MRS. JOSEPHINE E. DYER.

Death of Well-Known South Weymouth Lady--Was Noted For Her Acts of Charity.



Mrs. Josephine E. Dyer, widow of the late William Dyer, passed away at her home on Pleasant street, South Weymouth, last Friday of Bright's disease. Mrs. Dyer's illness had extended over a period of two years. The funeral services were held on Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock and were conducted by the Rev. Henry C. Alvord of the First Baptist church, assisted by Rev. Percy N. Griffin of Bridgewater. Mrs. Dyer's pastor at the time of her marriage was the Rev. W. W. Chapman. The interment was at the Mount Vernon cemetery at Abington. The pall bearers were Granville Allen, Eliphaz Chandler, George C. Torrey, H. Wilbur Dyer, Charles S. Dyer and Frank E. Lord.

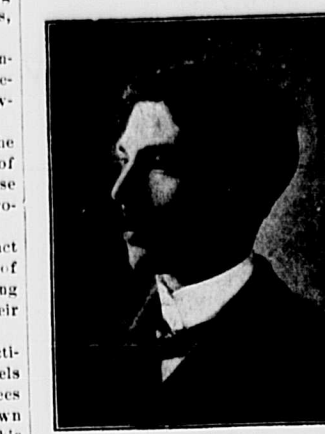

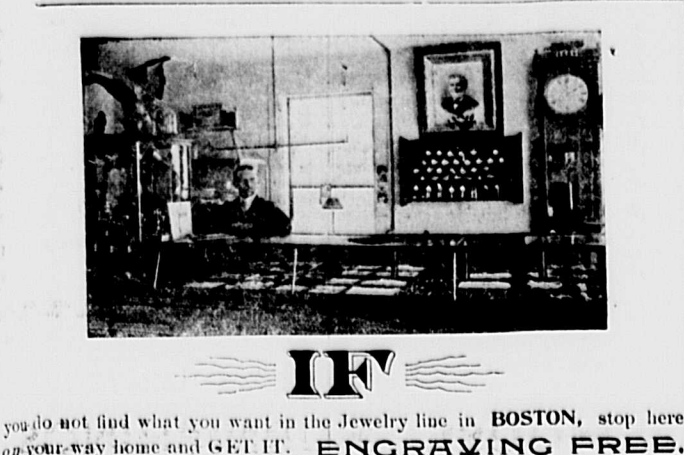
