MN011701. MILLENNIUM COHORT STUDY TO WATCH MILITARY HEALTH SAN DIEGO - ARE MILITARY PEOPLE HEALTHIER THAN THEIR CIVILIAN COUNTERPARTS? OR ARE THEY AT GREATER RISK FOR ILLNESSES DUE TO THEIR MILITARY SERVICE? THOSE QUESTIONS AND MORE MAY BE ANSWERED BY A NEW STUDY HEADED BY CAPT GREG GRAY, MC, OF THE NAVAL HEALTH RESEARCH CENTER (NHRC) IN SAN DIEGO.

ACCORDING TO GRAY, THE 21-YEAR MILLENNIUM COHORT STUDY WILL BE THE MOST AMBITIOUS STUDY OF MILITARY PERSONNEL EVER UNDERTAKEN. THE STUDY INVESTIGATORS WILL SURVEY 100,000 MILITARY PEOPLE WITH HEALTH QUESTIONNAIRES MAILED EVERY THREE YEARS. OF THE 100,000 INDIVIDUALS, 70,000 WILL BE VETERANS AND ACTIVE DUTY MEMBERS WHO HAVE NOT SERVED IN SOUTHWEST ASIA, BOSNIA OR KOSOVO SINCE 1997. THE OTHER 30,000 WILL BE MILITARY PEOPLE WHO SERVED IN THESE AREAS AFTER JAN. 1, 1998.

COHORT STUDIES COMPARE A GROUP OF INDIVIDUALS WHO SHARE A COMMON CHARACTERISTIC; IN THIS CASE, IT'S MILITARY SERVICE.

"THE PRINCIPAL FOCUS OF THIS STUDY IS TO DETERMINE IF MILITARY SERVICE, ESPECIALLY DEPLOYMENTS, PUT MILITARY MEMBERS AT RISK FOR DISEASE," SAID GRAY. "WE'RE TAKING A CLOSE LOOK AT CHRONIC DISEASES SUCH AS CANCER, HEART DISEASE, AND DIABETES, AND WE HAVE NUMEROUS OTHER HEALTH OUTCOMES TO EVALUATE."

GRAY SAID THAT THE STUDY WILL "OVER SAMPLE" RESERVISTS AND FEMALE SERVICE MEMBERS TO GET ADDITIONAL INFORMATION ON THEIR HEALTH RISKS AS INCREASING NUMBERS OF THEM COMPRISE DEPLOYED

MILITARY FORCES.

SOME DATA WILL BE AVAILABLE AS EARLY AS 2004 WHEN THE SECOND SET OF QUESTIONNAIRES IS RETURNED. IN OCTOBER 2004, 20,000 NEW MILITARY PERSONNEL WILL BE ADDED TO THE STUDY, AND THREE YEARS LATER, IN OCTOBER 2007, 20,000 MORE FOR A TOTAL OF 140,000. PARTICIPANTS' HEALTH WILL BE FOLLOWED UNTIL 2022.

THE TEAM OF 15 RESEARCHERS WHO DESIGNED THE STUDY DEVELOPED INNOVATIVE DATA COLLECTION METHODS, INCLUDING ALLOWING PARTICIPANTS TO RESPOND VIA THE INTERNET.

THE STUDY IS SPONSORED BY THE OFFICE OF SECRETARY OF DEFENSE'S DIRECTOR OF BIOSYSTEMS.

WHEN GRAY RETIRES LATER THIS YEAR HE WILL CONTINUE WORKING ON THE STUDY, BUT LCDR MARGARET A. K. RYAN, MC, WHO IS ALSO ASSIGNED TO NHRC, WILL BECOME THE PRINCIPAL INVESTIGATOR.

GRAY AND RYAN'S FELLOW RESEARCHERS ON THE STUDY ARE FROM THE OFFICE OF THE ASSISTANT SECRETARY OF DEFENSE FOR HEALTH AFFAIRS, UNIFORMED SERVICES UNIVERSITY OF THE HEALTH SCIENCES, U.S. ARMY RESEARCH INSTITUTE OF ENVIRONMENTAL MEDICINE, AND THE DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS.

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MN011702. NAVY MEDICS HELP COMBAT DISEASE IN EAST TIMOR

DILI, EAST TIMOR (NWS) - AFTER SEVERAL YEARS OF FIGHTING FOR THEIR INDEPENDENCE, THE PEOPLE OF EAST TIMOR NOW FACE ANOTHER FIGHT: THE WAR AGAINST DISEASE AND ILLNESS.

AS PART OF THE MEDICAL AND DENTAL CIVIC ACTION PROGRAM, NAVY MEDICAL PERSONNEL FROM THE USS BOXER (LHD 4) AMPHIBIOUS READINESS GROUP (ARG) AND 11TH MARINE EXPEDITIONARY UNIT (MEU) RECENTLY USED THE POWERFUL WEAPON OF EDUCATION TO HELP THEIR EAST TIMORESE COUNTERPARTS WIN THIS BATTLE.

THE ARG, CONSISTING OF USS BOXER, USS CLEVELAND (LPD 7), USS HARPERS FERRY (LSD 49), THE COMMANDER AMPHIBIOUS SQUADRON SEVEN STAFF AND THE MEU SPENT THREE DAYS IN EAST TIMOR ASSISTING U.S. SUPPORT GROUP EAST TIMOR (USSGET) WITH HUMANITARIAN AND CIVIC ASSISTANCE. THE MEDICAL AND DENTAL CIVIC ACTION PROGRAM WAS THE MOST EXTENSIVE, CONSISTING OF FOUR SEPARATE SITES THROUGHOUT EAST TIMOR.

"EDUCATION IS THE GREATEST CONTRIBUTION WE CAN GIVE TO THE EAST TIMOR HEALTHCARE PROVIDERS," SAID USSGET MEDICAL PLANNER AIR FORCE LT. COL. SUSAN KONCZAL. "ONE OF THE NUMEROUS TRAGEDIES RESULTING FROM THEIR FREEDOM STRUGGLE WAS THE DEATH OF MANY RESIDENT HEALTH PROFESSIONALS."

KONCZAL SAID FOOD AND WATER ARE NOT THE BIGGEST PROBLEMS, BUT POOR HYGIENE PRACTICES AND SANITATION, WORSENED BY INFRASTRUCTURE DESTRUCTION, POSE THE GREATEST THREAT.

DESPITE THE LANGUAGE BARRIER, EAST TIMORESE HEALTHCARE PROVIDERS RECEIVED EDUCATION AND TRAINING FROM NAVY MEDICAL PERSONNEL THROUGH HANDS-ON ASSISTANCE, TEXTBOOK INSTRUCTION, AND BY OBSERVING WESTERN MEDICAL PRACTICES AND TECHNIQUES.

LT JEANA KANNE, NC, FROM FLEET SURGICAL TEAM 9 OF SAN DIEGO, INSTRUCTED TEN NURSING STUDENTS.

"THEY DIDN'T UNDERSTAND THE BASIC DISEASE PROCESS, ESPECIALLY FOR MALARIA AND PNEUMONIA," KANNE SAID.

USING PICTURES FROM HER NURSING BOOKS, KANNE WAS ABLE TO OVERCOME SOME LANGUAGE BARRIERS.

"THEY GET SO EXCITED THAT THEY'RE GOING TO LEARN," SHE SAID. "THEY WANT TO LEARN IT ALL."

SHE ALSO FOUND THE EXPERIENCE REWARDING.

"I COULD SHARE MY PASSION FOR NURSING," SHE SAID. "THEY WERE JUST STARVING FOR EDUCATION."

LT HA TANG, MC, THE SUPPORT GROUP'S MEDICAL OFFICER, ALSO CONDUCTED TRAINING FOR TWO MEDICAL STUDENTS WHILE TREATING PATIENTS. THE FIRST-YEAR STUDENTS, WHO HAD PREVIOUSLY STUDIED IN INDONESIA, ALSO HELPED AS INTERPRETERS.

"THE EXPERIENCE WAS IMMENSELY GRATIFYING," SAID TANG. HE ADDED IT REMINDED HIM OF WHY HE GOT INTO MEDICINE IN THE FIRST PLACE.

"I'M GRATEFUL TO THE NAVY FOR MAKING THIS POSSIBLE."

KONCZAL ADDED THAT THE PEOPLE OF EAST TIMOR WERE HAPPY TO HAVE THE NAVY PEOPLE THERE.

"THEY KNOW THE AMERICAN UNIFORM," SHE SAID. "THERE IS A LOT OF FAITH AND TRUST."

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MN011703. PROVIDE HOPE MED INSPECTIONS WRAP IN TBILISI

LONDON - ON-SITE INSPECTIONS OF EIGHT MEDICAL HOSPITALS AND CLINICS WRAPPED UP IN TBILISI, GEORGIA THIS WEEK, AS PHASE I OF OPERATION PROVIDE HOPE 2001 DREW TO A CLOSE.

THE GOAL OF THIS THREE-PHASE EXERCISE IS TO PROVIDE MEDICAL SUPPLIES AND EQUIPMENT TO FACILITIES IN THE CAPITAL CITY.

PHASE II INSPECTION TEAM MEMBERS HAVE NOW JOINED THEIR PHASE I COUNTERPARTS CONDUCTING INVENTORY AND ASSESSMENT OF AVAILABLE EQUIPMENT IN PIRMASENS, GERMANY. TOGETHER, THEY WILL DETERMINE WHAT IS NEEDED AT EACH FACILITY.

OPERATION PROVIDE HOPE IS AN ONGOING JOINT MILITARY AND DEPARTMENT OF STATE OPERATION THAT DEMONSTRATES AMERICA'S SUPPORT AND COMMITMENT TO THE NEW REPUBLICS OF THE FORMER SOVIET UNION AS THEY TRANSITION TO DEMOCRATIC AND FREE MARKET STATES.

"THEY NEED EVERYTHING," SAID HMC (FMF) PATTI SPENCER, PART OF THE TEAM IN TBILISI. "WHATEVER WE HAVE TO OFFER, THEY CAN USE, SO WE'LL BE ABLE TO DO A LOT FOR THEM."

MORE THAN \$8 MILLION WORTH OF SUPPLIES WILL BE ASSEMBLED FOR SHIPMENT IN JULY. EIGHT HOSPITALS ARE EXPECTED TO RECEIVE ITEMS IN VARYING DEGREES. IN THE INTERIM, TEAMS WILL BE GETTING THE EQUIPMENT READY.

"NOW WE NEED TO DO THINGS SUCH AS ORDER MISSING PARTS, ADAPT THE EQUIPMENT FOR LOCAL ELECTRICAL STANDARDS AND PUT PACKAGES OF SUPPLIES TOGETHER FOR THE SPECIAL NEEDS OF EACH HOSPITAL," SPENCER SAID.

DENTAL CHAIRS, PHYSICAL THERAPY EQUIPMENT, X-RAY MACHINES AND PROCESSORS, DEFIBRILLATORS, BANDAGES, NEEDLES AND CENTRIFUGES ARE AMONG THE ITEMS BEING PREPARED TO SHIP.

PHASE III WILL BE THE ACTUAL SHIPMENT AND INSTALLATION OF THE SUPPLIES AND EQUIPMENT, AND TRAINING GEORGIAN MEDICAL PERSONNEL AND TECHNICIANS TO USE THE MUCH-NEEDED ITEMS. SHIPPING IS EXPECTED TO BEGIN IN JULY AND TRAINING WILL CONTINUE INTO OCTOBER.

NAVAL PERSONNEL INVOLVED IN THE MISSION COME FROM CNE FLEET MEDICAL, LONDON; U.S. NAVAL HOSPITAL NAPLES; U.S. NAVAL HOSPITAL OKINAWA; NAVAL HOSPITAL CAMP LEJEUNE; NAVAL MEDICAL CENTER PORTSMOUTH; NAVAL HOSPITAL TWENTYNINE PALMS AND NAVAL HOSPITAL PENSACOLA.

ABOARD USS GEORGE WASHINGTON (CVN73) - DT3(AW) DAVID BLAS' TWO UNCLES ADVISED HIM TO JOIN THE NAVY TO GET AN EDUCATION. HE TOOK THEIR ADVICE, AND JULY 13 HE REPORTS TO THE NAVAL ACADEMY PREPARATORY SCHOOL FOR A YEAR BEFORE, HOPEFULLY, HEADING TO THE ACADEMY.

BLAS SPENT A YEAR IN COLLEGE, BUT WASN'T ABLE TO FOOT THE TUITION-PLUS-EXPENSES BILL FOR THE NEXT THREE YEARS. HIS UNCLES, ONE A MARINE AND THE OTHER A SAILOR, SUGGESTED HE JOIN THE NAVY AND PURSUE OFFICER PROGRAMS.

HE TOOK THEIR ADVICE, AND IN SEPTEMBER 1999, JOINED UP. AFTER BOOT CAMP, HE ATTENDED DENTAL "A" SCHOOL, GRADUATING AT THE TOP OF HIS CLASS. THERE, HIS INSTRUCTORS TOLD HIM ABOUT MANY DIFFERENT OFFICER PROGRAMS - INCLUDING THE NAVAL ACADEMY.

AS SOON AS BLAS CAME ABOARD GEORGE WASHINGTON IN APRIL 2000, HE BEGAN TALKING ABOUT GOING TO THE ACADEMY.

"I TALKED WITH DTC ((SW/AW) DEBRA) CHAMBLISS, WHO IS THE DEPARTMENTAL CAREER COUNSELOR," SAID BLAS. "SHE TOLD ME SHE NEEDED TO EVALUATE ME BEFORE GIVING ME THE GO-AHEAD TO APPLY."

BY THE END OF THE CRUISE, CHAMBLISS, IMPRESSED WITH BLAS' WORK AND DEMEANOR, RECOMMENDED HE SUBMIT HIS PACKAGE. HE DID.

AND THEN HE WAITED. FINALLY, A LETTER FROM THE NAVAL ACADEMY CAME, TELLING HIM THAT SAID SINCE HE HAD BEEN OUT OF SCHOOL FOR MORE THAN A YEAR HE WOULD NOT BE ELIGIBLE TO ENROLL DIRECTLY INTO THE ACADEMY. BUT, IF HE CHOSE, HE COULD ATTEND THE YEAR LONG NAVAL ACADEMY PREPARATORY SCHOOL (NAPS) IN NEWPORT, R. I. IF HE WAS SUCCESSFUL THERE, HE WOULD BE RECOMMENDED FOR THE ACADEMY.

BLAS REPORTS TO NAPS JULY 13. HE'S CONFIDENT OF HIS SUCCESS,

BUT STILL HAS ONE MORE HURTLE: HE NEEDS THE RECOMMENDATION OF HIS CONGRESSMAN. AMID THE SCORES OF APPLICANTS, ONLY ONE RESIDENT OF GUAM, BLAS' HOME, IS RECOMMENDED FOR APPOINTMENT EACH YEAR. STILL, HE ISN'T DISCOURAGED.

"I'VE BEEN IN CONTACT WITH MY CONGRESSMAN SINCE LEARNING ABOUT MY ACCEPTANCE TO NAPS," HE SAID. "AND I FEEL LIKE MY EXPERIENCE AS A BLUEJACKET HAS GIVEN ME AN ADVANTAGE OVER SOME OF THE OTHER CANDIDATES."

PHILADELPHIA - NAVAL HOSPITAL PHILADELPHIA, CLOSED SINCE 1995, WILL BE IMPLODED MAY 12 TO MAKE WAY FOR A 1,500-CAR PARKING LOT FOR NEW STADIUMS FOR THE PHILADELPHIA EAGLES AND PHILLIES SPORTS TEAMS.

THE IMPLOSION IS SCHEDULED FOR 7 A.M. AND WILL TAKE THE 15-STORY, ART DECO BUILDING TO THE GROUND. CONVERTING THE LAND TO A PARKING LOT IS EXPECTED TO BE COMPLETED BY FALL, IN TIME FOR THE EAGLES' SEASON.

THE HOSPITAL OPENED IN 1935, AND SAW CONTINUOUS SERVICE UNTIL 1991, WHEN ALL BUT A CLINIC WAS CLOSED. IT HAS REMAINED VACANT SINCE 1995.

SPRINGTIME IS HERE AND SUMMERTIME IS SNEAKING AROUND THE CORNER. BUT BEFORE YOU BREAK OUT THE BEVERAGE COOLER AND RACE OFF TO HAVE SOME FUN IN THE SUN, IT PAYS TO REMEMBER THAT THERE ARE A NUMBER OF DANGERS TO BEWARE OF DURING THE SUNNY MONTHS.

SUNBURN IS A POTENTIAL RISK FOR PEOPLE DURING THE SPRING AND SUMMER SEASONS. IT'S NOT UNCOMMON TO SEE SUN-WORSHIPPERS SEVERELY BURNED OR "LOBSTERIZED" BY THE SUN'S HAZARDOUS RAYS.

OVEREXPOSURE TO THE SUN'S RAYS CAN BE EXTREMELY DANGEROUS. POTENTIAL THREATS INCLUDE PREMATURE AGING OF THE SKIN, IMMUNE-CELL DISRUPTION, CATARACTS AND OTHER EYE PROBLEMS. CONTINUOUS OVEREXPOSURE TO THE SUN CAN LEAD TO SKIN CANCER.

JUST LIKE THE EFFECTS OF RADIATION, SUNBURN IS A DELAYED REACTION. IT BECOMES NOTICEABLE HOURS AFTER EXPOSURE TO THE SUN.

THE POTENTIAL RISKS OF EXPOSURE TO THE SUN MAY PROMPT THE QUESTION, "WHY BOTHER GOING OUTSIDE AT ALL IF I'M ONLY GOING TO END UP DOING HARM TO MYSELF?" DON'T GET TOO DISCOURAGED -- THERE ARE A NUMBER OF STEPS YOU CAN TAKE TO MINIMIZE YOUR CHANCES OF BEING BITTEN BY THE SUN'S ULTRAVIOLET RAYS.

- 1. AVOID SUN EXPOSURE WHEN IT IS AT ITS PEAK -- BETWEEN 10 A.M. AND 3 P.M.
- 2. MAKE SUNSCREEN YOUR BEST FRIEND DURING THE SPRING AND SUMMER. THE SKIN PROTECTION FACTOR (SPF) SHOULD BE AT LEAST 15. SUNSCREEN SHOULD BE APPLIED BEFORE GOING OUTSIDE TO ALLOW MAXIMUM ABSORPTION INTO THE SKIN. IT SHOULD BE REAPPLIED REGULARLY APPROXIMATELY EVERY 90 MINUTES ESPECIALLY AFTER SWIMMING OR SWEATING HEAVILY. THE SUN'S REFLECTIVE RAYS CAN AFFECT AREAS OF THE BODY THAT MIGHT NOT BE PROTECTED, SUCH AS UNDER THE CHIN, SO DON'T NEGLECT THOSE AREAS.
 - 3. APPLY ZINC OXIDE CREAM TO NOSE AND LIPS.
- 4. BE SURE TO WEAR SUNGLASSES THAT BLOCK ULTRAVIOLET RAYS, ESPECIALLY WHILE SUNBATHING OR USING TANNING BOOTHS.
- 5. WEAR PROTECTIVE CLOTHING AND A HAT ON SUNNY AND CLOUDY/BRIGHT DAYS.

IF YOU DO GET A MILD SUNBURN, THERE ARE WAYS TO TREAT IT. ONE OF THE BEST METHODS IS BY TAKING A COOL BATH OR SHOWER, USING COOL COMPRESSES AND APPLICATIONS OF CALAMINE LOTION. BE SURE TO AVOID SUN EXPOSURE UNTIL THE SUNBURN HAS COMPLETELY FADED, OTHERWISE, THERE IS A HIGH RISK THAT IT WILL WORSEN.

ANESTHETIC SPRAYS CONTAINING BENZOCAINE CAN HELP RELIEVE THE PAIN THAT COMES WITH SUNBURN. YOU CAN ALSO TAKE ASPIRIN OR ACETAMINOPHEN TO REDUCE PAIN AND INFLAMMATION. AVOID WEARING

CLOTHING THAT RUBS THE BURNED AREA.

IF A CASE OF SEVERE SUNBURN RESULTS IN BLISTERED SKIN, DO NOT APPLY ANY TOPICAL MEDICINE TO THE BURN UNLESS A DOCTOR TELLS YOU TO DO SO. IT IS ALSO A GOOD IDEA TO NOT BREAK THE BLISTERS SINCE THAT COULD LEAD TO INFECTION. IF THE BLISTERS BREAK ON THEIR OWN, BANDAGE THEM LIGHTLY.

WHEN SUFFERING FROM ANY TYPE OF SUNBURN, BE SURE TO DRINK PLENTY OF FLUIDS TO KEEP HYDRATED AND IMMERSE THE AFFECTED AREAS IN COOL WATER FOR 10 MINUTES AT A TIME. IF THE PROBLEM PERSISTS, OR IF A HEADACHE, NAUSEA OR A HIGH TEMPERATURE IS PRESENT, CONTACT A DOCTOR IMMEDIATELY.

ARMED WITH THESE TIPS, AND A HEALTHY SUNSCREEN, THE SUMMER MONTHS CAN PROVIDE HOURS OF OUTDOOR ENJOYMENT WITHOUT GETTING BURNED.
