Andrew Neilson, Seattle, Shot Mrs. Ollie Wick, Seattle, and Himself in Regent Hotel

Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Loughran and Mrs. Mabel Meyers Held as Inquest Witnesses

Vancouver, May 11-An involved love tangle reached a tragic climax here last evening when Andrew Neilson, 1300 Block, Northlake Avenue, Seattle, shot to death Mrs. Ollie Wick, 4845 Forty-seventh Ave-Wick, 4845 Forty-seventh Avenue Southwest, Seattle, in the Regent Hotel, and then committed suicide. J. F. Loughran and Mrs. Laughran, 4007 Sunnyside Avenue, Seattle, and Mrs. Mabel Meyers, 4420 Forty-seventh Avenue Southwest, Seattle, involved in the tragedy, are held by the police as material witnesses at the inquest, which is to be held this afternoon in the city morgue.

Police who answered the first call from the hotel at \$.20 p.m. found the body of Mrs. Wick, with four builet wounds in the breast, in a chair, and that of Neilson with a bullet through the heart, face down on the floor. Mrs. Meyers was found in an adjoining room and the Loughran couple in the hallway on the seventh floor, three floors above that on which the shooting occurred.

, LEADERS CONFESSED MURDERS IN SOFIA

All Principals in Bulgarian Bomb Outrage But One Pleaded Guilty

Marco Friedmann Asked That He be Shot if Death Decreed by Court

Vienna, May 11.—Dispatches from Sofia say all the principals charged with reaponsibility for the recent bombing of the Sveti Kral Cathedral, in which, 160 persons were killed, have pleaded guilty with the exception of one defendant named Koeff.

The court deferred judgment after the pleas of guilty had been made. Marco Friedmann, alleged leader of the conspiracy, asked that he be shot in the event the death penalty was imposed. Headgorsky, sacristan of the cathedral, charged with having assisted the conspirators, begged that he be imprisoned, not killed, so that he might atone his misdeed by prayer and pentence.

URDER AND NATIVE KILLED AND 100 HELD IN JOHANNESBURG

Johannesburg, S.A., May 11.-One native was killed and 100 were arrested as the outcome of an attack upon six native de-tectives to-day while making a liquor raid. Seven hundred natives participated in the attack and the position of the detectives became so serious that the European policemen with them were obliged to use their revolvers.

The incident related in the above dispatch is similar to the recent riot in Bloemfontein, in which four natives were killed and a number wounded when police seized a quantity of Kaffir beer. The illicit making of this beverage is prohibited under new regulations recently announced.

WOMAN'S DOMAIN

Countess of Oxford Publishes
Another Book of

London, May 11.—An interesting political contretemps has come to light with the publication of a letter in the newspapers from Lady Oxford apologizing to David Lloyd George. Lady Oxford better known as Margot Asquith, a few days ago published her second book, "Places and Fersons," which like her earlier book is full of candid and incisive pen pictures or extracts from her diary. One of them, "a wasp in the jam," refers to Lloyd George's "absence of political principle and pathetic ignorance in foreign affairs." Aftere are other uncomplismentary references in the book to Mr. Lloyd George.

Lady Oxford's letter in the press to-day is a frank apology. She asserts that the passage in question about Mr. Lloyd George was written some years ago and was not intended for publication.

"Through a most blameworthy inadvertence on my part," she says, "it escaped my notice and was not deleted from the proof. I wish to express publicly as I already have done privately to Lloyd George my sincere and extreme regret." London, May 11.—An interesting

Washington, May 11.—Homage was paid to the sacrifice of American mothers in the nation's wars in Mothers' Day ceremonies at Arlington National Cemetery.

Speaking for the attending foreign delegations of the Women's Council, Lady Aberdeen, its president, declared "this is a day in which the mothers of all countries can join to hold high the example of those valiant young lives whose loss has darkened so many homes."

The German delegates were absent from the service and, in explaining this, they said they thought it would have been inappropriate for them to attend in view of the presence of United States army and navy officers. They would have joined heartily under other circumstances.

Washington, May 11.—The International Council of Women's Conven-

Whether the council had actually passed a resolution urging government to submit to the court of international justice all juridicial disputes remained in doubt owing to the confusion arising out of the use of three languages—French, German and English—in the council's deliberations.

The German delegates abstained from voting on the disarmament resolution after losing their fight, 247 to 99, to have eliminated a sentence stating "nations will not agree to disarm until they feel some sense of security," on the ground that it infringed on the council's constitutional ban on political issues.

LADY ARENDEEN RE-ELECTED—Lady Aberdeen, president of the international council, who was reelected after serving intermittently for twenty-five years in that position, held a round table conference with women of the Latin-American countries, regarding the growth of their organizations.
