Another Revolutionary Here is genet—On the 22d ult. in the county of Hanover, Virginia, Capt. Sautum Tirsuary aged 77 years. Captain Tinsley entered the Revolutionary army at the age of 18 years, and continued in the service until the close of the war. He served as a Coronet and then as a Licutionant of Cavalry in Major Nelson's corps of Horse. He was at the siege at York, and upon the aurrender of the British army he was ordered to conduct the prisoners to Winchester, where he remained until they were exchanged. After the close of the Revolutionary war, he educed in the service of the North Western Army, as a Captain under General Wayne, where he distinguished himself in the Indian battles, he continued in this service until a treaty of poarse was made with the Indian tribes. He was then stationed upon the frontiers of Georgia, and continued in the service until the reduction of the army, under Mr. Jefferson's administration, he was at that time the oldest Captain in the American Army. He performed thany valuable services in the war of the Revolution, and subsequently in the Indian wars, and was regarded as a most efficient, brave, and high-minded officer.
