ASKS IF WOMEN HAVE SOULS

George Harvey Says Pentateuch and Talmud Give No Recognition

Suggests Ten Commandments Be Revised
London, Oct. 24.—"Have women souls?" was a question placed before the Authors' Club last night by George Harvey, the American Ambassador, who was the principal guest at a dinner given by the club. Mr. Harvey delved deeply into the Pentateuch, the Zoroastrian and the Talmud, pointing out that there was no recognition in the Decalogue of the possession of souls or inherent rights by women and that the Ten Commandments were written for men and apply exclusively to men. The Ambassador asserted that theory and practice, as well as logic and reason, "drive us to the conclusion that either the commandments requirements of modern conditions or a specific Decalogue should be constructed exclusively for women." As theologians apparently were unable or unwilling to undertake this, Mr. Harvey said he commended the solution of the problem to the Authors' Club.

RUMANIA TO REPAY DEBT TO U. S.

Total of \$31,000,000 Owed by Balkan Country

Conversion Arrangements With International Group
Washington, Oct. 23.—The Rumanian Government has arranged with an international group of bankers for the conversion of \$15,690,000 of its short term Treasury notes, it was announced today in a statement issued by the Rumanian legation here. At the same time it was said that the question of Rumanian debts to the United States Government, aggregating \$31,000,000, soon would be taken up by a commission from that country, which will come to the United States for the purpose. "Concerning the question of Rumanian debts to the Government of the United States," the statement said, "we are informed that the Rumanian Government has designated two of its leading financial experts, Mr. Eftimie Antonesco and Mr. Antoniu, to conduct the necessary negotiations with the Government of the United States, which will leave shortly for Washington."

IMMIGRATION SHOWS DECREASE

88,999 People Entered Canada During Year Ended March 31 Last

Ottawa, Oct. 24.—Immigrants who entered Canada during the fiscal year ended March 31, 1922, numbered just one short of 89,000 persons, a decrease of thirty-nine per cent, as compared with the previous twelve months, when 148,477 persons entered Canada. Immigrant arrivals from the United Kingdom during the year numbered 39,020, as compared with 74,262 the previous year. Persons coming from the United States totalled 29,245. The previous year's total was 48,959. Immigrants from other countries during the year totalled 21,534, as against 28,158 in 1920-21. During the fiscal year 47,898 persons sought admission at United States border points and of these 18,553 were turned back. Chinese immigration decreased from 2,435 in 1920-21 to 1,746 last year. Japanese immigration decreased from 1,322 to 471 in the same time, and only thirteen Hindus were admitted during the year.

NEW MARKETS FOR AUSTRALIAN FRUIT

Government Assists the Export Industry
London, Oct. 24.—(Canadian Press Cable)—Reuter's Melbourne correspondent cables that the Australian Federal Government has agreed to contribute £11,000 to assist the fruit industry to find new markets overseas. The Government has also agreed to waive the proposed inspection fee of half a penny in the case of exported fresh fruit.

WOMAN FELL DEAD IN YARD

Okanagan, Wash., Oct. 24.—Mrs. Bertha Fitzpatrick, a fruit grower of Pogue Flat, living about four miles north of Okanagan, dropped dead in her yard yesterday and was found by her thirteen-year-old daughter. She leaves a brother living in Vancouver, B. C., and a sister, who has been notified of her death. She was a native of Canada, but had lived on her orchard for the past fourteen years. Her husband died thirteen years ago.

ASSIZE COURT HELD IN VERNON

Vernon, B. C., Oct. 24.—The Fall assize court opened here yesterday afternoon with Mr. Justice Gregory presiding. Five criminal cases are on the docket, including Rex vs. Clough-ton, Pentiction. This is a case arising out of beer and liquor charges recently heard at Jentiction. Other cases are: Rex vs. Hallam, Kelowna, charged with carnal knowledge; Rex vs. Ballentine, wounding a buckskin mare; Rex vs. Shaw, Armstrong, perjury; Rex vs. Krabs, cattle stealing.

PARTY POLITICS PLEA OF ROGERS

Canadian ex-Minister of Public Works Scores Alliances
Montreal, Oct. 24.—A straight call for a return to party politics and a dropping of all entangling alliances, either by the Conservative or any other party, was issued here last night by Hon. Robert Rogers, ex-Minister of Public Works, who is in the city conferring with a number of leaders of the Conservative party. Mr. Rogers, discussing public affairs, said there were great possibilities in the Western provinces where this year's harvest would bring in not less than \$500,000,000 of new money. He added, however, that means must be found whereby the producers of Western Canada might get a fair return for their time and money. "Not a prairie farmer is making money this year despite the crops," he claimed. He alleged that considerable complaint existed regarding freight rates from Fort William eastward, and ascribed adverse conditions to the lack of stable government during the last four years.

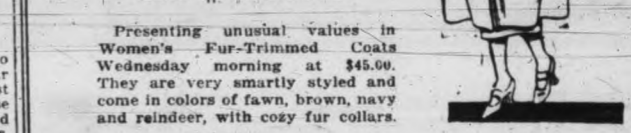

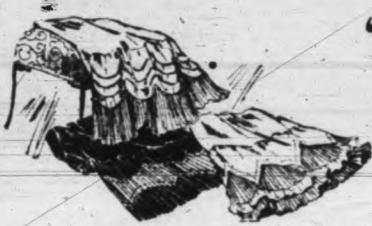

The Assyrians a Nation of Warriors

Problems in History

Do you know—

Who built the colossal Pyramids of Egypt and why?

Do you know—

Where the word paper had its origin?

Do you know—

The strange ancient people who considered that to eat the flesh of the dead was to honor the departed?

What race once worshipped a goddess whose earthly representations was the hippopotamus?

Higher up the Tigris, above the clay lands and with easy supplies of workable stone, a Semitic people, the Assyrians, while the Sumerians were still unconquered by the Semites, were settling about a number of cities of which Assur and Nineveh were the chief. Their peculiar physiognomy, the long nose and thick lips, was very like that of the commoner type of Polish Jew to-day. They wore great beards and ringletted long hair, tall caps and long robes.

First to Use the Horse and Chariot.

They were constantly engaged in mutual raiding with the Hittites to the west; they were conquered by Sargon I. and became free again.

This is a story of conquest following after conquest, and each conquest replaces old rulers and ruling classes by new races like the Sumerian and the Elamite are swallowed up, their languages vanish, their interbreed and are lost, the Assyrian melts away into Chaldean and Syrian, the Hittites become Aryanized and lost distinction, the Semites who swallowed up the Sumerians give place to Aryan rulers, Medes and Persians appear in the place of the Elamites, the Aryan Persian language dominates the empire until the Aryan Greek ousts it from official life.

The Vital Powers of Civilization.

Meanwhile the plow does its work year by year, the harvests are gathered, the builders build as they are told, the tradesmen work and acquire fresh devices; the knowledge of writing spreads, novel things—the horse and wheeled vehicles and iron—are introduced and become part of the permanent inheritance of mankind; the volume of trade upon sea and desert increases, men's ideas widen and knowledge grows. There are setbacks, massacres, pestilence; but the story is, on the whole, one of enlargement.

For four thousand years this new thing, civilization, which had set its root into the soil of the two rivers, grew as a tree grows; now losing a limb, now stripped by a storm, but always growing and resuming its growth. After four thousand years the warriors and conquerors were still going to and fro over this growing thing they did not understand, but need had now (330 B.C.) got iron, horses, writing, and computation, money, a greater variety of foods and textiles, a wider knowledge of their world.

The time that elapsed between the empire of Sargon I. and the conquest of Babylon by Alexander the Great was as long, he it noted, at the least estimate, as the time from Alexander the Great to the present day. And before the time of Sargon men had been settled in the Sumerian land, living in towns, worshipping in temples, following an orderly Neolithic agricultural life in an organized community for at least as long again.

"Eridu, Lagash, Uruk, Larsa, have already an immemorial past when first they appear in history."

One of the most difficult things

certain Tushratta, King of Mitanni, to the northwest, captured and held their capital, Nineveh, for a time, they intrigued with Egypt against Babylon and were in the pay of Egypt; they developed the military art to a very high pitch, and became mighty rulers and exacters of tribute; and at last, adopting the horse and the war chariot, they settled accounts for a time with the Hittites, and then, under Tiglath Pileser I., conquered Babylon for themselves (about 1100 B.C.).

But their hold on the lower, older and more civilized land was not secure, and Nineveh, the stone city, as distinguished from Babylon, the brick city, remained their capital. For many centuries now, awayed, between Nineveh and Babylon, and sometimes it was an Assyrian, and sometimes a Babylonian who claimed to be "king of the world."

For four centuries Assyria was restrained from expansion towards Egypt by a fresh northward thrust and settlement of another group of Semitic peoples, the Arameans, whose chief city was Damascus and

for both the writer and student of history is to sustain the sense of these time-intervals and prevent these ages becoming shortened by perspective in his imagination. Half the duration of human civilization and the keys to all its chief institutions are to be found before Sargon I.

These descendants are the Syrians of to-day. (There is, we may note, no connection whatever between the words Assyrian and Syrian. It is an accidental similarity.) Across these Syrians the Assyrian kings fought for power and expansion southwestward.

Deportation of the "Lost Tribes" of Israel.

In 745 B.C. arose another Tiglath Pileser, Tiglath Pileser III, the Tiglath Pileser of the Bible. He not only directed the transfer of the Israelites to Media (the "Lost Ten Tribes" whose ultimate fate has exercised so many curious minds) but he conquered and ruled Babylon, so founding what historians knew as the New Assyrian Empire. His son, Sennacherib, died during the siege of Samaria, and was succeeded by an usurper, who, no doubt to flatter Babylonian susceptibilities, took the ancient Akkadian Sumerian name of Sargon, Sargon II. He seems to have armed the Assyrian forces for the first time with iron weapons. It was probably Sargon II, who actually carried out the deportation of the Ten Tribes.

Such shiftings about of population became a very distinctive part of the political methods of the Assyrian new empire. Whole nations who were difficult to control in their native country would be shifted en masse to unaccustomed regions and amidst strange neighbors, where their only hope of survival would lie in obedience to the supreme power.

Sargon's son, Sennacherib, led the Assyrian hosts to the borders of Egypt. There Sennacherib's army was smitten by a pestilence, a disaster—described in the nineteenth chapter of the Second Book of Kings. "And it came to pass that night, that the angel of the Lord went out, and smote in the camp of the Assyrians an hundred fourscore and five thousand; and when they arose early in the morning, behold, they were all dead corpses." So Sennacherib king of Assyria departed, and went and returned, and dwelt at Nineveh.

Sennacherib's grandson, Ashurbanipal (called by the Greeks "Ananias"), did succeed in conquering—and for a time holding—lower Egypt.

The Assyrian empire lasted only 130 years at Sargon II. Fresh nomadic Semites coming from the southeast, the Chaldeans, assisted by two Aryan-speaking peoples from the north, the Medes and Persians, combined against it, and took Nineveh in 606 B.C.

So the story goes on. In 330 B.C., as we shall tell later in some detail, a Greek conqueror, Alexander the Great, is looking on the murdered body of the last of the Persian rulers.

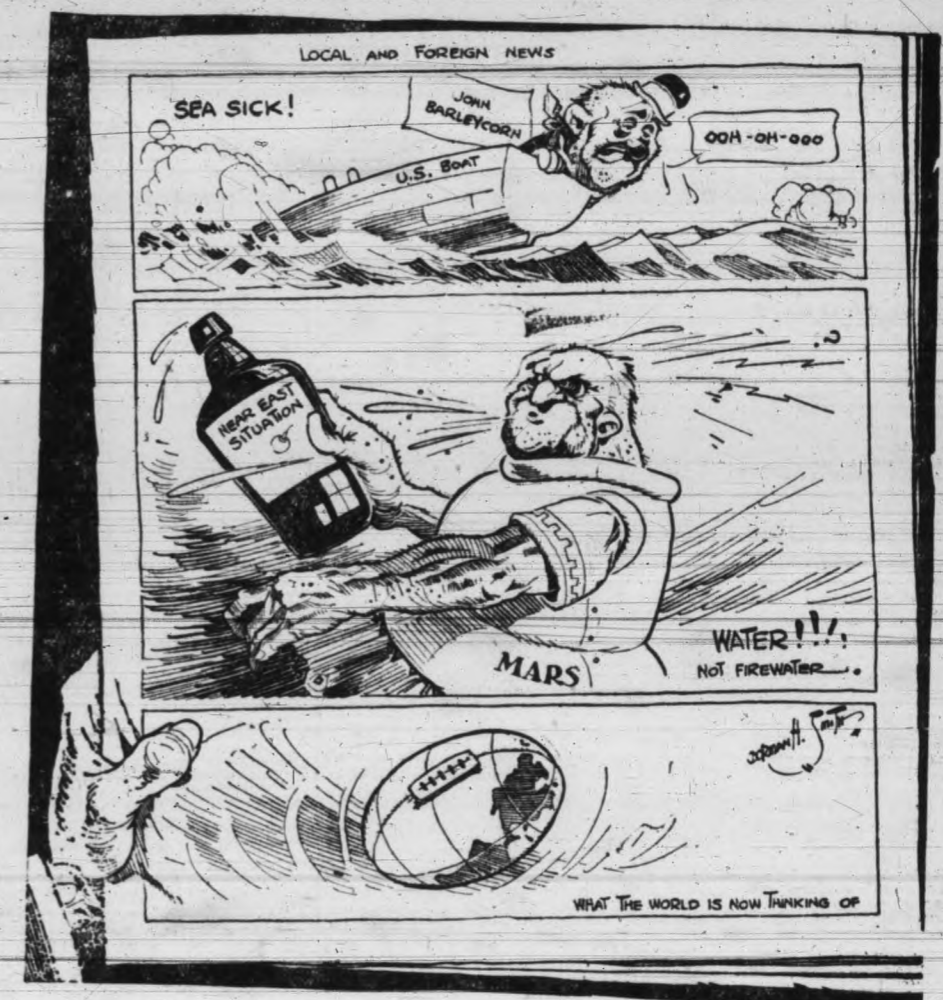

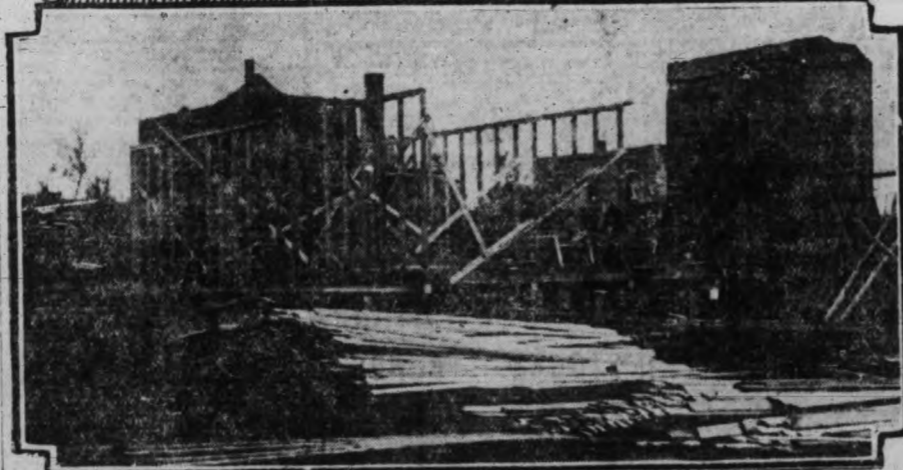

PLAN TO GRADE NEW RENT TAX

Council Also Askes Power to Raise License Fees If It Sees Fit

Must Have More Money, Aldermen Explain; Woodward Fights New Levy

In addition to securing power to tax the rental value of all businesses here, the city will ask the Provincial Legislature next month to allow it to raise its present license fees as much as it sees fit. Whether license fees and a rental value tax both will be collected will depend upon the 1923 Council. The present Council decided last night, however, that it should possess power to secure revenue from both sources.

The Council, as forecasted in last night's issue of The Times, decided also to seek power to grade the new rental value tax so that it may be levied with the least inequity possible. Under the city's private bill, as amended last night, the Council can fix varying rental value taxes on different classes of business. Thus a high tax would be charged on profitable businesses, such as jewelry stores, that occupy smaller premises and a small tax would be levied on businesses, like wholesale grocers, that occupy large, expensive premises but make relatively lower profits.

Fights New Levy.

Alderman Woodward fought vigorously last night against the imposition of a rental value tax under any system of classification. "Instead of asking power to levy taxes of this kind it would be far better to levy an income tax large enough to raise all the revenue we need," he said. "Instead of levying an income tax that will raise \$200,000 next year, let us levy one that will raise all the revenue we require. The money comes out of the same pockets but, under an income tax, we would get the money according to ability to pay. The rental value tax, on the other hand, is based on no such sound principle.
