A group of unidentified serial objects was sighted at 2030 hours MST on 16 Jun 52 about 1 mile south of Walker AFB, Roswell, New Mexico. The objects were of a grayish hue in color and their withmitted mititude above the terrain was about 5,000 feet. The objects traveled in a half mean formation in a general Southwest to Northwest line from a point about a mile south of Walker AFB until they disappeared from sight several miles morth of the base. The rate of speed was estimated to be between 500 and 600 miles per hour.

This sighting is similar to those reported in the press and other publications. Although the objects were visued for only a short period of time, the reliability to the observer is felt to warrant the probability of the sighting.







With the county surveyor's instruments I got the following readings from a point 3 miles southeast of Brownsville, Ky. Sighted--41 west of north--elevation 140; disappeared--34 west of north--elevation 3. Time of flight--23 minutes--approximately.

I am positive that it was not an airplane and almost as sure it was not a weather baloon because I was on the wrong side to see reflection from the sun.
