



#### E.C.T.C.—31 THSCULUM COLLEGE—0

The season opener played here before a large crowd on September 27, found the Pirates getting off to a flying start by whipping Tusculum College of Greeneville, Tenn., 31 to 0. The boys seemed in mid-season form as they scored before the game was five minutes old. Two straight passes to Charlie Craven and Billy Greene put the ball on the two yard line and moments later Bob Young pulled another one of Marshall Teague's passes deep in the end zone for the initial tally. 


