Major M.E.W. OELRICH led an eight plane strike against Abappaomogan Island. Eight Napalm fire bombs were carried. The planes took off at 1155, joined up northwest of base, and flew to the target area. Attack was made singly, diving from 2000' to low level for the bombing run, which was north-northwest to south-southeast. Average altitude of release was from 100' and all bombs landed in the target area, Squares 225 W and X, Air Target and Gunnery Map, Palau Islands. The bomb carried by Captain PRIDDLETON's plane hung up on the first run but was successfully released on a second run. One bomb failed to burn but the remaining seven caused fires of short duration. Retirement was to the south and all planes returned safely to base at 1330. No A/A was encountered or observed and no strafing was done.
