

Winnipeg, April 12.—The Great War Veterana' Association. of Manitoba, have requested the Dominion Govern-ment to permit them to bring "an ac-tion against the Crown in order to have it declared that any arrangement made by the Government with the Hutterites in 1915, whereby it purports to exempt them Arom military service could be declared unconstitutional, null and void." The veterans declare themselves as disatisfied with the Order-in-Council cancelling exemption privileges for all members of the Mennonits and Hut-terite brethren and want them kapt out of Canada until they sign a declaration of their intention to assume full respon-sibilities of Canadian citizenship, in-cluding the privilege of military services. According to Screetary Laws, of the becal office of the Veterans' Association, five carloads of offeets have left Emer-son for Ell, Man, and another colony is reported to be due to reach the hor-der within a week. Mr. Laws intimat-ad that veterans will build huts for heards pickets to prevent the crossing.

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#### THE ELECTION IN HULL.

It often has been said that Government reverses in by-elections in England should be regarded as being more the rule than the exception and devoid of any special political significance. Certain circumstances connected with the result in the contest in Central Hull yesterday, however, suggest a different interpretation. It was, we think, the third test of the sentiment of the electorate since the general election a few months ago and represents the second severe defeat of a Coalition candidate, while in the other instance the contestant endorsed by Mr. Lloyd George won by a greatly reduced majority. Yesterday a Coalition majority of more than 10,000 was converted into an anti-Coalition majority of nearly 1,000.

Local conditions may have had considerable to do with the result in each case, but after making due allowance for these it would appear that the tide of public sentiment is beginning to flow deeidedly against the Government. This is not sur-prising. We prophesied at the time of the general election that the Prime Minister's troubles would begin very quickly and that he would have a heavy storm to weather. In the first place the Govern ment's return was largely an emotional demonstration based upon recent victory. Secondly, the Government combines elements whose views on fundamental policies are in hopeless conflict, with reactionaries greatly outnumbering the reformers and progressives. Thirdly, Government candidates were pledged to insist upon certain strong peace terms which had to be obtained without modification or reservation.

It is probably the last factor on which the Coalition Government is breaking. While the Con-ference is determined to make Germany repair the damage she has done to the limit of her capacity, that limit, especially in the near future, may not be sufficient to meet the expectations raised by the candidates when they were appealing for votes in the height of the campaign. A few days ago 370 members of Parliament sent to Mr. Lloyd George a message demanding that he make out a bill against Germany for the full cost of the war, compel her to acknowledge it, and not until then should the ways and means of payment be dis-cussed. Mr. Lloyd George's reply was a threat to appeal to the country with the Peace Terms as the

The Premier is facing a difficult situation. He might have been in a better position to-day, per-haps, if at the general election he had pointed out that the terms of peace would have to be decided by all the Allies in Conference in which the United Kingdom would have but one voice; that it was vital that there should be harmony at the Conference, which otherwise would break up in disorder, with the result that the present Allies might be-come foes and Germany get off as lightly as France got off in 1815 owing to the conflict among the conferees at the Congress of Vienna. He could have explained that owing to the numerous conflicting interests among the Allies themselves the peace terms necessarily must be very considerably the result of compromise, and that what was even more important than great indemnities was the assurance of world peace for the future. This, however, he did not do, and now is being held to the absolute fulfillment of his promises. The electors plainly are dissatisfied with what they think is happening in Paris.

The difficulties of Mr. Lloyd George in the re lation of peace terms to the position of his Government, however, are mainly the difficulties of all other Governments represented at the Paris Conference. Their people, burning with their sense of wrong, suffering and sacrifice, naturally expect more at once than it is possible to collect even if the Allies occupied the whole of Germany, and if they are disappointed are likely to vent their wrath upon the negotiators. They have begun to suspect that their requirements are being pared down and political crises are i few of the countries interested. ending in not a In any event, another general election in the United Kingdom cannot be far away. The politi-cal atmosphere was not cleared by the appeal of a few months ago. Indeed, the circumstances under which that election was contested not unlikely made that atmosphere thicker. There heefy made that atmosphere theater. There was much manipulation of constituencies and too much "tactics" to allow the electors a free expression of opinion. And the publie temper is such at present that a free ex-pression of opinion at the polls would be a much-desired safety valve. Furthermore, Mr. Lloyd George must be anxious to' sever relations with the reactionary group with whom he is associated and who are driving him into the adoption of do-mestic policies to which he always has been resolutely opposed.

### PRACTICAL FARMING EDUCATION.

Not the least troublesome phase of the Empres of Asia community settlement scheme was the lack CIVIL SERVANTS of flexibility in the Federal loaning machinery as applicable to the non-skilled farm worker. Before advantage may be taken of the loan the applicant must satisfy the Soldier Settlement Board that he is sufficiently versed in the rural sciences to war rant assistance. The Asia delegation was assured that intending settlers under its plan would be Seek Allowance of Twentytrained in agriculture and paid during the process at the rate of \$50 monthly in the case of a married man, and proportionately less where the applican was single.

This is, of course, an excellent arrangement so far as it goes. But it occurs to us that the demand for farm laborers in the neighboring provinces at the present time supplies a medium through which first-rate experience may be obtained at a fair rate of pay and at once. This is not to suggest by any means that the returned soldier who has set his mind on settling in British Columbia permanently should migrate to the Prairie provinces with an intention of remaining there, but it appears to be norning. Premier Oliver replied that he was an opportunity of acquiring, at fair pay, such quali-fleations as are demanded by the Dominion Board in the matter of loans.

It is easy to understand that the prospect of training fifteen hundred men at a cost of \$50 per month each within the next month is remote. According to urgent telegrams received by the Pro-vincial Labor Bureau in this city, however, this is the number wanted immediately at various points in the Prairie provinces at wages ranging from \$65 to \$75 per month, including board. If the Dominion Government desires to train the intending agriculturalist at some cost to the State here is at least an opportunity to defray the traveling expenses, back and forth, of those men who may favor this mode of gaining rural education.

"There is a feeling in the outer country," said Mr. Pattulio, "that Vic-toria and Vancouver wish to hog every-thing. There are also to people in the cities who think that those who are living outside cannot be worth very much or they would be in Victoria or Vancouver. You want to get away from that idea. What we want to do is to get together. When we develop the outside country we must remember that we are increasing the trade and industry of our cities.
