liberty <sup>in 1814</sup> ~~though originally~~ ~~that~~ was introduced on the gold coins.

The fashion of our early silver coins will be seen in Nos. 10-11-12 ~~which~~ are specimens of the year 1794, the date of the first issues, one of 95-98 and 99, exhibiting a female head with the formation of the hair somewhat varied, but all without a cap of any description either on the head or otherwise. In 1805 or 1806 the head dress of a lady of this city considered as a pleasing example of the fashion of the time, was copied by the Engraver of the Mint on the <sup>silver</sup> ~~silver~~ coins from a miniature placed before him, as alluded to in my letter of the 9th of July. This head dress, of which No. 15 presents a specimen has been continued on the silver coins from that period. At the Mint when the above origin of it was familiarly known, it was never regarded as the Liberty cap, nor would it, at that period ~~then~~ the administration of

Mr. Jefferson, have been permitted on the head of the figure of so considerable. This is plain from his opinion most emphatically expressed on the unsuitableness of this emblem as heretofore mentioned, in my communication before referred to.

Among the specimens, is a half Eagle of ~~the~~ 1795, the date of the first issues, in which the head of Liberty is covered by a cap, resembling to a small degree the Pilgrim though very distinguishable from it. This contineous ~~was~~ <sup>is</sup> taken & such caps having been introduced ~~into~~ <sup>into</sup> the mint at the time ~~when~~ <sup>as</sup> I have stated in my former communication ~~was~~ <sup>had</sup> adopted for the gold. That the cap on the ~~gold~~ <sup>silver</sup> coins was not intended as the Pilgrim is strongly ~~inferable~~ <sup>inferred</sup> from the circumstance, that the genuine Pilgrim after appearing for a time on the ~~silver~~ coins, under the Administration of General Washington, was under the same Administration ~~but~~ <sup>gradually</sup> discarded! Moreover the opinion of Mr. Jefferson again presents itself in ~~the~~ <sup>this</sup> point, ~~that~~ <sup>it</sup> must have been ~~the~~ <sup>from</sup> the head of the figure of Liberty under his administration had any ~~surmises~~ <sup>surmises</sup> been entertained ~~about~~ <sup>concerning</sup> the ~~use~~ <sup>use</sup> of the ~~gold~~ <sup>silver</sup> coin, that it was regarded as the Pilgrim. The other specimen No. 14.

The above references and illustrations appear conclusively to prove that the ~~Pilgrim~~ <sup>Eagle</sup> on the head of the original emblem of Liberty contemplated in the Act of Congress establishing the Mint, was approved as a suitable emblem by either of the early Administrations of the Government; for there does not appear the slightest ground for imagining that Mr. Adams held an opinion on this subject differing from those of General Washington and Mr. Jefferson.

The above observations have relation only to the improvement in the face of the coin by the removal of the cap, in regard to the motto *E Pluribus Unum*. I beg leave to refer to my former remarks on this subject, nearly repeating now that after various attempts, without success, to dispose of this motto so as not to interfere too sensibly with the legal device, detracting at the same time from the beauty of the coin by an extra and crowded inscription, it was considered proper to omit it, and thus return to the just taste and simplicity of the legal provisions in regard to the reverse as well as the face of the coin. I beg leave now however to invoke ~~the~~ <sup>the</sup> ~~name~~ <sup>name</sup> of a few of our early gold and silver coins, in illustration of the opinion entertained ~~by~~ <sup>during</sup> the administration under which the Mint was instituted, and the discrimination in regard to the employment of this motto, observable in the early acts of the Government.


By a resolution of Congress under the Confederation passed in 1782, certain devices and inscriptions were adopted for the great seal of the United States. Among them it was prescribed that there should be on one side an Eagle bearing in his beak a scroll inscribed with the motto *E Pluribus Unum*; the inscription *United States of America* conveying the same general idea was not however prescribed on the seal.

In 1789 the Congress of the Federal Government adopted the great seal of the Confederation with its device and motto <sup>unchanged</sup>, and in 1792 established the Mint and instituted ~~the~~ <sup>the</sup> ~~gold~~ <sup>gold</sup> ~~silver~~ <sup>silver</sup> coin, depicting, on the reverse thereof, the figure of an Eagle with the inscription "United States of America" but the motto in question

pertain solely to the seal alone. On ~~the~~<sup>their two</sup> instances deliberate legislation assigns to the seal the motto without the words United States, and to the coin the words United States without the motto. The presumption is strong that they regarded the one as superfluous where the other was employed & as it credible that this was the result of mere inadvertence in the sagacious men of that day. I am persuaded that it resulted from a true feeling that all which is superfluous in regard to this subject ought to be omitted.

The half Eagle of 1795 it will be noticed is without the motto. Its first introduction on our silver coins was, ~~in~~<sup>on</sup> 1797. ~~in~~<sup>on</sup> 1798. ~~in~~<sup>on</sup> 1799. ~~in~~<sup>on</sup> 1800. ~~in~~<sup>on</sup> 1801. No specimen two specimens of that date are without it. And until 1802 the Motto is ~~not~~<sup>not</sup> on our silver coins. It will be observed the motto first appears in 1799; all the specimens of previous dates, including 1798 are without it. Whether it was introduced on any other authority than the fancy of the Engraver does not appear.

~~When from year to year~~ The purpose of returning our coinage to its first simplicity, had after much deliberation ~~been adopted~~ ~~in~~ ~~the time~~ ~~it~~ ~~had~~ ~~been adopted~~ ~~in~~ ~~year~~ ~~its execution was deferred under an impression which began about the same ~~time~~ ~~to~~ ~~be entertained~~ that the alloy of our gold and silver coins, and their ratio to each other, ought to be modified—an occasion most fit for executing the above design. In 1831 however, it was found necessary to comply with ~~the~~ keeping Germany for quarter dollars, and that the nomination of our coins being peculiarly in need of remediation, from the undue expansion of its diet, it was determined to correct this fault in the new coinage by a suitable contraction of the diameter of this coin. This contraction rendered it particularly convenient to discard the extraneous motto. And~~

never been sent repeat the correspondence with the  
Department which occurs in regard to this topic at the  
time nor farther to refer to that part of my letter of July last  
which relates thereto. It is due however to the occasion to  
remark, that this omission of the motto from the quarter dollar  
has now been before the public nearly four years, and approved,  
if not wholly without dissent, at least with a unanimity not  
to be surpassed in regard to any question capable of admitting  
two opinions. Among the specimens forwarded to me

In regard to the capricious motto, it may be added that it belongs to the Philosophy of coinage to exclude, which may be introduced on a medal when it is forbidden on a coin. The medal may have an ample disk, but the smaller denominations of coin are necessarily of minor dimensions, and the series should be strictly correlative in all their devices and inscriptions. The relief of a medal moreover may be raised by repeated efforts, but it is essential to the clarity required in coinage that the whole effect be produced by a single impulse. All inscriptions and devices, not important to the main design, are for this reason to be avoided, that less may be required of the die.

You will ~~feel~~ <sup>I am bound to you</sup> release me again  
on this subject. As a matter which concerns National taste  
it will not ~~be~~ be regarded as unimportant. Permit  
me to request that you will have the goodness to present the

above views to the consideration of the President  
together with my letter to the Department of the 9th.  
July and also of the 29th January 1831 of which latter a  
copy is enclosed. I can not but presume myself that  
the changes in Section will be confirmed by the Presi-  
dents approbation and ~~for~~<sup>thus</sup> I hope you will be assured that the  
superior beauty of our coins, ~~will~~ <sup>will</sup> add much  
to the considerations above mentioned will  
prevail throw in the estimation of the public.

In reply to the inquiries contained in your letter of the 18th ult. I have to remark that the legal ~~regulations~~ <sup>Authorizations</sup> of the Mint are dispersed through the volumes of the laws of the U States. No summary of them has ever been published. The ~~regulations~~ <sup>which have been adopted</sup> however relate to the regulations ~~for~~ <sup>of</sup> the ~~mint~~ <sup>for</sup> the payment of the people of Apaying. This has never been defined by law. I had the honor to receive your letter  
of 9<sup>th</sup> instant.

I am quite sensible that Congress ought  
to have made provision for supplying at least  
the principal cities with correct copies of  
the standard weight of the Mint, and that  
we have no claim on the services of Mr Echfeldt,  
whose time is sufficiently engrossed by his official  
duties. Yet, without his kind assistance, the weights  
cannot be adjusted to the standard, and the expediency  
of having at least one set properly adjusted for this  
city is obvious.

I will therefore avail myself of your  
kind offer and request you to have a set of weights  
ranging from half a grain to five hundred dwt, made by your  
best artist, to be, in conformity with your opinion, separate and  
not in a cast, and each down to the one dwt, having a proper  
adjustment to lift it by, with an adjustment screw. And we  
will feel under considerable obligation to Mr Echfeldt

to compare and adjust them to the standard weight, as  
early as his occupations will permit.

The deficiency you find in the standard of the  
gold coins of England and France is still greater than  
I had expected from the assays made at the respective  
mints of both countries of the coins of the other. I do not  
approve of the value at which gold has been rated by the  
last law, as I feel great apprehension that its ultimate  
effect will be to drive away silver and to diminish instead  
of increasing the amount of our metallic currency. But it is  
highly proper at all events that the foreign gold coins should  
be converted into coins of the United States, and I cannot  
perceive any object in making them current. If there is any,  
they ought at least to be rated at no greater value than our own  
coins, and I hope that you will be able, from your careful  
assays principally on large amounts, to ascertain and suggest  
before the next meeting of Congress the proper rate to be  
fixed by law both for the French & the English coins.
