WHOLE BATTALION OF **TURKS CAPTURED ON GALLIPOLI PENINSULA**

British and French Forces Gained Victory Near Gulf of Suvla, Ten Miles North of Position Taken and Fortified Following Landing: Dardanelles Fortifications Are Being Attacked Now By Land and Sea.

London, April 29.—The capture of an entire battalion of Turks. the Gallipoli Peninsula, near the Gulf of Suvla, after an all-day battle was reported in dispatches received here to-day from Athens. Both the British and the French participated in the engagement.

The Gulf of Suvla lies south of Suvla Burnu, on the west coast of the Gallipoli Peninsula. The point of the battle was 10 miles north of the position the allies are reported officially to have taken and fortified across the peninsula, two miles from the southern base.

All dispatches to-day indicate that a second great, attempt to force the Dardanelles now is in full progress, with the allies attacking the Turkish fortifications both by land and sea.

Official advices received by the Brit-ish admiralty from Vice-Admiral de Robeck show that the allies have gain-ed a solid foothold on the Gallipoli Peninsula. They have established a line of positions across the entire penin-sula and these are supported by fifty machine guns and as many batteries.

London, April 29.—In a dispatch from the Athens correspondent of the Ex-change Telegraph company, says that the fierce fighting throughout Wednesday on the shores of Suvia Bay, on the western side of the Gallipoli Peninsula, eighteen miles mosth of the southern extremity, resulted in success for the allies. The losses of the Turks were serious. One entire battalion was captured by the allies.

Athens, April 29.—Unofficial advices received here to-day confirm reports that the allies have captured a battalion of Turkish troops on the Gallipoli Peninsula. They credit the allies with a clean and overwhelming victory.

The losses on both sides are said to have been enormous. The battle raged flercely for twelve hours, the Turks re-tiring under the cover of darkness.

London, April 29.—The following dis-patch has been received by the Ex-change Telegraph from Athens: "The British force landed on the European coast of the Dardanelles has been entrusted solely with the mission of occupying the Gallipoli Peninsula, which has been defended by 6,000

"The French force has been landed entirely on the Asiatic coast with the object of advancing along the littoral by the British on the opposite coast.

"No credence is placed here in the Constantinople report that 8,000 French and British soldiers had been driven to the sea and that 12,000 others had been captured by the Turks as a result of the attempt of the allies to land forces.

London, April 29.—The Turks and the Germans maintain that the British on the west and the French on the east side of the Dardanelles are being managed in their attempts to press forward. It is obvious that statements from Constanti Berlin bearing on the struggle at the Dardanelles not only are being censor-ed, but are being framed with the especial purpose of exciting favorable influence on Italy and other wavering

Constantinople, April 27.—There has been given out an official announcement bearing on the fighting at the Dardanelles which reads as follows:

BRITISH AUTHORITY. MADE INVESTIGATION

London, April 29.—The secretary of date for war has issued to the Cana-lian Associated Press a letter from Dr. John S. Haldane, F. R. S., an authority on respiration, air analysis, etc., who went to France to observe and study the effects of the gas used by the enemy, and to report the best means of resisting the attacks. 




