## CAMELLIAS

Camellias are noted for their exquisite blossoms which begin to appear in early fall before frost and continue to bloom through March. Even after flowering, Camellias make handsome evergreen shrubs with their dark green, glossy leaves and compact growth. Besides their beauty, they have a definite value as an investment, for they become increasingly valuable with age. The graceful single flowers, the gigantic semidouble blossoms, the tremendous peony type flowers, in all their variety of colors, lend themselves perfectly for use in corsages or charming table decorations.

Camellias will stand a lower temperature without injury to flower buds than almost any other winter flowering plant. The graceful single varieties do well in colder climates, and all varieties thrive in the South and Gulf Coast sections. For the first few summers after transplanting, the plants should be protected from the full sun with a lattice frame or cheesecloth shade. The ideal location for Camellias is in partial shadefull shade prevents their free blooming and full sun will cause burning of the leaves.

A good mixture to use if the soil is not fertile is one-half good garden soil or sandy loam, one-fourth well-rotted cow manure, and one-fourth peat or leafmold, well mixed. After planting, mulch with halfrotted leaves or peat. Each spring, Camellias should be fertilized with well-rotted cow manure, bone-meal, and cottonseed meal. Plants should be kept well-mulched and well-watered at all times, particularly during the first two summers after transplanting, but never watered so much that the ground becomes soggy.

The foliage of the Camellia is sometimes attacked by the "Camellia Scale" which may be easily controlled with an oil emulsion. In spraying it is necessary to wet particularly the underside of the leaves and the very tender leaves.

## Rare Class

## AZALEAS

Azaleas are the most colorful and beautiful flowering plants of the South. They are perfectly hardy in the open, and by making a careful selection of varieties, one may secure a continuous profusion of flowers from January to May or June.

Azaleas require a loamy, well-drained soil that has a slightly acid reaction. Leaf mold and peat should be added to this soil for mulching; small quantities of sand should be added to heavy, stiff soils, in addition to leaf mold and peat. Leaf mold, peat, and mulching with decayed leaves helps to maintain an acid soil, to retain moisture, and to furnish plant food for the next year.

Azaleas have a very superficial root system, and should, therefore, be watered generously and heavily mulched during dry weather. They should be planted in partial shade where they are not exposed to the hot afternoon sun, and they should never be cultivated. If the plants are potted, they should be re-potted after flowering and before new growth begins. Keep the plants in a shaded place for several days, then place pot and all in the ground.

Very little fertilizer is required for these plants. They require about three light applications of cottonseed meal per year. Plants that produce a quantity of sappy growth are more likely to be killed by freezing weather than those that grow more slowly. As a rule, the Kurume variety is hardier than the Indica.

Native host plants and a lack of water will subject the Azalea to attacks of the red spider, tingids or lace fly. Spraying under the leaves with a strong force of water when watering the plants will keep down red spiders and thrip. These insects usually hatch in May, and the plant should be sprayed with Black-Leaf 40 at this time, the proper concentration being three teaspoonfuls to one gallon of water, and two to three teaspoonfuls of soapflakes. Should the plants be seriously infested, spray at intervals of ten days. Usually, however, a spraying in May and again in September will control the insects. Care should be taken to spray thoroughly the undersides of the leaves as well as the visible parts of the plant.

## Indica Azaleas

The Indica Group as a whole is fast growing with masses of large flowers. It is particularly adapted for landscape planting all along the Gulf Coast and Atlantic Coast regions. We list only those that have proved satisfactory for Houston and vicinity. It is our belief and recommendation that these plants should be used more freely in landscaping in this section.
