In red the only ones we find still with us are Commander and a new variety, John L. Crenshaw, named this blooming season.

However, there are many more late pinks. Laverne Christman has been an outstanding variety both in our show room and fields this season. Myrtle Gentry, Milton Hill, President Coolidge, Loveliness, Blanche King, Ella Christiansen, Nancy Dolman, Mrs. John M. Kleitsch, Walter Lindgren, Hansina Brand, Ramona, Oliver F. Brand and Dawn of Day, are at their best, and we wish that every flower lover could pass through our shaw room today and really see what beauties these are. To see is to believe.

After painstaking work with a new variety for a period ranging from fifteen to twenty years, it should not sell at a price less than \$50.00 per root when it is first introduced. Due to conditions at the present time, we realize very few would be able to purchase at such a price. We have just 10 roots to affer of each variety that we are introducing and we have decided to place a price of \$10.00 on each af them. All of these varieties will be divided this season early in September. We will fill our orders and then plant out the belance of our stock. No more stock of these will be offered for sale again for a period of two or three years. Do not order any of these after September 10th.

This variety was named for Dr. Graham, who was so long identified with the early history of the Mayo Clinic at Rochester, Minnesota. Here is a large late white in season with Marie Lemoine. It is a rich creamy white absolutely void of stamens. The plant is tall, with medium green foliage and strong stems. The flower is large, loosely built, with large guard petals enclosing a center of smaller lacy petals. There is an occasional trace of carmine on a petal, but not flecked like Festiva Maxima. The general appearance of this late flower is that of a large, very creamy white, the Kelway's Glorious type. We consider this a real acquisition to our short list of good late whites. It is absolutely a first class variety and also a late variety. It is a loose type and will open well.

EVANGELINE NEWHALL

A late, very large pink. The petals are very long and broad and the edges are both scalloped and ruffled. The flower has variations of deeper pink running throughout the petals. This variety is semi-rose in type but not so loose a type as the semi-rose, Phyllis Kelway. This variety was named fully ten years ago but we have never offered a root for sale up to this time. It was named in honor of Mrs. C. W. Newhall, whose husband has been for many years headmaster of Shattuck Military School located in our city.

Another fine red coming into flower with the late varieties. When Baroness Schroeder is just passing its prime, this variety is at its best. This is a bright crimson-red unlike in color either Longfellow or Mary Brand. When the buds just begin to open, they might pass for a rich red rose. The three or four outer rows of petals ore very large, broad, and symmetrically arranged. This flower has been admired in our seedling fields for the past ten years. We are dividing our stock again this fall and we are pleased to be able to offer a few roots for sale this season. The plont is of medium height, stems strong and erect, foliage narrow and dark green, and the blossom develops into fine size for o red.

L. W. POLLOCK

(Tone 1—Rich Tyrian Rose). We have long sought for a real deep self-colored pink. There are many good light pinks but when you look for dark pinks that will cover an entire blooming season, it is impossible to find flowers of exceptional quality that will compare with our best whites and light pinks. This variety is a true self color deep Tyrion rose. It is as distinct among the deep pinks as Walter Faxon is among the light pinks. The plant is of medium height, very thrifty, light green foliage, and good strong stems. It is a true rose type. The flower does not fade in the field. Here is a very fine field flower and also a good show flower. It is a large flower of exceptional merit.

A very fine semi-rose red that we named about eight years ago for a charming Peony enthusiast who came from Memphis, Tennessee, to visit us during the blooming season that year. She liked this beautiful red better than any other she saw in our seedling patch, and we distinguished it from that time on by giving it her name. We have continued to propagate this variety and have watched it carefully over a period of fourteen years ond we feel sure it is a real acquisition to the already named kinds in the red group. It is a flower of medium size, rich dark crimson in color, shows very little purple and comes into bloom early midseason. As the petals break away from the closed bud, one is deeply impressed by the intense richness of the flower. It is darker than Longfellow but not the color of Mons. Martin Cahuzac. It is a flower that has wonderful substance and lasts remarkably well as a cut flower. We had this variety on display in our show room and sold six plants to one customer. We are going to divide our stock this fall and we can still supply a few more roots. These will not be offered for sale again for a period of two years.

WALTER LINDGREN

Those who are familiar with the great pink, Therese, can get a mental picture of what this variety is like by comparison. What Therese is to the early pinks, this variety is to the late pinks. It is in season just as Baroness Schroeder is passing. It opens in the field a bright clear pink. It holds its color for a few days and then gradually fades lighter. However, it holds its beautiful form for days as it has wonderful substance. It is very much like Therese in color and form but it has much more substance and for this reason it makes a better field and show flower. It does not conflict with Therese as it is much later. The firm of Brand has alwoys been noted for its fine red Peonies. Longfellow, Mary Brand, Lora Dexheimer, Winnifred Domme, Richard Carvel, David Harum, and Charles McKellip are excellent varieties. Among the three reds that we are introducing this year is this superb variety, W. E. Blanchette, a rich deep crimson. It is of immense size, the largest red we know of. It is of a loose, semi-rose type with immense broad petals orranged in symmetricol form like the petols of a beautiful rose. It is so large and of such beautiful form that it catches the eye instantly in the field. It develops nicely inside as o show flower and holds up well over a period of a number of days. We believe anyone who purchases this fine red will be more than pleased with it.

Those of our customers who have expressed an opinion, favor the arrangement according to color, so we are following this plan.

OUR PRICE for any variety listed in this group is \$1.00, unless otherwise noted. This price will give you a Select Brand Division. If planted early this fall, you will get bloom from our select divisions next spring. Our roots are large and it will not hurt any of them to produce for you at least one flower this coming spring.

Choicest of Red Peonies

8.5 ADOLPHE ROUSSEAU

Red. One of the very good early dark reds. The plant is very tall and holds its flowers so erect that it makes a fine showing. One of the finest of all red Peonies as a landscape variety. A great dark flower that looks almost black and unusually rich when viewed from a distance.

8.2 BRAND'S MAGNIFICENT Red. A very deep dark red carrying more blue than any other good Peony. This variety is noted for its beautiful form, prolific bloom, broad symmetrical roselike petals, and excellent color. A midseason variety.

Red. A very tall growing semi-double bright dark red that is early, and splendid as a landscape variety. The color is a deep garnet, with a sheen that the variety is very noticeable among all other reds. For best effects this variety should not be disbudded. Awarded a silver medal by the Massachusetts Horticultural Society.

8.4 FELIX CROUSSE
Late. A deep rose-red showing no stamens. Consists of a central bomb (Crousse) of incurved petals surrounded by broad, prominent guard petals. A good all-purpose red.

The flowers are very large with prominent guard petals surrounding a great ball of closely packed petals of the same shade. The entire flower is an even shade of soft Tyrian rose, without stamens. An upright growing plant with very strong stems that hold their great blooms erect. One of the very best landscape reds. This variety appeared in five prizewinning collections at the National Show held at Des Moines in 1924.

This is considered one of the finest Peonies grown. When the last symposium was taken, this variety received a rating of 9.0 after 79 people had voted. When the buds first open, they are a delicate blush, but the flower soon fades to a milky white. This is a variety that should be found in every collection. It comes into bloom late, after most of the white Peonies are gone.

9.0 DENISE
This very large white opens a faint blush pink showing red markings on its center petals. The flower has a delightful rose fragrance and is most dependable. Strong, upright stems are af medium height. The flower is of exquisite form and appearance. A new Lemoine variety of the highest quality.

8.1 DUCHESSE DE NEMOURS

A very early, fragrant, creamy white. The guard petals are white with a full center of light canary-yellow, deepening to pale green at the base. An excellent garden variety.

9.1 E. B. BROWNING
A very late white coming into bloom with Marie Lemoine. The buds of this variety are often as large as the entire blooms of other fair-sized Peonies. The bud opens slowly, and as the petals unfold, a delicate pink coloring appears; the inner surface of the petals being washed with the most delicate pinkish canary. The perfume of the flowers is strong and sweet. The variety is so late that it is seldom seen in Peony shows.

8.9 ENCHANTERESSE

A charming very late white. An excellent show flower. Prolong your blooming season by adding this excellent variety to your list. We understand that this is not a good flower for the South, as it is very late and does not open well, but the farther north it is grown, the better it becomes. As grown with us, it is rated far too low. It is surely entitled to a rating of 9.2. A splendid pure white.

9.3 FESTIVA MAXIMA An early true rose type with broad guard petals surrounding a compact inner mass of rich white petals flecked crimson. This is a good early garden variety to use for cut flowers, but as a rule, comes too early for a show flower.

Frances Willard is a very fine white which we believe gives universal satisfaction. It opens an exquisite blush white, occasionally with a carmine touch, changing pure white. Usually found in the winning classes in every show room. Midseason, comes into bloom with Mary Brand. (A gorgeous Peony named for a great woman).

8.7 JAMES KELWAY
This variety received a rating of 8.7 when the last symposium was taken, after 49 people had voted. This fact, alone, places it among the good varieties. The flower is very large, loose and semi-rose in type. It apens a rose-white changing to milk-white with base of the petals tinged yellow. The fragrance is strong and pleasing.

8.9 JUBILEE (Pleas)

Very large, flat, ivory-white flowers. Petals long, narrow and laosely arranged, producing a very attractive feathery effect. Everyane familiar with Peonies knows that Jubilee is a fine flower. Its only defect is a weak stem, yet one can well afford to support such a beautiful flower.

9.8 KELWAY'S GLORIOUS

Midseason. Although not as symmetrical as Le Cygne, we believe this wonderful variety is fully as good and deserves as high a rating. Immense blooms with very long petals, so arranged that the entire bloom resembles a great downy ball of the most exquisite, delicate, snow-white lace. For a Peony of great size, probably no other can exhibit such perfection af beauty.

Midseason. A large flower, nicely rounded, with great broad petals beautifully arranged. Color a soft even shade of creamy pink. In our opinian, this flower is not fully appreciated, for it is one of the choicest of all Peonies and should rate well above 9.0. From our first observation of the flower, this has been our constant impression. When shown together with magnifcent blooms of Le Cygne, Kelway's Glorious, Therese and Mme. Jules Dessert, we have seen blooms of La Lorraine which showed up equally beautiful; and we think it is just as good a flower as any of them.

Of your 1925 list of Peanies, Ella Christiansen and Mrs. Frank Beach were especially fine to say nothing of the giant blooms of Mrs. John M. Kleitsch, and few Peonies in my garden ever surpass Victory Choteau Thierry, Martha Bulloch, and Phoebe Cary.

9.0 MRS. FRANK BEACH
Ivory-white. A very large, flat, perfect rose type flower with long, narraw, laciniated petals of the same lacy effect as in Jubilee. Blooms equally large as Jubilee but barne finely erect on rather dwarfish plants with very strong stems. Much as we admire Jubilee, it is handicapped by a weak stem. Mrs. Frank Beach is a glorified Jubilee. Deep cream, it fades but little even when developed in the field. Like Le Cygne, this variety develaps a flower true to type even on a yearling. Blooms profusely as a two-year-old. Received an Award of Merit, American Peony Society, London, Ontario, 1922. Late midseason. Sweetly fragrant.

9.1 MRS. HARRIET GENTRY
A very late perfect rose type variety. Petals are very large, of the purest glistening white. Deep in the center of the flower yau will find a touch of that peculiar pinkish tint far which Solange is famaus. 



Brand's New Improved French Lilacs

With Blossoms so Large and so Beautiful One can Hardly Imagine that They are Related to the Common Lilac

We have experimented with the propagation of the French Lilac for over 20 years to find how to grow it in a practical way on its own roots. We have discovered how to do this successfully. Before we were able to do this we never had any success with French Lilacs in the Minnesota climate. We have never had any trouble with our French Lilacs dying out since. A French Lilac must be on its own root to do well in a severe climate like that of Minnesota.

Growing an Improved Lilac on its own root is a slow process. It actually takes us 2 years longer to produce a Lilac of a given grade on its own root than it would take to produce the same grade on privet. Yet we insist on sending out only those Lilacs that will prove satisfactory, so our customers can depend upon receiving only genuine own-root plants.

We have a wonderful deep rich alluvial soil; the soil in which the Lilac revels. This contributes to strong thrifty tops with a large, well-balanced root system.

Our Lilacs are making a wonderful growth as this is written and as our stock is almost twice as large as we have ever had before, if nothing happens between now and digging time the chances are that our customers will receive some unusually fine bushes this fall.

Planting: Lilacs can be planted either in spring or fall. In the fall the planting season starts about September 20th and continues in the North well into late October, while in the South planting can go on all winter.

To allow the French Lilac its natural spread, the plants should be set not less than 8 feet apart. Dig a hole as large as a bushel basket. Fill back with rich top soil mixed with 1/3 part well-rotted cow manure if same is obtainable, and tramp down firmly until you can place the plant on this soil so that when roots are spread out naturally the crown will be from 4 to 6 inches deeper than it was in the nursery row.

Work the soil in carefully among the roots until the hole is half full; then tramp this down unusually hard. Then pour in a full pail of water. After this has settled away fill the hole with loose mellow soil until it is rounding full; then tramp lightly. Keep plants well hoed. Where planting is done in the fall, place a coarse mulch 6 inches deep about bushes first winter to keep ground from heaving.

Fertilizers: A Lilac likes a sweet soil and responds wonderfully to applications of lime. Use 4 quarts of lime to a large bush each year. Any good well-balanced fertilizer can be used with good results.

Heavy applications of well-rotted barnyard manure every year covering the ground about the bushes is best,

These bushes come to you already to plant. They need no trimming. Now that the French Lilac can be propagoted successfully on its own root, there is no longer any reason why a Lilac propagated in any other way should be planted.

Trimming: As soon as the blossoms fade the bushes should be gone over and the faded blossoms cut out. Remove just the blossom stem but none of the new wood surrounding it, as it is on this new wood that next year's bloom appears. As the bush starts to become too large and tall it should be gone over in March and from a quarter to a third of the old main branches cut back to within a foot of the ground. These old stumps will soon put out a new growth which by fall will have developed into long new shoots which in the course of two years will have formed virtually a new bush in the place of the old one and it is on these new growths that the great large panicles will appear that are so desirable.

Caution: The newly planted Lilac often acts as though it were going to die, even after it has made a good start the first spring. The leaves suddenly stop growing, turn limp, and the bush looks as though it were dying. As a rule there is no cause for alarm. Give the plant a good, thorough soaking of water;

Give the plant a good, thorough soaking of water; then cultivate it well the balance of the season. The next spring, remove any dead wood and your Lilac will come all right.

Pests: Oystershell scale and the lilac borer are about the only enemies of the Lilac. For oystershell scale use as a spray either lime-sulphur or an oil spray. Use liquid lime-sulphur in preference to dry at the rate of 1 part to 7 parts water, or if the oil spray is used, then at the rate of 1 part to 15 parts water. In using the oil spray, be sure the sprayer is thoroughly cleaned out before putting in the oil. Lime-sulphur spray should be applied just as the buds are beginning to show green, while the oil spray should be used just before the buds show any green.

The liloc borer is best handled by prevention. If bushes are kept well cultivated and growing, there is but little borer trouble. Where the borer is at work, he may be taken and killed by running a small wire into the hole and twisting it around to accomplish this. One can also shoot carbon bisulphide into the furrow of the borer with a medicine or fountain pen dropper; then plug up the entrance with putty or gum.




