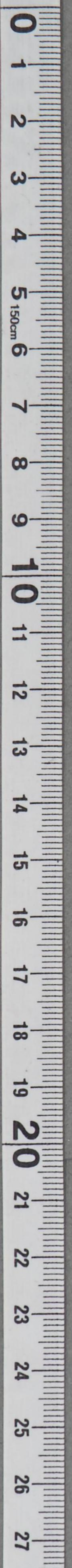

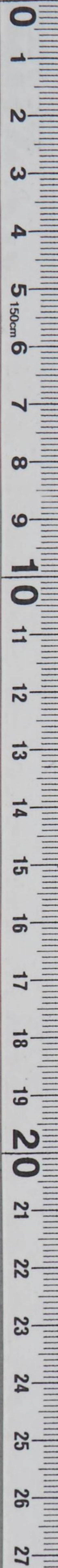

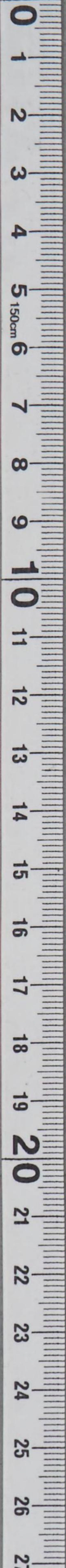

MEMORANDUM TO: Executive Officer

SUBJECT: Report on Trip to Ryukyus Command

A. General

1. Pursuant to letter orders dated 27 September 1950, Colonel E. A. Bedell and the undersigned proceeded to RYCOM by military aircraft on 25 October and returned to Tokyo on the afternoon of 29 October. During this period the Repairs and Utilities activities on RYCOM were inspected and the following is a report thereon. It was intended that the above mentioned party would also inspect Repairs and Utilities activities on Guam, but due to nonavailability of air transport from Okinawa to Guam the party returned to Tokyo and will arrange a trip to Guam at a later date.

2. During this inspection the following members of the Ryukyus Command were contacted:

3. Organization

In general there is considerable overlap in the organization; that is, the Staff Engineering group concerns itself too much in the detail operations of the Post Engineer, and the Staff Engineer himself appears to go too much into the details of the operation of the lower echelons.

a. The Staff Engineering group is actually operating in a similar manner to a District Engineer, supervising large contracts being

performed by the Vinnell Corporation and at the same time doing the engineering work for the staff. This is a satisfactory situation since it relieves the Post Engineer of the present large volume of new construction and rehabilitation which is going forward under the deferred maintenance program.

b. The Post Engineer organization is considerably more complicated than is visualized by the Standard Organization Chart proposed by the Office of the Chief of Engineers. For ready reference a copy of the Post Engineer Organization Chart as proposed by the Office of the Chief of Engineers is attached as Inclosure No. 1. It is believed that the organization of the RYCOM Post Engineer along the lines of the attached chart would be more satisfactory than the complicated organizational set-up which is now being used.

- (1) RYCOM is considered to be one post, but due to the large area being covered it is divided into five (5) areas each of which has a Colonel in charge for administration. In each of these same areas there has been set up a sub-area office for Repairs and Utilities purposes, under the control of the RYCOM Post Engineer. Each area has an R & U officer and a minimum crew of technicians to handle maintenance and utilities work. An operations office, shops, and small stocks of necessary materials are maintained in each area. It is believed that this is a good type of organization and will satisfactorily fulfill the mission.
- (2) Inspections were made in two of these areas; namely the Tengan area and the Naha area. Both areas appear well operated although a considerable backlog of work orders exists due to shortage of supply items.

B. Condition of Facilities

1. Water Supply

There has been a shortage of water supply in the Naha area during the past two months which have been exceptionally dry. In this area the water has been shut off during a number of hours during the day with the result that the installations are getting very bad service. Other areas on the island have had sufficient water and there were no difficulties.

a. Tengan Water Plant

The physical condition of the Tengan water plant continues to show excellent improvement and it is beginning to look like a first class installation. Water is being produced at 2-1/2 to 3 million gallons per day with satisfactory bacteriological reports and chlorine residuals.

Gas chlorinators have been installed to replace the hypochlorite system which was previously used. A laboratory for continuously checking the output of this plant has been installed and is in the charge of a competent chemist.

- (1) Under the Vinnell contract a third filter is being installed and will be completed in two or three weeks. Upon completion of this filter, it is proposed to rehabilitate, in turn, the two existing filters and to do some maintenance work on the sedimentation tank and the clear well. After these operations are completed the filtration portion of the plant will be in good condition and should operate satisfactorily for many years if properly maintained.
- (2) The high-lift pumping station is still powered by Grey Marine engines which are operating satisfactorily although they should be removed when electric power becomes available. The Ibara pumps which were purchased in Japan have been installed and are giving satisfactory service.
- (3) One new booster pumping plant has been installed on the discharge line from this plant about half way between the plant and the RYCOM tanks. It is said to be in satisfactory operating condition but was not inspected.
- (4) Water furnished from this plant has been declared potable and there appears to be no reason why potable water should not be continuously produced in this installation in the future. The operation of this plant would be further improved by the use of filter alum. It was claimed that requisitions for filter alum were not filled and a sufficient supply cannot be obtained. This matter should be investigated further to insure a continuous supply of filter alum to this plant.
- (5) Presently the Tengan plant pumps only to the Tengan-Awase-White Beach areas which do not require the full normal capacity of this plant.

b. Bishigawa Water Plant

This is a modern filtration plant and should experience no difficulty whatever in the production of satisfactory potable water. It is operating at approximately 4,000,000 gallons per day and experiencing no difficulties. This plant is designed for the use of a coagulant (filter alum) but this part of the procedure is not being used since filter alum has not been obtained in satisfactory supply. Water from this

plant is furnished to Kadena and to the RYCOM tanks from which the RYCOM-Sukiran areas are supplied. The District Engineer is presently constructing a 16" cast iron pumping line direct from this plant to the RYCOM tanks without utilizing any part of the Tengan line to the tanks. When this line is completed, it will then be possible for the Tengan plant and the Bishigawa plant to pump into the RYCOM tanks simultaneously and the full capacity of both plants can then be utilized.

c. Naha Water Plant

This plant was built by the Japanese and has recently been rehabilitated. The water supply comes from six springs and small streams in a vicinity north of Naha. It is collected by gravity lines into a raw water pumping station and discharged from there to the filtration plant which is located on an elevation about two miles north of Naha. This elevation is sufficient to distribute the water by gravity throughout the Naha area without the necessity of booster pumping.

- (1) The filtration and purification of this water supply is accomplished through two slow sand filters having a combined output of 650,000 gallons per day. The operation of these filters is satisfactory and the water supply is being properly chlorinated.
- (2) All of the possible water supply sources for this plant have not been developed. It is believed there are five or six more springs or creeks which could be piped into the raw water pumping plant and the capacity of this system increased thereby to approximately 1,000,000 gallons per day.

d. Camp Kue Water Plant

This plant was built by the District Engineer and was operated by him until 27 October 1950 at which time it was taken over by the Post Engineer. It was not inspected. It should be noted, however, that one source of raw water for this plant comes from the small stream in the Sukiran area not far east of the RYCOM laundry. For the past two or three years the Post Engineer operated a water point on this stream but recently discontinued its use since this stream is heavily polluted and was not considered a satisfactory supply source particularly since the filters at this installation were in very poor condition. Therefore, very careful operation of the filtration plant at Camp Kue will be necessary to produce a dependably potable water.

2. Electric Power

Electric energy on the island is furnished from a number of diesel engine plants some of which were inspected and are discussed in the following paragraphs.

a. Tengan Power Plant

This plant is equipped with two 500 KW General Motors, Model 278-A, diesel engines both of which have operated beyond 6,000 hours without overhauling. However, the plant is operating satisfactorily, housekeeping was good, and the generators were operating at almost full load on each. The operating details of the plant are being satisfactorily logged.

- (2) Since this plant is fully loaded, it cannot supply other facilities in the vicinity which are presently being carried on numerous portable engines. It is also proposed that the Tengan Water Plant be fully motorized. Therefore, a new and larger plant is being constructed in the vicinity under an approved project estimate. This plant will be sufficiently large to carry the entire load of the Tengan-White Beach area including the water plant.

b. RYCOM Power Plant

This plant contains seven (7) General Motors, Model 278-A, 500 KW diesel engine generators all of which are operating without difficulty. Maintenance is excellent and operations of the plant are nicely logged. The peak load on this plant is 2500 KW, and it is being met by the operation of five (5) engines, which leaves two (2) engines in reserve. At the time of the inspection all engines in operation were carrying practically full load on each. No difficulties are being experienced. Housekeeping was excellent.

c. Machinato Power Plant

This plant operates four (4) General Motors, Model 278-A, 300 KW, diesel engine generator sets. It is well operated, housekeeping is satisfactory, and only sufficient engines to meet the demand are kept in operation. At the time of the inspection two engines were in operation and two standing by.

- (1) Under a project recently approved by this office this plant is being enlarged by the addition of two 500 KW engine generator sets. Construction work is just getting underway. Additional power will be required from this plant for new housing areas and the new Machinato refrigerated warehouse, construction of which has just begun.

d. Naha Power Plant

This plant contains six (6) General Motors, Model 278-A, (one 750 KW and five 500 KW) diesel engine generator sets. It is under the

operational control of the Air Forces. At the time of inspection three engines were operating and carrying full load; the other three engines are practically new but have been damaged in operation and are now in the process of major overhaul. Housekeeping in this plant is poor and at the time this party entered the plant one operator was sound asleep in his chair.

e. Standby Power Plant, Naha Refrigerated Warehouse

This plant consists of one 500 KW, General Motors, Model 278-A, diesel engine generator set. It was in operation carrying approximately full load and supplying energy to the Naha general distribution system. This plant is under the jurisdiction of the RYCOM organization, operations are satisfactory and housekeeping is good. It should be noted that this plant is being operated as a power source for the Naha distribution system. This use was not intended but is necessary because the Naha Power Plant, mentioned in the preceding paragraph, is not being properly operated, with the result that the Naha Power Plant cannot meet its load and this standby plant is called upon to supply the difference.

f. White Beach Power Plant

This is a small portable power plant consisting of four 100 KW diesel engine generator sets. It is a temporary installation but is being satisfactorily operated.

3. Refrigeration

a. Tengan Reefer Bank

This reefer bank consists of an assembly of 225 prefab 1800 cubic feet reefer boxes. These boxes are old and will not last very much longer. It has been necessary to shore up the ceilings of a number of these units and many other ceilings are sagging. Leakages of cold air from a number of units were noted. Mechanically and electrically the equipment is being excellently operated, and the technician in charge, Mr. Balutis, should be commended.

b. Tengan Ice Plant

This is a fifteen (15) ton ammonia-brine type ice plant. It is being operated entirely with Okinawan technicians and a satisfactory job is being done. Potable ice is assured by supplemental chlorination. The ice produced is cloudy since no deaeration equipment is in use. It is understood that this plant will probably be turned over to the military government when the new Machinato warehouse and ice plant is completed.

c. Naha Refrigerated Warehouse and Ice Plant

Mechanically and electrically this plant is being operated very satisfactorily and no difficulties are being experienced. The temperatures being maintained in the several rooms are in accordance with requirements. It was noted, however, that the housekeeping in the storage rooms was only fair and the stacking of subsistence was somewhat haphazard, thereby not getting the best service from the available space and the refrigeration equipment.

- (1) The ice plant in this location has had some difficulty due to shortage of water supply although it has been possible to maintain potability through the use of supplemental chlorination. It was noted that a substantial quantity of ice in storage was badly discolored by rust which is carried in the water supply due to turning it on and off. It was also noted that, although this plant was designed to produce crystal ice, white ice is being produced due to failure in the operation of deaeration equipment.

d. Naha Reefer Bank

Under a project recently approved by this office construction has started on a supplemental reefer bank immediately north of the Naha refrigerated warehouse. This will be an assembly of 1800 cubic feet prefab refrigeration units.

e. Machinato Refrigerated Warehouse

Construction of this warehouse was started about two weeks ago and is presently in the foundation stage.

4. Post Engineer Plant Facilities

A brief tour of the electric, plumbing, tinning, and roads maintenance shops gives the impression that they are too small and inadequately equipped to properly perform the mission. The paint shop appears more satisfactory although one building provides inadequate housing. The heavy equipment maintenance shop is in much better condition and is more nearly adequate for the maintenance loads. The Post Engineer warehouse is in a ramshackle building which is quite inadequate to the mission. Bins are being provided together with bin and locator cards. This warehouse is not considered satisfactory. The area around the Post Engineer operating facilities is greatly improved and has been well graded and is well kept.

5. Housing

- a. Considerable work has been done under the Vinnell contract to

rehabilitate housing on the island.

- (1) The 34th General Hospital was inspected briefly and appears much improved although the inherent construction of this property is such that a considerable maintenance load will be required to keep it in good condition. The commanding officer was not available at the time of inspection, but a Captain nurse stated that with two exceptions the rehabilitation work is satisfactory. These exceptions are some difficulties with leakage along the eyebrows which have been built into these quonsets; and the fact that it is impossible to enter the rooms with a wheel litter.
- (2) Troop housing in the vicinity of the RYCOM officer's club which had been rehabilitated by Vinnell was inspected briefly and it appears that a good job has been performed; however, due to the inherent type of construction a heavy maintenance load may be expected.

b. Garicoa Construction

Two types of dependent housing are under construction on the island. One type uses cement blocks which are produced locally, and the other uses coral blocks. Both types have a tile roof which is also produced locally. The cement block house is finally stuccoed in light color and, with the red and white colors of the tile roof, gives a very attractive appearance. The house constructed with coral block is a light brown color, and, together with the white and red tile roof, is particularly attractive. Both types of construction are superior to our attempts to use the quonset or prefab steel type of buildings.

6. Preventive Maintenance

The operation of preventive maintenance teams is generally being followed in the several Post Engineer areas although the record cards are not yet complete in all instances. It is concluded that good progress is being made although complete use of preventive maintenance procedures has not yet been accomplished. At the Tengan Reefer Bank preventive maintenance has shown very excellent results and the records are complete.

7. Conservation

a. The conservation of electric energy is fairly good although the operation of security lighting well into the morning daylight hours was noted and should be corrected.

b. The conservation of water is not yet satisfactory since the per capita consumption of water runs far in excess of normal. The use of

continuous flow urinals was noted in a number of buildings although this office has often suggested their removal. At the ice cream plant the cooling water from the compressor and other equipment (probably 50 or more gallons per minute) was being discharged to the sewer. Only minor instances of faucet leakages were noted and this improvement over past conditions is probably the result of preventive maintenance operations.

C. Discussion.

The physical condition and the appearance of the Army installations on Okinawa shows a substantial improvement since the last time they were inspected by the undersigned in February 1950. Also apparent is a gratifying change for the better in the morale of Officers and DACs who are responsible for the operation of these facilities.

1. Water Supply

It is probable that in the event of any further increase in the population of Okinawa serious water shortages may be experienced next summer, and this matter should be given consideration prior to that time. It is believed that the program of water conservation is not fully activated in Ground Force and Air Force installations on the island and, if the program is fully activated, the anticipated water shortages will be avoided.

a. Tengan Water Plant

The improved condition of this property is very gratifying, but continued improvement of this plant is desirable. When the Tengan Power Plant is completed this plant should be fully motorized, thereby improving its dependability and reducing the cost of operation. Under a project approved more than a year ago it was proposed to construct a new raw water intake which would not be subject to flooding and in which vertical submerged type centrifugal raw water pumps would be used. This part of the project should be completed in order to assure a dependable raw water source for the Tengan water plant. It was informally understood that the District Engineer proposes to use the Tengan river as a source of expanded water supply for the Bishigawa plant. Such planning is satisfactory and, by coordination with the District Engineer, the new raw water intake proposed above could be so designed that the District Engineer could install therein the raw water pumping equipment required for delivering water to the Bishigawa Plant also. The ultimate result would then be that the Tengan Water Plant would continue for an indefinite period as a dependable source of water for the north part of the island.

b. Bishigawa Water Plant

Operations appear satisfactory except that a coagulant should be used both in this plant and in the Tengan plant mentioned above.

c. Naha Water Plant

This is a good installation and it has been properly rehabilitated although it is operating below the present capacity of the three slow sand filters. Since the Naha area is short of water, it appears advisable to collect from other sources which are known to be available more raw water which can be brought by gravity into the raw water pumping station. The full use of this plant to its total capacity is desirable since it is a very simple but quite dependable type of filtration plant and one which is readily operated by Okinawans. There is sufficient room in the vicinity to add additional slow sand filters in the event excess raw water is available.

2. Electric Power

The good physical condition of the Ground Force power plants and the dependability of their operation was very gratifying. The poor condition of the Air Force plants and the undependability of power therefrom was quite unsatisfactory. It was noticeable in the Ground Force plants that those engine-generators in operation were each being required to deliver approximately full load and that no difficulties from overheating of the equipment were being experienced. Many times in the past representatives of this office have recommended such operation, preceded, of course, by cleaning the cooling systems which were scaled and the use of cooling water treatment. This has now been done and difficulties from overheating are no longer experienced. As a result of operating these engines at approximately full load each, the number of engines required to be in operation is held to a minimum, the overall plant efficiency has been increased, and the wear and tear on engines has been reduced. For example, it was noted that some time ago the RYCOM plant was requiring one gallon of fuel to deliver 11.12 kilowatt hours whereas now the same plant delivers 11.87 kilowatt hours per gallon.

a. Naha Power Plant

The condition of the Naha Power Plant which is under Air Force operation and control was not satisfactory. Six (6) new engines were installed in this plant and half of them are now shut down for major repairs with the result that there are power outages in that area and generally undependable operation. It is believed that a substantial overall economy would result if all power plants on Okinawa were brought under Ground Force occupational control as was intended when the island-wide power board was formed about a year ago.

b. Standby Power Plant, Naha Refrigerated Warehouse

This power plant is operating as a source of power for the Naha distribution system as well as for the Naha warehouse and has been so operating for a considerable period. Such operation is not good

procedure since this plant was intended to be only a standby source which must always be ready to supply power and protect the perishables in this refrigerated warehouse. If it is forced to operate continuously it loses its position as a dependable standby source and places in hazard the heavy investment in perishables for the protection of which it was installed.

3. Refrigeration

a. Tengan Reefer Bank

It was a surprise to the undersigned to find the Tengan Reefer Bank operating at full capacity since advice had been given to this office a short time ago that this reefer bank would be discontinued. No detailed study of refrigeration requirements was made; but it is the opinion of the undersigned that this bank must be taken out of service as soon as possible. Fortunately this refrigeration bank is under the operating control of an excellent mechanic who succeeds in keeping it running although at considerable expense for replacement of Freon and for operating man hours. In any event the physical condition of these prefab boxes is such that they cannot be continued in service very much longer.

b. Tengan Ice Plant

This small ice plant is operated entirely by Okinawans and gives a practical demonstration of what the Okinawan mechanics can do under proper supervision. It is well operated, it turns out a good product with the exception that the ice is white and, if continued in use for the Army, deaeration equipment should be installed so that crystal ice can be produced.

c. Naha Refrigerated Warehouse and Ice Plant

The operation of this refrigerated warehouse appears satisfactory with the exception that more orderly stacking of perishables would result in more efficient use of the space and equipment. This is a problem for the Quartermaster. The ice plant should repair and put back into use the deaeration equipment so that crystal ice will be produced; also discolored water resulting from turning the supply off and on again, should be run to waste and not used to manufacture ice.

4. Post Engineer Plant Facilities

The shops in this area are too small and inadequately equipped; however, since it is proposed that the Post Engineer will use the facilities now being occupied by the Vinnell Corporation it appears economical to continue the use of these inadequate buildings in the meantime. Information was given that many necessary items of hand tools and small equipment are not available; such as electric testing instruments, rubber gloves, hoods, blankets, and miscellaneous small tools. The Post Engineer warehouse in

its present location will never be satisfactory although considerable improvement was noted in the provision of bins with bin and locator cards.

5. Housing

The rehabilitation work being performed by the Vinnell Corporation on the Quonset type housing greatly improves them both in appearance and serviceability, though it is believed that this type of construction will continue to impose heavy maintenance loads and is still temporary construction which must be replaced after a relatively short period. The cement block or the coral block type of construction, both with tile roof, is much superior, much more durable, and it is believed that the first cost and maintenance cost will be less. There is the further advantage that the materials used therein may be largely obtained locally.

D. Recommendations

1. It is recommended that:

- a. The Staff Engineer divorce himself from the operating details of the Post Engineer mission.
- b. The Post Engineer organization be rearranged generally in accordance with the Standard Organization Chart proposed by the Office of the Chief of Engineers.
- c. The planning for the future of the Tengan Water Plant visualizes its continued operation for an indefinite period and that its rehabilitation be completed so that it will be a dependable water source.
- d. Filter alum be obtained in sufficient supply so that it will be always available for use as a coagulant at both the Tengan and Bishigawa Water Plants.
- e. Planning be initiated to increase the output of the Naha Water Plant.
- f. The island-wide power board be revitalized and the operation of all power plants on Okinawa be incorporated thereunder with a view of dependable power from the numerous isolated plants; also, so that island-wide planning will assure sufficient power wherever it may be required.
- g. The continuous operation of the standby power plant at the Naha warehouse be discontinued at the earliest practicable date.
- h. The operation of the Tengan reefer bank be discontinued at the earliest practicable date; however, the installation should be retained and maintained in a standby condition for possible future need.

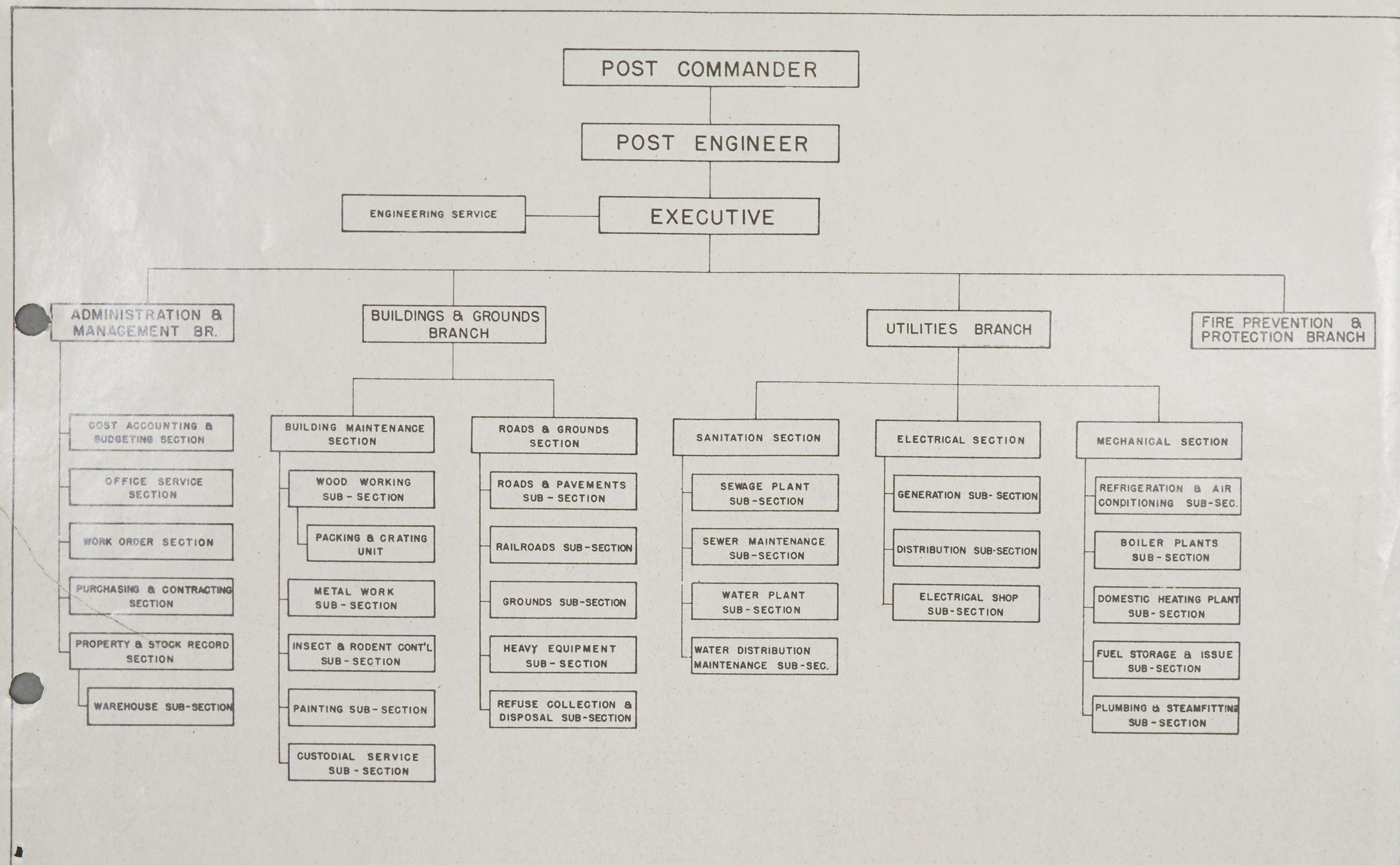
2. The above recommendations were partially discussed with Major General R. B. McClure, Commanding General, RYCOM; with Colonel R. F. Sink, Chief of Staff; and Colonel Arthur R. MacLean, Post Engineer. It is interesting to note that although the undersigned has made five inspection trips to Okinawa in the past this was the first time that a representative of the R & U Division, General Headquarters, Far East Command, has had the opportunity to discuss R & U activities with the Chief of Staff and the Commanding General.

POST ENGINEER ORGANIZATION CHART

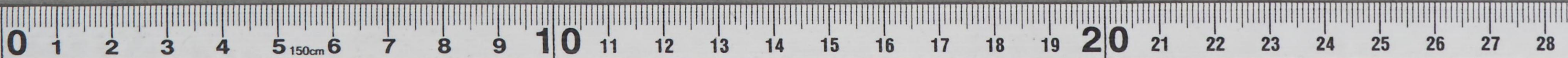

1. Reference is made to CINCPACFLT message 262154Z August 1950, a copy of which is inclosed.

2. A limited operational control of shipping was placed into effect in the Pacific in accordance with the above referenced message, consequently, instructions regarding movement reports of vessels now emanate from Naval authorities in accordance with procedures (WFRI (E) 50) specified by the Chief of Naval Operations. It is expected that eventually an international, worldwide system of operational control of shipping in a general emergency will be established, with instructions for United States ships emanating direct from the Chief of Naval Operations. The Naval Operational Control Authority, operating through the local Naval Control of Shipping Offices, is a permanent organization, and although its first application may have been influenced by the advent of hostilities in Korea, it was not established as an interim measure to regulate shipping during the present emergency.

3. The system anticipates the control of the routing and movement of all merchant and non-combatant Naval ships in the event of a general emergency. The present limited application was initiated by the Chief of Naval Operations, and it is expected that it will eventually be placed into worldwide effect, as a safeguard and to obviate the difficulties that would arise should such controls suddenly be ordered in a crisis. The Commander-in-Chief, Pacific Fleet, by direction, was charged with the responsibility for establishment of the system in the Pacific, and appointed the Commander, United States Naval Forces, Far East as Operational Control Authority for the Japan-Korea-Okinawa area.

4. The purposes of this system are not only to control the routing and movement of shipping at sea, but also to maintain certain security standards considered appropriate by reducing to the minimum communications to and from vessels. Because control of shipping in these respects has passed to Naval authorities, the Naval directives and procedures supersede any local port regulations that are contrary to their contents or intent, specifically those portions of port regulations of 2d Transportation Major Port which required 100 hours, 48 hours and 24 hours pre-arrival ship radio reports of ETA. The re-establishment of the reports as requested in paragraph 5, basic communication and by

inclosure 1 would tend to violate the principles of the Navy control procedure (WPRI (E) 50) and make dissemination of correct information more difficult, place added burdens on communications systems, introduce duplication of information into crypto systems, and permit enemy location fixes to be made on ships at sea.

5. It is realized that the Operational Control Authority System, which allows a variation of 8 hours from the stated arrival time without correction (4 hours before or 4 hours after the original ETA) imposes many operational difficulties over the previous system whereby the time of arrival of the ship was gauged so closely as to practically eliminate variations. This period of limited control may be considered a prelude to further developments of the system, and emphasis at this time should be placed upon perfecting the reporting procedures and adjusting port operations to the new methods.

a. Radio communication from and to ships under way and use of the voice transmitter with ships approaching or in the harbor should be eliminated insofar as possible to insure that the system will be effective when radio silence is essential. For the same reason communication from and to ships under way should be limited to the Navy communications system requirements to Naval addressees.

b. The unfortunate case stated in paragraph 1, basic communication, apparently resulted from a combination of three factors, which seemingly indicate an incomplete adjustment to the new system.

- (1) Planning for the acceptance of the vessel was not firmed up on the basis of the stated ETA, but was delayed until receipt of the firm confirmation at 1700 hours on 23 October.
- (2) The debarkation instruction, when initiated, was delayed too long in transit (message was initiated at 1715 hours on 23 October, but not received until 24 October, too late for the ship to comply with the instructions)
- (3) The conditions were aggravated by the apparent failure to determine the troop messing situation prior to the actual docking.

6. Because of the implications attendant to the above outlined Naval functions and organization, it is not considered appropriate to pursue further the possibility of re-establishing the former 100 hours, 48 hours and 24 hours pre-arrival reports of shipping entering Tokyo

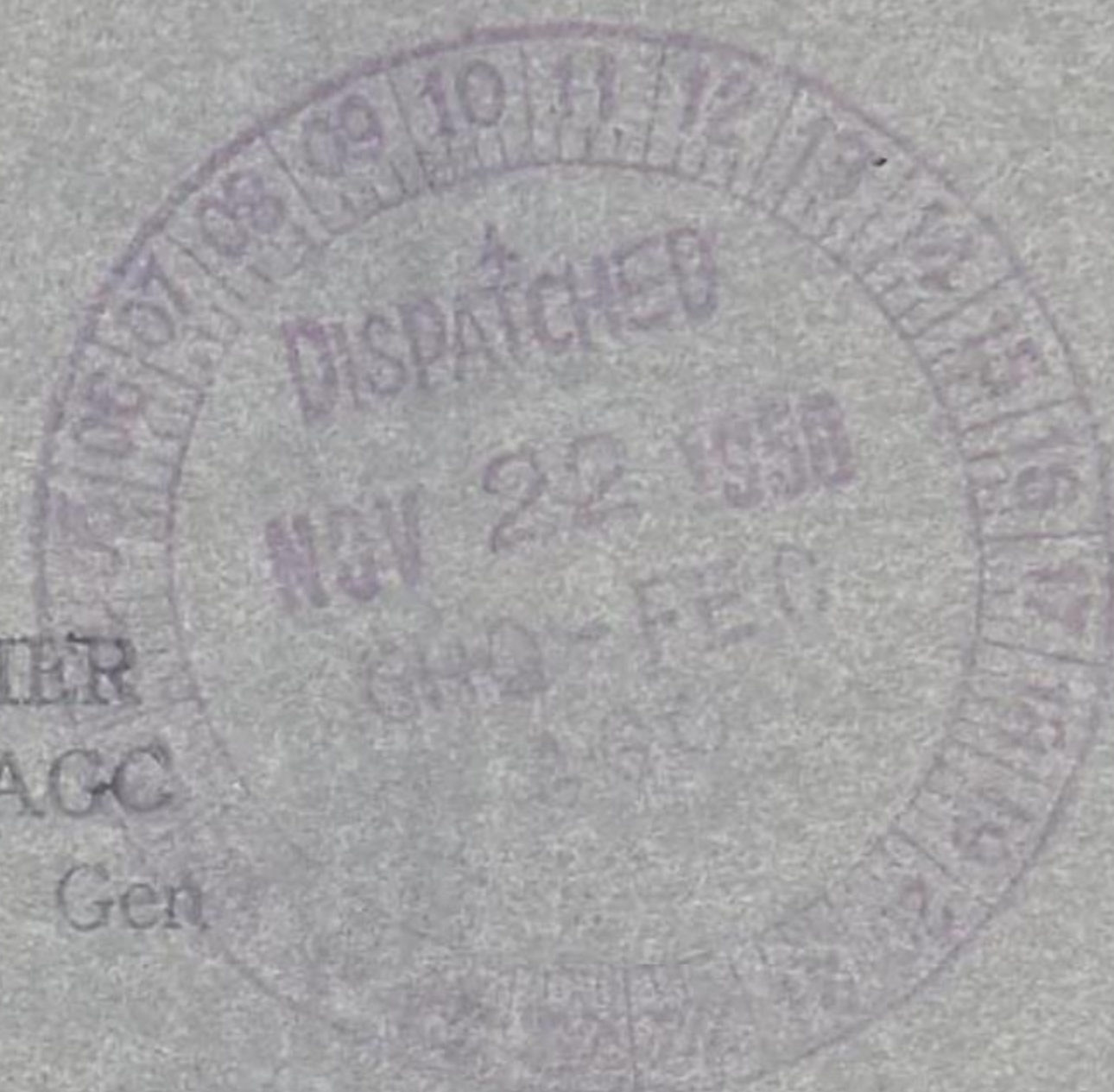

MEMO FOR RECORD:

1. Ltr, Hq 2d T Maj Port, AGMT, Subj: Reports from Ships, to CG JICOM, 30 Oct 50, states that current MSTIS instrs require all ships destined Yoko to sail under radio silence. As a result, the port is unaware of the exact arrival time of any ship until picked by visual means which leaves only about 2 hrs sailing time before docking. An example is given USNS Lt BEAUDOIN in which considerable confusion resulted from delays of radio msgs on arrival and docking time, and feeding of EM pass. This ltr thoroughly reviews the ports need for timely arrival info. The recommendation is made in the final para that all pass-carrying ships calling at Yoko be required to render reports by radio indicating position and ETA when 100, 48 and 24 hrs from destination.

2. The above ltr was fwd to CINCPACFLT by 1st Ind, Hq JICOM, AGMT 565.2 (30 Oct 50) 3 Nov 50, JICOM concurs in the recommendation made in para 5, basic communication and invites the attention of CINCPACFLT to a previous communication which made the same recommendation, namely JICOM msg E 31462 JM of 19 Oct 50 which states, in order to insure more efficient port operation, request re-establishment as soon as possible of radio reports of ETA when ves are 100, 48 and 24 hours out of Yoko.

3. The system recommended by the 2 communications is exactly the same as prevailed before the Korean hostilities. This Army reporting requirement, however, was superseded during the first part of July by instrs thru Naval channels which imposed a security restriction on the

ship transmitting its position and ETA. Subsequently, CINCPACFLT msg 262154Z Aug 50 stated that a limited control of shipping had been placed into effect in the Pacific effective 07001Z Sep 50. Para 2 of this msg states that the Navy directive WPRI (E) 50 (Wartime procedures and Routing Instructions) is made effective and all shpng will come under operational control Naval Control of Shpng Offices (NCSO) for routing and sailing to and from Far East. Para 5 of the msg calls attention to Para 215 of WPRI (E) 50 and states that sailed and arrived information will be rendered accordingly, (Sailing msg states next port of call and date and time of ETA, sailed msg states name of ves and ATP. If a variation of 4 hours either way from the stated ETA is anticipated, the ship then transmits a new ETA). JICOM and the ports have always been info on these shpng msgs.

4. JICOM msg E 31462 JM of 19 Oct 50 (see Para 2 above) was passed for info to DEPCOMSTWESPAC and COMNAVFE. Subsequently CINCFE msgform to these two addrees, AG 500 (19 Oct 50)TO, 25 Oct 50, requested comments and/or recommendations on the JICOM msg be submitted to CINCFE.

5. COMNAVFE spdltr, Ser 6323, 7 Nov 50 readdresses DEPCOMSTWESPAC spdltr, Ser 1902 of 29 Oct 50 and states, it is recommended that these reports (100 48 and 24 hr pre-arrival reports) be abolished. Information required by the ports should be supplied by the established Navy Mvmt Report Office or Operational Control Auth under the Mvmt Report System. Additional reports by ships as recommended by JICOM only make dissemination of correct info more difficult, put added load on communications system, and introduce duplicate info into the crypto systems. Radio transmissions in war and peace should be reduced to a minimum to insure that a system will be effective when radio silence is required. Communication from and to ships under way should be limited to the NCSO system requirements. Use of voice radio should be prohibited except when carefully monitored by Navy auth. COMNAVFE concurs in above recommendations of DEPCOMSTWESPAC.

6. The scope, purposes and procedure details stated in subj 2d Ind were obtained fr Lt Cdr Ashly, MPO, COMNAVFE.

7. In view of the broad scope, future plans and objectives of the Mvmt Report system, it is not advisable to institute a special, local, reporting system for 2d T Maj Port. Rather, the port should study the Navy Mvmt Report System and come up with recommendations for improvements. It is believed that JICOM and port officials are not cognizant of the purposes, organization and principles of MR system, therefore a complete resume has been made in the Ind itself.

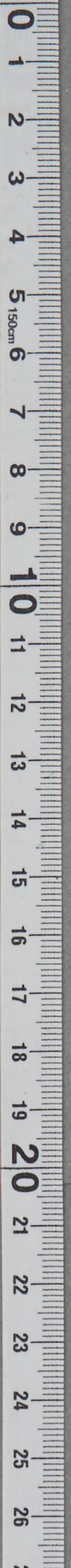

SUBJECT: Reports from Ships

1. BASIC ACTION: Letter from 2d Trans Maj Port to CG JLCOM recommending that all passenger carrying ships with Port of Call at Yokohama be required to render reports by radio indicating position and ETA when 100, 48 and 24 hours from destination. 1st Ind by CG JLCOM concurs.
2. DISCUSSION: In order to have a permanent shipping control organization which could readily be expanded to handle full scale convoy and escorting required during an "Emergency" the present Naval Control of Shipping Organization was established, effective 070001Z Sept 50. The present Korean War situation is being used to test this organization under wartime conditions. Radio silence by ships underway must be observed under these conditions. Thus, the solution to the difficulties reported in the basic is not to have the ships break radio silence, but rather to develop some other method of obtaining the desired info. This would have to be done in an "Emergency". The proposed 2d Ind expresses this thought.

1. CINCFE msg ZX 19411, 7 Oct, among other things, requested com-
ments of CG Army Eight and CG JLCOM on the possibility of substituting
the detailed cargo loading wire prescribed by TM 38-412, Ocean Shipping
Procedures, for the Eighth Army Vessel Loading and Ship Activities Radio
(EAVLSAR). The EAVLSAR report is used for vessels moving between Japan
and Korea, having been established when CG Eighth Army exercised com-
mand in both countries. The EAVLSAR report is substantially identical
with the Detailed Cargo Loading Radio, differing only in that it includes
a slightly different cargo breakdown by service and class of supply and
incorporates passenger information in the cargo radio.

2. CG JLCOM msg DX 73490 JM, 18 Oct, replied, stating that the
EAVLSAR report was originally established to meet the needs of the port
of Pusan, and that JLCOM would incorporate into the EAVLSAR report or
the Detailed Cargo Loading Radio whatever information Army Eight deems
necessary.
