UNDER INFLUENCE OF SOVIET GOVERNMENTS

German-Austria Affected by Changes at Munich and Budapest

Vienna, April 12.—(Associated Press).—German Austria is coming under the influence of the establishment of Soviet Governments in Munich and Budapest. At Donawitz, ten thousand workers in the iron smelting plants have driven out the managers because the latter have refused to grant increased wages. The coal miners there are reported to have considered similar action, and there is prospect that the employees of the iron mines will take over control

of the properties and elect their own managers.

Bank clerks at Vienna are demanding higher salaries. At one bank the salaries paid before the war totaled eleven million crowns, which amount was increased during the war to twenty-five million, which will make a sum equal to the yearly dividends of the bank before the war.

The communists of German Austria have been told that if communism is adopted here the Allies would cut off food supplies, but this argument has been removed since the Allies have appeared willing to treat with the communists at Budapest.

Italy has offered the German-Austrian republic to disband and disarm any troops regarded as pro-communist.

At Budapest.

The situation at Budapest prevents Vienna banks from making up their yearly statements. It is impossible as yet to estimate the value of securities held by Hungary, and it is said that even if Hungary should agree to make settlements with the German-Austrian Republic, any money she might offer would be without value. Business at Vienna is at a standstill with the banks operating virtually as Government tax offices.

"The only salvation here is to kill Bolshevism with work," said Dr. Alfred Trechot, director of the Anglo-Austrian Bank to-day, "but we cannot give work unless we can secure raw materials from abroad."

IRISH-AMERICANS AT FRENCH CAPITAL

Seek to Present Ireland's Case Before Conference at Paris


Paris, April 12.—The three delegates chosen by the Irish societies of the United States to appeal to the peace conference on behalf of Ireland arrived in Paris yesterday. They are Edward F. Dunne, of Illinois, Michael J. Ryan, of Philadelphia, and Frank P. Walsh, of Kansas City.

The delegates will ask to be heard by the council of four to place before them the case of Ireland and demand that the question be dealt with according to the principles of President Wilson and the right of self-determination. They were met at the St. Nazaire station by Sean O'Connell (John O'Leary), the delegate of the provisional Irish Republic to the conference, and George G. Duffy, member of the British Parliament for South Dublin. Duffy and O'Connell told them the big powers would refuse to hear and receive them, but the Americans were not deterred and will ask President Wilson to grant them an audience.

Former Governor Dunne, in referring to the audience given by President Wilson to an Irish delegation when the President was in America early in March, and from which Justice C. J. Van Dusen, of New York, was excluded, said: "At that time the question put to President Wilson by the delegation was: 'Are you prepared to vindicate before the peace conference the right of Ireland to dispose of herself according to the principles laid down in your fourteen points?'"

"The President's reply then was: 'Surely, you do not think that I can answer this question now.'"

"We then informed the President we were in no hurry and were prepared to wait for his answer, and were even willing to journey to Paris in order to obtain it. President Wilson now has had sufficient time to reflect. We have come to Paris for his answer."

PORTLAND TROLLEY CAR OPERATIVES PRESENT DEMANDS

Portland, Ore., April 12.—Trolley car operatives employed by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company on its urban lines, yesterday presented demands, effective April 1, for increased wages from their present schedule of wages, now 46, 48 and 50 cents an hour, according to length of service, to 55, 58 and 60 cents, respectively. Franklin J. Griffith, president of the company, announced after receipt of the demands that no further rise in wages at this time could be granted. The present schedule was placed in effect by the Federal war labor board last October, and under the agreement then signed the wage question could be reopened by either party at six months' intervals. The first six months expired April 1. Interurban lines of the company are not affected by the demand.

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THE ELECTION IN HULL.

It often has been said that Government reverses in by-elections in England should be regarded as being more the rule than the exception and devoid of any special political significance.

Local conditions may have had considerable to do with the result in each case, but after making due allowance for these it would appear that the tide of public sentiment is beginning to flow decidedly against the Government.

It is probably the last factor on which the Coalition Government is breaking. While the Conference is determined to make Germany repair the damage she has done to the limit of her capacity, that limit, especially in the near future, may not be sufficient to meet the expectations raised by the candidates when they were appealing for votes in the height of the campaign.

The Premier is facing a difficult situation. He might have been in a better position to-day, perhaps, if at the general election he had pointed out that the terms of peace would have to be decided by all the Allies in Conference in which the United Kingdom would have but one voice.

The difficulties of Mr. Lloyd George in the relation of peace terms to the position of his Government, however, are mainly the difficulties of all other Governments represented at the Paris Conference.

In any event, another general election in the United Kingdom cannot be far away. The political atmosphere was not cleared by the appeal of a few months ago.

THE NEED OF CO-OPERATION.

Perhaps the most serious year's work ever faced by the Victoria Board of Trade was commenced yesterday when it elected its new officers for the ensuing twelve months and listened to the annual address from a Cabinet Minister.

What has been done under war conditions can be continued during the days of peace to come.

Board of Trade can do much. It should be the premier business institution of any city. Each individual member should consider his membership synonymous with a definite obligation to his community.

In his address yesterday afternoon the Hon. T. D. Pattullo urged the need for co-operation. He suggested a trip through the Province, organized by the Boards of Trade of this city and Vancouver, so that both bodies might realize British Columbia's potentialities.

We congratulate Mr. J. O. Cameron upon his selection as President of the Board, and the Board upon its choice of presiding officer. Mr. Cameron is a progressive businessman and a loyal and enthusiastic Victorian and will prove a worthy successor to Mr. Kingham in the presidential chair.

PRACTICAL FARMING EDUCATION.

Not the least troublesome phase of the Empire of Asia community settlement scheme was the lack of flexibility in the Federal loaning machinery as applicable to the non-skilled farm worker.

This is, of course, an excellent arrangement so far as it goes. But it occurs to us that the demand for farm laborers in the neighboring provinces at the present time supplies a medium through which first-rate experience may be obtained at a fair rate of pay and at once.

It is easy to understand that the prospect of training fifteen hundred men at a cost of \$50 per month each within the next month is remote. According to urgent telegrams received by the Provincial Labor Bureau in this city, however, this is the number wanted immediately at various points in the Prairie provinces.

CANON HINCHLIFFE'S PROPOSAL.

It is to be regretted that Canon Hinchcliffe's proposal for a Peace Thank-offering and a universal Tag Day has apparently not found favor with the Dominion Executive of the Army and Navy Veterans' Association.

No matter how embracing the pension scheme may be, however, so long as suffering exists it will have to be ameliorated by other means if the dependent or the returned man himself has no legal claim on the authorities.

Quebec says it prefers beer and light wines to total prohibition. In enacting its proposed prohibition legislation Parliament likely will note that preference and make such provision as will permit Quebec to have what she wants.

It is announced from Paris that the Council of Four has reached an agreement on all subjects. Let us hope that agreement provides ample reparation by Germany for the damage she has done and for the punishment of those responsible for the war and the hideous outrages perpetrated in Germany's name—from the late Kaiser down.

One of the vital contributing factors towards Allied victory was superiority in aircraft, in type of machine, in skill and in daring. British Columbians have heard a great deal about aeroplane spruce in terms of feet, which convey little.

THE ANSWER.

The Manufacturers' Association asks "where will the revenue come from?" If material reductions are made in the Canadian tariff, the answer is that, at the expense of the poor, the tariff in Canada provides a larger percentage of the national revenue than it does in any other important industrial country.

AGENT-GENERAL CABLES DENIAL

Mr. Wade Assures Premier Oliver There is No Advertising for Laborers

Reports from various sources have reached Premier Oliver to the effect that the Agent-General in London was advertising British Columbia as offering employment to intending emigrants.

The Agent-General has cabled back this morning that he knows of no single laborer who has gone from the Old Country in response to any such publicity.

Mr. Wade also says it is probable that many Old Countrymen may have left England on the strength of the glowing pictures painted by the famous legions from this Province.

CIVIL SERVANTS ASK AN INCREASE

An increase by way of an allowance of at least twenty-five per cent. to be added to the salaries of all civil servants, to date from April 1, 1919, and to continue in effect until such time as the revision of salaries and grading, provided for by the Civil Service Act, is completed and in operation.

Premier Oliver replied that he was not in a position to give an immediate answer, he would necessarily require to take the matter under advisement with his colleagues. He assured the delegation, however, that the Association's memorial would receive consideration and that a reply thereto would not be unduly delayed.

The lengthy memorial, left with the Cabinet to digest, very carefully sets out details as to the rise in cost of living and its terms generally are designed to give practical justification to the Association's request.

INTERNATIONAL REGULATION OF ALL LABOR CONDITIONS EMBODIED IN FINAL REPORT

The entire consideration of the Conference centred in the belief that universal peace could be established only if based on social justice.

The first meeting is recommended for next October at Washington. The programme will embrace the principle of the eight-hour day and the forty-eight-hour week, prevention of unemployment, women's employment before and after childbirth, women and children's employment during the night or in unhealthy processes, a minimum wage for the employment of children, the extension of the International Conventions adopted in Bern in 1906 prohibiting night work by women and the use of white phosphorus in the manufacture of matches.

The report says that an International labor office is to be established at the seat of the League of Nations as a part of the League to collect and distribute information on the international adjustment of conditions of industrial life and labor; subjects which it is proposed to bring before the Conference; the conduct of special investigations as ordered by the Conference, the preparation of a newspaper in the French, English and German languages, and generally to act as a clearing house on matters of international labor.

This office is to be controlled by a governing body of twenty-four, of whom twelve are to be selected by the Governments, each elected by delegates at a conference representing employees and workers respectively.

Machinery also has been provided by which a State failing to carry out its obligations may be subjected to pressure. An industrial association, employers or workers, may make representations to the International labor office, which governing body may communicate to the state criticized. If no satisfactory reply is received the office, the report says, probably would create considerable moral pressure.

The governing body may apply to the Secretary-General of the League of Nations to appoint a commission of inquiry to investigate the reports and recommend economic pressure if desired.

TORONTO-HAMILTON AIRPLANE EXPRESS SERVICE ESTABLISHED

Toronto, April 12.—An airplane express service has been started between Toronto and Hamilton by P. G. Erickson, the first trip being made yesterday by Pilot A. E. Parsons. The first load of merchandise was a motion picture, which will be regularly delivered in this manner to the Ambitious City. The returned flight occupied forty-five minutes.

IMPROVEMENT OF PUBLIC HOSPITALS. President of Catholic Hospital Association Will Be Here Thursday

Milwaukee, Wis., March 12.—To promote the international hospital improvement movement Rec. C. B. Mouliner, President of the Catholic Hospital Association and regent of Marquette University School of Medicine, Milwaukee, and John G. Bowman, Chicago, director of the American College of Surgeons, are now making a tour of inspection of the hospital of the west, southwest and northwest.

REV. C. B. MOULINIER. members of the National Committee on Standardization of Hospitals, whose whole aim is to bring about more scientific service in hospitals.

This is a campaign preliminary to a rating of all hospitals which will come within a year or two, when the hospitals' standing will be given to the public as an A, B, C, D or E institution. The committee is considerate and patient, and does not wish to embarrass any institution, but will insist upon proper service.

In each city Father Mouliner and Mr. Bowman will meet the fellows of the American College of Surgeons and the hospital people for a radius of 300 or 400 miles. The object of seeking improvements in hospitals is to obtain for the patient as near as possible 100 per cent. medical service.

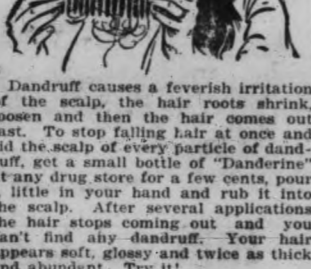

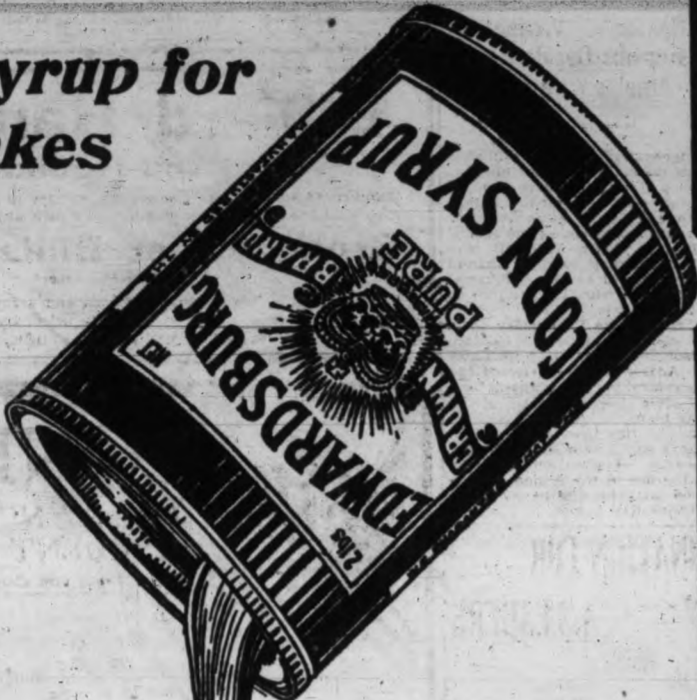

URGE EXTENSION OF ROSS BAY CEMETERY

Alderman Thinks Scheme Would Delay Final Pur- chase of New Site

The forced extension of the present Ross Bay Cemetery by taking in a piece of the Fairfield Road will be recommended to the City Council on Monday night by the Works Committee which approved the plan yesterday afternoon. As there was strong opposition in the committee and as a considerable number of Aldermen were absent it is thought quite probable that the proposal will be defeated by the Council.

Commencing the debate on the proposed extension Alderman Sargent pointed out the piece on the south side of Fairfield Road added to the Cemetery would provide for eight years' burying, or some 450 grave sites. In addition, the ratepayers on the other side of the road needed some sort of relief from taxes. This would be provided if the road were narrowed and the taxes as a result reduced.

The "jog" which the extension of the cemetery would cause to the course of the road was a very objectionable feature in the mind of Mayor Porter. "In a few years," declared Alderman Johns, "we will reverse the whole plan and take out the 'jog' and put the fence back."

The expropriation of the sixteen feet as an addition to the present cemetery would delay the purchase of a large site for a new burial place. And the delay, Alderman Johns thought, would mean that the site would cost more.

Alderman Cameron objected to the narrowing of streets under sixty feet in width.

After some discussion the Council also decided to demolish the present house used by the caretaker, to make room for 175 graves.

GRADE STREET BEFORE SITE OF NEW CHURCH

City to Proceed With Blasting in Front of Christian Science Church Property

In order that the building of the new Christian Science Church may proceed without delay that part of Pandora Avenue in front of the site will be graded immediately. It was decided by the Streets Committee of the City Council yesterday afternoon. Blasting operation will also be commenced.

The cost of grading Pandora Avenue from Cook Street to Fort Street, according to the estimate filed by City Engineer F. M. Preston would be \$25,000. The total length of the strip is nearly 4,000 feet, and the total cost of the completed work with a forty-six feet asphalt roadway and two six-foot sidewalks of concrete will amount to about \$90,000. Sixty per cent. of the property owners have signed the proposed agreement with the city.

It was pointed out to the Works Committee that should the building of the church proceed before the grading and blasting had been done, the structure would be severely damaged by the concussion of the blasting operations later on. As the officials of the church were anxious to build the new institution at an early date, speed in the transaction was necessary.

The committee agreed to do the grading in front of the church property "but conditional upon the church not holding the corporation liable should such grade not be established or being departed from." The Engineer will be instructed to proceed with the blasting in front of the church site as soon as the agreement has been signed.

WOULD INVESTIGATE CITY'S RECREATION

Deputation From Y. M. C. A. Waits on Aldermen to Urge Plan

A plan whereby public recreation as now existing would be thoroughly investigated and placed under the control of a widely representative organization was laid before the Parks Committee of the City Council yesterday afternoon by a deputation from the Y. M. C. A. The members of the deputation were G. Bell, Dr. M. Raynor, C. Little and James Thompson.

It was finally decided to refer the matter to the Parks Committee. The proposition submitted suggested that a strong non-political committee representing the leading organizations of the city should be formed, and that this committee should make a careful study of the community's needs in connection with recreation. It would investigate such establishments as dance halls, bowling alleys and moving picture shows, and would determine whether the conditions at present obtaining were satisfactory or not. The committee would then proceed to draw up a plan which would cover the needs of the community. The plan also suggested that adequate provision for the parks be secured. The cost of supervising play in the Central, Beacon Hill and Victoria West Parks would cost \$1,550 for the three summer months.

Necessity for Parks.
As a result of the general use of vacant lots for increased production, said Dr. Raynor, the children were forced to play on the streets. The improvements of parks was therefore particularly necessary.

The Log of the Legislature By Rexniph Chapter I.

The third session of the fourteenth Parliament of British Columbia will go down in history as one of the most momentous in the annals of the Province.

No Provincial Government has responded so readily and so completely to the Western spirit as has that of British Columbia. And it must not be forgotten that the Western spirit, as exhibited in the Pacific Province is far in advance of that manifested in any other part of Canada.

These problems are not new. They have been accentuated, however—all of them—by the fact that the war of the entire and fully one-fifth of the producing population.

To command the situation, provide against distress, unemployment, unrest among struggling citizens who kept the home fires burning, as well as reassure the feverish, war-weary, listening to chatter, weeping over wasted time, watching men spar for position, back and fill, acquiesce, retreat, bluff, brag, bluster, play buffoon, sit silent and reflective, assume a virtuous plot, scheme, connive, shout affirmation or make dumb show of hands, lead, mislead, throw dust, hold a set course, stand pat, counter-thrust, parry, snarl, laugh, keep right on—in fact, all the things that one sees, looking down on a new world in the making, by men who had had to live in the old world, this day after day, and, latterly night after night; to moralize on these things, write them down and afterward to tell them is the purpose of this "Log of the Legislature."

Right creditably the task has been performed. It may be assumed that the Government had not been napping. Perhaps its first duty was to organize order out of chaos. It is known that literally hundreds of schemes for soldier re-establishment had been submitted. Boards of trade, reconstruction groups, soldier organizations, women's institutes, social service leagues, municipal councils, labor organizations, nondescript local committees, as well as hundreds of private citizens, outlined plans and submitted schemes which were the "last word" in the solution of the soldier problem.

Those who should be in a position to know state that the Government never was in doubt as to how far it was willing to go. It appeared wise, however, to do nothing rashly, but allow time to disclose the temper of the people and ascertain to what extent legislation somewhat radical—when viewed from past standards—might have the endorsement and approval of the solid citizenship of the country upon whose shoulders the burden of rehabilitation must fall.

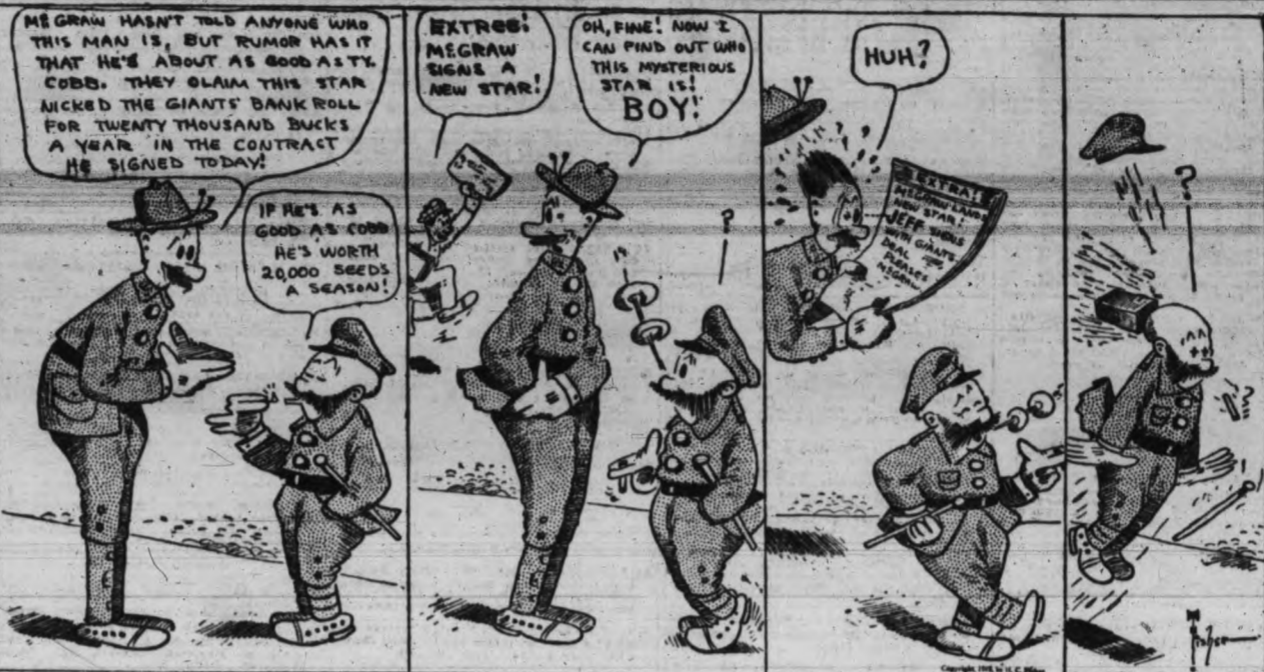

PROTEST ON REPORTED RAILWAY SUSPENSION

Views of Saanich Council Will Go to Ottawa; Taxes Due in October

A protest against the reported intention of the Victoria & Sidney Railway to suspend operations was laid before the Saanich Council last night by the Saanich Fruit Growers' Association.

The Council decided that for this year the ratepayers who make their payments on or before October 15 should have the advantage of the net rate, this decision being required by amendments to the Municipal Act made at the last session of the Legislature.

A by-law framed to check the damage done by heavy vehicles on the municipal roads was put through the committee stage. The by-law would give the Council power to prohibit the passing over the roads of any traffic it considers harmful.

The date of the annual tax sale was set for September 2, and a by-law to give effect to the Council's decision on the matter was put through its first readings.

The Council decided to take no action to make early closing effective in Saanich, as the storekeepers of the district had expressed no desire that such action would be taken.

Councillors Graham and Henderson were named to represent the municipality at the forthcoming inter-state real estate convention in this city.

BUSINESS OF CITY CLIMBS UPWARDS

Board of Trade Annual Report Contains Interesting Statements; Officers Elected

Business in Victoria during the twelve months ending March 31 expanded remarkably over the trade of the preceding year. The annual report of the Board of Trade submitted at the meeting yesterday afternoon showed that the past year was most profitable.

In part the report reads: "It is expected that the Dominion Government will immediately arrange for commencing some productive public works. Our returning soldiers who have shown valor in every field of battle, are entitled to have their country be able to offer them, moreover, judicious expenditure on productive public works in this particularly virgin western territory could be made a remunerative investment, increasing the permanent prosperity of Canada."

THE FUR TRADE. C. H. French, of Victoria, Speaks on Subject of Fur-Bearing Animals. In his address before 200 Rotarians in Vancouver on Thursday evening, Charles H. French, local manager of the Hudson's Bay Company and Fur Commissioner for the Province of British Columbia and the Yukon Territory, dealt at length on the subject of fur-bearing animals in this Province.

Mr. French has spent a great deal of time in the Hudson's Bay Company's forts and among the fur districts. His excellent and well-delivered lecture was interspersed with illuminating touches of personal experience and close observation of the habits of the fur-bearing animals of the Coast.

Mr. French first displayed a large number of lantern slides of scenes from some of the districts in which the Hudson's Bay Company operates, showing haunts of the animals. Pictures were also exhibited of the methods of capture and of the animals themselves. The lecturer then exhibited raw skins of the beaver, the otter, mink, martyn, Alaska sable and other fur-bearing animals, devoting a few remarks to each as to the manner in which the skins were prepared for the market, their value, the way the Indians secured them, and other instructive information.
