A comparison of figures taking the receipts for the year ending December 31, 1916 and figures for the year ending December 31, 1917 will show the past year has been a successful one. The increase in milk sold was \$895.63 and in miscellaneous was \$208.77.

We commend the superintendent, Mr. C. W. White, and the matron, Mrs. C. W. White, for their conscientious and satisfactory services and have unanimously contracted with them for another year.

#### WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

#### MIDDLESEX SS:

To either of the Constables of the Town of Tewksbury in said County.

#### GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Tewksbury, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to meet and assemble at the Town Hall in said Tewksbury, on Monday, the 4th day of February, 1918, at nine o'clock a. m., to act on the following articles:

#### ARTICLE 1.

To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

#### ARTICLE 2.

To choose all necessary Town Officers, to choose by ballot a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of Poor, three members of the Board of Health, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, a Tree Warden, and Constables—all to serve one year; one Assessor, one Highway Commissioner, one School Committee, two Trustees of the Public Library and one Park Commissioner, all to serve three years; also one Trustee of Public Library to serve one year. The polls for the election of Town Officers to be opened at ten o'clock a. m., and close at three o'clock p. m.

## ARTICLE 3.

To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.

# ARTICLE 4.

To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise by taxation to defray necessary expenses for the current year, and make appropriations for the same.

#### ARTICLE 5.

To see what action the Town will take on the following question: Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in the Town? The vote to be yes or no, as provided by Revised Laws, Chapter 100, Section 10.

#### ARTICLE 6.

To see if the Town will vote the money arising from licensing dogs, for the ensuing year, to aid in support of the Public Library.

#### ARTICLE 7.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year.

Voted: That the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1918, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, any debt or debts incurred under this vote to be paid from the revenue of said financial year.

#### ARTICLE 8.

To see what compensation the Town will vote for the collection of taxes, and at what rate and from what date interest shall be charged on taxes of 1918 unpaid after November 1, 1918, or to take any other action relative thereto.

#### ARTICLE 9.

To see if the Town will vote to borrow, if necessary, a sum not exceeding one twenty-fifth of one per cent. of the current year's valuation, such sum of money to be used in the suppression of the Gipsy and Brown Tail moths, and not to be expended before December 1st next, and to be raised in the tax levy of the year 1919.

#### ARTICLE 10.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00, for the proper observance of Memorial Day, and appoint a committee to expend the money.

#### ARTICLE 11.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to institute suits on behalf of the Town or defend any suits that are, or may be brought against the Town.

#### ARTICLE 12.

To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate for the application of tar, oil or other binder to its highways.

#### ARTICLE 13.

To see if the Town will appropriate \$150.00 to help pay for new lookout tower on Robin's hill in Chelmsford, Mass.

#### ARTICLE 14.

\* To see if the Town will accept Caledonia Road, so-called, in South Tewksbury District, and appropriate \$100.00 for work on same.

#### ARTICLE 15.

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for sidewalk from Wilmington line to Foster's Corner, Tewksbury.

#### ARTICLE 16.

To see if the Town will vote to install ten electric lights on North Street, commencing near residence of Charles Battles, and extending toward Almont Station.

#### ARTICLE 17.

To see if the Town will vote to install ten electric lights on Whipple Road, commencing near the West schoolhouse and extending to the residence of Mrs. David Rogers.

#### ARTICLE 18.

To see if the Town will vote to lay a gas main through James-Street during the year 1918.

#### ARTICLE 19.

To see if the Town will vote to install one gas light on Robinson Avenue, midway between Main Street and Helvetia Street.

#### ARTICLE 20.

To see what action the town will take, if any, in regard to installing two gas lights and extending main on Lee Street, from where they now terminate to the junction of Lee and Chandler Streets.

#### ARTICLE 21.

To see what action the Town will take, if any, in regard to appointing a permanent man to drive and care for the fire truck, and make appropriation for the same.

#### ARTICLE 22.

To see of the Town will vote to instruct the School Board to pay the teachers and janitors their salary weekly.

#### ARTICLE 23.

To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen grant licenses to the several stores in town to keep open Sundays, between the hours of 6 a. m. and 10 a. m. only, for the sale of such merchandise as their trade may desire.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE

Present unsettled conditions have been felt during the past year in the management of the Tewksbury public schools. Your committee has endeavored to keep all buildings in good condition and the machinery of school work, in general, in good running order. The high cost of living has not omitted to call on all members of the school working force. The obtaining of school supplies has been attended not only with greatly increased cost but also in some cases with great difficulty of delivery. However, your committee feels that the Tewksbury schools have fared well and only asks for a continuance of the town's generous financial support and for its serious consideration of larger accommodations which are a necessity in view of the number of children attending our schools today.

Several changes have occurred in the teaching force. They are as follows:—

Miss Ethel Hadley has taken the place of Miss Wray at the Shawsheen school

Miss Arnold has been transferred from the Library school to the Foster school where she is Assistant to the Principal for the 7th and 8th grades.

Miss Elizabeth Dowler has taken Miss Arnold's place at the Library school.

On the resignation of Miss Evelyn Waite, Miss Ruth Nourse was elected by the District to the position of singing teacher.

Miss Churchill resigned from her position at the Foster school at the end of the fall term. Miss Hazel Weinbeck of Lowell will fill this vacancy for the present.

Janitors. Home ties called Mr. Warren Lincoln from his work as janitor at the Foster and Library schools. He will be remembered as a most conscientious worker. Your committee were fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Geo. Garland to fill the vacancy left by Mr. Lincoln. Mr. Garland is giving great satisfaction in this position.

At the beginning of the fall term Mr. Thos. Sawyer assumed the work of janitor of the Shawsheen school, it being the belief of your committee that the jobs of janitor and bargeman could in this case be successfully combined; the contrary was proved, however, and Mr. T. H. Painter is now taking care of the school building as before.

Fuel. Your committee counts itself fortunate in having a good supply of coal on hand in all the school buildings for the winter term. Some other towns have endeavored to obtain coal with less success.

Repairs. The Library and West schools are in good condition. Electricity has been installed in the latter for lighting purposes.

At the Shawsheen school a concrete foundation has been laid under the pumping engine; new furnace pipes installed and two storm doors constructed on the northern exposed side of the building.

At'the North school extensive sanitary improvements have been made, full details of which will be found in the report for this special appropriation.

Among other things it was found necessary to install a new chimney flue in the Foster school. The old flue has never given satisfactory draft for the boiler. Last winter, however, this fact became so noticeable as to necessitate definite and prompt improvement. On investigation, the old flue was found to have a draft area much too small considering the area of the boiler tubes and besides being full of soot, it was badly cracked in many places. A new flue has been installed which is of heavier material and of nearly twice the draft area. A marked improvement has been noticed in the running of the boiler fires and in the heating of the building. This will no doubt result also in saving of fuel.

Your committee calls your attention to the fact that this building is continually undergoing repairs and alterations leading to comfort and safety, and in accordance with instructions from the inspector of buildings. A new fire alarm has been installed and repairs and improvements made in the heating and sanitary

systems, and ceilings and masonry have been re-enforced and repaired, yet in the opinion of your committee, it will be necessary to ask for a considerable amount of money for further extensive repairs, if the town still expects this building to serve in anything approaching a satisfactory manner.

Some things which should be done are as follows:

All inside walls calcimined, ceilings repaired, building given a general overhauling inside.

These are a few things which should be done at once, but even these improvements will not lessen the need for more room, which is the most essential item of all today. There are about forty-five children in each of the three rooms in this building and sixty-five in the fourth remaining room. It will be a serious proposition how to dispose to best advantage the school children of this town at the opening of the fall term of 1918.

This fall the Committee on Public Safety, Board of Food Administration, encouraged the production of extra large crops of potatoes by the farmers of Massachusetts as a "Win the War" measure. In anticipation of the need of storage room to prevent waste of this extra supply, the committee made general inquiry of the School Board if this room was to be had in school basements in case of local emergency. Your committee responded, offering space for the storage of thirty or forty barrels, if necessary. However, this has turned out to be merely a precautionary measure. The potato crop was not large enough to require this method of preservation in any of the Massachusetts schools, according to the report of December 7th.

In June, it was planned to hold hearings at the Public Service Commission rooms in Boston on the matter of six cent trolley fares and the abolition of workingmen's and school children's half fares. A member from your committee attended the first of these hearings, at which there was a large number of representatives from surrounding towns gathered to protest the changes in fares proposed by the Bay State Railway. Apparently considering the outlook inauspicious, the representatives of the Bay State succeeded in having the hearing postponed and the next that was learned in regard to the matter was that a compromise agreement had been reached by the Railway Co. and counsel for cities and towns through which the system runs. This agreement

resulted in the present six cent fares, but prices for workmen's tickets and also those of school children remained the same.

Your committee asks for a substantial increase in appropriations to cover 1918 school expenses. It considers that many of the teachers' salaries must be advanced to allow them to meet the extra living expenses today. It is wise to make such a move for the benefit of teachers and janitors and in appreciation of their untiring efforts and good work for the schools; it would be more difficult to replace any of the school working force today. The supplies of text books, etc., have advanced in price from fifty to one hundred per cent. Fuel is costing today nearly one hundred per cent more than it did a year ago and the upkeep and repairs on school buildings carry a proportionate advance in cost, as the question of labor and material is a very serious one today.

The committee recommend that the following sums of money be appropriated to meet school expenses the coming year:

Your committee have carefully considered all the details of building, have visited other schools, and unanimously agree that a new eight room school building is the best proposition. However, we feel at this time, with the uncertainty of war conditions it would not be wise to expend the large amount necessary for a new school building. Your committee therefore deem it advisable to defer action until some later date.

#### Report of Committee on Special Appropriation For Up-to-date Sanitation at the North School

Much needed sanitary improvements were made at the North school this summer. In spite of the rapid advance in cost of labor and material, the expenses were kept within the original appropriation of \$1,000.00.

In place of the old unsanitary toilets, a new up-to-date system has been installed. Flush closets and urinal are supplied with water from a pressure tank which in turn is filled by an automatic electric pump.

A pipe has been run out connecting this system to the well in front of the school.

The toilet room is situated on the south side of the building, and is well ventilated, at the same time being supplied with warm air through a register connected to the furnace in main building.

Two tight dry wells take care of the drainage. It was feared that the ledge of rock running beneath the building would interfere with the installing of the drain, but this ledge was struck at a depth which just allowed for the correct "fall," and the whole system was in good working order by the beginning of the fall term.

#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Lowell, Mass., January 4, 1918.

To the School Committee of Tewksbury,

Mrs. Larrabee and Gentlemen:--

I hereby submit my fifth report which is the twenty-seventh in the series of superintendents' reports. The work of your schools for the past year has been successful, you have a capable corp of teachers who are getting good results from their pupils.

Teachers. There have been but few changes among the teachers this year. Miss Grace Wray who was at the Shawsheen primary last year is now teaching in Fitchburg. Miss Ethel Hadley, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School with several years' experience, was selected by Principal Mahoney for the position at Shawsheen, she has made an excellent beginning in her work.

Miss Estelle Horton who served as assistant to Miss Flemings last year has a school of her own in North Reading. It was thought best to have an experienced teacher in this place and at the beginning of the year Miss Gladys Arnold was transferred from grades five and six at the Library School to Miss Flemings' room where she acts as assistant to the principal and as teacher of grade seven.

Miss Elizabeth Dowler, a graduate of Lowell Normal with one year's experience was placed in charge of the sixth grade at the Library. Miss Dowler gives promise of becoming a successful teacher.

At the Christmas vacation Miss Anna Churchill who was teaching her second year in town resigned on account of the ill health of her father. Miss Churchill was a capable, faithful teacher. The position left vacant by her resignation has as yet been filled but temporarily.

The work of those teachers who have been in Tewksbury several years and are working under the "tenure act" continues to be very commendable. Miss Evelyn B. Waite, for three years supervisor of music, resigned in August to accept a position nearer her own home. Miss Ruth H. Nourse of Boston was secured for the position. Miss Nourse is a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music, four year course. After several years' experience as teacher of instrumental music she returned to the Conservatory for a post graduate course in order to fit herself for a public school position. She has made an excellent beginning in securing the good-will and loyalty of both teachers and pupils.

Salaries. An increase of one dollar per week was granted in January to certain teachers who had reached the maximum salary. This increase would have been adequate under normal circumstances, but the increase in the cost of living being abnormal it seems no more than justice that the salaries of all teachers be so augmented that the increase in salary become somewhat proportionate to the increased cost of board, travelling expenses and other necessities, in short that the yearly salary should nearly equal in purchasing power what it was two years ago.

I feel sure that every member of the school committee, and I doubt not every citizen in town, wishes to pay the teachers such salaries that they may remain in the important service for which they have been fitted and not be forced to turn to some other vocation.

Foster School. In my report for last year I called attention at some length to the inadequacy of the accommodations at the Foster building. A committee was appointed at the annual town meeting to report on the need of and the feasability of securing better accommodations at Tewksbury Centre. This report will be given at the coming town meeting.

Let me say, however, that the need expressed one year ago is more marked at the present time. Of the four rooms at the Foster building the grammar room now contains 66, the intermediate 44, the second primary 46, and the primary 45. While two teachers are employed for the grammar grades they cannot work to the best advantage as there is no recitation room large enough to seat either the seventh or the eighth grades.

Should the high cost of both labor and material make it seem inadvisable to the town to build a new school house under the present circumstances, then a temporary re-adjustment should be made at a small cost in the recitation room at the present Foster building in such a manner that an entire grade can be accommodated in it.

Emergency Kits. Well equipped emergency kits have been placed in each of the schools. Some instruction has been given in first aid treatment, and in several instances the kits have already proved helpful.

Thrift Stamps. Arrangements have been made so that the pupils may purchase thrift stamps at the several schools. This seems to fine an excellent method of teaching at the same time thrift and patriotism.

Athletics. Playground activities have for several years been encouraged in the various schools. Plans have been made recently in the upper grades for what is called the Athletic Badge Test for both boys and girls. This is following the standards set by the Playground Association of America and consists not in competition contests, but in certain minimum requirements that have been established for boys and girls of certain ages, as per example—for boys of twelve years: The pull up 4 times, Standing Broad Jump 5 ft. 9 in., 60 yds. dash 8 3/5 seconds.

Many children will exceed the minimum standards just as many will pass an arithmetic test with a rank higher than 70 per cent. All who pass these athletic tests next May will receive badges authorized by the Playground Association.

The children are enthusiastic and the teachers much interested. I heartily approve of it for I believe that, "Every boy ought to be fit." "In these days the boy who makes himself physically efficient is preparing himself for efficient citizenship later."

Civics. Last year the history course was so changed that the last term was spent in the study of civics, especially applied to the community. Much credit is due Miss Flemings for the able way in which she gave the incentive for organizing her school into a "school city" under the name of Foster City. A mayor was duly elected after a lively campaign, commissioners were chosen and all the necessary machinery for a real government. Different departments had actual duties to perform, which for the most part were well cared for. Several matters of minor school discipline were actually settled by the Foster City Police Court.

On the whole this department has proved a decided success, worthy to become a custom.

Handwork. Sewing for the girls of grades six, seven and eight, and woodwork for the boys of the seventh and eighth has become a customary part of the school curriculum. Both classes have done well this year. The girls under the direction of the teacher, Miss Frances Cameron, have made some fifty aprons of various styles, twelve nightdresses, four slips, four combinations, five petticoats, fifty work bags, three dresses, four children's dresses, four clothespin bags, twelve iron holders, three pair bloomers, four dozen red cross handkerchiefs, and some embroidery.

The boys under the direction of Mr. Edmund Alger made a good showing at the annual exhibition last June. Many articles of practical use were shown including one ironing board, one step ladder, three taborets, two book-cases, six picture frames, one chicken coop, one fence gate, several towel racks and several blotter holders.

At the present time every boy is working on a project of his own, something that he or someone in his family can use.

Nearly twenty pictures were framed by the boys and given as presents this last Christmas season.

In addition to the individual projects light repairs about the building are continually being made.

Graduation. Graduation exercises of the eighth grade of the Foster school were held Friday evening, June 22, 1917.

Mr. H. L. Of these thirty-five pupils, twenty-two entered high school, two went to vocational school, ten went to work at once and one remained at home.

High School. The large number of men called to the army and the great demand for help in all kinds of industrial work, together with correspondingly high wages, has greatly affected the

high school attendance in our country. This is true of the enrollment of the Lowell High School and has to some extent decreased the number of Tewksbury pupils attending high school. For the past five years this town has had a constantly increasing eighth grade and a correspondingly large high school attendance. This year not only has the high school enrollment not gained, but it has actually decreased. Last year there were sixty-six pupils in high school, this fall fifty-eight. Only sixty-three per cent. of the class which graduated from Foster school in June entered high school, while one out of every three of them went to work.

There may be reasons for the boys of the upper classes leaving high school to take up the work of the enlisted men, but it seems to me a short-sighted policy so far as the future welfare of the country is concerned to have the younger boys, those under sixteen, neglect their school on account of the lure of the present high wages and the ease of getting a job.

The warning has been given by Hon. Payson Smith, Commissioner of Education in Massachusetts, and by Hon. Philander Claxton, United States Commissioner of Education, to impress upon the young people of the country that their patriotic duty is to get as good an education as possible in order that their value may be enhanced for some future need.

I pass this warning and advise along with hearty endorsements to the parents of pupils now in the Lowell High School and now in the eighth grade of Tewksbury.

Junior High School. For many years there has been a distinct gulf between grammar school methods and those of the high school. Many a pupil who has done commendable work in the grades finds himself unable, sometimes unwilling, to adapt himself to high school environment. Often times he is forced out of school when he needs a few more years of education. Not till within a very few years has an attempt been made to bridge this chasm of grammar and high school standards. The Junior High School is being instituted in many towns and cities throughout the United States, especially is this educational departure advanced in Massachusetts, with this very purpose, namely, to make the transition from the grammar grades to the high school more natural. The Junior High School plan, in short, is to differentiate the studies of the last two grammar grades in such a manner that

the individuality of each pupil, or group of pupils, may be brought out and developed. Certain choices in study are allowed in these grades, a certain elasticity in the curriculum aims directly at the solution of the question, "What is best for the child?" For example in the case of our last eighth grade, twenty-two pupils went to high school, it was necessary that these pupils be prepared for admission to high school; but in regard to the ten who went directly to work, would not a short course in business accounting have been of more benefit to them than twenty weeks in algebra?

Would a course in business letter writing have been of more benefit to these ten than the strict drill in technical grammar, which was demanded for those who entered high school?

Something along this line has already been accomplished in your grades by the course in sewing and woodwork introduced two years ago.

The nearby town of Reading has started a Junior High School course this past year. The superintendent has reported it as proving successful.

I should like to see such a departure started in Tewksbury. With all the sections of the town sending the eighth grade pupils, and with one exception the seventh, to the Centre, the Foster school becomes an excellent place for this modern educational movement which I recommend to your consideration.

Lunch Serving. The warm luncheons prepared so successfully in the "dining room" and described in some detail in former reports were again carried out last winter. Just what will be done this present term I cannot say as the scarcity of sugar has upset our plans, but I am sure that this important part of school life will be continued. I wish that it might be possible to give regular lessons in cooking in connection with the lunch serving.

Conclusion. In closing I again ask the co-operation of all parents with the teachers. The child is under the direction of the school but six hours per day for five days per week. What he is doing after school, how he spends his evenings and holidays, is a matter of vital importance in character building. I wish that there might be frequent consultations between parents and

teachers on this important subject, not only when the pupil is "in trouble" but when no trouble clouds are seen.

The supervisor and teachers have shown unmistakable loyalty in our mutual duties and the school board has given me hearty, continuing support, all of which I deeply appreciate.

I wish to call your attention to the various reports which

form a part of this report.

#### REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MANUAL ARTS

Mr. Charles L. Randall, Superintendent of Schools, Dear Sir:

I have the pleasure of presenting herewith my seventh annual report of drawing in the schools of Tewksbury.

Drawing is always a means of recording or conveying ideas or impressions of form just as words are a means of recording or transmitting thoughts and experiences. The average workman must understand drawing because execution in nearly every branch of industry demands it.

The outline of work in our schools is planned to cultivate an appreciation of art in its application to production, to homemaking and to the personal life of the individuals. The different branches of the subject are closely related to one another and the exercises in these branches are made to arise from the child's interest in his immediate surroundings.

The primary instruction deals mostly with objects, incidents and scenes with which the children are familiar.

In the grammar grades the features of the work that receive most attention are pencil drawings, color work, printing and design applied to constructed articles. Design and its application to the December work of this year was most satisfactory. This is indeed encouraging because the knowledge of design has not only aesthetic value but also great commercial value. It not only provides occupation for great numbers but it also increases the market value of products.

The annual exhibition of manual arts held in June is our best means of showing to parents and friends the progress made in the different departments and such a display should be encouraged to stimulate keener interest in the child and thus lead him to an appreciation of the best in the highest cultural sense.

The cordial and loyal co-operation of the teachers in all phases of the work has been most pleasant and helpful and I desire to express my thanks to the Superintendent and teachers for their manifest interest.

The supervisor is absolutely dependent upon her grade teachers, and I take this opportunity of expressing my sincere appreciation of the hearty co-operation and good will of the teachers and superintendent of this town.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen.

Gentlemen:

As Chief of the Fire Department I herewith submit the following: Total number of fires attended, 40—house fires 15, forest fires 25; false alarms 6; total value of buildings and contents, \$60,200; insurance on same, \$44,785; damage, \$36,498.50.

During the year I have cemented the cellar of the Station and taken care of the Common and Flag. Had also planned to shingle the roof, but owing to high cost of material I felt it advisable to wait until this year. The truck is in good condition. We are greatly handicapped from the lack of water, and would recommend purchasing pumping apparatus similar to the Billerica machine. We could use this in brooks and place catch basins where there is not any. I would also recommend an appropriation of \$800.

#### WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

MIDDLESEX SS:

To either of the Constables of the Town of Tewksbury in said County.

GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Tewksbury, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to meet and assemble at Pickering Hall in said Tewksbury, on Monday, the 3d day of February, 1919, at nine o'clock a. m. to act on the following articles:

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers, to choose by ballot a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of Poor, three members of the Board of Health, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, a Tree Warden, and Constables—all to serve one year; one Assessor, one Highway Commissioner, one School Committee, two Trustees of the Public Library and one Park Commissioner, all to serve three years; also one Trustee of Public Library to serve one year. The polls for the election of Town Officers to be opened at ten o'clock a. m., and close at three o'clock p. m.
- ART. 3. To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.
- ART. 4. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise by taxation to defray necessary expenses for the current year, and make appropriations for the same.

- ART. 5. To see what action the Town will take on the following question: Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in the Town? The vote to be yes or no, as provided by Revised Laws, Chapter 100, Section 10.
- ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote the money arising from licensing dogs, for the ensuing year, to aid in support of the Public Library.
- ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year.
- ART. 8. To see what compensation the Town will vote for the collection of taxes, and at what rate and from what date interest shall be charged on taxes of 1919 unpaid after November 1, 1919, or to take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to borrow, if necessary, a sum not exceeding one twenty-fifth of one per cent. of the current year's valuation, such sum of money to be used in the suppression of the Gipsy and Brown Tail moths, and not to be expended before December 1st next, and to be raised in the tax levy of the year 1920.
- ART. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00, for the proper observance of Memorial Day, and appoint a committee to expend the money.
- ART. 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to institute suits on behalf of the Town or defend any suits that are, or may be brought against the Town.

- ART. 12. To see what action the Town will take toward the acquisition of a site for a new Town Hall, or toward the erection of a new Town Hall, to see if the Town will appoint a committee to obtain plans for said hall, and to see what sums of money the Town will appropriate and raise by loan or otherwise for said site, hall or plans, and to see what action the Town will take in regard to any or all of the above matters.
- ART. 13. To see what sum of money will be appropriated for a Town Memorial Forest in honor of the Town's Roll of Honor in the recent world war.
- ART. 14. To see what action the Town will take, if any, in regard to Street Railroad car service in West Tewksbury.
- ART. 15. To see what action the Town will take in regard to laying out, widening, and grading Astle Street.
- ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to have the Bay State Street R. R. Co. take up their tracks between Astle Street and Wamesit.
- ART. 17. To see what disposal the Town will vote of the balance of money left from insurance on Town Hall.
- ART. 18. To see what action the Town will take, if any, in regard to raising the salaries of the Town officers as follows:

Town Clerk, from \$150 to \$200; Town Treasurer, from \$200 to \$250; Auditor, from \$200 to \$250; Assessors, from \$2.50 to \$3.00 per day; Selectmen, chairman, from \$200 to \$250, the other two members from \$150 to \$200; School Committee, from \$50.00 to \$75.00 each.

- ART. 19. To see if the Town will accept Chapter 423 of the Acts of 1909 and laws amendatory thereto, relating to the sale of ice cream, confectionery, soda water and fruit on Sunday.
- ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote to place two gas lights on James Street, as petitioned for by James Chandler and five others.
- ART. 21. To see if the Town will vote to place one more gas light on Robinson Avenue.
- ART. 22. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$50, or some other amount, and elect a director for demonstration work in agriculture and home economics, the money to be expended by, and the director to serve in co-operation with the County Agricultural Trustees of the Middlesex County Bureau of Agriculture and Home Economics under the provisions of Chapter 273, General Acts of 1918.
- ART. 23. To see what provision the Town will make toward compiling a complete record and memorial of the persons who have been in the service during the recent war, and make appropriation for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 24. To see what action the Town will take toward reimbursing the Town Treasurer for money advanced to Highway Department in 1918 in anticipation of Street Railway and Excise Tax, amounting to \$2,632.66. Also, in the sum \$388.32 being the amount paid as interest in loans in excess of amount received from taxes for last year.
- ART. 25. To see what action the Town will take, if any, in regard to finishing Andover Street, and make an appropriation for same, by loan or otherwise.

- ART. 26. To see what action the Town will take toward appointing a committee of three to investigate the advisability of a water supply, and report at a special meeting to be held as soon as convenient, or take any other action relative to the same.
- ART. 27. To see what action the Town will take toward purchasing a new fire truck, or other fire apparatus, and to see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise by loan or otherwise for same.
- ART. 28. To see what action the Town will take in regard to sale of the Town Farm; to see what instructions, if any, the Town will give to the Overseers of the Poor regarding closing or carrying on the Farm and Almshouse for the ensuing year, or take any other action relative thereto.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant by posting up attested copies thereof, one at each of the Public Meeting Houses, one at the Town Hall, one at each of the Post Offices, and leave one hundred copies for the use of the citizens at the Post Offices in said Town, 10 days at least, and over two Sundays, before the time of holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due returns of this Warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting as aforesaid.

#### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

War conditions during the year 1918 have affected nearly every branch connected with school administration. We can be thankful, however, that the work of the public schools was not hindered in the U. S. as it was in other belligerent nations at the beginning of the war.

Early in 1918 the Tewksbury School Board, among others of Mass., received notice of the purpose of the Commissioner of Education to prevent any relaxation in carrying on the schools at highest efficiency. He says: "Education is a long-time investment. Its purpose is to protect democracy through the right training of the youth."

Tewksbury Schools, we believe, have fared well, everything being taken into consideration. Crowded conditions in the Foster School have been somewhat alleviated by the remodelling of the lower rear interior of the building, thus forming a new room capable of seating about 30 scholars.

All buildings are in good condition. Last summer the whole Foster School interior underwent improvements of an extensive nature, as may be seen from the report on special appropriation for this purpose. The North and Shawsheen school houses were given two coats of paint on the outside. A fire exit was installed at the West School. The interior of the Library schoolroom has been brightened by the application of a light brown shade of paint on the walls, with a result more restful to the eye than the former color, which was a red. A more satisfactory water supply for drinking has been arranged for this school.

The fuel situation appeared somewhat critical at times, but it seems that all danger of shortage has now passed. Early in 1918 the Christmas vacation was extended to Jan. 7, by request of Fuel Administrator J. J. Storrow, in order to conserve coal. No further moves in this direction were necessary, however, and our schools were fortunate in receiving at an early date their full supply of fuel for the present winter.

Since the fire of October 13, which destroyed the Tewksbury Congregational Church, Pickering Hall has been in great demand, not only as the most desirable place in which Sunday services could be held, but also as the only hall of suitable size for the accommodation of all entertainments and functions usually held in the old church vestry and vestry hall. The School Board has endeavored to cooperate with the church committee to the utmost in offering the use

of the hall at the lowest possible figure which will cover the expenses. It is fortunate that the extensive improvements, so much needed in the interior and especially in the hall of the Foster School, should have been completed in time to make the latter fit for such considerable service.

The School Board has taken warning from the several disastrous fires of 1918 and substantially increased the insurance carried on the school buildings of the Town.

It will be seen from our financial statement that we have run short of funds to the extent of \$1.189.75. It is needless to call to mind the high prices which have prevailed during 1918 on all material and on labor itself. An additional and unlooked-for expense turned up last summer in the shape of instructions from the State Building Inspector requiring further installation of lathe and plaster ceilings in the basement of the North, Shawsheen and West schools. A portion of this work designated as immediately necessary has been com-The Committee plans to do more along this line the In spite of war prices, salary advances and the above-mentioned work which had to be done, our appropriation would not have fallen short of our expenses if we had received the usual amount from the State on account of the Mass. School Fund. The apportionment of this fund received by Tewksbury in 1917 was \$893.92. The exact amount cannot be foretold, but depends somewhat upon the size of the Town's valuation, and when the latter reaches \$2,500,000 it automatically ceases. In making up the budget for 1918 the Committee figured on receiving aid from the School Fund, not realizing until too late that our Town valuation had just passed the \$2.500,000 limit.

In this connection it might be well to call attention to the fact that within a year or two Tewksbury must probably forego other State aid which it enjoys today, in the form of reimbursements on tuition and transportation accounts. At present, having a valuation of over \$1,000,000, but with less than 500 families, Tewksbury is entitled to reimbursement of all money expended on High School transportation, and one-half of all money expended on High School tuition. The last census showed Tewksbury as having 485 families. We may therefore expect a continuance of the State Aid on the above accounts until 1920, when it will probably be found that the number of families in Town has increased to 500 or more. To sum up in a brief statement, we have been able up to 1918 to count on aid from the State toward running our schools to the amount of approximately \$3,000. We will now no longer have a portion of the Mass. School Fund, amounting to nearly \$1,000, and in 1920 will probably lose approximately \$1,500 we are now getting toward tuition, and \$550

toward transporation of scholars at the Lowell High School.

The above is simply called to your attention to show that Tewksbury schools in this growing Town cannot for long enjoy the substantial aid they have been getting from the State.

The particular item of trolley transportation expense will be

larger this year owing to the increase in fares charged by the Bay State Street Railway Co. Those children in our elementary grades which require transportation by trolley number about the same as those which attend the Lowell High School, incurring a cost to the Town of some \$550 per year. The fares now average double what they did six months ago. In addition, the Bay State Street Railway Co. has taken steps to gain financial relief by applying for the removal of its obligations by law to transport all school children at half-fare rates. A hearing at the District Court in Boston has been set twice in December but postponed to a later date. Your Committee has protested and will protest any such change in fares.

There is further food for thought when we realize that if State aid on transportation be removed in 1920, and if the Bay State Street Railway Co., in addition to raising their fares, are permitted to charge full rates for school children into the bargain, the Town bill for all trolley transportation will soon be increased by about \$4,500 annually.

In closing, we wish to call attention again to the fact that in considering appropriations to be made for new buildings at the coming Town meeting, our schools should not be forgotten. Sconer or later they will have to be considered. Why not now? We must make a start some time. The Foster and Library schools are crowded to full capacity. New accommodations provided in the Foster School are giving only temporary relief. No more children should be crowded into these buildings in a locality where there is not perfect fire protection. Tewksbury has shown what it can do in subscribing to war activities. Thousands have gone into Liberty bonds, and thousands donated outright to war-work funds. No one doubts that we shall have a new church to replace the one burned last October. Tewksbury is well able to include a new schoolhouse in its building program, a building modern, attractive and of fireproof construction.

In the meantime we recommend the following sums of money be appropriated to cover school expenses for the ensuing year:—

# REPORT ON EXPENSE OF \$1,000 SPECIAL APPROPRIATION FOR IMPROVING INTERIOR OF FOSTER SCHOOL

Extensive improvements were made at the Foster School last summer with the money on this appropriation. The walls in all the rooms have been cleaned and re-tinted; ceilings whitened and woodwork washed and varnished; windows in all the class rooms have been equipped with new curtains. All the school rooms look brighter and cleaner for the work done and more attractive for the teachers and children.

Pickering Hall was included in this work, and as a result is now in good condition for the many uses to which it is being put since the burning of the church.

In the rear of the building, on the lower floor, by moving the partition out further into the hall way, a larger room has been made which is being used as a recitation room, accommodating about 30 scholars, thus, for a while at least, the congestion which has been growing for the past few years will be relieved.

The general improvement to the interior of the building is pleasingly noticeable. However, it only serves to make the building cleaner and more attractive, while the Committee is continually forced to spend additional amounts of money toward repairs of a more serious nature which are constantly coming up.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Lowell, Mass., Jan. 3, 1919.

To the School Committee of Tewksbury.

Mrs. Larrabee and Gentlemen:-

I hereby submit my sixth annual report, which is the twenty-eighth in the series of Superintendent's reports. While the work of the schools has to some extent been interfered with by the demands of such forms of war work as children can do, the year has as a whole been a successful one.

Supervisors. We have been called upon to secure new supervisors in music and drawing. Miss Ruth H. Nourse, who had been in charge of the music for but one year had in that time secured a good response from both teachers and pupils. She resigned to accept a much better salary in Mt. Vernon, N. Y.

All connected with the public schools regretted the resignation of Miss Margaret J. Carney, who had been the efficient supervisor of drawing in the schools of the district for more than six years. As a teacher she was faithful, conscientious and successful; as a supervisor she was careful, painstaking and efficient; her personality was such that she won the lasting esteem of all with whom she came in contact. Her resignation was due to the offer of a much more desirable position in Chelsea.

We have been fortunate in securing supervisors of experience for these important vacancies. Miss Mildred Brennon, of Lowell, a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music, who had excellent recommendations from the neighboring towns, has been in charge of the music since September. I believe that she will do successful work for us, as she has done for others.

Miss Edith Merchant, of Lowell, a graduate of the Normal Art School, with strong recommendations from the towns where she has supervised the drawing for several years, began her duties with us after the Thanksgiving recess. From what I have seen and heard of her work during the three weeks that she has been with us I judge that she will maintain the high standards established by Miss Carney.

Teachers. There has been but one change among the regular teachers of the Town. Miss Lydia Hopkins, teacher of the North School for two years, resigned at the close of the school year to accept a position in Holbrook. The principal of the State Normal School at Lowell, secured for the position Miss Eva L. Hersey, for

several years principal of the grammar school at Wilmington. Miss Hersey taught under my direction for three years at Wilmington, and I came to know her as an exceptionally efficient teacher. I believe that the North School under her management will prove a marked success.

The teachers in the other schools were with us one year ago and are doing satisfactory work.

The special teachers also resigned at the close of the school year—Mr. Edmund Alger, who had charge of the Manual Training for two years, to enter the Army, and Miss Frances Cameron, who had taught sewing for two years, to enter commercial work. The work of each of these special teachers was satisfactory, and their resignations were regretted.

Miss Lena Coburn, who has taught sewing at Tyngsboro for five years, has taken the same work here. She is doing well.

Owing to war work and high wages no one has been found as yet to conduct the manual work with the boys.

Salaries. On page 11 of last year's report I had an article on the justice of an increase in salaries. Beginning with January of last year such increases were granted to the teachers of this Town that they expressed themselves as satisfied. Since that time there have been further increases in living expenses and marked advance in the cost of travelling, which virtually lowers the net salaries of our teachers. However, the reason for the present article is to discuss the law recently passed concerning teachers' salaries with its application to this Town.

On May 10, 1918, the following law was passed:

"On and after the first day of January, 1919, the compensation of every teacher employed in any day school in the Commonwealth, except persons in training and those employed as temporary substitutes, shall be at the rate of not less than five hundred and fifty dollars for the school year in that school." (Not to apply to towns of less than a million valuation.)

According to our present schedule a teacher reaches the maximum salary of \$600.00 after three years of service. The inexperienced teacher starts with \$450.00, and receives an increase of \$50.00 per year till the maximum is reached. In other words, the teacher who has been successful for two years and started on her third will receive \$550.00, just the salary that the inexperienced teacher will now receive. There are ten teachers in the various towns of the district whose salaries will automatically become after Jan. 1, 1919, \$550.00. It would seem an injustice to leave the salaries of these

teachers, who have done faithful work for more than two years, on an equality with those just beginning their service.

Also, the fact that all your teachers who are receiving the maximum salary after more than three years of service, in some cases considerably more, must be considered, for if we leave the salary of these teachers unchanged it will hold no encouragement for a successful teacher to remain in our schools, for there would be no possibility of any increase with the exception of the bare fifty dollars in excess of the legal salary of the first year.

This law compels us to increase the salaries of our inexperienced teachers one hundred dollars after Jan. 1, but I maintain that in order to carry out the spirit of the law, as well as the letter, and in order to maintain the feeling of fair treatment so essential for a teacher to have in her nerve-trying work among the children, it will be necessary for us to grant a proportionate increase to the teachers who are receiving more than \$550.00. That is, the law legally applies to ten teachers in the district, but virtually applies to all.

Foster School. During the past summer extensive repairs and alterations were made at the Foster School, the latter to alleviate the necessity of having two teachers in one room. The recitation room at the end of the lower hall, together with a portion of the hall, has been made into a schoolroom. Furniture has been placed in it, and the seventh grade, with Miss Arnold, have been assigned to it. It is 23 x 15 feet in dimensions, a small room for a class of thirty, but does very well during the present strenuous times. That is, for an emergency proposition it is a success, for a permanent schoolroom it is inadequate.

Influenza. Four weeks of the present school year, on account of the necessity of closing the schools in latter September and early October due to the prevalence of the dread influenza and by order of the Board of Health, have been lost. This loss of time and loss of interest in school work has been an injury to the schools, and will undoubtedly affect the success of the year, although the lost time will be made up by lengthening the school day through the remainder of the year.

War Work. Every school in Town joined the Junior Red Cross last February. Both the drawing department and the sewing department helped in this work by having the children do such work as they were able. The Music Supervisor also helped in raising money by a concert and entertainment. The following articles have been

made within the year: 12 sweaters, 5 afghans, 2 scarfs, 17 garments, 84 handkerchiefs, 161 "joke" books, 102 slings, 1000 gunwipers, 1 helmet, 9 pair wristers, 10 pair socks, 12 crutch pads, 6 pillows, 50 surgical cases, 37 small articles.

Nearly all the children reported that they had home gardens last summer with good results. The Shawsheen School was the only one which tried to have a school garden. Here the whole effort was spent in raising beans, and while the garden did not look as well in June on account of the non-diversity of crops, yet it looked much better than usual in August, and actually produced a financial result in October, having a bushel or more of marketable white beans.

In the Victory Campaign in November sixty-five pupils pledged sixty-five dollars for the united war work drive. 75% of this money has been paid.

In Thrift and War Stamps the following results have been obtained this year, namely, 127 children own stamps to the value of \$4,489.75.

No School Signal. I wish to call attention to the fact that the No School Signal is supposed to be given only on very severe days. Much time has already been lost, more time will unavoidably be lost if our schools are to be discontinued for every not-severe snow or rain.

Training Schools. In my opinion the two State Training Schools at North and South Tewksbury are in the best condition of any time since I have been acquainted in Town. In every case there are excellent teachers doing excellent work. These schools now illustrate the old truism, "The teacher makes the school."

I especially commend the community work which has been carried on in the Shawsheen district.

Vaccination. This subject always gives more or less trouble. Many times the parents believe that the teacher, or superintendent, or perhaps the Committee, have an option concerning this matter, and can in a spirit of accommodation excuse the young child from being vaccinated. This is not so, personally I would not vaccinate a child under ten years of age, but my opinion has nothing to do about this matter. Neither is it the duty of the school authorities to attend to this, rather it rests directly on the parents. All parents of the children of the next September entering class, that is of those who will be grade one next fall, should have the children vaccinated before

they are sent to school, and not wait for the teacher to call attention to it later.

Please read again the brief law which I quote:

"Gen. Acts, Chapter 117, Section 6. A child who has not been vaccinated shall not be admitted to the public schools, except upon presentation of a certificate the same as the physician's certificate required by the provisions of Section 139 of Chapter 75 as amended by Section 2, Chapter 190 and by Section 10, Chapter 544 of the Acts of 1902."

School Fund. For many years the Town of Tewksbury has received a portion of the Massachusetts School Fund, amounting to over a thousand dollars. The law provides that no Town whose valuation exceeds two and a half million can receive any share of this fund. This Town, on account of its rapid rise in valuation, loses this fund this year for the first time, nor will it be received again unless the Town has the misfortune to shrink in valuation.

**Graduation.** The customary grammar school graduation was held in Pickering Hall, Thursday, June 20, 1918.

After pleasing exercises and an address by Principal Herbert D. Bixby, of the Lowell High School, the Superintendent presented diplomas to the following graduates: Blanche Banville, Vera Colby, Ruth Cameron, Alice Cartier, James Clancy, Ernest Dodge, John Furtado, Martin Flaherty, Mae Frink, Clifford Greene, Charles Groves, Everell Harnden, Albin Johnson, Irene Kelley, Harold Livingston, Albert La Bounty, Arthur Marcille, Mary MacKillop, Charles Nash, Edward O'Connell, Archie M. Pillsbury, Lillian M. Simpson, Mildred Saluskofski, William Smith, Archie Toothaker, Lester Vander Burgh, Dora White, Albert Wright.

Of these twenty-eight graduates thirteen entered High School, two are attending Vocational School, seven are working, two remained at home, the others moved from Town.

Sewing and Manual Training. Excellent work was done in sewing last year under the direction of Miss Cameron. A good exhibition was made in June though not as large as would have been the case had not much time been given to Red Cross work.

You will be able to judge of Miss Coburn's plans by her report which follows.

The manual work for the boys was carried on acceptably till June by Mr. Edmund Alger. A portion of the exhibition was given to this department with creditable result.

After Mr. Alger's resignation we were unable to find anyone to carry on this work, but hope to do so soon.

Back-to-the-School-Drive. During the past two years we have had many varieties of "drives." Now that the war is over the most important "drive" is to impress on pupils and parents alike the necessity of having children remain in school after they have reached the legal fourteen years. The per cent. of pupils who remain in the eighth grade has decreased for the past two years, while the number of graduates from the Grammar School who attend High School, and the total number of pupils in High School, is constantly growing less. 1916 there were 69 pupils in High School, 1917 there were 58 pupils, while in 1918 there were but 49. All educators, whether national, state, or local are crying against the children of America giving over their education on account of lust for high wages.

I pass this warning along for a second time, confident that the subject is one of the most important for your consideration.

Co-operation. The need of co-operation between the home and the school has been more apparent this past year than ever before. With many children doing the work of men and women, and with many mothers as well as fathers at work, there has grown in this locality, as throughout the whole child-world, a spirit of lack of restraint and lawlessness which may soon lead to crime.

Parents should realize that they have a responsibility for their children, and that no teacher and no school can take the place of home restraint and discipline.

It is important that parents, and in fact the whole community, take up the task of working with the schools in making future good citizens.

Conclusion. I wish to call to your attention the reports and tables which follow this report and form a part of it.

I wish to again express my appreciation for the loyal co-operation and the cordial support of the Committee. It is a privilege to work under such harmonious conditions.

The girls of the upper grades have made aprons of all kinds, both large and small, also underclothes.

One of the girls is to start a smock at the next lesson, and bloomers are also being made.

I expect to have several more smocks, or simple dresses, started soon.

The girls in the lower grades have finished bags to hold their sewing, also both large and small aprons.

In addition to this we have made refugee garments, namely, six boy's undershirts, six large aprons and sixty shot bags, and now are working on ten large aprons.

I wish to take this opportunity of expressing my sincere appreciation of the hearty co-operation of the teachers and superintendent.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

Mr. Charles Randall, Supt. of Schools.

Dear Sir:-

School work has been so interrupted during the past few months that it hardly warrants a report of results, but I feel that we are making definite progress in music.

We are devoting much time in the lower grades to individual work, and every new problem that is taken up is being drilled individually. If pupils become able to sing independently in the lower grades no difficulty will be found in part singing in the upper grades.

Great stress is being laid on good tone quality and clear enunciation, and I hope to see a great improvement in this respect during the year.

In the upper grades we are giving some time to definite work in music appreciation. We are trying to teach pupils to understand music so that they can listen intelligently as well as to take an active part in it. Short talks are given about instruments of the orchestra and band, and different forms of music, such as opera and oratorio; pictures are shown, and records illustrating the lesson are played on the Victrola. The Victrola, when properly used, is of great value in this phase of the work, and the boys and girls seem much interested.

Every pupil, when they leave the Grammar School, should be able to sing correctly the familiar songs that are being so widely used in community music, and during the present term we shall give some time to this work in the seventh and eighth grades.

I wish to thank the teachers frr their co-operation in carrying out my plans, and also the Superintendent for his interest in my work.

As Local Superintendent for the suppression of the Gypsy and Brown Tail Moths, I submit the following:

Have found a few Brown Tail Moth nests during the year. There is an increase of 25% of Gypsy Moths.

Practically the same methods were employed as in former years under State Supervision.

The Health situation throughout the country has been a trying one the past year, and our town has been no exception, influenza the past few months and scarlet fever the last, with quite a fair proportion of other cases between. The scarlet fever at present is very trying to handle from the health standpoint, because of the lightness of attacks, the patients in several cases not knowing that they were having the disease, and for that reason, not staying in quarantine or reporting their case to the Board. I want the co-operation of everybody just now to prevent the further spread of this disease. Report any case that you hear of or are suspicious of, whether in your own family or others, to the agent or any member of the Board and we will co-operate with that family for their own protection as well as that of the community.

The financial situation of the Health Department must be considered from a bit different angle this year than usual where the appropriation the past several years has been \$200, this will not be sufficient in the future because of the tuberculosis situation. is a statute which, we will all admit, is with proper intention, which states that if a case of tuberculosis wishes to enter a hospital for the treatment of this disease and a vacant bed can be found, we must from our health appropriation and not from the charitable department, provide maintenance as long as they need it, if they are unable to provide it themselves. The stated rate is \$10.50 a week at

present time and we have one patient, so provided for, as this is a chronic disease, a whole year would not be beyond consideration at \$546.00 per annum. The report will show 4 cases this year with only one cared for under this statute. I have advised the Board to provide for this possible situation by an increase in appropriation Their judgment will be my recommendation as our appropriation for 1920.

The reports of the Auditor and Librarian found on another page give in detail the expenditures and also the number, character and circulation of books during the year. Besides supplying the Centre, the Library furnishes weekly a box of books for those sections of the Town which desire them. In this way as large a proportion of the reading public as possible is reached.

We request the Town to grant us the appropriation of five hundred dollars, the amount given last year.

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## WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

MIDDLESEX SS:

To either of the Constables of the Town of Tewksbury in said County:

GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Tewksbury, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to meet and assemble at Pickering Hall in said Tewksbury, on Monday, the 2d day of February, 1920, at nine o'clock a.m. to act on the following articles:

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers, to choose by ballot a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of Poor, three members of the Board of Health, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, a Tree Warden, and Constables—all to serve one year;

one Highway Commissioner, one School Committee, two Trustees of the Public Library and one Park Commissioner, all to serve three years; one Park Commissioner, to serve two years; one Assessor to serve three years and one Assessor to serve one year to fill a vacancy. The polls for the election of Town Officers to be opened at ten o'clock a. m., and close at three o'clock p. m.

- ART. 3. To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.
- ART. 4. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise by taxation to defray necessary expenses

- for the current year, and make appropriations for the same.
- ART. 5. To see what action the Town will take on the following question: Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in the Town? The vote to be yes, or no, as provided by Revised Laws, Chapter 100, Section 10.
- ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote the money arising from licensing dogs, for the ensuing year, to aid in support of the Public Library.
- ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year.
- ART. 8. To see what compensation the Town will vote for the collection of taxes, and at what rate and from what date interest shall be charged on taxes of 1920 unpaid after November 1, 1920, or to take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to borrow, if necessary, a sum not exceeding one twenty-fifth of one per cent, of the current year's valuation, such sum of money to be used in the suppression of the Gipsy and Brown Tail Moths, and not to be expended before December 1st next, and to be raised in the tax levy of the year 1921.
- ART. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00, for the proper observance of Memorial Day, and appoint a committee to expend the money.
- ART. 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Select-

- men to institute suits on behalf of the Town or defend any suits that are, or may be brought against the Town.
- ART. 12. To see what action the Town will take toward purchasing a new fire truck, or other fire apparatus, and to see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise by loan or otherwise for same.
- ART. 13. To see what action the Town will take towards indexing the Town Records, and to see what sums of money the Town will appropriate for same.
- ART. 14. To see if the Town will vote to instal three electric lights on Astle Street, between Lowell line and Eliot French's residence, and appropriate money for same.
- ART. 15. To see if the Town will vote to instal three electric lights on Astle Street, between Main Street and Mr. Blake's residence, and appropriate money for same.
- ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to place one gas light on Rogers Street, same to be placed at the curve, about 300 feet from Main Street, and appropriate money for same.
- ART. 17. To see if the Town will vote to place one gas light on Main Street, near the residence of Mr. Sunbury, and appropriate money for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 18. To see if the Town will vote to instal one gas light on Main Street, between the trestle and Mr. Leith's house, and appropriate money for same.
- ART. 19. To see if the Town will vote to place three

- gas lights on Main Street, from the present terminal of the main, near Mr. Landers' residence to Mr. Marshall's house.
- ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote to place three gas lights on North Street, from the present terminal of the gas main near Mr. Patten's residence to Almont Station.
- ART. 21. To see if the Town will vote to place two gas lights on James Street, from the terminal of gas main to Mrs. Chandler's house.
- ART. 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to instal electric street lights in South Tewksbury on Salem Road, South Street, Main Street, and Lake Street, or any part thereof, and make appropriation for said work.
- ART. 23. To see if the Town will vote to instal one gas light on North Street, midway between East and Main Streets.
- ART. 24. To see if the Town will vote and appropriate a certain sum of money sufficient for the purchase of a set of Town Scales to be placed on the Town Lot in rear of the Town Hall, or any other location, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the application of tar oil or other binder on the roads.
- ART. 26. To see if the Town will vote to repair the culvert under Rogers Street, about 700 feet from Main Street, near the McTeague residence.
- ART. 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$5,576.00

by loan or otherwise to remodel the Library School. or take any other action relative thereto.

- ART. 28. To see what provision the Town will make toward compiling a complete record and memorial of the persons who have been in the service during the recent war, and make appropriation for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$150, and elect a director for demonstration work in agriculture and home economics. The money to be expended by and the director to serve in co-operation with the County Trustees for aid to agriculture of Middlesex County Bureau of Agriculture and home economics under the provisions of Chapter 273, General Acts of 1918.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting up attested copies thereof, one at each of the Public Meeting Houses, one at the Town Hall, one at each of the Post Offices, and leave one hundred copies for the use of the citizens at the Post Offices in said Town, 10 days at least, and over two Sundays, before the time of holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due returns of this Warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting as aforesaid.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE

If conditions during the war occasioned disturbances felt in all branches of School work, the year following the signing of the Armistice has been none the less full of difficulties.

Undoubtedly the most important of these has been the question of securing teachers. This matter is dealt with more minutely in the report of the Supt. of Schools. Suffice it to say here, that the shortage of competent teachers to fill vacancies has been felt severely. The majority of our teaching force has remained intact, and given high grade service in our schools. Salaries have been raised, but it will be necessary, and it is the plan of your Committee, to adopt at once in Jan. 1920, a higher schedule of salaries, which will place our schools on a plane at least approaching what other schools are doing today, and which will protect us from deliberate attempts on the part of other Towns to buy off our best teachers.

In this effort to meet the salary requirements of the present day, we are aided by the New Mass. School Fund which reimburses the Town from \$100 to \$200 per teacher according to the salary paid by the Town. The first amount received by our dept. last Fall was \$540.00. With the salary schedule proposed to go into effect Feb. 2nd, 1920, we should receive from the State \$1750.00 next Fall.

Satisfactory arrangements have been made with those who manage the barge routes, for the remainder of the School year. It has been necessary however to consider our janitors in the general salary increase, particularly in view of the good service rendered.

With all this in mind we can feel encouraged at least to consider that the School Dept. will not commence the year 1920 with an account of over \$1100 unpaid bills to clean up, as was the case in 1919.

Your Committee have felt that with the cost of building as high as it is today, it would be wise to increase the insurance on our Schools still more. In our estimates for 1920, \$400 is asked for to cover renewals coming due, \$240 more is included for added insurance.

At the North School many improvements have been made including a complete renovation of the interior. The results are satisfying and pleasing to the eye.

The West School had a new coat of paint last summer on the exterior and is in good condition within and without.

This year, the Committee plans to complete the work of putting up a metal lathe and plaster ceiling in the Shawsheen School. Last summer a portion of this work prescribed by the Building Inspector was put up and a similar job completed at the North School, according to building regulations for school houses.

It has been the belief of the Committee that the Shawsheen and North Schools, termed training schools, are keeping up a high standard in scholarship and discipline, and that the aid of the Lowell Normal School officials has been very beneficial.

Up to the spring of 1919 however this work was being carried on under only a verbal agreement with our Dept. Deciding that it would be more businesslike, and that a more satisfactory understanding of the requirements of the situation could be arranged on paper, a written agreement was drawn up and signed by your Committee and the Comm. of Education, on April 5, 1919.

This agreement is similar to that entered upon by other cities and towns, and assures us high teaching standards, the benefit of additional salary offered by the Normal School in order to secure and hold a satisfactory teaching force, also certain sums of money spent by the Normal School for the maintenance of superior practice facilities. Other clauses arrange for "mutual understanding in regard to the conduct of these schools." If for any possible reason this arrangement becomes unsatisfactory to either party, the agreement may be abrogated by mutual consent, or by either party alone after one year's notice in writing shall have been given to the other party thereto.

An effort is being made to start a Branch Library at

the Shawsheen School for the benefit of those in the Southeast section of the Town.

At the Foster School, Pickering Hall has been in much demand during the past year. A considerable amount has been realized on rent of the Hall, but it is doubtful as to just how much of this amount is offset by expense of janitor, police, lighting and heating, and general wear and tear. Then again the hall being on the third floor not only offers difficulties to elderly people desiring to attend certain meetings but also results in the tracking of mud and dirt over a large area of the school. It is the interest of the School Board that this Hall be used whenever necessary, but we look forward to the day when the new Town Hall and Church will take care of functions which are properly their own.

A new piano has been bought and placed in Pickering Hall. It has good tone and is meeting the requirements of the Hall, much better than the old one.

Three items which are costing us more than ever before are, transportation, fuel, and all labor connected with the upkeep and repair of the Schools.

A special appropriation is asked for this year to cover the expense of remodelling the Library School. It is expected that the Public Library will be moved into its new room at the Town Hall in the Spring. This will leave the School Dept. much needed space, which must be fitted up as a modern school-room, and which will delay for a few years the necessity of erecting a new School building. It is the intention of your committee also to provide this school with much needed sanitary requirements, and a suitable arrangement for drinking water.

It has been a source of great satisfaction to the School Committee to feel that we have the backing of the Townspeople so strongly in our effort to keep the Schools in good condition, well equipped as they should be for all work to be done in them, and attractive and safe as possible for teachers and children, as well as a credit to the Town as public buildings.

We recommend the following sums be raised to cover expenses as enumerated below, for the year 1920:

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Lowell, Mass., Jan. 7, 1920.

To the School Committee of Tewksbury:

Mrs. Larrabee and Gentlemen:-

I herewith submit my seventh annual report which is the twenty-ninth in the series of Superintendents' reports. Owing to the increase in all supplies and materials, and to the marked shortage of teachers the past year has been a strenuous one in which to maintain the standard of the schools.

Supervision. Miss Edith Merchant who is serving her second year as drawing supervisor in the district is doing excellent work.

Miss Mildred Brennon who taught music in the district last year resigned last June to be married.

Miss Georgia Within, a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music with three years' experience, was selected for the position. She has made an excellent beginning in the music of the schools, and has the support of teachers and pupils.

Teachers. Miss Hazel Weinbeck resigned in June to be married.

Miss Annie M. Wylie for many years teacher of the West school resigned in Oct. to accept a better position in another town. Miss Wylie deservedly had the good will and affection of both pupils and parents.

Miss Ella E. Fleming, for many years principal of the Foster School, on account of home duties resigned her position Nov. 10, 1919. Losing Miss Fleming from the teaching force of the town was felt as a distinct personal loss by the pupils of the eighth grade, their parents, and also by the many young people who have graduated from the school. The loss is, however, more far reaching than this, as it is an actual loss to the town at large. I know of no one separate agency which has tended more fully toward the making of good citizenship in the town than the

eighth grade of the Foster School as conducted by Miss Fleming.

Mr. Reginald Webster, a man with a fine record as a student, a teacher and a soldier completed the fall term after Miss Fleming's resignation.

Beginning with the winter term, Miss Gladys Arnold assumes the principalship of the Foster School, and Miss Elizabeth Dowler, takes the seventh grade. So far as can be judged in this short time these changes are proving successful. It seems that Miss Arnold who has taught in the Foster school for more than seven years will make a worthy successor to Miss Fleming. Miss Abbie Whitney, a recent graduate from Lowell Normal was placed in charge of the second primary room in September.

Mrs. Lilla McPherson, a graduate of Framingham Normal, has taken charge of the Library School.

Miss Helena McGowan, a graduate of Lowell Normal, is at the West School. We have been fortunate in retaining so many of our teachers this year. Especially is this true when considering the fact that five of the town teachers have been offered increased salaries since the Christmas vacation.

The Teacher Situation. The shortage in the available supply of teachers is alarming. It is officially reported that 3,800 teachers are lacking in the United States this school year. The neighboring state of New Hampshire has already closed fifty schools and contemplates closing eighty more.

While Massachusetts has probably closed no schools this year it has certainly placed teachers in the schools who have not sufficiently prepared themselves for the important position held by teachers.

In the case of your own town and the other towns of my district thus far the shortage has been felt only in that teachers of less experience than formerly have been assigned to important rooms. However, the situation has recently become more intense and in filling the positions left vacant at the Christmas vacation I was obliged to use all the teacher material I knew of, and for other vacancies and for substitutes I have been obliged to call upon the Lowell Normal School to furnish undergraduates.

Massachusetts School Fund Law. The fact that Massachusetts realizes the gravity of the teacher situation and the inadequacy of the teacher's salary, is proved by the passage of the long contended "School Fund" bill. This law provides for reimbursement as follows:

- (1). "Two hundred dollars for every such person who has received as salary not less than eight hundred and fifty dollars and who is a graduate of an approved normal school or college, and has had at least two years teaching experience, or who possesses preparation and teaching experience accepted in lieu thereof."
- (2). "One hundred and fifty dollars for every such person, not included in the foregoing classification, who has received as salary not less than seven hundred and fifty dollars, and who has satisfactorily completed one year of professional training in an approved normal school or teachers' training school, and has had at least three years of teaching experience: or is a graduate of an approved normal school or college, and has had at least one year's teaching experience: or who possesses preparation and teaching experience expected in lieu of either of the foregoing requirements in this paragraph."
- (3). "One hundred dollars for every such person, not included in either paragraphs (1) or (2) who has received as salary not less than six hundred and fifty dollars."

This law was approved July 24, 1919 and took effect at once, consequently in November 1919 the sum of \$540 was turned into the town treasury on account of salaries paid during the school year ending June, 1919.

In order to take as great advantage of this law as possible for the present school year the salaries of the teachers must be so adjusted that the teacher may receive an increase and the town may also draw back a larger reimbursement, for example teacher receiving \$800 should be raised to \$850 or more.

The estimated amount to be received by Tewksbury

in accordance with the salaries asked for in the annual budget will total \$1,750.

Salaries. The above described law was passed with the definite purpose of securing increases in the teaching salaries throughout the state, thereby giving an impetus to the movement already begun of attracting and retaining competent and trained teachers in the schools. For years teachers have been notoriously underpaid.

Campaigns have been waged for increase in salaries either on the ground of fairness or charity, and when increases have been gained they have in general been inadequate, as for example the case in which teachers received a raise of one dollar per week, but board was increased at the same time a dollar and a half per week.

The above state of affairs has changed rapidly since the outbreak of the late war. Wages and salaries have been so large and so easily obtained in office, shop, factory, and even housework, that girls upon the completion of their high school course, or even before, have scorned taking a course in one of the State Normal Schools, but have gone directly to work at a larger salary than they would be able to receive after graduation from a normal school and after several years of experience. I offer as proof of the above statement the fact that there are but sixty-odd students at Lowell Normal School where there should be one hundred and seventy-five.

In view of the shortage of teachers, the new law mentioned above, and the fact that living expenses have increased 88 per cent within two years, I urge you to give such substantial increases to your teachers and supervisors that the former good standing of your schools may be maintained, and that teachers of worth who are in your schools may be retained and that new teachers of merit may be attracted.

I recommend that the minimum salary be increased to \$650, and the maximum to \$1000, with corresponding increases to the supervisors.

This will call for an appropriation of \$8400 for teach-

ers, but you must remember that this salary schedule will return as reimbursement under the new law \$1750, making the net appropriation practically what it was last year.

As all the towns in the vicinity of Lowell Normal School have either passed a similar salary schedule, or will ask for an appropriation sufficient to do so at the coming town meeting, I can see no recourse left except to fall into line.

Tewksbury need not attempt to compete with cities in the salary question, but it must maintain an approximate equality in this respect with the other towns of the locality, or it must suffer the serious penalty of seeing its schools deteriorate.

Library Building. Before the outbreak of the European war the town of Tewksbury passed a vote to build a new school building, and appointed a building committee with instruction to investigate and report at the next annual meeting. The war broke out and prices soared. The report of the "building committee" was that it was not feasible for the town to build at that time. As a temporary remedy the "committee room" at the Foster school was enlarged into a small class room capable of seating thirty pupils.

Later the disastrous fire which destroyed the public buildings of the town made it necessary for the town to use its resources in building a new town hall.

As this hall will furnish room for the public library it seems a fitting time to make use of the entire Library building for school purposes. I recommend that the building be renovated, remodeled, and fitted up as a primary two-room school, equipped with modern lighting, heating, and ventilating, with running water, toilets, and basement play room; in short, made into a modern, sanitary school, not as a temporary expedient, but with the idea of permanency.

With the two rooms of the Library school used for primary grades, and the four large rooms and one class room at the Foster employed, the school building situation will be cared for for many years.

The immediate need of the additional room may be judged from the fact that for several years it has been necessary to "split" some of the grades, that is, put part of a grade in one room, the rest in another.

Graduation. Thursday evening, June 19, 1919 occurred the most unique graduation exercises I have ever witnessed. The principal of the school decided that she wished her class to present something in the way of a local historical drama or pageant, but found that no material was available. The teachers of the building arose to the emergency and themselves wrote an original historical drama of Tewksbury based on what facts were found to be authentic and covering from Indian times to the European war, under the title.

Of these twenty-nine graduates nineteen entered high school, two entered vocational school, the rest remained at home, or went directly to work.

Manual Training. Miss Lena Coburn who did excellent work in sewing last year is continuing this year with equal satisfactory results. The hand work with the boys which was given up last year on account of the great difficulty of finding a teacher has been resumed this year. Mr. Myrton L. Harris of Leominster, a senior at Fitchburg Normal School and an ex-service man has charge of the work.

He has made a satisfactory beginning.

High School. In spite of the fact that the war is over there is no increase in high school attendance, in fact there are only forty-five enrolled in Lowell High School from Tewksbury as compared with fifty-one a year ago. following pupils entered or continued at high school this vear: Alma Anderson, Ralph Anderson, Charles A. Mr. Chas. Randall, Superintendent of Schools, Tewksbury, Mass. Dear Sir:

At your request, I hereby submit my first annual report as Su-

pervisor of Drawing in the Town of Tewksbury.

Practically every supervisor's outline is briefly—Fall, color and lettering; Winter, object drawing and landscape; Spring, design; Summer, nature's work. These, of course, are interrupted by special work at Thanksgiving, Christmas, Easter, etc. The difference comes in the emphasis. While one instructor spends many weeks on color scales, the next is spending an equal time on landscapes. To me, a very important part of the work seems to be the construction work. which carries with it a knowldge of the ruler and of lettering. It calls for accuracy as does nothing else.

All work, I endeavor, whenever possible, to correlate with that of the teacher. As an example, the free hand cutting of leaves and the making of covers for books of "leaves" in connection with Mr. Weed's nature work in your Normal Practice Schools. We have also, in the upper grades, done considerable work in cardboard con-

struction, such as loose leaf books for geography, etc.

May I, at this time, express my appreciation of the unfailing kindness of the Superintendent and teachers since I undertook the work a year ago.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

Mr. Charles L. Randall, Superintendent of Schools, Dear Sir:

I hereby submit my report as Music Supervisor of the Schools of Tewksbury.

We endeavor to teach the children in the Primary grades to love music and to love to sing through rote songs, singing games and folk dances. Special attention is given to the individual voice so that the greatest difficulties may be overcome before the child reaches the more advanced grades.

In the Intermediate grades we require more formal drill on the technical problems of music as the pupils at this age are more able for independent technical mastery of their work. A part of each music lesson is used for individual sight reading.

We do part singing in the Grammar grades and become familiar with the patriotic, old standard songs and Christmas carols. The study of the composers and their compositions is taken up and we get better tone quality and song interpretation.

Throughout the rooms we do work in music appreciation with carefully chosen records which can be correlated with other subjects taught in the schools. Thus, through these listening lessons the pupils are taught to know and appreciate good music. The Victrola is put to good use in this phase of music and in folk dancing. The hall at Tewksbury Center School gives fine opportunity for this work.

Of the number of meetings held, or the work done in co-operation with an efficient Architect and responsible Building Contractor, or the hardship of the Industrial conditions of the Winter of 1919, making building construction almost impossible, no further mention is needed except the reminder that under such difficulties the work was carried on to completion with results that to your Committee were most gratifying and satisfactory.

The walls of the building retained dampness and made it difficult to get dry conditions until the building could be heated in the Fall, so that the vaults suffered from damp and the walls have affected the paint.

The Heating Plant should be in all ways most effective when it is fully understood. The economy of its service is assured and the

efficiency of the Plant already evident.

The Electric Lighting Plant has so far proved its worth and efficiency, by almost constant service, and under conditions that have tested the Plant, but it has stood the test, and our Lighting Plant cannot be excelled either for economy in first cost, or in its upkeep. We are using high candle power that can be reduced at any time, but the brilliancy of the Lighting Plant is beyond any service we should expect from ordinary Electric service and our moderate expense is

for the best and not for the minimum of efficiency.

In addition to the above it seems proper to place on record mention of the gift of Mr. Geo. Stevens, an honorable citizen of our town, who suggested to the Committee the desirableness of having a bell added to the clock outfit and which the Committee had not favored on account of extra expense. Mr. Stevens offered to defray the cost of a bell which he left to the Committee to select according to their best judgment. It was found that nearly an equal sum would be added to the cost on account of change of mechanism to a striking clock. This amount Mr. Stevens also paid. And thus we owe to this instance of public spirit in one of our townsmen for this most desired and added attraction to our new Town Hall.

A word in closing concerning this Committee. In all these meetings held from the first to the last, there has been no controversy of any kind, no differencies, only unity of purpose and united effort to carry on to accomplishment. We are proud of the results and of our limited part in them, but it has been a privilege recognized by your Committee that our Townspeople have been united in their assistance and support at all times, and have accepted our reports without question, and for that reason, above all others, we have striven to deserve their confidence and support in all that has been done.

At the Annual Town Meeting held in 1920 an additional sum of \$1000.00 was appropriated and plans were made and carried through on Memorial Day, 1920, as follows: Public exercises in the New Town Hall in the afternoon under the direction of the committee. Presentation of Tablet to the Town by Howard W. Foster, chairman, and acceptance for the Town by the Chairman of Board of Selectmen, Irving F. French. The presentation of the Town testimonial, consisting of a gold filled watch fob with their names and date on one side, and the Town Seal on the other, to each World War Veteran by Lieut. Col. Perkins in behalf of the Town.

A banquet was given to the World War Veterans after the pub-

lic exercises.

The committee placed the Grand Military Ball held in the evening in the hands of the World War Veterans who had full charge and directions of all details relating thereto. During the entire work the assistance and advice of the World War Veterans was given to the committee and to them and all who assisted in any manner we return our thanks. For complete detail of expenditures by your committee see Auditor's Report.

The records of the World War Veterans so far as completed, is hereto annexed. The committee has made strenuous efforts to make it complete. The Veterans are widely scattered and the delay is un-

aviodable.

# WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

MIDDLESEX SS:

To either of the Constables of the Town of Tewksbury in said County:

GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Tewksbury, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to meet and assemble at Town Hall in said Tewksbury, on Monday, the seventh day of February, 1921, at nine o'clock a.m. to act on the following articles:

ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers, to choose by ballot a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of Poor, three members of the Board of Health, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, a Tree Warden and Constables. all to serve one year. Highway Commissioners, one to serve for three years and one for two years to fill a vacancy; one School Committee, two Trustees of the Public Library and two Park Commissioners, one to serve three years; one Park Commissioner to serve two years; one Assessor to serve three years. The polls for the election of Town Officers to be opened at 9 o'clock a.m., and close at 4 o'clock p. m., and to vote on the following question: "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of certain non-intoxicating beverages in this town?" Yes; No.

- ART. 3. To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.
- ART. 4. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise by taxation to defray necessary expenses for the current year, and make appropriations for the same.
- ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote the money arising from licensing dogs, for the ensuing year, to aid in support of the Public Library.
- ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year.

The vote to be as follows:

Voted:—That the town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1921, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and debt or debts incurred under this vote to be paid from the revenue of said financial year.

- ART. 7. To see what compensation the Town will vote for the collection of taxes, and at what rate and from what date interest shall be charged on taxes of 1921 unpaid after November 1, 1921, or to take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 8. To see if the Town will vote to borrow, if necessary, a sum not exceeding one twenty-fifth of one per cent. of the current year's valuation, such sum of money to be used in the suppression of the Gipsy and Brown Tail Moths, and not to be expended before December 1st next, and to be raised in the tax levy of the year 1922.

- ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 for the proper observance of Memorial Day, and appoint a committee to expend the money.
- ART. 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to institute suits on behalf of the Town or defend any suits that are, or may be brought against the Town.
- ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to instal electric lights on Main Street, from Lowell line to Foster's Corner, and make an appropriation for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 12. To see of the Town will vote to instal electric lights on Lake Street, South Street, and State Street and Salem Road, and make appropriations for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 13. To see if the Town will vote to instal electric lights on North Street from Andover Street to Almont Station, and make appropriation for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 14. To see if the Town will vote to instal electric lights on Pike Street, from Main Street to the residence of S. P. Pike, and make appropriations for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 15. To see if the Town will vote to instal electric lights on Rogers Street, from Whipple Street to the residence of Mr. Gulliland, and make appropriations for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to instal electric lights on Whipple Street on existing poles, and make appropriations for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 17. To see if the Town will vote to place three gas or electric lights on Rogers Street, one at the

- McTeague residence, one at the Flaherty residence, and one at the Walsh residence, and make appropriation for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 18. To see if the Town will vote to extend the gas main on Main Street from present terminal at Marshall residence to Harnden's Corner, instal street lights and make appropriations for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 19. To see if the Town will vote to instal five gas lights from the present terminal on Chandler Street to Mr. Small's residence on Pine Street, and make appropriations for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote to extend the gas main on Pleasant Street from the present terminal to a point opposite the residence of Walter Smith, appropriate the necessary money or take any action thereon.
- ART. 21. To see if the Town will vote to instal six gas lights on Marshall Street and make appropriations for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 22. To see if the Town will vote to instal gas lights on Old Main Street from Lynch's Corner to Callahan's Corner, and make appropriations for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 23. To see if the Town will vote to instal one gas light on Summer Street near the residence of George Garland, and make appropriations for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 24. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$720.00 for the expenses of a School Nurse, or take any action relative thereto.

- ART. 25. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the purchase and maintenance of new fire apparatus and make appropriations for same.
- ART. 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to instal cisterns in different sections of the Town.
- ART. 27. To see if the Town will vote to sell the present Fire Truck.
- ART. 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept Sec. 27, Chap. 591, Acts of 1920 relative to Town Fire Departments.
- ART. 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the additions and corrections in the names on the Memorial Tablet of persons who entered the World War from Tewksbury and make necessary appropriations for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 30. To see if the Town will vote to amend the By-Laws to establish a Finance Committee, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 31. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee to go before the Officials of the Boston & Maine R. R. to see that the present train schedule is maintained and to confer with the Street Railway Company in an effort to secure better car service, or to take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 32. To see what action the Town will take to help maintain car service on Sprague Ave. from the Bunting Club to the residence of Eliot French.
- ART. 33. To see if the Town will vote to pay for the Bond for the Collector of Taxes and set the amount thereof.

- ART. 34. To see if the Town will vote to reimburse the Town Treasurer in the sum of \$666.76, this amount having been paid in excess of amount received from State and County on account of Andover Street construction, and make appropriation from same.
- ART. 35. To see if the Town will vote to gravel Pike Street and repair culverts on Pike Street, and make appropriations for same.
- ART. 36. To see if the Town will vote to repair Old Main Street from Lynch's Corner to Callahan's Corner, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 37. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appriate the sum of \$2150.00 or some other amount, and elect a director for demonstration work in agriculture and home economics, the money to be expended by, and the director to serve in co-operation with the County Trustees for Aid to Agriculture of the Middlesex County Bureau of Agriculture and Home Economics, under the provisions of Chapter 273, General Acts of 1918; it being understood that \$50 of this amount shall be used to provide local paid supervision of boys' and girls' club work.
- ART. 38. To see if the Town will vote to accept Chap. 240, Acts of 1920 in regard to regulations and control of certain sports and games on the Lord's Day
- ART. 39. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$1000 and the unexpended balance to instal the Town Scales, or take any action relative thereto.
- ART. 40. To see if the Town will vote to accept Section 18 of Chapter 591, Acts of 1920. (An act relative to appointment of electrical inspectors in towns).

- ART. 41. To see if the Town will vote to accept Section 9 of Chapter 591, Acts of 1920. (An act relative to By-Laws for regulation of carriages and vehicles).
- ART. 42. To see if the Town will vote to sell the Temporary Town Hall and lot to the Tewksbury Congregational Church, or take any action relative to the sale of said property.
- ART. 43. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500 to gravel North Street, beginning at Andover Street.
- ART. 44. To see if the Town will vote to lease the Town Hall for motion pictures, and take any action relative to extra cost of same.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting up attested copies thereof, one at each of the Public Meeting Houses, one at the Town Hall, one at each of the Post Offices, and leave one hundred copies for the use of the citizens at the Post Offices in said Town, 10 days at least, and over two Sundays, before the time of holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due returns of this Warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting as aforesaid:

### REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The year 1920 has been one of considerable progress in the School Department. It has been the purpose of the School Board to give all our Schools certain attention each year so that they will be kept well stocked with necessary supplies, be safe and sanitary for children and teachers and kept in good repair inside and out.

Undoubtedly the peak of high prices was reached last Summer, and as the energy of the School Board was directed at the remodelling of the Library School, a good deal of caution was used in spending money on the other Schools until the Committee could be certain as to the expense to be incurred on the Library School.

It was found that while the sum named in the special appropriation would still cover the major part of the work to be done on this building, yet some advance had gone into effect in building materials; the cost of furnishing had reached a much higher figure than estimated and in addition to this, it was decided that in order to give a finished appearance to the work, the building should be painted.

Therefore, with the knowledge and assent of the building inspection authorities, certain work in the Schools, such as the completion of metal lath and plastering and retubing of the Foster School boiler, was postponed and the money used to insure the satisfactory completion of the work at the Library School.

This School was in a deplorable condition and had been condemned not only by your Committee and other Townspeople but also by the Inspectors.

Today it stands completely renovated and with alterations of a nature to fit it for the uses of an up-to-date school building, so that it would hardly be recognized as having any connection with the old Library School. It will no doubt be of interest for some of our older citizens when looking at the present building, to call to mind the original little one-story school house which stood on this site.

The improvements include a larger basement with new furnace and more convenient arrangements for removing ashes; new driven well, 500 gallon pressure tank and gas engine mounted properly on a new cement floor: water is supplied to drinking fountain in the entries of both school rooms above, as well as to the new toilets for which ample drainage has been provided.

Both school rooms are ventilated according to the requirements of the law, new exits have been provided, and better light is furnished by means of special sets of windows on the East side of the building. Supply rooms, coat rooms and a teacher's room complete the accommodations. The room on the lower floor was furnished with new desks and seats and curtains of the latest type were adjusted to the windows.

The front entry was brightened by means of the installation of a transom over a new set of doors. The porch was laid in concrete, as were also the steps.

The flagpole was taken down; shortened for safety and painted, while a large number of minor repairs and additions, together with a thorough job of painting both inside and out, completed the work.

It was the intention of the Committee to spend some money in laying out the grounds about this and other Schools but funds were not available. Conditions over which we have no control forced expenditures for the year in excess of the appropriation for Schools, in spite of efforts to keep within bounds.

For the information of the voters, the following is pointed out with regard to increases in expenses which could not be anticipated.

It has been necessary to grant some increases in salaries; two more teachers have been added to the pay roll; trolley transportation for scholars has advanced 25%; High School Tuition was advanced in the Fall of 1920 nearly 100%; fuel cost more than estimated, although orders were placed early in the year, and it was impossible to foretell the limits of the cost of supplies, although it is to be hoped that the peak of high prices has now been passed.

The School Committee does not offer apology for a situation as indicated above, but trusts that the Townspeople will believe that our Schools have obtained the greatest possible benefit from expenditures incurred.

The teacher situation is enlarged upon under the report of the Superintendent. It is the opinion of the Committee that under his guidance the best is being done today for Tewksbury Schools, that can be expected under the present situation which is still fraught with so much difficulty throughout the State and Country.

Following the course of necessity and whether by advice or under compulsion of State Laws your Committee will continue to ask for funds sufficient to keep the standard of teaching in our Schools as high as possible. As regards accommodations, the yearly increase in the number of scholars at present is small, and the additional space at the Library School has brought temporary relief at least. It should be remembered, however, that the number of scholars now attending our Schools is sufficient to fill nearly all rooms to capacity and that it is not satisfactory to use the small class room in the Foster Building as much more than a recitation room if the health of the children is to be regarded.

Your Committee calls attention to the faithful and high quality of work of all those directly connected with our Schools and invites the Townspeople to visit the Schools oftener, that they may be acquainted with the conditions surrounding their children, and if necessary offer suggestions to the Committee.

The lack of education in its simpler forms has been shown to be great in this Country, while it is increasingly evident as we daily review the affairs of this and other nations, that education is the true means of bringing our young people to appreciate the blessings of, and uphold ours, the best form of government in the world today.

We recommend the following sums be raised to cover expenses as enumerated below, for the year 1921:

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Lowell, Mass., Jan. 10, 1921.

To the School Committee of Tewksbury,

Mrs. Larrabee and Gentlemen:-

I hereby submit my eighth annual report which is the thirtieth in the series of Superintendents' Reports. The past year owing to inflated prices in all school supplies and to the marked shortage in teachers has been a critical one to the local schools as well as in State and Nation.

Teachers. Miss Wathen, who taught music very successfully in the district last year, resigned in September to accept a better salary in West Springfield. Miss Isabel Gregory was selected to succeed Miss Wathen and so far as can be judged in a short period of service is taking up the work satisfactorily.

Miss Gladys Arnold, who was promoted last year to the principalship, Miss Elizabeth Dowler and Miss Abbie Whitney, all of the Foster School, resigned at the completion of the school year to accept better salaries elsewhere. Miss Lilla McPherson, who completed the year in Grade Six, was serving as a substitute. It became necessary to secure five new teachers for the Center Schools at the beginning of the school year.

Miss Marion McLellan, a teacher with a successful experience, was secured for the principalship of the Foster building. Miss Hazel Hodgman, also with several years' experience, was placed in Grade Seven, Miss Beatrice Symonds, a graduate of Lowell Normal with two years' experience, was placed in Grade Six, and Miss Bessie Sullivan, a graduate of Lowell Normal with one year experience, was secured for Grades Three and Four. Miss Elizabeth Flynn, who has taught successfully in this building for seven years, was the only teacher not new to the situation in September.

Four of the teachers mentioned above were lost to the Town directly on account of larger salaries paid in other places. The work is progressing well at the Foster building when one considers the new teaching force. It is a serious detriment to the schools when several

successful teachers leave at the same time. At the Center Primary Miss Nettie L. Eagles, who had taught with success for several years at the Foster School, has charge of the building and of Grade One. Miss Lillian Southerland is caring for Grade Two acceptably.

In the other schools of the Town, Shawsheen, North and West, fortunately no changes occurred this year. Work is going on very satisfactorily in all these schools. At the North Miss Lillian Allard, a graduate of last year's class at Lowell Normal, has been secured as assistant.

The Crisis. The war and conditions growing out of the war have made great inroads upon the teaching force of America. The Secretary of the Interior has reported that 143,000 out of approximately 650,000 teachers in the United States resigned last year on account of inadequate salaries; and the United States Commissioner of Education recently announced that 20,000 schools involving 500,000 pupils are closed for lack of teachers, and 40,000 schools are supplied with teachers below the minimum standard of proficiency. No immediate relief for the situation is seen by the Commissioner, Dr. Claxton, who states that while 150,000 new teachers will be needed during the coming year there will be at the outside only 35.000 prepared teachers to fill the vacancy, a deficit of at least 80,000.

The figures to illustrate to what extent Massachusetts is affected by this nation-wide shortage are taken from the report of the Special Commission on Teachers' Salaries Appointed by the Governor, August 18, 1920. The teacher shortage as manifested throughout the country has appeared to show these results: First, the closing of schools; second, the employment of teachers with less than the usual qualifications; third, a decrease in the enrollment of the teacher training institutions, that is the Normal Schools. The Commission has reported that in Massachusetts but forty schools were closed in 1919, and that the qualifications of the teaching force had shown but little deterioration, but that the State had shown to a marked degree a decrease in enrolment in the Normal Schools. Out of 2,070 teachers employed for the first time in the schools of Massachusetts in 1919, only 27% come from the State Normal Schools. The Commission adds: "It is clear that from the standpoint of the teacher supply, the State is not producing a sufficient number of teachers to fill the vacancies annually arising." While figures are not available for this year I am sure that the decrease is even more strongly apparent.

The enrollment in the ten Normal Schools of the State have decreased from 2833 in 1916 to 2022 in 1919. Within a month I heard

this question asked the Director of Education: "Is it not true that the enrollment in the ten Normal Schools of the State is greater than it was last year?" Mr. Wright answered, "Yes, there is a gain, but only a small one." This fact is of vital interest in showing when a relief from the teacher shortage may be expected. People who are not posted judging from other occupations often say, "Oh you will find plenty of teachers next September." Every student of the situation knows the fallacy of this statement. It takes from two to four years to train a teacher, and even then she is inexperienced. I am convinced that there can be but little relief from the present situation for several years.

The local situation for Dracut, Tewksbury and the other Towns of this Union is this: During the school years of 1918, 1919 and 1920, the shortage affected us in the immediate vicinity of the Lowell Normal School only in this way, that we were obliged to take more and more inexperienced graduates to fill our vacancies. However, during the summer of 1920 it became exceeding difficult to fill any except the most desirable positions even with inexperienced teachers. One day in June I offered several positions in my Town to six girls of the senior class; everyone was refused. I later offered one school which a few years ago was eagerly sought by "beginners" to five different girls before a teacher accepted. When it was necessary to secure a principal for one of the four-room buildings in October it seemed for a time an impossible task to fill the place acceptably, and that, too, after the resources of nine teachers' agencies had been exhausted.

The above rather long article is but a hint of the situation, but I am sure that any one who reads it thoughtfully will be convinced that the present is a critical time in Local as well as National and State Education.

Salaries. The cost of living increased about 100% from 1910 to 1920, whereas the average salary of elementary teachers increased 85%. The average salary of elementary teachers in Massachusetts in 1920 is \$1,237.83. It is evident that the increase in salaries though very decided has not been equivalent to the increase in cost of living. However, I am no longer considering the cost of living when I am considering the question of salaries. I know that the cost of living will be less next year than this; I know that nearly every occupation will be flooded with those out of work; I also know that your salaries must agree nearly with those paid by your neighbors in order to keep your schools up to the same standard that has been maintained for many years.

A few years ago teachers were justly considered among the lead-

ing citizens of a community. Young men and women of the highest character went into the teaching profession in ever-increasing numbers. They often lived "at home" and found a great part of their reward, not in the salaries which were small, but in appreciation, influence and opportunity. Today, while the great proportion of teachers are self-denying and devoted to their profession, yet the tendency fostered by the State is to put the teacher upon a business basis. Therefore in considering the salary appropriation for your budget of 1921 you will have to consider the law of "supply and demand;" that, in my judgment you will have to consider strictly as a business proposition whether you will pay such salaries that you can compete (I am sorry to use this word) with other Towns of this vicinity who draw their teachers from the same source as yourselves, or whether you will deliberately allow Tewksbury to be discriminated against.

I have gained the following information about the salaries paid by twelve of your neighbors which I believe to be trustworthy and up-to-date, Jan. 1, 1921:

The Remedy. Several laws have already been passed to alleviate the present shortage by paying higher salaries. Among the bills proposed by the State Board of Education for the present legislature is one to increase the minimum salaries to \$800.00 throughout the State with a greater reimbursement to the Towns and Cities. Another is to increase the length of the Normal School course to four years, granting degrees upon the completion of the course, thus making the education obtained at Normal School of the same worth and dignity of that of the College, hoping thereby to attract to the State Normal Schools more young women of high scholarship and character.

While laws will accomplish much I agree with Lee Russell who writes, "The true remedy lies much deeper than any thing which has

yet been proposed. It lies in such genuine appreciation of the importance of the work to the State as will lead to its being placed on a higher plane of honor and dignity than it has ever held. It will require the long, slow but unceasing growth of public opinion led by the conviction that upon the character and tone of the teaching force of the Public Schools the future of our country will surely depend:"

In the meantime I recommend that the Town of Tewksbury increase its salaries to an approximate equality with those of its neighbors. I make this recommendation for the sake of your children who must attend your schools.

Primary. The remodeling of the old "Library" building into the present Primary School was successfully carried out during the past summer. School opened there in September with a good enrolment in each grade. The building, with exception of blackboards in one room, is pleasant, sanitary, up-to-date. Heating, ventilation, light, seating, water supply and toilets are as satisfactory as in any school in my district.

North. During the spring of 1920 building on Trull road was begun. In September of the present school year there were eleven children of school age living on this road. It was thought best at first to transport these children to the Center, but on account of increase in transportation this method was found to be more costly than to engage a second teacher for the North. Also the matter of keeping Trull road broken out to Wamesit during the snows of a severe winter entered into the problem. The children were sent back to the North School and an assistant was secured for Miss Hersey. This also enabled us to save a considerable item of expense by retaining the Eighth Grade at this school instead of sending this grade to the Foster School. In my opinion this feature of retaining the Eighth Grade, is only temporary, for if the enrolment increases as it has in the past year there will not be room for Grade Eight at the North. In fact it may become necessary to find more room at this building within a few years.

Shawsheen. For several years both Grade Seven and Grade Eight has been sent to the Foster School from this district. Cost of transportation had increased to such an extent that it seemed necessary to retain Grade Seven at the Shawsheen School in order to save expense. This was done, and another student-teacher was assigned from the Normal School in order to take care of the extra Grade, Grade Four reciting in the hall to a student-teacher but being directly under the charge of Miss Wiggin.

Nurse. While the law of Massachusetts requires all Towns to appoint School Physicians it says but little about their duties and

nothing about their salaries. The result has been that while all School Physicians of my acquaintance have more than earned their small salaries, they have been unable to do the "follow up" work that is so valuable. At the February Town Meeting Dracut appropriated a sum of money to secure a full time nurse to work in the schools during the school year, under the direction of the School Department, that is, under the supervision of the Physician and the Su-The results of the work of this Nurse have been so perintendent. beneficial to the children of the Towns that I am the other Towns of the district should secure like advantages. T have reason to believe that the Towns of Tyngsboro and North Reading will be glad to join with Tewksbury in securing a full time nurse for the coming year. The Town of Dracut paid its Nurse \$1000 for this past year and have promised her \$1200 for the coming school year. In order that you may judge of the value of such a nurse I will quote from my report recently prepared for Dracut: "Miss —— has worked at all seasons and times conscientiously and wisely; she has been untiring in her efforts to improve the health of the pupils; she has justly won the good-will of teachers and pupils, and the admiration of the school officials. Her year's work has proved a blessing to the schools of your Town." During the ten months of service this Nurse has made 1124 home visits, including in these visits 1394 children. has visited 90 measles cases and 53 under school age. She has taken cultures for 6 diphtheria cases, has discovered 2 appendicitis cases, has put on 76 simple dressings, has taken 53 to hospitals or clinics, has vaccinated 44 at school, has taken 19 to physician's office for vaccination. She has had the following list of "corrections": Tonsils and adenoids removed, 74; Uvula, 2; Dental treatment, 80; glasses changed, 12; Pediculosis corrected, 81; individual instructions to mothers, 88; calls for Tuberculosis work, 62.

Is this not a record work that you would like done in your own?

Graduation. On Thursday evening, June 17, 1920, appropriate graduation exercises were held at Pickering Hall. Superintendent C. L. Randall presented diplomas to the following named pupils: Margaret Amiot, Morton Battles, Leslie Chambers, Alexander Cameron, John Connors, Francis Corr, Ruth Driver, Stephen Eliades, Gerald Eno, Douglas Flaherty, Wilbur Foss, Tony Furtado, Bernard Greene, Adelaide Holt, Alfred Johnson, Helen Kittredge, Dorothy Lavelle, Ethel Livingston, Arthur Maclaren, William McHugh, Allen MacDonald, Corinne Marion, Viola Pinkos, Eva O'Connell, Marion Rust, Arthur Scarlett, Frances Swain, Willard Scutt, Anna Sullivan, Rae

Sutherland, Alice Simpson, Melvin Tenney, Ethel Treadwell, Richard Wright, Figenva Zariphes.

Of these thirty-five graduates 20 entered Lowell High School, 3 entered Vocational School, 4 went directly to work, and the rest remained at home.

High School. The tuition at Lowell High School has justly been raised from \$60.00 to \$100.00 per year. The increase will make a considerable item in the school budget. However, no citizen of Tewksbury will wish to have the number of pupils in attendance at High School decrease in order that the tuition bills may be less. I consider it a matter of deep regret that the High School attendance has constantly diminished since the outbreak of the war. While in many Towns the tide has turned and more pupils are in High School than a year ago, in Tewksbury the attendance is still constantly decreasing. Two years ago there were fifty-one pupils enrolled from this Town at the Lowell High School, last year there were forty-five, and at present there are but 40.

The following pupils entered or continued at High School this last September: Margaret Amiot, Alma Anderson, Ralph Anderson, Charles Battles, Ruth Cameron, Mary Clancy, Martha Coolidge, Stephen Eliades, George Eno, Douglas Flaherty, Bernard Greene, Clifford Haines, Adelaide Holt, Benjamin Holt, Nils Johnston, Frances Johnson, Ethel Livingston, Arthur Maclaren, Corinne Marion, Hubert McCoy, Allen MacDonald, William McHugh, Anna McKillop, Charles Nash, Albert Newhouse, Eva O'Connell, Sadie Penney Archie Pillsbury, William Scarlett, Morton Battles, Harold Smith, Anna Sullivan, Kenneth Sunbury, Frances Swain, Bessie Tenney, Eunice Toothaker, Ethel Treadwell, Alice Trull, Helen Wright, Richard Wright.

Dear Sir:

At your request, I herewith submit my second annual report as Supervisor of Drawing in the schools of Tewksbury.

War time is not the time of innovations unless it be in learning to do without the things we have always had. Many supplies are not procurable and others only at prohibitive prices. And unfortunately, as prices have increased, the quality has decreased. Paper is very thin and porous and paints are uniformly poor. This means that really high grade work is impossible with the most pains-taking child. All paste is now "war paste"—made with dark flour. Its sticking qualities are poor and the dark color soils the paper and causes mussy work. But in spite of these handicaps, the work has, it seems to me, gone very well.

First Grade children learn the colors, how to use crayons in different tones, to use scissors—cutting to line and also free hand cutting, measuring inches, and have some nature work.

Second and Third Grade children do more difficult work along all these lines and learn the half inch.

In the Fourth Grade, the quarter inch is freely used in measuring. Water color is introduced as a medium for nature work after practice obtained in making colors (we make all colors from the three primaries) and in color scales.

In Fifth or Sixth, according to the way Grades are combined simple work is the foreshortened circle (in other words, the drawing of objects like tumblers, vases, etc.) is introduced with more difficult work in the same line the following year. Upper Grade object drawing is still more difficult, dealing with the perspective of parallel lines—boxes, books, etc.

In all grades, the special work for the holidays combines measuring, coloring and construction, the low grade construction work being with paper and the upper utilizing cardboard covered with paper and vellum—i. e., simple bookbinding.

At the June exhibition, as great a variety of work as possible is shown but conditions are not favorable for display of perhaps the most interesting things, the finely constructive work.

To the superintendent and teachers I wish to express my appreciation for their kindness and co-operation at all times.

## WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

MIDDLESEX SS:

To either of the Constables of the Town of Tewksbury in said County:

GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Tewksbury, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to meet and assemble at Town Hall in said Tewksbury, on Monday, the 6th day of February, 1922, at nine o'clock a.m. to act on the following articles:

ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers, to choose by ballot a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of Poor, three members of the Board of Health, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, a Tree Warden and Constables, all to serve one year. One Highway Commissioner, to serve for three years and one School Committee, two Trustees of the Public Library and one Park Commissioner, to serve three years; one Assessor to serve three years. The polls for the election of Town Officers to be opened at 9 o'clock a. m., and close at 4 o'clock p. m., and to vote on the following question: "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of certain non-intoxicating beverages in this town?" Yes; No.

- ART. 3. To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.
- ART. 4. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise by taxation to defray necessary expenses for the current year, and make appropriations for the same.
- ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote the money arising from licensing dogs, for the ensuing year, to aid in support of the Public Library.
- ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen. to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year.

The vote to be as follows:

Voted:—That the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1922, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and debt or debts incurred under this vote to be paid from the revenue of said financial year.

- ART. 7. To see what compensation the Town will vote for the collection of taxes, and at what rate and from what date interest shall be charged on taxes of 1922 unpaid after November 1, 1922, or to take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 8. To see if the Town will vote to borrow. if necessary, a sum not exceeding one twenty-fifth of one per cent. of the current year's valuation, such sum of money to be used in the suppression of the Gipsy and Brown Tail Moths, and not to be expend-

- ed before December 1st next, and to be raised in the tax levy of the year 1923.
- ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for the proper observance of Memorial Day, and appoint a committee to expend the money. Said committee to be taken from members of the G. A. R., Spanish War Veterans, and American Legion.
- ART. 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to institute suits on behalf of the Town or defend any suits that are, or may be brought against the Town.
- ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appriate the sum of \$150.00 or some other amount, and elect a director for demonstration work in agriculture and home economics, the money to be expended by, and the director to serve in co-operation with the County Trustees for Aid to Agriculture of the Middlesex County Bureau of Agriculture and Home Economics, under the provisions of Chapter 273, General Acts of 1918; it being understood that \$50 of this amount shall be used to provide local paid supervision of boys' and girls' club work.
- ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of twelve hundred dollars from the electric light appropriation of 1921 to instal fourteen electric lights from the junction of Main and Chandler Streets to the residence of L. E. Small on Pine Street, providing the abutters of said streets pay to the Lowell Electric Light Corporation the same amount to help construct the line, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART 13. To see if the Town will transfer from the unexpended balance of the 1921 Electric Light appro-

- priation a sufficient amount to extend the electric lights from Almont to the junction of North and Main Streets, thus completing the circuit from Lowell via North Tewksbury to the Centre.
- ART. 14. To see if the Town will vote to instal electric lights on old Main Street from Lynch's Corner to Callahan's Corner, and make appropriations for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 15. To see if the Town will vote to instal electric lights on Trull Road from Andover Street to Main Street, and make appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to instal three electric lights on French Street, and appropriate money for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 17 To see if the Town will vote to instal one electric light on Main Street near the residence of Frank Smith.
- ART. 18. To see if the Town will vote to instal electric lights on Shawsheen Street, from Corner of Main and Shawsheen Streets to Burtt's Crossing, and make an appropriation for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 19. To see if the Town will vote to place four gas lights on Chandler Street, from the present terminal of the Main to the junction of Chandler and East Streets, and appropriate money for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote to instal one electric light on Summer Street, near the residence of Mr. Garland, and make appropriation for same, or take any other action relative thereto.

- ART. 21. To see if the Town will vote to place one electric light on Main Street on the Easterly side of the railroad crossing at Wamesit, and make appropriation for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to purchase a Lungmotor, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate for pruning and repair of public shade trees throughout the Town.
- ART. 24. To see what action the Town will take relative to the purchase of a new Fire Truck or Chassis and to see if the Town will vote to dispose of the old truck or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500 for oil or other binder.
- ART. 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000 to repair East Street from the Centre to the State Infirmary.
- ART. 27. To see if the Town will vote to repair Rogers Street from Main Street, to the residence of Mr. Walsh, and appropriate money for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 28. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$200.00, to provide band concerts on the Centre Common during the summer months, and choose or appoint a committee to expend the money, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to rebuild the bridge over Strong-water brook, or take any other action relative thereto.

- ART. 30. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue Old Andover Street, between the residences of Mr. Kittredge and Mr. Hilton, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 31. To see if the Town will vote to widen and repair French Street, and remove dangerous corner near old powder house.
- ART. 32. To see what action the Town will take to reimburse the Town Treasurer for loss of taxes of 1920 on personal property of the Avery Chemical Company.
- ART. 33. To see what action the Town will take to reimburse the Town Treasurer the sum of \$1372.82, the amount of overpaid interest in 1921.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting up attested copies thereof, one at each of the Public Meeting Houses, one at the Town Hall, one at each of the Post Offices, and leave one hundred copies for the use of the citizens at the Post Offices in said Town, 10 days at least, and over two Sundays, before the time of holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due returns of this Warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk at the time and place of meeting as aforesaid:

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Lowell, Mass., Jan. 9, 1922.

To the School Committee of Tewksbury.

Mrs. Larrabee and Gentlemen:-

I hereby submit my ninth annual report which is the thirty-first in the series of Superintendents' Reports. The past year has been a successful one in most respects when you consider that the teacher shortage still prevails to such an extent that it has been a most difficult task to fill vacancies in the teaching force in a satisfactory manner.

Teachers. The only change among the supervision this year has been in case of Mr. Frank Hatch of Fitchburg Normal School who resigned as teacher of Manual Training. Mr. Hatch had done excellent work. He is succeeded by Mr. George Robeson who taught successfully in Tyngsboro last year.

Miss Marion McLellan, principal of the Foster School last year resigned at the close of the school year.

Miss Mary C. Rogers, a teacher of wide experience and of apparently good recommendations was secured for the position. Miss Beatrice Symonds resigned from the sixth grade in order to teach nearer her home. Miss Lucy Desmond who had recently taught in Lowell succeeded Miss Symonds in grade six where she is doing satisfactory work.

Miss Ethel M. Hadley, successful teacher of Shawsheen primary, resigned at the close of the school year to be married. Miss Ruth Tingley, a native of Tewksbury, a graduate of Lowell Normal, and a teacher of several years successful experience, has been selected for the position.

At the West School Miss Laura Byron, a recent graduate of Lowell Normal School, began the term in September but left early in the term to teach in Rhode Island near her home. Miss Lucia Waite, an experienced teacher is now in charge of the school, doing satisfactory work. The rest of the teaching staff remain as last year.

The teacher situation is still serious. The number of students now in attendance at the training schools of the state is nearly normal. When those now students in the Normal Schools graduate the shortage will begin to be relieved, but it will probably be several years before the normal supply of teachers is available.

Salaries. The salaries in Tewksbury were raised last January so that they are now practically equivalent to those paid by the neighboring towns. I look for no marked change in the salary schedule, but do recommend that the schedule be placed on the \$50 basis, that is starting \$850, \$950 etc., instead of \$800, \$900 etc. This is because the state re-imbursement begins with \$750, \$850, etc.

Health. At the annual meeting of 1921 an appropriation was made to hire, together with the towns of North Reading and Tyngsboro, a school nurse. Since this date a law was passed making such action compulsory. Mrs. Margaret Michaud was secured, and is now spending three days per week in Tewksbury in accordance with agreement. She is faithful and conscientious in her duties and her work will prove beneficial to the pupils. Several cases of correction have already occurred.

Standard scales for weighing the pupils have been placed in each building. Containers and a supply of liquid soap have also been placed in each of the school houses.

North. The number of pupils increased to such an extent last year that an assistant was engaged for the North School. During the summer vacation a partition was removed thus making the two small class rooms into one large one. Desks and seats were placed in this room and it is now used as a primary school for the first three grades. Miss Lillian Allard, the former assistant, has been elected teacher of this school.

The North School is now, therefore, on the same basis as the Shawsheen, viz. each a two room building, used by the State as training schools.

Foster School. Six grades are taught at this school with five teachers in charge, two teachers together have three grades, as per example, Miss Flynn has grade five with one half the work of grade four, and Miss Sullivan has grade three with half the work of grade four. This arrangement makes the number of pupils in these two rooms large. There should be eight rooms at the Center to accommodate the eight grades. I suggest that you give this matter your careful consideration. Perhaps a portable school near the Foster building would prove a solution to the problem.

Physical Training. That physical training by a special instructor will soon become compulsory in the schools of Massachusetts seems evident. Physical exercises are now conducted in the rooms by each teacher. It seems advisable to make plans for securing at some time in the near future land for an addition to the playgrounds of the Foster School.

Vacation. Many schools throughout the country are employing what is called the "eight week" plan. This means that after the Christmas vacation the schools will be in session eight weeks then a vacation of one week, and so on till the close of the year in June. This division

of the work is claimed to be beneficial to both pupils and teachers. You will see by the school calendar that a decision has been made to try this plan in Tewksbury this year.

REPORT OF CLUB WORK IN TEWKSBURY—Boys' and girls' club work was started for the first time this year as a result of an appropriation of \$50 for that purpose by the annual town meeting. Miss Marie McPherson of Lowell was employed as local leader. There were two canning clubs with a membership of 15 and a mixed club containing nine in the garden project, two in pig and one in corn. Ten meetings were held with the clubs and two of them won banners for making a 100% finish. All the members were visited at their homes on an average of three times during the summer. Arthur Trull won a two day trip to the State College because of his excellent work in the garden club. Home Economics C.ubs are now being organized and the interest in all club projects is increasing every week.

Manual Training. The boys of the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades have classes in Manual Training of woodwork each week. The sixth grade boys have had no previous instruction, while the eighth graders have had lessons for two years. I am giving the following facts about this course from the fuller report of Mr. Robeson. The sixth grade boys are instructed in the use of tools, their care, and to a slight extent their manufacture. They are taught to make joints, laps, "mortise and tenon," etc. This grade makes knife boxes, book racks, screen frames, and simpler articles.

The seventh grade boys are taught simple wood finishing with stains and shelacs.

The boys of the seventh and eighth grades make more difficult articles such as book cases, tool boxes, music cabinets, etc.

Beside the individual projects of the pupils considerable light repairs are made about the school, and several articles are made each year for the use in the rooms.

Sewing. At the time that the boys of grades 6 to 8 are taking manual training the girls of these grades have sewing with Miss Coburn.

I quote directly from Miss Coburn's report to me. "The seventh and eighth grade girls have made underclothes, aprons of all kinds, handkerchiefs, smocks, dress skirts, middy blouses, several dresses, and dresses and rompers for younger children. The girls of the sixth grade have made iron holders, work bags, handkerchiefs, small aprons, dish towels, dust caps, and underclothes."

I feel that this kind of training is of value to your pupils and regret that there is no opportunity to give equally to the pupils of the North.

Graduation. On Thursday evening, June 23, 1921, Mrs. H. M. Larrabee, Chairman of the School Committee, presented diplomas to the

Conclusion. In conclusion I wish to call to your attention the reports and tables which follow this report and form a part of it.

Again I wish to express my appreciation of the loyal co-operation of supervisors and teachers, and the cordial support of the School Board.

#### REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF DRAWING

Mr. Charles L. Randall, Supt. of Schools, Tewksbury, Mass. Dear Sir:

At your request, I herewith submit my third annual report as supervisor of drawing.

Everybody whether or not he realizes it, whether or not he wishes it, is a designer. When he dresses himself, arranges a bouquet, sets a table, writes a letter—he is a designer. The home, the place of business, reflects the taste of the owner.

Good taste is the application of the laws of color, form and proportion. And these laws are being daily taught, in the drawing lessons, to the children in our schools. The first lesson in design, though it does not bear any such name, is given the first grade child, when he is shown where, on the paper, to place his first drawing. This design work continues through the grades. Each year the child learns more about proper spacing, margin and arrangement. This is the application of but one principle. Hand in hand with this are the principles taught, when drawing from nature, of color, line and harmony for nature always observes all the laws of good design.

To make this design work of the greatest educational, the greatest practical value, is our aim and this is best obtained by interweaving, as far as possible this work with the regular work of the school—the illustrating of their reading in the lower grades, the making of signs and of placards in the middle grades and portfolios in the upper classes. This year we are helping the nurse in her health campaign by making posters in all the grades and the upper grades will also make posters for the concerts which the schools are to give.

## REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

January 7, 1922.

To the Superintendent and School Board of Tewksbury.

As supervisor of Music, I am glad to submit the following report:—

In taking up the teaching of music in Tewksbury I found the Weaver system had been followed. In this system, the primary grades are taught rote songs, the first steps in reading, and tone and time work are started. In the intermediate and upper grades, tone work is continued, reading and rhythm are given particular attention. Two and three part singing is started in grade five and continued through the upper grades.

An effort is made to develop appreciation of the best music, by giving attention to classical songs, the history of music and the development from the folk song to the music of to-day. Appreciation is the outgrowth of knowing and doing.

I have attempted to organize orchestras, but have not met with very encouraging results, but will not give up. If any one has a cornet, drum or any instrument tucked away in their attic, I beg of you to bring it out and let some child have the use of it. We all need music in our lives. It is for the joy it gives that I urge this cause, not to make professional musicians.

I am pleased with the interest which has been shown, to my latest suggestion, of violin classes in the schools, and assure you, we will show some good results.

I have received hearty co-operation from the Superintendent, teachers, parents and friends. For this I wish to thank you. It is interest that makes for success in any educational work.

# REPORT OF SCHOOL PHYSICIAN AND NURSE

The past year has shown some very remarkable results in the physical improvement of our school children through the co-operation of the school nurse with me. Many cases, as reported below, have been taken to the hospital for operation. A great many defects have been noted and reported, which have been remedied. Talks upon school hygiene have been given the children, and a healthy co-operation of parent, teacher and nurse has been established.

As school physician I have examined all of the school children in the Town, and suggestions have been made for their betterment.

A school nurse in a small town in a very great aid to the school system. It appears to me that it would be one of the best moves that the Town of Tewksbury could make, to engage our nurse for full time, in preference to the present arrangement. By so doing her work would not be divided to anybody's disadvantage, and her constant attention would mean very much improved results.

# REPORT OF DEMONSTRATION WORK IN AGRI-CULTURE AND HOME ECONOMICS IN THE TOWN OF TEWKSBURY FOR THE YEAR ENDING DEC. 31, 1922.

An appropriation of \$150 was made at the Annual Town Meeting for demonstration work under the direction of the Middlesex County Bureau of Agriculture and Home Economics. Following is a report of the work done by this organization in Tewksbury:

a report of the work done by this organization in Tewksbury:
Agents of the Bureau made sixty-six farm and home visits during the year. The County Agricultural Agent organized an automobile poultry tour to study some successful poultry plants in the

northern part of the County.

Bureau moving pictures were shown twice to a total audience of

230 people.

Most of the work of the Bureau was done with boys and girls, there being forty-five enrolled in different Club projects. Some of the best work was done in garden and canning during the past summer. Agents of the Bureau held twenty-seven meetings with boys' and girls' clubs. These clubs were organized in all parts of the Town. Velma Trull won a two-day trip to M. A. C. for her work in both Home Economics and Canning. A canning exhibit was held in connection with the Middlesex North exhibit at Lowell, which created much favorable attention. Local leaders employed by the Bureau to assist regular staff workers were Miss Mary McPherson and Myrton Fuller.

Middlesex County continues to lead all others in the United States in the number of boys and girls enrolled in club projects. There were 2,965 enrolled in various club projects and they produced \$75,475 worth of products during the year. All of these young people were under the leadership of agents of the County Bureau and

184 paid and volunteer local leaders.

## WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

MIDDLESEX SS:

To either of the Constables of the Town of Tewksbury in said County:

GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Tewksbury, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to meet and assemble at Town Hall in said Tewksbury, on Monday, the 5th day of February, 1923, at nine o'clock a. m., to act on the following articles:

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose all necessary Town officers, to choose by ballot a Town Clerk, three Selectmen. three Overseers of Poor, three members of the Board of Health, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, a Tree Warden and Constables. all to serve one year. Highway Commissioners, one to serve for three years and one for one year to fill a vacancy; one School Committee, two Trustees of the Public Library and one Park Commissioner, to serve three years; one Assessor to serve three The polls for the election of Town officers vears. to be opened at 9 o'clock a.m., and close at 4 o'clock p. m., and to vote on the following questions: "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of certain non-intoxicating beverages in this Town?" Yes; No. "Shall the Town petition for installation of an accounting system by the Commonwealth?"

- ART. 3. To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.
- ART. 4. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise by taxation to defray necessary expenses for the current year, and make appropriations for the same.
- ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote the money arising from licensing dogs, for the ensuing year, to aid in support of the Public Library.
- ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year.

The vote to be as follows:

Voted:—That the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1923, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and debt or debts incurred under this vote to be paid from the revenue of said financial year.

- ART. 7. To see what compensation the Town will vote for the collection of taxes, and at what rate and from what date interest shall be charged on taxes of 1923 unpaid after November 1, 1923, or to take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 8. To see if the Town will vote to borrow, if necessary, a sum not exceeding one twenty-fifth of one per cent. of the current year's valuation, such sum of money to be used in the suppression of the Gipsy and Brown Tail Moths, and not to be expend-

- ed before December 1st next, and to be raised in the tax levy of the year 1924.
- ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for the proper observance of Memorial Day, and appoint a committee to expend the money. Said committee to be taken from members of the G. A. R., Spanish War Veterans, and American Legion, and Sons of Veterans.
- ART. 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to institute suits on behalf of the Town or defend any suits that are, or may be brought against the Town.
- ART 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 or some other amount, and elect a director for demonstration work in agriculture and home economics, the money to be expended by, and the director to serve in co-operation with the County Trustees for Aid to Agriculture of the Middlesex County Bureau of Agriculture and Home Economics, under the provisions of Chapter 273, General Acts of 1918; it being understood that \$50 of this amount shall be used to provide local paid supervision of boys' and girls' club work.
- ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000 to purchase a truck for the Highway Department, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 13. To see what action the Town will take in regard to selling the Town horses.
- ART. 14. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote by which they accepted Section 63, Chapter 41, .

- of the General Laws, which establishes the office of Road Commissioners.
- ART. 15. To see if the Town will accept the provisions of law providing for the election of a Highway Surveyor.
- ART. 16. To see what action the Town will take in providing for the increased enrollment of the Foster School; secondly, to appoint a committee consisting of four members, to act in conjunction with the School Committee to investigate said situation and report at a special Town meeting to be held not later than June 1st, 1923.
- ART. 17. To see what action the citizens of the Town of Tewksbury will take relative to donating the use of the second story of the Delco Generating Building to the Tewksbury American Legion, Post 259, for their headquarters.
- ART. 18. To see if the Town will vote to have the assessments of the real estate for 1923 published in book form, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- ART. 19. To see if the Town will vote to have the Fire Chief attend to the Chief's duties, and do nothing outside of fire department duties.
- ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote that no automobile or carriage belonging to private parites shall remain in any building belonging to the Town.
- ART. 21. To see if the Town will vote that no person employed by the Town shall draw more than one salary.

- ART. 33. To see if the Town will vote to instal one electric light on Barker Ave., near Wamesit Railroad Station, and make appropriation for same.
- ART. 34. To see if the Town will vote to instal one electric light on Pike Street between Main Street and the McCoy residence, and move the present light at Garland's driveway to the junction of Astle and Pike Streets.
- ART. 35. To see if the Town will vote to instal one electric light on Summer Street, near the residence of Mr. Garland, and make appropriation for same, or take any other action relative thereto.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1922

During the past year needed repairs and improvements have been made in our schools, such as the installation of a new electrical water pump at the Shawsheen building, and the repairing and reshingling of the roof.

With the changing of the grades at the Foster School, whereby each teacher has charge of one grade only, it became necessary to convert a part of Pickering Hall into a classroom; grade six now occupies this room. The increased numbers in each of the grades in this building is rapidly becoming a serious problem. The Foster building, in its present condition, cannot adequately provide for the increasing population of the school, also, the building will have to be painted this year.

During the coming year we hope to establish a Junior High School, consisting of grades six, seven and eight. The establishment of this system will serve to eliminate the difficulty which the present system now brings about when students go from grammar to High School. The change will be more gradual and inducive to a larger number to obtain a higher education. We have now sixty pupils attending High Schools, a vast increase over the attendance of previous years, and next year we hope for a still greater number.

To work for the welfare of the scholar is the aim of the committee, and we hope the public bear the same spirit with us.

## REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent and School Board of Tewksbury:

From the official head of the Women's Music Clubs of America there has lately been a challenge and prophecy in the statement that "the hope of the nation for universal music culture rests upon music in the Public Schools." You might ask, "How is this being answered?

In our one aim in the Public Schools of America. That is, to produce children trained in the broadly cultural and appreciative side of the art, using band and orchestral training, vocal and in-

strumental instructions as the tools.

Last winter violin classes were organized in the schools. They were a success from the fact that we have apparent proofs. I. Members were prepared to give a public demonstration. 2. Some of the pupils are studying with private teachers. 3. I could not produce an orchestra until after the classes were well established; at graduation the results were given. 4. It has given material for a Junior ensemble.

At a recent Parent-Teacher's meeting the regular orchestra gave a demonstration of the Wednesday morning work this fall. The in-

strumental work is all done out of school hours.

Of the true value of this instrumental work I am fully convinced, because I believe some children should learn to play, some to sing, some to listen, some to professional perfection, some to amateur accomplishment, but each to that point where music would fill its finest place in his life.

The regular vocal music and appreciation is being carried on by

the same schedule as I have given in a previous report.

The principal features: good tone quality, the right vocal habits, the love and appreciation of good music, being foremost in all les-

sons through the grades from first to eighth.

Last winter a concert was given by the Foster and Spaulding Schools. Although given in the style of a pageant it portrayed the regular school work, as the songs were taken mostly from our music readers, and the dances by Grades I. and II. demonstrated work with rhythmic effects. Some of the proceeds were used for Victrola records, playground necessities and orchestra music.

Sir:

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Tewksbury for the period from January 1, 1922 to April 30, 1923, and report thereon as follows:

The financial transactions of the town as recorded on the books of the several departments collecting or disbursing funds of the town were examined and reconciled.

The books of the treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were checked with the records of the departments collecting money for the town and with the other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury. The disbursements were checked with the approved vouchers on file.

The cash book was footed throughout for the period covered by the audit, and the cash balance was verified by a reconciliation of the bank account with the statement furnished by the bank.

The trust funds in the custody of the town treasurer were examined and found to be as recorded.

Tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash and summaries of the trust fund accounts are appended to this report.

The books and accounts of the tax collectors for the taxes of the years 1916 to 1922, inclusive, were examined. The commitment books were footed and differences between the detailed list as shown by the commitment books and the assessors' warrants were adjusted.

The cash book entries were checked to the postings in the commitment books, the payments to the treasurer were verified by the treasurer's records of receipts, and the abatements were checked to the assessors' records of abatements granted.

In reconciling the outstanding accounts, considerable difficulty was experienced, due to the fact that a number of cash book entries had not been posted to the commitment books, and also to the fact that entries were found in the commitment books which did not appear on the cash books.

From the tables appended it will be noted that the collector has made payments to the treasurer in excess of the amount collected as shown by his books, which is undoubtedly due to the fact that collections have been made which do not appear on the commitment or cash books.

In several instances it was found that owing to the fact that payments had not been entered on the commitment books, property had later been sold for non-payment of taxes. I would recommend that steps be taken to determine the amount of tax titles belonging to the town, and to perfect the titles to the same.

The outstanding taxes were listed and verification notices were sent to a number of persons whose accounts appeared as unpaid on the collector's books, and from the replies received I believe that, with the exception of clerical errors, the accounts as listed are correct.

Tables showing reconciliations of the tax and assessment accounts for the various years are appended to this report.

The records of the town clerk were examined and the appropriations and other financial authorizations as voted at the town meetings were listed and checked. The town clerk's books showing dog and hunting and fishing licenses issued were examined and payments to the State and county treasurers were checked to receipts on file.

The records of licenses granted by the selectmen and issued by the town clerk were checked, the fees received being checked to the town treasurer's records.

The books of the sealer of weights and measures were examined and checked, and the total of fees received and paid to the treasurer was verified by the latter's books.

The records of receipts for rent, etc., from the town hall were examined and checked to the treasurer's receipts.

The surety bonds of the treasurer, tax collectors and town clerk were examined and found to be in proper form.

A balance sheet, showing the financial condition of the town as of December 31, 1922, was prepared, and is appended to this report.

While making the audit it was noted that the practice of giving the various departments their receipts had been discontinued except in one or two instances. The law in this respect applies to all departments.

An appropriation should be made at the town meeting to cover the necessary expenses of the moth department for the year, also to cover the expenditure for State Aid, debt and interest; and all receipts should be used by the assessors in determining the tax rate.

The custom of voting that unexpended balances of appropriations be carried forward from year to year should be discontinued, except in cases where the specific purpose for which the appropriation is made has not been accomplished.

The balance sheet as submitted shows a small deficit of revenue which is due to the practice of carrying forward unexpended balances and the failure to provide for all expenditures made.

While engaged in making the audit, the hearty co-operation of all the officials was received, and on behalf of my assistant and myself I wish to express my appreciation of the courtesies received and the assistance rendered.

We have about the average number of contagious diseases this past year. The scarlet fever and diphtheria being mostly in the south part. In visiting the many small stores and booths, about town, I find, for the most part a very satisfactory condition of the premises. We had one hydrophobia case, which was taken care of in the proper way. As a bit of advice to those who are not conversant with the disease in animals, let me give a few directions. Do not kill the animal, if there is any way of getting it tied up alive, without danger to yourself. Next, notify either the Inspector of Animals, Mr. Hugh Cameron, or the Agent of the Board of Health. By following the above instructions, we have a chance to observe the animal and definitely determine the condition. Otherwise, if it escapes before a diagnosis is made, every person, who is scratched, bitten or even gets the saliva into a scratched part of the body should take treatment. To kill the dog at once may make a positive diagnosis difficult, because the disease has not developed sufficiently to determine it; therefore making treatment imperative. By following my first instructions we can positively determine whether patients need rabies treatment or not.

At these meetings, following our usual custom, new books have been distributed among the trustees for their censorship.

During the year 391 new books have been added, 43 of these being children's books.

Realizing that the public library is an important factor in the education of the young, the book committee has endeavored to get the very best material for them, and that their efforts are appreciated, is proven by the large number of children who visit the library and take out books.

We wish there might be a greater demand, among the adult readers, for books of non-fiction, for the library that does not furnish books of instruction and reference, as well as entertainment, is not fulfilling its highest mission. Yet it is useless to purchase these books unless they are to be read.

The book committee welcomes requests for new books from the patrons of the library, and never fails to secure such, when they are desirable books.

We regret that Mrs. Dinsmore, who was elected a member of the board at the beginning of this year, has found it necessary to resign, owing to a temporary absence from the town.

We would make mention also of the recent death of Miss Anna Coggin, formerly a resident of this town, who served faithfully as a trustee for many years. We also refer with sincere sympathy to the recent death of our townsman, Albert J. Trull, who served for many years as a trustee of the library, giving his best advice and work for the welfare of library.

The following notes, taken by the board during the year, might be of general interest:

That the price of library cards be reduced to one cent.

That books of non-fiction be removed from the 7 day list.

That the old chest of drawers used for the card catalogue, be exchanged for a new and more spacious one.

We would like to remind the voters of the town that the present quarters of the library, intended to be used temporarily only, are very inadequate for supplying our needs, and unless some other provision is made within a few years, it will doubtless be necessary to either curtail the number of new books added, or to store the books which are not in active circulation.

Our thanks are due to the librarians for their faithful work, to those who have generously donated books, and to the reading public for its courteous patronage.

The trustees respectfully request that the article in the warrant, asking for the library an appropriation of \$750. be adopted.

## WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Middlesex ss:

To either of the Constables of the Town of Tewksbury in said County:

Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Tewksbury, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to meet and assemble at Town Hall in said tTewksbury, on Monday, the 4th day of February, 1924 at nine o'clock a. m., to act on the following articles:

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose all necessary Town officers, to choose by ballot a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of Poor, three members of the Board of Health, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, a Tree Warden and Constables, all to serve one year; one Highway Commissioner to serve three years; one School Committee, two Trustees of the Public Library and one Park Commissioner, to serve three years; one Assessor to serve three years. The polls for the election of Town officers to be opened at 9 o'clock a. m., and close at 4 o'clock p. m., and to vote on the following questions: "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of certain non-intoxicating beverages in this Town? Yes; No.
- ART: 3. To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.
- ART. 4 To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise by taxation to defray necessary expenses for the current year, and make appropriations for the same.
- ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote the money arising from licensing dogs, for the ensuing year, to aid in support of the Public Library.

ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year.

The vote to be as follows:

Voted:—That the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1924, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and debt or debts incurred under this vote to be paid from the revenue of said financial year.

- ART. 7. To see what compensation the Town will vote for the collection of taxes, and at what rate and from what date interest shall be charged on taxes of 1924 unpaid after November 1, 1924, or to take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 8. To see if the Town will vote to borrow, if necessary, a sum not exceeding one twenty-fifth of one per cent. of the current year's valuation, such sum of money to be used in the suppression of the Gipsy and Brown Tail Moths, and not to be expended before December 1st next, and to be raised in the tax levy of the year 1925.
- ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for the proper observance of Memorial Day, and appoint a committee to expend the money Said committee to be taken from members of the G. A. R., Spanish War Veterans, and American Legion, and Sons of Veterans.
- ART. 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to institute suits on behalf of the Town or defend any suits that are, or may be brought against the Town.
- ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 or some other amount, and elect a director for demonstration work

in agriculture and home economics, the money to be expended by, and the director to serve in co-operation with the County Trustees for Aid to Agriculture of the Middlesex County Bureau of Agriculture and Home Economics, under the provisions of Chapter 273, General Acts of 1918; it being understood that \$50 of this amount shall be used to provide local paid supervision of boys' and girls' club work.

- ART. 12 To see if the Town will vote to build a new school house according to plans presented at this meeting or take any action relative thereto.
- ART 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$116,000 00 for building the new school house.
- ART. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for building an addition to the Foster School, or take any other action relative to furnishing increased school accommodation in the Town.
- ART. 15. To see if the Town will vote to pay the architect the sum of \$300.00 for drawing the plans for the new school house out of the appropriation raised last year.
- ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a tractor or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) for oil or any other binder, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 18. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum not exceeding four thousand five hundred dollars (4,500.00) to purchase a new fire truck, or take any other action relative to same.
- ART. 19. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of twelve hundred dollars (1,200.00) to purchase fire hose, or take any other action relative to same

- ART. 20. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600.00) to purchase suitable device for a fire alarm, or take any other action relative to same.
- ART. 21. To see if the Town will vote to resurface East Street, from Fairgrieve's Store to State Hospital main entrance, or take any other action.
- ART. 22. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair Hood Road, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 23. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars for Band Concerts at the Common and appoint a committee for same, or take any other action toward same.
- ART. 24. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue all lights on State Road and on any of the Town's highways where there are no houses, except at cross roads and curves and intersecting streets, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 25. To see if the Town will vote that no automobile or carriage belonging to private parties shall remain in any building belonging to the Town. any other action.
- ART. 26. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Fire Chief sufficient salary so that he will attend to the duties of a fire chief and no other, or take any other action.
- ART. 27 To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the free telephone service to all officials of the Town except the Fire Chief's phone or take any other action.
- ART. 28. To see if the Town will vote to install more powerful lights at the center or take any other action.

- ART. 29. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights in the Town barn, or take any other action.
- ART. 30. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights on Lee Street and make an appropriation for same, or take any other action thereto.
- ART. 31. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights on Chandler Street from Chandler's Corner to East Street and make an appropriation for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 32. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights on East Street from the residence of Mrs. Nathan Scott to the junction of Main Street, and make an appropriation for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 33. To see what action the Town will take in regard to installing electric lights on Shawsheen St., from Collins' house to Burtt's Crossing on Lowe Street to Maple Street, on Whittemore Street to East Street, on East Street to Carter Street, to the residuce of George E. Gray and make an appropriation for same, or take any othe action relative thereto.
- ART. 34. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights on Old Main Street, Fairlawn, and make an appropriation for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 35. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights from the Wilmington line from Atkin's store on Whipple Road to Foster Street, and on Foster Street to Maple Road, and make appropriation for same, or take any other action relative to same.
- ART. 36. To see what action the Town will take in regard to installing electric lights on Brown Street, and make appropriation for same.

- ART. 37. To see what action the Town will take in regard to installing electric lights on South Street, from Sutherland's Corner, and make appropriation for same.
- ART. 38. To see if the Town will vote to place electric lights on Whipple Street from present terminal to residence of Mr. Durrill, and make appropriation for same.
- ART. 39. To see if the Town will vote to print new valuation books, or take any other action relative to same.
- ART. 40. To see if the Town will vote to purchase lifesaving apparatus to be placed at Round Pond, and make an appropriation for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 41. To see if the Town will provide proper sidewalks radiating on all streets from Tewksbury Center Post Office for a distance of one mile, and make appropriation for the building of such sidewalks, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 42. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for cutting brush on highways in Town and make appropriation for same.
- ART. 43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee to report at the next annual meeting on whether the Town should establish a town forest.
- ART. 44. To see if the Town will vote to change the day of the annual Town meeting from the first Monday in February to the first Saturday in February, or take any other action.
- ART. 45. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred and sixty dollars to reimburse abutters for money paid for electric lighting service on Pleasant Street from Main Street

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1923

The improvements and repairs which have been made during the past year to the school houses are as follows:

The Foster School has been painted and a new electric pump installed. Considerable difficulty has been experienced by the old one and the cost of repairing it and relining the tank would cost about the same as the new pump which can be operated at a less expense and remedy the trouble.

The West School has been very unsanitary every year in the spring and fall on account of surface water collecting in the basement, and it has been very hard for the janitor to maintain a fire. A drain has been put in and we hope it will take care of the trouble. The committee wish to thank Mr. Castor for allowing us to drain it on the adjoining land at no expense to the Town.

The committee wish to report that each year a greater number of students are availing themselves of the opportunity of a High School education. This year our enrollment is even greater than before. The census in the Grammar and Primary Schools is steadily on the increase and we earnestly hope that a new school be granted us so that the children may be adequately and safely housed. Our present accommodations are cramped and most unsatisfactory.

We are trying to keep with us the teachers who have proven themselves capable by paying them a salary, sufficiently attractive so that our neighboring small towns will not draw them from us.

The committee are very grateful to Mr. Randall for his untiring efforts toward making our schools a success. We also wish to thank the building committee which has met with us on several occasions and tried to solve the present "new school" situation with us.

We ask your co-operation by frequent visitation to our schools, all of which extend a most heartily welcome to you.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Lowell, Mass., Jan. 9, 1924.

To the School Committee of the Town of Tewksbury,

Mrs. Hanson and Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my eleventh annual report which is the thirtythird in the series of Superintendent's Reports. Your schools have done very satisfactory work this year considering the inconvenient and unsatisfactory condition at the Foster School.

Supervisors and Teachers. There has been no change in supervisors during the past year, and only four in case of teachers. Mrs. Bertha McElroy, who taught the seventh grade at the Foster, closed her work in June in order, as she expressed it, "Not to take the place of an unmarried teacher." Mrs. McElroy is a capable teacher and very ready to serve as a substitute for a term or a year as needed, in fact she has taught in grade six during the fall term while Miss Westgate was on leave of absence. Miss Mabel McKay and Miss Alice Bedell, first-year teachers, completed their term of service in June. Miss Lillian Allard, teacher at the North of several years experience left our employ to teach in Lowell.

Miss Cecelia Hodgkins, a teacher of broad training and successful experience was secured to take charge of grade seven, and also to do departmental work with Miss Howard. Miss Ruth Piper, with several years of successful experience, has been placed in charge of grade four, and Miss Marguerite Tellier who has taught successfully elsewhere in grade two was engaged for the same position in the Spaulding School. Principal Weed of the Normal School selected Miss Anna Mulligan, with one year's experience, to succeed Miss Allard. All of these new teachers are beginning their work in town in a satisfactory manner.

Salaries. The Law of Supply and Demand has an influence in securing teachers as well as in business. In order to attract and keep successful teachers it is necessary to pay what may be termed the "market price." For example, the salary of a principal of a six or eight room building is established almost as definitely as though listed in a daily paper. No schools can succeed where the teachers must for any reason change often. I am glad to report that Tewksbury has taken steps to secure and retain, when mutually satisfactory, good teachers. The salary of \$1800.00 which you pay your principal is exactly the amount which should command the services of a successful and experienced teacher. For the vacancy in grade seven this last summer you fixed the salary at \$1500.00, which is good for a teacher in the upper grades without the responsibility of principal-ship. You are aware, I am sure, that school custom and the above

mentioned "Law of Supply and Demand" have apparently decreed that teachers of seventh and eighth grades, that is, Junior High, can command slightly more salary than teachers of grades one to six, that is, elementary grades. For the grade teacher who is not a principal your maximum is \$1250.00. You have this fall passed a vote which I believe will have a beneficial influence on the teaching force of your schools. The substance of this vote is to set a new maximum which will depend solely on the teachers ambition and studiousness; that is, any teacher who has reached the maximum salary and who successfully has taken a course of advanced or professional study during the past year may receive \$50,00 additional to her salary. until with perseverance she establishes for herself a new maximum of \$1400.00. I believe this to be a very progressive step and of sound pedagogy; for while I am a firm believer in the words of Mary Lyon, "Never teach the immortal mind for money. If money making is your object, be milliners or dressmakers, but teaching is a sacred not a mercenary employment," yet I am confident that best work can be done only by happy, contented, and progressive teachers.

Junior High. It would be too ambitious to say that we have actually established a Junior High School, but certain changes have been made which look toward a regular Junior School when the new building is ready for it. First, a distinction has been made in the rank to be obtained by those who are preparing to enter high school, a rank of 80 being necessary to obtain a certificate. Secondly-Departmental teaching is being done in grade seven and eight, Miss Howard taking those subjects for which she is best fitted and Miss Hodgkins those for which she has a special aptitude, in fact the latter teacher was engaged with this departmental work in mind. division of subjects will enable the teacher to do better work as she will have her favorite studies; it will also make high school work and methods a little less strange to the pupil. Third, beginning at the present time two courses are being offered in Arithmetic and two in English in grade eight, one fitting for high school, the other with a business trend adapted to those pupils who will go to vocational, school, or will leave school at the completion of the year.

These changes will perhaps lead with gradual growth to a recognized Junior High School.

Foster School. It is generally known that the Foster School is inadequate for the needs of our schools. This building was constructed for a four room building, having two grades in a room. While this plan could be carried out the building did very well, although the upkeep has always been too great due to the large amount of unused space. Since the number of pupils became too great to place two grades in one room the building has but poorly supplied the needs of the Center. Several attempts have been made to supply accom-

modations, one by fitting the old library as a primary school, the Spaulding. Another attempt to solve the difficulty was to add to the small "committee" room what would make a fair sized class room; this was done with satisfaction for a short time, but when it became necessary to equip this room with desks it proved altogether too small to seat a grade there and use it as an ordinary school room. The last attempt was to put a partition in the assembly hall on the third floor, and use the room thus formed as a school room. This room is large enough, but the ventilation and lighting is very poor. For the last two years, therefore, two grades have been placed in rooms which I am sure that any state officer would promptly condemn. Any citizen who visits the school will find conditions precisely as I have described above.

What, then, may be suggested as a permanent remedy? One is to build two full size school rooms onto the Foster building. This could be done at a small cost, and with the Spaulding School would meet the needs of the Town for several years. I do not advocate this, I simply call your attention to the fact that this is a possible solution.

The other plan is to build an entirely new, modern, thoroughly equipped, brick structure, which would match architecturally the public building already in town, and which would not alone solve all school problems for a generation to come and make possible the plans of improvement already mentioned under heading Junior High, but would become an ornament to your town that every citizen could well admire.

A site for such a building has already been tentatively selected by your committee which would make the new school a part of the civic group already begun.

Barge Routes. It seemed wise to the committee to lengthen the school day, closing the afternoon session at three-thirty, a generally accepted time for graded schools. This change of time made the pupils who live at the North and in the West sections of the town, and who must go to the "Square" and transfer, very late in reaching home.

Mr. Louis Cote has been secured to transport all these pupils to the Foster School. The cost of this transportation does not exceed the cost of the same pupils by trolley.

Physical Education. Since my last report a law making physical education compulsory has gone into effect. In Tewksbury the teachers allow fifteen minutes per day for this work. When the weather permits classes are taken out of doors for drills and marching exercises, ending with one or two vigorous games in which all participate. In the winter the exercises are necessarily confined to the school rooms, and consist of calisthenics and more limited games. Some

teachers have these exercises adapted to music and are accompanied on the victrola.

All of this work is carried out according to outlines prepared by the State Board of Education. The more recent graduates from the Normal School are especially prepared for teaching this subject.

Health. Closely allied with physical education is the health of the pupil. I take this opportunity of saying that I approve of the work which the School Nurse is doing in Tewksbury, and commend to you her report which follows:

In accordance with statute law the retarded children have been thoroughly examined by a physician in the employ of the State and recommendations made for the physical and mental care of those children who were found to need especial treatment.

No-School Signal. The No-School Signal is now given at 7.45 o'clock by the whistle at the State Institution. This signal will be given only when very stormy or when the travelling is very bad. It is unfortunate that signal has to be given so early, as it often happens that the storm is over by nine o'clock, or on the other hand, nine o'clock shows a severe storm which was not anticipated at the time of giving the signal.

I wish the schools to be in session every day that is suitable for the children to get to the buildings, on the other hand, I do not wish the pupils to attend when the bad weather would be a menace to their health. Attempts to guess right on weather probabilities is trying to the nerves of the Superintendent and the patience of the parent.

**Club Work.** The following is quoted from a report of Mr. Robert Trask, Director:

"Two splendid Junior Leaders have been developed in this town during the year club work has been carried on; Velma Trull in North Tewksbury and Marion Foster in Tewksbury Centre. These girls, through their own personality have gathered together clubs in canning and home ceonomics and have done very effective work. Both of these girls were awarded a two-day trip to the Massachusetts Agricultural College.

The leadership of Miss Hersey in the North Tekwsbury School has been exceedingly valuable and the co-operation of the principal and school nurse in the Centre have made it possible to establish a very successful lunch box club in that community.

The garden and corn clubs being so scattered no regular meetings could be held, but every member was visited four or five times during the year."

Parent-Teachers. Since my last report a Parent-Teachers Association has been organized, and is being carried on successfully. This is very pleasing to me as I believe in the closest union possible between the home and the school.

Educational Day. In accordance with state wide plans our schools observed Educational Day. Parents and friends were especially invited to the various rooms to listen to the ordinary school work and to specially prepared programs. Rev. George F. Sturtevant of this town gave an interesting and inspirational address to several classes at the Foster School on the value in life of an education.

Penmanship. With a view to stimulating interest in penmanship several contests are now going on among the various schools of the district, which of course applies to Tewksbury. These contests are in the nature of an athletic rivalry which shall continue throughout the winter and be judged by papers submitted by each pupil about May 1. For illustration, the eighth grade of the Foster School has issued a challenge to all other seventh and eighth grades in the district to a contest in penmanship. This challenge was signed by a pupil of the grade for her classmates; it has been read to the various grades and promptly accepted by all schools except one. Another contest will be between all fifth and sixth grades, while there will be a third issued by Miss Piper's school to all third and fourth grades.

It is expected that great interest, and consequently improvement in writing, will result.

Manual Training. The work in manual training continues under the charge of Mr. George Robeson along the same lines as previously mentioned. The room in the basement is totally inadequate for this work. It is not good economy to hire expensive teachers and then be unable to place them where they can work to advantage.

The new building will remedy this defect.

Graduation. On Tuesday evening, 1923, a pleasing program composed mainly of scenes from "The Man Without a Country" was presented in the auditorium of the Town Hall. After this program, Mr. Hector Jackson, Chairman of the School Board, presented diplomas to the following named pupils:

Of these twenty-eight graduates twenty-one entered high school; three entered vocational school; three remained at home, and one is working.

Conclusion. One year ago I suffered a severe illness. I wish to take this opportunity of expressing my heart felt appreciation of the kindly sympathy which was shown me at that time. I think that no one ever received more considerate treatment from School Boards, teachers, and pupils than did I.

In conclusion I wish to call to your attention the report and tables which follow this report and form a part of it. And again I wish to express my thanks for the loyal co-operation of supervisors and teachers, and the cordial support of the School Committee.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

January 12, 1924.

To the Superintendent and School Board of Tewksbury,

As School Nurse I submit the following report:

I began my duties as School Nurse, Sept. 1922. All the pupils in the schools were weighed, measured and examined for pediculosis four times during the school year. The underweight and defective children were examined at more frequent intervals. This year (beginning Sept., 23) all pupils were weighed, measured and examined for pediculosis, skin diseases, uncleanliness, etc., every two months and weight cards sent home with the report cards.

In June a Clinic for underweight children was held in the Town Hall. Fifty-five children, accompanied by their parents, were examined by expert physicians sent to us by the State. The parents and children were also instructed and advised by a nutrition worker. Twelve children were recommended for X-Ray; these pictures have been taken but the findings have not been sent to me. This delay is very unfortunate but is doubtless due to the fact that large numbers of children have been examined through the State.

This fall I have paid especial attention to defective teeth and have obtained many corrections. Fully 75 per cent. of the pupils need the immediate attention of a dentist.

Eighteen children have been vaccinated in school.

The schools have been remarkably free from contagious diseases. January 1 to December 31, 1923:

#### REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent and School Committee of Tewksbury:

The many educational possibilities of music have caused President Eliot to say that music properly taught, is one of the most valuable things presented in the schools. It has also caused Payson Smith to say that if rating the studies in their importance he would put English first and music second. I believe music is one of the best mediums we have to make children think, act and do for themselves.

Some of the elements of education are concentration, observation, independence of thought and action, quick thinking, reasoning and co-operation.

Do these elements enter music? Try to read a piece of music at sight, you will find you need the utmost concentration. You must observe the various elements of time and tune that enter into the right rendition of the musical problem, the number of sharps and flats in the signature, the position of the key note and the time and tune signature. There are a few things a child must be taught to observe.

What about quick thinking? In arithmetic or other subjects the child is not lost who hesitates, but in music "He who hesitates is lost," for time and tune wait for no man. It must be on time or else it is wrong.

Independence of thought and action enters the subject through singing. It needs the utmost freedom of thought and action, as well as concentration. Twopart singing is started in the fourth grade. In the sixth grade three part music is introduced.

Co-operation is taught throughout the grades, but is brought into prominence in the upper grades, by the pupils learning to co-operate and sing together by watching and following the lead of the director. A feature in our work which I believe interests the pupils and brings all these elements into play to a certain extent is the concert arranged by class. This is the result of our daily study in singing and appreciation. We study a song, interpret it, then classify it. Just about this time of year we have a varied enough repertoire to arrange a fifteen minute concert. We talk about what is necessary to make a program interesting, then the class does all the work. The fifth and sixth grades are doing this now and I am sure if you visit some of these classes you can easily see all the above elements worked out, plus the social and cultural training, which I consider valuable to every pupil. This is all made possible through the sincere co-operation I receive from the teachers.

# REPORT OF DEMONSTRATION WORK IN AGRICULTURE AND HOME ECONOMICS

Carried on by Middlesex County Extension Service in the Town of Tewksbury, during the year ending December 31, 1923

An appropriation of \$150 was made at the annual meeting for demonstration work, under the direction of Middlesex County Bureau of Agriculture and Home Economics, now known as the Extension Service. Following is a report of the work done by this organization in Tewksbury:

Agents of the Extension Service made twenty-four farm and home visits during the year.

An Extension School was carried on for the benefit of farmers and their families, but due to severe weather the attendance was rather poor. A seed improvement demonstration was conducted, also a poultry account project which brought out the value of efficient management in getting egg production.

Five educational moving pictures were given with a total audience of 1045.

In the boys and girls department there was an enrollment of 39 divided as follows: garden 6, canning 13, home economics 20. Marion Foster and Velma Trull were awarded the two-day trip to the Massachusetts Agricultural College for the excellent results they obtained in club work.

These young people were a part of the great County Achievement Organization, containing nearly 3,000 boys and girls, who produced during the year 1923, \$129,000 worth of products. All of these were under the leadership of Agents of the County Extension Service and two hundred volunteer local leaders.

The Trustees of the Public Library submit the following report for the year ending December 31, 1924:

Details of expenditures in and for the Public Library will be found in the Auditor's report.

A statement in regard to the condition of the Library, the number of books in use and in storage, also the circulation of books during the year, will be found in the report of the Librarian.

Monthly meetings have been held by the board except in the months of July and August.

During the year 445 new books have been added, of which number 143 were children's books. When expedient these books have been censored by members of the board as in other recent years, before being placed upon the shelves.

By vote of the trustees, lists of new acquisitions have been issued for the convenience of users of the Library, and the expenditure would seem to be well worth while.

We would once more call attention to the fact that the number of books and the readers thereof is constantly growing larger, while the room for their accommodation is inadequate and as constantly growing more so.

We request the Town to grant for Public Library use an appropriation of \$750.00 and the money received from dog taxes.

# WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Middlesex ss.

To either of the Constables of the Town of Tewksbury in said County:

# Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Tewksbury, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to meet and assemble at Town Hall in said Tewskbury, on Saturday the 7th day of February, 1925 at nine o'clock A. M., to act on the following articles:

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose all necessary Town officers, to choose by ballot a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of the Poor, three members of the Board of Health, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, a Tree Warden and Constables, (Three) all to serve one year: one Highway Commissioner to serve three years; one School Committee to serve three years; one Trustee of the Public Library to serve one year, two Trustees of the Public Library to serve three years; one Park Commissioner to serve two years, one Park Commissioner to serve three years; one Assessor to serve three years. The polls for the election of Town Officers to be opened at nine o'clock A. M., and close at four o'clock P. M., and to vote on the following question: "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of certain non-intoxicating beverages in this Town?" Yes: No.

- ART. 3. To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.
- ART. 4. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise by taxation to defray necessary expenses for the current year, and make appropriations for the same.
- ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote the money arising from licensing dogs, for the ensuing year, to aid in support of the Public Library.
- ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year.

The vote to be as follows:

Voted:—That the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1925, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and debt or debts incurred under this vote to be paid from the revenue of said financial year.

- ART. 7. To see what compensation the Town will vote for the collection of taxes, and at what rate and from what date interest shall be charged on taxes of 1925 unpaid after November 1, 1925, or to take any other action relative thereto.
- ART 8. To see if the Town will vote to borrow, if necessary a sum not exceeding one twenty-fifth of one percent, of the current year's valuation, such sum of money to be used in the suppression of the Gipsy and Brown Tail Moths, and not to be expended before December 1st next, and to be raised in the tax levy of the year 1926.

- ART. 9 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for the proper observance of Memorial Day, and appoint a committee to expend the money. Said committee to be taken from members of the G. A. R., Spanish War Veterans, and American Legion, and Sons of Veterans.
- ART. 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to institute suits on behalf of the Town or defend any suits that are, or may be brought against the Town.
- ART 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 or some other amount, and elect a director for demonstration work in agriculture and home economics, the money to be expended by, and the director to serve in co-operation with the County Trustees for Aid to Agriculture of Middlesex County Bureau of Agriculture and Home Economics, under the provisions of Chapter 273, General Acts of 1918; it being understood that \$50.00 of this amount shall be used to provide local paid supervision of boys' and girls' club work.
- ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to repair and maintain the sidewalks radiating on all Streets from Town Hall for a distance of one mile, and make appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 13. To see what action the Town will take in regard to installing electric lights from the present terminal on Whittemore Street to East Street, on East Street to Carter Street, to the residence of George E. Gray and make an appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 14. To see what action the Town will take in regard to installing electric lights on Shawsheen Street from Main Street to the Billerica line, make appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.

- ART. 15. To see what action the Town will take in regard to installing electric lights from the present terminal on Chandler Street to Livingston Street, on Livingston Street to the residence of Henry Scarlet make appropriation for same or take any action relative thereto.
- ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to install six electric lights on Marshall Street, make an appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 17. To see if the Town will vote to install Electric lights on Maple Street, from the present terminal, to the residence of H. B. Treadwell, make an appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 18. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights on Whipple Road from the end of Pleasant Street to the present terminal near the residence of Austin French and make an appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 19. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights on Whipple Road corner of Pleasant Street to Chapman Road, on Chapman Road to the residence of Axel Anderson and make an appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights on East Street from Carter Street to the Andover line and make an appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 21. To see what action the Town will take in regard to installing electric lights on Brown Street and make appropriation for same, or take any other action relative thereto.

- ART. 22. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights on South St. from Salem Road to the residence of P. J. O'Neil or install lights on any other portion of said street, and make appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 23. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights on Foster Street, Shawsheen River Park and make appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3500.00 to complete the additions and alterations to the Foster School, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 to furnish electric light fixtures for the Foster School, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 for drilling a new well or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2431.00 for a steam heating plant to be installed in the Shawsheen School or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 28. To see if the Town will vote to macadam North Street from East Street to Almont Station and make appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500.00 for cinders to be used on the following roads, Fiske, Trull Road, upper end of River Road to Fiske Street and from Kelley's Crossing on East Street to the Andover line or take any other action relative thereto.

- ART. 30. To see if the Town will vote to widen Andover Street from the end of the car line to the residence of Mr. Hilton and make an appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 31. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$500.00 to build Town Hall Avenue and act thereon.
  - ART. 32. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate to obtain the establishment of the boundary line between town hall lot and land of Mr. Alexander and the easements of the town in land of Mr. Alexander, and to erect suitable markers.
- ART. 33. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to fill up the saucers on the sidewalks and repair the same where needed with cinders or gravel or take any action. Work to be done under the supervision of the road commissioners.
- ART. 34. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the money \$1186.62 returned to the Town under Acts of 1924 Chapter 480 to provide suitable quarters for the American Legion Post as a memorial to the Veterans of the Town or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 35. To see what sum the Town will appropriate for cutting brush along the highways, and to see if the Town will designate the highways where the money shall be expended.
- ART. 36. To see if the Town will vote to print new valuation books of real estate and personal property and make an appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 37. To see if the Town fill vote to appropriate the sum of \$1800. to purchase a new Reo Chassis for the Fire Department and to mount the present apparatus on same, or take any other action relative thereto.

- ART. 38. To see if the Town will vote to make the salary of the Road Commissioners \$100.00 each per year.
- ART. 39. To see if the Town will vote to change the name of the "Almont" railroad station to "Tewksbury" and instruct the selectmen to confer with the officials of the B. & M. R. R. relative thereto.
- ART 40. To see if the Town will vote to accept Foster Street, Shawsheen River Park.
- ART. 41. To see if the Town will vote to accept Bay State Road from Lake Street to Water Street.
- ART. 42. To see if the Town will vote to accept School Street.
- ART. 43. To see if the Town will vote to accept Forest Avenue from Lowell Street to Felker Avenue.
- ART. 44. To see if the Town will vote to accept Veranda Avenue.
- ART. 45. To see if the Town will vote to accept Section 6, Chapter 40, of the General Laws, to establish a RESERVE FUND, from which, by vote of the Board of Selectmen, a small sum may be transferred to another account to meet an emergency, in case there is no money left under the regular appropriation; and make appropriation for same.
- ART. 46. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5000.00 for oil or other binder, or take any other action relative thereto.



### REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1924

In all our schools the usual necessary small repairs have been made for the upkeep of our buildings. Very little has been required at the North and West Schools.

A new electric motor has been installed at the Spaulding School to take the place of the gas engine for pumping water. This engine caused us a lot of trouble and was a bill of expense to the town.

At the Shawsheen School the heating plant has been giving a great deal of trouble. In fact for some few years past it has been the same, but this winter it has been more difficult to make it reach a temperature sufficient for any comfort in the school rooms. Not only have the teachers and children been obliged to sit in cold rooms, often times wearing their coats but have had to endure the physical discomfort of smoke which at times fills the building. Your committee are asking you for sufficient funds to install a new heating plant

The new addition to the Foster School is progressing most satisfactorily the report of which has been adequately given by your Building Committee. It is expected to be completed in March and an invitation is extended to every citizen in the town to inspect it and see for themselves the splendid improvements which will be a benefit

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Lowell, Mass., Jan. 9, 1925.

To the School Committee of the Town of Tewksbury,

Mrs. Larrabee and Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my twelfth annual report which is the thirtyfourth in the series of Superintendents' Reports. You have an excellent corp of teachers and the year has been very satisfactory in school affairs.

Supervisors and Teachers. I am pleased to report so few changes this year. Miss Cecelia Hodgkins from the Foster and Miss Louise Fay from the West resigned to teach elsewhere. Mrs. McElroy, serving as a substitute completed her work with us last June. Miss Marian Adams, a teacher of successful experience, has been engaged for Grade 7, and Miss Marion Piper, one year's experience, for Grade 4, at the Foster School, and Mrs. Sarah Loupret, a recent graduate of Lowell Normal School has been appointed at the West School. Each of the teachers has begun the year's work very satisfactorily.

Foster. The chief item of interest this year is the addition to the Foster School. Due to unavoidable delays the Building Committee was unable to start the work till the last of August, hence the schools in this building are somewhat handicapped this term by having the work on the addition going on while the schools are in progress. Miss Dickinson with Grade 3 occupies a room at the town hall, while Grades four and five are seated in one room, using the hall for a recitation room. This arrangement is only for an emergency of course, and seemed the only way to keep all grades on full time.

In spite of much noise and confusion both teachers and builders are doing their best to be considerate to the other, and all are looking forward to the completion of the building. In my opinion the new part and the renovated old part will make as convenient, usable, and sanitary building as though entirely new, and at a 50% saving.

It would seem to be wise to place the first and second grades, now in a separate building as an overflow school, again in the Foster Euilding, and I so recommend.

Special work at the Foster has been injured or entirely eliminated. Sewing and Manual Training have been conducted with difficulty, while lunch serving has been entirely given up. At the completion of the building all of these activities will be resumed.

Health. Milk serving at recess or at noon has been started in all the schools this past term, see the report of the School Nurse for details. While there has been insufficient time to note results, yet

it is expected that such benefits will be visible among Tewksbury pupils as has been observed among pupils of other towns where milk has been served for several years. Much of the credit of instigating this forward step is due to Mrs. Larrabee of the Committee,

Barges. As there were no eighth grade pupils from the North this year it was not necessary to continue the barge route from Trull road this year.

Owing to the necessity of pupils from the West district going into Lowell and transferring, thus making them very late home, a new barge route has been established from the West. The cost of this barge varies but little from the cost of transporting by trolley; the permanence of the route will doubtless depend upon the satisfaction of the patrons.

District. Again it has seemed best to the State Board of Education to make a change in the District and Tyngsboro has been removed and joined to the Pepperell Union, thus leaving Dracut and Tewksbury to constitute the Union.

Dracut now pays 65% and receives 65% of time, and Tewksbury the remaining 35%. These two towns have been together for thirty-four years. It would seem that they might remain together to their mutual advantage for many years. This division also applies to the supervisors.

Penmanship. During the most of last year a contest was going on in the fifth and sixth grades, and the seventh and eighth, grades of the District (Tyngsboro was then a member) in penmanship. The award to be made by Mr. W. E. Riley of Lowell Normal School, and the reward to be the right to be considered champions of the District. The results were checked up in May and the decision for the upper Grades went to the Eighth Grade of the Foster School. Mr. Riley expressed great pleasure at the work of this room. The award in the intermediate grades went to Grade 6 of Parker Avenue School, Dracut.

I believe and Mr. Riley concurred that this contest was a great incentive in penmanship. Something similiar will be done this year.

Banking. School banking which was discontinued during the war was resumed last October under the management of the Mechanics Savings Bank of Lowell.

The response has been most gratifying. There has been deposited between Oct. 14 and Jan. 9 by the pupils of Tewksbury \$595.67. During this time there have been opened at the bank 174 real bank accounts.

The law obliges us to teach thrift in the public schools, I believe that the best way to do this is to teach the children to save.

Graduation. On Tuesday evening, June 24, 1924 were held the annual graduation exercises of the Foster School. After an especially

pleasing program Mr. Hector Jackson, Chairman of the School Board, presented diplomas to the following pupils.

Of these thirty graduates, 17 entered High school, 6 vocational school, 1 returned to Foster, and 6 are at home.

Last year's Freshman class at the Lowell High School made an exceptionally fine record. It is to be hoped that the graduates named above, the Freshmen of this year, will equal or surpass the record of their predecessors.

High School. ### REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent and School Board of Tewksbury:

It is with pleasure I present my annual report to you. This year as in the past, I have worked with the aim of creating a love for music, both vocal and instrumental, and the desire to perform as well as appreciate; to give to the pupils a greater understanding of and sympathy for the culture of other nations, and to give them a greater appreciation of the part their own country has played and is to play in the cultural development of the race and to spur them on to do their part toward the contribution of the future.

You would see that some of our pupils of the past, are doing their part if you should visit the High School, musical department. The District is well represented and can well be proud of the pupils.

The other day a young man stepped up to me, handed me a card, and on it was the name of an orchestra, with the name of the young man, as director and violinist. He said, "Miss Gregory I find it an enjoyable way of spending my spare time and I earn a little pin money". He gave the credit to the school for interesting and encouraging him instrumental as well as vocal music. Here is one proof that our efforts are not in vain, that the desire is created and that some at least have learned to love and do; and make themselves useful factors, gaining happiness and contributing to the happiness of others.

During the Christmas season our orchestras, principally Violins, piano, drums, sometimes a cornet or mandolin appears, accompanied the choruses in the carol singing. At this time and about two or three times a year besides, we have assemblies; sing patriotic and folk songs, then each grade entertains the other grades with one or more songs.

Just at present the sixth grades of the District are competing for a banner. Last term three of the sixth grades of the District competed, and the Tewksbury sixth grade won.

National Music Week was observed in all the schools by special musical programs.

Of course the regular work in music, such as the necessary theory, reading, interpretation, and appreciation is faithfully done, and that makes the assemblies and concerts possible.

The production of good tone is another phase of our work which requires and receives considerable attention. The aim is to produce a light head tone, and to have as near as possible, perfect pronunciation, pure articulation, and clear enunciation. To accomplish this, besides the regular class drill, the children who cannot match

tones have special help from the teacher, and I have a short period with these pupils, (above the second grade), to match tones, then phrases, later singing the regular classroom songs. In the lower grades this work is part of the regular work and as a rule most of pupils are cured in these grades. This is very interesting work, one cannot appreciate it unless they watch the development. I would be pleased to have visitors to these classes.

I wish to thank our Superintendent, Mr. Randall, the School Board, Teachers and Parents, for their hearty co-operation. It has made my work a pleasure and helped to realize some of the ambitions I have for the pupils.

### REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF DRAWING

Mr. Charles L. Randall, Superintendent of Schools, Tewksbury, Mass. Dear Sir:

I take great pleasure in presenting to you, my third annual report of the work in drawing in the Tewksbury schools.

A prominent educator lists drawing first among those subjects which develop the creative imagination, calling it, "An admirable training for both eye and hand". Classes in design give a child's imagination freedom to expand, while in the lower grades keen observation, accuracy and neatness are emphasized.

My work has been divided into several different types, depending largely upon the ability of the classes. The lower grades study color, measuring, free-cutting, simple constructive work, weaving, object drawing, nature work and posters; while the upper grades are taught combinations, values and harmony of colors, nature, printing, designing, ellipses and perspective. Special holiday problems are always used. At Christmas the different classes made blotters, calendars, boxes and waste-paper baskets, for gifts.

I once more take this opportunity to thank the superintendent for his valuable advice, and the teachers for the co-operation and interest which they have shown in my work.

### REPORT OF SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

January 1, 1925.

To the School Committee of the Town of Tewksbury:

The past year has shown very pleasing results in the health of our school children. The establishing of a daily milk supply of excellent quality, for the children, has been of great help in the under weight cases and is the best balanced food that the children can have with their lunches. The Foster School has had the particular advantage of this innovation, but with the co-operation of the parents in other sections, we hope to get the "Daily bottle of milk" idea established in the other schools.

The water supply in the Foster School has been condemned as to its quality, the chlorides being far in excess of a passable standard. There is only one remedy, a new well driven down below a contamination point, close to one hundred feet. The drainage system from a school of this size, and the character of the soil into which it drains makes for an almost impossible safe supply until you have gone below the second or third strata. This should be cared for at once before the addition is finished.

In the other schools the water supply seems adequate and of good quality. The past fall has seen quite an epidemic of measles in the South district, interfering to quite an extent with attendance and progress. This could have been limited greatly had the parents notified the school nurse or the Board of Health, as the law requires, so that the first cases could have been properly cared for.

Our care taker in each of our schools is very satisfactory and the general sanitary conditions are excellent.

### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

January 7, 1925.

To the Superintendent and School Board of Tewksbury:

As School Nurse I submit the following report January 1, to December 31st.

I have made two hundred and sixty-one visits to the schools. Every child in school has been weighed and measured every two months and a record sent home with their report card. If one's child is ten per cent or more underweight or does not show a steady and continuous growth parents should consult their family physician. When the children are weighed and measured they are inspected for cleanliness, skin eruptions, pediculosis, etc. Defective children are examined more frequently.

I have made one hundred and thirty home visits and parents have been willing to co-operate with me in correcting defects in their children. I have taken one hundred and nine children to Dental clinics. All the children in school need the periodic inspection of their teeth by a competent Dentist. I have taken nine children to the hospital for the removal of tonsils and adenoids.

Thirty-two children were successfully vaccinated in school this Fall. I have done forty-five simple dressings in school.

In September sixty-five children were found to be ten per cent and more underweight. Milk is provided, in half pint bottles, for all children who want it at the Foster, Spaulding, North and West schools. We have not been able to find any one to supply milk for the children at the Shawsheen school. All the underweight children (except a very few who dislike milk) are taking milk and are gaining in weight.

Last May I attended the New England Health Institute in Boston and from what I learned there I am sure our children (as a whole) are in better condition than the average and we have fewer cases of contagious disease.

One girl in last year's graduating class made a coat for herself and several made serge dresses

The girls in the lower grade made holders, aprons, handkerchiefs, dish towels and underclothes. Several made blouses for themselves.

I wish to take this opportunity for expressing my sincere appreciation of the hearty co-operation of the Superintendent and Teachers.

### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE

The School Building Committee which was authorized to make changes and additions to the Foster School Building at the Special Town Meeting, August 4th, 1924, has held twenty-five meetings since that date, besides numerous inspections at the Foster School.

At our first meeting, J. Williams Beal Sons of Boston were retained as architects, and bids for the general construction, and heating and plumbing were at once secured. The Committee realized they were at a disadvantage in being obliged to start this work so late in the Summer, but no other course was open and no time wasted.

On the general construction, seven bids were received with a difference of nearly \$13,000 between the highest and lowest. Your Committee accepted the lowest bid at once. This party, however, at the last moment withdrew and stated he could not proceed with the work for the sum he had named.

Your Committee, therefore, rejected all bids and called for a second lot. This time six bids were received on general construction and the lowest bidder had increased his first bid by \$3600. All the rest were considerably more. The Committee rejected all bids for a second time.

After consideration by the architect and the committee, it was deemed advisable to enter into a contract for the general construction with Mr. H. A. Page to do that work under the supervision of the architect, and a contract was made between the committee and Mr. Page, as it seemed reasonable to all that the work could be done at a figure much nearer the estimate that had been made. This course being decided upon, the bid of Farrell & Conaton of Lowell was accepted for the heating and plumbing, so as to get the most important part provided for at the outset, and interfere with school conditions as little as possible.

Mr. Page started work on September 18th, and the construction has gone forward rapidly, and with satisfaction to the architects who have at various times expressed their satisfaction with the progress of the work done. Your Committee feels that Mr. Page has rendered the town a great service. Perhaps this will be better realized when it is pointed out that the highest bid on the general construction alone was equal to the sum of all the monies appropriated by the Town at the Committee's disposal.

It may be interesting to know that while the amount appropriated by the Town for this work was \$37,000, the lowest available bids for the work complete totalled \$37,967.66, while the highest was \$52,335.

The second time bids were called for, the lowest totalled \$41,737. 66, while the highest was \$51,135. With a difference of nearly \$5,000 in excess of the Town's appropriation for this work the Committee felt justified in taking the course they have, and this has been carried on under Mr. Page's direction, at what we consider a minimum cost.

The work has had to be done, however, at considerable disadvantage in consequence of having the school in session a good part of the time. This has made it a very difficult matter, and caused much inconvenience to the teachers and scholars. However, we feel that the best has been done, under the conditions, that was possible.

Your Committee have considered it desirable to install electric lighting in the new part and to also have it carried throughout the old, as we believe it will make the remodeled building much more desirable at all times, for whatever needs may arise. This has already called for \$700.00 more than was considered in the figures reckoned on. There are other improvements which should be carried out under this Committee's supervision, including the fixtures for the electric lights and the finishing up of the foundation wall in the basement where two large rooms have been made usable for playroom and manual training. Whatever the amount may be which the Committee estimates in excess of your appropriations to build this building, we feel that the best kind of value has been received for the expenditure and that nothing short of a new building could have provided better accommodation for the Town than we shall have in this remodeled building.

A total of what has been accomplished is herewith submitted:

The work when completed will add four classrooms, capacity thirty-five to forty scholars each.

It does away with the old rickety iron fire escape, and provides a stairway fully enclosed, running from top to bottom at the rear.

It provides extensions of hallways on all floors to this stairway. It provides complete renovating, heating, and ventilating system, including one new boiler and larger flue.

It provides entirely new plumbing and increased facilities in the boys' and girls' toilets, as well as new drainage system, and septic tanks. There will also be one large playroom in the basement, and one manual training room, a coal bin of over 100 tons capacity, a store room and a boiler room with improved facilities.

All interior partitions and walls are made of white brick, which is very attractive and also makes the basement lighter and fireproof.

All floors are relaid with re-enforced cement, and all ceilings wire lathed and plastered. Adequate electric lighting is provided for the whole building. The whole interior is to be renovated, and the whole exterior painted. The building when completed will seat about 300 scholars.

Following is the Financial Statement up to and including Jan. 3rd.

Your Committee requests additional appropriations of \$3500.00 to complete the alterations at the Foster School, and under a separate article asks for \$700, to supply electric light fixtures.



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

Sir:

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the tax collectors of the town of Tewksbury for the period from April 16, 1923, the date of the previous audit, to August 10, 1925, and report thereon as follows:—

The accounts of M. G. Rogers for the Levies of 1916, 1917, 1918, and 1919 were examined, the abatements being checked with the assessors' records of abatements granted, the payments to the treasurer being checked to the treasurer's cash book, and the outstanding accounts being listed and reconciled.

There are a few small accounts outstanding on each of the levies from 1916 to 1919, and a determined effort should be made to collect these accounts, if collectible; if not collectible, they should be abated.

The accounts of H. J. Patten for the levies of 1920, 1921, and 1922 were examined and checked. The abatements were compared

with the assessors' record of abatements granted and the payments to the treasurer were checked to the treasurer's record of receipts.

These levies have all been closed, with the exception of \$7,317.00, the personal property tax of the Avery Chemical Company in 1920. In 1922 the town voted an appropriation of this amount to "relieve the treasury" for this loss. Some action, however, should be taken to clear the collector's books of this account.

The commitments to J. C. Marshall for the levies of 1923, 1924 and for the poll taxes of 1925 were examined and checked. The commitment books were footed and reconciled with the assessors' warrants, the abatements were checked to the assessors' record of abatements granted, the recorded payments to the treasurer were verified with the treasurer's books, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled. The outstanding accounts were further verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, and from the replies received, I am satisfied that the accounts as listed are correct.

Appended to this report are tables showing summaries of the tax accounts examined.

While engaged in making the audit, I received the hearty cooperation of the several town officials, and I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express my appreciation.

Some patching on our gravel roads has been done this year with fair results, would recommend more of this work if we had the proper equipment.

We have added to our department this year one new horse, two set of double harness, one new sidewalk plow and have had electric lights installed in the barn.

In this report we advise you of some needed repairs on your town barn which needs shingling and painting and sills should be repaired this coming year. We also have leased from the Mead-Morrison Manufacturing Company, East Boston, Massachusetts, for three months, one five ton Mead-Morrison "55" tractor and also one Walsh Special Snow Plow with Wings and Steel Mould Board to take care of our winter snow at \$500.00 per month.

We recommend for the coming year an appropriation of \$12,000.00.

The past year was ushered in by a threatened epidemic of diphtheria, but due to the hearty co-operation of the infected households. we were fortunate in localizing it, and stamping it out.

The latter part of the year has given us a real epidemic of a milder disease, that or measles, although not as serious and not re-

quiring the same care in its isolation, it has still been a source of increased expense to the board and inconvenience to our many homes.

This disease, is more contagious during the three days just before the eruption appears, than any time during its course contrary to our previous teachings. For this reason it is far more difficult to control it, but had a little greater care been exercised in the beginning, by notifying the health department, as the law requires, even though a physician is not in attendance, would probably have prevented a great majority of these cases.

I am going to call attention here to the fact that all of the diseases listed in the table, at the beginning of this report are reportable to this department, as soon as they are recognized as such. This report should come from the physician in attendance if one is employed and if not, it then becomes the legal duty of the head of that household to report the case.

Our local physician has shown us every courtesy in this respect, but about twenty other cases were not reported, and were only discovered through outside sources.

Under the law requiring the Board of Health, to be financially responsible for cases of tuberculosis, who are dependants, and not the charity department, we have at present two cases.

These patients have been and are now in state or county institutions, but claim a residence in our town. The expense to the town although divided with the state, is about one dollar a day per person. This makes it necessary for us to prepare for this item in our cominging year's budget.

#### REPORT OF MIDDLESEX COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE

An appropriation of \$150.00 was made at the annual meeting in support of the Middlesex County Extension Service in Agriculture and Home Economics. The following is a report of the work done by this organization in Tewksbury for the year 1925:

An Extension school was held for the purpose of discussing some of the local problems and making plans for the coming year's work. The agricultural work for the town centered around fruit and poultry. A poultry culling demonstration was given by Prof. Monahan of Amherst at the G. F. Garland and Son farm with an attendance of thirty-five poultrymen. A pruning meeting was held in the orchard of Howard Foster and 22 fruit men attended.

Mrs. Harry C. Dawson was appointed chairman of the Women's work, and in turn appointed, Mrs. George Bennett, North Tewksbury, Mrs. Melvin Rogers, West Tewksbury and Mrs. M. P. Mahoney at the Centre.

Thirty interested women carried on a series of meetings on subjects relating to clothing under the direction of the Home Demonstration Agents. Two similar groups carried on work in Food Selection and another group attended a series of millinery meetings.

Two canning demonstrations were given and attended by a large group of home makers.

Mrs. Clarence Foster and Mrs. Emma MacLaren have done excellent work in the 4-H club activities. 71 boys and girls were enrolled in clothing, lunch box, poultry, garden, canning and calf clubs. Accomplishments were shown at the spring achievement program and by exhibits at the Middlesex North Agricultural Society Fair. The two day Trip to the Massachusetts Agricultural college was awarded Helen Flint, Alice Crosby and Evelyn Fuller. Velma Trull was elected Secretary of the 4-H Alumni club of Middlesex County.

Motion pictures were shown eight times to a total audience of 2325.

A total of 23 farm visits have been made in the town and help was given on individual problems of various farmers. Many of the fruit growers in town profited by receiving the spray service postal cards which were sent out from time to time during the spray season. Judges were furnished for the Fair held by the Middlesex North Agricultural Society in North Tewksbury.

In addition, several county-wide meetings, such as the County Picnic at Concord, the Annual Extension Service meeting at Waltham, meetings for fruit growers and poultrymen have been held and attended by many Tewksbury people.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE

Since the special Town Meeting of August 4, 1924, and between the dates of August 6 and June 25, 1925, your Committee has held fortyone meetings while the work of alteration and construction on the Foster School was in progress.

Work was begun under the supervision of Mr. H. A. Page on Sept. 18, 1924, and this building was officially inspected and approved by the Building Committee and the Architect on May 23, 1925, approximately eight months later.

During this time school was maintained, it must be admitted under some difficulties, but your Committee had the fullest co-operation of the teachers, and the children passed through the period of transition very well without injuries or the slightest interference.

Today we submit it is difficult to tell from external appearances if this is not a new building, while on the inside several persons on the night of the public opening were heard to discuss the location of the line between the old and the new sections with considerable doubt.

The public was invited to inspect the building on the night of April 23, 1924, at which time all the rooms were electrically lighted and proved the value of the new lighting system, in spite of the fact that a small fuse covering the circuits in the principal's room blew out, causing temporary inconvenience. This defect was promptly remedied.

When the alteration plans were drawn up your Committee was very desirous of getting a new and effective heating outfit. The room space to be heated has been practically doubled. The old boiler was reported in fair condition after recent repairs, and lack of funds counseled keeping it intact and adding one new boiler to supplement it during extreme winter weather. A larger flue was erected to handle both boilers but the size of this flue was limited by the air shaft in which it was built. As a result the draft proved inadequate.

To remedy this your Committee had three alternatives—first, the building of another flue at an estimated cost of \$1000.00 for construction and breaking through to locate in another place—second, the installation of a fan or blower to boost the draft, the efficiency of which we could not be certain,—and lastly, the attachment of a special type of ventilation on the top of the flue. This last was adopted and an improved draft was the immediate result, so that all rooms can now

be satisfactorily heated during ordinary winter weather by the new boiler alone, while the old boiler can be used to add necessary pressure during most severe conditions.

In completing the work about the building, your Committee wished to do something to build up and improve the looks of the grounds. Much debris and rubbish was removed and a little grading done, but the chief improvement effected was the building of a crushed stone driveway which is a considerable improvement over the old cinder road and will give many years of service.

The Architect's account of the total cost of alterations and construction is \$35,806.57; exclusive of electrical fixtures and architects' fees. The lowest bid submitted to your Committee covering the same work amounted to \$41,737.66. Clearly the services of Mr. H. A. Page were of supreme value to the Committee and the Town,

His constructive ideas and honest criticism were exceptionally helpful in securing the best for the money expended. It is especially gratifying to the Committee that the building was completed during the active life of Mr. Spaulding and to his entire satisfaction. He would have preferred a new brick school house but joined most heartily with the majority of the Committee in deciding to remodel the old building.

In view of the fact that the work of this Committee is now completed it is their earnest desire to have this report accepted and the Committee discharged from further duties.

#### WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Middlesex ss.

To either of the Constables of the Town of Tewksbury in said County:

#### Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Tewksbury, qualified to vote in Town affairs, to meet and assemble at Town Hall in said Tewksbury, on Saturday the 6th day of February, 1926 at nine o'clock A. M., to act on the following articles:

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose all necessary Town officers, to choose by ballot a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, three Overseers of the Poor, three members of the Board of Health, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, a Tree Warden and Constables, (Three) all to serve one year: one Highway Commissioner to serve three years; one School Committee to serve three years; one Trustee of the Public Library to serve two years, two Trustees of the Public Library to serve three years; one Park Commissioner to serve three years; one Assessor to serve three years. The polls for the election of Town Officers to be opened at nine o'clock A. M., and close at four o'clock P. M.
- ART. 3. To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees and act thereon.

- ART. 4. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise by taxation to defray necessary expenses for the current year, and make appropriations for the same.
- ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote the money arising from licensing dogs, for the ensuing year, to aid in support of the Public Library.
- ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year.

The vote to be as follows:

Voted:—That the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1926, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and debt or debts incurred under this vote to be paid from the revenue of said financial year.

- ART. 7. To see what compensation the Town will vote for the collection of taxes, and at what rate and from what date interest shall be charged on taxes of 1926 unpaid after November 1, 1926 or to take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 8. To see if the Town will vote to borrow, if necessary a sum not exceeding one twenty-fifth of one percent, of the current year's valuation, such sum of money to be used in the suppression of the Gipsy and Brown Tail Moths, and not to be expended before December 1st next, and to be raised in the tax levy of the year 1927.

- ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for the proper observance of Memorial Day, and appoint a committee to expend the money. Said committee to be taken from members of the G. A. R., Spanish War Veterans, and American Legion, and Sons of Veterans.
- ART. 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to institute suits on behalf of the Town or defend any suits that are, or may be brought against the Town.
- ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00, or some other amount and elect a director; the money to be expended by and the director to serve in cooperation with the Middlesex County Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture in the work of the Middlesex County Extension Service, under the provisions of Sections 40 to 45, Chapter 128, General Laws of Massachusetts.
- ART. 12. To see if the Town will build and maintain a sidewalk on East St. beginning at the land of Mrs. Scott and ending with the land of Mr. Robinson, and appropriate sufficient money for this purpose or take any other action.
- ART. 13. To see what action the Town wil take in regard to placing a stone curbing for sidewalk from the corner of North and East St. to Postoffice, and make necessary appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$150 for three band concerts, one at the Centre, one at the North and one at South Tewksbury, during July and August, or take any other action relative thereto.

- ART. 15. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a Committee to act in conjunction with the School Committee to investigate the conditions at the North School and report at the next annual Town Meeting.
- ART. 16. To see what action the Town will take in regard to installing electric lights on Shawsheen Street from Main Street to the Billerica line, make appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 17. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights on Whipple Road from Pleasant Street to the residence of Mr. Mahoney, make an appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 18. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights from the present terminal at Baldwin's station on Livingston street to H. C. Scarlett's residence on Livingston street, make appropriation for same, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 19. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights on South St., from Salem Road to the residence of P. J. O'Neil or install lights on any other portion of said street, and make appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights on Maple Street, from the present terminal, to the residence of H. B. Treadwell, make an appropriation for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 21. To see if the Town will vote to extend electric lights on Whipple street, from the present terminal, near residence of Austin French, to the residence of Mr. Preston, and appropriate money for same or take any other action relative thereto.

- ART. 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$5000.00 to extend electric lights in Tewksbury, said sum to be spent under the direction of the Selectmen and Road Commissioners.
- ART. 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000.00 to purchase the five ton Mead-Morrison "55" tractor and Walsh Special Snow Plow or take any action relative thereto.
- ART. 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3000.00 for oil or other binder or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$2500.00 for cinders to be used in South Tewksbury, the streets are as follows: Lake Street, South Street, Brown Street and Shawsheen Street, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to macadamize North Street with the aid of the State and County or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept Vernon Street as laid-out on the plan filed with the Town Clerk, and see if the Town will vote to raise or appropriate a sum necessary to settle damages on same.
- ART. 28. To see if the Town will vote to repair Shawsheen Street make an appropriation for same on take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 29. To see if the Town will vote to increase the salaries of the Town Auditor and the Town Treasurer, from \$250 to \$350 per year, and that the Selectmen's salary be increased \$50 each, per year, or take any other action relative thereto.

- ART. 30. To see if the Town will vote to repair Astle Street with cinders, or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 31. To see if the Town will vote to cut brush and widen Rogers Street from Whipple Street to Pike Street, and raise or appropriate money for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 32. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a 5-ton 4 wheel drive dump-body truck, raise or appropriate money for same or take any other action relative thereto.
- ART. 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175 in addition to the balance of last year's appropriation, to erect a curb between Town Hall Ave. and property of Arthur Roper.
- ART. 34. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute and deliver a deed on its behalf to Arthur H. Roper and Minnie R. Roper, of Lot 1 on a plan of land in Tewksbury, surveyed May 16, 1925, by J. C. and W. T. Monahan, Civil Engineers.
- ART. 35. To see if the Town will vote to abolish the Highway Commissioners, and to vote for one Highway Road Surveyor, who would have full charge of all highways, for a term of one year to take effect in 1927.

#### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1925

The year just ended has been rather a strenuous one for your Committee. The addition to the Foster School has been completed, and the report of the School Building Committee will be found in detail elsewhere in the Town Report.

The members of the School Committee, at this time, express their thanks and appreciation to Mr. Henry M. Billings, chairman of the Building Committee and to Franklin F. Spaulding, secretary. To the late Mr. Benjamin Spaulding we are greatly indebted for his advice and strenuous work on this Committee and know that he will be missed by us all.

The heating of the Shawsheen School has been a serious problem. Your Committee asked for the sum of \$2431.00 to install a steam heating plant. After a conference with the State Inspector, they found that it would be necessary to remodel the basement, but to do this \$2000.00 more would be needed. We are indebted to Inspector Cobb for his expert advice regarding remodeling the furnace and changing the piping and feel sure that the plant will now give satisfaction. The building should be painted inside and the roof repaired.

At the North School this year the attendance has increased rapidly and we fear that another year will bring a very congested condition. Therefore, we are asking for a committee to investigate the matter, and report at the next Town Meeting.

During the summer, your Committee held a hearing regarding the closing of the West School, which they felt to be for the best interest of the Town. There was so much opposition that they voted to indefinitely postpone the matter.

#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee of the Town of Tewksbury,

Mrs. Larrabee and Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my thirteenth annual report which is the thirtyfifth in the series of Superintendents' Reports. The year has been a successful one, and with the occupation of the New Foster Building your schools are in the best condition known for several years.

Teachers and Supervisors. The only change among the supervisors was caused by the resignation of the Supervisor of Drawing, Miss Gladys Pillsbury of your own town. Miss Pillsbury has always given satisfaction, her loss from our schools is regretted.

In the selection of Miss Elizabeth Ward of Springfield, a graduate of the art department of Skidmore College, I believe that we have been fortunate. While Miss Ward has had but one term of service she has won the cooperation of both teachers and pupils by the sensible, sympathetic manner in which she has conducted her department.

But three teachers have left town during the year, Miss Marion Adams to teach in Worcester and Miss Marguerite Tellier and Miss Anna Mulligan, both to teach in Lowell. You may judge of the estimation in which Miss Tellier was held by the fact that she was at once placed at the Bartlett School as one of the Training Teachers connected with the Lowell Normal School. The Principal of the Normal School secured Miss Catherine Graham for the vacancy at the For the vacancy caused by Miss Tellier's resignation Miss Sarah O'Brien was secured, and for the additional teacher needed at the Spaulding School Miss Margaret Flynn was chosen. Both of these young teachers were highly recommended, not only by the Normal School, but by the teacher of one of our own Training Schools, I am pleased to note that each is doing satisfactory work. Miss Marguerite Benson who succeeds Miss Adams at the Foster has taught for me in Dracut for several years.

Foster School. The completion and renovation of the Foster School gives us as well equipped a building as one can find in the State. There are eight good rooms, each well lighted, and well heated and ventilated, and, with one exception, well equipped with modern, adjustable furniture. The building is not as valuable, financially, as though built of brick, but from a practical view point of school use the building is just as good and as useful as though built entirely new, and of the most expensive material. The financial report of the Build-

ing Committee will be given elsewhere, but it seems to me not out of place for me to say here that I consider that this Building Committee did a valuable piece of work for the school children of Tewksbury by making possible for them this modern building., and that the Committee saved the town a large sum of money when one considers that a new building containing besides the eight rooms, a hall, a manual training room, and a lunch room, would have cost certainly three times as much as the expenditure on the present Foster School.

Water. In connection with the above topic I wish to call to your attention the fact that the water supply has as yet been unsatisfactory, and we are now obliged to bring drinking water into the school at a considerable daily inconvenience and a considerable yearly expense.

The town of Dracut is to make the attempt of redriving a condemned well, and safe guarding it against further pollution. If this experiment proves a success I hope that we may make a similar attempt at the Foster next year.

North. I have known this school twelve years. When I first knew it there were twenty pupils in one room with two small rooms built on to the original one-room building for the convenience of the student-teachers from the Normal School.

Today there are seventy-one pupils with two teachers and grade eight transported to the Foster School. There is no more room than formerly, but the two small rooms have been thrown together by the partial removal of the partition. This seems about all that can be done in-as-much as the present building consists of an old type oneroom school, with the addition apparently in the form of a "lean-to". What we term the primary room is filled to the point of overflowing. Something should be done soon; if possible before September of next There are several possible solutions of the problem; one, the easiest, to transport more pupils to the Foster; another, the best, to dispose of the old building and build a new, compact four room building, all of which would be used by the regular and training teachers now at the school; a third and cheaper plan, would be to erect a oneroom building well lighted and heated, so near the present building that the same water and the same toilets could be used. This plan would allow the smaller rooms to be used for the normal students as originally planned.

The situation at the North seems to me to be of sufficient importance to demand the appointment of a committee to make investigation of the situation and needs of this section, and report their findings at a subsequent meeting.

New Furniture. Modern adjustable furniture is demanded for the pupil of today. There are but two schools in town with the old time non-adjustable school desks, one is the North where about thirty five desks are of the old type, and the other is in one of the rooms at the New Foster where fourteen old type desks may still be found. I recommend that new, adjustable standards be secured where needed.

Playground. Now that the school at the Center will remain permanently on the site so long occupied by the Foster School it seems wise to secure the field lying to the north west of the school grounds. For several years this field has been occupied by the school, but rental has been paid annually. If the town owned the lot it could be improved at a small expense and made a suitable playground and athletic field. It is possible that the Parent Teachers Association may be able to assist in this matter.

Parent Teachers Association. Tewksbury has had for several years a prosperous, well attended association, keen to learn the problems of the school and anxious to help in the solution of them. I quote from the report recently sent me by Mrs. Mary E. Mahoney, president of the Association.

"Tewksbury has had a Parent Teacher Association for four years.

'The object of the Association is to promote high standards of home life, and co-operation between parents and teachers, in order to secure the best physical, mental and moral development of the child.'

The school needs the help of the home. The home needs to know the school and to see children as the school sees them. It is only when parents and teachers are intelligently co-operating that education can be entirely successful.

There are in this country 14,000 Associations with almost a million members.

The Tewksbury Parent-Teacher Association meets once a month, the first Tuesday, in the Town Hall. The first part of the evening is devoted to a business meeting—then an entertainment, and usually a speaker—followed by refreshments and a social hour.

Some of our activities have been the giving of prizes to the children for perfect attendance during the school year—helping to organize a Boy Scout Troop—a gaining of a promise to place danger signs near each school in town.

We have ninety members, we hope to grow. Our aim is to have every person in Tewksbury, who is interested in the school child, a member, that means every adult in Tewksbury."

West School. This district differs from others, here we have a modern, well equipped building, but with a small number of pupils. Last summer it was voted to discontinue this school and transport the pupils to the Foster, as it was believed that there would be but fourteen pupils attending in September. Upon request of many of the parents a hearing was granted by the committee and the vote to close the school was rescinded. You will notice from the Table of Statistics that the total enrollment this year is eighteen, the present enroll-

ment is seventeen. The saving in school expenditure would have been considerable had it seemed best to close this school.

Barge Routes. A larger barge is run from West district this year, thereby carrying all the pupils who are more than a mile from school.

A large class from the North in the eighth has again made it necessary to transport from this village to the Foster.

Club Work. The Middlesex Farm Bureau has continued with club work among the Tewksbury pupils. You can judge of what is being done from the directors report, from which I quote.

"In the 4-H club activities- 71 boys and girls were enrolled in the clothing, lunch box, poultry, garden, canning and calf clubs under the leadership of Omar Blanchard, Harper Gale, Mrs. E. P. Mc Laren, Mrs. C. E. Foster and Miss Velma Trull.

"Accomplishments were shown at the Centre in the Spring Achievement program held in conjunction with the Extension Service Movies, while in North Tewksbury, a program was held at the school. Club members also exhibited at the Middlesex North Agricultural Society.

"Helen Flint, Alice Crosby and Evelyn Fuller were awarded a trip to the Massachusetts Agricultural College for their outstanding work.

"The Junior Director for the town is Velma Trull who is also the secretary of the 4-H Alumni club."

Teachers Club. I am pleased to report that the teachers of Dracut and Tewksbury have organized for the purpose of sociability and professional growth. Miss Spaulding of Dracut is president and Miss Eagles of Tewksbury is secretary, there is a membership of over fifty.

I am ambitious for my teachers and am always gratified when they take any step looking toward professional advancement as I believe this does.

Banking. A banking business has been carried on with the Mechanics Savings Bank of Lowell. You will note from the statistics that a very considerable sum has been deposited in a year, in fact an average of \$51 per week for each banking week.

Both the bank and the school is much pleased with the results.

Visual Education. The last mail brought to my desk a pamphlet under the caption, "The Eyeway of Teaching History is the Highway of Successful Learning", which means that the mind more easily retains what it has seen. During the year we were able to secure a good picture machine for the use of our schools. Valuable lessons in history, geography and health are being given.

Graduation. On Tuesday evening, June 23, 1925, after a pleasing program Mr. Hector Jackson, Chairman of the School Board, presented diplomas to the following pupils: Merle Lola Burgess, Eileen Clare Carmody, Nellie A. Chase, Alice McBride Clancy, Dorothy May

Davis, Anna S. Haas, Ruth Fletcher, Bertha Marion Flint, Helen Gertrude Flint, Mary Julia Furtado, Marion Elizabeth Guyer, Gertrude Alice Kane, Louise MacPherson Kelley, Rachel L. Lynsky, Marie G. Parsons, Mary L. Pupkis, Thelma Louise Small, Max Abrams, Billy Barousky, Harris M. Briggs, John Joseph Croteau, John Patrick Mahoney, Wilfred James McCoy, Herbert Parker, Alexander Pinkos, Kenneth Harold Pollette, James William Roberts, Matthew Stevenson, Algird A. Suskis, James J. Toothaker, Edward Wener.

Of these thirty-one graduates 25 entered high school, 3 moved from town, and 3 are at home or are working.

High School. There were enrolled in September 1925 at the Lowell High School the following pupils from Tewksbury. #### REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

To the Superintendent and School Board of Tewksbury:

The requisition of education is two fold; 1, that the child be made accomplished; 2, and happy. Undoubtedly the question has often been asked. "What does school music offer toward this end?"

I believe I am not exaggerating when I say no less than fifty per cent of the first graders cannot sing a tune wifen they enter school. The first work, is to help these little folks to find their singing voices. This done, the next step is to give them a repertoire of beautiful, childlike songs and a high standard of tone quality and interpretation. Hand in hand with this instruction goes the music appreciation lesson thro which the child becomes acquainted and learns to love good music. As he advances, sight reading is added to his music activities: he learns to orient himself on a page of music, and to read his tunes intelligently, as he does his stories. He is also given the opportunity of chorus singing, that most vital and inspiring phase of music work. Thro all the years of his school life, his musical education may go hand in hand with his academic and technical work. Whether he be a performer or appreciative listener only, he has gained a social and civic asset as valuable in maturity, as in youth.

Pupils entertained the Parent-Teachers twice during the season of 1924-25. The first was a Fete of the Nations presenting folk songs and dances. The second was a play presenting Mother Goose rhymes in action and song. Dec. 9th the Foster and Spaulding schools presented a Christmas entertainment. The money is to be used to purchase playground necessities, and records in the music appreciation course of the Music Education Series. A certain percent of these records are songs from the Music Education Series, that is, the music books which are used in the school. These serve as a bridge between singing by the pupils and intelligent listening to the classics. We all enjoy listening to familiar scores. From that idea this course is de-Songs the child knows are given, one with soprano voice, another violin or trumpet, another introduces the rhythmic side, so something new is introduced, while they are enjoying something familiar. Gradually the ensembles are introduced, until all the attributes of music are adequately represented. Two cases, that is 26 records are to be purchased. This will give a good start to the course and also give us records to continue our yearly music memory contest in the seventh and eighth grades.

We are gradually realizing our aims and desire of a standardized and interesting course in music and music appreciation which go hand in hand.

The nurse has followed up the cases of very bad teeth and tonsils, and through the co-operation of the Lowell hospitals, and clinics, and her personal care of the children, to and from these clinics, we have seen worth while results.

It is with pleasure I present to you my first annual report of the work in Drawing in the Tewksbury Schools.  $\dot{}$ 

Education in Art today is not complete if the scholars are offered only a smattering of water color, a bit of crayon and pencil technique, and a few rules of perspective, which never go any farther than just the theory. Art education must have a definite influence on the Student and be of some very definite value to him, just as the other subjects that he studies.

There are many elements in a complete art education, and so my work includes many phases. The lower grades have problems involving color, crayon work, weaving, paper tearing and cutting, object drawing, construction work and design. The upper grades make a more complete study of color and design, and are taught printing, painting and perspective. By applying these problems to daily life, they have a more practical and lasting benefit. Holiday work, health posters, advertising problems and handicraft all have their place in the grades. At Christmas time every grade made window decorations, and many gifts. These gifts included blotters, calendars, boxes, greeting cards and envelopes. By making the courses varied I hope that every child will discover a medium best suited to his own expression. In this way his interest will be sufficiently stimulated and his work will become a pleasure.

I want to thank you, Mr. Randall, for your worthy advice, and the teachers for their interest, cooperation and enthusiasm in my work.

#### REPORT OF MANUAL TRAINING

Mr. C. L. Randall, Supt. of Schools, Tewksbury, Mass.,

Dear Sir:—I have the honor to submit the following report of the Manual Training work in the Foster School.

Owing to the size of the classes the work has been limited to the seventh and eighth grades since Sept. The seventh grade is continuing the schedule of projects which were begun last year. The boys are making towel racks foot stools, toys, etc. These boys also do repair and construction work about the building.

Grade eight is allowed to select their own work as far as possible. The boys are making medicine cabinets, tabourets, toys, hall trees and tool boxes.

Last year a schedule of projects was started in the sixth grade. These are to continue thru the remaining years of the course. The boys begin with the simplest articles or exercises and continue thru more difficult projects, giving the boys experience in tool processes, manipulation and care as well as lumber uses and terms. We also do some plan reading and any boy who shows proper interest is allowed to select his own work.

When we moved into our new shop we had no equipment except some benches. Now we have a tool closet, and a black board. An old closet has been built into a teachers desk. Tool racks have been built in the stock room and lockers for class projects have been built under the tool closet.

We have under construction a mitre box table, a finishing table and closet, a first aid cabinet, a clamping and gluing stand. This has all been done by the boys, mostly of the eighth grade, as well as putting up curtains in the hall. Last Spring we also refinished most of the desks in the seventh grade room.

It is not my intention to turn out carpenters, as some think, but rather to teach the boys to have a fair working knowledge of woodworking. That, if they desire to follow that line of work, will have a good background. But if not, they will have a knowledge of craftsmanship which will be of value in their own homes. All of which will contribute toward our goal of better American Citizenship.

#### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

January 8, 1926.

To the Superintendent and the School Committee of Tewksbury:

As School Nurse I submit the following report January 1st to

December 31st.

I have made two hundred and eighty-five visits to the schools. Every child in school has been weighed and measured every two months and a record sent home. In September sixty eight per cent of our children were under weight: by the end of October almost every child had made a substantial gain. I believe this is due to the establishment of regular habits that come with the opening of school and to the serving of milk in school.

I have made one hundred and fifty-one visits to the homes and the parents have been willing to co-operate with me in obtaining correction of defects in their children. I have taken one hundred and twenty-seven children to Dental clinics. I have taken six children to the hospital for the removal of tonsils and adenoids and have obtained corrections in vision for seven children.

Twenty-six children were successfully vaccinated in school this Fall. Dr. Larrabee has examined one hundred and ninety seven children this Fall. I tabulated the defects found and will try to get as many corrections as possible. I have done one hundred and three simple dressings in school.

I have used the new lantern and given three illustrated talks on Health subjects.

The measles are hard to control and we have had many cases but I think the epidemic is almost over.


