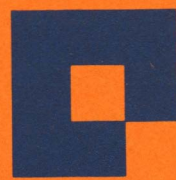

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'Rap And Produce' Set Next Week To Help Community Identify Problems

"Road to Understanding - Rap & Produce (Round Three), a two-day workshop for all interested members of the community, will be held on April 13-14 at RIT's Metropolitan Center, 50 West Main St.

The annual program is sponsored by the Extended Services Division, Urban Extension, with a contributing grant from the John F. Wegman Foundation, Inc.

The purpose of the annual program is to provide the opportunity for identifying community problems, evaluating both what the community and the conference participant from the past have been doing to remedy those problems, making the fullest use of community resources, both physical and human, bringing about meaningful involvement and positive change and establishing ongoing evaluation as an integral part of "Rap & Produce."

"The idea is to help people find ways they can solve their own problems," says Mrs. Jessie James, co-ordinator of RIT's Urban Extension Office. "We want to help people use other's ideas and apply them to their own problems."

The program is being coordinated by Mrs. James and Ronald Hilton, an Extended Services associate. William Hall, executive director of the Baden Street Settlement House is the general chairman.

The workshop topics, which will be covered during both sessions, are: health and mental health, welfare rights, criminal justice, politics and the community, human relations, youth and the community, education, administration and management and communications and the public. Participants will register for one workshop only.

Campus Builder To Receive RIT Award

John B. Pike & Son, Inc., a well-known Rochester-based construction company, will be awarded RIT's Distinguished Service Citation at the 47th Annual Management Convocation on Wednesday evening, April 11, at the Rochester Chamber of Commerce.

Pike, celebrating its 100th anniversary this year, will be honored for its service to the Rochester community and its high degree of excellence within the construction field.

The firm was founded in 1873 by John B. Pike. His son, John D. Pike, was the company's first president, and currently serves as Chairman of the Board. He is an honorary member of the RIT Board of Trustees.

Over the past 100 years, John B. Pike & Son, Inc., has been a prominent leader in the construction of industrial, commercial, institutional and public services facilities. Among these are such outstanding facilities as Midtown Plaza, Finger Lakes Racetrack, Asbury First Methodist Church, Delco Products Division of General Motors Corp., and the new Eastman Kodak Company Marketing and Education Center at Riverwood. The firm is well-known for the fine restoration work done on the Eastman Theater and St. Luke's Episcopal Church. The Rochester Savings Bank, built by Pike in 1926-27, was recently declared both a state and national landmark. At one time, the firm was in the custom home business, and built the Alva G. Strong Estate on Allens Creek Road, which now houses the Margaret Woodbury Strong Museum.

Two buildings on the RIT Henrietta campus, the George Eastman Memorial Building, which houses administrative offices, the College of Business, and the College of Continuing Education, and the physical education and sports complex were also constructed by John B. Pike & Son, Inc.

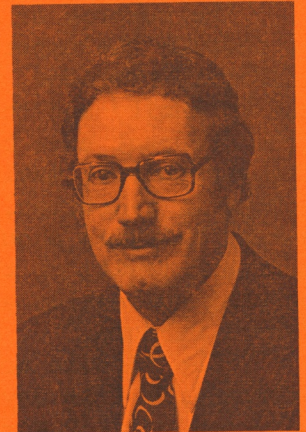
Also to be honored at the Management Convocation will be nearly 150 employees from Rochester-area businesses and industries who will receive diplomas in the areas of industrial and office supervision, sales, materials handling, packaging, transportation and traffic management, and industrial engineering through the Management Division of RIT's College of Continuing Education. About 700 persons, including employer representatives, graduates and guests, will attend the convocation.

The featured speaker will be Frank O. Riley, a General Motors vice president and group executive in charge of the Automotive Component Group. Rochester Products is a part of that group.

Keynoting the program will be Professor John Wordeman, staff chairman of the Management Division in the School of Printing at RIT. Wordeman is widely published in numerous printing and graphic arts magazines and journals and is a contributing editor of the In-Plant Printer Magazine.



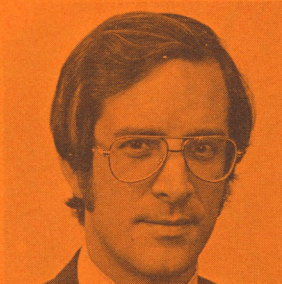

Dr. Wallace Named Dean Of Science

Dr. Thomas P. Wallace has been chosen the second dean of the College of Science at Rochester Institute of Technology, according to an announcement by RIT President Paul A. Miller.

On the College of Science faculty since 1968, Dr. Wallace 38, has been assistant professor, associate professor and head of the chemistry department, and for the last year associate dean of the college.



His appointment as dean is effective July 1. His predecessor, Dr. Ralph Van Peurse, dean of the college since its founding in 1963, is retiring June 30.

"Dr. Wallace will bring to his new work many attributes of special pertinence to this important position of leadership," said Dr. Todd H. Bullard, provost and vice president for Academic Affairs. "He has been unusually vigorous and creative as a department chairman and associate dean; he has an impressive record as a teacher and scholar in the field of chemistry, and his association with RIT has permitted him to come to know many of the people and organizational arrangements of the Institute."

A physical chemist, Dr. Wallace has a bachelor's degree from the State University of New York at Potsdam, a master's degree in general science from Syracuse University, a master's degree in chemistry from St. Lawrence University, a doctoral degree in physical chemistry from Clarkson College of Technology, and postdoctoral research experience at Mellon Institute of Carnegie-Mellon University.

From 1961 to 1967 he was an assistant professor at the State University of New York at Potsdam, and in 1967-68 was a research fellow at Mellon Institute of Carnegie-Mellon University.

He has authored reports in several publications, including the Journal of Physical Chemistry, Journal of Polymer Science, Journal of Colloid and Interface Science, Journal of Applied Physics, and Applied Optics.

His professional associations include the Rochester Section of the American Chemical Society, Sigma Xi and the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

He is a consultant to Eastman Kodak Company.

A 1953 graduate of Saranac Lake High School, Dr. Wallace is the son of Mrs. Sarah Wallace of 22 McClelland St. in Saranac Lake.

The College of Science offers bachelor of science degree programs in biology, chemistry, mathematics, physics and medical technology, an associate in applied science degree in chemical technology and graduate programs in chemistry leading to the master of science degree. It has an enrollment of 468 students and it employs 55 faculty members.

Engineering Trade Fair Set April 12, 13

An engineering trade fair that will feature products and equipment exhibits of over 20 area companies will be held at RIT's College of Engineering on April 12 and 13.

Titled RITCON '73, the program is being sponsored by the RIT student chapter of the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) for the purpose of exposing engineering students to employment opportunities with local firms. The event is admission free and open to the public.

Company products and equipment will be exhibited from 1 to 9:30 p.m. on April 12. Equipment and displays designed and built by RIT electrical engineering students will also be exhibited on April 12. On Friday afternoon and evening, technical papers will be presented by students and faculty.

Technical papers will also be given by students from IEEE Chapters at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Clarkson College of Technology, Union College, Syracuse University, and the State University of New York at Buffalo.

As part of the trade fair, RIT's Electrical Engineering Department will sponsor an open house on April 12 from 2 to 9 p.m.

In the 47-year history of the RIT Management Program, it has expanded from a one course-10-student enrollment to a program which includes nearly 100 courses and 1,600 students. The program is one of the most comprehensive and largest continuously operating ones in management education in the country, and has graduated nearly 6,000 area supervisors.

Dennis Hopper To Speak At Media Symposium

Film star Dennis Hopper and director James Frawley will participate in a multimedia symposium on new concepts in film-making and communications at RIT, Wednesday, April 11, from 2 to 5 p.m.

The multimedia event will take place in the lounge of the College-Alumni Union. It will include demonstrations of graphics, film, and video techniques. There will be a question and answer period.

Hopper is best known to film audiences for starring in and directing the film "Easy Rider." He also wrote, produced, directed and acted in "The Last Movie," and is soon to appear in the new Twentieth Century Fox release "Kid Blue" which is to open in Rochester April 18.

Frawley, who directed "Kid Blue," previously directed the feature "The Christian Licorice Store," and 30 segments of "The Monkees" television show. He also produced and directed two short subjects "Shoot the Actor" and "J-24," which won the best short subject award at the San Francisco Film Festival.

The symposium is being sponsored by Imaginations, the not-for-profit organization that produced Rochester's recent international film festival, and Rochester Area Colleges, Inc., a consortium of 18 area colleges in western New York, in cooperation with Twentieth Century Fox.

Admission is free. Seating is limited and on a first come, first seated basis.
