

A New Spraying Mixture.

Another very valuable discovery has been made by Prof. R. C. Kedzie, of the Michigan Agricultural College and Experiment Station. He has discovered a spraying mixture more reliable as an insecticide than Paris green, and which does not burn the foliage of the trees, and it costs less than four cents a barrel, it is not patented, and here are his directions for mak-

Boil two pounds of white arsenic and four pounds of salsoda for fifteen minutes in two gallons of water. Put into a jug and label "poison," and lock it up. When you wish to spray slake two pounds of lime and stir it into forty gallons of water, adding a pint of mixture from the jug.

The mixture in the jug will cost 45 cents, and this is enough for 800 gallons, or twenty barrels of spray. These twenty barrels will require forty pounds of lime, which will cost 20 cents more, making the total cost 65 cents for twenty barrels, or 31/4 cents per barrel.

Its advantages over Paris green are as follows: It is cheaper, and the ingredients can be found in any village drug store; it is easily prepared and easily kept ready; it is uniform in strength; it does not injure the leaves of trees or plants: it colors the leaves white, showing how evenly it is distributed.-Florida Farmer and Fruit Grower.

Substitutes for Glass

From time to time different materials have been placed upon the market as substitutes for glass, all of which have been more or less satisfactory. The most recent comer in this line is a fabric called "Waterproof Sash Paper." which is likely to supersede all others that have ap peared up to the present time, both on account of its serviceable nature and its cheapness, as well as its durable character. The material in question is of American manufacture, being a perfectly translucent waterproof paper with a waxy surface. It comes in rolls 38 inches wide and 25 yards long, and unlike the foreign made fensterpappe, is ready for immediate use. When nailed on the sash it does not sag during wet weather (thus possessing an advantage over some of the materials performing a similar service), but remains perfectly taut under all conditions. Wherever sash shading or a good substitute for glass is in requisition, we should think the "waterproof sash paper" will be found to fill the bill.-Florists' Exchange.

Crimson Rambler Rose.

There will be seen this Easter many a magnificent plant of this rose, and doubtless they will combiand a large price and outsell any plant, and worthily, too. If you want to buy any for another year, don't wait till fall, for this is not the way to do it. Purchase from some reliable nurseryman the good home-grown plants they have to offer; get them within a few weeks before they are started. Pot into 7, 8, 9, or even 12-inch pots, if extra strong. Don't buy any but what are strong, and don't haggle over a few cents in the price; 5 cents' difference in price this spring may mean a dollar next spring. and your labor has been identically the same. Cut out weak shoots, if any, and shorten back the strong growths to one foot. If grown under glass, they would need to be put out of doors in September to ripen their growth, but they could be started and grown entirely out of doors till you wanted to force them. From the growth of this summer you will get the flowers for next spring, and the roots will not be disturbed. There is time enough to give a hint or two rabout their management this summer. The important point is to get the plants at once, while they do not feel the moving.

Hybrid Perpetual roses you can buy of our American nurserymen in the fall and force most satisfactorily the following spring: but this gorgeous Rambler should be well established before forcing is attempted.

Our nurseries are far enough south to escape the severe freezing weather. Everything is bright, green and fresh—sound to the tips. Nearly all the sorts offered are standard sorts, such as most nurserymen can use in assortment with their own growing. Orders should be sent in as soon as possible, but the stock need not be shipped until wanted, as we are prepared to hold it in good condition. We have nothing for sale not offered on this list.

It will be noticed by some of our correspondents that we have refused orders the past season for several articles listed. Our fear of overselling and some countermands account for this. We ask attention to the small-sized trees offered for transplanting into nursery rows. All of the small trees, as well as the large ones, are very nicely rooted, and everything is young, smooth and bright.

We can refer to nurserymen who have bought of us in nearly every State and

Territory. We can give satisfaction, and guarantee it for these shipments.

Terms--Cash with order, or 30 to 60 days from date of shipment to responsible prompt-paying parties. In box lots the price of boxes is included, but the price of boxes on orders filled from the Nurseries is extra. The cost of drayage will be charged in both cases.

For convenience in telegraphing, a cipher is given. The cipher word stands for one box only in cases where there are more than one in the same assortment.

as a rule, to cover the difference in the expense of handling in the smaller numbers. We uniformly tie in bunches of 10, when consistent with the order, and we suggest to our customers to make their orders for varieties in multiples of 10 as far as practicable. Orders for 50 and not over 30 trees, if for not less than 10 of a variety, will be charged at the rate per hundred. orders requiring 300 trees or more, and not less than 10 of a variety, will be filed at the lowest quoted prices. Orders for less than 10 trees of one variety, will be charged at the rate per ten.

SEASON.—Our packing and shipping season begins by the 20th of September, and continues until about the first of March.

We have great advantages to offer here in early shipments for the North in Spring. We do not accept orders for trees we do not grow, as we never buy trees to sell again. You can de-pend upon us for fresh dug trees. Each order is taken up separately, and not until it is wanted for shipment.

SHIPPING DIRECTIONS.—We respectfully beg our patrons to furnish us with explicit directions as to shipping, and the mode of conveyance by which they desire trees forwarded. When no particular directions are given, we forward according to the best of our judgment. But in no case do we assume any responsibility as to safe delivery and condition of Trees and Plants of the proper shipment by us after a proper shipment by us.

RELEASE.—When prepayment of freight is not required, we will Release and Guarantee, and take forwarder's receipt and mail to consignee. take forwarder's receipt and main to consignee. It is left to the option of the shipper of trees over some railroads, whether he will release them or not under the clause "Value less than \$5.00 per 100 lbs." If released under this clause, the freight is less on roads governed by this classification, and we will assume it to be proper tassification, and we will assume it to be proper to make this release, without reference to the value of the trees, unless instructed to the con-trary. This clause does not apply upon roads under some of the district classifications, and because of this confusion we will not be held responsible for any oversight to release, unless instructed by our customers. Claims for delay or loss must be made to the forwarders.

PACKAGES.—The cost of package must be added to the prices quoted in this list, as follows: Boxes 30 inches square, from 7½ to 9 feet long, as the trees may require, each \$2.50; boxes 24 inches, \$2.00; boxes 18 inches, \$1.50; bales from 25c. to 75c. each.

PACKING.-Goods will be packed in moss, and especial care taken to insure their arrival in the best condition.

ASSORTMENTS .- We do not require customers ASSOCIATION ASSOCIATION AS A SOCIATION AS A RULE WE do not wish, but will sell one variety alone if desired. If any substitution can be allowed, either in grade or variety, it should be so stated when making the order. As a rule we do not substitute without permission.

CAUTION .--We accept all orders upon the condition that they shall be void, should any injury befall the trees from frost, hail, storm, fire, or other causes over which we have no control

TERMS.—Cash. When desired, we will allow 30 to 60 days from date of shipment to responsible,

RATES.—As we send this list to the trade only, prompt-paying customers. Parties with whom we make the difference in prices between the 10, we have had no business transactions, will save 100 and 1000 rates very slight—simply sufficient, time by sending reference, with order. We wish it expressly understood that payment is expected from the first collections made, and the time named is only intended as so many days of grace in which to make returns. We do not allow any discount for cash, but we make our prices low to command cash, or prompt returns. In orders command cash, or prompt returns. In orders when the time is not mentioned, 30 days is to be understood. Interest at the rate of 8 per cent per annum must be paid on over due accounts. Should prices be changed, either higher or lower, during the season, the prices ruling at the time the order is made, are expected to stand.

Forms of Payment.—All bills are payable at the office of the seller, and remittances should be made by drafts on New York, Chicago or St. Louis, or by money orders on some Express Company, or by postal orders. We will, however, accept checks from those of our customers who may be located at places having no banking, express or postal facilities, provided they make them in every case payable "with exchange", or add ¼ of one cent. to the amount of the bill for the cost of collection.

ACCEPTANCE.—Notice should be sent us by telegraph, at our expense, if there is any cause of complaint, or should the trees be refused, stating reasons. Claims for deduction, from whatever cause, will receive consideration only when made GUARANTEE OF GENUINENESS .- While we ex-

cause, will receive consideration only when made promptly upon the receipt of the trees. If trees show any signs of shrivelling upon arrival, they show any signs of shrivelling upon arrival, they can usually be restored by being thoroughly watered and buried entirely under the ground for two or three days. Should there be any frost in the trees upon arrival, they should not be removed from the box until the frost is all oft. The box should be placed in the cellar or protected in some other way. The presence of frost in the boxes is not to be considered an evidence of bad condition, as we pack to secure the trees against damage, if the frost is allowed to come out in the natural way. Goods will be considered accepted if removed from the boxes in which they are packed, withfrom the boxes in which they are packed, with-out notice of complaint to us and without our orders for their disposition.
