Note by the Secretary General

ENCLOSUREPOLICY ON SILK PRODUCTION IN JAPAN

1. The questions raised by you concerning the policy to be followed for Japanese silk production have been considered with the State Department which advises as follows:

2. Except for plantations whose trees or bushes are ready because of age or for some other reason to be replaced, it is considered on basis information available here that mulberry areas should not be reduced except in cases where they occupy land which would be especially productive if used for food. While a major aim is to maximize food production, it is recognized that silk constitutes an important foreign trade item and the most readily accessible means of creating foreign exchange to pay for imports and, therefore, silk production should not be reduced without corresponding economic benefits.

3. Within broad policies laid down by you, maximum responsibility for formulating and executing food and agriculture programs should be placed upon Japanese authorities. However, these programs including mulberry acreage, should be formulated by Japanese with the advice and approval of your agricultural experts.

4. Until such time as food import requirements are calculated and export target for silk established, unable to give definite policy guidance based on relative considerations of necessity for food production as against mulberry production. Further, until extent of full import program for Japan is known, unable to reach definite conclusions based on evaluation of necessity for silk production as means of creating foreign exchange with which to pay for imports. For the present, in view of greater amount of detailed information available to you, specific quantity of mulberry acreage is left for your decision within the general policy outlined above.

5. Direction to continue price stabilization program is not contained in present draft of economic directive now under active consideration. In accordance with paragraph 3 above, determination

concerning revival price stabilization program should be made by Japanese authorities subject advice and approval your agricultural experts.

6. Not yet possible advise concerning quantity and types silk desired as target for export. Will be transmitted to you as soon as possible.

7. Advice on channels to be used for export will be furnished later. Prices for silk will be furnished you on spot basis at your request.

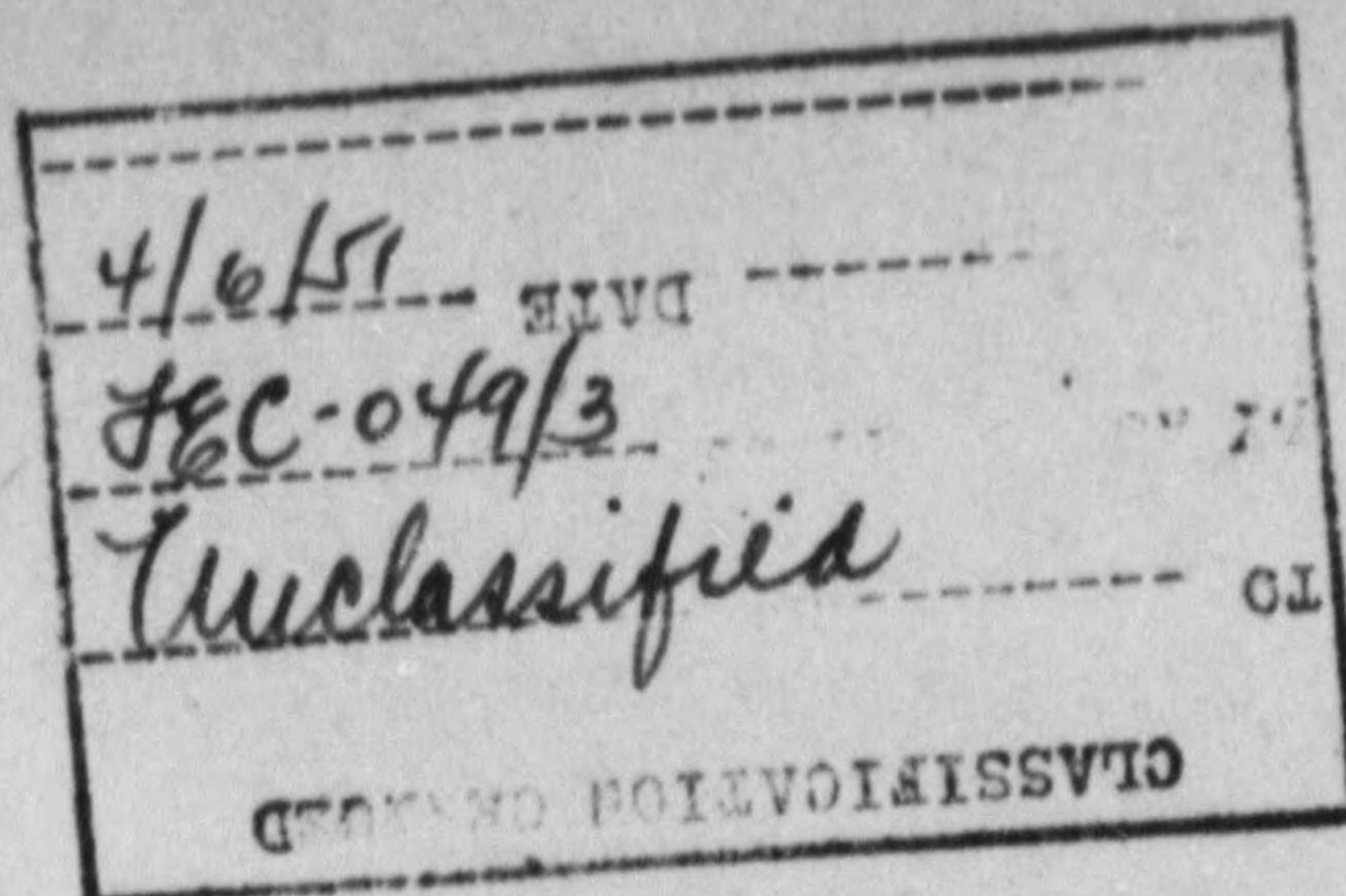

ENCLOSUREPOLICY REGARDING RELATIONS OF NEUTRAL
DIPLOMATIC MISSIONS WITH JAPANESE GOVERNMENT

The following has been prepared by the State Department:

1. The existence of diplomatic missions to the Japanese Government is not deemed consistent with the purposes and character of allied occupation of Japan or with the position of the occupying authorities.

2. If it is so desired, neutral nations might designate a diplomatic agent or representative of that character to maintain contact with the Headquarters of the Supreme Commander for the Allies.

3. General MacArthur should be instructed to direct the Japanese Government that it should not carry on relations with neutral governments except in accordance with such procedure as may be established by him. End of State Department message.

It is desired that you take such action as may be necessary in order to implement the sense of the above.

ENCLOSURECUSTODY OF JAPANESE ARCHIVES AND DIPLOMATIC PROPERTY

It is desired that unless you have objections for operational reasons you proceed with the issuance of necessary instructions to comply with the Joint Chiefs of Staff directive for the surrender of Japanese diplomatic and consular archives and property to the custody of the Allies (Serial No. 8). For your guidance the following has been approved by the State, War and Navy Departments:

U. S. missions are faced with difficult situation through non-issuance of instructions to Japanese missions concerning disposal of diplomatic and consular archives and property. In neutral countries Japanese acting as if no surrender had occurred and archives unsealed. In countries where Sweden and Switzerland acting as protecting powers access to archives not permitted. Accordingly, urgently necessary to issue instructions embodying following provisions:

In neutral countries Japanese missions immediately should turn over diplomatic and consular archives and property to representatives of four Allied powers. However, protection of nationals may be turned over to Sweden and Switzerland since these countries are acting as protecting powers for Japanese elsewhere.

In countries where Sweden or Switzerland are acting as protecting powers, immediate instructions should be issued to turn over physical custody of all diplomatic and consular archives and property to representatives of four Allied powers. The protecting powers, however, should continue to exercise the routine functions of protection of Japanese nationals.

In the United Kingdom, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, China, United States and British Commonwealth, France and Netherlands, custody of archives should be given by protecting powers to countries themselves with access to representatives of four Allied powers.

E N C L O S U R EAGREEMENT AS TO PARTICIPATION OF BRITISH
COMMONWEALTH FORCE IN OCCUPATION OF JAPAN

State Department advises that on 24 January 1946 agreement was consummated between United States and Australia, acting on behalf of Governments of United Kingdom, Australia, New Zealand and India, for participation of a British Commonwealth Force (approximately 43,600) in occupation of Japan on basis of arrangements made between you and General Northcott on 18 December 1945. Provision whereby Australian Government agrees to reduce size of force from time to time in conformity with future progressive reductions of U. S. forces in Japan has been specifically accepted by Australia. Additional provision makes size of force subject to reexamination in light of future arrangements for participation of Chinese or Soviet forces.

You are directed to accept and to perfect further details concerning the British Commonwealth Force in Accordance with the above agreement.

State, War and Navy Departments advise that U. S. Government considers that it would be impracticable to organize Allied Council until Far Eastern Commission is functioning in Washington. Following, received from Departments, is for your (SCAP) guidance;

1. The State Department will obtain from the governments concerned and will furnish to you the names of other representatives on the Allied Council for Japan.
2. When the Far Eastern Commission is functioning in Washington, you will be informed so that you, as chairman, may convene the first meeting of the Allied Council for Japan.
3. If the representatives designated by Russian, Chinese and British Commonwealth Governments are in Tokyo, you should invite them by direct communication to participate in first meeting. If they have not yet arrived in Tokyo, your invitation should be forwarded to the Joint Chiefs of Staff in order that State Department may forward it to governments concerned.

1. No Japanese taxation should discriminate against aliens.
2. No capital levy should be levied by the Japanese authorities in respect to property in or outside Japan owned by United Nations nationals. Any capital levy on corporations and unincorporated associations should be so devised as to exempt from the effects of the levy, the shares and interests in the said corporations and unincorporated associations held by United Nations nationals. If in the opinion of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, exceptional circumstances justify the imposition of any such capital levy, he should refer the matter for consideration of the Far Eastern Commission.

The Terms of Reference of the Far Eastern Commission provide that one of the functions of the Commission should be to "formulate the policies, principles and standards in conformity with which the fulfillment by Japan of its obligations under the Terms of Surrender may be accomplished."

It is further provided that when such decisions are made by the Far Eastern Commission, "The United States Government shall prepare directives in accordance with the policy decisions of the Commission and shall transmit them to the Supreme Commander through the appropriate United States Government agency."

At the twentieth meeting of the Far Eastern Commission held at 2516 Massachusetts Avenue, Northwest, Washington, D. C., on 18 July 1946, the enclosed policy decision relative to Japanese Taxation of Aliens, was unanimously approved.

As Secretary General of the Far Eastern Commission, I have been instructed to forward this decision to you on behalf of the Commission, in order that the appropriate directives may be prepared and transmitted to the Supreme Commander in accordance with the Terms of Reference.

In approving the statement of policy, the Commission recommended that in connection with this policy decision, the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers should be informed that the Far Eastern Commission has currently under consideration additional policy with respect to extraordinary taxation designed to meet war costs or other charges falling on the Japanese as a result of the war, such as the Increased Property Tax Law and the War Profit Tax Law as Imposed on Juridical Persons.

I should appreciate it if this information could be transmitted to the Supreme Commander along with the appropriate policy directives.

JAPANESE TAXATION OF ALIENS

The following statement of policy, adopted by the Far Eastern Commission on 18 July 1946, under the provision of paragraph II, A, 1 of its terms of reference has been received from the State, War and Navy Departments for transmission to you as a directive for your guidance in accordance with paragraph III, 1, of those terms of reference:

"1. No Japanese taxation should discriminate against aliens.

"2. No capital levy should be levied by the Japanese authorities in respect to property in or outside Japan owned by United Nations nationals. Any capital levy on corporations and unincorporated associations should be so devised as to exempt from the effects of the levy, the shares and interests in the said corporations and unincorporated associations held by United Nations nationals. If in your opinion exceptional circumstances justify the imposition of any capital levy, you should refer the matter for consideration of the Far Eastern Commission."

In connection with the foregoing the Far Eastern Commission has requested through the State, War, and Navy Departments that you be informed as follows:

"The Far Eastern Commission has currently under consideration additional policy with respect to extraordinary taxation designed to meet war costs or other charges falling on the Japanese as a result of the war, such as the increased property tax law and the war profits tax law as imposed on juridical persons."

RESTRICTEDE N C L O S U R EINFORMATION RELATIVE TO EXTRAORDINARY TAXATION IN JAPAN

The following message has been received from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers with regard to latest plans for extraordinary taxation in Japan:

"Tax Program prepared by Japanese Government after detailed study with guidance by members of this staff includes Capital Levy on individuals only, excluding United Nations Nationals. Concurrent with Capital Levy there is being imposed 100% tax on indemnity claims against the Government growing out of the war. These measures together with guarantee of small deposits and establishment of government finance agencies are designed to effect (a) maximum recapture of war profits; (b) sound reorganization of Japanese Banking System; (c) minimum disruption essential industrial production; (d) imposition of major taxation burden on high income class.

"Above program will be ready for submission to Diet in mid-August and forced introduction of new measures such as (a) increased Property Tax Law and (b) War Profits Tax as imposed on juridical persons would cause serious disruption of organized plans of government for tax collection and create delays detrimental to badly needed programs for essential industrial production and economic stabilization. Above measures were considered and rejected here because of administrative difficulties created in connection with collection processes and because of conviction that results desired can be obtained with greater certainty through present simplified program.

"Adequate safeguards will be achieved here to protect Allied interests. It is urged that Far Eastern Commission be requested not to take formal action on substantive aspects of tax program until opportunity for comment has been accorded to Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

"Will forward complete details approved Japanese Tax Program earliest. If adjustments required subsequently by Far Eastern Commission these can be accomplished here after final coordination has been achieved."

With reference to the cable dispatched by the Joint Chiefs of Staff on 6 September 1946 to the Supreme Commander of the Allied Powers, as WAR 99683, subject: extraordinary taxation in Japan, the following message has been received from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers:

"In view of the fact that the complete set of tax bills have not yet been passed by the Japanese Diet, publicity upon the subject of treatment of Allied Foreign Nationals at this time is considered premature and no press releases in Tokyo are contemplated. A release on this subject now will gravely embarrass the administration of the comprehensive program now in process of legislative action and will greatly increase the difficulties which confront the execution of the basic policies involved. Until action has been taken by the Diet on the series of complex bills under contemplation I recommend no press release be made. There can of course be no objection to such a release after the accomplishment of these administrative measures."

The following received from the State, War and Navy Departments regarding advances of yen to Far Eastern Commission or any other authorized Allied commission, official missions, and Allied Governments for their occupation troops in Japan is furnished for your guidance:

1. You are authorized to advance yen to meet expenses incurred in Japan by Far Eastern Commission or any other authorized Allied commission and national delegations comprising the commissions. Such yen will be obtained by Far Eastern Commission or any other authorized Allied commission and their national delegations from appropriate section your command against receipt. Far Eastern Commission or any other authorized Allied commission and their national delegations shall keep records showing in appropriate detail purposes for which yen expended and shall provide you with detailed monthly statements of their yen expenditures. Far Eastern Commission or any other authorized Allied commission should inform your headquarters monthly of general administrative expenditures of Far Eastern Commission or any other authorized Allied commission, together with allocation of expenditure among their national delegations.

2. It is anticipated that missions assigned to your staff, for example Textile Mission, will incur official expenses payable in yen which constitute expenditures properly chargeable to occupation cost. You are authorized advance yen funds for necessary official expenses to head each such mission, against appropriate receipt supported in adequate detail.

3. You are authorized to furnish yen currency requested by Allied Governments for their occupation forces in Japan, through the Finance Division of your Military Government Sections for Japan and Korea respectively, against receipt.

4. You should maintain record of all yen advances and report monthly to Joint Chiefs of Staff both total amount and breakdown of yen currency furnished by you under this authorization.

5. In event yen amounts requested by any national delegations of Far Eastern Commission or any other authorized Allied commission, head of mission, or Allied government for its occupation forces in Japan should appear excessive, it is requested that you refer matters to Joint Chiefs of Staff together with your recommendation.

You are authorized to advance yen to meet necessary official expenses incurred in Japan by Far Eastern Commission, national delegations of the Far Eastern Commission, authorized Allied commissions, missions assigned to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers staff, national representatives and their staffs on the Allied Council for Japan, and Allied governments for their occupation forces in Japan.
2. Yen advanced under above authorization should be limited to such amounts as can reasonably be regarded as occupation expenses, including reasonable salary or other compensation to personnel to enable maintenance of reasonable standard of living in Japan, hire of Japanese or other local employees, and purchase of necessary official supplies and equipment which it is impracticable to import.
3. You should take appropriate steps and establish appropriate procedures to ensure that excessive amounts of yen are not issued under the above authorization.
4. You should maintain a detailed record of all yen advances and submit monthly report to Joint Chiefs of Staff containing detailed statement of amounts of yen currency furnished by you under this authorization.
