REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE FLORIDA METHODIST ORPHANAGE

Dear Brethren:—We are grateful for a year of prosperity and progress in the work you have entrusted to us. We have cared for more children this year than ever before and there has been a larger average number in the home for the year. The income from the churches has been barely sufficient to meet these increasing needs. While we have met all of our obligations, for current expenses, maintenance, and repairs, we have had no fund for any of the needed improvements; for increasing our working force in order to undertake manual training, technical training and equipment for the same.

A glance at the statistical report will show the income from charges by districts; and the Treasurer's report contains an itemized statement of disbursements. It will be seen that many of the stronger churches have done very little for the Orphanage through the year.

LOCATION—Acting on instructions of this Conference, the Board appointed a committee to seek invitations from several desirable and suitable locations. So far, we have had no definite offer for a site, nor a definite invitation to locate. The committee on location, is continued and we trust to be able to take some steps toward a better location soon. As to the present location; the health of the children has been good. There has been no sickness of a serious nature and no death. We have good sanitary conditions and the healthfulness of the locality is good.

INCOME—We must have an increased income or we shall be compelled to turn away applicants for our benevolence. In other words, we are succeeding so well in our purpose, to gather poor and

dependent orphan children, that we must increase our facilities and our capacities to meet the necessary demand from us.

SUPERINTENDENT—We again express our confidence in our Superintendent and Matron, both as to their splendid Christian characters and their ability in the administration of the affairs of the home. The management of all the details of operation, the discipline and training of the children, and the upkeep of the premises and buildings are most satisfactory.

We call especial attention to the two appended reports of the Treasurer and the Superintendent, respectively.

We offer, for adoption, the following resolutions:

First. That the Conference set apart the fifth Sundays as Orphanage Day, on which the Sunday schools and the congregations, as well, be asked to make an offering for the support of the Orphanage.

Second. That the Saturday before the last Sunday in October be designated as Work Day and the following Sunday as Harvest Day for the ingathering of offerings for the Orphanage.

Third. That it shall be the duty of the pastors to present the Orphanage cause to their congregations and Sunday schools on the designated days.

Fourth. That the Superintendent of the Orphanage be invited by the pastors, at such times as shall be convenient, to visit their several charges, to present the cause of the Orphanage.

Fifth. That an assessment of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000.00; be levied on the Conference to be raised by above methods or otherwise; said assessment to be apportioned on the several districts according to accompanying schedule, made on same basis as other apportionments.

The general health of the Home is good. No serious illness of any kind during the year. The children are doing exceptionally good work at school, due to the excellent teachers in our public schools. Forty-

one attend school. Eighteen girls have been organized into sewing classes, taking the regular course. These girls are also doing all the mending for the Home, under the direction of their teacher. The boys have split all the wood during the year. We have about organized the boys into a troop of boy scouts. The organization will be complete in a few days. We have had a splendid garden both last Spring and this Fall, cared for by the boys. The girls are interested in the flower garden, the soil for which is prepared by the boys and the seed contributed by the state representative. During the summer the boys painted the entire large front veranda. Two of our girls took lessons on the piano during the summer, paid for by an individual and by a class. One of these girls now plays the accompaniment at family worship. The children of the Home do the entire work of the institution, except the directing, cooking and washing. The general character of the children is good. They are hearty, healthy and full of life. Some of them have a future; all deserve your care and help.

SUPPLIES—We have had sufficient supply of clothing during the year. We have received boxes, barrels and packages from nearly every part of the State. Fruits and vegetables of all kinds in the season have been contributed. Friends of the Home have donated a carload of wood and promised another; had a boardwalk laid from the front gates to the veranda; presented the Home with four dozen silver dessert spoons, engraved with the initials of the Home, and a supply of new clothing for all the children. Various gifts of interest have been made, but the list would be too long, should I enumerate them all. God has wonderfully supplied our needs, and we are all very grateful for the same.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION No. 1

Whereas the action of the College of Bishops, acting as a Board of visitors, vetoing the acceptance of the so-called million-dollar gift to the Medical Department of the Vanderbilt University by Mr. Andrew Carnegie, has been criticised in certain quarters; and whereas four members (being a minority) of the Board of Trust, at the annual meeting held June, 1913, entered their protest against the acceptance of

said proposed gift; and whereas it has been claimed by certain parties that neither the veto of the Bishops nor the protest of the minority members of the Board of Trust represents the sentiments and judgment of the Church generally; therefore, be it

Resolved, first, that while we regret that the terms of said gift as set forth in Mr. Carnegie's letter, were such that it could not be accepted with honor, we do hereby heartily indorse both the Bishops' veto and the protest of the minority of the Board of Trust;

Second, That we hereby express hearty agreement with the sentiments and positions of the Bishops, as expressed in their "Veto" and "Message to the Church at Large," and of the minority of the Board of Trust, as expressed in their protest;

Third, That we hereby pledge our hearty sympathy and support to the Bishops and to the minority of the Board of Trust as faithful servants of the Church, in the discharge of their important duties in this whole Vanderbilt matter.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION No. 2

Reports in the hands of this Board from various educational institutions, indicate a high degree of efficiency and a large measure of success. These cover detailed statement from Vanderbilt University, our Correspondence School, Ministerial Supply, Emory, Wesleyan and Southern.

Southern College, our own Conference school, while enjoying not quite so large a patronage, is doing thorough college work and making a good record for herself. We have for some years, been compelled to incur obligations for needed improvements, and these have proved a serious handicap to us, in the extension of our work, but the Board learns, with genuine pleasure, that the Board of Trustees have inaugurated a scheme which not only promises to raise the debt, but to render very material, financial aid to the college.

We have helped during the past year, five young men who are studying for the ministry, from our Conference Loan Fund in an aggregate amount of \$350.00 for the year.

We recommend:

First. That all of our pastors observe the second Sunday in February as Educational Rally Day, and that a sermon on Christian education be prepared for the occasion. Also that assessments for education be taken early in the year.

Second. That we urge our people to a more hearty interest in and liberal patronage of. our Conference School.

Third. We heartily commend the work of our church for, and among, the negroes, as directed through Paine College.

Fourth. We recommend that the assessment for Conference Educational Work be fixed the same as for last year, namely: \$6,000. The General Board apportions for this Conference, \$1,972.00.

Fifth. We recommend appointment, by Bishop Morrison, of the Reverend K. Hollister as a student of Vanderbilt University and Rev. G. E. Scott to be Conference Secretary of Education. That Rev. J. F. Bell be confirmed as a trustee of Wesleyan College.

We note, with pleasure, the action of the Courts in so amending the Charters of Emory College and of Wesleyan, as to provide that all trustees of said colleges, however elected, shall first be confirmed by the annual Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in the territory, within the limits of which, said trustee shall reside.

May our people read them. All Methodists ought to be versed in the literature of their church, especially since the reading members are the intelligent, the active, and the most successful working members. We urge upon all Methodists the wisdom of patronizing our own Book Houses, of buying freely, of reading extensively and thoughtfully our own books in preference to other publications and to commend and encourage the reading of the same by their own children.

Our Conference Colporteur

Your Committee in connection with the subject of books, commend most heartily the splendid services to our Conference of Rev. C. W. White, who has been the instrument of circulating and encouraging the reading of many of our best church publications. Brother White's zealous and faithful work deserves the highest commendation of all Methodists of the State, and we believe that our Master will reward his faithful work in his dual capacity.

The Florida Christian Advocate

We are rejoiced to call attention to the success of our own Conference organ and to report that it has been kept up to the standard and has greatly increased its circulation during the past year under the faithful management of Brother D. B. Sweat. The paper has met all financial claims upon it during the past year, and its subscription has increased about 1,000—from 4,600 at the last Conference to 5600 during the year, the largest subscription list in the history of the paper.

We are informed that much better facilities for publishing the paper are provided for another year. Your Committee feel that Bro. Sweat deserves the thanks and commendation of all Methodists within the bounds of our Conference.

The Christian Advocate

Our general organ, The Christian Advocate, keeps well up to its established standard and we desire all Methodists, who are able to take two church papers and who desire to keep posted in the general work of the church, to take and read our general organ.

Our Quarterly Review

We believe that our Quarterly Review ranks well with all similar church publications, and we especially commend it to preachers and laymen and heartily wish that its subscription list might be multiplied many times, and that many thousands more Southern Methodists could be induced to take and carefully read it.

Our Sunday School Literature

Your Committee may be partial in its judgment, but we confidently believe that no better Sunday School Literature is issued from any press. The several magazines and the various publications for graded work are admirably suited for the purposes for which each is desired. The entire church, in our judgment, has cause to congratulate itself on the whole of the Sunday School out put. We are glad that Dr. E. B. Chappell came and delivered his able and comprehensive address to our Conference. We believe that God is using

him for most excellent services to the church in a field of labor for which he is eminently fitted. We trust that our Conference will be annually visited by him.

Educational Literature

The various tracts, lectures, booklets and books published and circulated under the supervision of Dr. Stonewall Anderson on the subject of church education makes as a whole most comprehensive and instructive information on that department of the work of the church. Your Committee recommend that Methodists, clerical and lay, secure and read this most valuable literature and get the inspiration that may be obtained by reading the various publications circulated by our General Secretary of Education. This literature gives a comprehensive view of the work and aims of the church along educational lines and informs the honest inquirer where he may best educate his sons and daughters. A letter addressed to Dr. Anderson at Nashville will secure a catalogue of this literature. We trust that our people will inform themselves and patronize, as far as they may be able, the Educational Institutions of our own church.

Our Missionary Literature

We call especial attention to the Missionary publications of the church—The Voice and all circulating literature issued by the Board, and commend the same to our membership at large.

New Publications

From information filed with your Committee, there is necessity for a revised publication of our discipline in Spanish, and also in Italian, for the use of those engaged in Italian Missions. Therefore, we recommend to the proper authorities that the discipline be published in both of those languages after the next General Conference.

REPORT OF JOINT BOARD OF FINANCE

Dear Fathers and Brethren:—We are very glad to report that the amount of money at our disposal for the old and worn out preachers, their widows and children is larger than last year.

The amount coming to us from the Superannuated Preachers' Endowment Fund increases every year. In 1911 it was \$168. In 1912

it was \$198.75 and this year it is \$222.60. This helps considerably toward making a better provision for our veterans.

The amount paid to us by the Publishing House at this Conference is \$252. The collections over the Conference are better this year than last, so that we have been enabled, in not a few instances to increase the amount given to our aged and esteemed brethren.

Through an insurance policy of Dr. Josephus Anderson, \$500 comes to the Board for the use of the worn out preachers. It was decided to lend this money out this year, and use only the interest for the purpose aforesaid.

But let us remember that while all this is very gratifying and encouraging, the amount given to our claimants is altogether too small. Many really need and should have more than the Board is able to give them out of the funds at our disposal. The claim of the aged and worn out servant is a sacred one, and is being recognized more and more throughout our country. The Government pensions the old and disabled soldiers. Railroads and other corporations provide for those aged ones who have served them long and well. The churches generally are studying to solve the problem of a better provision for the old and worn out preacher. Our church must not be behind, we must recognize the obligation and rise to meet it and at least pay every dollar of the assessment in full.

It is very gratifying to note and commend Rev. B. K. Thrower for his success in securing six new and comfortable homes throughout the bounds of our Conference for our superannuated preachers.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

This organization had its origin in America about one hundred years ago.

Its object as most of the brethren know was to disseminate the Gospel through the printed word of God at actual cost of publication to those who are able to pay for it, and to those who are unable to pay to make the Bible a free gift. This policy has been adhered to unto this good day, and has resulted in many millions of volumes as to numbers and in the language of more than one hundred and fifty different peoples. When we look at the work of this Society as the same is connected with perhaps the greatest department of church activity today, namely the cause of missions, both near at hand and afar off, we find it simply and truly an indispensable adjunct to this worldwide enterprise.

Right here let us say that Rev. M. B. Porter, D.D., American Bible Society District Agent in the South Atlantic States, Richmond, Va., says that the work of Rev. D. Carrera amongst the thousands of Cubans, Spaniards and Italians of Tampa and Key West, is the most

important in his entire agency. Bro. Carrera is our Cuban pastor in Ybor City. We thus see that this Society is carrying on in our midst a work whereunto the Holy Ghost has separated it.

The cost of furnishing the Bible in the language of the nations is far too great for any one church to undertake, even in the fields peculiar to that church but the society as a fully able and benevolent Good Samaritan comes almost literally running to the assistance of the Missionary and at little cost in money and at no sacrifice of brotherly love, furnishes him that which contains the visible bread of life for those who most need it.

We cannot, for any reason, afford to treat with indifference an indispensable friend and co-laborer. The funds necessary to operate such a great enterprise are raised through legacies bequeathed to the Society and by public collections in churches throughout our country.

Doubtless, the main reason why we do not do more for this great and most unselfish benevolence is because we learn so little about it. We are not informed and refreshed as to it from time to time as we might be and doubtless as we wish to be. We desire to offer two resolutions: First. That as a Conference, we assume an assessment for the Bible cause to be placed on all the pastoral charges equal to one per cent of each pastor's salary. Second. That Rev. F. M. C. Eads be requested to write occasional articles for the Florida Christian Advocate concerning the American Bible Society and its work.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

The progress and enlarging opportunities of the work call loudly for an increase in the force of missionaries, and the urgent need for better equipment continues and grows more serious.

The mission of the church is to Christianize the world. We as Methodists should do our part in this great work. We are grateful to Almighty God for the work done and for the progress made.

Never in the history of our own Conference has there been so many opportunities and urgent demands for men and means to give the Gospel to the rapidly developing communities and towns within our own State. The call has been made on your Conference Board for the coming Conference year for nearly four thousand dollars more than the Missionary assessment on the Conference for nineteen hundred and thirteen.

Every dollar that the Conference assesses for home and foreign

missions is needed. The General Board of Missions is in great need of money to maintain their present work and to enlarge their plans, while your Conference Board is embarrassed for want of means to carry forward our Missionary work within the bounds of our own Conference.

We therefore recommend that all our pastors and members begin early in the year and work diligently to raise the Missionary assessments in full. We also ask that the presiding elders urge that these assessments be paid in the first part of the year.

We further recommend the Missionary Voice to all our pastors and people, and urge that they subscribe for and read this valuable Missionary periodical. We recommend that Rev. W. J. Carpenter be appointed as our Conference Missionary Secretary.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE

The liquor traffic in the United States of America is doomed. The cause of temperance and sobriety is already won in the public thought. Organized forces of righteousness are marching in double-quick time to a victory certain, overwhelming and enduring. A nation without the shame of the open saloon, is not a vision of achievement in the vague future, but is a reality, inviting and challenging the Church of God, today. One more great battle, one other great issue joined and after that, the death of the liquor traffic shall be written in the Constitution of the country and shall become one of the basal principles of government upon which the nation will build a new civilization, free from the curse of intoxicating liquors.

Amid the marvels of a wonderful age, none is more astounding than the progress of the prohibition cause. The sale of intoxicating liquors has been abolished in one section after another, until a large majority of the people of the country has been delivered from the curse. Whenever the question has been put to the arbitrament of the ballot, with an open field and a fair count, the cause of prohibition has unfailingly won. State Legislatures have been characterized by the laws they have enacted, to either abolish the liquor traffic or to restrain and diminish its work of destruction. The Congress of the United States has registered the popular will in the Webb-Kenyon bill; and the people have elevated to the office of Chief Executive of the Nation, a man who is an ardent foe of the legalized liquor traffic and he, in turn, has surrounded himself with a Cabinet composed of men who fear God and work righteousness. So the great cause of temperance, like a sea of light, has pushed its way over the continent, beating against one grim headland after another, rising higher and higher until it covers the nation, valleys and mountains too, like the sunshine on a summer's day. We give the praise to God, while we take the paeans of victory upon our lips.

The Church of God is in the van. But the victory has not been won by the Church alone. The great industries of the Nation demanding efficient service from employees, have thrown the organized might of factory and shop, and mill and mart against the open saloon. Science searching out causes and effects, and seeking to free humanity from burdens that oppress and practices that retard, has said that the liquor traffic entails too much cost to be borne. The medical profession, seeking to conserve health, has said that the diseased superinduced by intoxicating liquors, is consuming the vitality of the race, and that the saloon must be destroyed. The statesman, seeking to uplift his people, has recognized that the saloon is the enemy to all government, and that it is the organized center of anarchy in which all lawlessness is spawn and that everywhere, refusing to be regulated, it must be destroyed. So, following the leadership of the church, bus-

ness, science, medicine, politics have fallen in and made an invincible and irresistible army in this warfare against the saloon.

The object of all government is to preserve the public health and the public morals. We stand, in amazement, before the fact that the Nation has tolerated for so long a time, a traffic that destroys both. But the night is far spent; the day is at hand; and with the early dawn, the nation will be divorced forever, from a partnership with a traffic that lives upon the spoils of health and morals it makes among the people.

Therefore be it resolved, by the Florida Annual Conference:

First. That we respectfully petition the Congress of the United States to pass a Resolution submitting to all the people a constitutional amendment, prohibiting the manufacture, sale, transportation and importation of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, in this country; and that we further request the Representatives from the State of Florida, in both houses of Congress, to give their earnest support to such resolutions.

Second. That the State of Florida should be absolutely freed from the legalized liquor traffic, and that we do hereby pledge ourselves to promote the cause of Prohibition in the State by all laudable means soever.

Third. That we heartily endorse the Anti-Saloon League and the Womei's Christian Temperance Union and register our purpose to cooperate with them in all their activities for the destruction of the liquor traffic.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

For information regarding the work of our general board of Church Extension, we refer the Conference to the admirable Handbook published by that Board, which has been mailed to every pastor, and which gives a most complete account of this work.

Your Conference Board has had before it this year twelve applications for aid, ten from churches, two from parsonages, asking for donations amounting to \$2,675.00, and loans aggregating \$1650.00.

We have found it possible to make the following appropriations:

We regret to learn that our Conference paid in 1912 but seventy per cent. on its assessment for Church Extension as against seventy-seven per cent. on an assessment of the same amount the year before. In view of the urgent and increasing needs of our State in this direction, your Board insists that every effort ought to be made to pay this assessment in full.

The General Board informs us that our Conference Loan Fund now has a capital of \$2,671.55, to which will be added the amount of this year's collection \$534.00. The amount available from this source alone made possible the unprecedented appropriation of the present year.

The assessment for the coming year from the General Board is \$5,693.00. The assessment for the J. C. Ley Loan Fund remains at the established figure of \$100.00 for each Presiding Elder's District. These assessments are combined in the apportionment and the receipts will be divided pro rata. The apportionments to the several Districts are as follows:

REPORT ON DISCREPANCIES

To the Florida Conference, M. E. Church, South:—

At your session held in Tampa, Florida, December 18th, 1912, you appointed the undersigned as a committee "To report at the next session of Conference on discrepancies between the secretary's report and that of the statistical secretary."

If some plan could be inaugurated whereby an examination and comparison of these parallel reports might be made by a committee charged with authority to correct discrepancies, in advance of publication of the reports, the beneficial result would be plainly apparent.

What practical benefit, however, if any, may be hoped for from having your Committee point out inaccuracies in statistical tables which have become permanent records is not apparent to the mind of your Committee.

Furthermore, your Committee feel hardly justified in burdening your records and adding costs to, by increasing the bulk of your Minutes with voluminous details of bygone errors which, at best, have no corrective value, and where no malfeasance exists to justify the report as a foundation for recovery.

Obedient to your mandate, we illustrate the class of errors which occur to the extent named below:

Jacksonville District

In table 3, of the Minutes, Church Extension column amounts reported from pastoral charges, if correctly added would be.....\$558.60
The column footing intended to show the aggregate seems to
indicate the amount to be 531.60
Error in addition is 27.00

Published Minutes indicate a return from Estelle Street Church, for Church Extension, \$25.00. While treasurer's books show \$8.82.

Published Minutes do not show anything for Educational Fund, while Treasurer's account shows that he received \$25.00 for that cause.

Published Minutes show a payment by Riverside, of \$65.00 for Church Extension, while the treasurer's books show the payment to have been \$80. Under the item of Education these amounts are exactly reversed, seeming to indicate that the same were incorrectly reported to the Statistical Secretary.

The aggregate difference between the Treasurer's report and the report of the Statistical Secretary, is \$1050.73. One error in the addition on the aggregate for Church Extension payments in the Tampa district, amounts to \$1007.50. The collections reported, if correctly

added, would be \$815.50, while the published footing of the column in table 3, seems to show it to be \$1823.00. Error, \$1007.50.

The difference between the Treasurer's books and the Annual Conference Minutes is, \$1050.73. This is embraced in the table above which seeks to set forth errors in addition, as well as errors in reporting to the Statistical Secretary, both for and against the districts.

In the Ocala District, Williston charge, published minutes show for church extension \$51.00 while the Treasurer's books show \$15.00. Yet the Treasurer's books shows a credit for \$51.00, on account of Domestic Missions funds, not shown by the published minutes, probably indicating another incorrect report to the Statistical Secretary.

MEMOIRS—DR. ANDERSON

Doctor Josephus Anderson was born in Hanover County, Virginia,

October 7th, 1829, died in Leesburg, Florida, August 11th, 1913.

Thus briefly is recorded the span of life, born, died, with a significant blank between. However, the record of Doctor Anderson's life is not thus indicated, for between those dates there lies a biography of a high life and noble service.

In January, 1848, he was licensed to preach, and in the same year joined the Virginia Conference and became, according to the custom in those days, Junior Preacher on Lancaster Circuit. Then followed his itinerant career of so many years serving Hampton, Farmville and Richmond, being transferred to the Florida Conference in 1854, and stationed at Tallahassee. Other appointments in our Conference were Quincy, Presiding Elder of the Tallahassee District, a supernumerary relation at Monticello, 1860.

Left effective the following year he served Monticello, Thomasville, and Jacksonville, Leon Circuit, and other charges in Middle Florida. In 1875 he was transferred to the White River Conference and was in 1886 transferred again to the Florida Conference, serving that year at Orlando. In 1887 he was appointed Editor of the Florida Christian Advocate, remaining editor and publisher for fourteen years. In 1912 resigning the editorship, he took a superannuated relation, worn with toil and the burdens of years, to spend the evening tide of life like Abraham, looking for that city, whose builder is God, while the Kingdom of God was forming itself gloriously within his soul.

Doctor Anderson was married December 11th, 1851, to Miss Virginia L. Venable. They together walked the path of a united life until she was taken home to God, July 4th, 1904.

From this time Doctor Anderson was a lonely old man, and yet not alone, for God was always consciously with him. This God Consciousness, the witness of the Spirit, the assurance of Sonship, the sweet privilege of a Spirit-born son of God and marks of a divine parentage, was, all in one, the measure of his attainment in Grace; in nature much like the loving John, he was spiritually minded. The one supreme purpose and dominant passion of his life, being to "Know Him," and to enter into the "Fellowship of his sufferings," and thus as an imitator of Christ, to perfect for himself a character so like that of his ascended Lord, that it would admit him to the citizenship of heaven.

His spiritual perceptions were clear; he saw the supreme value Christ placed on the affections, and gave his love, saw that mighty works were wrought by men whose hearts God had touched, rather than their intellects; that divine recognition was based on conditions of the soul and not mighty works. That the meek, the pure in heart, were the blessed ones of God; that what a man does is little, what he is, all important.

Doctor Anderson was a scholarly man, a life long student and able expositor of the Doctrines of our church and a defender of the faith.

He wrote much and well, his pen reaching where his voice could not go to spread Scriptural holiness over these lands.

Our young men had in him a wise counsellor and firm friend. The children loved him, because he loved and always noticed them. No man has left more friends to sorrow; no man in our State has left greater influence for good. His name will not perish, his works do follow him, and he being dead, yet speaketh. God will establish the works of his hands, while in heaven the beauty of the Lord shines upon him.

Made perfect through sufferings, should be his epithet, for he was not "Carried to the skies on flowery beds of ease," but learned obedience by the things which he suffered, and being made perfect, God gently said "It is enough, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

JOINED THE IMMORTALS

Mrs. Nannie Alderman Mitchell was born in Georgia, November the 1st, 1849, and moved with her parents to Hillsborough County, Florida, when a small child. She entered into rest in the spring of this year 1913, from her home at Green Springs, Florida, and her body sleeps beside those of her husband and son awaiting the resurrection of the just.

She became the happy bride of Rev. George W. Mitchell, of the Florida Conference, M. E. Church, South, in Tampa, Florida, in the year of 1866. Her husband, whose memory is still fragrant among us, preceded her to the mansions of the blessed about eighteen months.

Sister Mitchell gave her heart to Christ and her life to the church in the morning of life, while the dews of youth were fresh upon her cheeks and her future was bright with the promise of a long life. She felt that there was nothing too good for her Saviour, and therefore, withheld nothing from him.

A little later in the bloom of young womanhood, the war having just ended leaving our southland in waste and ruin, when she was invited to take her place beside a manly young Methodist preacher with all the hard conditions of our itineracy in Florida, forty-nine years ago. She consulted not with flesh and blood, but unhesitatingly she laid her young life on the altar of consecration as a living sacrifice.

Too great honor cannot be bestowed on her and the princely women of the Heavenly Kingdom composing her class, whose heroism and self denial made possible the achievements of our ministry.

It can be truthfully recorded that in all the relations of life, as daughter, wife and mother, she was faithful. She was a saintly woman.

She knew what it was to bear the burdens of others, to weep with those who weep, and rejoice with those who rejoice.

Up to her last illness she did what she could in her humble sphere in the interest of the kingdom of God in teaching a class of small girls in the little Sunday school at Green Springs.

There remain to revere her memory and follow her beautiful ex-

ample, a devoted daughter, Mrs. Bert. L. McMullen, of Bayview, Fla., and Thos. J. Mitchell, a loving son of Kansas City, Mo. I have no doubt that her life made a substantial contribution to the advancement of the cause of Christ and has added to the enriching of the Kingdom of Heaven.

MRS. NORTON

Mrs. S. E. Norton (nee Cassidy) was born in 1844 at Lawrenceville, Ala., and passed to her home on high, Friday night, October 11th, 1913.

When a child of nine years she joined the church, and at sixteen she was genuinely converted. In 1865 she was married to Rev. W. F. Norton, then of the Alabama Conference. In 1876 they came to the Florida Conference, and were appointed to the Gadsen Circuit, living at Mt. Pleasant. Sister Norton was a genuine Christian, measured by any rule. She had a living experience of salvation. As she would put it herself, she was "Born of the Spirit." Religion was not a matter of "hope" only, but she knew that she was accepted of God. And so she lived daily. She so impressed her children with her Godly life, that she was able to lead each one to accept Christ and to so live as to meet divine approval. Not one of her children is unsaved. All six are now faithful to Christ and the Church. Two, Clarence and Marvin, being honored members of our Conference and successful soul winners.

Sister Norton was firm in her character, taking a stand, which she always did when right and wrong were involved, she held her position, regardless of opposition. So that in the administration of affairs in bringing up her family, they had a firm, but religious government. And this may in a large degree account for the religious body of boys and girls that she has left behind to bless the world.

As a preacher's wife she was a model. Her husband had in her a true helpmeet. Whether he was serving a mission, or district, she put him in his work ahead of other things. She would leave everything, no matter how insistent the call for her time, and go to him, and give her assistance to him, when she could be of service. There is little wonder that he was a good preacher, and a successful leader of the cause. Had he not had natively the elements of success in himself, she would have supplied them. In the church activities, as a member of it, she was as true as at the other points before mentioned.

It was true of her that she made the Bible the man of her counsel. It was her plan to go through it annually. Daily she studied it. In it now are seen the marks made by her as she progressed along its chapters and pages, studying its truths and learning its precepts. Hers might be termed "the open Bible," for such it was.

Much could be said of the touching devotion of the children and children-in-law to the old saint of God. And if it were possible to be more so at one time than another, which is hardly possible, yet they were so tender and kind as she neared the gates and passed out from

this world, and took her last flight to her eternal home, in the city of God, where she shall be appointed to her parsonage, never more to pack up and move.

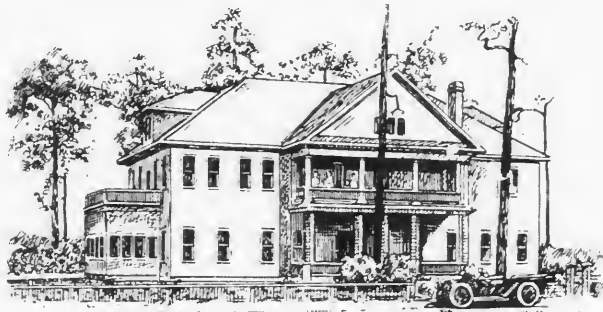
